Television Coverage

ABC will broadcast the game to a national audience. Sean McDonough (play-by-play), Todd Blackledge (color) and Molly McGrath (sideline reporter) will call the game.

Radio Coverage

Jim Brandstatter (play-by-play), Dan Dierdorf (color) and Doug Karsch (sideline) will call the action on the LEARFIELD Michigan Sports Network. Anchored by WWJ-AM (950) in Detroit, the Michigan Radio Network is comprised of 37 affiliate stations in Michigan and Ohio during football season (see page 3).

Wolverines and Huskies

This will be the 13th meeting between Michigan and Washington, and the fifth contest played at Michigan Stadium. The Wolverines hold a 3-1 record in games played at the Big House, while holding a 2-2 record at Washington and a 2-2 mark in four Rose Bowl match-ups. The two programs were scheduled to play at Washington last season but that game was rescheduled due the COVID-19 pandemic.

Michigan vs. Washington at the Big House

This will be the fifth meeting between Michigan and Washington at the Big House. The Wolverines defeated the Huskies in 1953 (50-0), 1969 (45-7) and 2002 (31-29) while losing a 20-11 contest in 1980. In the last meeting at Michigan Stadium, U-M claimed victory as Phil Brabbs converted a 44-yard field goal as time expired in the 2002 opener.

U-M vs. Pacific-12 Conference

Michigan has compiled a 50-26-1 record against teams that currently compete in the Pacific-12 Conference. This will be the first time the Wolverines will face a Pac-12 team since playing Colorado in 2016 at Michigan Stadium.

- This will be the 13th meeting between the Wolverines and the Huskies
 - U-M sports a 7-5 record against Washington with their largest margin of victory being 50-0 in 1953, the very first meeting between the two programs
 - The last meeting between the two schools came in 2002, when Michigan opened the season with a 31-29 victory over Washington at Michigan Stadium
 - The Wolverines have a 3-1 mark against the Huskies at the Big House

- U-M vs. Pacific-12 Conference**
- Michigan has compiled a 50-26-1 record against teams that currently compete in the Pacific-12 Conference
 - In 1901, the Wolverines played their first game against a current Pacific-12 team, obliterating Stanford in the Rose Bowl (49-0)
 - Michigan holds undefeated marks against Washington State (4-0) and Oregon State (5-0)
 - Michigan has played all 12 teams currently in the Pacific-12 Conference
 - This will be the first time that Michigan faces Washington since 2002

10th Night Game at Michigan Stadium

This will be the 64th night game played by the Wolverines in school history and the 10th contested at Michigan Stadium. U-M has compiled a 36-27 overall record in games and has a 7-2 mark at home. See page 19 for a complete list of night games played by Michigan in school history.

