Western Michigan University provides the resources of a globally engaged national research university, plus the personal attention and support associated with many small private colleges. It is known for preparing students to immediately enter graduate school or the workplace, as well as for innovations such as the establishment of the WMU Homer Stryker M.D. School of Medicine in Kalamazoo.

WMU prides itself on being learner centered, discovery driven and globally engaged, and its appeal begins with its strong sense of place. Nearly 24,000 students from some 90 nations are enrolled at the University, which is located close to downtown Kalamazoo. Its highly-rated engineering campus and Business Technology and Research Park are located three miles away, while its nationally recognized aviation college is based in Battle Creek. WMU also extends its reach by offering quality academic and professional development programs online and at eight regional locations in the Michigan cities of Battle Creek, Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids, Lansing, Muskegon, Royal Oak and Traverse City.

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has classified WMU as one of the nation's major public research universities. It offers an academic climate with the top-notch programs, faculty, facilities and hands-on learning opportunities that students need to prepare for and excel in graduate school or the work place.

The University is large enough to provide the resources of a large research institution and still small enough to allow students one-on-one interaction with some of the world's leading scholars. Despite the University's size and complexity, students who attend WMU expect and receive personal attention from senior-level faculty. A full two-thirds of undergraduate classes have 30 or fewer students.

WMU offers more than 250 academic programs from which to choose. The University is recognized around the country as one of the best places to study in disciplines ranging from jazz studies and engineering management to creative writing, marketing, aviation and audiology.

WMU is listed as a top-100 public university by U.S. News & World Report and is one of fewer than 100 public institutions to be granted a charter by Phi Beta Kappa, America's premier honor society.

Western Michigan President | 10th Year

10 years at Western Michigan • Eighth president in Western Michigan's history

Dr. John M. Dunn has served as the eighth president of Western Michigan University since July 1, 2007.

Prior to coming to WMU, President Dunn served as interim chancellor at Southern Illinois University Carbondale. Before accepting that appointment, he held the position of provost and vice chancellor at Southern Illinois.

An educator for more than 30 years, Dunn was dean of the University of Utah's College of Health from 1995 to 2002 before moving to Southern Illinois. Before that, he was at Oregon State University for 20 years, last serving as associate provost. His earlier positions at Oregon State included assistant dean of Health and Human Performance, chair of the Department of Exercise and Sport Science and director of the university's Special Physical and Motor Fitness Clinic.

Internationally known for his research and writing about the long-term health of people with disabilities, Dunn is the author of more than 50 professional papers and book chapters. He is a past president of the Research Consortium of the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance; past editor of *Quest*, a professional publication for kinesiology scholars; and president of the American Academy of Kinesiology and Physical Education.

Since moving to Michigan, President Dunn has been actively engaged with state and community efforts that focus on quality-of-life issues and enhancing economic development. He is a member of the boards of First National Bank, Southwest Michigan First and the WMU Foundation as well as the governing boards of the Greater Kalamazoo Area United Way, the Gilmore Keyboard Festival and the W.E.Upjohn Institute.

Dunn, who began his teaching at the University of Connecticut in 1972, earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Northern Illinois University in 1967 and 1969, respectively. He earned his doctoral degree from Brigham Young University in 1972.

President Dunn and his wife, Linda, reside in Kalamazoo in the president's official residence. They have three adult children, Matthew, Michael and Kerry.

Western Michigan Athletic Director | 20th Year

Kathy Beauregard, the Director of Athletics at Western Michigan University, has been involved with the Broncos in several capacities over the course of the past 36 years and begins her 20th season as Athletic Director in 2016-17.

Beauregard is the longest serving athletic director in the Mid-American Conference and is just one of eight female Athletic Directors at the 128 Football Bowl Subdivision schools.

