WAGNER-ROBERT MORRIS SCENE-SETTER

The Wagner football team hosts longtime Northeast Conference (NEC) rival Robert Morris on Saturday. November 4 in a high noon Senior Day matchup at Hameline Field.

ABOUT THE SEAHAWKS

Wagner (2-6, 0-3 NEC) is looking to snap a three-game losing streak and pick up its first NEC win of the season against the Colonials. The Seahawks are coming off a 31-16 home loss to Bryant last week. Junior running

back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade / Milford Academy) exploded for 228 yards on 25 carries against the Bulldogs, delivering the top rushing game by a Seahawk in six years, en route to claiming NEC Offensive Player of the Week honors. Bryant, however, was able to use several big plays from wide receiver Jean Courant, who found the end zone three times, including a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. Following his 228-yard performance, which was the first 200-yard game by a Seahawk since former NFL running back Dominique Williams gained 216 yards at Robert Morris on November 12, 2011, Fulse now ranks seventh nationally in the FCS with 832 yards rushing. His performance against Bryant was also the 11th-best single-season rushing game by an FCS player this season. At quarterback, junior Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) is third in the NEC with a 60.5% completion rate, having connected on 101-of-167 passes for 1,032 yards, five touchdowns and six interceptions. Defensively, junior linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) continues to lead the Seahawks. Following an eight-tackle, one-sack effort vs. Bryant, the Central Florida transfer ranks No. 5 in the NEC with 68 tackles (36 solo, 32 assisted), in addition to ranking No. 3 in both sacks (37) and tackles for loss (12).

ABOUT THE COLONIALS

Like Wagner, Robert Morris (2-6, 0-3 NEC) is in search of its first conference win of the season under fifth-year head coach and former Pittsburgh Steeler, John Banascak. Last week, RMU dropped a 36-7 decision at Saint Francis U despite sacking Red Flash quarterback Bear Fenimore four times. The Colonials feature a young lineup, particularly on the offensive side of the ball, where three redshirt-freshmen and three true freshmen are listed as starters. Junior quarterback Jimmy Walker has completed 48.5% of his passes for 1,164 yards, five touchdowns and six interceptions. Redshirt-freshman running back

Harrison Dreher paces the RMU ground attack with 319 yards while sophomore wide receiver Tim Vecchio has a team-best 19 catches for 174 yards. Defensively, junior inside linebacker Adam Wollet is the team's leading tackler with 78 stops (30 solo, 48 assisted).

FULSE NAMED NEC/HONORABLE MENTION FCS OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Junior running back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade / Milford Academy) has been named the Northeast Conference (NEC) Offensive Player of the Week following his stellar 25-carry, 228-yard rushing game vs. Bryant on Saturday, the league office announced on Monday. The 228-yard effort marks the top rushing game by a Seahawk in six years, as Fulse became the first Seahawk to break the 200-yard rushing barrier since former NFL running back Dominique Williams went for 216 yards at Robert Morris on November 12, 2011. Fulse also accounted for the highest individual rushing total in a NEC contest since 2014. In addition, Fulse earned Honorable Mention STATS FCS National Players of the Week Fulse, who also had a five-yard reception in the game, went 38 yards for a touchdown on a 3rd-and-1 play midway through the third quarter to draw the Seahawks to within one score at 17-9. With Wagner trailing, 24-9, Fulse then exploded for 53 yards to give the Seahawks a 1st-and-10 at Bryant's 19-yard line on their second touchdown drive of the period. Earlier in the game, his 36-yard burst into Bryant territory set up Wagner's game-tying, first-quarter field goal while the junior's 20-yard rush brought Wagner into the red zone during the closing minutes of the opening half. The powerful, yet nimble 5-11, 195-pound Fulse, has now moved up to seventh nationally among FCS runners with 832 yards rushing on the season. In addition, his 228-yard explosion vs. the Bulldogs was the top rushing game by an NEC player this season and the 11th-best single-game effort. This latest accolade marks the fifth time this season that a Seahawk has earned a league player of the week honor. Freshman kicker Eric Silvester (Lincolndale, NY / Somers) has picked up a pair of NEC Rookie of the Week awards, on September 18, and again on October 9. Wagner had two players of the week on October 2, when junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) was tabbed the conference's offensive player of the week while sophomore defensive back David Thomas (Buffalo, NY / South Park) picked up co-defensive player of the week honors.

This is Wagner College

As tenacious as any Seahawk, Wagner College enjoys a bucolic perch atop Grymes Hill overlooking Manhattan and the other boroughs of New York City. Founded in 1883 as a Lutheran proseminary, Wagner has evolved to become an independent residential liberal arts college enrolling a capacity of over 2,000 students. The location of the College above the gateway to one of the world's greatest financial and cultural capitals was the work of alumnus Frank Sutter who convinced the College's Board of Trustees to relocate Wagner here from Rochester in 1918. In this, the Rev. Sutter and the trustees were extraordinarily prescient. Their wisdom provided Wagner with a distinct geographical advantage over all other all liberal arts colleges in the country. Wagner is New York State's southernmost college and its 105 park-like acres represent the highest elevation on the eastern seaboard from Maine to Key West Florida.

The College's signature curriculum – the Wagner Plan for the Practical Liberal Arts –

capitalizes on the best of a traditional, suburban, liberal arts college campus and the infinite array of educational opportunities afforded by New York City. Students intern in the world's leading financial institutions. They observe and experience diversity from the sophisticateworkings of the United Nations to melting pots of multicultural neighborhoods. They circulate in the city's unparalleled creative environment of museums, media, and performing arts. This is their laboratory. They immerse themselves and are inspired by the city's sheer energy.

The contrast between the frenetic life of the city and the almost pastoral setting of the campus is the perfect metaphor for the melding of experiential and theoretical education that is the hallmark of The Wagner Plan. In small learning communities, students and faculty explore the conceptual foundations of the arts, humanities, and sciences. The faculty challenges students to consider new ideas, to master new skills and technologies, and to reflect and draw meaning from what they have experienced in and out of the classroom.

A lush canopy of mature maples and oaks shades Wagner's 105-acre campus of manicured lawns and gardens; historic and modern buildings; and sweeping views of Manhattan, Brooklyn, and New York Harbor. No wonder Wagner students voted their campus Most Beautiful in the Princeton Review's Poll in 2005. The carefully tended campus is yet one more manifestation of the nurturing environment Wagner provides its students.

Movie companies have frequently used the campus as a





classic college setting, most recently for a movie titled "School of Rock" starring Jack Black (Shallow Hal). The picturesque campus was also used in a fall 2001 television series, The Education of Max Bixford, starring Richard Dreyfus and as the site of a prospective private military school in the HBO series, The Sopranos. The school was also used a a backdrop for current shows, Rescue Me and Law & Order.

Since the adoption of the Wagner Plan in 1997, enrollment has increased by nearly 40 percent and student quality as measured by high school average and SAT scores have improved as well. Once largely a commuter campus, now 82 percent of all undergraduates live on campus in residence halls that offer "million dollar" views. Though continuing to serve students from metropolitan New York, the college draws most of its enrollment from beyond the immediate region.

By every measure – enrollment, endowment, and national reputation – Wagner is ascending the ranks of America's strongest small colleges that blend the liberal arts with a commitment to service and preparation for the professions.

Campus life includes the array of sports provided by an NCAA Division I program which is housed in a 93,000-square-foot sports center featuring an extensive fitness center, an indoor NCAA swimming pool and a basketball arena. A football and track & field stadium showcases a variety of playing fields throughout the campus including baseball, softball, lacrosse and soccer venues.



ROBB & LIA TROPHIES

Annually at Homecoming, two Wagner College football players are selected to receive special awards for outstanding play. The James Robb Memorial Trophy is presented to the outstanding offensive player, while the Nick Lia Memorial Trophy is awarded to the Seahawks' outstanding defensive player. Established in 1949, the Robb Trophy was named in memory of James Robb, a Seahawk gridiron star who was killed in action during World War. The Lia Award is named in honor of former Seahawk great and Staten Island native, Nick Lia, who was killed in Vietnam.

This year's winner of the James Robb Offensive MVP Trophy was Luke Massei while Myron Morris was named the winner of the Nick Lia Defensive MVP Trophy.

MASSEI FIRST SEAHAWK QB OVER 300 YARDS IN 11 YEARS

In passing for 322 yards vs. CCSU on Oct. 14, QB Luke Massei became the first Seahawk quarterback to eclipse the 300-yard plateau since Matt Abbey threw for 305 yards vs. Sacred Heart on September 30, 2006.

FIRST OT GAME SINCE 2014

The Wagner-CCSU game on Oct. 14 marked the first overtime game since October 11, 2014 when the Seahawks edged Saint Francis U 46-39 in two overtimes.

