WASHINGTON IS NEXT UP IN CHALLENGING SEPTEMBER SCHEDULE

Portland State took a heart-breaking 21-17 loss at San Jose State last week after the Spartans scored the game-winning touchdown with 1:11 to play. However, there is no time for PSU to think about "what ifs" as the Vikings move on to face Washington of the Pac-12 Conference this Saturday.

The game with the Huskies is part of a very challenging month of play for PSU. The Vikings have the two FBS opponents, a brief respite with a bye on Sept. 17, then travel to open Big Sky Conference play at number-three ranked Montana on Sept. 24.

PSU has tremendous positives to take from the contest at San Jose State. Despite being heavy underdogs, the Vikings out-gained the Spartans, 395-288, played tremendous defense that included seven sacks, got 353 yards of total offense from new starting quarterback Dante Chachere, and had the lead for much of the fourth quarter. However, they can also look back at a pair of turnovers, a special teams snafu and some untimely penalties that will need to be cleaned up before facing Washington.

Chachere completed 24-37 passes for 270 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions in his first career start. His main target was All-Big Sky slot receiver Beau Kelly, who had nine catches for 133 yards and a score. Six different Viking defenders made sacks, including a pair from Tyreese Shakir, while All-American cornerback Anthony Adams made 10 tackles, one for loss and broke up a pair of passes.

Washington opened its season with a 45-20 home win over Kent State. The Huskies jumped to a 31-13 halftime lead and never looked back, out-gaining the Golden Flashes 525-340 and making three interceptions. Quarterback Michael Penix Jr. was 26-39 passing for 345 yards and four touchdowns. The Huskies got two interceptions from defensive back Asa Turner.

Saturday's game will be the third meeting all-time between Portland State and Washington. The Huskies had convincing wins in the first two contests (2012, 2016).

The game will be televised on the Pac-12 Washington network, and streamed on the Pac-12 Now App. It kicks off at 1 p.m. in Seattle at Husky Stadium. Live stats will be available at www.VikLive.com.

STORYLINES

- The Vikings are 4-43 all-time against FBS-level competition, 1-18 against current members of the Pac-12 Conference. FBS wins have come over Hawai'i (2000), New Mexico (2006), Washington State (2015) and North Texas (2015).
- Washington has won convincingly in two previous meetings. The 2012 game was played at CenturyLink Field while the 2016 game was played at Husky Stadium.
- PSU also played San Jose State and Washington back-to-back in the 2016 season (though in games 2/3).

LAST MEETING, Sept. 17, 2016: Washington 41, Portland State 3

Seattle, WA - The Washington Huskies lived up to the billing. It was as simple as that. Eighth-ranked FBS Washington was heralded as having perhaps its best team in the 16 seasons since it last won a Pac-12 title. The Huskies proved it, beating Portland State 41-3 at Husky Stadium.

The Vikings helped the Huskies cause as they were hamstrung by turnovers. Two led directly to Washington touchdowns, while the other two came deep in Husky territory. Otherwise, Portland State was competitive.

The Huskies made a strong start, driving 75 yards on their opening possession for a score. The ensuing kickoff proved to be the first break of the game. Washington made a pooch kick, and when a strong wind that blew all afternoon caught the ball it landed between Viking players and the Huskies recovered at the PSU 24. It took only three plays and Washington scored again, going up 14-0 only three minutes into the game.

After that the Vikings held their own for the remainder of the first quarter.

Chico McClatcher caught his second touchdown pass of the game from Jake Browning early in the second quarter to make it 21-0. Then another turnover, on a lateral pass, on the following possession allowed the Huskies to take over at the Viking four-yard line. Two plays later, Myles Gaskin went in from four yards out and it was 28-0.

Portland State's biggest threat to score came late in the half. Maximo Espitia made a 30-yard reception and was running deep in Husky territory when the ball was punched out from behind by Ezekiel Turner. It was the Vikings' third turnover of the half and stymied any opportunity to get back into the game.

The Vikings outplayed the Huskies in the third quarter, holding them scoreless. A 26-yard field goal by Jonathan Gonzales finally got the Vikings on the board as the third ended at 28-3.

Browning tacked on a fourth touchdown pass in the fourth, hitting Gaskin on a four-yard connection. A late score gave the Huskies a 38-point win.

Washington outgained the Vikings 407-182 as PSU's ground game was shut down. The Vikings managed only 34 yards rushing.

Browning completed 12-19 passes for 163 yards and four scores. Alex Kuresa was 11-17 for 148 yards and one interception for the Vikings.

