THE GAME

The Boise State football team, ranked No. 18 in both the Associated Press and Coaches Polls and No. 19 in the College Football Playoff Poll, will square off against Washington in the Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl, Dec. 21 (Saturday). A rematch of the 2012 edition of the bowl game, the Broncos and Huskies are slated to kick at 5:30 p.m. MT in what will be the final bowl game held at Sam Boyd Stadium, and the game will be nationally televised on ABC.

The Broncos will be making their fifth appearance at the Las Vegas Bowl, and are a perfect 4-0 in the game. Boise State has defeated Utah (2010), Arizona State (2011), Washington (2012) and Oregon (2017) in the Las Vegas Bowl.

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TOP OF THE G5

...Boise State athletics has concluded each of the last two seasons as the highest-ranked school from the Group of Five in the Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup Standings.

...This season Boise State took over as the all-time leader in winning percentage (.7306; 460-169-2) in NCAA history. Second is Ohio State (.7300; 924-325-53) and third is Michigan (.7297; 962-345-36).

...Boise State is in the midst of its 22nd-consecutive season with a winning record, the longest active streak in the nation, the 15th-longest streak in NCAA history and the longest by a Group of Five school all-time.

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BRONCO GAME NOTES

THE NATION'S WINNINGEST PROGRAM

With Boise State's win over Colorado State and Michigan's loss to Ohio State during the final week of the regular season, the Broncos took over as the winningest team in college football history in terms of percentage. Since becoming a four-year school in 1968, Boise State is now 460-169-2, a winning percentage of .7306. Ohio State is now second (.7300; 924-325-53), while Michigan is third (.7297; 962-345-36).

QUICK HITTERS

...The Broncos' current six-game winning streak is tied with FAU for the sixth-longest in the country, trailing only Clemson (28), Ohio State (19), LSU (14), Memphis (seven) and Air Force (seven).

...The Broncos have posted eight come-from-behind wins this season, tied with Memphis for the most in FBS.

...Boise State has seven wins over bowl-eligible teams this season, tied with Georgia for the fourth-most nationally. Only CFP participants LSU (nine), Ohio State (nine) and Clemson (eight) have more.

...From 2014-19, Boise State has 31 wins over teams that finished above .500. The Broncos rank sixth nationally behind Alabama (50), Clemson (49), Ohio State (44), Georgia (34) and Oklahoma (34) during that time.

THE SERIES

Boise State and Washington are an even 2-2 in the all-time series, the Broncos' only losses coming on the road in 2007 (24-10) and 2013 (38-6). The victories came in the 2012 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas (28-26), and at Albertsons Stadium in 2015 (16-13).

SENIOR SUCCESS

The Broncos' 2019 senior class is the 21st-straight group that will leave Boise State with at least one conference title. Of those 21 senior classes, 18 left with multiple championships, including 11 with three-or-more. The last senior class without a league championship was the 1998 group.

The streak of 21-straight classes is the longest active streak in the country, and tied with Michigan (1975-2002) for the third-longest in NCAA history. BYU (30; 975-2004) and Nebraska (28; 1975-2002) boast the longest streaks in NCAA history.

IN THE POLLS

ONE OF THE VOTERS: Boise State head coach Bryan Harsin is one of 65 voters in the 2019 Amway Coaches Poll.

18 YEARS IN THE RANKINGS: The Boise State football team is in the midst of 18-consecutive seasons in the national rankings, tied with USC for the eighth-longest active streak in the nation.

Boise State has been ranked for at least one week in either the AP or the Coaches Poll every season since 2002.

PRESEASON RANKINGS: The Broncos did not open the 2019 season ranked in either the AP or the Coaches Polls. Historically, that seems to bode well for the Broncos. Over the course of the last 17 seasons, the Broncos did not open a season ranked on eight occasions, and in seven of those seasons – 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2008, 2014 and 2017 – the Broncos finished the season in the top 25. In two of those seasons, 2006 and 2014, the Broncos capped the year with a victory in the Fiesta Bowl.

The only time the Broncos did not start or finish the year in the top 25 was in 2016, though the Broncos were ranked for nine games that season.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED: Boise State has an all-time record of 118-20 (.855) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP Poll, the Coaches Poll or the College Football Playoff Poll. A complete history of the Broncos in the rankings can be found on pages 30-31.

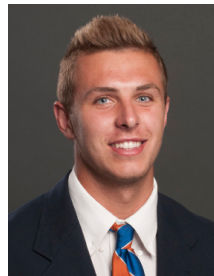

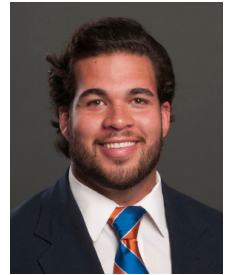

GAME NOTES

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BRYAN HARSIN NOTES

THE HARSIN ERA

The 2019 campaign marks Boise State's sixth under head coach Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach. Harsin, who is 64-16 over his Boise State tenure, has led the Broncos to five 10-win seasons, two Mountain West titles, and four trips to the Mountain West Championship Game. In his first season at the Bronco helm in 2014, Harsin guided the program to a 12-2 mark, which included the school's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining the league in 2011 and the school's third victory in the Fiesta Bowl.

HARSIN IN BOWL GAMES

Saturday's Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl will be the sixth Boise State bowl game under head coach Bryan Harsin. Boise State is 3-1 in bowl games, and has made five bowl-game appearances, under Harsin, with the lone defeat coming in the 2016 Motel 6 Cactus Bowl against Baylor (31-12).

The Broncos were set to face Boston College at the 2018 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, but the game was canceled in the first quarter due to lightning. In each of the three bowl wins under Harsin, the Broncos have gotten out to leads of at least 21-0 before its opponent cracked the scoreboard.

MOUNTAIN WEST'S BEST

With Dec. 7's 31-10 win over Hawai'i in the Mountain West Championship Game, Boise State captured its fourth Mountain West title (2012, 2014, 2017, 2019), and third under head coach Bryan Harsin (2014, 2017, 2019). It was also Boise State's fourth title-game appearance, tied with Fresno State for the most of any Mountain West program since the inaugural championship game in 2013.

WIN NUMBER 70

Bryan Harsin picked up the 70th win of his head-coaching career with the Broncos' win in the regular-season finale against Colorado State. Harsin has won 77.2 percent of his games (71-21) at Arkansas State (2013) and Boise State (2014-present).

Harsin hit the 60-win mark at Boise State with Nov. 9's victory against Wyoming, and his 64 victories with the Broncos rank third on the program's winningest head coaches list since Boise State became a four-year football playing institution in 1968. Only Chris Petersen (2006-13; 92) and Tony Knap (1968-75; 71) boast more wins as a Boise State head coach.

HEAD COACHES AT ALMA MATER

Entering the 2019 season, Bryan Harsin was one of only 18 head coaches in the country serving at his alma mater. Of the 18, four were in the Mountain West: Troy Calhoun (Air Force), Harsin, Nick Rolovich (Hawai'i) and Jeff Tedford (Fresno State). Tedford has since left his position at Fresno State.

FOUR 2019 WATCH LISTS

Head Coach Bryan Harsin was the only head coach from the Mountain West – and one of just three from the Group of Five – on the Dodd Trophy's 2019 midseason watch list released Oct. 17. On Oct. 23, Harsin was also named to the Paul "Bear" Bryant Award Watch List, and he is a semifinalist for the George Munger Coach of the Year Award.

Harsin has also been named a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award.

TEAM NOTES

LAS VEGAS...A SECOND POSTSEASON HOME?

Boise State will make its fifth appearance at the Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl with Saturday's contest, tied with Utah for the second-most. BYU, with six appearances at the bowl, is the all-time leader.

A HOT HAND IN VEGAS

Boise State brings a hot hand to the tables for this week's Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl, having won each of its four previous visits.

The Broncos went to the Las Vegas Bowl three-straight years from 2010-12, picking up, in order, wins over No. 20 Utah (26-3), Arizona State (56-24), and Washington (28-26), then returned in 2017, beating Oregon, 38-28.

THE HAMMER



Boise State selects one player to lead the team onto the field with The Dan Paul Hammer each game. The Hammer was renamed prior to the Hawai'i game, Oct. 12. Dan Paul, a former fullback from 2009-12, passed away in July of 2019, and symbolized the blue collar culture of the Boise State football team.

Traditionally, the honor has gone to the individual that made the best special teams play the week prior. However, the offensive line has been selected in the past, and the entire team entered the field with The Hammer in the 2017, 2018 and 2019 MW Championship Games.