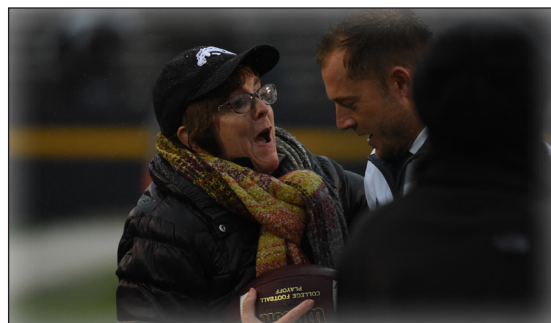
During her tenure as an Athletic Director, which began in 1997-98, Western Michigan has won 51 conference championships. Beauregard initially came to WMU in 1979 as head women's gymnastics coach. In nine seasons (1980-88), she produced two MAC title teams and was twice named the conference's coach of the year.

Last year was one of the best in history for the University as the department captured three conference championships (Women's Soccer, Men's Tennis and Baseball) and won its first bowl game in program history.

Under Beauregard Bronco student-athletes have posted 19 consecutive semesters of a combined overall GPA above 3.00. The student-athlete population, in any given year, ranges from between 350-400 students.

Beauregard has received several notable recognitions for her work in college athletics and the community. In 2011, she was named the Athletic Director of the Year for the Football Subdivision in the Central Region by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). In 2012, she became the first woman ever to receive the Gerald R. Ford Award from the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame. In 2012, she was also the recipient of the YWCA Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2000, Beauregard received the Hope College Distinguished Alumni Award from her alma mater.

Beauregard is a native of Kalamazoo and graduate of Loy Norrix High School. She earned a bachelor's degree from Hope College in 1979 and a master's degree from Western Michigan in 1981. She and husband, Rick, have a son, Brad, who graduated from WMU. Rick retired from Kalamazoo Public Schools after 32 years of service.

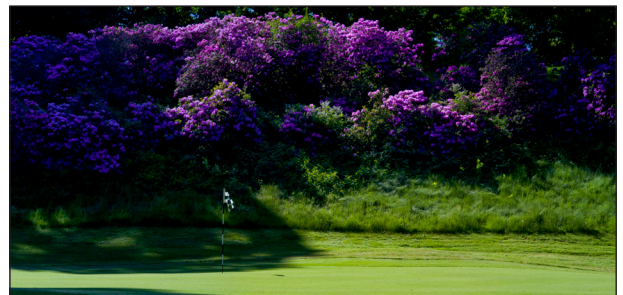

2016 Season Preview



Quarterback

The Broncos begin 2016 with one of the top quarterbacks in the country. Senior **Zach Terrell** has achieved notoriety this summer, being ranked as the No. 12 most efficient QB nationally according to *NFL.com*. He ranked seventh in the FBS last season in quarterback efficiency and was 10th in accuracy, completing 67.0 percent of his passes (262-of-391). He finished the year with a career-high 3,526 passing yards including 297 yards and two touchdowns in the team's first bowl win over Middle Tennessee State.

Terrell enters 2016 as the fifth ranked QB among active players in completion percentage with a mark of 63.9 percent. He is also ranked eighth among active players in career efficiency with a mark of 150.25. Last season he showed the ability to put up big numbers against elite competition as he threw for a season-high 365 yards and two TDs against No. 4 Michigan State in Waldo Stadium.

Backing up Terrell will be sophomore **Tom Flacco**, the brother of NFL Pro Bowler Joe Flacco. Tom added a different dynamic to the Bronco offense late in the season as he gave the team an ability to do more designed QB runs. He had his biggest game of the year in the Broncos' first win over a ranked opponent in program history as he ran for 60 yards to upset No. 24 Toledo 35-31. In that game he added a two-point conversion on the team's first possession to help set the tone for the day. Flacco has also shown an efficiency in throwing the ball, finishing his freshman campaign 10-of-12 for 188 yards and a touchdown.

Battling it out for the other spot on the depth chart will be redshirt freshman **Jon Wassink**. Wassink has a year in the system after coming out of high school ranked No. 33 in *Detroit News'* Blue Chip Recruits list after his career at South Christian high school in Grand Rapids. Wassink racked up 34 total touchdowns with 2,178 yards passing and ran for an additional 900 yards during his senior year, earning the honor as a finalist for the 2014 Michigan High School Player of the Year.