THE TEAM

- Four players, two on each side of the ball, were voted 2021 captains for the Wolverines: Ronnie Bell and Andrew Vastardis on offense and Aidan Hutchinson and Josh Ross on defense
- Vastardis, Hutchinson and Ross were named captains for the second straight season; the coaches appointed captains during the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic shortened season and this year the program returned to its tradition of having the players vote on captains
- U-M had six returning All-Big Ten honorable mention performers from 2020: Michael Barrett, Hassan Haskins, Brad Hawkins, Daxton Hill, Brad Robbins and Andrew Stueber
- The Wolverines entered 2021 with 15 returning starters on offense (seven) and defense (eight); also had three returning specialists
- Heading into the 2021 season, a total of 25 players have started at least one game in their career: 14 on offense and 11 on defense
- Senior WR Ronnie Bell leads the offense with 17 career starts
- Senior DE Aidan Hutchinson and DB Brad Hawkins lead the team and defense with 17 career starts
- The 2021 roster features 76 student-athletes that have seen game action during their career; the total does not include three (3) student-athletes that played elsewhere before transferring to Michigan
- The Wolverines had 18 players see their first career action in the opener vs. Western Michigan
- Six players made the first starting assignment of their careers during the 2021 season: LG Trevor Keegan, TE Joel Honigford, NT Mazi Smith, OLB David Ojabo, WLB Nikhai Hill-Green and FS R.J. Moten
- Seven true freshmen saw their first collegiate action in 2021: WR Andre Anthony, DL Rayshaun Benny, LB Junior Colson, OL Greg Crippen, QB J.J. McCarthy, DB Rod Moore and DL George Rooks
- In addition to the freshmen, 11 players made their Michigan career debuts during the year: WR Daylen Baldwin, DB Eamonn Dennis, RB Leon Franklin, DB Keshawn Harris, TE Matt Hibner, DB George Johnson, DE Braiden McGregor, DB Andrew Russell, WR Matt Torey, QB Dan Villari and DL Jordan Whittle
- U-M has players from 24 different states and two different countries - Germany and Scotland - on the roster this season
- The 2021 roster includes 36 Michiganders, nine (9) from Massachusetts as well as eight (8) student-athletes from the Ohio, California, Connecticut and Florida
- The two international players are LB David Ojabo (Aberdeen, Scotland) and DL Julius Welschof (Miesbach, Germany); defensive line coach Shaun Nua was also born outside the country in American Samoa (Pago Pago)
- The Wolverines have 13 players enrolled in graduate studies: K Rhett Anderson, QB Alan Bowman, OL Chuck Filiaga, DB Brad Hawkins, DL Donovan Jeter, DL Elijah Pierre, P Brad Robbins, LB Josh Ross, DL Jess Speight, OL Andrew Stueber, DE Taylor Upshaw, OL Andrew Vastardis and DL Jordan Whittle
- Michigan had 10 freshmen enroll in January 2021 and participate in spring football: OL

Raheem Anderson, WR Andre Anthony, OL Tristan Bounds, LB Junior Colson, OL Greg Crippen, WR Cristian Dixon, RB Tavierre Dunlap, RB Donovan Edwards, OL Giovanni El-Hadi and QB J.J. McCarthy

U-M Unranked Entering Washington Game

- The Michigan football team enters the Washington game unranked in the top 25 of the national polls
- The Wolverines had been ranked in the national polls for 31 straight games dating back to the start of the 2018 season prior to falling out of the polls during the 2020 season
- Entering the Washington game, U-M has been ranked for all but 13 contests during Coach Harbaugh's tenure (60 of 73 games); first four games in 2015, four games in 2017 and 2020 and the first two games of the 2021 season
- Michigan finished the 2020 season unranked in the final polls
- Over the last six seasons (2015-20), Michigan has faced more teams that have finished in the top 15 of the national polls (17) than any other program

Schedule Notes

- Michigan will face five teams ranked in the pre-season AP poll: #4 Ohio State, #12 Wisconsin, #17 Indiana, #19 Penn State and #20 Washington
- Four of the Michigan's foes played in bowl games last year: Indiana (Outback Bowl), Northwestern (Vrbo Citrus Bowl), Ohio State (CFP/National Championship Game), Wisconsin (Duke's Mayo Bowl)
- The combined 2020 record of Michigan's 12 opponents was 45-39 (.536)

Michigan in Big Ten Action

- U-M posted a 2-4 record in the Big Ten last season, defeating Minnesota and Rutgers while losing to Michigan State, Indiana, Wisconsin and Penn State
- Michigan has a 34-16 mark in Big Ten action under sixth-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have a 17-8 record at home in Big Ten play under Harbaugh and have a 17-8 mark on the road
- U-M has compiled a 519-215-18 record all-time in Big Ten action

Playing at Home in September

- The Wolverines play all four games in the month of September at Michigan Stadium; opened the season with a 47-14 victory over Western Michigan on Sept. 4
- It will be the first time since 2016 that U-M has played its first four games at home; Michigan

- The Wolverines also played five straight home games to start the 2011 season
- The most consecutive home contests to start a season is eight, a mark achieved during the 1905 and 1917 seasons.