GAME NOTES

NOT MUCH PLAYING FROM BEHIND

The Broncos have usually seemed to be the more motivated team in their Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl appearances, and it is to be seen if that keeps up this Saturday against Washington.

Out of a combined 240 minutes of gameplay over its four previous game appearances, Boise State has trailed its opponent for just 10 minutes, 10 seconds. In 2010, the Broncos trailed Utah, 3-0, for 7:17 from the end to the first quarter to almost halfway into the second before tying the game 3-3. Two years later, Boise State trailed Washington, 26-25, for 2:53 late in the fourth quarter before Michael Frisina's 27-yard field goal with 1:16 to play provided the winning points in the Broncos' 28-26 win.

ANOTHER BOWL REMATCH

Boise State and Washington will face off in Las Vegas for the second time, following the 2010 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, a 28-26 Bronco win.

It marks the fourth time in program history that Boise State is matched with a program in bowl action for a second time. Technically, it is the third time the Broncos will play an actual, official bowl game against that opponent for the second time (fingers crossed).

The other teams Boise State has been matched with at least twice during bowl season are Louisville (1999 Crucial.com Humanitarian Bowl, 2004 Liberty Bowl), TCU (2003 Fort Worth Bowl, 2008 Poinsettia Bowl, 2010 Fiesta Bowl), and Boston College (2005 MPC Computers Bowl, 2018 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl). The Broncos went 1-1 against the Cardinals and 2-1 against TCU in those bowls, and lost the 2005 MPC Computers Bowl to Boston College before last year's First Responder Bowl was canceled in the first quarter due to lightning.

BOWLING AGAINST THE PAC-12

This year's Las Vegas Bowl matchup against Washington marks the sixth time in which the Broncos have faced off with a Pac-12 team in the postseason. The Broncos are 4-1 all-time against the Pac-12 in bowl games, picking up wins over Arizona State (56-24 at the 2011 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas), Washington (28-26 at the 2012 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas), Arizona (38-30 at the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl), and Oregon (38-28 at the 2017 Las Vegas Bowl) while the only setback came in a 38-23 loss to Oregon State at the 2013 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl.

It is important to note that Utah was a member of the Mountain West when Boise State (then a member of the WAC) defeated the Utes, 26-3, at the 2010 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas.

PAC-12 SUCCESS

Boise State is 12-14 overall against the Pac-12 heading into Saturday's Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl, and have won five of its last six meetings against the conference. The Broncos are 12-6 against the Pac-12 since 2004.

This year's Las Vegas Bowl against Washington marks the 18th time that the Broncos will play a Pac-12 team away from Albertsons Stadium, with 13 of those meetings being true road games. The Broncos are 2-11 in those true road contests, with the only wins coming at Oregon (37-32 on Sept. 20, 2008) and at Oregon State (38-24 on Sept. 24, 2016).

FIRST UNDEFEATED MW CAMPAIGN

Boise State went a perfect 8-0 in Mountain West play for first time since joining the conference in 2011 with Nov. 29's 31-24 win at Colorado State. The Broncos had previously finished with just one loss in Mountain West play five times (2011-12, 2014, 2017-18).

It also marked Boise State's 12th unbeaten conference season in program history, and first since going 8-0 in the WAC in 2009.

CONFERENCE TITLES

Boise State's 2019 Mountain West Championship was its 14th since joining what is now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996, more than any other school in the country during that time. Oklahoma (13), Ohio State (12), and Florida State (11) are the only other schools in the country to win double-digit conference titles during that time.

The Broncos have won 20 conference championships all-time, including four in the Mountain West, eight in the WAC, two in the Big West and six in the Big Sky.

GAME NOTES

AGAINST THE AUTONOMOUS FIVE

With Aug. 31's 36-31 win at Florida State, Boise State has now claimed at least one Autonomous Five win in five of the last six campaigns (2014-17, 2019). Last year (2018) was the first since 2013 in which Boise State failed to notch a victory over an Autonomous Five opponent, snapping a streak of four seasons (2014-17) with such a win. The Broncos fell at Oklahoma State, 44-21, last Sept. 15, and had its bowl matchup against Boston College canceled due to lightning.

Aug. 31's contest at Florida State was the Broncos' only regular-season matchup with an Autonomous Five program.

The Broncos are now 16-9 against Autonomous Five schools since the 2006 season, and have won seven of the past 11 against such opposition. Boise State has also won 16 games against Autonomous Five programs since 2003. It should be noted that eight of the nine Boise State losses to Autonomous Five schools since 2006 have come on the road or at a neutral site, with the loss against Virginia in 2017 being the only one at Albertsons Stadium. Since notching its first victory over an Autonomous Five school, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, Boise State is 16-13 all-time in games against Autonomous Five teams, and 16-25 overall.

UNDEFEATED HOME REGULAR SEASON

Nov. 16's 42-9 win over New Mexico sealed Boise State's fourth unbeaten home regular season (2014, 2016-17, 2019) under Bryan Harsin (2014-present). The Broncos earned an additional home game, hosting the Mountain West Championship Game on Dec. 7, with Nov. 23's win at Utah State.

STREAK OF EIGHT-WIN SEASONS

Nov. 9's win over Wyoming was Boise State's eighth of the season, extending an impressive streak. The Broncos have now won at least eight games for 21-straight campaigns (since 1999). The last campaign in which the Broncos failed to reach eight wins was 1998, when they went 6-5.

NEVER LESS THAN NINE

With Nov. 16's win over New Mexico, Boise State grabbed its ninth win of the season. The Broncos continued their streak of winning at least nine games in every season of Bryan Harsin's tenure (2014-present). Harsin is the only head coach in program history, to date, to never have less than nine wins in each of his seasons at the helm.

ANOTHER 10-WIN SEASON

With Nov. 23's win at Utah State, Boise State has posted its 17th 10-win campaign since joining Division I-A (now FBS) in 1996. The Broncos' 17 10-win seasons since 1996 ranks second in the country only to Ohio State, which has now won 10 games 19 times over that span after the Buckeyes' Nov. 16 win over Rutgers.

This year is also Boise State's fifth 10-win season in six years, a stretch which includes records of 12-2 (2014), 10-3 (2016), and 11-3 (2017). The Broncos had a run of seven-straight 10-win seasons from 2006-12, highlighted by undefeated campaigns in 2006 (13-0) and 2009 (14-0).

ALL THE WAY TO 11

With Nov. 29's win at Colorado State, the Broncos, at 11-1, have now posted 11 or more wins in two of the last three seasons and thrice under Bryan Harsin. Boise State has now won at least 11 games in eight of the last 12 years and in 12 of the last 18.

LUCKY 13 IN SIGHT

Boise State could notch the fifth 13-win season in program history should it win Saturday's Mountain West Championship Game as well as its bowl matchup. The last time the Broncos won 13 games was the 2009 season, when Boise State went 14-0 en route to a 17-10 victory over TCU in the 2010 Fiesta Bowl.

SUCCESSFUL NOVEMBER

Thanks to the way the calendar fell this year, Boise State played five games in the month of November, going 5-0. The five November wins were the most for the Broncos since also hitting that number in 2008.

HANDING TEAMS THE "L"

Not just the loss, but the 50-point mark ("L" is the Roman numeral for 50). Boise State's 56 points in Nov. 23's win at Utah State was its third 50-Burger of the 2019 campaign, following such outputs Oct. 12 against Hawai'i and Nov. 2 at San Jose State.

Last season, Boise State thrice hit the 50-point mark, topping out at 62 in last Sept. 8's 62-7 win over Connecticut. Overall, the Broncos have hit the 50-point mark 18 times under head coach Bryan Harsin, and at least once in each of his seasons at the helm (2014-Present).

GAME NOTES

GIVE UP HOPE AFTER THE THIRD

Nov. 16 against New Mexico, Boise State won its 118th-consecutive home game when leading after three quarters, the longest-active streak in the country.

A NEW ATTENDANCE RECORD

Boise State drew a record crowd of 36,902 for Oct. 12's 59-37 win over Hawai'i, eclipsing the previous mark of 36,864 set in a 7-6 win over BYU on Sept. 20, 2012. It was also the team's first home sellout since a 16-13 win over Washington on Sept. 4, 2015.

PROTECT THE (NEW) BLUE

Boise State unveiled the sixth edition of its world-famous blue turf in front of a prime-time national television audience Sept. 6 as it hosted Marshall at Albertsons Stadium. The Broncos are 6-0 on the brand-new blue turf this year after Nov. 16's 42-9 win over New Mexico.