WAGNER CELEBRATED FOUR OF ITS GREATEST TEAMS TODAY [1967, 1987, 1992, 2012]

Wagner celebrated the achievements of four of the most accomplished teams in the history of the football program in a pre-game tailgate and again in a halftime ceremony. This year marks the 50th anniversary for the undefeated 1967 team and the 30th for the 1987 National Champion Seahawk squad. It also marks the 25-year reunion of the 1992 team while the 2012 team will come together for its five-year reunion. The 1992 Seahawks finished the season as the ECAC Southeast Champions while compiling an 8-2 record. The Green & White of 2012 secured the first Northeast Conference Championship (NEC) in program history and a first-round victory in the NCAA Division I FCS Playoffs, which remains the lone playoff win by an NEC team.

WAGNER PLACES FIVE ON 2017 ALL-NEC PRESEASON TEAM, SEAHAWKS PICKED THIRD

Five members of the Wagner football team were selected to the 27-man, 2017 Preseason All-NEC Team, while the Seahawks were picked third in the preseason poll, as chosen by the conference's seven head coaches, the league office announced at the #NECFB Social Media Day at MetLife Stadium in July. Defensive lineman Jordan Baskerville ((West Point, NY / James I. O'Neill / Milford Academy), kicker James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple), offensive lineman Matt Diaz (Edison, NJ/Edison/Milford Academy), quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport), and wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Lackawanna CC [PA] are the Seahawks tabbed to the All-NEC Preseason Team.



NOTABLE WAGNER FOOTBALL ALUMNI

Rich Kotite (1963-1965) is perhaps the most recognizable name by Wagner College football fans. Formerly the head coach of the National Football League's Philadelphia Eagles and the New York Jets,

Kotite broke onto the football scene as a three-year performer at tight end for the Wagner football program. Kotite graduated with then school-record totals of 119 receptions and 2,065 yards in just three seasons, both of which stood for almost 20 years. Following Wagner, he played six seasons of NFL football with the New York Giants and the Pittsburgh Steelers. Kotite also worked for 13 seasons as an assistant coach under coaches as Hank Stram. Sam Rutigliano and Buddy Ryan , before rising to the rank of head coach for Philadelphia (1991-1994) and New York (1995-1996). A staunch supporter of Wagner athletics, Kotite can often be found in the stands attending a Seahawk event. Of more recent vintage, Wagner has three current former players playing professional football. Linebacker Julian Stanford is in his sixth season in the NFL and is currently on the New York Jets. Linebacker Najee Harris is in his first season with the Oakland Raiders, having earned a spot on the practice squad. C.O. Prime is in his fourth season in the CFL as a member of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

WAGNER FOOTBALL - A PROUD HISTORY

The Seahawks, who have won at least of share of two of the last three NEC championships, off to an uncharacteristic 1-9 start in 2015, have a long and proud gridiron history. Since the football program was established in 1927, Wagner



has had three undefeated seasons, in 1960 (9-0), 1964 (10-0) and 1967 (9-0). A Division III program until moving up to the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) level in 1993 (then 1-AA), undoubtedly the signature moment in Seahawk history came in 1987 when the Green & White won the NCAA Division III National Title, capping a 13-1 season with a 19-3 victory over Dayton in the championship game, known as the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl. That year, head coach Walt Hameline, who stepped down as head coach after 34 seasons at the end of the 2014 campaign, was named the 1987 Chevrolet National Division III Coach of the Year.

The NEC began sponsoring FCS football in 1996. As a result of the NCAA Board of Directors' approval of a new budget that allowed for the expansion of the Division I Football Championship Subdivision post-season bracket, the NEC gained automatic access into the Division I Football Championship beginning in 2010. In 2012, Wagner

captured its first-ever NEC title and accompanying NCAA Playoff appearance. On November 24, 2012, the Seahawks defeated Patriot League champion Colgate, 31-20, becoming the first, and to date only, NEC team to ever win an NCAA Playoff game. The following week, the Seahawks took a third-quarter lead at No. 4 Eastern Washington before the Eagles came back to post a 29-19 win. Following the 2012 season, Wagner became the first, and to date only, NEC team to finish in the Final Top 25 of both major FCS Polls (No. 21 FCS Sports Network Poll, No. 22 FCS Coaches Poll). Following the 2012 campaign, Walt Hameline earned two FCS National Coach of the Year honors (College Football News & College Sports Journal), in addition to being named NEC Coach of the Year.

Honorable Mention FCS National Offensive Player of the Week



Junior running back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade / Milford Academy) has been named the Northeast Conference (NEC) Offensive Player of the Week following his stellar 25-carry, 228-yard rushing game vs. Bryant on Saturday, the league office announced on Monday. The 228-yard effort marks the top rushing game by a Seahawk in six years, as Fulse became the first Seahawk to break the 200-yard rushing barrier since former NFL running back Dominique Williams went for 216 yards at Robert Morris on November 12, 2011. Fulse also accounted for the highest individual rushing total in a NEC contest since 2014.

In addition, Fulse earned Honorable Mention STATS FCS National Players of the Week Fulse, who also had a five-yard reception in the game, went 38 yards for a touchdown on a 3rd-and-1 play midway through the third quarter to draw the Seahawks to within one score at 17-9. With Wagner trailing, 24-9, Fulse then exploded for 53 yards to give the Seahawks a 1st-and-10 at Bryant's 19-yard line on their second touchdown drive of the period. Earlier in the game, his 36-yard burst into Bryant territory set up Wagner's game-tying, first-quarter field goal while the junior's 20-yard rush brought Wagner into the red zone during the closing minutes of the opening half. The powerful, yet nimble 5-11, 195-pound Fulse, has now moved up to seventh nationally among FCS runners with 832 yards rushing on the season. In addition, his 228-yard explosion vs. the Bulldogs was the top rushing game by an NEC player this season and the 11th-best single-game effort.

This latest accolade marks the fifth time this season that a Seahawk has earned a league player of the week honor. Freshman kicker Eric Silvester (Lincolndale, NY / Somers) has picked up a pair of NEC Rookie of the Week awards, on September 18, and again on October 9. Wagner had two players of the week on October 2, when junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) was tabbed the conference's offensive player of the week while sophomore defensive back David Thomas (Buffalo, NY / South Park) picked up Co-defensive player of the week honors.

WEEK FIVE: WAGNER 37, LEHIGH 20 (SEPT. 30, 2017)

Denzel Knight and David Thomas Names NEC Players Of The Week



Redshirt-junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) was named the Northeast Conference (NEC) Offensive Player of the Week, while sophomore strong safety David Thomas (Buffalo, NY / South Park) was tabbed the conference Co-Defensive Player of the Week, for their efforts in Saturday's 37-20 victory over Lehigh, the league office announced today.

Knight, who needed just 17 touches to gain 199 yards from scrimmage, rushed for a careerhigh 152 yards on 14 carries, highlighted by touchdown runs of 60 and 24 yards, in the win. In the opening half vs. Lehigh in what was the first-ever meeting between the schools separated by just 87 miles, Knight had just 20 yards on four carries as running mate Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade) ran for 102 first-half yards on 15 carries and two TDs, one of which was a 50-yard score.

In half number two, Knight's number was called early and often and the 6-2, 220-pound tailback took advantage. He got things going by catching a 39-yard screen pass out to trigger a quick-strike third-quarter drive that gave Wagner a 24-14 lead. Knight then opened Wagner's next drive with a 16-yard burst that and finished it off with a 24-yard TD scamper that opened a 31-14 Wagner lead. In the fourth quarter, Knight put on the exclamation point, racing

60 yards to pay dirt, sealing the 37-20 win. For the game, Knight averaged 10.9 yards per carry on his 14 carries, carrying 10 times for 132 yards in the second half alone. Knight closed out the game with his long TD run in the fourth quarter, finishing with 153 yards!



On the other side of the ball, Thomas tied the Wagner school record with three interceptions, first accomplished by Tony Smith vs. Iona on October 16, 2004, in helping the Seahawks match the school record with five interceptions vs. the Mountain Hawks. Going up against the second-ranked passing offense in the FCS, Thomas helped Wagner limit opposing signal caller Brad Mayes to his lowest completion percentage (40.0) of the season. In addition to the record-tying three picks, the Seahawks' sophomore strong safety made four tackles, including three of the solo variety.