The Team under Coach Harbaugh

- Michigan has won 10 games in three of Harbaugh's seven seasons leading the program
- The Wolverines have won 50 games during Coach Harbaugh's six seasons (50-22)
- U-M has scored 290 touchdowns while allowing just 166 to its opponents during that stretch
- The defense has been listed in the top 12 nationally in five seasons, including four of those years ranking among the top 5
- A total of 65 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team), including eight players in 2015, 16 in 2016, nine in 2017, 15 in both 2018 and 2019 and 2 in 2020
- Five players earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (2016), Maurice Hurst (2017) and Devin Bush (2018)
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award
- Additionally, three players have been named finalists for national awards during Harbaugh's tenure: Jabrill Peppers (Lombardi, 2016/Bednarik, 2016), Jourdan Lewis (Thorpe, 2016) Devin Bush (Butkus, 2017 and 2018/Bronko Nagurski, 2018)

Michigan at Home in the Harbaugh Era

- The Wolverines have compiled a 31-8 home record under Jim Harbaugh
- Michigan has a 17-8 mark in Big Ten games at the Big House under Harbaugh's leadership
- The Wolverines have gone undefeated twice; posted a 7-0 mark in 2018 and an 8-0 mark in 2016
- U-M had a 10-game home winning streak snapped against Michigan State in 2017 and a 13-game streak snapped by Ohio State in 2019
- The only setbacks in Big Ten home games came in losses to rivals Michigan State and Ohio State as well as Wisconsin and Penn State in 2020
- The Wolverines are a perfect 14-0 in non-conference games under Harbaugh at the Big House, outscoring the opposition by a 568-179 margin in those games

Michigan on the Road under Harbaugh

- U-M has compiled a 17-10 record (.630) on the road under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have posted a 17-8 record (.680) in Big Ten road games during his tenure, including a 4-0 record in 2015
- The program has posted a 2-4 record in neutral site games: 1-4 mark in bowl games
- The team's only regular season neutral site affair was a 33-17 victory over Florida in the 2017 season opener at Cowboys Stadium

THE OFFENSE

2021 Offense

- The offense is led by third-year offensive coordinator Josh Gattis
- U-M has two new assistant coaches on offense: running backs coach Mike Hart and quarterbacks coach Matt Weiss; two additional assistants moved positions as Jay Harbaugh returned to coaching the tight ends and Sherrone Moore shifted over to the offensive line and added co-offensive coordinator duties
- Michigan returned seven starters from the 2020 season and has 14 players with starting experience on the 2021 roster
- The Wolverines had two players make their first career start in the opener vs. Western Michigan: Trevor Keegan (LG) and Joel Honigford (TE)
- A total of 10 players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Hassan Haskins, Blake Corum, Donovan Edwards and Leon Franklin, WRs Ronnie Bell, A.J. Henning and Roman Wilson, and QB Cade McNamara, J.J. McCarthy and Dan Villari
- Four Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns in their careers, combining for 16 scores; Haskins leads the group with 11 and is followed by Corum (3), Henning (1) and McNamara (1)
- McNamara entered 2021 as the only quarterback on the roster with game experience, appearing in four games with one start
- McNamara, McCarthy and Villari are saw action against Western Michigan
- U-M has 11 players with a reception in their careers: WRs Bell, Henning, Cornelius Johnson, Mike Sainristil, Roman Wilson and Daylen Baldwin; TEs Erick All and Luke Schoonmaker; and RBs Corum, Haskins and Edwards
- Seven (7) Wolverines have scored receiving touchdowns, combining for 16 end zone trips; Bell leads the way with five career TD and is followed by Johnson with four scores; Sainristil (3), Schoonmaker (1), Wilson (1), Corum (1) and Baldwin (1) have also caught receiving TDs
- Bell's 17 starts are the most among all players on offense
- WR Bell, RB Haskins and OT Andrew Stueber are Michigan's players on offense who have earned All-Big Ten recognition; each was an honorable mention pick by the league's coaches

A Look Back at the 2020 Offense

- Michigan averaged 381.8 yards per game of total offense
- The offense gained 131.5 rushing yards per contest and passed the ball for an average of 250.3 yards per game; U-M was sixth in the conference and 44th nationally in passing offense
- The Wolverines gained over 450 yards in three games: Rutgers (495), Minnesota (481) and Michigan State (452)
- U-M led the Big Ten in fewest tackles for loss allowed, fewest turnovers, interceptions and fumbles while listing second in sacks allowed
- The team turned the ball over six times in 2020, the fewest of any team in the Big Ten and 10th in the NCAA; one of those turnovers came on special teams
- Michigan lost two fumbles and threw four interceptions; the two fumbles led the Big Ten

and were sixth nationally while the four interceptions ranked first and 17th, respectively

- U-M converted 36.0 percent of its third down opportunities (27-75)
- The offense ranked 18th nationally in fewest sacks allowed (1.33 avg.) and 17th in tackles for loss (4.50 avg.)