Linebacker Anthony McNichols had 13 tackles to lead PSU. Freshman defensive end Kenton Bartlett recovered a fumble in the second quarter for the Vikings first takeaway of the season.

QUICK SNAPS

WINS, LOSSES, AND THE BIG SKY

- Portland State is 0-1 overall, 0-0 at home, 0-1 on the road.
- 2022 is Portland State's 30th season at the NCAA I FCS level (1978-80 (1-AA), 1996-2022). PSU is 140-174 in all games at the FCS/1-AA level.
- PSU is competing in its 27th season since moving back to FCS and the Big Sky Conference (1996-2022). PSU is 121-161 in that span, 78-56 in home games, 43-105 on the road.
- As a member of the Big Sky Conference (1996-2021) PSU is 80-115 all-time in league games, 47-51 at home, 33-64 on the road.
- Bruce Barnum (2015-22, 18-30 Big Sky, 26-44 overall) is the Vikings fourth Head Coach in the Big Sky Conference era. Previous coaches were: Tim Walsh (1993-2006, 42-41/90-68 all-time); Jerry Glanville (2007-09, 7-17/9-24); and Nigel Burton (2010-15, 13-27/21-36).
- The Vikings have never won a Big Sky title, but have tied for second five times (four times under Walsh and in 2015 under Barnum). PSU has made two NCAA FCS playoff appearances (2000, 2015).
- PSU's best record ever at the FCS level was 9-3 in 2015 (4-2 at home, 5-1 on the road).

VIKING UPSET BID FALLS JUST SHORT AT SAN JOSE STATE, 21-17

San Jose State quarterback Chevan Cordeiro scrambled for a two-yard touchdown with 1:11 to play, boosting the Spartans over Portland State, 21-17, on Sept. 1 at CEFCU Stadium... in a coulda, shoulda, woulda game, the Vikings came up agonizingly short. They outgained the Spartans 395-288 on the field. The defense was resilient in the second half, allowing only 66 yards to San Jose State, forcing a missed field goal and getting a goal line stop with four minutes to play. However, the Vikings couldn't get a needed first down and had to punt it back with just over two minutes left... PSU can look at two turnovers, a special teams miscue and seven costly penalties as big factors in their season opener... new starting quarterback Dante Chachere was up to the moment in his first time leading the team. The sophomore signal caller drove the Vikings 66 yards for a touchdown in his first series. Chachere completed 4-4 passes for 47 yards, including an 11-yard TD toss to senior wideout Maclaine Griffin. That gave the Vikings an early 7-0

VIKINGS vs. FBS COMPETITION

Portland State is 4-43 all-time against programs at the FBS level dating back to 1968. The Vikings play FBS members San Jose State (Mountain West Conference) and Washington (Pac-12) this season.

Athletically, Portland State has competed at virtually every level of competition, except the FBS. PSU began as Vanport Extension Center - a two-year school - in 1946-47, but competed in the Oregon Collegiate Conference (NAIA) from 1950 to 1964. Portland State became a four-year institution in 1955 and competed at the NAIA level. PSU joined the NCAA in 1965 and competed at the College Division level (the fore-runner of NCAA II). PSU was an NCAA 1-AA member from 1978-80, then moved back to Division II in 1981, where it competed through the 1995 season. In 1996, Portland State moved to the Big Sky Conference and up to the NCAA 1-AA (now FCS) level. Below is a listing of all PSU games against members of the NCAA I FBS level of competition.

HEAD COACH BRUCE BARNUM



Bruce Barnum is in his eighth season as Portland State Head Football Coach and his 13th year overall with the program in 2022. Only one head coach, Tim Walsh, has had a longer tenure in PSU history.

Barnum has the distinction of earning FCS National Coach of the Year and Big Sky

Conference Coach of the Year in 2015 after leading PSU to its best season ever at the Division I level (9-3). The season included wins over FBS Washington State and North Texas, and five nationally-ranked FCS teams. The Vikings had their best season in Division I history (9-2) before losing to Northern Iowa 29-17 in the FCS Playoffs.

In his time as Head Coach, Barnum has molded the team in his image; tough, blue-collar and fundamentally-sound, instituting #BarnyBall.

Barnum spent his first five seasons at PSU as the Vikings' offensive coordinator. In his five seasons as offensive coordinator, the Vikings had tremendous success. In 2013, PSU set school-records for total offense (6,486 yards), offense per game (540.5), rushing offense (3,330 yards), rushing offense per game (277.5) and rushing touchdowns (36) while maintaining balance in the attack with 263.0 yards per game in the air, leading the nation in yards per completion (16.7). Portland State ranked third in the nation in total offense (first in the Big Sky) and third in rushing offense (second in the Big Sky). The Viking program has averaged 200+ rushing yards per game in all seven seasons that Barnum has been on the Park Blocks.

