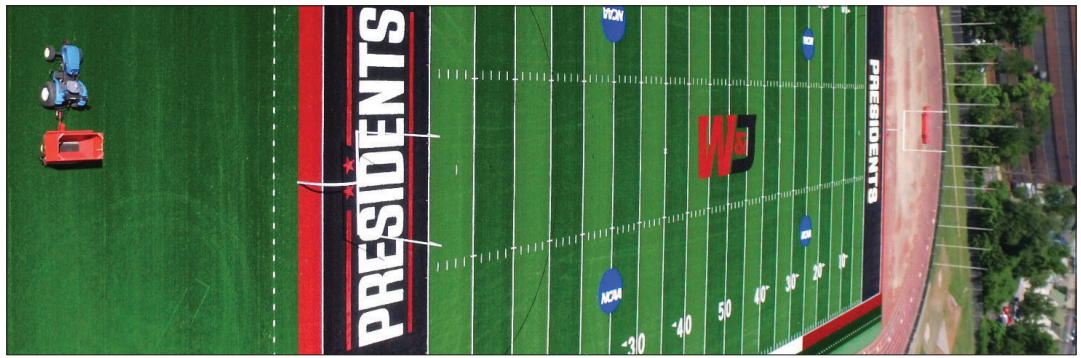

In 1885, Washington & Jefferson College purchased eight acres of the old Washington Fairgrounds on the south side of the City of Washington to use the property as a site for football games.

Since then, the facility that was once known as College Park has been the site of numerous historic collegiate and high school games. Dozens of legendary players and coaches, from George Gipp and Knute Rockne to John Heisman, Wilbur "Pete" Henry and "Deacon" Dan Towler, have walked the sidelines at the facility that was renamed College Field in 1920.

Before the 1999 season, College Field was redesigned and expanded, thanks to a commitment of \$2.5 million from Don and Sally Cameron, Dick and Edwina Cameron, James and Nancy Cameron, Steven and Diane Cameron and Lynn Cameron and family to update and enhance the aging facility. The gift, one of the five largest in the history of the College, underscores the singular partnership that exists between the College and the community.

In phase one of the restructuring, an eight-lane, all-weather outdoor track was added as well as the installation of a new playing surface. Debuting in 2000 was phase two of the restructuring of Cameron Stadium, also the home of W&J field hockey and track & field.

A total facelift of the entire stadium was enacted, including men's and women's locker rooms, a state-of-the-art press box, V.I.P. luxury suites and two concession stands. The project updated restroom facilities and added three new ticket booths to make it easier for fans to get in and out of the stadium. For media personnel, space for television and radio broadcasts is included in the press box. A media room for post-game interviews as well as a conference room were also added.

The completion of the Washington & Jefferson Athletic Hall of Fame, including the Eaton/Gentile Hall of Fame Room at Towler Hall, has also helped current students, alumni and fans honor and appreciate those from the past who played, coached and supported W&J athletics.

In 2010, Hellas Construction replaced the 10-year-old artificial surface with state-of-the-art RealGrass. The surface was once again replaced in the summer of 2018 when brand new FieldTurf was installed with the new W&J Athletics logo at midfield and the Presidents' wordmark in the end zones.

Cameron Stadium is one of the top facilities in all of Division III. Each year, the Presidents hope to add to W&J's storied football tradition of success at Cameron Stadium.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS - SCOTT MCGUINNESS

Scott McGuinness has spent more than two decades at Washington & Jefferson College. The 2024-25 academic year marks the 24th year for McGuinness in Washington. He currently serves as Assistant Dean of Students and Director of Athletics at W&J.

McGuinness came to W&J in 2001 and spent 13 years as the college's Sports Information Director. He then served as the Interim Co-Director of Athletics in 2014-15 before taking over the role as Director of Athletics in July of 2015. He added the Assistant Dean of Students title in the summer of 2023.

From March 2019 until January 2023, he served on the NCAA Division III Management Council, which handles the implementation of policies adopted by the Association's Board of Governors and Presidents Council.

Washington & Jefferson has won 33 conference championships under McGuinness' leadership, including first-time conference titles in the sports of women's lacrosse, men's cross country, women's tennis, and men's indoor track & field.