Now one of five players in the FCS to record three interceptions in a game this season, Thomas also tied the NEC single-game record that was originally set by Central Connecticut's Chris Blackshear in 2002. Thomas' first pick came late in the first quarter when he made a diving grab on a 2nd-and-15 throw from Mountain Hawk QB Brad Mayes at midfield. His second INT came late in the first half when he snared a 4th-and-8 pass, stepping in front of Lehigh WR Gatlin Casey at the Seahawk two-yard line before returning it up the right sideline some 47 yards out near midfield. Thomas' third pilfer came early in the fourth quarter on a 3rd-and-10 play. In addition to earning player of the week honors, Knight and Thomas were named #NECPrimePerformers, as was junior inside linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF), who recorded a game-high 11 tackles to go along with two sacks.

With Wagner facing a 4th-and-1 from its own 34-yard line in the first quarter, the 5-11, 185-pound Silvester sailed his 64-yard launch that was downed at the Lions' two-yard line, one of two punts downed inside the Columbia 20 on the afternoon.

None of his kicks went into the end zone and only one of his six punts was returned by Columbia, resulting in a four-yard gain. Two of the boots resulted in fair catches. The Lions' average drive start following ester's punts was inside of their own 25.


Graham had a game-high 11 tackles, including two tackles for loss, two sacks and one interception vs. Columbia.

SPOTLIGHT – GREG SENAT OFFENSIVE LINE I 6'8" I 290 LBS. ELMONT NY I ELMONT HS MARIANAPOLIS PREP (CT)

Wagner Assistant Athletic Director of Media Relations John Beisser recently sat down for a brief Q&A with fifth-year senior two-sport standout Greg Senat, a power forward for the Wagner basketball team the past four years, who is now spending his second straight fall as the Seahawks' starting right tackle.

Question: How does your basketball background benefit you on the football field? Answer: "I think it helps me in a lot of ways. First and foremost, would be my conditioning which gives me the ability to move my feet. It really comes into play when I move laterally. If I'm beat on a play, I'm able to recover and prevent the quarterback from getting hit."

Question: Which sport is more physically demanding?

Answer: "A year ago, I would have said basketball just because of the constant movement required on both ends of the court. Coach Bash (Bashir Mason) runs some tough practices, we really got after it. This year, now that I'm in my second year, I might say football. I was really fresh last year but this year, my body is starting to feel it a bit (laughs). I sometimes have to remind myself, I've had no rest. It's been basketball, football, basketball, back to football. We work pretty hard under Coach Hoss (football head coach Jason Houghtaling) too. He works us to be our best as well. They're both demanding in different ways."

Question: Due to your size and overall play, NFL teams are taking notice of you. Do you give a professional football career a lot of thought?

Answer: "It's in the back of your mind, no question about it. I'm glad they've taken notice but I have a lot of work to do. In some ways, I'm still raw. I need to continue perfecting my technique, making sure I stay low, that my hand and foot positioning are proper...little details. I'm relatively new to football, so I'm just concentrating right now on our season and this team. Once the season's complete, my focus will shift to signing with an agent, and preparing myself mentally and physically for that next step."

Question: Entering the stretch drive of the football season, what are some of your remaining goals?

Answer: "I just want to play as best as I can so I can help my team. Individually, I just want to be the best version of myself. Football-wise, I'm kind of young and raw. I just want to continue to refine my craft and keep getting better."

Question: What was your recruitment like coming out of, first high school, and then prep school?

Answer: "As my high school career went along, I focused more and more on basketball. I didn't play football my last couple years of high school. I really didn't have any offers coming out of high school, so I decided to attend Marianapolis, where I actually spent two years. I improved a lot in my time there and so, coming out of prep school, my final schools were Drexel, St. Bonaventure and Wagner. But, I fell in love when I visited campus and the coaching staff here wanted me the most."

Question: What is your academic major and when football does come to an end, what type of career do you see yourself pursuing?

Answer: "I'm am Medical Anthropology major so I see myself working in the medical field. Both of my parents are nurses so I've always been interested in medicine and how the body works. Maybe I'll combine it with a business career as I definitely want to be a business owner."

Wagner Assistant Athletic Director of Media Relations John Beisser recently sat down with junior defensive back Sterling Lowry, one of the Seahawks' four captains, for a brief Q&A.

Question: Mr. Versatility. How many different positions have you played in your football career would you say?

Answer: "Oh man, that's tough. Let's see, in high school, on defense alone, I played strong safety, free safety, cornerback and inside linebacker. On offense, I was mainly a wide receiver but I also played some H-Back, in the slot, even quarterback. At Milford, I was a cornerback my whole season there."

Question: And what about here at Wagner?

Answer: "I've played all of the defensive back positions here — nickel, free safety, strong safety, boundary corner, field corner. I started at corner last year and then, in the offseason, Coach Hoss approached me and said for our defense this year, it'd be best for the team if I switched to strong safety. I've played both safety positions this year but mostly strong safety. Then, on special teams I'm the gunner on the punt and kickoff teams. And on punt return, I'm a cornerback, an edge rusher. Special teams, that's all effort."

Question: What makes you such a versatile player?

Answer: "I'm a good listener, I think, which helps me learn different defensive schemes and positions. My goal is to always earn the trust of my coaches and teammates and it's worked out pretty well. During my whole career, coaches have seemed to have a lot of trust in me as a player which is something I'm proud of."

Question: What were some of the factors that led you to becoming a Seahawk? Answer: "I had a knee injury in August right before my senior year of high school that required surgery and caused me to miss my whole senior season. So, I didn't really have any scholarship offers, but my high school coach had some connections with the coaches at Milford, and I was able to spend a semester there. I started at cornerback the whole season but still didn't have any offers. After the season, we had a combine where we went through drills in front of college coaches and Coach Hoss was there and ended up giving me my first offer. A couple other schools got involved, Rhode Island was one of them, but the Milford coaches had really good things to say about Coach Hoss and I was pretty set on Wagner."

Question: What is your academic major and where do you see your career progressing after your football playing career is over.

Answer: "I'm a finance major. As for a career, I'm really not sure but I would like to stay in athletics, if possible, maybe become an athletic director or a general manager. Maybe even coaching."

Question: Being such a versatile football player, did you play other sports in high school?

Answer: "I played JV basketball in eighth and ninth grade. In 11th grade, I was on the track team. In fact, I was a member of the 4x200 state championship team, so, I was a sprinter. I think I finished sixth or seventh in the stat in the 60 (meter dash)."

Question: Do you have a favorite sports team or athletes that you are big fans of? Answer: "Steelers. I've always been a Pittsburgh Steelers fan, no clue why really. I've just always been a fan of "Big Ben" (Roethlisberger). In the NBA, my favorite player is definitely Anthony Davis, so, I guess the (New Orleans) Pelicans would have to be my favorite team."



CAPTAIN SPOTLIGHT – SANTONI GRAHAM LINEBACKER I 6'1" I 225 LBS. ARLINGTON, VA I BISHOP O'CONNELL HS

Wagner Assistant Athletic Director of Media Relations John Beisser recently sat down with redshirt-sophomore inside linebacker Santoni Graham, one of the Seahawks' four captains, for a brief Q&A.

Question: How did you come to be named Santoni?

Answer: "My dad's name is Santoni, so I'm a junior, but the name is actually a combination of the first names of two of my great-great grandparents on my father's side. My great-great grandmother's first name was Sandy and my great-great grandfather's name was Toni. So, put them together and you have Santoni."

Question: What were some of the factors that led you to Wagner?

Answer: Well, I received an offer from Wagner way back when I was in the 11th grade when Coach Hameline was still the coach. After high school, I originally committed to Toledo but ended up spending a year at prep school. And I have to say, attending Fork Union was an awesome experience. It definitely helped me improve mentally as well as a football player. I'm grateful for that experience and have a lot of "brothers" from there that I'm still friends with.

"Then, when I was at Fork Union, I received a call from Coach Hoss, who had just become the head coach, and they were coming off the 2014 championship (NEC regular season). I had visited the campus years before and really liked it. Plus, New York City was exciting."

Question: What is your academic major?

Answer: "Finance"

Question: Where do you see yourself and what type of career might you pursue when your football career is over?

Answer: "I'm really wide open at the moment. Right now, I'd say I'll probably stay in the New York area and become maybe a financial advisor. But I don't really know. The west coast intrigues me and I've spent some time in Florida, so I'm not really sure."

Question: Whenever the Wagner defense comes up in conversation, the talk quickly turns to the inside linebacker combination of yourself and Quintin Hampton. Discuss your relationship with Quintin.

Answer: "With Quintin and me, it's a brotherhood. We feed off each other, we play for each other, really, we're like two brothers.

At times, there's kind of a friendly rivalry where we talk about the number of tackles each of us has. But I know he's

excited when I make plays and it's the same for me. It's a brotherhood of trust, that's the best way to put it, and that's the motto for the whole team."