BOWL ELIGIBILITY (AGAIN)

Boise State became bowl eligible for the 22nd-straight season with Oct. 12's win over Hawai'i. Boise State has been selected for bowl games in each of the previous 17 seasons, tied with Wisconsin for the fifth-longest streak in the country. In 2001, the Broncos were not selected for a bowl game despite going 8-4 in the regular season.

RARE HOME OVERTIME GAME

Nov. 9's 20-17 overtime win over Wyoming was just the third Boise State home contest to require the extra session(s) to decide a winner.

The Broncos had previously defeated Nevada, 69-67, in four overtimes on Oct. 14, 2007, and fell to Fresno State, 19-16, in last Dec. 1's Mountain West Championship Game.

The win over Wyoming put Boise State's all-time overtime record at 5-6.

NEVER OUT OF THE FIGHT

Nov. 9's 20-17 overtime win over Wyoming marked the third time this season that Boise State went into a fourth quarter trailing yet came back to win. The Broncos went into that fourth quarter staring down a 17-10 deficit.

Nov. 2 in San Jose, the Broncos faced a 34-31 score line, but outscored the Spartans, 21-8, over the final 15 minutes to walk out of CEFCU Stadium with a 52-42 win. The first fourth-quarter comeback this year came in the Aug. 31 opener at Florida State, when the Broncos were down 31-26, and left Tallahassee with a 36-31 win.

This season's three comebacks when trailing entering the fourth quarter match the three achieved in 1990.

The Broncos have also now won back-to-back games when trailing entering the fourth quarter for the first time since 2014 (Nov. 8 at New Mexico and Nov. 15 vs. San Diego State).

PREPARATION PAYS OFF

Following Nov. 2's 52-42 win at San José State, Boise State improved to 24-6 under Bryan Harsin with more than seven days between games, including season openers and bowl games. Within the regular season, Boise State is 16-4 in such games. Previously this season, the Broncos won their opener at Florida State, 36-31, defeated Portland State on Sept. 14 with eight days between games, then, on Oct. 5, defeated UNLV after coming off of the first bye week.

BOUNCING BACK

In each of the past two seasons, and thrice under Bryan Harsin (2014, 2017-18), Boise State has responded to a loss with a winning streak of at least seven games. In 2014, the Broncos dropped to 3-2 after a Sept. 27 loss at Air Force, and responded with nine-straight wins to close the campaign. In 2017, a loss to Virginia put the Broncos at 2-2, but Boise State ran off seven-straight wins to clinch the Mountain Division. A year ago, again at 3-2 following a 19-13 loss to San Diego State, Boise State once more posted seven-straight wins to clinch the Mountain Division.

WINNING STREAKS UNDER BRYAN HARSIN

Boise State's Oct. 19 loss at BYU is sandwiched by six-game winning streaks. It marks the fourth-straight year and fifth time in six campaigns under Bryan Harsin that the Broncos have had a six-game winning streak.

BRONCOS IN THE NFL

There are currently 16 Broncos on National Football League rosters (as of Nov. 23), and 11 teams have at least one former member of the Boise State football team on their roster.

At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last 10 seasons, and 23 players have been drafted during that time - including eight in the first two rounds.

GAME NOTES

SCORING STREAK

The Broncos have scored in 292-consecutive games, the sixth-longest active streak in the country and ninth-longest in NCAA history.

The nation's longest active streaks also include Florida (391; 1988-present), which is the longest in NCAA history, and TCU (338; 1991-present), Virginia Tech (316; 1995-present), Georgia (312; 1995-present), and Nebraska (300; 1996-present).

FOCUSED ON THE TASK

Boise State overcame numerous bumps in the road to stay focused and pick up the 36-31 win over Florida State on Aug. 31.

With the game originally scheduled for 7 p.m. ET in Jacksonville, concern about the approaching Hurricane Dorian led to the game being moved to Florida State's Doak Campbell Stadium in Tallahassee, with a new kick time of noon ET.

Despite spending Thursday night in Jacksonville, then bussing two-plus hours to Tallahassee after practice Friday (which was delayed and moved indoors due to lightning), arriving in town 18 hours before kickoff, the Broncos kept their focus, rolled with the changes and picked up a statement win over the Seminoles.

NOW THAT'S A COMEBACK

The Broncos overcame two separate 18-point deficits in the win at Florida State, first trailing 24-6 then 31-13 in the second quarter.

Boise State scored the final 23 points over the contest's final 17:51, netting the final six points of the first half before outscoring the Seminoles, 17-0, in the second half.

The 18-point comeback goes down as the largest by a Boise State team against an Autonomous Five opponent, eclipsing the Broncos' comeback from a 14-0 deficit against Oregon State on Sept. 7, 2006, en route to a 42-14 win.

MOUNTAIN WEST REPRESENT

Speaking of performance against Autonomous Five programs, the Mountain West, through Week 14, leads all FBS conferences with nine victories against A5 opponents in non-conference games.

Along with Boise State's Aug. 31 victory at Florida State, the Mountain West has racked up A5 wins over Arizona and Oregon State (both by Hawai'i), Purdue (by Nevada), UCLA (by San Diego State), Missouri (by Wyoming), Colorado (by Air Force), Arkansas (by San Jose State), and Vanderbilt (by UNLV).

HOME ALL SEPTEMBER

The road trip to Florida State was Boise State's only one over the first five weeks of the 2019 season. The Broncos didn't leave Boise again until an Oct. 5 contest at UNLV.

The road game-free September marked the first calendar month without an away or neutral-site contest for Boise State since September 1994. In that month, the Broncos opened the campaign with four home games and didn't have its first contest away from home until Oct. 1 at Northern Arizona.

OVER 200 WINS SINCE 2000

The Broncos have 219 wins since 2000, tied with Oklahoma on the list of winningest teams in college football over that span.

CONFERENCE RECORD

Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 139-17 (.891) in conference regular-season play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 149-26 (.851). Boise State went 5-3 in Mountain West play in 2015, just the second time since 1998 - when Boise State went 2-3 in the Big West - that the Broncos lost three conference contests in a season. It was also just the fourth time since 2001 - Boise State's first year in the WAC - that the Broncos lost multiple conference games (also went 6-2 in WAC play in 2001).

GAME NOTES

MW SUCCESS

Since joining the Mountain West for the 2011 season, Boise State has lost just 13 games against conference opponents, with only three of those losses being by more than seven points. Outside of a 28-14 loss to Air Force (Sept. 27, 2014), a 52-26 loss at Utah State (Oct. 16, 2015), and a 28-17 loss at Fresno State (Nov. 25), the Broncos' other 10 Mountain West losses (regular season games and conference championship game) have come by a combined 39 points. Boise State's four Mountain West losses from 2011-13 were by a combined seven points: TCU in 2011 (36-35); San Diego State in 2012 (21-19); Fresno State (41-40) and SDSU (34-31, OT) in 2013. Additionally, no Mountain West team has a winning record against the Broncos, although San Diego State is 3-3 against Boise State.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY

The Broncos are the winningest football program by percentage in the country since 2000, owning an overall record of 219-42 (.839). Ohio State (219-42; .839), Oklahoma (218-48; .820), LSU (199-59; .771), and Alabama (202-63; .762) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page four.

Boise State's offense was well-represented when the Mountain West announced its postseason awards and All-Mountain West Teams Dec. 4.

Running back George Holani was voted the Mountain West Freshman of the Year, and he headlined eight members of the Bronco offense earning All-Mountain West recognition.

Four members of the Bronco offensive line were recognized, with Ezra Cleveland and John Molchon each being named to the All-Mountain West First Team for the second-straight year. Center Garrett Larson was named to the second team, and Eric Quevedo earned honorable mention.

Holani was named to the second team, along with John Hightower, who claimed second-team spots at both wide receiver and kick returner. Tight end John Bates and wide receiver Khalil Shakir were each named honorable mention.

GAME NOTES

HOLANI NAMED MW'S TOP FRESHMAN

Freshman running back George Holani became the second Bronco in program history to be named Mountain West Freshman of the Year (following quarterback Brett Rypien in 2015) on Dec. 4.

The Bellflower, Calif., native was also named to The Athletic's Freshman All-America Second Team for his breakout 2019 season.

Holani emerged as Boise State's No. 1 back in 2019, leading the team, and all freshmen in the Mountain West, with 979 rushing yards, third-best in the conference. His performance led to him being voted the 2019 Mountain West Freshman of the Year, and to the conference's Second Team.

The rookie's production has not been limited to the ground, as Holani has also nabbed 23 passes for 179 yards and a pair of touchdowns, to add to his seven rushing scores for a total of nine on the season.