The 2023-24 academic year saw Cassie Carr honored as W&J's first female student-athlete to earn the prestigious NCAA Elite 90 Award in the sport of Women's Cross Country. Carr is just the second-ever W&J student-athlete overall to earn one of the NCAA's top academic honors.

W&J captured five conference championships during the 2022-23 academic year. W&J has claimed five or more conference championships in an academic year just eight times in school history. W&J had four academic All-Americans during the year which included seeing Tyler Horvat be named Academic All-America Team Member of the Year for Division III Baseball.

W&J claimed four PAC titles during the 2021-22 academic year, which included men's basketball's first conference crown since 1994-95. W&J had five student-athletes earn CoSIDA Academic All-America honors during the year.

During the 2018-19 academic year, W&J won six conference championships for the first time in school history. The Presidents have also made two trips to the NCAA Division III Baseball World Series (2017, 2019) during his tenure as AD.

While serving as the Interim Co-Director of Athletics in 2014-15, McGuinness helped lead an athletic department that won four conference titles for the first time since 2009 and had three student-athletes chosen as Capital One Academic All-Americans. Additionally Nick Carr became the first wrestler at W&J to win a national championship, claiming the NCAA Division III title at 157 pounds. Carr was just the fourth President to claim an individual national title in any sport.

McGuinness also played a major role in helping Washington & Jefferson College secure the bid to host the 2015, 2016 and 2017 NCAA Division III Mideast Baseball Regionals at Ross Memorial Park. He has helped restructure the department's intern coach program, while overseeing construction of the college's six new tennis courts, The Janet L. Swanson Tennis Center, which debuted in the fall of 2015.

The 2016-17 academic year saw W&J win the Mideast Regional in baseball and advance to the championship round of the 2017 NCAA

Division III Baseball Championship in Appleton, Wis. W&J finished as the national runner-up after being defeated by California Lutheran in a three-game series. It marked just the first regional crown in program history and just the third time a W&J team advanced to the national championship in a sport (Football, 1992 and 1994).



In his first year as the Director of Athletics in 2015-16, W&J claimed the PAC Men's All-Sports Trophy for the 11th time and featured a pair of Academic All-Americans in Ryan Doyle (football) and Nicholas Willison (men's water polo and swimming).

McGuinness also helped with the planning of The James David Ross Family Recreation Center, which opened during the 2016-17 academic year and features a three-lane walking and running track as well as three full-sized athletic courts. The new center includes a general exercise room and phase two of the athletic renovation project also introduced new coach offices, an expanded wrestling room and team meeting spaces in the area of the previous auxiliary gymnasium.

In the fall of 2019, McGuinness helped plan and implement the renovation of the Henry Memorial Gymnasium. A new wood floor was constructed, while new bleachers with sections of VIP chairback seating was installed. The newly-renovated Salvitti Family Gymnasium also added central air conditioning, four new offices and the Morrow Alumni Suite.

In January 2018, the W&J Athletic Department announced an exclusive partnership with BSN Sports to outfit all of its athletic teams in Nike gear, the first such deal in department history.

A 2000 graduate of Shippensburg University, McGuinness previously oversaw the promotion of Washington & Jefferson's NCAA Division III athletic program to local and national media as SID. McGuinness helped promote 14 W&J student-athletes who have earned CoSIDA Capital One Academic All-America awards during those 13 years.

From 2014-2016, McGuinness served as a member of the NCAA Division III Women's Golf East Region Advisory Committee. He is also spent two years as a member of the NCAA Division III Athletics Direct Report Institute planning committee.

Three times (2010, 2011, 2014) he was selected as the Division III Sports Information Director of the Year by the CWPA and was honored as the 2006 NCAA Division III Great Lakes Region SID of the Year by the AVCA.

McGuinness' SID career began during the 2000-01 academic year as the assistant SID at Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Va. McGuinness was the media relations coordinator of the 2001 NCAA Division III Baseball South Region Tournament (Lynchburg, Va.) and worked as the assistant statistician for the 2001 NCAA Division III Football National Championship, the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl (Salem, Va.).

He and his wife, Amanda, are the proud parents of son Colman and daughters Maysen and Ellie. His brother, Todd, is the head men's basketball coach at NCAA Division III Case Western Reserve University.