QUARTERBACKS

- Michigan went from one quarterback with playing experience at Michigan -- Cade McNamara -- to three after the opener vs. Western Michigan; J.J. McCarthy and Dan Villari both saw their first collegiate action while Alan Bowman is also on the roster who was a starter at Texas Tech before transferring to U-M
- McNamara (7) and McCarthy (1) have both thrown touchdown passes in their careers
- McNamara has accounted for eight TDs in his short career: 7 passing and 1 rushing
- McNamara threw a team- and career-high four touchdown passes at Rutgers
- McNamara scored his only rushing touchdown on a two-yard run in overtime against Rutgers
- McNamara has thrown 82 pass attempts without an interception

Cade McNamara

- Michigan has scored points on 67% of his drives; directed 21 series over the last two seasons, leading the team to 14 scores (11 TDs, 3 FGs) - does not include OT at Rutgers
- Started vs. Western Michigan, completing 9-of-11 passes for 136 yards and two TDs; directed scoring drives on 6-7 series played
- 2020 Academic All-Big Ten
- Played in four games and made one starting assignment in 2020; completed 43-of-71 passes for 425 yards and five touchdowns
- Earned first career start vs. Penn State, completing 12-of-25 passes for 91 yards and had a three-yard run despite playing through injury
- Led 17-point comeback victory at Rutgers, completing 27-of-36 passes for 260 yards and four touchdowns; added a two-yard rushing score in overtime
- Had the highest completion percentage in school history for a single game with 36-plus attempts (75%) at Rutgers
- Made career debut at Minnesota, directing one series; attempted three passes in the contest
- Ran the scout team offense most of the 2019 season; did not see game action
- Two-time Gatorade Player of the Year in Nevada; first player in state to win the award in back-to-back seasons

J.J. McCarthy

- Made collegiate debut vs. Western Michigan, completing 4-of-6 passes for 80 yards and one TD; threw first career touchdown on a 69-yard pass to WR Daylen Baldwin
- Finished high school career with a 36-2 record as a starter; accumulated 7,905 career pass yards with 94 touchdowns and 13 interceptions
- Helped IMG finish the season as the 2020 National Champions; ranked No. 1 in MaxPrep's final 2020 High School Football Rankings
- Went 92-of-165 passing for 1,392 yards with 16

U-M'S OFFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- U-M has gained more than 5,000 yards of total offense in four of Coach Harbaugh's seven seasons: 5,147 yards (2015), 5,524 (2016), 5,457 (2018) and 5,220 (2019)
- Two of the three players in school history to pass for more than 3,000 yards in a season have played during Harbaugh's tenure: Jake Rudock (3,017 in 2015) and Shea Patterson (3,061 in 2019); school record is 3,331 yards by John Navarre in 2003
- The offense has generated two of the top five total offensive seasons in school history: 4th in 2016 with 5,524 yards and fifth in 2018 with 5,457 yards
- The Wolverines have posted 2,346 points in 72 games for an average of 32.6 points per contest
- Scored more points in 2016 than any team in the modern era of U-M football and trailed only the Point-a-Minute teams of the early 1900s; tallied the fifth-highest point total (524) in school history during the 2016 season
- Michigan gained more than 2,000 rushing yards in four seasons under Harbaugh: 2,057 yards (2015), 2,768 (2016), 2,310 (2017) and 2,653 (2018); finished with 1,959 yards in 2019
- The red zone offense has converted at just under 90 percent, 267-307 (87.0%); scored 193 TDs in those 267 conversions (72.3% of scores are TDs)
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in red zone efficiency twice: 13th (2016) and 7th (2015)
- Converted 41.3% percent of third down chances (420-1,016), including 40% or better in three of those seasons: 49.4% (2018), 43% (2016) and 49% (2015)
- U-M has scored 160 rushing TDs in seven seasons: 3 in 2021, 11 in 2020, 26 in 2019, 26 in 2018, 26 in 2017, 41 in 2016 and 27 in 2015
- Michigan has a 28-1 record under Harbaugh when a player gains 100 yards rushing and is 41-4 when out-rushing the opposition
- U-M is 44-5 under Jim Harbaugh when gaining 125 rushing yards or more in a game
- The Wolverines have lost 38 fumbles in 72 games: six (2015), five (2016), 11 (2017), three (2018), 11 (2019) and 2 (2020)