Question: Are you a big sports fan and what are some of your favorite teams and athletes?

Answer: "I'm a Chargers fan from way back. I used to love to watch LT (LaDainian Tomlinson), Antonio Gates, Drew Brees, all of those guys. As for my favorite player, I'd say Tyrann Mathieu of the Cardinals. He's an undersized safety and I just like the way he plays, how hard he plays, how he's overcome adversity in his life."

Question: Off the field, what are some of the things you like to do? Answer: "In my free time, I like to hang out with my friends, nothing too crazy.







CAPTAIN SPOTLIGHT - MATT DIAZ LEFT TACKLE I 6'6" I 295 LBS. EDISON, NJ I EDISON I MILFORD ACADEMY

Wagner Athletic Director of Media Relations John Beisser recently sat down with 6-6, 295-pound fifth-year senior offensive tackle Matt Diaz, a 2016 All-NEC selection and a member of the

2017 All-NEC Preseason Team, for a brief Q&A:

Question: Why Wagner?

Answer: "Coming out of Milford, I was offered by URI (University of Rhode Island), Albany and Wagner. When I visited Wagner, it was just the feeling I got being around the guys on the team, the overall vibe of the program and the campus, that made the difference. It just felt right. Coach Houghtaling was the offensive line coach then and he was my main recruiter. We hit it off pretty well. He called me a lot on the phone and we just formed a relationship."

Question: What is your academic major?

Answer: "I earned my degree in sociology this past spring and I'm working towards a second bachelor's degree in political science. I was accepted into the MBA program here but I felt getting the second bachelor's was my best option."

Question: Whenever your football career comes to an end, either after this spring or following a professional playing opportunity, what kind of career path interests you?

Answer: "I'd like to get involved in law enforcement in some capacity. My uncle is a policeman and that might be the kind of route I take. Law enforcement is just something that I've

always seemed to be interested in."

Question: Coming off last year's 6-5 season, as preseason training camp winds down, how would you describe this year's team?

Answer: "Competitive. That's the first word that comes to mind. We're extremely competitive each day in practice. This is the first team I've been on here where one side of the ball has the better day, and the next day it's the other side. We have our way on offense at times but some days the defense has the edge. And I think that competition is driving us and making us a better team. With these personal battles each day, some of these guys on our defense, like Cam (sophomore outside linebacker Cameron Gill), are some of the best guys I'll face all season. So, when we start to mix it up with other teams, that will make us that much better. I'm very optimistic about this team."

Question: How would you describe yourself and the other three captains on the 2017 team - quarterback Alex Thomson, linebacker Santoni Graham, and defensive back Sterling Lowry?

Answer: "I'd say we're all more the leader by example types. Alex, partly cause of his position as quarterback, is probably the most vocal. I'm more of a quiet leader, that's my nature."

Question: Finally, what are some of the things you like to do in your free time, as rare as that is being a Division I football player?

Answer: "I'm a big Netflix guy. Not movies so much, but there' some shows I really like. Game of Thrones is probably my favorite. I'm a big MMA (Mixed-Martial Arts) guy, too. I love MMA. My older brother Mike, he's 27 years old and he's into MMA and has even competed in MMA matches."

Head Coach Jason Houghtaling

Former Wagner associate head coach/offensive coordinator Jason Houghtaling (hO - Tail- Ling), was elevated to head football coach on November 25, 2014 and enter his third season at the helm of the Seahawk program in 2017, after guiding the Green & White to 6-5 record and a 4-2 Northeast Conference (NEC) mark a year ago.

Houghtaling took over for Walt Hameline, who served in the dual role as Seahawk athletic director and head football coach for 34 years, before announcing that he is stepping down from his role as head coach. Hameline remains as Wagner's athletic director.

Prior to his appointment as head coach, Houghtaling spent seven seasons on the Wagner sidelines, serving as offensive coordinator during Wagner's 2012 and 2014 Northeast Conference (NEC) title runs, while in-between, spending the 2013 season as offensive coordinator at Cornell

In his last three seasons as Wagner's offensive coordinator, the Seahawks have amassed a 16-6 NEC record with league titles in two of the last three seasons. The Green & White staged a dramatic 23-20 come-from-behind victory at Bryant, marching 65 yards in the waning minutes for the game-winning touchdown that gave the Seahawks a 7-4 record, a 5-1 NEC mark, and a share of the 2014 NEC title.

The 2014 Seahawk offense followed a similar formula to the 2012 Seahawks, finishing the regular season ranked No. 4 nationally in time of possession (33:02), while not committing a single turnover in the last three games of the season.

When he returned to Grymes Hill in the capacity of associate head coach/offensive coordinator in January, 2014, this marked Houghtaling's third stint at Wagner. Known as 'Hoss' to his players and fellow coaches, Houghtaling was a Seahawk assistant coach from 2006-2009, before becoming head coach at Hudson Valley Community College in 2010. Following one season as head coach of the Vikings, he returned to Wagner as offensive coordinator in 2011, where he spent two seasons, including the 2012 NEC Championship campaign.

"Jason has a sharp football mind and he is an excellent teacher and leader of young men," said Wagner College President Richard Guarasci. "He has prepared himself carefully to be a head coach of a Division I program. He completed his Masters degree in education from Wagner



where he learned how to teach students with different and unique skills and personalities. I am delighted that he will lead Wagner's football program and continue his partnership with Walt Hamline as they take Wagner into the next generation of athletic and academic success."

During Wagner's 9-4 NEC Championship season of 2012, that saw the Seahawks become the first team in NEC history to win an NCAA FCS Playoff game and rank in the Top 25 of both final national polls, Houghtaling tutored the Seahawks' record-setting quarterback, Nick Doscher, as he evolved into one of the all-time great quarterbacks to ever compete at Wagner and in the NEC.

Doscher operated Houghtaling's offensive system with precision, finishing his career ranked No. 1 in Seahawk history, and No. 2 in NEC history, with 8,404 yards of total offense. His 6,100 passing yards are also No. 1 on the Wagner all-time list and No. 9 on the all-time NEC list. As a senior in 2012, Doscher

fashioned a passer rating of 133.9, with 13 touchdown passes and just one interception, ending his career with a remarkable 221 consecutive pass attempts without an interception.

Led by Doscher, and star running back Dominique Williams, the 2012 Seahawks were one of the nation's most balanced units, ranking No. 1 nationally with the fewest turnovers (6) in all of FCS football.

Head Coach Jason Houghtaling



"I am thrilled that Jason Houghtaling will take over as Wagner head coach and I have full confidence that he will continue to keep the Seahawks on the path to success for years to come," said Hameline. "His work ethic, passion, football knowledge, recruiting contacts, and familiarity with Wagner College are all major assets that will pay huge dividends for our program. In Hoss, we have an individual who has the respect of everyone that he comes into contact with, and is highly-regarded by high school coaches both within our region, and on a national scale."

During the 2013 season as offensive coordinator at Cornell, Houghtaling coached quarterback Jeff Mathews, who led the Ivy League in attempts, completions and passing yards, before signing a free agent contract with the NFL's Atlanta Falcons. Following the 2013 season, Mathews, who is currently a member of the practice squad of the Indianapolis Colts, was named to the College Sports Journal FCS All-America Team and received the additional honor of participating in the East–West Shrine Game, serving as captain of the East squad.

During his first season as a collegiate offensive coordinator (2011), Houghtaling directed the talented Williams to impressive numbers. Williams ranked among the national leaders by rushing for 121.6 yards per game and 14 total touchdowns, while posting eight 100-yard games in 11 contests. The following

season, Williams was a 2012 College Sports Journal All-American, in addition to earning First-Team All-NEC honors.

"Wagner is a special place for both my family and I, so it's truly an honor to be selected to continue to build this program," said Houghtaling. "I thank Coach Hameline and Wagner College President Dr. Guarasci for entrusting me with this position and can't wait to lead this program, coach our current players, and attract even more elite student-athletes in the coming years."

When he first arrived at Wagner in 2006, Houghtaling served as running backs coach, before heading the Seahawk offensive lines from 2007-2009.

With an emphasis on New York State and Florida, Houghtaling has been the lead recruiter for a host of student-athletes who have gone on to enjoy outstanding careers on Grymes Hill. The list of top Wagner student-athletes that Houghtaling has recruited include New Jerseyan Dominique Williams, New York State natives Quintin Anderson, Tyrone Collins, Chazz Legette, Stefan Gage, Patrick Gibbons, and Sidiq Soulemana, as well as Floridians Keith Hernandez, Frantz Placide and Otis Wright. In 2010, his one season as head coach at Troy, NY-based Hudson Valley Community College, he tutored two All-Conference performers.