HEAD COACH - MIKE SIRIANNI

Mike Sirianni (Mount Union '94), one of NCAA football's most successful head coaches, and the winningest football coach in W&J history, enters his 22nd season as the head coach at Washington & Jefferson College in 2024.

Sirianni's winning percentage of .808 (185-44) places him among the best active NCAA football coaches (FBS, FCS, D-II, or D-III) with at least 10 years of experience. At the conclusion of the 2023 season, Sirianni ranked fourth in winning percentage among active head coaches with 10+ years of experience.

A seven-time Presidents' Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, the 2012 D3football.com South Region Coach of the Year and the 2017 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region 2 Coach of the Year, Sirianni has led W&J to the postseason in 18 of his 21 seasons, including 11 NCAA playoff appearances. Sirianni's squads have won at least nine games 14 times, including three-straight, 10-plus win seasons from 2006-08.

Under Sirianni's direction, W&J finished the 2023 campaign with a 9-2 overall record. The Presidents capped the season with a 46-21 win over the United States Merchant Marine Academy in the 2023 ECAC James Lynch Bowl. The nine wins gave W&J its 40th-straight winning season, which ranks third best among Division III schools, as only Linfield (67) and Mount Union (45) have better active streaks. During the streak, the Red & Black have won at least eight games 35 times. Dawson Dietz received First Team All-America honors for a second-straight year from D3football.com. On the offensive side of the ball, quarterback Jake Pugh enjoyed a breakout season, as he was named PAC Offensive Player of the Year and ECAC Offensive Player of the Year. Four players earned D3football.com All-Region, six players were named to the ECAC teams and 15 Presidents were All-PAC honorees.

The Presidents finished with a 9-2 record in 2022. W&J capped the season with a 35-18 win over Hobart College in the ECAC Asa S. Bushnell Bowl on Nov. 19. Four Presidents earned All-Region status from D3football.com, including Dawson Dietz as a First Team pick. Six Presidents picked up First Team All-PAC honors while 17 student-athletes earned a spot on the All-PAC Teams. Aside from its bowl win over Hobart, the Presidents also snagged wins over traditional power John Carroll along with victories over Westminster and Grove City, a pair of conference foes who qualified for the postseason.

W&J finished the 2021 campaign with an 8-3 overall record and an appearance in the ECAC Clayton Chapman Bowl. The Presidents opened the season on a high note as they topped No. 11 John Carroll on the road by a 21-14 decision. Both Andrew Wolf and Justin Huss earned All-Region honors from D3football.com following the season. A total of 17 players, including seven first team selections, were honored on the 2021 All-PAC Football Teams. Additionally, Sean Doran and Alex Keith were recognized as CoSDA Academic All-Americans.

The Presidents opened the 2019 season with a 16-8 win over nationally-ranked Wittenberg and concluded the season by overcoming a 17-point third quarter deficit to defeat Ithaca 20-17 in the ECAC Asa S. Bushnell Bowl.

The 2019 President defense ranked among the best in Division III, ranking second in the nation in sacks (4.27), third in takeaways (34), sixth in third down defense (25.6 percent), seventh in team tackles for loss (9.1), ninth in red zone defense (52.6 percent), 10th in passes intercepted (18) and 12th in defensive touchdowns (4). The Presidents boasted the number-one scoring defense (16.1) and total defense (297.6) in the PAC. Senior defensive tackle Mike Williams was honored as an All-American by The Associated Press and D3football.com. Sophomore returner Joey Koroly joined Williams as a D3football.com All-American, and senior defensive lineman Conor Manning was named a First Team CoSIDA Academic All-American.

With an 8-3 mark in 2019 that helped W&J record its 36th straight winning season. That streak ranks as the third longest among NCAA football schools only behind Linfield (64) and Mount Union (41). During the streak, the Red & Black have won at least eight games 32 times.

With a 33-14 road win over Waynesburg on Nov. 10, 2018, the W&J football team claimed its 26th Presidents' Athletic Conference championship. Following the conclusion of the 2018 season, sophomore wide receiver Andrew Wolf was named a unanimous All-America selection.