His nine touchdowns are tied for eighth among non-kickers in the Mountain West, and lead all freshmen. He's also put up three 100-yard games this season, highlighted by his 178 yards on just 16 carries (11.1 yards per attempt) with a pair of touchdowns Nov. 23 at Utah State.

1,000-YARD RUSHERS

George Holani enters Saturday's contest with 979 rushing yards, just 21 away from extending Boise State's streak of seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher to 11.

The current streak of 10 seasons was the longest in the nation entering 2019, and is tied for the third-longest in the history of college football with USC (10; 1972-81) and Wisconsin (10; 1993-2002 and 2005-14), behind only North Carolina (12; 1973-84) and Texas (11; 1995-2005).

LINEMAN APPRECIATION

For the first time in program history, four Bronco offensive linemen earned all-conference recognition. For both Ezra Cleveland and John Molchon, Dec. 4's announcement marked the second-straight first-team selection, and third all-conference honor overall (both were named honorable mention in 2017). Larson, named to the second team, and Quevedo, named honorable mention, each earned their first-career All-Mountain West nods.

The quartet worked on a line that anchored a Bronco offense that leads the Mountain West and ranks 14th in the country with 36.8 points per game, in addition to ranking second in the conference and 38th in the country at 441.5 yards per game. This all despite members of the quartet missing a combined four games (two for Quevedo, one each for Cleveland and Molchon) due to injuries.

Five different Broncos have rushed for over 100 yards this season, while 11 different Bronco ballcarriers have found the end zone in 2019, led by seven from Holani and six from redshirt junior running back Robert Mahone.

4-0 START FOR HENDERSON

Redshirt senior quarterback Jaylon Henderson is now 4-0 as an FBS starter, following Dec. 7's Mountain West Championship Game win over Hawai'i. Henderson has shined over these past four starts, going a combined 77-for-121 (63.6 percent) for 944 yards and 10 touchdowns against just two interceptions.

Overall this season, Henderson has completed 63.2 percent of his passes (84-for-133) for 1,032 yards and 11 touchdowns, against just two picks, making his efficiency rating a solid 152.62.

HIGHLIGHT-REEL HIGHTOWER

Wide receiver John Hightower added more highlight-reel scores to his tape in 2019. Nov. 16 against New Mexico, the Landover, Md., native hauled in a 51-yard touchdown, while finishing with four catches for 124 yards in the 42-9 win. The 51-yard touchdown reception was also the 11th scoring play of 40 or more yards in his Boise State career.

It followed an Oct. 5 performance at UNLV in which he had four catches for 105 yards, including a 76-yard touchdown, and rushed twice for 51 yards. In that game, Hightower even had a third highlight-reel play called back, as his kickoff return for a touchdown was nullified by a Boise State holding penalty.

Hightower now has seven plays of 50-plus yards in his career, all of which have gone for scores. He's had touchdown runs of 55 and 88 yards against UConn (Sept. 8, 2018) and Nevada (Oct. 13, 2018), respectively, while, in addition to his 76-yard touchdown Saturday at UNLV, he's also hauled in scoring tosses of 67 yards against UConn, and 61 yards at Air Force (Oct. 27, 2018). His first scoring play of 50-plus yard this season was a 98-yard kickoff return against Portland State (Sept. 14), followed by a 51-yard touchdown catch against New Mexico on Nov. 16.

GAME NOTES

MULTI-THREAT SHAKIR

After having a promising freshman campaign cut short due to injury early last November, sophomore wide receiver Khalil Shakir has enjoyed a breakout 2019 campaign. Shakir, named All-Mountain West Honorable Mention, has been a versatile threat for the Bronco offense, not just out wide but also in the Wildcat formation, taking direct snaps and using his legs to hurt defenses. Nov. 16 against New Mexico, his talents were on full display as he caught five passes for 96 yards, including an 18-yard touchdown, and threw a two-yard scoring pass to Garrett Collingham.

For the year, Shakir leads all Bronco receivers in receptions (60) and is second in receiving yards (834) and touchdown catches (six). He's also run the ball 17 times for 71 yards and three scores.

RECEIVING VERSATILITY

Boise State this season has eight players with double-digit receptions. Sophomore wide receiver Khalil Shakir leads that group with 60, followed among the wide receivers by John Hightower (48), CT Thomas (38), Akilian Butler (28), and Octavius Evans (16), while running back George Holani (23) and tight ends John Bates (21) and Garrett Collingham (12) are also in double digits.

Of the Broncos' 28 touchdown catches, 21 have gone to wide receivers, with Hightower (eight) leading the way. Tight ends Collingham (three) and Bates (one), along with running backs Holani (two) and Andrew Van Buren (one), are the only non-wide receivers to haul in a scoring pass. Overall, 10 Broncos have caught a touchdown this season, the most since 2014 (10).

START IT OFF WITH A BANG

Boise State has scored a touchdown on its opening drive in four of its last five games, with its four-game streak being snapped Dec. 7 against Hawai'i. After Nov. 29's 17-play, 73-yard march at Colorado State, which took 8:32 off the clock. The drive concluded with a two-yard scoring run from tight end Garrett Collingham.

In two of the games (Nov. 9 against Wyoming, Nov. 16 against New Mexico), the Bronco offense opened with scoring drives of at least 90 yards. Against Wyoming, the Broncos started their opening possession on their own eight-yard line, and promptly marched 92 yards in 7:10 to take a 7-0 lead. Against New Mexico, the Broncos started their first drive at their own three, and went 97 yards in just 3:42. Nov. 29 at Colorado State, the Broncos marched 73 yards in 17 plays, taking off 8:32 of time, on its game-opening touchdown drive.

The touchdown at Colorado State marked the eighth time this season (Portland State, at UNLV, Hawai'i, at BYU, Wyoming, New Mexico, at Utah State, at Colorado State) that the Broncos scored on their opening drive. All of the opening-drive scores have been touchdowns.

RED-ZONE SUCCESS

A big part of Boise State's success lately has been its efficiency in the red zone. The Broncos scored a touchdown on each of their four trips into the red zone Nov. 29 at Colorado State, and have scored 28 of their last 29 red zone opportunities.

That total has Boise State 30th in the country and to the top of the Mountain West rankings in red-zone offense, as the Broncos have scored on 89.1 percent of its trips inside the 20 (49-for-53).

COLLINGHAM DOES IT ALL

Redshirt senior tight end Garrett Collingham was at his versatile best in Nov. 29's win at Colorado State, scoring touchdowns on the ground (two-yard rush) and through the air (three-yard catch).

It was Collingham's second-career rushing score, while the receiving touchdown was his third this season and the fourth of his career. Collingham, who converted to tight end from linebacker in 2018, has caught 10 passes for 101 yards and three scores this season, and for his career has 15 catches for 159 yards and four scores.

CENTURY MARK FOR SHAKIR

Sophomore wide receiver Khalil Shakir went for 103 yards on seven catches in Nov. 29's win at Colorado State, posting his second 100-yard receiving game of the season. For the year, it is the eighth 100-yard receiving game by a Bronco receiver, with three different pass-catchers hitting the century mark (John Hightower four, Shakir two, CT Thomas two).

CAPTAINS

Boise State players voted sixth-year senior defensive tackle David Moa, redshirt senior offensive lineman John Molchon and senior safety Kekoa Nawahine as captains for the 2019 season.

GAME NOTES

RUN, YOUNG MAN, RUN

Freshman running back George Holani had the finest game of his young career Nov. 23 at Utah State, running for 178 yards and a pair of touchdowns over just 16 carries, a per-attempt average of 11.1 yards. The 178 yards marked a season high for the freshman, and his two scores gave him seven on the ground, and nine overall, for the year.

Holani is also closing in on keeping Boise State's streak of seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher alive, as he currently sits at 979 yards, with one game remaining.

IT WORKED AGAIN!

Boise State went with an old favorite late in the first quarter Nov. 23 at Utah State, calling "Statue Left" from the Aggie five-yard line. The play worked once again, as George Holani took the handoff and hit the pylon to put Boise State ahead, 21-7.

"Statue Left," immortalized when the Broncos ran it to perfection for the 2007 Fiesta Bowl-winning two-point conversion, has gone for touchdowns in recent years with Jay Ajayi scoring on the play twice in the 2014 season: once at Wyoming, and the second time in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

INSERT QUARTERBACK, COLLECT WIN(S)

Jaylon Henderson's start at quarterback in Nov. 16's 42-9 win over New Mexico brought Boise State's number of different starting quarterbacks in 2019 to three (Henderson, Hank Bachmeier, Chase Cord). It is the first time since 1993 that Boise State has started three different quarterbacks (Danny Langsdorf, Lee Schrack and Tony Hilde). Bachmeier, the opening day starter, is 7-0 when starting, Henderson is now 4-0, and Cord is 1-1.