TD passes and no interceptions as a senior

- Led Nazareth to a 13-1 record and the Class 7A state title as a sophomore in 2018; helped Nazareth reach the state title game in 2017 and 2019
- Threw for 2,820 yards and 34 touchdowns as a junior at Nazareth Academy in La Grange Park (Ill.)

Dan Villari

- Made his career debut at quarterback vs. Western Michigan, running the ball three times for 11 yards
- Played on special teams against the Broncos
- Did not see action during the 2020 season

Alan Bowman

- Won two varsity letters at Texas Tech (2018, '20) after injury caused a redshirt in 2019
- Appeared in 19 games with 16 starts under center as a Red Raider
- Accumulated 5,060 pass yards at TT with 33 touchdowns and 17 interceptions
- Threw for 300 passing yards nine times and 400 yards four times
- Two-time Academic All-Big 12
- Appeared in eight games with six starts in 2020; completed 150-of-232 pass attempts for 1,602 yards with 10 TDs and took only two sacks

TIGHT ENDS

- The tight end corps has five players with game experience: Erick All (19 games), Luke Schoonmaker (19), Carter Selzer (11), Joel Honigford (1) and Matt Hibner (1)
- All and Schoonmaker have the only career receptions by the group
- The TEs have accounted for 18 receptions totaling 169 yards and one touchdown in their careers
- All leads the TE corps with 16 receptions for 115 yards while Schoonmaker has two catches totaling 54 yards
- Schoonmaker has the groups only touchdown, a 29-yard TD at Illinois during the 2019 season

Erick All

- Saw action in 19 career games and played tight end in 15 contests
- Caught 16 passes for 115 yards in his career
- Led the team with three receptions totaling 23 yards vs. Western Michigan
- Played in all six games and started two contests at tight end in 2020; led the TE corps with 12 receptions gaining 82 yards
- Had an eight-yard reception vs. Penn State
- Caught a career-high four receptions for 27 yards at Rutgers
- Hauled in two passes vs. Wisconsin and made three catches for 13 yards vs. Michigan State
- Caught two passes for 33 yards at Minnesota
- Appeared in nine games at tight end and played on special teams in 12 contests during 2019 season; missed Illinois game due to injury
- Made first career reception at Penn State, hauling in a 10-yard pass in the fourth quarter
- Assisted on one special teams tackle in 2019
- Made career debut at tight end and on special teams against Middle Tennessee State

Luke Schoonmaker

- Appeared in 19 career games and played tight end in 15 of those contests
- Has two receptions for 54 yards and scored one touchdown during his career
- Played tight end vs. Western Michigan
- Saw action at tight end and on special teams in five of the six games during the 2020 season; played on special teams only at Indiana
- Played tight end in eight games during the 2019 season and saw special teams action in 11 contests
- Earned snaps at tight end against Penn State, Notre Dame and Maryland
- Had a 25-yard touchdown reception at Illinois
- Made his first career reception vs. Rutgers, a 29-yard pass from Joe Milton, on his birthday
- Saw action at tight end and on FG/PAT protection unit against MTSU, Army and Rutgers
- Made career debut at Rutgers in 2018, playing snaps at tight end

Carter Selzer

- Three-year letterman who has played in 11 career contests
- Three-time Academic All-Big Ten (2018-20)
- Played tight end in six of his 11 appearances
- Played snaps at tight end vs. Western Michigan
- Saw action in all six games during the 2020 season, playing on special teams with action at tight end against Michigan State