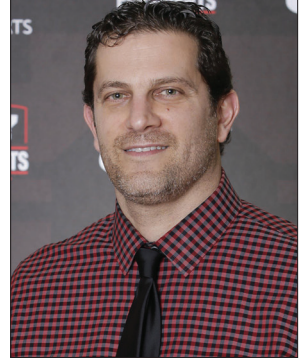
On November 11, 2017, the Presidents clinched the program's 25th Presidents' Athletic Conference championship and a 10-0 regular season with a 42-0 win over Waynesburg. That victory was the 138th for Sirianni as he moved into sole possession of first place on the school's wins list, passing Hall of Famer John Luchardt.

A seven-time Presidents' Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, the 2012 D3football.com South Region Coach of the Year and the 2017 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Region 2 Coach of the Year, Sirianni has led W&J to the postseason in 15 of his 17 seasons, including 11 NCAA playoff appearances. Sirianni's squads have won at least nine games 12 times, including three-straight, 10-plus win seasons from 2006-08.

The 2017 Presidents won 11 games and their 25th PAC title and hosted two NCAA Division III playoff games for the first time since 2004. W&J also earned ECAC Division III Team of the Year honors for the first time. Wide receiver Jesse Zubik broke nearly every W&J and PAC receiving record en route to unanimous First Team All-America honors (AFCA, AP, D3football.com), while cornerback O'Shea Anderson was a consensus All-American after claiming First Team honors from the Associated Press and Third Team accolades from D3football.com.

In 2016, W&J once again had one of the most prolific offenses in Division III, averaging 455.7 yards of total offense and 37.5 points per game. Wide receiver Jesse Zubik earned Second Team All-America honors from D3football.com and the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), while also being recognized as an Associated Press Second Team Little All-American, which recognizes players from NCAA Divisions II and III and the NAIA.

The 2015 campaign saw the Presidents finish with an 8-2 record, the 12th season with at least eight wins under Sirianni.



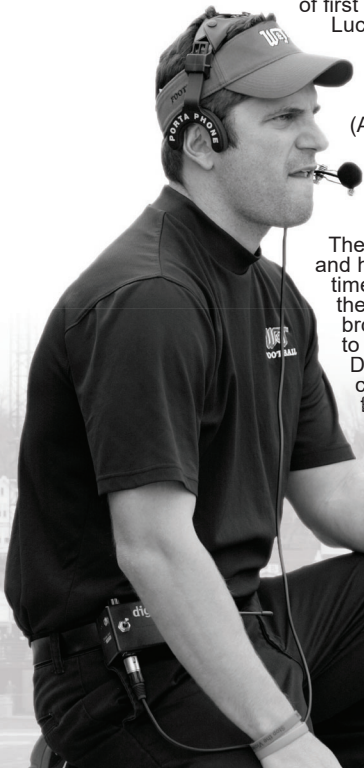

W&J captured its 24th PAC Championship during the 2014 season with a 10-2 overall record and defeated Wittenberg 41-25 in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoffs. In 2010, W&J secured the ECAC Division III Southwest Bowl with a 54-41 victory over Franklin & Marshall. Seven years earlier, the Presidents routed Wilkes 41-19 to win the same ECAC bowl game.

The 2012, 2013 and 2014 Presidents were PAC co-champions and earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA playoffs.

Since Sirianni's arrival at Washington & Jefferson, the Presidents have shattered over 100 individual or team offensive records. Sirianni has a knack for developing great quarterbacks as Brian Dawson '03, Chris Edwards '06, Bobby Swallow '09 and Pete Coughlin '16 hold nearly every record in W&J history. The quartet combined to throw for nearly 40,000 yards and almost 400 touchdowns.

W&J advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals in 2008 and finished with an 11-2 overall record. Following a 35-29 victory over Christopher Newport in the opening round of the NCAA playoffs, the Presidents traveled to Mississippi and knocked off the South Region's top seed, third-ranked Millsaps, 35-20. Washington & Jefferson set school records for total offense (6,118 yards) and points (532) during the 2008 campaign. The 11 victories marked the fourth time in six years that W&J reached double-digit win totals.

In 2007, Sirianni earned his third Presidents' Athletic Conference Coach of the Year award after leading W&J to its ninth undefeated regular season (2nd under Sirianni) in school history. Washington & Jefferson ranked second in the nation in total offense (518.7 ypg) and fourth in scoring (46.2 ppg).

