#14/12 WASHINGTON vs. CALIFORNIA Pac-12 Opener Comes Early As Bears Visit Husky Stadium

THE GAME: The start of Pac-12 Conference play comes early this year as the Washington football team (1-0) plays host to California (1-0) this Saturday night, Sept. 7, at Husky Stadium. The game, which kicks off at 7:30 p.m. PT, will air on FOX Sports 1. UW is ranked No. 13 in the second AP Top 25 of the season and remains No. 12 in the week two USA Today coaches' poll. Cal, which beat UC Davis in its opener, is not ranked. The Huskies beat FCS preseason No. 3 Eastern Washington, 47-14, last Saturday at Husky Stadium. Following the Cal game, the Huskies remain at home to face Hawai'i on Sept. 14 (4:30 p.m., Pac-12 Network).

QUICK HITTERS: The UW has won 15 consecutive home games, the fourth-longest such active streak in FBS ... UW's defense has led the Pac-12 in both scoring defense and total defense each of the last four years ... of the 106 players on the current UW football roster, a little over half (55) are freshmen or redshirt freshmen ... Washington played 10 true freshmen vs. Eastern Washington: DL Jacob Bandes, PK Tim Horn, OLB Laiatu Latu, CB Trent McDuffie, WR Puka Nacua, DL Noa Ngalu, DL Faatui Tuitele, LB Alphonzo Tuputala, DB Asa Turner and DB Cameron Williams ... additionally, 17 redshirt freshmen played in the opener ... Jacob Eason made his UW debut as starting quarterback vs. EWU and threw for 349 yards and four TDs ... his 349 yards were the most ever by a Husky QB in his first start ... his 4 TD passes tied for seventh-most in UW history ... the Huskies scored six TDs against the Eagles, and those six touchdowns were scored by five different players ... UW head coach Chris Petersen entered the 2019 season with the highest winning percentage among active NCAA-FBS coaches with five or more years experience ... Petersen has a career record of 140-33, good for a winning percentage of .809 ... Washington won 32 games over the three previous years (32-9), the highest three-year wins total in UW history and the only time that the Huskies have posted double-digit wins in three straight seasons ... the Huskies have been to a bowl game nine years in a row, and during that stretch have gone to nine different bowls, with no repeats ... including the 2002 Sun Bowl, the UW's last 10 bowl berths have been to 10 different bowl games.

TELEVISION: The UW-Cal game will air on FOX Sports 1 with Brian Custer (play by play) and Robert Smith (analyst) on the call. The game can also be viewed on the FOX Sports Go app.

RADIO: The Washington Sports Network, with its flagship station KOMO AM-1000 and FM-97.7, will carry the live broadcast of every football game on 18 Northwest radio stations. Play-by-play man Tony Castricone and color analyst Damon Huard are joined by sideline reporter Elise Woodward. The UW broadcast of the game will also air on Sirius (105) and XM (201) satellite radio, and is also available via Tuneln.com and the Tuneln app.

HEAD COACH SIXTH SEASON AT UW

Washington wrapped up the 2018 football season in the Rose Bowl on January 1, 2019. That the Huskies were back in Pasadena on New Year's Day was one of many milestones to which Husky head coach Chris Petersen has led the program in his first five seasons.

The 2018 marked the culmination of the first class of Petersen-recruited players, a group of fifth-year player who originally signed on to become Huskies shortly after his arrival in Seattle. The group, along with the highly-successful group of players that followed the

next season, have put together one of the great runs in modern Husky Football history. In five years, the Huskies have won five straight Apple Cups, have gone to five straight bowl games, have won two Pac-12 Championships, earned three New Year's Six bowl-game berths and have competed in the 2016 College Football Playoffs.

In the meantime, during that same span, 24 Huskies who played under Petersen have debuted in the NFL. A total of 22 have earned first-team All-Pac-12, 14 have made an All-America team, three have been honored as Pac-12 Offensive or Defensive Player of the Year and two have won Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for football. Over five seasons, the Huskies have won 47 games, including three straight seasons with double-digit wins.