Providing depth to the position are true freshman **Brendan Tabone** and redshirt freshman **Alex Mussat**.



Running back

Western Michigan's backfield features a trio of talent that calls themselves Earth, Wind and Fire. **Jarvion Franklin**, **Jamauri Bogan** and **LeVante Bellamy** combined last season to record 2,279 yards and 23 touchdowns on the ground between them. Bogan led the way with a team-high 1,051 yards and 16 TDs, earning him the honor of MAC Freshman of the Year, and becoming the fourth straight Bronco to earn the award. He was also named Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Offensive MVP after rushing for 215 yards and four TDs against Middle Tennessee State. It was the second time in 2015 he ran for four TDs.

Franklin, the 2014 MAC Freshman of the Year and Offensive Player of the Year, was productive in having someone to share the carries with last season as he accounted for 735 yards and five TDs on his own. One of his most memorable runs to the end zone came against Central Michigan as he lowered his shoulders and ran the Chippewa defender over en route to getting into the end zone. Through his first two seasons, Franklin has rushed for 2,286 yards, and 29 career touchdowns. He ranks 10th in program history in career rushing yards and third in career rushing TDs. He set the single season rushing TD record at WMU in 2014 when he ran for 24 TDs.

This year Bellamy expects to split time in the backfield and in the slot as a receiver to help replace the loss of Daniel Braverman. Bellamy provides breakaway speed and showed it off against Ohio, as he had a season-high 149 yards on nine carries and a touchdown. His day included a season-long 56-yard scamper to pay dirt. For the season he finished with 493 yards and two TDs on the ground and had an additional 72 yards receiving.

Providing depth in the backfield this season will be senior **Fabian Johnson**, who is used primarily on third downs along with a talented redshirt freshman **Davon Tucker**. Tucker was the 2014 New Jersey Offensive Back of the Year and rushed for 1,085 yards and 13 TDs as a junior.



Wide Receiver

Lining up out wide for the Broncos this season is one of the top players in FBS history, senior **Corey Davis**. Named by *ESPN* and *CBS Sports* as the top senior wide receiver in the country, Davis enters 2016 as the active career leading in the entire country in terms of yards (3,785) and touchdowns (33).

He comes into this season just 400 yards away from the all-time MAC record held by former Bronco Jordan White. Perhaps even more impressive is that Davis is just 1,200 yards away from the all-time FBS record of 5,005 career yards held by Trevor Insley of Nevada. Davis currently ranks 26th on the all-time list. He is just behind notable names such as Emmanuel Sanders (SMU), Roy Williams (Texas) and Kendall Wright (Baylor).

Last season, Davis finished fifth in the country and second in the MAC with 1,436 receiving yards and was 11th in the country and third in the MAC with 12 receiving TDs. He has posted 1,400+ yards in back-to-back seasons, becoming the first FBS receiver since Justin Blackmon of Oklahoma State in 2010-11 to accomplish the feat. In Western Michigan's first bowl win in program history, he recorded eight catches for 183 yards, including an 80-yard touchdown. That performance was one of seven straight games of 100+ yards to end the season.

Even with one of the best receivers in the game, the Broncos will be looking to fill the void left by Daniel Braverman who was drafted by the Chicago Bears in April. Braverman finished second in the country last season with 108 receptions for over 1,300 yards and 13 TDs. Replacing him will be no easy feat but leading the way to step up are seniors **Carrington Thompson** and **Michael Henry**.

Thompson was regarded as being the standout player of spring practice, as he used his 6-2 frame to shield his body from defenders. Last season, Thompson had eight catches for 89 yards and two touchdowns. He is a transfer from Northwood University where he caught 89 balls from 1,210 yards and had 10 TDs.

Henry, who will primarily line up in the slot, finished with 18 catches for 247 yards in 2015. He recorded at least one 15-yard catch in five games. His season-best came against Eastern Michigan in which he had four receptions for 95 yards including the first TD of his career, a 64-yard catch-and-run.