The 2006 Presidents won the PAC title and won 10 consecutive games after dropping its season opener. Sirianni helped W&J reach the second round of the NCAA Division III playoffs and his offense committed the fewest turnovers in the nation with only 10 in 12 contests.

W&J finished the 2005 campaign with the sixth-best overall (501.8 ypg) and passing (327.3 ypg) offenses in NCAA Division III. W&J also finished fourth in the country with an average of 41.9 points per contest.

In 2004, Sirianni, a former Washington-Greene County College Men's Coach of the Year, helped W&J set a new school record with 12 victories after the Presidents advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division III playoffs for the first time since 1995. W&J also strung together a school-record 12-game win streak.

As the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 1999-2002, Sirianni brought yearly national recognition to W&J's offensive unit. He is credited with the development of former W&J quarterback Brian Dawson, who finished his career with 10,259 passing yards, the fifth-highest total in NCAA Division III history.

Washington & Jefferson ranked fifth in the country in total offense in 2000, averaging 500.8 yards per game. He helped Dawson lead all NCAA divisions (I, II or III) in passing efficiency with a rating of 201.5.

In 1998, he served as the offensive coordinator at Wilkes, where he helped the Colonels achieve national rankings in pass offense and passing efficiency.

Prior to coaching at Wilkes, Sirianni spent three years as the wide receivers coach at his alma mater, Mount Union. During his stint as a coach, the Purple Raiders won national championships in 1996 and 1997. Before his time at Mount Union, he also served one year on the staff at Ithaca as a **graduate assistant** coach, while earning his master's degree in exercise and sports management.

As a player, Sirianni was a three-year starter and two-time All-Ohio Athletic Conference selection as a wide receiver and won a national championship in 1993. He also was a four-time conference triple jump champion on the Mount Union track team.

Sirianni and his wife Jennifer, reside in Hopewell, Pa. They have two daughters, Jenna and Jordan.

His brother, Nick, was named the head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles on Jan. 24, 2021. Nick took the Eagles to a NFC Championship and a Super **Bowl** appearance in just his second season as head coach. Their father, Fran, was inducted into the Clarion (Pa.) Sports Hall of Fame in 2015 for football and track & field.

Sirianni, his wife, Jennifer, and his daughters, Jenna and Jordan, reside in Hopewell, Pa. Jenna is a graduate student in the Physician's Assistant program at Baldwin Wallace University.

His brother, Nick, was named the head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles on Jan. 24, 2021. Nick previously served as the offensive coordinator of the Indianapolis Colts for three seasons before accepting the head position in Philadelphia. Nick has served in various roles in the NFL since 2009, spending four years with the Kansas City Chiefs before spending five years with the Chargers organization. Their father, Fran, was inducted into the Clarion (Pa.) 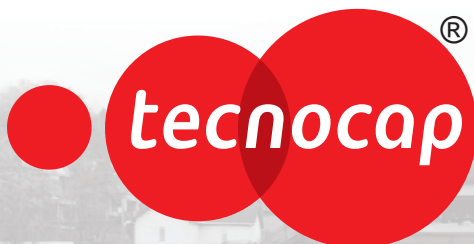

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR - SHAWN GLOSEK



Shawn Glosek returns to Washington & Jefferson College in 2024 as the offensive coordinator. Glosek first joined the W&J football staff in the fall of 2020 as an intern assistant coach working with the offense as passing game coordinator.

Glosek spent the Spring 2024 season at Ohio Northern as the offensive coordinator and quarterback coach. Prior to that experience, he spent the 2023 season as the running backs coach at Valdosta State, helping the program to the Gulf South championship and a trip to the NCAA Division II quarterfinals.

Glosek originally came to W&J from Dickinson College, where he served as the wide receivers coach since June 2019. ASSISTANT COACH - STEVE SPENCE



Steve Spence enters his 15th season at Washington & Jefferson College in 2024. Spence has been a member of the Presidents' football coaching staff since 2010.

Formerly the offensive coordinator, W&J won three consecutive PAC Championships under his offensive direction and the Presidents defeated Wittenberg 41-25 in the 2014 NCAA Division III first round for the program's first playoff victory since 2008.