And, not surprisingly, the Huskies have performed just as well off the field, establishing themselves as one of the most academically successful, major-college football programs in the nation. In the fall of 2018, during the playing season, the Huskies earned a team grade point average of 3.16, tying the program record, which had been set the previous fall. A total of 77 Husky football players posted a 3.0 or better in the fall, 2018, academic quarter. The UW football team has earned a team GPA over 3.0 for 10 of the last 11 quarters after never having done so prior to Petersen's arrival. Washington's most recent Academic Progress Rate (May, 2018) for football was No. 1 in the Pac-12.

Petersen, 54, enters the 2019 season with the highest winning percentage among active NCAA-FBS coaches with at least five years as an FBS coach. Entering the coming season, his .808 winning percentage (139-33) is the 12th-highest in major-college history.

When Petersen was hired after the 2013 season, no one knew for sure how long it might take to return the Husky program to the top levels of the college football world. It turns out, it took about three years.

In 2016, the Huskies had their best season since 2000 and one of their best ever, winning the Pac-12 Championship, earning a spot in the College Football Playoff and finishing ranked No. 4 in the final polls. They did it with high-achieving, young players across the lineup while also succeeding in the classroom at an unprecedented and sustained rate.

That success continued in 2017, as the UW posted back-to-back, 10-win seasons for the first time since 1990-91 and earned a spot in an New Year's Six bowl game while going 10-3 overall and 7-2 in Pac-12 play. In the meantime, during the fall academic quarter, the Huskies posted a team GPA of 3.16, shattering the program's record, set the previous fall.

In 2018, the successes continued as the Huskies won another Pac-12 title and earned a berth in the Rose Bowl, finishing with a 10-4 overall record, a 7-2 Pac-12 mark and another 3.16 team GPA. Three Huskies earned first-team All-America, led by linebacker Ben Burr-Kirven, who became the first player ever to win the Pat Tillman Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year and Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for football. The UW also swept the Morris Trophy for the fourth-time ever as Kaleb McGary and Greg Gaines were voted by the conference players as the Pac-12's best offensive and defensive linemen in the nation.

Petersen, who built a reputation as an offensive innovator who carried the Boise State program to its highest highs and had been courted by innumerable programs, was swayed to take on a new challenge in Seattle when he agreed to become head coach of the Huskies in December of 2013. Petersen's "Built for Life" philosophy, on which the program is based, achieved its highest level of fruition to date with the successes of the team in 2016.

Along with those on-field victories, the team continued to achieve at never-before-seen levels academically as the team achieved a 3.09 grade point average (second-highest in recorded history for UW football to date) during the fall 2016 academic quarter. In 2016, three Huskies earned District 8 Academic All-America and Jake Eldrenkamp was named the Pac-12's Scholar-Athlete of the Year for football.

Along with a 12-2 (8-1 in the Pac-12), the Huskies posted other eye-popping numbers on offense, defense and special teams. The Huskies led the nation in turnover margin and were first in the conference and eighth in the nation in both total offense and total defense. The UW led the Pac-12 in 17 different team statistical categories.

After the 2016 season, Petersen was honored with the Gene Stallings Award, awarded

annually to a college coach who is both a humanitarian and an exceptional coach.

In 2015, Petersen's Huskies, featuring one of the nation's youngest squads and a schedule ranked by many as the nation's toughest, rallied for the Dawgs' sixth consecutive bowl berth, which resulted in a victory over Southern Miss in the Heart of Dallas Bowl. A stout Husky defense (first in the Pac-12 in scoring and total defense) led the way as a freshmanladen offense showed steady growth en route to a 7-6 season record.

Off the field, Petersen's impact on the football program's academic success was clear as well. In the most recently-completed academic quarter (spring, 2015), the football team posted a team GPA of 3.08, highest in school history for football.

In his first season at Washington, Petersen led the Huskies to an 8-6 record and a berth in the TicketCity Cactus Bowl. He became the fastest active FBS coach to reach 100 career victories — doing so in 117 games — and tied with Knute Rockne for fifth fastest all-time after a win over cross-state rival Washington State in the Apple Cup.

Petersen's 'Built for Life' coaching philosophy has been embraced on and off the field by the Huskies in less than a year. Not only did Washington produce three first-team and seven honorable mention All-Pac-12 players, but a combined five players earned first or second team Academic All-Pac-12 recognition, including Danny Shelton who was named First-Team Academic All-American — a first for Washington since 1991.