Barnum has more than 30 years of coaching experience and more than 15 years as an offensive coordinator. Barnum is the 14th head coach in the 76-year history of Portland State football.

lead... the Spartans scored on their next two series and led 14-7 early in the second quarter... PSU had two drives terminated inside the Spartans 10-yard line late in the second quarter. Kenyon Reed intercepted a Chachere pass at the nine-yard line to end a 73-yard PSU drive and scoring threat... PSU's defense held on the succeeding series getting a fourth-down stop on the Spartans at the PSU 43. VJ Malo had a sack, Anthony Adams and Boogie Davis each made tackles for loss, then Jake Porter got the 4th-and-2 stop with another sack... again, the Vikings drove deep into Spartan territory. With the clock winding down, PSU got to first-and-goal at the one-yard line with no timeouts and 4.5 seconds on the clock. With the option of attempting a field goal, the Vikings went for a tying score. But the San Jose State defense stopped Viking back Andrew Van Buren on a dive over the line and the half ran out with the Spartans ahead 14-7... the Vikings closed the gap on a 12-play, 70-yard drive in the third quarter. A pair of SJSU personal fouls helped the cause. Gianni Smith finished the drive with a 35-yard field goal, making it 14-10 Spartans... PSU got a defensive stop on the next series, but the Spartans punted it down to the PSU 1. On the next play, the Vikings ran a flea flicker from their own endzone. The result was a 48-yard completion to Nate Bennett near midfield. Later, the Vikings went for it on 4th-and-2 from the Spartans 43. A wildcat run by Van Buren resulted in a first down... on another 4th-and-2, at the Spartans 19, a Chachere keeper went for eight yards and a first down. Two plays later, Chachere hit Beau Kelly in the middle of the end zone on a go-ahead 12-yard touchdown pass. PSU led 17-14 with 9:57 to play... the Spartans missed a chance to tie with a 37-yard field goal attempt that flew wide right. But a moment later Jordan Cobbs picked off a Chachere pass that was tipped at the line. SJSU took over at the PSU 23 with 6:20 to play... Portland State was able to terminate that drive, making a fourth-and-goal stop with 4:03 left... the Vikings took over at their own one-yard line, but were limited to eight yards and a punt. It was returned to the PSU 32. Six plays and two PSU penalties later Cordeiro made his dash into the end zone with the winning score... PSU had 1:11 to play, but could only get to midfield before a last-second Hail Mary fell short... Chachere completed 24-37 passes for 270 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. He rushed 14 times for 83 yards... coming up big again for the Vikings was Kelly with nine receptions for 133 yards and a score... the story was the defense though. PSU did not force a turnover, but stopped two Spartan drives on fourth down, made 11 tackles for loss and seven sacks in the game while allowing just 288 yards to an FBS program. Sophomore roverbak Tyreese Shakir had eight tackles, four TFLs and three sacks. Senior cornerback Anthony Adams made 10 tackles, one for loss, and broke up a pair of passes.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

- Portland State had 395 yards of total offense against San Jose State, 270 through the air and 125 on the ground.
- SO QB Dante Chachere (SASH-er-ay) made his first career start. He completed 24-37 passes for 270 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. In his first series of the game, Chachere was 4-4 for 47 yards, throwing an 11-yard TD pass to SR WR MacLaine Griffin... Chachere had 353 yards of total offense as he was the Vikings leading rusher with 14 carries for 83 yards.
- SR WR Beau Kelly was up to his old tricks, catching nine passes for 133 yards and a touchdown. It was Kelly's sixth 100-yard game in the last 12 contests... last season Kelly led the Big Sky Conference during the regular season in receptions (69), total yards (981) and touchdowns (10).
- SR WR Emmanuel Daigbe, an All-Big Sky Conference wide receiver and special teamer in 2019, played in his first game since that season. His 2020 was wiped out by PSU's COVID-cancelled season, and 2021 was also eliminated as he recovered from a groin injury... Daigbe had five receptions for 27 yards and one rushing play for four yards... Daigbe has 68 career catches for 1,051 yards and 11 touchdowns.
- SR RB Andrew Van Buren started his first game after transferring to PSU from Boise State. AVB had 13 carries for 29 yards.
- SO WR Nate Bennett, one of PSU's top receivers last season, had five catches for 76 yards.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