HIGHTOWER'S HUNDRED

Senior wide receiver John Hightower recorded his sixth-career 100-yard receiving game, and fifth of 2019, with 124 yards on just four catches Nov. 16 against New Mexico. It was also his fourth 100-yard receiving game in the last six contests.

On the year, Hightower leads the Broncos in receiving yards (859) and touchdown catches (seven), and, with 45 receptions, which ranks second on the team.

CORD'S FIRST-CAREER WIN

Redshirt sophomore quarterback Chase Cord picked up his first win as a starting quarterback in Nov. 9's 20-17 overtime win over Wyoming. Cord, making the second start of his career (Oct. 19 at BYU), went 19-for-30 for 190 yards and a touchdown with an interception.

Cord was instrumental in Boise State's opening-drive touchdown, going 6-for-6 for 66 yards, including a 5-yard touchdown pass to redshirt senior Akilian Butler.

THIRD-DOWN HANK

Quarterback Hank Bachmeier has been clutch passing on third downs this season, going 32-for-51 (62.7 percent) for 578 yards, 26 first downs, five touchdowns, and an interception in that situation. In his most recent action, Nov. 2 at San José State, Bachmeier went 2-for-3 for 45 yards and a pair of first downs on third down, in addition to a pair of runs on third downs that earned the Broncos a fresh set of downs. Sept. 20 against Air Force, Bachmeier went 5-for-8 for 98 yards and a touchdown on third downs.

THIRD DOWN IS OUR DOWN

Boise State's offense has converted 48.9 percent of its third-down opportunities (92-for-189), a mark that is good for 10th in the FBS and second in the Mountain West.

THEY CAN FLING IT

Boise State's quarterback depth has been impressive in 2019, considering how few snaps the trio of freshman Hank Bachmeier, redshirt sophomore Chase Cord, and redshirt senior Jaylon Henderson had played prior. This season, the trio has the Bronco passing attack ranked 35th in the country with 267.4 yards per game.

This depth was well-reflected in Oct. 12's 59-37 win over Hawai'i, as the three Bronco quarterbacks combined to go 21-for-37 for 315 yards and five touchdowns. The five scoring tosses were just one away from tying the program's single-game record of six, and it marked the first time since Nov. 8, 2008, against Utah State, that at least three Broncos each tossed a scoring pass in a game.

Cord led the way with career highs of 175 yards and three touchdowns in relief of Bachmeier, who left the game with an injury after throwing for 58 yards and a score. Henderson, a redshirt junior, bolstered the Bronco depth at quarterback, going 6-for-10 for 82 yards (all career highs) and throwing his first-career touchdown pass.



Lyle Smith, the "Father of Boise State Football," head football coach from 1947-67 and Boise State Athletics Director from 1967-81, passed away the morning of July 26, 2017, at the age of 101.

Smith came to Boise Junior College in 1946 as basketball coach and assistant football coach. In 1947, he became head coach of the BJC football program and didn't lose a game until his fourth season.

His 1958 team won the National Junior College championship.

Smith retired from coaching after the 1967 season. In his 20 years as the head football coach at BJC, he compiled a 156-25-6 record, a winning percentage of .842.

Smith continued to lead Boise State as AD until his retirement after the 1980-81 academic year. Smith guided Boise State's transition from a junior college power to a highly-successful NCAA Division I athletic program.

In his honor, a statue was erected at the southwest corner of Albertsons Stadium. He was present for its unveiling prior to the 2016 season.

BATES WITH A CAREER YEAR ALREADY

Redshirt junior tight end John Bates has emerged as one of Boise State's receiving threats from the tight end corps, most recently making three catches for 39 yards Oct. 19 at BYU. This season, Bates has already notched career bests in receptions (21) and receiving yards (253) while tying his best for scoring catches (one). After catching just three passes for 34 yards as a redshirt freshman in 2017, Bates grabbed 10 balls for 155 yards and a score last year.

CAREER YEARS ALL AROUND FOR TIGHT ENDS

John Bates isn't the only Bronco tight end making a career-best number of catches. Redshirt senior Matt Pistone, primarily an H-Back and an additional run blocker, has caught a career-high two passes this season for 21 yards, getting to that mark with a 14-yard catch at BYU. Pistone, in his previous three season of action, had made one catch for seven yards, coming last Oct. 19 against Colorado State.

Meridian, Idaho, native Garrett Collingham caught his third touchdown pass of the season Nov. 29 at Colorado State, and has 12 catches for 106 yards this year.

TWO RECEIVERS OVER THE CENTURY MARK

The Broncos had two 100-yard receivers Oct. 5 at UNLV, as Khalil Shakir (seven catches, 111 yards, a touchdown) and John Hightower (four catches, 105 yards, a touchdown) each hit the mark. It marked the fifth-straight season in which the Broncos had at least one game in which two receivers hit the century mark, with the last time occasion being Oct. 27, 2018, at Air Force (John Hightower - 182, Sean Modster - 101).

HOLANI WITH A RARE FEAT

On an emotional night in which the Broncos honored the late Dan Paul, a fullback on the 2010 Fiesta Bowl-winning team, by naming The Hammer after him, freshman running back George Holani accomplished a feat last booked by Paul.

With a pair of touchdown receptions in the Oct. 12 win over Hawai'i, Holani became the first Bronco running back to score on at least two receptions in a game since Paul had three scoring grabs on Nov. 27, 2009, against Nevada.

For Holani, the grabs highlighted a three-touchdown game in which he added a 40-yard scoring run late, and finished with 64 rushing yards on nine carries, and three catches for 38 yards and the two scores.

BACHMEIER NAMED TO FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICA MIDSEASON WATCH LIST

Freshman quarterback Hank Bachmeier was named to the FWAA's Freshman All-America Midseason Watch List Oct. 24, earning national recognition for a solid rookie campaign.

Boise State got off to a 6-0 start with Bachmeier under center, including a season-opening 36-31 victory at Florida State in which the Murrieta, Calif., native went 30-for-51 for 407 yards and a touchdown, leading a Bronco comeback from an 18-point deficit.

On the year, Bachmeier has completed 63.5 percent of his passes (122-for-192) for 1,760 yards and nine touchdowns, against just four interceptions.

OK, WE'RE CONVINCED

There was a lot of intrigue around the announcement of true freshman Hank Bachmeier as Boise State's opening-day starter on Aug. 24, and Bachmeier wasted little time making believers around the country.

The Murrieta, Calif., went 30-for-51 passing for 407 yards and a touchdown with just one interception in Aug. 31's 36-31 win at Florida State. His passing yardage was the most by a Boise State quarterback in his first start in the program's FBS Era (1996-present), and just missed cracking the program's single-game top 10 (the cutoff for the top 10 is 410 yards).

Bachmeier's 51 attempts also tied for fifth-most in Bronco single-game history, matching Brett Rypien (Dec. 27, 2016 vs. Baylor), Travis Stuart (Oct. 3, 1992 vs. Montana), and Keith Jarrett (Oct. 25, 1986 at Oregon State).

REPLACING A LEGEND

For only the second time in the last 51 games, a quarterback not named Brett Rypien started under center when the Broncos took the field Aug. 31 at Florida State.

Rypien, the 2018 Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year, a four-time All-Mountain West selection, and the Mountain West's all-time leading passer, graduated last December after missing just one start (Sept. 14, 2017 against New Mexico) since taking over the QB1 spot Sept. 25, 2015 at Virginia.

He became the conference's all-time leader in passing yards (13,581), completions (1,036), and 300-yard games (21) in 2018, eclipsing San Diego State's Ryan Lindley's (2008-11) yardage and completion marks of 12,690 and 961, respectively, last Nov. 9 against Fresno State, and passing BYU's Max Hall for most 300-yard performances last Nov. 24 against Utah State.

BACHMEIER WINS THE QB1 JOB

For the first time in Boise State's FBS history (since 1996), the Broncos started a true freshman at quarterback in a season opener when freshman Hank Bachmeier was tabbed QB1 by head coach Bryan Harsin on Aug. 24.

Bachmeier, a four-star prospect according to ESPN, 247Sports and Rivals coming out of high school, was a four-year starter at Murrieta Valley High School (Murrieta, Calif.) who amassed more than 13,000 yards passing and 2,000 yards rushing. He completed 797-of-1,182 passes for 13,150 yards (.675), 156 touchdowns and 30 interceptions, setting the CIF Southern Section record for career passing touchdowns, and rushed 317 times for 2,190 yards and 32 TDs.