Backing up the aforementioned trio will be redshirt freshmen **Keishawn Watson**, **Giovanni Ricci**, **Anton Curtis** and newcomers **Hunter Brothersma**, **D'Wayne Eskridge** and **Rodney Graves**.

Offensive Line/Tight Ends

Four of last year's starters along the offensive line return to Kalamazoo this year to improve on the 29th nationally ranked rushing attack in 2015. All-conference standout **Taylor Moton** leads a group of younger but equally skilled road graters up front in **Jackson Day**, **John Keenoy** and **Chukwuma "Chukes" Okorafor**.

While there is four dominating big men up front, the question is who steps in to fill the fifth spot left by 2016 fourth round NFL Draft pick Willie Beavers who was a MAC First-Team selection last season. Beavers anchored the left tackle position for the last few years for the Broncos and there is competition to fill his spot. Judging by spring practice, the first player to get that shot will be Okorafor who's frame of 6-6, 333 pounds is ideal to protect Terrell's blindside. He is making the switch from right tackle after starting all 13 games there last season. The musical chairs continue as Moton, who started every game at right guard last year will slide over to right tackle, a position he has played previously.

Keenoy started 12 of 13 games at center as a true freshman last season and should only get better with a year of experience under his belt. He stands at 6-3, 305, one of the biggest centers in the MAC. Day stands to Keenoy's left, and is entering his second year as a full-time starter. He started the last 11 games of the season for the Broncos after former All-MAC standout Jimmy Kristof suffered a season-ending injury.

There are numerous candidates to fill in the last spot on the line at right guard. Redshirt freshman **Luke Juriga** impressed in both bowl practices and spring practice. He will battle it out with **Curtis Doyle** and **Kristof Ifkovits**, who is also sliding to provide depth for Keenoy at center.

Providing depth for spots on both tackle positions will be redshirt freshman **Elliot Jordan** who stands at 6-6, 282. He will be joined by another big body in fellow redshirt freshman **Jonathan Todd** who is 6-6, 330.

There will be a quartet of incoming freshmen to fill gaps in **Spencer Kanz**, **Mark Brooks**, **Jordan Asbury** and **Mike Caliendo**.

Perhaps the toughest player on the entire team will lineup along the line as well, in junior tight end **Donnie Ernsberger**. He is a throw-back type tight end, with his primary strength coming as a blocker. The Broncos hope to also get him more involved in the passing game this season. He will be backed by **Lucas Bezerra**, **Odell Miller** and a pair of true freshmen **Mitchell Heimbuch** and **Brett Borske**.



Defensive Line

The Broncos' front four on the defensive side of the ball is the tone setter for the entire unit. "Swarm to the ball" has been a mantra the entire offseason and it starts with the guys up front. Seniors **David Curle** and **Keion Adams** return as stalwarts who started all 13 games last season.

Adams is the leader for the Bronco pass rush after recording a team-high 5.5 sacks last season, while also placing second on the team in tackles for loss with 10.0. Fans will recognize him by a different jersey this year as he goes from No. 12 to No. 1.

While Adams is known as the team's best pass rusher, Curle, who is the biggest lineman along the line at 6-3, 303, leads the Broncos' efforts in stopping the run. He started all 13 games and routinely ate up blocks for others to get to the ball carrier.

Providing help on the outside ends are **Eric Assoua**, **Nathan Braster**, **Antonio Balabani** and **Andre Turner**. Braster came on last year, finishing with 3.5 tackles for loss with 1.5 sacks. Assoua showed periods of dominance along with Adams on the ends during spring ball in collapsing the pocket.

Inside, the Broncos will have a young rotation to fill the spot beside Curle. Sophomores **Daniel Jackson** and **Ken Finley** will play major roles along with junior **Nick Match** and redshirt freshman **Wesley French** who is transitioning from the offensive line to defensive line.

Perhaps the biggest X-Factor on how the D-Line performs will be the contribution provided by true freshman. **Ken Aguirre** who should provide great size inside, measuring at 6-1, 296 and Asbury a tall 6-3, 275. Aguirre provides big-time strength as he has tested of being able to squat 700 pounds. Outside, Kailen Guillory is a 6-4, 240-pound end who was ranked as the 17th overall prospect in the state of Indiana.