- Portland State's defense had one of its best performances ever against an FBS-level program. The Vikings allowed only 288 yards in the game, making seven sacks. The most sacks PSU had in a game last season was five, and the seven sacks were the second-most in the nation by an FCS team in week one... the Viking D held SJSU to 66 yards in the second half helping the offense turn a 14-7 deficit into a 17-14 lead... PSU held four of 11 opponents under 300 yards in 2021.
- SR CB Anthony Adams had a team-high 10 tackles, one tackle for loss and two pass breakups. It was the third double-digit tackle game of his career... Adams now has 33 career pass breakups, tying former Viking Rashad Floyd (1997-2000) for the PSU career record... Adams started the 36th consecutive game of his career. He and SR DE Jake Porter have each played in 36 career games, most on the Viking roster. Porter has started 22.
- SO ROV Tyreese Shakir made seven tackles, three tackles for loss and two sacks - all career-best numbers for him (initial stats had Shakir credited with three sacks, however one was miscredited and goes to JR ROV David Joseph).
- SO LB Parker McKenna passed 100 career tackles (102) in just 13 career games.
- In his first game as a Viking, SR DT EJ Ane was playing against his former team, San Jose State. Ane played in 28 career games for the Spartans, making 68 tackles, 10 tackles for loss and 5.5 sacks. Ane had two tackles for the Vikings.

- SR P George Triplett, a transfer from Princeton, had four punts for a 43.8 yard average and a long of 47.
- SO K Gianni Smith made his first field goal attempt of the season, from 35 yards. Smith is now 6-9 on field goals in his career and 31-31 on extra points.
- SO LS Ryan Alvidrez started the 12th consecutive game of his career. He has a perfect long snapping record as a Viking.

LET'S OPEN UP THE RECORD BOOK

Three Vikings are having an impact on the Portland State career record book after one game of the season. A more complete look at record book updates can be found after the season stats in these game notes.

- SR CB All-American Anthony Adams is now tied for first all-time in pass breakups (33 in 36 games) with former Viking All-American Rashad Floyd (1997-2000, 45 games). Adams is two interceptions shy of making the top 10 for picks (9).
- SR WR Beau Kelly now ranks 11th all-time in receptions (124), he is 200 yards shy of the top 10 in receiving yards (1,767), two touchdowns short of the top 10 for receiving touchdowns (14), and ranks 10th all-time in punt return yards (233).
- SR DE VJ Malo now ranks 10th all-time in career sacks with 11.5 in 12 career games.

STRAIGHT AS: ALL-AMERICAN ANTHONY ADAMS

SR CB Anthony Adams is a two-time All-American - once as a safety and once as a cornerback. He led the nation in passes defended in 2019 (24; 19 PBUs, 5 INTs). He entered the 2022 season as the nation's leader in career passes defended (40; 31 PBUs, 9 INTs, plus 4 FRs).

Adams has been selected to five 2022 FCS Preseason All-America teams and was named to the Buck Buchanan Award Watch List for the second time in his career. He was 12th in the balloting in 2019. Adams is also considered one of the top NFL prospects at the FCS level for 2023.

- Adams is now the career record holder at Portland State for pass breakups (33). He is also the leader among active players in total tackles (175).
- Adams had 10 tackles and two pass breakups in the Vikings' opener at San Jose State.

BEAU KNOWS RECEIVING, PASSING, RETURNING, RUSHING...

SR WR Beau Kelly has done it all for the Vikings during his career. He had 1,111 all-purpose yards last season, gaining yards receiving, rushing and on punt returns. He was also 2-2 passing for 56 yards.

- In game one against San Jose State, Kelly had 144 total yards, including 133 receiving.

MALO-IFICENT TO OFFENSES

SR DE VJ Malo terrorized opposing quarterbacks in 2021. He made 10.5 sacks (2nd in the Big Sky), 20 tackles for loss (4th in the Big Sky) and forced three fumbles (1st in the Big Sky). His 20 TFLs were the second most for a season in school history, most ever at the Division I level and most since 1987. His 10.5 sacks rank eighth all-time, are the most at the Division I level and most since 1988. Malo was selected to four preseason All-America teams and preseason All-Big Sky.

- Malo picked up where he left off, making a sack in his first game of the season. He now has 11.5 career sacks in 12 games, 10th-most for a career in PSU history.

Adams was named second team All-American by Hero Sports. He is now a two-time All-American (2019)...SR TE Malik Thirdgill was named to the Big Sky Conference Community Service team for contributions away from the field. Thirdgill is a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee on campus, was a co-creator of a Social Justice Team, has also been involved with PSU's freshman student-athlete mentorship program and is a volunteer with Holy Redeemer Athletics and Big Yard Foundation.