Bachmeier enrolled at Boise State in January 2019 and participated in spring practices during the offseason after graduating from high school a semester early. While he is the only true freshman to start a Boise State season opener in the program's FBS Era, the Broncos have had a redshirt freshman start a season opener before, when Kellen Moore was the opening-day QB1 in 2008.

REPLACING ANOTHER 1,000-YARD RUSHER

The quarterback spot won't be the only one with large shoes to fill for Boise State's offense in 2019, as the early departure of running back Alexander Mattison leaves a 1,415-yard-long hole to fill in the backfield.

Mattison, who declared for the NFL Draft after his junior season in 2018 and was selected in the third round of the NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings, posted back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons from 2017-18, going for 1,086 yards as a sophomore in 2017 before pounding out 1,415 yards on the ground last year.

He ran for 29 touchdowns over the past two seasons, carrying a combined 581 times, including 302 times in 2018, a figure that ranks third in Boise State single-season history.

ALL FIVE STARTERS BACK

Boise State is one of only three schools in the country that returns its starting five offensive linemen, a list that also includes Auburn and Iowa State.

LT Ezra Cleveland, LG John Molchon, C Garrett Larson, RG Eric Quevedo and RT John Ojukwu have combined for 107 starts entering 2019. Only five schools – Oregon (153), Louisiana (130), Texas Tech (116), Iowa State (114) and Michigan State (113) – return more starts among their projected starting five.

HE MADE THE LIST, SO HE'S A FREAK

Boise State redshirt senior offensive lineman John Molchon was named to Bruce Feldman's 2019 College Football Freaks List, checking in at No. 42. An excerpt from The Athletic: He made All-Mountain West first team in 2018 as a left guard for the Broncos. The 6-5, 317-pound fifth-year senior hang cleans 425 and power cleans 365 for two reps. His vertical jump is 27.5 inches. Said the Broncos' strength and conditioning coach, Jeff Pitman, "John is an explosive athlete that stops all activity in the room when he maxes because everybody wants to watch him. Not only does he lift heavy weight with ease, but he lifts his team's energy level when he is in the room."

WEAVER HEADLINES ALL-MOUNTAIN WEST PICKS

STUD Curtis Weaver headlined Boise State's defensive All-Mountain West honors Dec. 4, being named the Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year. The honor made Weaver the second Bronco in the last three years to claim the award, following Leighton Vander Esch in 2017.

Weaver, along with nickel Kekaula Kaniho, were named to the All-Mountain West First Team, with Chase Hatada, David Moa, Kekoa Nawahine, Jalen Walker, and Riley Whimpey earning spots on the second team. Sonatane Lui and Avery Williams were voted honorable mention.

Weaver has racked up a Mountain West-leading 13.5 sacks, ranking fifth in the nation, as well as a career-high 50 tackles, including 18.5 tackles-for-loss, a figure which also paces the conference and ranks tied for ninth in the FBS.

A Ted Hendricks Award finalist and Bednarik Award semifinalist, Weaver has recorded at least a share of a sack in eight of Boise State's 13 games, along with three multi-sack performances. He set a Boise State single-game record with 4.0 sacks Sept. 14 against Portland State, and, with three sacks Oct. 5 at UNLV, passed the previous conference career benchmark of 29.5 to become the Mountain West's career sack king. With 34.0 sacks to his name over his three seasons, Weaver ranks second in Boise State history, and is the FBS' active career leader.

ALL THE ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Weaver ought to have a wheelbarrow handy to haul all of the All-America honors he has received since the end of the regular season.

The Long Beach, Calif., native, through Dec. 13, has been named to the Walter Camp All-America First Team, and picked up second-team honors from The Athletic, CBS Sports, and USA TODAY.

Weaver's inclusion on the Walter Camp First Team made him the first Bronco in the program's FBS Era (1996-Present) to achieve the honor. Weaver is the third Bronco overall named to the Walter Camp All-America First Team, as defensive ends Pete Kwiatkowski (1987) and Erik Helgeson (1988, 1990) were previously named to the Walter Camp I-AA All-America First Teams.

In the program's FBS Era (1996-Present), Weaver is the first Bronco named to the Walter Camp First Team, and sixth honored overall, following second-team nods to kicker Tyler Jones (2004), offensive lineman Ryan Clady (2007), cornerback Kyle Wilson (2009), offensive lineman Nate Potter (2011), and defensive end DeMarcus Lawrence (2013).

ONE MORE TIME FOR MOA

Sixth-year defensive tackle David Moa will play his final collegiate game in Saturday's Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl, and it marks an end of an era, in some ways. Moa is the last, and only, Bronco on this year's roster who was also on the team in head coach Bryan Harsin's first season (2014) at the Boise State helm. Moa redshirted that season, which ended with a 38-30 victory over No. 10 Arizona in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

Over his career, Moa has thrice been named All-Mountain West, earning first-team honors in 2016 and being named to the second team in 2017 and 2019. After an injury limited him to one game last season, Moa received a waiver for a sixth year in 2019, and took advantage, racking up 5.5 tackles-for-loss and a sack, along with a fumble recovery, from his defensive tackle spot. Moa's reputation, and his play, helped open up opportunities for fellow rushers, as STUD Curtis Weaver (Mountain West Defensive POY), defensive tackle Chase Hatada (All-Mountain West Second Team), and nose tackle Sonatane Lui (All-Mountain West Honorable Mention) each claimed all-conference honors.

KANIHO CHAOS

Junior nickel Kekaula Kaniho was named to the All-Mountain West First Team for what many would consider, surprisingly, just the first time in his career on Dec. 4. Kaniho has long carved out a reputation as Boise State's utility man on defense, excelling in stopping the run, getting into the backfield, and defending the pass. This season, Kaniho is second on the team in tackles (59), tackles-for-loss (11.0), and pass breakups (six), and has 3.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, an interception, and a fumble recovery.

Oct. 5 at UNLV, Kaniho came on a blitz and made his second sack of the season, and finished the game with 2.5 tackles-for-loss among his five tackles (four solo). He picked off his first pass of the season Sept. 20 against Air Force, which he returned 50 yards to set up a Boise State touchdown which put the Broncos up, 30-13.

After enduring a rough first half along with the rest of the Bronco defense Aug. 31 at Florida State, Kaniho rebounded to finish with an impressive stat line. The Bronco ballhawk, who has scored touchdowns via interception return, fumble return, and punt return in his career, ignited the Bronco defense's awakening in the second quarter with a crucial strip-sack of James Blackman which led to a Bronco recovery and offensive touchdown drive. His stop and forced fumble, with Boise State trailing 24-6, helped stem the bleeding, and he went on to finish the game with 4.0 tackles-for-loss including the sack.

KANIHO PLAYS BIG ON "THE NINTH ISLAND"

Las Vegas is affectionately known as "The Ninth Island" among Hawaiians, and nickel Kekaula Kaniho, a Kahuku, Hawaii, native, has shared that sentiment in his two-career games at Sam Boyd Stadium.

At the 2017 Las Vegas Bowl against Oregon, Kaniho picked off a Justin Herbert pass and returned it 53 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter of Boise State's 38-28 win. He finished that game with, along with his pick-six, a sack, 2.0 tackles-for-loss, and a forced fumble.

This past October, in Boise State's 38-13 win at UNLV, Kaniho was at it again, finishing the game with five tackles (four solo), including a sack and 2.5 TFL.

NAWAHINE MAKING PLAYS

Senior safety Kekoa Nawahine earned his third All-Mountain West honor in 2019, being named to the second team. Nawahine led the Broncos with three interceptions, and, despite missing a game due to injury this season, continued to be a tackling machine for the Broncos, ranking fourth on the team with 54 (22 solo).

Nawahine leads the Broncos with five takeaways this season (three interceptions, two fumble recoveries), and has forced an additional fumble.

WILLIAMS EXCELS AT MULTIPLE SPOTS

Redshirt junior cornerback Avery Williams has been making plenty of plays for the Broncos on special teams, sharing the national lead with two punt-return touchdowns and ranking eighth in the country with 12.4 yards per punt return, but has also been making plays on defense, as he was named All-Mountain West Honorable Mention at cornerback, in addition to his Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Year award.

This season, Williams has broken up four passes, and ranks 10th on the team with 35 tackles.

MAKING THOSE INTERCEPTIONS

Boise State picked off a pass in Dec. 7's Mountain West Championship Game, with Kekoa Nawahine doing the honors, to extend its streak of games with a pick to

The Bronco defense had put together two-straight multi-interception performances ahead of that game, making a pair at both Utah State (Nov. 23) and Colorado State (Nov. 29).