In 2016, wide receiver Jesse Zubik became a consensus Second Team All-American, appearing on lists from D3football.com, the American Football Coaches Association and the Associated Press Little All-America team. Zubik was a unanimous First Team All-American following the 2017 season and became the program's first D3football.com South Region Offensive Player of the Year. Zubik finished his career with the third-most receiving yards (4,756) in Division III history. He was also ninth in receptions (291) and touchdowns (54).

Spence helped Alex Baroffio '14 become the first wide receiver in school history to record 100 receptions during his first two seasons. Baroffio virtually re-wrote the record books at W&J for the wide receiver position, finishing his career first in receptions and receiving yards.

Spence came to the W&J campus after a successful two-year stint as an assistant offensive coach at John Carroll University. He also assisted with the Blue Streaks' strength and conditioning program.

A 2008 John Carroll graduate with a degree in exercise science, Spence was a two-year quarterback from 2005-2006 for JCU. He was a two-year member of the Student Athlete Unity Council and a 2006 team captain.

Spence and his wife, Krista, reside in Pittsburgh with their young son, Derek.

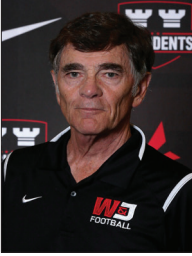

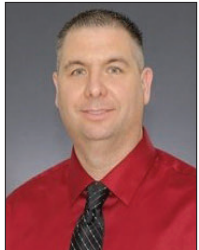
HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER/ATHLETICS HEALTH CARE ADMINISTRATOR - MIKE LESAKO

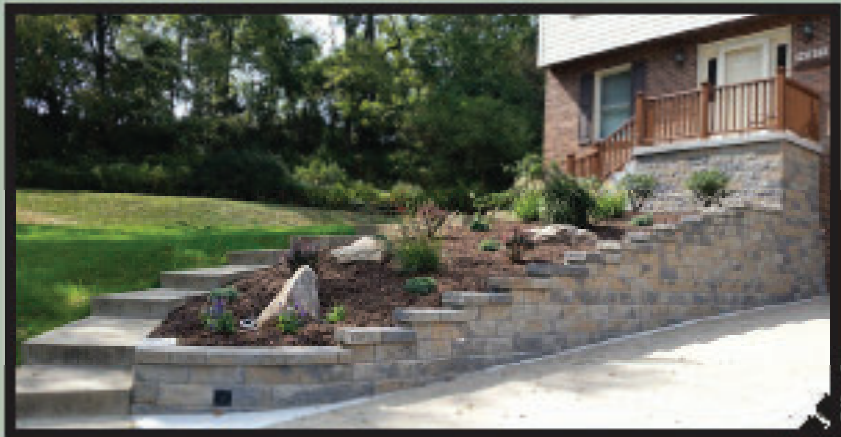

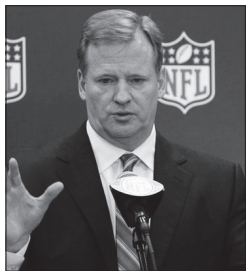

THE PRESIDENTS' ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Presidents' Athletic Conference (PAC), built on the basic belief that an athletic program is an integral part of college life but not an entity in itself, looks back on over sixty years of growth and ahead to years of continued academic and athletic excellence.

The league's name clearly reflects its founding principle that operational control of all aspects of intercollegiate athletics is ultimately the responsibility of the presidents of each member institution, and thus active presidential leadership and oversight is paramount in conference administration.

Formally organized in 1955 by Western Reserve University, John Carroll University, Case Institute of Technology, and Wayne State University, the PAC was the result of a realization that college athletics, despite numerous virtues for the individual and the institution, were gradually becoming a financial and academic burden. If athletics were to be continued, action had to be taken to place the program on its proper level. This included the premise that benefits of participation should be provided to as many students as possible. The PAC and its membership continue its original, defining mission of promoting intercollegiate athletics and the pursuit of academic excellence.

Institutions involved understand that the key components to its progress lie in the foundation of faith in each member by each other member. It is the conviction of its membership that the PAC is the solution to the dilemma of intercollegiate athletic competition, and they have staked their athletic future on this premise.

Currently comprised of 11 select, private institutions -- Allegheny College, Bethany College, Chatham University, Franciscan University of Steubenville, Geneva College, Grove City College, Saint Vincent College, Thiel College, Washington & Jefferson College, Waynesburg University and Westminster College -- the PAC remains a unique organization in this day of high-pressure intercollegiate athletics, with academics at the center of each member's philosophy. Carnegie Mellon University and Case Western Reserve University have competed as affiliate members in the sport of football since 2012.