BIG SKY LEADERS

SR WR Beau Kelly led the Big Sky Conference in receptions (69), receiving touchdowns (10), total receiving yards (981) in 2021. He would have led in punt return average (14.4) but did not reach the required number of returns... SR CB Anthony Adams led the Big Sky in fumble recoveries (3) and had six total takeaways.

FABULOUS AS FRESHMEN

The Vikings started six freshmen, had eight making major contributions, and played 24 total freshmen in 2021... WRs Nate Bennett (50-616-4) and Darien Chase (54-579-4) were important members of the offense, while OLs Richard Estrella and D'Angalo Titali'i became starters... LB Parker McKenna led the Vikings in tackles with 88, including four tackles for loss, a sack, a forced fumble and fumble recovery. Also on defense, ROV Tyreese Shakir became a starter, making 32 tackles, two interceptions, two fumble recoveries and four pass breakups. LB Justice Pagan made 39 tackles, 6.5 TFLs, two sacks and two pass breakups... on special teams, K Gianni Smith and LS Ryan Alvidrez were starters and steady performers.

BEAM ME UP

The NCAA transfer portal has become a significant recruiting tool in all sports. In 2022, Portland State will have 16 Division I transfers on its roster, 11 of which are from FBS schools.

CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN

The Portland State Football team has selected its captains for the 2022 season. In a vote of the players, seniors Anthony Adams, Beau Kelly, VJ Malo, Tyson Pauling and Mataio Talalemotu were named team captains.

THE SCHEDULE

Portland State will play a traditional 11-game football schedule in 2022, featuring two FBS opponents and a rigorous eight-game Big Sky Conference slate that includes three FCS playoff programs. The Vikings have five games at home and six on the road in 2022.

The Vikings open on the road against their FBS opponents, San Jose State on Sept. 1 and Washington on Sept. 10. Ironically, they faced those two opponents in succession in 2016 season. The Spartans come off a 5-7 season in the Mountain West Conference which included a win over former Big Sky Conference foe Southern Utah. The Huskies come off a 4-8 season in the Pac-12 Conference that included a 13-7 upset loss to Montana of the Big Sky.

PSU will have a bye week before leading into its' Big Sky Conference season opener against no less an opponent than 2021 FCS semifinalist Montana. Portland State travels to face the Griz in Missoula on Sept. 24. Montana finished 10-3 in 2021, 6-2 and tied for third in the Big Sky.

PSU returns home to host Northern Arizona, a program it has not faced since 2019, on Oct. 1. The Lumberjacks had a record matching the Vikings at 5-6, 4-4 in the Big Sky, in 2021. The teams have met

only three times in the past decade (2014, 2017, 2019) due to the size of the Big Sky Conference.

The Vikings played their final, non-conference game on Oct. 8 at home, hosting NCAA II Lincoln (CA) University. It will be a first-ever contest against an opponent from the bay area that was 1-8 in its inaugural season of 2021.

PSU will make it three straight home games for the first time since the first three games of the 2003 season when its hosts Weber State on Oct. 15. PSU beat the Wildcats in 2021, knocking off 24th-ranked WSU, 30-18, in Ogden. Weber State was 6-5 overall, 5-3 in the Big Sky in 2021.

For the second year in a row, PSU will play at Idaho. The Vikings lost 42-35 last year to the Vandals who finished the year at 4-7/3-5 overall.

Portland State closes out October at Eastern Washington. The Eagles were 10-3 in 2021, reaching the FCS Quarterfinals. They tied for third in the Big Sky at 6-2 with Montana. PSU lost to Eastern, 42-28, in the season finale of 2021. This year's game marks the first time since 2011 that the Vikings and Eagles do not play each other in the final regular season game.

November opens with back-to-back home games. Portland State hosts Northern Colorado on Nov. 5, then Sacramento State on Nov. 11. The Vikings and Bears last played in 2019 in Greeley, a 38-30 PSU win. Last season, the Big Sky Champion Hornets beat the Vikings 49-20 in Sacramento. The Hornets finished the year a perfect 8-0 in the Big Sky, 9-3 overall. Northern Colorado was 3-8/2-6 in 2021.

The season finale will take place Nov. 19 at Cal Poly. Portland State beat the Mustangs at Hillsboro Stadium this past year, 42-21. Cal Poly was 2-9/1-7 in 2021.