Houghtaling began his collegiate coaching career at prep powerhouse Milford Academy in Berlin, NY, where he helped lead the Falcons to a 20-3 mark as defensive coordinator, while also serving as defensive line and strength and conditioning

coach. A 2004 graduate of the University of Binghamton with a degree in History, Houghtaling earned a Masters in Education from Wagner in 2009. He originally attended Lafayette, where he was a defensive lineman for the Leopards, before injuries cut short his playing career and he transferred to Binghamton.

Staten Island, NY - Redshirt-junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) completed 21-of-28 passes for 256 yards and a touchdown and the Wagner defense held Saint Anselm to 139 total yards, including just 10 through the air, as the Seahawks earned a 37-7 victory in the season opener for both teams.



Junior wide receiver D'Erren Wilson (Greeneville, TX / Greeneville), a 6'3" transfer from the University of Central Florida, recorded 10 receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown while redshirt junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Rochester / Salisbury School) ran for three scores as Wagner held an overwhelming 417-139 edge in total vardage.

Following a scoreless first quarter, senior Gerald Kahari (Lynn, MA / St. John's Prep) returned a punt 51 yards to the Hawks' 11-yard line to set up a five-yard touchdown run by junior running back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade / Monroe CC (NY), who was also seeing his first action as a Seahawk, as Wagner jumped on top 7-0 with 12:15 left in the third guarter.

On Saint Anselm's ensuing drive, senior linebacker Matthieu Louiselle (Quebec, Canada / Vermont Academy) stripped running back Correy King of the ball as senior defensive tackle Christan Gore (Macomb, MI / Dakota / Western Michigan) recovered at the Hawks' 31.

After Thomson connected with senior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township Lackawanna JC) and

sophomore tight end Nick Galanti (Howell, NJ / Freehold Township) on receptions of 16 and 13 yards, respectively, Knight barreled in from the two to cap a four-play, 31-yard drive.

This score, following a failed extra point, gave the Seahawks a 13-0 lead at halftime.

Wagner then put the game out of reach by opening the second half on a crisp nine-play, 65-yard drive, capped by a six yard TD strike from Thomson to Wilson in the back of the end zone, which made it a 20-0 game with 10:09 left in the third quarter.

Trailing by the count of 30-0, Saint Anselm notched its lone touchdown of the night on a three-yard run by Ben Reiffarth with 10:14 remaining in the game.

The Green & White will face a huge test next time out when the Seahawks make the long trek to Loretto, PA to meet defending Northeast Conference champion Saint Francis U on Saturday, September 9 at Noon in a game that will be carried live on ESPN3.

NOTES – With his 256-yard passing game, Thomson enters the Wagner all-time Top 10 in career passing yards, now checking in at number eight with 3,777 passing yards. The 10 passing yards allowed by the Seahawks tonight are just 10 shy of the all-time record for fewest passing yards allowed in a game. On September 23, 1978, Wagner held Hobart to 0 yards passing during a 13-8 victory. Serving as honorary captain and presiding over the pre-game coin toss was retired four-star general, David Rodriguez, who served who last served as the Commander of the United States Africa Command.

Loretto, PA - Bear Fenimore completed 20-of-31 passes for 293 yards and three touchdowns and Jymere Jordan-Toney added 105 yards on 26 carries with one score to carry defending Northeast Conference (NEC) champion Saint Francis U to a 31-6 victory over Wagner this afternoon at DeGol Field.

For Wagner, redshirt-junior quarterback Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport) broke free on a pair of long first-half runs, including a career-long 57-yard second-quarter jaunt, to finish the first half with seven carries for a career-high 85 yards.



The 6-5", 225-pound Thomson, an All-NEC Preseason choice who was hurried into 6-of-17 passing in the first half for 51 yards, was shaken up at the end of that long second-quarter run. While Thomson was able to finish out the half, with the Seahawks trailing 14-6 at the intermission, he was then replaced by junior Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) who played the entire second half at QB for Wagner.

Saint Francis U, which outscored Wagner 17-0 in the second half, outgained the Seahawks by a 390-212 margin on the afternoon and led in first downs, 19-12, while holding a 33:42-26:18 edge in time of possession.

Seeing the most extended playing time of his career, the 6-1, 190-pound Massei had his share of bright moments, finishing 9-of-15 passing for 100 yards, including completions of 31 and 30 yards to wide receivers Adam Giordano (Cherry Hill, NJ / Milford Academy) and Willie Dale (Staten Island, NY / St. Peter's), respectively.

Dale was the Seahawks' leading receiver with four catches for 46 yards. Junior wide receiver D'Erren Wilson (Greeneville, TX / Greeneville) also had four grabs for 28 yards while Giordano finished with three receptions for 44 yards.

Defensively, the Seahawks' inside linebacker tandem of Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union) and Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) was active and aggressive all afternoon, sharing game-high honors with 11 tackles apiece.

A year ago, the Seahawks were the lone NEC team to defeat SFU as Wagner earned a 31-21 win in the season finale on November 16 and Wagner got off to a solid start in today's game as well.

Sophomore speed merchant Myron Morris (Miami, FL / Booker T. Washington) got things started for the Seahawks by returning the opening kickoff 57 yards to the SFU 36. After Wagner advanced 19 yards in seven plays, fifth-year senior kicker James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/Temple) came on to boot a 34-yard field goal to give the Green & White an

After the Wagner defense forced a three-and-out, the Seahawks muffed the ensuing punt, giving the Red Flash possession at the Green & White 36. Nine plays later, Jordan-Toney ran for a three-yard touchdown to give SFU a 7-3 lead with 4:51 left in the opening quarter. That's the way things stood until midway through the second quarter when SFU quarterback Bear Fenimore hit wide receiver Kamron Lewis for a 30-yard touchdown.

The Fenimore to Lewis connection capped a four-play, 61-yard drive, the took just 2:08 and gave the Red Flash a 14-3 lead.

Morris then uncorked his second huge return on the ensuing kickoff, racing up the right sideline 73 yards all the way to the Red Flash nine-yard line. Thomson, however, was sacked twice as Wagner was forced to settle for a 43-yard field goal by Cooper that made it a 14-6 game. For Cooper, this made him 2-of-2 on the game and 3-of-3 on the young season.

The Seahawks had a chance to further cut in into the deficit late in the half. Thanks in large part to a brilliant 43-yard Thomson scamper, the Green & White had a first and 10 at the Red Flash 20. Again, the SFU stiffened, forcing Wagner to attempt a 31-yard Cooper field goal attempt which was blocked, allowing the Red Flash to take the momentum and that 14-6 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Fenimore engineered a late third-quarter 85-yard drive, capped by a two-yard TD pass to Terrell Johnson, extended the SFU lead to 21-3. The Red Flash then tacked on an early fourth-quarter 27-yard field goal by Eric Bofenkamp, followed by a 19-yard mid-fourth-quarter TD strike to wide receiver Jorge Solano to round out the game's scoring.

New York, NY - New York, NY - Columbia's Oren Milstein booted a game-winning 29-yard field goal with no time left on the clock to offset a spirited Wagner comeback effort, as the Lions edged the Seahawks 17-14 in a thriller at steamy Lawrence A. Wein Stadium at Baker Field Today.

Today's game was the season opener for now 1-0 Columbia while Wagner falls to 1-2.

Wagner trailed 14-0 at the half before roaring back with two touchdowns by junior running back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade/Monroe), including an 83-yard jaunt, to tie the game at 14-14. Fulse, who also had a 60-yard TD run negated by a holding penalty, finished with 153 yards rushing on just 19 carries, which computes to a hefty 8.1 yards per carry average.

The Seahawks, who had two field goals blocked, were led defensively by redshirt-sophomore linebacker Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union), who also had an interception, and junior linebacker Quintin Hampton

(Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF), who recorded 11 and nine tackles, respectively. In addition to Graham's interception, redshirt-sophomore cornerback Darryl Gamble (Tinton Falls, NJ / Monmouth Regional) came up with an interception which he returned 24 yards in the first start of his career in place of injured sophomore Myron Morris (Miami, FL / Booker T. Washington).

"Overall, I couldn't be prouder of a group of kids for what they did today," said Seahawk third-year head coach Jason Houghtaling. "I think whenever you're faced with adversity, guys are put into roles that they haven't been put into before, and to have them respond the way they did today...they're hurting now, but,,again, I couldn't be any prouder than I am of the team that's sitting in the that locker room who left it all out there on the field for each other."

Seahawk junior quarterback Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) made his first collegiate start, in place of the redshirt-junior Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport), who was injured in the first half of last week's game at Saint Francis U. In the face of a consistent Columbia pass

rush, Massei went a gutsy 13-of-19 through the air for 120 yards, including completions of 18 and 17 yards to junior tight end Chris Woodard (North Tonawanda, NY/North Tonawanda) and senior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ/Washington Town-ship/Lackawanna CC), respectively.