Another freshman who will compete for time is **Jaylon Moore** who is making the switch from offensive line to defensive line. Moore played multiple positions in high school, including offensive and defensive line along with tight end. He was named among top-31 prospects by *SooDetroit Magazine* heading into his senior year.



Linebackers

Linebacker is one of the most intriguing position groups on the 2016 Broncos squad. The team returns junior **Caleb Bailey** who was one of the leaders in the MAC in tackles for loss, with 12.0, along with junior middle linebacker **Robert Spillane** who was having an all-conference type season before suffering a season-ending injury against Eastern Michigan.

Spillane finished with 46 tackles in eight games and had 5.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks. The week before he was injured, he was named MAC Player of the Week for having nine tackles, including 3.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks vs. Miami (OH).

The other linebacker spot is where intrigue develops. Western Michigan signed four linebackers in February and have just as much returning competition on the team. Junior **Asantay Brown** is poised to potentially make the switch to linebacker after earning all-conference honors as a safety last season, leading the team in tackles with 103. He posted a sack, 3.0 tackles for loss, two interceptions, five pass breakups and two forced fumbles along with a fumble recovery to go along with his 103 tackles.

The returners that will push for the spot opposite Spillane and Bailey are **Lucas Cherocci**, **Kasey Carson**, **Jakevin Jackson** and **Paul Engram**. Carson has the most production in the group, coming off a year in which he posted eight tackles including a tackle for loss. Jackson is the elder statesman of the unit, entering his senior year while Engram didn't see action last year.

The talented players they will be battling for time with include **Jared Culp**, **Eric Rogers** and **Drake Spears**.

Culp was ranked the 32nd best prospect in the state of Indiana, totaling 62 tackles and 10.0 tackles for loss to go with 5.5 sacks his senior year.

Rogers was praised as being the second-best inside linebacker in the state of Michigan by *Rivals* after finishing with 118 tackles, 2.5 sacks and three interceptions as a junior.

Spears made the conversion to linebacker this fall from defensive back. He was ranked the 20th best overall prospect in the state of Illinois by *Rivals.com*.

Defensive Backs

Since taking over as defensive backs coach along with defensive coordinator, **Ed Pinkham** has had the DB unit atop the country in several categories. In 2014, Ronald Zamort and Donald Celiscar topped the FBS leaderboard in pass breakups. Last season was much of the same as **Darius Phillips**, who made the transition from wide receiver to corner, finished sixth in the country in pass breakups and Zamort placed 14th.

Phillips contributed five interceptions in his first year as a DB. He had a season-high two picks against No. 1 Ohio State. While showing the same ballhawk skills he did as a receiver, he also was able to prove himself as a physical defender with 48 tackles on the year, sixth on the team.

The Broncos will be looking for a corner to start opposite Phillips this season following Zamort moving to the NFL with the Arizona Cardinals this spring after graduating last year. The team has a plethora of options at that spot, as seen in spring, with **Sam Beal**, **Obbie Jackson** and **Malik Rucker** all competing for the starting job. Beal played in 12 games last season, recording 15 tackles and a pass breakup. He possesses prototype size at the corner position, measuring at 6-1.

Rucker is in his first season being eligible for the Broncos after sitting out last season due to NCAA Transfer rules. Rucker came to Kalamazoo from Iowa where he was on the squad for two years. Jackson is one of the most competitive players on the team, and redshirted last year. He ranked No. 40 on the *Detroit Free Press* Fab 50 list coming out of high school.

WMU will also have to fill at least one safety spot after losing Rontavious Atkins to graduation and waiting to see how Brown's potential transition to linebacker goes. Competing for those spots will be primarily **DeShawn Foster**, **Justin Tranquill**, **Davontae Ginwright** and **Justin Ferguson**. Tranquill, a redshirt freshman, saw action early in the year in 2015 before losing the rest of the year to injury. He came to Western Michigan as the highest-ranked recruit in program history, coming in as a four-star athlete.