SCHEDULE NOTES

- This is the 76th season of Portland State football (1947) and 27th season as a member of the Big Sky Conference.
- Year in and year out Portland State football has one of the most challenging Football Championship Subdivision schedules in the country, and 2022 will be no different. The Vikings will play three 2021 FCS playoff teams (Montana, Eastern Washington and Sacramento State). Sacramento State was the Big Sky Conference Champion (8-0). PSU's opponents were a combined 35-29 in Big Sky games last year, 49-44 overall.
- PSU faces five teams in 2022 that were on the schedule in 2021 (Weber State, Idaho, Eastern Washington, Sacramento State, Cal Poly).
- The two FBS-level programs are San Jose State and Washington. It will be the second all-time meeting with the Spartans and the third meeting with the Huskies. PSU is 4-42 all-time when playing "up" against FBS programs. Wins have come over Hawai'i (2000), New Mexico (2006), Washington State (2015) and North Texas (2015).
- Portland State has its latest home-opening start (Oct. 1) since 2010 (Oct. 2).
- The last time PSU played three straight home games (Oct. 1-8-15) was in 2003 (Sept. 4-13-20).
- Portland State is playing one lower division program in 2022, Division II Lincoln (CA) University. The Vikings are 19-0 in games against lower division opponents since moving to Division I in 1996.
- The Big Sky Conference has been reduced to 12 teams in 2022. Southern Utah left the conference to join the Western Athletic Conference. Portland State faces just eight of the other 11 members. PSU will miss Big Sky schools Montana State, UC Davis and Idaho State in 2022.

VIKING TRIVIA

- **BUY LOCAL:** Portland State has 28 players on the roster from the state of Oregon, plus seven others from just across the river and the Vancouver, WA area.

alum who played for the Vikings... Quarterbacks Coach Kieran McDonagh (2012-15) is also a PSU alum who was recruited by and played for Bruce Barnum... Wide Receivers Coach Darnell Adams (2012-17) joined the Viking staff this season.

- **GOING PRO:** Former Viking QB Davis Alexander finished his Portland State career in 2021 ranked number two in virtually every PSU passing category behind only Neil Lomax. Alexander is currently a member of the Montreal Alouettes.
- **SUPER PLAYERS:** Portland State had a pair of former players meet in the Super Bowl for the first time in history in February 2014. TE Julius Thomas ('10, Denver) and DB DeShawn Shead ('11, Seattle) both played in Super Bowl XLVIII. Shead returned to the Super Bowl in 2015 with the Seahawks. He joins Clint Didier and Ted Popson as former Vikings with Super Bowl rings. Thomas was named a Pro Bowl tight end in 2013 and 2014. In the 2014 off-season, he signed the richest tight end contract in the NFL to play for the Jacksonville Jaguars. Thomas retired in the 2018 off-season after a seven-year career that included 71 games, 226 receptions, 2,406 yards and 36 touchdowns. Shead, a starting corner with the Seahawks in 2016, missed 2017 due to an ACL injury, then signed and played with Detroit in 2018. Shead is now an assistant coach with the Seahawks.