The Seahawks had a chance to put points on the board in the first half but a 44-yard field goal try by fifth-year senior kicker James Cooper was blocked, preserving the Lions' 14-0 lead heading into the intermission.

Fulse changed the complexion of the game when he broke through the left side of the line and galloped 83 yards up the left sideline for a touchdown that sliced the Seahawk deficit in half, at 14-7, with 11:53 left in the third quarter.

Late in the third quarter, Graham came up with a big interception over the middle which he returned 23 yards to the Columbia 39. On the third play of Wagner's ensuing drive, which was also the first play of the fourth quarter, Fulse got loose again, this time on a 21-yard TD sprint, that tied the game at 14-14.

This would prove to be the final points of the game for the Seahawks. After Milstein missed a 29-yard field goal attempt for Columbia in bidding to break the deadlock with 8:14 to go, Wagner methodically worked the ball to the Lions' 24 before having to settle for a 42-yard Cooper field goal try at the 1:38 mark, which was blocked.

Columbia then put together its game-winning drive that culminated in Milstein's game-winner at the end.

Kalamazoo, MI - The Wagner football team trailed by just a 21-7 count at halftime before FBS member Western Michigan pulled away for a 49-14 victory tonight at Waldo Stadium.

With the loss, the Seahawks fall to 1-3 on the season while the Broncos, who opened the season with competitive losses to then third-ranked USC (49-31) of the PAC-12, and Big 10 member Michigan State (28-14), even their season mark at 2-2.



Western Michigan, which earned its first win of the season by a 37-28 count over Idaho last week, is coming off of its best finish in school history. After claiming the MAC Championship, the Broncos took a 13-0 record into the 2017 Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic where they battled Wisconsin of the Big 10 to the wire before falling by a count of 24-16.

The Seahawks are next action on Saturday, September 30, when Wagner hosts Lehigh University of the Patriot League for a 6:00 p.m. kickoff at Hameline Field. The Mountain Hawks fell to 0-4 on the season today after dropping a wild 65-47 contest to the University of Pennsylvania. This will mark the first-ever meeting between Wagner and Lehigh whose campuses are separated by just 87 miles.

Tonight, WMU quarterback Jon Wassink completed 11-of-12 passes for 165 yards and three touchdowns while running backs Jamauri Bogan and Jarvi Franklin added 132 and 111 yards on the ground, respectively.

For the Seahawks, junior quarterback Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) gained his second consecutive start at quarterback in place of All-Northeast Conference (NEC) Preseason selection Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport). Thomson, a 6-5, 225-pound redshirt-junior, suffered a season-ending shoulder injury at Saint Francis U on October 7 and underwent successful surgery on Friday.

Trailing 21-0, Wagner punched in its first touchdown in the waning seconds of the opening half on a possession that began when junior linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) delivered a crunching hit on WMU quarterback Jon Wassink in the open field. Hampton's blow jarred the ball loose, with senior defensive back Tyamonee Johnson (Ft. Wash-ington, MD / Bullis School) recovering at the Broncos' 30-yard line.

Western Michigan initially stopped the drive with 1:11 left in the half, forcing a 47-yard field goal attempt by Eric Silvester (Lincolndale, NY / Somers), but the left-footed freshman was run into by a WMU player after the try missed, with the 15-yard penalty giving Wagner a first down at the Broncos' 15. Next, a pass interference penalty on Western Michigan in the end zone gave the Green & White a first-and-goal at the two. On first down, redshirt-junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) barreled in for the score with 19 seconds to go in the half, cutting the deficit to 21-7 at the intermission.

After WMU reeled off 28 consecutive points to open the second half, the Seahawks made it a 49-14 game on the legs of Fulse, as he carried both times on a quick-strike, two-play, 28-yard TD drive. On first down, Fulse scooted 20 yards around left end to make it first-and-goal at the eight. On the next play, the junior bulldozed his way in up the middle for the score.

The score was set up by senior defensive lineman Maurice Diawara (Lakewood, NJ / Lakewood), who scooped up a fumble and returned it 11 yards to the WMU 28.

The Seahawks had a chance to score some early points on their second offensive possession of the game. With Wagner trailing 7-0, Massei connected with redshirt-sophomore wide receiver Willie Dale (Staten Island, NY / St. Peter's) up the right sideline on 21-yard completion which sparked a 57-yard drive. After the drive stalled on the Broncos' 18-yard line, kicker James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) came on for a 35-yard field goal, but the graduate student's attempt sailed wide right.

Fulse, coming off a 153-yard, two-touchdown game at Columbia last week, finished with 61 yards rushing on 19 carries. Massei went 7-of-15 through the air for 54 yards with junior tight end Chris Woodard (North Tonawanda, NY / North Tonawanda) leading with three receptions (16 yards) while Dale led in receiving yards with 27 (two receptions). Massei was shaken up in the third quarter and replaced by true freshman Donald Glenn (Middletown, NJ / Middletown North), who went the rest of the way, completing his lone pass attempt for three yards.

Defensively, sophomore linebacker Allaah Sessions (Elmira, NY / Elmira) paced the Seahawks with a career-high seven tackles, five of them solo stops. In the punting department, Silvester, the reigning NEC Rookie of the Week for his efforts at Columbia last week, which included a career-long 64-yarder, delivered another top performance vs. WMU. Tonight, the southpaw was called on to punt the ball seven times, hitting for a 40.3-yard average with a long of 55 yards.

Staten Island, NY - Junior quarterback Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) threw for 205 yards, running backs Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School) and Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade/Monroe) ran for 153 and 107 yards, respectively, and the Wagner defense came up with a school-record tying five interceptions in a wild 37-20 win over Lehigh at blustery Hameline Field tonight.



The five interceptions by the Seahawk defense matched the five that Wagner came up with at Monmouth on October 15, 2005. Keying the big-play defensive effort was sophomore strong safety David Thomas (Buffalo, NY / South Park) who tied a school-record with three interceptions, matching the three that Tony Smith picked off vs. Iona on October 16, 2004.

The Green & White defense also delivered a five-sack effort tonight vs. Lehigh, led by two each from junior linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) and sophomore linebacker Cameron Gill (Douglasville, GA / Chapel Hill), to go with the one sack recorded by junior nose tackle Charbel Dabire (Toronto, Canada / New Mexico Military Institute).

In the first-ever meeting between schools, who are separated by just 87 miles, Wagner overcame early deficits of 7-0 and 14-7 before the Seahawks reeled off 24 unanswered points, spanning the

second and third quarters, in pulling away for the win.

For Lehigh, quarterback Brad Mayes, who entered the game ranked second nationally in passing yards, completed 18-of-45 passes for 306 yards with his favorite targets being Jorge Protorreal (eight catches, 132 yards) and Troy Pelletier (six catches, 143 yards). On the ground, Dom Bragalone rushed for 102 yards on 21 carries.

Overall, Wagner outgained Lehigh by a slim margin of 454-445 yards, highlighted by a 249-139-yeard edge on the ground.

Lehigh scored on its opening drive tonight as Mayes found Pelletier for 53 yards to the Wagner 30-yard line. Three plays later, Bragalone raced 26 yards for the score to cap a 5-play, 83-yard drive Mountain Hawks took a 7-0 lead with 12:56 left in the first quarter.

The Seahawks responded with the tying touchdown less than 1:30 later Fulse exploded for a 50-yard touchdown run to tie the game at 7-7.

The Mountain Hawks regained the lead early in the second guarter, marching 95 yards in 12 plays. A key play in the drive came on fourth-and-six from the Wagner 35yard line, when Mayes hit Portorreal for 21 yards down to the Seahawks' 14-yard line. Following a Lehigh penalty, Bragalone ran 16 yards to set up a three-yard Mayes dash from three yards out to put Lehigh back on top, 14-7, lead with 10:43 left in the second quarter.

Late in the quarter, Wagner used an 11-play drive, 70-yard drive to even the score at 14-14 with 4:34 left in the half with Fulse capping the drive from one yard out. On the ensuing kickoff, James Cooper's (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) boot into the wind dropped in front of the Lehigh return man with sophomore linebacker Allah Sessions (Elmira, NY / Elmira) pouncing on the ball at the Mountain Hawks' 23-yard line. The turnover led to a 26-yard Cooper field with 3:12 left on the clock which gave Wagner a 17-14 halftime lead.

The Seahawks struck quickly following the break, needing just 1:37 in driving 73 yards on just four plays as a 30-yard touchdown strike from Luke Massei to redshirtsophomore wide receiver Willie Dale (Staten Island, NY / St. Peter's) gave Wagner a two-score lead at 24-14 less than two minutes into the second half.