The PAC crowns league champions and awards all-conference honors in its 23 championship sports (12 men, 11 women). Head coaches determine All-PAC squads for all team sports, while in individual sports, such as cross country and golf, All-PAC accolades are based upon performances at the conference championships.

The PAC, which celebrated its 60th anniversary during the 2014-15 academic year, annually awards its All-Sports Trophies to the schools which perform best across the board in PAC competition. The men's athletic program at Grove City and women's athletic program at Allegheny captured their respective All-Sports Trophies for the 2022-23 academic year. The All-Sports Trophy for the Grove City men is their second in the last three years and 12th in program history. This was the first All-Sports Trophy for the Allegheny women's program, who spent the last 39 years in the North Coast Athletic Conference before returning to the PAC in 2022-23.

Staying true to its original mission of promoting intercollegiate athletics and the pursuit of academic excellence, the PAC has seen over 300 of its participating student-athletes recognized as Academic All-Americans, while the league has also produced numerous NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners. In 2022-23, a record 1,744 student-athletes were recognized on the PAC Academic Honor Rolls (823 fall, 921 spring), which acknowledges all participating student-athletes who earn a semester grade-point average of 3.60 or above.

LAST TIME OUT

WASHINGTON, Pa. – Junior quarterback Jacob Pugh (Jefferson Hills, Pa./Thomas Jefferson) tossed for six touchdowns, four of which were caught by sophomore receiver Jacob Macosko (Venetia, Pa./Peters Township) to lift the Washington & Jefferson College football team to a 46-21 victory over the United States Merchant Marine Academy in the 2023 ECAC James Lynch Bowl.

Pugh tossed for a career-high six touchdowns in the victory. The Presidents' Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year finished with 232 passing yards. The six touchdowns is one shy of the W&J single game record of seven, which was set twice by Pete Coughlin.

Macosko earned ECAC James Lynch Bowl Most Valuable Player honors after hauling in a career-high four touchdowns. He finished with five catches and 88 yards receiving Saturday.

The game got off to a wild and wacky start. Both teams committed turnovers in the opening five minutes of play. USMMA scored first when they blocked a punt and returned it for a touchdown at the 7:55 mark of the first quarter.

A few minutes later, an interception by sophomore cornerback Bruno Fabrycki (New Salem, Pa./Albert Gallatin) helped set W&J up with the ball around midfield. The Presidents put their first points of the day on the board when Pugh hit sophomore receiver John Peduzzi (Hilton Head, S.C./Hilton Head Christian Academy) for a 10-yard touchdown. The point after made the score 7-7 at the 1:46 mark.

The ultimate difference in the game was a strong second quarter surge by the Presidents. W&J found the end zone four times in the quarter. Pugh connected with Macosko for a 16-yard touchdown at the 13:37 mark of the second. After a lengthy 17-play drive helped the Mariners regain the lead with 6:52 to play in the half, W&J found the end zone three more times to take control.

A six-yard pass by Pugh to Macosko pushed W&J back in front at 19-14. After a second interception by Fabrycki, Pugh hit Peduzzi for a 40-yard scoring strike to make it 25-14 W&J at the 3:26 mark.

Another USMMA turnover, this time a fumble forced by Tanner Volpatti (Bethel Park, Pa./Bethel Park) allowed W&J to get another crack at the end zone before halftime. This time a 10-yard scoring play, which ended with a spectacular one-handed catch by Macosko with 1:38 remaining in the half made it 32-14 Presidents at the break.

The lone touchdown of the third quarter came with 4:48 showing on the clock. Pugh connected with Macosko for a fourth time. The 47-yard passing play allowed W&J to reach the end zone and swell the lead to 39-14.

Both teams scored a touchdown each in the fourth. Sophomore running back Troy Volpatti (Bethel Park, Pa./Bethel Park) rushed in from 11 yards out to conclude the scoring with 6:55 to play.

Peduzzi added an eight-catch, 96-yard effort to cap his strong sophomore season.