2021 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- After an opt-out season in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Portland State football program returned to a full season of competition in 2021. With two games to play in the season, the Vikings were still in contention for a post-season berth. However, losses to Big Sky Conference Champion Sacramento State and fifth-ranked Eastern Washington in the final two weeks had the Vikings finish the year at 5-6 overall, 4-4 in Big Sky Conference games. The 4-4 mark was PSU's best since the 2015 season. The marquee win was a 30-18 victory over 24th-ranked and defending Big Sky Champion Weber State.
- The Vikings had six players earn All-Big Sky Conference honors: 1st team: JR CB Anthony Adams (52T, 5 TFL, 5 PBU, 3 INT, 3 FR, 1FF); 2nd team: JR WR Beau Kelly (69 receptions, 981 yards, 10 TDs); SR QB Davis Alexander (266-432, 3,075 yards, 21 TDs, 12 INTs, 6 rushing TDs); JR DE VJ Malo (45T, 20 TFL, 10.5 SK, 3 FF, 2 PBU); Honorable Mention: FR WR Nate Bennett (50 receptions, 616 yards, 4 TDs); SR DT Semise Kofe (37T, 5.5 TFL, 2.5 SK).
- JR CB Anthony Adams was named second team All-American by Hero Sports. He is now a two-time All-American (2019).
- JR TE Malik Thirdgill was named to the Big Sky Conference Community Service team for contributions away from the field. Thirdgill is a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee on campus, was a co-creator of a Social Justice Team, has also been involved with PSU's freshman student-athlete mentorship program and is a volunteer with Holy Redeemer Athletics and Big Yard Foundation.
- JR WR Beau Kelly led the Big Sky Conference in receptions (69), receiving touchdowns (10), total receiving yards (981), and would have led in punt return average (14.4) but did not reach the required number of returns... JR CB Anthony Adams led the Big Sky in fumble recoveries (3) and had six total takeaways.
- SR RB Malik Walker was named Big Sky Conference Offensive Player of the Week after an Oct. 30 win over Cal Poly. Walker rushed 14 times for 116 yards and two touchdowns in the game. Walker finished the season third in the Big Sky in rushing (879 yards) and second in touchdowns (11).
- FR WR Nate Bennett was named to the 22-player Jerry Rice Award Watch List during the season. The Jerry Rice Award recognizes the top freshman in the nation at the end of the season. He finished 19th in the balloting... SR QB Davis Alexander was selected to the 46-member Walter Payton Award Watch list. The Payton Award is given annually to the top offensive player in the nation at the FCS level.
- SR QB Davis Alexander finished his career second all-time in virtually every passing category at Portland State, trailing only Viking legend Neil Lomax, including total offense (10,473 yards), passing yards (9,215), touchdown passes (63), completions (708-1,223). Alexander also had 25 career rushing touchdowns (7th all-time), and with 88 total touchdowns ranks behind only Lomax.
- JR DE VJ Malo had 20 tackles for loss and 10.5 sacks on the season. Both numbers were the most ever by a Viking at the FCS level, and the most by any Viking since 1988. He was second in TFLs and fourth in sacks in the Big Sky, ranking fifth and 11th in the nation, respectively.
- Portland State had 20 student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Sky Conference honors.

GET ON THE BUS: THE AMERICANA TOUR

Portland State Football Coach Bruce Barnum is renowned for taking his team on the bus to as many road games as possible. He calls it "The Americana Tour." It has made for some long bus rides, but Barnum often lets his team out to see the sights. Barnum also feels it promotes team unity (and saves a few dollars in the budget). In the past seven years, PSU has logged 23,298 bus miles with a "program record" of 4,906 in 2016.

- Coach Barnum led his first "Americana Tour" in 2015, which included bus rides to Pullman, WA, Pocatello, ID, San Luis Obispo, CA, and Cheney, WA. In all, the Vikings logged 4,394 bus miles and approximately 80 hours round trip to those four destinations (PSU also flew on two road trips). The Americana Tour included such things as dozens of on-bus movies, a stop to buy a lottery ticket on the way home from beating Washington State, a practice on Boise State's blue turf, a sight-seeing trip to Alcatraz (in which equipment manager Mike Haluska was left on the island... but soon retrieved), and a midnight McDonald's run at a lonely truck stop in eastern Oregon. In addition to the economy of the bus trips,

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT PORTLAND STATE AND VIKING FOOTBALL

Portland State University, located in Portland, OR, is the second-largest school in the state of Oregon with 23,979 students. It was founded in 1946 as Vanport College - a two-year institution.

Athletically, Portland State began as a junior college in 1946-47, but competed in the Oregon Collegiate Conference at the NAIA level from 1950 to 1964, winning three OCC football titles (1962, 1963, 1964). PSU became a four-year institution in 1955.

Portland State joined the NCAA in 1965 and competed at the College Division level (the forerunner of NCAA II). PSU was an NCAA 1-AA member from 1978-80, then moved back to Division II in 1981, where it competed through the 1995 season. The Vikings were members of the Western Football Conference from 1982 to 1992, winning six conference championships. PSU made eight NCAA II playoff appearances from 1987 to 1995.

In 1996, Portland State moved to the Big Sky Conference and up to the NCAA 1-AA (now FCS) level. The Vikings made their first playoff appearance at their current level in 2000. In 2015, Portland State had its best season ever at the Division I level, compiling a 9-3 record and reaching the NCAA playoffs.

Portland State's football program has produced such legendary figures as Coach Mouse Davis, quarterbacks Neil Lomax and June Jones, Tom Oberg (the first Viking to play in the NFL), Coach Pokey Allen (who led the Vikings to two NCAA II National Championship appearances), and some 30 players who have appeared in the NFL.

In 2014, three former Vikings reached NFL Championship games: Julius Thomas with Denver, DeShawn Shead with Seattle and Jordan Senn with Carolina. Thomas and Shead went on to meet in Super Bowl XLVIII with their respective teams and Shead became a Super Bowl Champion - just the third former PSU Viking to do so (Clint Didier, Ted Popson). Shead made a return appearance to the Super Bowl in 2015, while Thomas was selected to his second Pro Bowl in as many years. He later signed a free agent contract with the Jacksonville Jaguars, making him the highest paid tight end in the NFL.