Petersen, the first and one of only two two-time winners of the Paul "Bear" Bryant Award (2006 and 2009), compiled an exceptional 92-12 record in his eight seasons as Boise State head coach (2006-2013), including two unbeaten seasons (13-0 in 2006 and 14-0 in 2009) and two BCS bowl berths. He won five conference titles and posted a 57-6 record in conference play (WAC from 2006-10 and Mountain West from 2011-13).

Petersen, who won the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award in 2010, led the Broncos to 10 or more wins in seven of eight seasons and to 12 or more in four straight (2008-11).

In 2006, Petersen's first season in charge in Boise, he led the Broncos to their first undefeated season since 1958. The 2006 season was capped by a 43-42 overtime win over Oklahoma in the Fiesta Bowl, a game remembered by many as one of the greatest in history. That Boise team ended the year ranked No. 5 in the final AP top 25 poll. The next season, the Broncos went 10-3 The 2008 squad went 12-1 and ranked No. 11 in the final top 25.

In 2009, Petersen led the Broncos to their second undefeated campaign and another Fiesta Bowl berth. Boise State beat TCU, 17-10, in Arizona, becoming the first team from a non-BCS conference ever to win two BCS bowl games. The '09 Broncos checked in at No. 4 in the final AP poll. The 2010 season ended with a 12-1 record, a No. 9 final ranking and a win in the Las Vegas Bowl. In 2011, BSU once again went 12-1, finishing with a No. 8 final ranking. In 2012, Petersen's team went 11-2 and beat Washington in the Las Vegas Bowl, good for a No. 18 final ranking. In 2013, Boise State finished the regular season with an 8-4 record and earned a berth in the Hawai'i Bowl.

Throughout his teams' on-field success, Petersen also saw his Broncos succeed in the classroom. In 2011, Boise State was the only school to finish in the top 10 in both major polls and also receive a Public Recognition Award from the NCAA for finishing in the top 10 percent of the Academic Progress Rate (APR), the second of three straight such awards.

Known for his work with quarterbacks, Petersen tutored Kellen Moore at Boise State. Moore set an NCAA record with 50 career wins as a starting OB while winning three conference player of the year awards. His 142 passing touchdowns were second-most in NCAA history while his 14,667 career passing yards were fifth-most. He twice led the nation in passing efficiency and set an NCAA record for season interception percentage, throwing just three in 431 attempts in 2009.

Before taking over as head coach at Boise State, Petersen served as the Broncos' offensive coordinator from 2001-05, during which his teams led the nation in scoring in 2002 and 2003. Petersen began his coaching career in 1987 as freshman coach at his alma mater, UC Davis. In 1989, he became the Aggies' varsity wide receivers coach. In 1992, Petersen moved to Pittsburgh, where he was QBs coach. In 1993, Petersen moved back west to take over as QBs coach at Portland State, helping the Vikings to two Division II playoff berths.

In 1995, he took a job at Oregon as the receivers coach under Mike Bellotti, a position he held before moving to Boise as offensive coordinator in 2001.

Born in Yuba City, Calif., on Oct. 13, 1964, Petersen graduated from Yuba City High in 1983 and went on to play quarterback at Sacramento City College. From there, he transferred to UC Davis, earning a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1988. He later earned a master's in educational psychology from Davis. At Davis, he set numerous school records, including the single-season standards for passing efficiency, completions, completion percentage, touchdown passes and total offense as well as the career mark for completion percentage. He season and career completion percentage records still stand.

In 1986, Petersen was named the Northern California Athletic Conference Player of the Year and earned UC Davis' Colby E. Slater Award as the school's Male Athlete of the Year. He was also a captain and won the team's Jerry Norris Award (Most Valuable and Inspirational). He was inducted into the Cal Aggie Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

Petersen and his wife, Barbara, are parents of two sons, Jack and Sam.

