

## WRESTLING SEASON RECORDS

1927

Wrestling reduced to intramural competition; remained that way until 1930.

In 1930, wrestling returned but the only recorded match was a victory over the Everett YMCA. Wrestlers were Culp 115, Vogel 125, Stevens 135, Webster 145, Shands 155, Howard 165, Landauer 175 and Kraetz hwt.

In 1931, wrestling again was intramural.