Matthew Hibner

- Made his career debut vs. Western Michigan, playing snaps at tight end
- Did not see game action as a freshman in 2020
- Caught 42 passes for 940 yards and scored 12 touchdowns as a senior at Lake Braddock High School (Burke, Va.)
- Registered 96 tackles, 20 tackles for loss, 10 sacks, two interceptions and eight pass breakups in 2019

RECEIVERS

- U-M has seven receivers that have seen game action during their career: Andre' Anthony, Daylen Baldwin, Ronnie Bell, A.J. Henning, Cornelius Johnson, Mike Sainristil and Roman Wilson
- Six of the seven receivers have caught passes in their career
- Six receivers have scored touchdowns in their career: Bell (5), Johnson (4), Sainristil (3), Baldwin (1) and Wilson (1); Baldwin caught nine TDs prior to transferring to Michigan
- The receiving corps had two TD receptions over 65 yards vs. Western Michigan: Bell (76 yards) and Baldwin (69)
- U-M had two players average over 15 yards per catch in 2020: Bell (15.4 avg.) and Johnson (15.9)
- Bell and Johnson had more than 15 catches during the 2020 season
- The Wolverines' corps collected 79 receptions for 1,085 yards in 2020; averaged 13.2 catches and 180.8 yards per contest (does not include Baldwin's statistics at Jackson State)

- Played receiver in all six games during the 2020 season; caught nine passes for 122 yards and scored one touchdown
- Had a four-yard reception vs. Penn State
- Ran nine yards on a jet sweep at Rutgers

SPECIAL TEAMS

A Look at the 2021 Special Team

- Jay Harbaugh is in his second season as the program's Special Teams Coordinator after serving as an assistant the prior five seasons on staff
- Michigan's special teams shined in the season-opening win over Western Michigan; 31-yard punt return, 79-yard kick return, two field goals and one blocked field goal attempt
- U-M returns three starters from its special teams corps: kicker Jake Moody, punter Brad Robbins and long snapper Will Wagner
- Robbins is one of the top candidates for the Ray Guy Award after leading the Big Ten and listing 10th nationally in punting last year
- The Wolverines will be breaking in a new punt and kick returner this fall

Reviewing the 2020 Special Teams Units

- An All-Big Ten honorable mention selection, Brad Robbins was 10th in the NCAA and first in the Big Ten in punting (45.3 avg.)
- U-M returned 21 kickoffs for 520 yards (24.8 avg.) and one touchdown
- Giles Jackson was tops in the conference and 16th nationally in kickoff return average
- Jackson had five punt returns for 45 yards (9.0 avg.) and 13 kick returns for 354 yards (27.2 avg.)
- Jackson had the team's only special teams touchdown on a 95-yard kickoff return at Rutgers; it was his school record-tying second kickoff return for a TD (tied Desmond Howard)
- The Wolverines converted all 21 PATs
- Quinn Nordin connected on two field goals, a 23-yard attempt vs. Michigan State and a 46-yarder against Wisconsin, while Jake Moody hit the other on a 40-yard attempt vs. Penn State
- Nine of the team's 28 punts were downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line
- 14 of Moody's 29 kickoffs were touchbacks

Michigan's Special Teams under Harbaugh

- U-M has converted 97-127 field goal attempts (76.4%) and 266-271 point-after-attempts
- The Wolverines have 219 touchbacks in 447 kickoffs
- Michigan has punted the ball three or less times in 30 games, including two contests where the team did not attempt a punt (Hawaii and Maryland in 2016)
- The Wolverines have downed 109 punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line
- U-M has 15 blocks in the seven seasons that Coach Harbaugh has led the program
- Led the Big Ten and finished second nationally with seven blocked kicks in 2016: one PAT, two FGs and four punts (three other punts were deflected and another punt by the opposition hit into the back of its own player)
- Led the NCAA with four blocked punts in 2016, finished 19th nationally with three blocked punts in 2018 and ranked fifth in the country with two blocked punts in 2019
- Michigan has scored eight touchdowns on returns during Harbaugh's tenure, scoring four times each on kickoffs and punt returns

Brad Robbins

- Three-year starter; earned starting nod as a true

freshman (2017), senior (2020) and fifth-year senior (2021); missed the entire 2018 season due to injury