100 WINS: With the 2014 victory over Washington State in the Apple Cup, UW head coach Chris Petersen reached his 100th career victory. At the time, it put his record at 100-17, meaning that it took him 117 career games to reach his 100th victory. Only four coaches in major college history did it faster:

Gil Dobie (North Dakota State, UW, Navy, Cornell): 108 games

George Woodruff (Penn): 109 games Bud Wilkinson (Oklahoma): 111 games

Fielding Yost (Neb., Kansas, Stanford, San Jose St., Michigan): 114 games

Chris Petersen (Boise State, Washington): 117 games

Knute Rockne (Notre Dame): 117 games

PETERSEN'S FIRST FIVE: The NCAA Record Book also notes that Petersen won more games in his first season as a head coach (13-0 in 2006) than any coach in history and that his record over his first five seasons as a head coach (61-5) was fifth-best in history, ahead of the likes of Knute Rockne and Bud Wilkinson and behind coaching legends like Gil Dobie and Walter Camp. Here are the 10-best coaching performances over the first five years of a career:

COACHING STAFF: Washington welcomes back nine of 10 full-time assistant coaches from last year's staff, with just one new addition. Five of the 10 assistants are in their sixth season at UW under Petersen (one of whom was a holdover from the prior staff). Of the 10 full-time coaches on the 2019 staff, four came to the UW from Boise State along with Petersen after 2013. Co-defensive coordinator Pete Kwiatkowski was on Petersen's staff in Boise in all eight seasons as head coach, including the last four as defensive coordinator. Kwiatkowksi, a BSU Hall-of-Fame defensive lineman, also worked at his alma mater from 1988 to 1996. Running backs coach and recruiting coordinator Keith Bhonapha was also on Petersen's Broncos staff during Petersen's entire eight seasons, though he started as director of operations. He coached running backs his last five years at BSU. Assistant head coach, special teams coordinator and linebackers coach Bob Gregory came to Washington having spent the previous four seasons at Boise State. He was the defensive coordinator at California from 2002 to 2009 and, along with also having coached at Boise State in 2001, had also worked in the conference at Oregon. Defensive backs coach and defensive coordinator Jimmy Lake, who spent the 2004 season at Washington under head coach Keith Gilbertson, was Petersen's DBs coach in Boise the last two years there, having spent five seasons in the NFL before that. Tight ends coach Jordan Paopao is entering his seventh season in that position, having worked as a Husky GA the previous two. UW alum Ikaika Malloe, who lettered as a Husky from 1993 to 1996 and once worked as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, is back for his fourth season as UW's defensive line coach. He joined the staff after the 2015 season, coming to Seattle from Utah State. Third-year offensive line coach and run game coordinator Scott Huff spent the previous 11 seasons at Boise State, his alma mater, where he played under Coach Petersen (when Petersen was an assistant) and coached for him for all eight years Petersen was head coach. UW offensive coordinator Bush Hamdan, who worked at UW as a quality control assistant (2015) and wide receivers coach (2016) under Petersen, is back for a second season as OC, having spent the 2017 season as the Atlanta Falcons' QBs coach. Last year, Washington welcomed Will Harris to the staff. A former safety at USC, Harris is UW's assistant secondary coach. The only new member of the full-time staff is wide receivers coach Junior Adams, who came to Seattle after two seasons as offensive coordinator at Western Kentucky. Two of four UW graduate assistant coaches are returners to their position: Robert Kugler (former OL at Purdue) and Jabriel Washington (former CB at Alabama) are back for a second year, while Daniel Segal and Henry Fernandez are the newest additions.

TEAM NOTES

HUSKIES vs. GOLDEN BEARS HISTORY: Washington and California are the only two teams that have played in what is now the Pac-12 Conference in every season since the league was founded in 1916. As that would indicate, they've played one another quite often. The Huskies hold a 54-40-4 record in the 98-game, all-time series, which began in 1904. Washington has won nine of the last 12 after Cal had won five in a row (2002-2006).

Last season, the Huskies fell in 12-10, in a defensive struggle in Berkeley. The game featured just 27 first downs and 492 yards of total offense between the two teams, combined. Cal's only TD came on an interception return. Two years ago in Seattle, UW held Cal to 93 yards of total offense in a 33-7 win. In 2016 in Berkeley, Jake Browning threw for six TDs and 378 yards on 19-for-28 passing to lead UW to a 66-27 win. John Ross totaled 208 receiving yards and Dante Pettis added 104 more, while each scored three TDs. In 2015 in Seattle, Cal built a 27-7 lead over the UW and then held the Huskies off for a 30-24 win. In 2014 in Berkeley, a 100-yard fumble return from Shaq Thompson and an 86-yard pass to Ross were the key plays in a 31-7 Husky win.

