Washington vs. Purdue

Husky Stadium, Nov. 15, 2025

Husky sophomore running back Adam Mohammed scored the game's first two touchdowns, doubling his career rushing TD total to date. He added a third of the game and fifth of his career just before halftime. He three rushing TDs tie for ninth in UW single-game history.

Redshirt freshman Jordan Washington scored on a 68-yard run in the second quarter. It was the longest play of the season for a Husky (passing or rushing), and was one yard more than he had on the season coming into the game. It was also his first career touchdown.

Washington's 68-yard rush was the longest by a Husky since the 2019 season (Salvon Ahmed, 89-yard rush vs. USC).

Jordan Washington's TD came on the first play of a possession, meaning it was a one-play scoring drive. It was the 15th-longest, one-play scoring drive in UW history.

Washington finished the game with 108 rushing yards on just five carries, good for the first 100-yard rushing performance of his career. He entered the game with 74 career rushing yards.

Washington was the first Husky freshman or redshirt freshman has rushed for 100 yards in game since Myles Gaskin rushed for 181 yards vs. Southern Miss in the Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowl in the final game of the 2015 season. Gaskin had eight 100-yard games as a true freshman that year.

Husky WR Audric Harris caught his first career TD pass on a 61-yard strike from Demond Williams Jr., in the third quarter. It was the longest pass play of the season for the Huskies, and was Harris' first career touchdown reception.

Harris' 90 receiving yards (on just two catches) easily set a new career high.

The pass to Harris was the longest pass completion in William Jr.'s career. He had two previous completions of 59 yards each. It was also the longest pass play by a Husky since Michael Penix Jr. hit Ja'Lynn Polk with a 92-yarder, Oct. 28, 2023, at Stanford.

Washington has won 25 of its last 26 home games.

Purdue did not advance a possession into the red zone until the fourth quarter.

Defensive end DeShaun Lynch, who deflected two passes today vs. Purdue, is the team's co-leader in pass break-ups, with six.