On the year, the Broncos now have 10 picks, with half of that total coming in the last three games.

GIVING "CHASE"

Senior defensive tackle Chase Hatada was named to the All-Mountain West Second Team, his first all-conference nod. It rewarded a career year for the senior, in which he posted career bests in sacks (4.0), tackles-for-loss (9.0), and forced fumbles (two).

Hatada had one of the best performances of his career Nov. 16 against New Mexico, as he notched four tackles-for-loss and a sack while being part of a defense that held the Lobos to just 2.6 yards per carry. Hatada was also the force behind the game's key opening play, forcing a fumble by New Mexico quarterback Tavaka Tuioti that was picked up by Sonatane Lui and returned 24 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 Bronco lead.

Hatada also became the third Boise State player this season to record four tackles-for-loss in a game, joining Kekaula Kaniho (Aug. 31 at Florida State) and STUD Curtis Weaver (Sept. 14 vs. Portland State).

WINNING THE BATTLE IN THE TRENCHES

Along with its success in bringing down the quarterback, the Bronco defense has also controlled the line of scrimmage and made a home in the opposing backfield. Boise State made 5.0 tackles-for-loss against Hawai'i on Dec. 7, and now have 89.0 TFL on the season, a figure that leads the Mountain West and ranks 28th in the country. Curtis Weaver leads the defense with 18.5 TFL, followed by Kekaula Kaniho at 11.0.

PICK SIX

Redshirt junior cornerback Jalen Walker didn't just make the first interception of his career Nov. 23 at Utah State, but he went the extra, well, 15 yards, taking it to the house for the pick six.

Walker read the short route immediately upon the snap, and sprinted forward to snag the Jordan Love pass and continue into the end zone without breaking stride. It marked the first pick-six, for the Bronco defense this season.

THE DEFENSE GETTING IN ON THE OFFENSE

Walker's pick-six in the first quarter at Utah State marked the second-straight game in which the Boise State defense got into the end zone. Nov. 16 against New Mexico, nose tackle Sonatane Lui got the game started with a #ScoopNScore on the first play from scrimmage, scooping up a Tavaka Tuioti fumble and rumbling 24 yards for the score. Lui's Piesman Trophy Moment was Boise State's first defensive touchdown of 2019, and the first score of Lui's career.

LONG TIME COMING

Redshirt senior safety Evan Tyler recorded the first interception of his career late in the win at Utah State, and the pick was special because of much of the adversity Tyler has had to battle through in his time at Boise State.

Tyler saw two seasons of his career derailed by ACL injuries, but has battled his way back into the defensive back rotation, and, in addition to his interception, has made 14 tackles (11 solo) and shared a tackle-for-loss this year.

WEAVER BECOMES MOUNTAIN WEST'S SACK KING

Redshirt junior STUD Curtis Weaver racked up three sacks Oct. 5 at UNLV, raising his career total to 29.5 and becoming the Mountain West's all-time leader. He passed the previous benchmark of 28.5 shared by BYU's Jan Jorgensen (2006-09) and TCU's Jerry Hughes (2006-09).

Weaver, currently at 34.0 sacks, also ranks second all-time on Boise State's sacks list. Weaver also tied the Boise State single-game record Sept. 14 against Portland State with four sacks. The mark is shared with four others and was last accomplished by Chris Wing in 1996, also against Portland State.

Weaver, whose 13.5 sacks this year are fifth in the country and lead the Mountain West, is also the FBS' active career leader in sacks, 4.5 ahead of Ohio State's Chase Young.

LUI HOLDS DOWN THE MIDDLE

Senior nose tackle Sonatane Lui has been enjoying a career season, as he is currently seventh on the team in tackles (44), is third in sacks (2.5), and sixth in tackles-for-loss (4.0). Oct. 5 at UNLV, he registered five tackles (three solo), including a sack.

In Sept. 20's win over Air Force, Lui racked up a career-high 16 tackles (four solo). He was a force in the middle of the trenches, most notably teaming with defensive tackle David Moa to stuff Air Force's Taven Birdow on a 4th-and-1 in the fourth quarter with the Broncos holding on to a seven-point lead.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

MOMMA, THERE GOES THAT MAN

Punt returner Avery Williams made Boise State history when the Mountain West's postseason honors were announced Dec. 4, being named Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Year and becoming the first Bronco to earn a conference's top special teams honor.

The redshirt junior, who was also named to the all-conference first team as punt returner and honorable mention as a cornerback, broke off his second punt-return touchdown of the season Nov. 23 at Utah State, reversing field, finding the edge, and going 74 yards on his first touch of the second half.

Williams housed his first punt of the season Nov. 2 at San José State, opening Boise State's scoring with a 66-yard return in the first quarter. For his career, Williams now has five special-teams scores (four punt returns, one kick return).

Williams, averaging 12.4 yards per return this season, leads the Mountain West and ranks eighth in the country. He is also one of just two FBS players with two punt-return scores in 2019 (TCU's Jalen Reagor).

MAKING A HOUSE CALL

Senior kick returner John Hightower broke into the clear on Portland State's first kickoff of Sept. 14's contest, going 98 yards to the house for the Broncos' opening touchdown. The 98-yard return tied for the fifth-longest in school history, and marked the second-straight season in which the Broncos housed a kickoff, after Avery Williams took an onside-kick attempt 44 yards for a score last Oct. 19 against Colorado State.

In terms of "regular" kickoffs (non-onside-kick edition), it was Boise State's first house call since Bryan Douglas' 100-yarder at San Diego State on Nov. 23, 2013.

Hightower returned a second kickoff for a touchdown Oct. 5 at UNLV, but it was called back due to a holding penalty.

SACHSE EARNS NATIONAL RECOGNITION AFTER DEBUT

Redshirt senior kicker Eric Sachse earned plenty of recognition after his stellar debut Aug. 31, being named Mountain West Co-Special Teams Player of the Week, and being named one of the Lou Groza Award's Stars of the Week.

His Mountain West honor made him the first Bronco placekicker to take home the Special Teams award since Dan Goodale on Nov. 10, 2014.

SACHSE FIFTH AVENUE

Redshirt senior kicker Eric Sachse, a transfer from Division III Trinity, made his Bronco debut Aug. 31 at Florida State and promptly matched the program's single-game record by making five field goals, connecting from 36, 36, 41, 26, and 30 yards out.

Sachse accounted for 18 points in the contest (five field goals, three PATs), and he became the third Bronco kicker to make five field goals in a game, joining Roberto Moran (Nov. 2, 1985 vs. Idaho State) and Eric Guthrie (Nov. 6, 1971 vs. Northern Arizona).

This season, Sachse is 14-for-17 on field-goal attempts and 60-for-61 on PATs.

VELAZQUEZ PROVIDES SOME LEG

Redshirt junior kicker/punter Joel Velazquez had one of his best games as a Bronco Oct. 5 at UNLV, averaging 42.9 yards over eight punts with three landing inside the 20. He also showed off his kicking leg, drilling a 52-yard field goal on the final play of the first half to account for his first-career field goal.

Velazquez' 52-yard field goal tied for the sixth-longest in Boise State history, and was the first field goal of at least 50 yards by a Bronco kicker since Tyler Rausa's 51-yarder Sept. 25, 2015 at Virginia.

Punting-wise, Velazquez has hit eight punts of at least 50 yards, and 15 of his 51 punts have landed inside the 20-yard line. On kickoffs, 49 of his 85 have gone for a touchback.

SACKS FOR HUNGER



Boise State has once again teamed up with Albertsons and the Idaho Foodbank to tackle hunger in the Treasure Valley.

For every sack by a member of the Boise State football team, Albertsons will donate \$500 to the Idaho Foodbank.

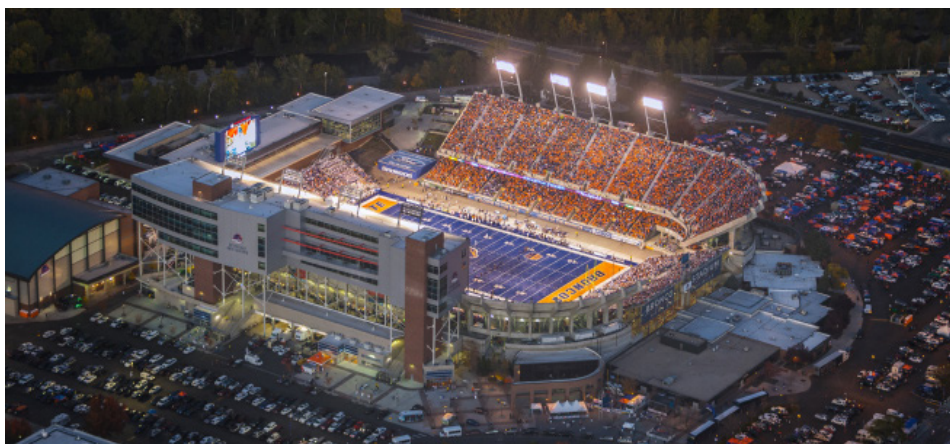

ALBERTSONS STADIUM / THE BLUE



Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith, who passed away in July of 2017 at the age of 101, is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third going in prior to the 2002 season. The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, and the most recent edition was installed prior to this season - making a total of six different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.