After the Seahawk defense forced Lehigh into a three and out, Wagner went 69 yards in six plays, cappyed by a 24-yard TD burst by Knight which gave the Seahawks a commanding 31-14 lead with 9:18 left in the third quarter.

The Mountain Hawks answered with a 75-play drive, capped by a Bragalone one-yard scoring run on a direct snap, which brought Lehigh to within 31-20 late in the third quarter.

Knight then put the exclamation point on the win with a 60-yard fourth-quarter TD run to forge the final score of 37-21.

Pittsburgh, PA - Boise State transfer Tommy Stuart completed 14-of-23 passes for 238 yards and four touchdowns to lead Duquesne to a 38-0 Northeast Conference (NEC) victory over injury-plagued Wagner this afternoon at Arthur J. Rooney Field.

Stuart's favorite target was wide receiver Nehari Crawford, who had six receptions for 156 yards and two scores.



With the win, the Dukes improve to 4-1 on the season, 1-0 in NEC play, while the Seahawks, who were minus their top two quarterbacks due to injury, fall to 2-4 overall and 0-2 in the conference.

Already without All-NEC Preseason selection Alex Thomson (Keyport, NJ / Keyport), who suffered a season-ending shoulder injury at Saint Francis U back on September 9, Wagner was also without junior quarterback Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) today.

During his career-high 205-yard passing day in last week's impressive 37-20 win over Patriot League member Lehigh, Massei injured his right, throwing hand and was unable to go today. Gaining his first career start in his stead was true freshman quarterback Donald Glenn (Middletown, NJ / Middletown North), who is less than one year removed from completing a nighly-decorated scholastic career along the Jersey Shore.

Seeing the first extended playing time of his young career, the 6-2, 195-pound Glenn completed 10-of-26 passes for 84 yards and was intercepted twice. Glenn completed three passes to junior tight end Chris Woodard, for 21 yards, while also connecting twice each with junior wide receiver D'Erren Wilson (Greeneville, TX / Greeneville, UCF) and senior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Townshhip / Lackawanna CC, for 20 and 18 yards, respectively.

Offensively, the Seahawks were led by junior running back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade), who rumbled for 118 hard-fought yards on a career-high 28 carries, as the Monroe College (NY) transfer topped the century mark for the third time in his six-game Seahawk career. Red-shirt junior running back Denzel Knight (Rochester, NY / Salisbury School), the reigning NEC Offensive Player of the Week, added 37 yards on 11 rushes.

The Seahawk defense, playing without its second-leading tackler in redshirt-sophomore linebacker, Santoni Graham (Arlington, VA / Bishop O'Connell / Fork Union), who suffered a lower leg injury last time out vs. Lehigh, performed well for a large portion of this game. But, in the end, the Green & White were largely undone by committing four turnovers on the afternoon, including a first-quarter muffed punt that led to Duquesne's first TD of the game.

Despite that early miscue, Wagner trailed by just a 14-0 count late in the second quarter, having forced the Dukes to punt the ball five times. After taking over on its own 44 following a Wagner punt, Duquesne marched 56 yards in six plays, capped by a 23yard touchdown pass from Stuart to wide receiver Kellon Taylor, which gave the Dukes a 21-0 halftime bulge with just 1:00 left in the half. The Dukes then managed to outscore Wagner, 17-0, over the game's final two quarters.

Defensively, sophomore outside linebacker Cameron Gill (Douglasville, GA / Chapel Hill) paced a unit that held Duquesne 29 yards below its season average, finishing with six tackles, all solo, including a sack. Senior inside linebacker Randall May (Sparta, NJ / Sparta), still rounding into shape after suffering a preseason injury, had his top game of the season, coming up with five tackles (also all solo), including a pair of tackles for loss.

Meanwhile, sophomore outside linebacker Allaah Sessions (Elmira, NY / Elmira), and sophomore strong safety David Thomas (Buffalo, NY / South Park), the reigning NEC Co-Defensive Player of the Week, added four stops apiece.

Punter Eric Silvester (Lincolndale, NY / Somers) continued his fine freshman season, averaging 39.8 yards on five punts, three of which were downed inside the 20, highlighted by a magnificent 44-yard third-quarter boot that was downed at the Duquesne one-yard line.

Team-wise, the final statistics were much closer than the final score would indicate. In fact, Wagner out-rushed Duguesne, 153-142, and held a 32:59-27:01 edge in time of possession. Duquesne led by a scant 16-14 margin in first downs, in addition to outgaining the Seahawks, 380-237. The key stat was turnovers. While Wagner turned it over those four times, the Dukes played a clean offensive game, not turning the ball over one time.

Staten Island, NY - Junior quarterback Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) completed 27-of-50 passes for 322 yards and three touchdowns, senior wide receiver John Williams (Sewell, NJ / Washington Township/Lackawanna CC) had eight catches for 111 yards and two TDs, and sophomore cornerback Myron Morris (Miami, FL / Booker T. Washington) came up with two interceptions, including a 39-yard pick six, but in the end Central Connecticut was able to survive in a wild 51-45 four-overtime thriller.

Wagner overcame a 27-7 second-quarter deficit before holding CCSU scoreless for two and a half quarters and didn't take its first lead of the game until it was 37-34 in overtime.

CCSU running back Cameron Nash rushed 24 times for 104 yards and three touchdowns, with all scores coming in overtime, to lead the Blue Devils to their fourth straight win.

Central took a 3-0 lead on a 31-yard field goal from Frankie Palmer midway through the first quarter. CCSU then blocked a Seahawk punt which led to a one-yard TD run by Enyce Walker to cap a 15-yard drive and extend the lead to 10-0 before the end of the first quarter.

After Palmer kicked a 37-yard field goal to make it 13-0, the Seahawks put together a well-executed eight-play, 75-yard drive that culminated in a seven-yard TD pass from Massei to Williams which cut the lead to 13-7 with 9:56 left in the second

quarter.

Central responded quickly as Jacob Dolegala hit running back Drew Jean-Guillaume on a 43-yard touchdown pass to stretch the lead to 20-7. Wagner was on the move on its next possession when Tymir Hinton picked off a Massei pass in the end zone and returned it 100 yards for the score, giving the Blue Devils a 27-7 lead for the Blue Devils with under five minutes to play in the second quarter.

Wagner answered and cut the lead to 27-14 with 3:04 left before halftime on a quick-strike four-play, 66-yard drive in 1:38 capped by a 15-yard TD pass from Massei to freshman wide receiver Joshua DeCambre (Staten Island, NY / Curtis). Graduate student James Cooper Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) then booted a 31-yard field goal to open the third quarter to cut the CCSU lead to 27-17.

The rest of the third quarter was scoreless before Cooper connected again from 37 yards out to make it a 27-20 game with 11:49 left in the fourth quarter. On the next Blue Devil possession, Dolegala threw his second interception of the game, as Morris stepped in front of an CCSU receiver and raced 39 yards up the left sideline to tie it at 27-27.

In the first overtime, the Blue Devils needed just one play as Nash scampered in from 25 yards out to make it 34-27. Wagner answered on a throwback TD pass from Massei to fifth-year senior tight end Caleb Scepaniak (Endicott, NY / Seton-Catholic/Union-Endicott) from 12 yards to tie it at 34-34 and send the game to a second overtime.

Cooper opened the second OT with his third field goal, a 39-boot to give Wagner its first, and only lead of th game, at 37-34. On CCSU's second OT possession, Palmer kicked his third field goal of the game, this time from 22 yards, to make it 37-37 and send the game to a third overtime.

Nash scored his second touchdown of the game in the third overtime, and the two point conversion pass to WR Jose Garcia was successful to give CCSU a 45-37 lead. Wagner countered with a touchdown on a gadget play as junior wide receiver D'Erren Wilson (Greeneville, TX / Greeneville/UCF) connected with Williams in the deep right corner of the end zone to make it a 45-43 game. The Seahawks then converted a wild two-point conversion attempt as Massei, under pressure, flipped the ball over his left shoulder to junior wide receiver Willie Dale (Staten Island, NY / St. Peter's), who somehow snatched the deflected toss to tie the game 45-45 and send it to a fourth overtime.

Nash's third touchdown came after the Blue Devils forced an interception on Wagner's possession in the fourth overtime. Jarrod Cann picked off his fourth pass of the season to stop the Seahawk scoring attempt. Nash than ran it in from one-yard out for the game's deciding score.