In 2013 in Seattle, UW earned a 41-17 victory behind 241 rushing yards from Bishop Sankey and 376 passing from Keith Price. In 2012, the UW earned a 21-13 win thanks largely to second-half TDs from Austin Seferian-Jenkins and Sankey. In 2011 in Seattle, the Huskies held on a late goalline stand to preserve a 31-23 victory as Price threw for three TDs in the Pac-12 opener. In 2010 in Berkeley, the Huskies beat the Bears, 16-13, on the final play of the game, a one-yard run from Chris Polk. In 2009, the Huskies closed out their season with a 42-10 win over the Bears in Seattle. Jake Locker passed for 248 yards and three TDs and rushed for 77 and two more scores. In 2008, Cal won in Berkeley, in another season finale as Jahvid Best ran for 311 yards and four TDs in a 48-7 Bears win. In 2007, the 37-23 Husky victory broke a streak of five straight Cal wins in the series.

Prior to that five-game losing streak, the Huskies had won 19 consecutive games in the series, a streak that began with a 50-31 win in 1977. Before 2002, the last Cal win had come in 1976. Cal and UW first met in 1904, battling to a 6-6 tie in a game played in Seattle. In both 1915 and 1916, they played one another twice each year, with unbeaten Gil Dobie's Washington team sweeping the four games. In 1917, Cal broke the UW's 63-game unbeaten streak (still an NCAA record) with a 27-0 win in Berkeley. Other big games in the series include the 1937 game, when the unranked Huskies held No. 1 Cal to a 0-0 tie in Seattle. In 1991, the Bears probably came as close as anyone to beating Washington that national championship season, as Mike Pawlawski's last-gasp pass into the endzone was batted down in a 24-17 UW win. Washington has also posted four of its nine biggest comebacks in history against California. The biggest ever was in 1988, when the Dawgs trailed 27-3 before rallying to win, 28-27. In 1981, Washington was down 21-0 in the third quarter before coming back for a 27-26 victory. A 20-point comeback in 1993 (24-23) and a 14-point rally in 1999 (31-27) also rank on the list. In 2001, the Huskies trailed 21-7 in the first guarter, but came back to earn a 31-28 victory in Berkeley.

HUSKIES vs. BAY AREA SCHOOLS: Washington has a combined, all-time record of 110-83-8 vs. opponents from the San Francisco Bay Area. Washington is 55-40-4 against Cal, 43-42-4 vs. Stanford, 10-0 vs. San Jose State, 1-1 vs. St. Mary's and 1-0 vs. Santa Clara. The Huskies haven't played Santa Clara since 1935 and St. Mary's since 1947. Since 1977, UW is 60-18-0 vs. Bay Area teams: 28-6 vs. Cal, 24-12 vs. Stanford and 8-0 vs. San Jose State.

EARLY CONFERENCE PLAY: Washington hasn't played its conference opener in the first two weeks of the season, as they do Saturday vs. California, since 2008. Over the last 41 seasons, dating back to 1978, the Huskies have played their conference opener in week one or two on 12 occasions. In those 12 games, the Huskies have gone 7-5. Of those 12 games, nine were season-openers (week one), while just three were in second week of the season.

OPPONENTS 35-AND-UNDER: Washington hasn't allowed an opponent to score more than 35 points in a game since a 44-30 loss at UCLA in 2014 — one of only three games in Chris Petersen's UW tenure that an opponent has scored more than 35 points. That's a streak of 57 games in a row that the Huskies' opponent has failed to score more than 35. In that 57-game stretch, Husky foes have scored 30 or more just nine times (of those nine, five were exactly 30 points) and have been held to 14 or fewer points 27 times. In that same span of 57 games, the UW has scored more than 35 points on 25 occasions.

RETURNING STARTERS: While the official number of "returning starters" this year for Washington includes just two defensive and seven offensive players, a deeper look at the numbers reveals a lot more experience. In fact, not counting specialists (UW returns its starting placekicker, punter, holder and long snapper), Washington has 20 current players who had started at least one game on offense, and nine who have started on defense prior to the 2019 season — though obviously most of those were not the primary starter at any one position last season.