- One of nine (9) punters in school history with a career average better than 40 yards per punt
- Currently ranks sixth in Michigan history with a 41.7-yard career average
- Punted 93 times for 3,882 yards (41.7 avg.) with a 66-yard career long
- Had 29 punts downed inside the opposition's 20-yard line with only six career touchbacks
- 35 of his 93 career punts have been fair caught
- Had a 43.5-yard average on two punts vs. Western Michigan; both were fair caught

MICHIGAN IN THE CLASSROOM

- 224 student-athletes have earned Academic All-Big Ten honors during Coach Harbaugh's tenure (2015-20): see chart to the right
- The Wolverines rank fourth among all conference institutions in Academic All-Big Ten performers over the last six seasons
- Michigan had a school record 50 players receive Academic All-Big Ten accolades in 2020, topping the previous mark of 48 in 2017
- U-M's 48 players earning Academic All-Big Ten in 2017 was the most of any Big Ten school
- DE Aidan Hutchinson is the team's nominee for the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete award
- A second-year player with the Indianapolis Colts, Jordan Glasgow was a three-time CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree and was on the ballot for academic All-America accolades
- A member of the U.S. Marine corps, linebacker Noah Furbush received the Bo Schembechler Postgraduate Scholarship by the Michigan Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall at the conclusion of the 2017 season
- 2017 All-American Maurice Hurst, a member of the San Francisco 49ers, became just the 11th player in school history to earn Academic All-Big Ten four times during his career
- Two-time All-American tight end Jake Butt (2017) and linebacker Adam Shibley (2021) were named Big Ten Medal of Honor recipients as the top senior student-athlete at Michigan; the prestigious honor is provided to one male and one female at each Big Ten institution each year

IN THE COMMUNITY

More than 60 student-athletes are active participants in the Ann Arbor community, serving the program and charitable organizations.

Additional service opportunities for players throughout the year include:

- A tradition for more than 25 years, football players and student-athletes in other sports across Michigan Athletics visit patients at **C.S. Mott Children's Hospital** on Thursday nights throughout the year
- The football team makes annual visits to the **Veteran's Hospital** in Ann Arbor, allowing the players a chance to give back to our military and thank them for their service to our country.
- Student-athletes participate in reading programs throughout the Ann Arbor School system and attend and speak at ACT (Athletes for Community Transformation) at Bryant Community Center
- Football players engage with special needs students from across the area at **Victors Day**, an event put together by the T. Wall Foundation
- The coaches and student-athletes work with the **KIDSPORT** Program to teach youngsters from around the Washtenaw County area about football, complete with youth run drills and demonstrations
- Pen Pal Program
- Holiday Giving Drive

Community Service Overseas

During its foreign trips, the Michigan football team participated in multiple community service activities

- In Rome, the team engaged in several service-based activities, including an afternoon with refugees at Borghese Gardens. Coach Harbaugh, his family and five players visited the SOS Children's Village, which provides stable homes to orphaned or abandoned children. The contingent provided Michigan apparel, played games and visited with the youth and their surrogate mothers, who dedicate their lives to providing a stable environment for these children.
- The team also interacted with representatives from the Federazione Italiana de American Football (FIDAF), an Italian football team, which included refugee players on its roster. The team met two individuals, Kana Jallow and Saikou Sanneh, and watched a documentary about their journey, struggles and the hard work it took to overcome these difficulties, and how the lessons learned in football apply to their every day life.
- In Paris, the Wolverines spent a morning providing a free instructional clinic to French, German, Hungarian and Italian youth and coaches to help spread the game of football across the globe. After the clinic concluded, a group of players broke off and played two soccer games against refugees from Somalia, Afghanistan, Sudan, Bangladesh, Guinea and Chad.
- Michigan Football partnered with Salomon Kabongo-Kooper and his initiative, Feed the City, where players and staff put together food and boxed meals for Paris' homeless. A group of Michigan players went to the northern part of the city to spend time interacting with refugees while another group spent time preparing food, packaging clothing and delivering the items to the homeless. The players at the refugee camp played soccer, ran races and taught the young people the game of American football.
- In South Africa, the Wolverines united under the banner of sports with youth and college players from the Cape Town area as well as professional players from the Springbok, the country's national rugby team. Michigan players learned the skills necessary to play rugby while teaching the game of football to the youth in attendance. The older rugby players ran a scrimmage to show the Wolverines how a full-field game is played and then put the student-athlete through two instructional sessions featuring rugby drills. The clinic ended with UTC choir singing the national anthems for the United States and South Africa. Captain Ben Bredeson participated in a jersey swap with the organizing rugby clubs and offered a few words of thanks for the opportunity to learn the fame of rugby.