Since 1986, Boise State is a combined 189-39 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .829. And since 2000, Boise State has gone 120-9 at home (.930), the highest winning percentage in the country during that time.

Overall, since the construction of Albertsons Stadium in 1970, Boise State is 272-56 (.829), the second-highest winning percentage of any stadium in the country currently in use. Only Alabama's Bryant-Denny Stadium (272-54-3; .831), built in 1929, has a higher winning percentage for its tenant.

UNIFORM COMBINATIONS



We're so blue collar that our blue collars say "BLUE COLLAR."

Boise State unveiled a new look for the 2017 season, the first time the Broncos had overhauled their Nike uniforms since 2011.

Included in the new slate were blue, orange and white, and the jerseys featured new stripes on the sleeves and "Blue Collar" on the inside of the neck. The Broncos added a black set of uniforms that will be unveiled against Air Force, Sept. 20.

The uniforms are from the Nike Vapor Untouchable line, with stretch woven material, a seamless front and shoulders and laser perforation fabric instead of mesh. The uniforms combine materials and science designed for speed and comfort for the players, based on four core principles – fit, durability, weight and core body temperature.

Bryan Harsin, a former Boise State quarterback, assistant coach and offensive coordinator, is in his sixth season as the head coach at his alma mater in 2019. Harsin boasts a record of 64-16 at Boise State, an average of more than 10 wins per season. Overall, he is 71-21 as a head coach – including one season at Arkansas State – and has led his programs to bowl games in each season as a head coach.

In his debut season Harsin led his alma mater back to where it rose to national prominence. Boise State went 12-2 in 2014, winning its first outright Mountain West Championship and capping the campaign with a 38-30 victory over Arizona in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

The victory in the Fiesta Bowl was the third such win for the Broncos in the previous nine seasons. Harsin, serving as offensive coordinator in the first two Fiesta Bowl victories, has been a part of each of the school's three appearances in the game.

The team's victory in the 2014 Mountain West Football Championship marked Boise State's first outright league title since joining the conference in 2011, and the first overall since 2009. The only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State, Harsin has won conference championship as a student-athlete, assistant coach and head coach.

Boise State also captured MW titles in 2017 and 2019, giving Harsin three in six seasons. In 2017, the Broncos capped the championship campaign with a 38-28 victory over Oregon in the Las Vegas Bowl. The Broncos concluded the year at 11-3 overall and ranked No. 22 in both the Associated Press and Coaches Polls.

Following a 12-1 regular-season campaign, and the team's first perfect 8-0 conference record since joining the MW, the Broncos are back in the Las Vegas Bowl in 2019, and will enter the game nationally ranked in each of the three major polls – No. 18 in both the AP and Coaches Polls, and No. 19 in the College Football Playoff Poll.

In 2015, the Broncos went 9-4, climbing as high as No. 20 in both the AP and Coaches Polls. Boise State capped the 2015 campaign with a 55-7 victory over Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, the fifth-largest margin of victory in the history of bowl games. In 2016, Harsin guided the Broncos to a 10-3 record and an appearance in the Motel 6 Cactus Bowl.

In 2018, the Broncos concluded the season ranked in all three major polls - No. 23 in the AP Poll, No. 24 in the Coaches Poll and No. 25 in the College Football Playoff Rankings. The Broncos have been ranked in the top 25 in each of Harsin's six seasons, climbing as high as No. 13 in both the AP and Coaches Polls in 2016, and No. 13 in the Coaches Poll in 2019, Boise State's highest ranking since finishing eighth and sixth in each, respectively, in 2011.

Boise State went 10-3 in 2018, boasting the Mountain West Offensive Player of the Year in quarterback Brett Rypien – one of 11 All-Mountain West honorees. Rypien concluded his career as the Mountain West's all-time leader in career 300-yard passing games (21), completions (1,036) and passing yards (13,581). He also ranked second in league history in both wins by a starting quarterback (37) and career attempts (1,619), and tied for second in career touchdown passes (90).

Curtis Weaver, a redshirt junior STUD end, made it three-straight MW Player of the Year honors for the Broncos, following Rypien's nod in 2018 and Leighton Vander Esch's Defensive Player of the Year award in 2017.

Vander Esch later went on to become a first-round selection of the Dallas Cowboys in the National Football League Draft after foregoing his final season of eligibility. In his rookie season, Vander Esch was named second-team All-Pro by the Associated Press.

Vander Esch, following his 2017 season, and then running back Alexander Mattison, who led the MW in rushing in 2018 (1,415), continued a trend of Broncos declaring for the NFL Draft before exhausting their collegiate eligibility. Boise State now has six-consecutive seasons with an early enrollee getting drafted, one of only nine schools in the country to boast such a distinction. The list also includes Alabama, Clemson, Florida, Florida State, LSU, Penn State, Stanford and Washington.

Mattison was selected in the third round by the Minnesota Vikings.

The Broncos have won at least 10 games in five of Harsin's six seasons, giving Boise State 17 since joining what is now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996. The total ranks second behind only Ohio State during that time.

The Broncos' six-consecutive bowl appearances under Harsin runs the school's streak to 18, tied for the nation's fifth-longest.

For his efforts in 2014, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear Bryant" National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the nation's top first-year head coach by the Football Writers Association of America.

Harsin was named head coach, Dec. 11, 2013. A graduate of Capital High School in Boise, he played quarterback for the Broncos from 1995-99. Following his graduation from Boise State with a degree in business management, Harsin coached running backs and receivers at Eastern Oregon in 2000.

The former Bronco letterwinner began his coaching career at Boise State as a graduate assistant in 2001, before taking over the tight ends as a full-time assistant coach from 2002-05. When Chris Petersen was hired as head coach in 2006, Harsin assumed the role of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Harsin was Petersen's offensive coordinator for five of his eight seasons as head coach (2006-10), and was named a finalist for the 2009 Broyles Award, awarded annually to the nation's top assistant coach. Boise State went 61-5 during his tenure as offensive coordinator.

With Harsin on staff, Boise State has won 11 conference championships.

Following the 2010 season, Harsin went to Texas, where he served as co-offensive coordinator from 2011-12. While with the Longhorns, Harsin helped guide the ascension of an offense that ranked 88th in scoring prior to his arrival, to No. 24 nationally in 2012 (36.1).

Harsin then earned his first head coaching opportunity at Arkansas State in 2013, which claimed a share of the Sun Belt Conference championship and a berth in the GoDaddy.com Bowl that season.

Harsin and his wife Kes have two daughters, Devyn Lynn and Dayn Mykena, and a son, Davis.

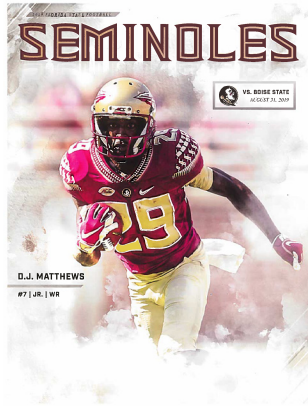

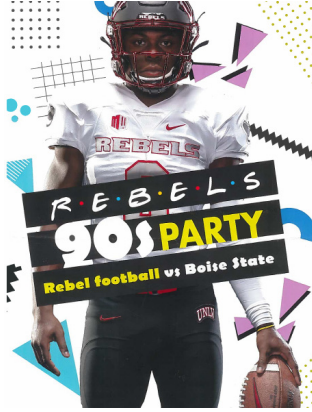

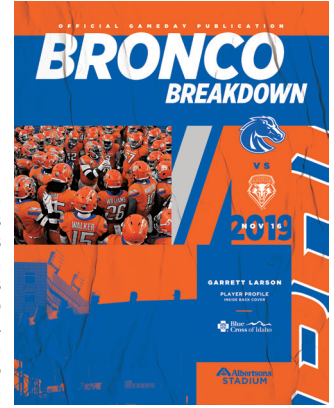