Portland State football plays at Hillsboro Stadium, west of downtown, a 7,200-seat stadium.

PORTLAND STATE

Portland State should always be referred to as "Portland State", NEVER by just "Portland". An acceptable alternative to "Portland State" is "PSU". The nickname for both the men's and women's teams at Portland State is "Vikings". The women's teams should NEVER be referred to as the "Lady Vikings" or "Lady Viks". An acceptable alternative to "Vikings" is "Viks".

Barnum contends the time together draws the Viking team closer.

- The 2016 Americana Tour included round trips to San Jose, Seattle and Sacramento (twice). There was also a return bus ride from Ogden, UT and a shorter trip from Las Vegas to Cedar City... the trip to San Jose was a total of 1,340 miles. It included a stop off at Oregon Wildlife Safari and the obligatory In-and-Out Burger visitation in Medford... on the trip to Southern Utah, PSU flew into Las Vegas, took in the Criss Angel Show at the Luxor Hotel and made another midnight In-and-Out run... while traveling to Weber State, PSU visited Temple Square and the Hogle Zoo... after a pair round trips to Sacramento (UC Davis and Sacramento State), PSU had accumulated 4,906 bus miles for the season.
- The 2017 season was limited to just three bus trips: Oregon State, Idaho State and Eastern Washington. There was also a bus portion from San Jose, CA to Cal Poly. And, Portland State's trip to Corvallis was a mere 168 miles round trip. The Americana Tour bus trip to Pocatello, ID was 660 miles one way, 1,320 miles round trip. The Vikings made a stop in Pendleton and toured the Pendleton Rodeo Museum and Hall of Fame, as well as a stop along the Snake River... the Vikings had bus travel from San Jose Airport to San Luis Obispo for the game at Cal Poly. It was 376 miles round trip and included a stop over on the Monterey Peninsula on the way down. No golf was played... the final week's bus trip from PSU to Eastern Washington was 339 miles one way, 678 round trip. That made the Vikings' Americana Tour for 2017 a total of 2,542 miles.
- In 2018 Portland State made bus trips to five different states. They included Nevada (1,156 miles round trip), Oregon (218 miles), Idaho (718 miles), Montana (1,098 miles) and Sacramento State (1,158 miles). That made for a total of 4,348 bus miles.
- The 2019 Americana Tour started early as the Vikings bussed to Camp Rilea Armed Forces Training Center in Warrenton, OR (176 miles round trip) for the first three days of preseason practice. The Vikings stayed in the barracks, ate at the mess hall and practice on a makeshift field on the Helipad. Numerous team bonding exercises took place, including bowling night, a beach bonfire and three hours of liberty in Seaside, OR... only three bus trips are on the docket for 2019. They include Boise State (864 miles round trip), Idaho State (1,326 miles) and Eastern Washington (678 miles)... on the trip to Boise State, the Vikings pulled off the freeway for a couple of hours in Pendleton to enjoy the world famous Pendleton Roundup rodeo... FR OL Shiloh Ta'ase thrilled his teammates on the way to Eastern Washington when the team stopped for lunch in Kennewick. On a dare, Ta'ase leaped into the Columbia River in the midst of chilly 33-degree temperatures... Total bus miles for 2019 were 3,044.
- PSU's lone game at Montana in spring 2021 included a 1,098-mile round trip.
- In 2021, the Americana Tour began with a bus ride to Washington State. The round-trip to Pullman was 775 miles... the Vikings flew to Las Vegas, then bussed up to Cedar City for a game with Southern Utah. A team photo in front of the legendary "Welcome to Las Vegas" sign was part of the journey. Following a PSU win, the busses took a celebratory cruise down the Las Vegas strip at midnight on the return trip. That round trip was 342 miles... Portland State made the 6+-hour bus drive to Idaho on Oct. 9 (via an overnight stay in Spokane), totaling 791 miles round trip... the Vikings bussed to Sacramento to take on the Hornets. The round trip was 1,058 miles. That increased the season bus miles to 2,966.
- The 2022 season will be low-key bus travel, as the Vikings bus to only Washington (356 miles round trip), Idaho (718 miles round trip) and Eastern Washington (680 miles round trip). That totals a mere 1,754 bus miles for the season... while in San Jose, the Viking team made a return site-seeing trip to Alcatraz (like 2015) on the day before the game.