Staten Island, NY - Wagner junior running back Ryan Fulse (Fort Meade, FL / Fort Meade / Milford Academy) rushed for 228 yards on 25 carries, delivering the top rushing game by a Seahawk in six years, but Bryant was able to use several big plays from wide receiver Jean Courant, who found the end zone three times including a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, to hold off the Seahawks by a 31-16 count this afternoon at Hameline Field.

> With the win, the Bulldogs improve to 3-5 on the season, 1-2 in Northeast Conference (NEC) play while the Green & White fall to 2-6 overall, 0-4 in league play.

> The Seahawks are next in action on November 4 when they host the Robert Morris University Colonials in a Noon kickoff on Senior Day, before concluding the 2017 season with road games at Stony Brook (11/11) and Sacred Heart (11/18).

> After graduate student James Cooper (Linwood, NJ / Mainland Regional/ Temple) boomed a 50-yard field goal, which had plenty of room to spare, to tie the game at 3-3 late in the first quarter, Bryant countered with that 100-yard kickoff return by Constant, who added a 25-yard touchdown reception early in the second quarter, to help the Bulldogs take a 17-3 halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Fulse, whose previous career-high rushing day was a 19-carry, 153-yard effort at Columbia (9/16), bounced outside on a third-and-1 play for 38 yards up the left sideline for a touchdown. Fulse's 38-yard scamper, which was followed by a blocked extra point which left the score at 17-9, capped a guick-strike four-play, 67-yard drive which took just 2:07.

Bryant responded with a quick answer of its own, racing 68 yards on just three plays, capped by a 31-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Price Wilson to Courant, which pushed the Bulldogs' lead to 24-9.

Undaunted, junior quarterback Luke Massei (Cary, NC / Green Hope) calmly led the Seahawks on a crisp five-play, 78-yard drive in 2:52, culminating in a well-thrown, high-arching, nine-yard TD pass to junior wide receiver D'Erren Wilson (Greeneville, TX / Greeneville/UCF) in the deep left corner of the end zone. Cooper's extra point, with 3:39 left in the third quarter, made it a one-score game at 24-16.

This is as close as Wagner would get, however, as Wilson Bryant 63 yards in nine plays, capped by a 14-yard TD pass to Constant, with just 3:30 remaining in the game, to seal the 31-16 win.

Under duress much of the day, which resulted in two sacks and several quarterback hurries. Massei wound up with a gutsy 24-of-35 through the air for 210 yards, with one touchdown and no interceptions. His favorite receiver on the afternoon was Wilson, who snared a game-high seven catches for 71 yards.

Defensively, junior inside linebacker Quintin Hampton (Moultrie, GA / Colquitt County / UCF) led the way with a team-high eight tackles and one sack, while sophomore outside linebacker Cameron Gill (Douglasville, GA / Chapel Hill) added six stops, including four solo.

For Bryant, Wilson finished 16-of-22 passing 166 yards, two scores and no interceptions while backup quarterback Devin Ray made the most of his opportunities, going 2-of-2 for 41 yards, highlighted by a 25-yard TD toss to Couurant.

In the receiving department, Tom Kennedy led Bryant with five receptions for a gamehigh 109 and one touchdown. On the ground, halfback Brenden Femiano gained a team-high 82 yards on 16 carries. Linebacker Thomas Costigan paced the Bulldogs' defense with a game-high 11 tackles while Eulogio Portugale came up from his cornerback spot to record 10 stops.

Statistically, Wagner held the edge in several major categories, including overall yards (432-337), rushing (222-130) and time of possession (33:55-26:05), in addition to holding a narrow 210-107 edge in passing yards.

NOTE: Fulse's 228-yard rushing day was a career high and the most by a Wagner runner since November 12, 2011 when Dominique Williams rushed for 216 yards at Robert Morris on November 12, 2011.

SEAHAWKS POST-SEASON HISTORY



2012 NEC Champions, 2nd Round NCAA Playoffs

The Seahawks' sprint to a historic 2012 NEC Title featured a nine-game winning streak and the first-ever FCS Playoff win by an NEC team, a 31-20 victory over Colgate (11/24). The superlatives for Wagner were many, including a final national Top-25 ranking in both major FCS Polls, and a pair of National Coach of the Year Honors for Head Coach Hameline, who will bring a 213-127-2 (.626) record into his 33rd season as head of the Wagner program this season. Running back Dominique Williams was named to the College Sports Journal (CSJ) All-America Team while defensive tackle Daevonte Barnet was tabbed a CSJ Freshman All-American. All-NEC performers included Williams, QB Nick Doscher, OL Steve Ciocci, CB Jarrett Dieudonne, RS Otis Wright, LB C.O. Prime CB Torian Phillips, and SS Sidiq Soulemana.

PITTSBURGH, PA — Duquesne jumped on Wagner early, building a 30-7 lead with a monstrous air attack that accounted for 357 yards in a 44-20 win. Two Kito Lockwood scores brought Wagner within 30-20 early in the fourth quarter, but Duquesne scored twice on the ground to clinch the game. Seahawk quarterback Jason Miletic completed 22 passes for 251 yards in the loss.



1994 ECAC-IFC DIVISION I-AA BOWL

JAMAICA, NY — The Seahawks turned the ball over five times and managed just 271 yards of total offense in a 34-14 loss at St. John's University, losing an ECAC Championship game for the first time ever. Ahead 14-7 and driving into Red Storm territory, the Seahawks fumbled. St. John's converted and never looked back. Pat Connolly caught five passes for 69 yards for Wagner.



1993 ECAC-IFC DIVISION I-AA BOWL

NEW ROCHELLE, NY — The Seahawks won a record fifth ECAC crown and avenged a regular-season loss by shutting out the Gaels on their home turf, 32-0. All-American linebacker Ryan Tobin, the game's MVP, made 18 tackles, including 12 solos, three tackles for a loss, two sacks, and forced a fumble, while Chris Purdy ran for four Seahawk touchdowns.



1992 ECAC SOUTHEAST CHAMPIONSHIP

STATEN ISLAND, NY — Senior quarterback Terry O'Hare earned MVP honors as he passed for 332 yards and three touchdowns, while also running for a score in leading the Seahawks to a 48-6 victory over the St. Francis (PA) Red Flash, avenging a regular-season loss. The Seahawk defense registered six sacks, including three by linebacker Bryan Devone.



1986 ECAC SOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP

LANCASTER, PA — Senior quarterback Jesse Foote ran for four touchdowns and passed for another as Wagner posted a 40-28 victory over host Franklin & Marshall to capture the ECAC South Championship at Williamson Field. Foote scored all four of his touchdowns in the final thirty minutes, including a 46-yard jaunt with 52 seconds remaining to seal the victory.



1985 ECAC SOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP

KING'S POINT, NY — Sophomore Peter Andolpho's end zone tackle of King's Point running back Doug Jones with 7:47 remaining in the first half provided Wagner with the winning margin as the Seahawks captured the ECAC South Championship with a 9-7 victory at Captain Tomb Field. Freshman running back Terry Underwood scored Wagner's only touchdown on a two-yard run.



1983 ECAC METRO CHAMPIONSHIP

JAMAICA, NY — The Seahawks scored an ECAC Championship game record 48 points to capture the ECAC Metro NY-NJ Championship over host St. John's University, 48-7. The Seahawks took control early as tailback Ed Christensen scored three first-quarter touchdowns on runs of 77, 14 and 10 yards. Christensen ended the day with 177 yards on the ground.



The greatest day in the long and illustrious gridiron history of Wagner College came on a sunny December 12, 1987 in Phenix, Alabama, as the Seahawks captured the 1987 NCAA Division III National Championship with a 19-3 victory against the University of Dayton.

The Seahawks, winners of seven straight and 12 of 13 heading into the championship, rose to the challenge in the Stagg Bowl. Wagner jumped out to a 19-0 first-half lead and never looked back in cruising to the College's first and only national championship in any sport.

Quarterback Greg Kovar got Wagner on the board early, finding split end John Chaney in the end zone from 22 yards out with just under two minutes left in the opening quarter. Fullback Tom Pugh put the Seahawks up 13-0, bulldozing in from one yard out. Wide receiver Keith Johnson capped the Seahawk scoring 20 seconds before intermission, hauling in a 22-yard Kovar spiral for a 19-0 halftime lead.

With Kovar on the way to a 301-yard day, the defense took it the rest of the way, holding Dayton to just 234 yards of total offense and 2.9 yards per play. End George Gaspar led the way with 16 tackles and a sack, while linebackers Artie DiMella and Chris West made 13 stops each.

The Seahawks made three other NCAA Playoff appearances in the 1980s, earning berths in 1980 and 1982 and returning to defend their championship in 1988, but falling 34-31 in an overtime shoot-out to eventual national champion Ithaca

NCAA