WINNING AT HOME: Washington's 15-game home winning streak is the fourth-longest current streak. Only Alabama (26), Clemson (16) and UCF (16) enter the week with longer home win streaks in tact. The UW is 21-1 over its last 22 games at Husky Stadium, a stretch that dates back to November of 2015. The Huskies have won 19 straight non-conference home games, dating back to a loss vs. Nebraska on Sept. 18, 2010.

TEAM NOTES

DEFENSE vs. BIG PLAYS: The UW allowed just ONE scrimmage play of 40 or more yards all last season. No other FBS team allowed fewer than four and 102 teams allowed 10 or more. Washington also allowed just 11 scrimmage plays of 30 or more yards (only Appalachian State, with 10, allowed fewer). The Husky defense also ranked No. 5 in fewest 20-yard plays allowed (34). In 2017, the UW also led the nation with fewest 40-yard scrimmage plays allowed (3) and were second in fewest 30-yard plays (14). They were tied for 5th and 2nd, respectively, in 2016. The Huskies did give up one long play, a 64-yard pass, in the 2019 opener vs. Eastern Washington.

YOUTH: Washington's roster remains on the young side. Of the 106 current players, more than half -55 – are freshmen or redshirt freshmen, due in large part to the fact that every freshman on last year's team preserved their redshirt season. Washington's roster includes 18 seniors, 20 juniors, 13 sophomores, 25 redshirt freshmen and 30 true freshmen.

THE PAC-12: Prior to the 2011 season, the Pac-10 Conference added Utah and Colorado to expand to the Pac-12. Washington, which along with California is one of two schools who have been in the conference since its founding in 1915, plays in the Pac-12 North, along with the other three Northwest schools (Oregon, OSU, WSU) and Stanford and Cal. Under the current system, each school plays all five division rivals, plus four of six teams in the other division each season. The first two seasons, the Huskies did not face UCLA or Arizona State. In 2013 and 14, the Huskies didn't play Utah or USC. In 2015 in 2016, neither UCLA nor Colorado were on the UW schedule, while the Huskies didn't face USC and Arizona in 2017 or 2018. The 2019 season marks the start of a new cycle, moving the rotation back to where it started. Therefore, the Huskies will not play UCLA and Arizona State this season and again in 2020.

THE 100-YARD FACTOR: Since the 1947 season, Washington is 217-67-3 (.761) when a Husky player rushes for 100 yards in a game. The Huskies were 8-0 in such games in 2016, 5-1 in 2017, and 5-1 last season.

HISTORY LESSON: Successfully rushing the football and winning go hand-in-hand for the Huskies. Since 1990, UW has rushed for 200 yards in a game 118 times. The Huskies' record stands at 101-16-1 (.860) in those contests.

HUSKY STADIUM RENOVATION: Husky Stadium underwent a major renovation over from Nov., 2011, through Aug., 2013, as the entire lower bowl and south upper deck were demolished and replaced. The new facility features a new, state-of-the-art football operations center (weight room, training room, locker room, meeting rooms, coaches' offices) in the west end, much more premium seating options and a new playing surface. Husky Stadium had featured a track up until 2011, so seats that were once far from the field, particularly in the west end, are much closer to the action. UW is 35-8 at home since the re-opening of Husky Stadium, and have won 15 consecutive home games (through the EWU win).

ALASKA AIRLINES FIELD AT HUSKY STADIUM: The Oregon game on Nov. 5, 2011, marked the final game in Husky Stadium prior to major renovations that were completed in summer, 2013. The Huskies re-opened their home field with a 38-6 win over then-No. 19 Boise State on Aug. 31, 2013. The 2018 season marks the 99th season of play in Husky Stadium. Original construction on the facility was completed in 1920 when Washington played one game in the new campus facility. UW's all-time record in Husky Stadium stands at 391-177-21 (.682).

BEST DEFENSE IN THE WEST: Washington has led the Pac-12 in both scoring defense and total defense each of the last four seasons, after finishing 3rd and 6th in the conference, respectively, in 2014, Chris Petersen's first year at UW. Generally speaking, the Huskies' averages in these two categories have not only topped the conference rankings, but frequently by a significant margin. Here's a look at the Pac-12 and NCAA FBS rankings for each of the last five years.