Junior running back Owen Petrisek (Ellsworth, Pa./Bentworth) led the Presidents' ground efforts. Petrisek finished with a career-high 100 yards rushing on just 11 carries.

Senior linebacker Justin Johns (Murrysville, Pa./Franklin Regional) posted a career-high 20 tackles in the victory.

Senior linebacker Keaton Hall (Dover, Ohio/Dover) and senior defensive back Brandon Brown (Monessen, Pa./Greensburg Central Catholic) both finished with double-digit tackle efforts against USMMA's triple-option attack.

Hall recorded a career-high 18 tackles and recovered a fumble. Brown finished with 12 tackles and a fumble recovery. Junior defensive lineman Dawson Dietz (Allison Park, Pa./Hampton) added 12 tackles, 2.0 tackles for loss and a sack.

Fabrycki intercepted a pair of passes as W&J forced four turnovers Saturday.

Notes: W&J has earned at least eight wins in each full season since the 2012 campaign. The win improves the Presidents to 6-1 all-time in ECAC Bowl games. Pugh finishes the 2023 season with 38 passing touchdowns. Peduzzi hauled in 18 touchdown receptions while Macosko tallied 11 touchdowns through the air in 2023.

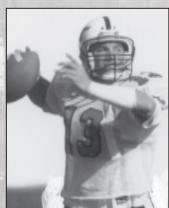

1922 ROSE BOWL

JAN. 2, 1922 -- WASHINGTON & JEFFERSON COLLEGE O, UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA O

- Only scoreless Rose Bowl game in history; one of four scoreless ties in any major bowl game throughout history.
- First tie in Rose Bowl history.
- Last Rose Bowl ever played at Tournament Park.
- W&J had an enrollment of 450 at the time and remains as the smallest school to ever play in a Rose Bowl.
- W&J's **Pruner West** became first African-American quarterback in Rose Bowl history.
- W&J's **Herb Kopf** became first freshman to play in Rose Bowl history.
- Only 11 players made the cross-country trip, making W&J the last team in Rose Bowl history to use only 11 players.
- W&J's **Russ Stein** named Rose Bowl MVP. He was inducted into the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame in 1991.
- Washington & Jefferson defense limited Cal to 49 yards rushing and two first downs. The Presidents did not allow the Bears to complete a pass.
- A W&J touchdown was overturned by an offside penalty and the play is recognized as one of the most disputed moments in Rose Bowl history.

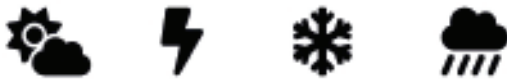

WJPA's Bob Gregg and Mark Uriah honored as recipients of 2023 Dow Carnahan Media Award

The longtime local broadcast duo of Bob Gregg and Mark Uriah were honored as the 2023 recipients of the Dow Carnahan Media Award. The presentation took place in accordance with the annual Presidents' Athletic Conference Football Media Day, which was hosted by Saint Vincent College in Westmoreland County for a 16th consecutive time.

Carnahan, a longtime supporter and friend of the PAC, passed away unexpectedly on April 29, 2016. The award is presented annually to a distinguished member of the media or on-campus representative for his or her commendable service while covering and promoting the conference's student-athletes, coaches and programs.

The 2023 season will mark the 40th season that Gregg and Uriah will team up to call Washington & Jefferson College football games on WJPA radio. From the start of the 1984 season, the duo has called the action to local listeners in Washington. During this time, W&J has racked up more than 300 wins, 25 PAC titles and made two Stagg Bowl appearances. The 1984 season also started W&J's string of 39 consecutive winning seasons.

Both are Western Pennsylvania natives, as Gregg is a graduate of Washington High School and attended the University of Miami (Fla.) and Geneva College, while Uriah graduated from Chartiers Valley High School and Ohio State University. In addition to their work covering W&J, both gentlemen have been fixtures on the local sports scene. The duo has covered WPIAL and PIAA athletics over the last four decades, including football, basketball, wrestling, baseball and softball, as well as California (Pa.) University playoff games, the Pony League World Series in Washington, Washington Wild Things baseball and the Frontier League playoffs.

Due to their efforts, WJPA Sports is a four-time winner of the Pennsylvania Associated Press Broadcasters Association Award for Best Sports Play-by-Play. They were both inducted into the Washington-Greene Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in 2013.