- Michigan has 50 players listed on NFL Rosters at the outset of the 2021 season
- During head coach Jim Harbaugh's six seasons, the Wolverines have had 39 players drafted, 44 participate in the NFL Combine and 48 players make NFL rosters
- U-M led all schools with 11 players selected during the 2017 NFL Draft
- The Wolverines had a school record 14 players attend the 2017 NFL Scouting Combine

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2020 (94 Years)

The football program is in its 94th season in the "Big House" in 2020, with a 438-133-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 41 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 294 consecutive games; the current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 -- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 51,422,764 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 294 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000; current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Jim Harbaugh has led the University of Michigan football program to three 10-win seasons in his six years in Ann Arbor, becoming one of just four Big Ten coaches to accomplish the feat in the history of the conference.

The J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach, Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

In three of his five seasons as the Michigan head coach, Harbaugh has guided the Wolverines to 10-wins. U-M has appeared in a bowl game in all five seasons, including two New Year's Six Bowls with the 2017 Orange Bowl and 2018 Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl, and three other bowls played on New Year's Day (2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl; 2018 Outback Bowl; 2020 Vrbo Citrus Bowl).

Eight Wolverines have secured 12 All-America honors under Harbaugh, including consensus honorees Devin Bush, Jake Butt, Maurice Hurst, Jourdan Lewis and Jabrill Peppers.

Additionally, Butt won the Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end in 2016 while Peppers received the Lott IMPACT Trophy, Paul Hornung Award and was a fifth-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy race that same season. Several other athletes have been national award finalists under Harbaugh, including Lewis (Jim Thorpe Award) and Bush (Butkus Award).

At least 20 players from each team Harbaugh has coached at Michigan have earned All-Big Ten recognition, including 24 players with first-team honors (four in 2015, six in 2016, three in 2017, eight in 2018, and three in 2019). In the classroom, Wolverines have totaled 174 academic All-Big Ten honors during his tenure, including a program-record 48 in 2017.

Harbaugh's teams at Michigan have each finished the season ranked in the national polls, including a No. 10 season-ending ranking in 2016,

when the Wolverines came within inches of claiming their first Big Ten East Division Title and a spot in the conference championship game in 2016. U-M has finished the season as a top-15 team three times in Harbaugh's tenure.

Under Harbaugh, Michigan has produced two of the five most-productive offensive seasons in school history. U-M has had a top-12 national defense in all five seasons and a top-three unit on three occasions.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after a four-year run in the NFL with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the NFC title in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record, including 5-3 in the postseason.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and the NFC Championship Game in 2011, his first season, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating

with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history.

At the collegiate level, Harbaugh spent three years at the University of San Diego (2004-06) and four years at Stanford (2007-10). He turned around a Cardinal program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory in 2010. In his debut as a head coach, Harbaugh led San Diego to a 29-6 record in three seasons.

He spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the Oakland Raiders' quarterbacks coach, assisting the team to Super Bowl XXXVII.

Harbaugh began preparing for a coaching career during his professional playing days, spending eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001).

As an NFL quarterback, Harbaugh played for five organizations in his 15-year career (1987-2001). He threw for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games and made 140 career starts. He was the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. In 2005, he was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor.

As a Wolverine, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished runner-up the following year. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years.

In 1986, Harbaugh won the "Chicago Tribune" Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, was a first-team All-American and finished third in Heisman Trophy voting.

The first Michigan quarterback to throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin), Harbaugh also eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against Michigan State and Ohio State. During his college career, he completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns; all four statistical categories still list among the top 12 in school history.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three adult children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.