Ferguson begins his senior year in 2016 after playing primarily special teams during his time as a Bronco after coming over from Notre Dame following the 2012 year. Ginwright and Foster will each begin their initial years on the field after each redshirted last year.

Providing even more athleticism in the defensive backfield are members of the 2016 top ranked recruiting class in the MAC. **Dontre Boyd**, **Emmanuel Jackson**, **Brad Tanner** and **Stefan Claiborne** bring championship pedigree along with top-end speed.



Special Teams

A staple of Western Michigan's squads since 2013 has been an elite special teams unit. That standard will be put to the test this year as the Broncos will have a new placekicker and punter after losing Andrew Haldeman and J. Schroeder to graduation. Haldeman finished his career as the all-time leading scorer in program history with 337 points.

Taking over for them this year will be freshman **Butch Hampton** (kicker) and sophomore **Derrick Mitchell** (punter). Mitchell previously served solely as the team's kickoff specialist, where he tied the program record for most touchbacks in a season with 36. Hampton comes to Kalamazoo after being ranked as one of the top kickers in the country. He was an early enrollee, which allowed him to participate in spring practice this year. Hampton impressed in his first foray as a Bronco, routinely knocking down field goals from as far as 55+ yards.

A weapon that returns fully intact for the WMU special teams unit is the aforementioned **Darius Phillips**. Phillips made national headlines on the opening week of the 2015 season, returning a kickoff 100-yards for a touchdown against No. 4 Michigan State in front of a sold out Waldo Stadium. The performance earned him one of two MAC Special Teams Player of the Week honors during the year. He finished with a kickoff average of 23.2 yards per return, earning him All-MAC honors at the end of the season.

Phillips will audition to pull double duty this fall as the Broncos have an opening for a punt returner following Daniel Braverman's exit to the NFL. Braverman averaged over 10 yards per return last season, setting the bar high for his successor.



Coaching Staff

Western Michigan's coaching staff featured a shakeup in the offseason as the program had assistants lured away due to the success the program has achieved nationally both on the field and in recruiting.

Leading the way for the Broncos in his fourth season is Fleck who has put WMU on a national platform, guiding the program to its first bowl win in history, a top-50 recruiting ranking, highest in MAC history, back-to-back eight-win seasons and achieving the highest GPA in program history with a 2.93 in 2015.

Fleck is flanked by his returning coordinators **Ed Pinkham** (DC) **Kirk Ciarrocca** (OC) and **Rob Wenger** (Special Teams) along with offensive line coach, **Brian Callahan**, tight ends coach **Bill Kenney**, wide receivers coach **Matt Simon**. Last season, the unit produced four players to earn spots on NFL teams, along with team records in points scored in a season (468), most yards in a game (711) and most yards in a season (6,384). Individually the staff also helped produced the top WR duo in the country since 2002 with a 1,300 yard receiver (Braverman) and a 1,400 yard receiver (Davis) along with the all-time leading scorer in program history in kicker Andrew Haldeman (337 points).

Filling new spots on **Coach Fleck's** staff are **Kenni Burns** (RBs), **David Duggan** (LBs) and **Jimmy Williams** (DL).

Burns brings a national championship pedigree to Kalamazoo after serving as the recruiting coordinator for FCS powerhouse North Dakota State from 2010-13. He followed Craig Bohl to Wyoming and worked for a year as the wide receivers coach in 2014. Prior to his time at North Dakota State, Burns worked at Southern Illinois and Millersville (Pa.). He played his collegiate ball at Indiana where he was a three-year letterwinner as a running back.

Duggan brings a wealth of experience both as an assistant coach and head coach during his career. He most recently came from Southern Miss where he was a defensive coordinator helping lead one of the best turnarounds in the country, going from 3-9 in 2014 to 9-5 last season. During his career he has made stops at North Carolina and was a head coach in NFL Europe where he won the World Bowl in 2001 and 2002.

Williams has made quite the impact during his short time for the Brown & Gold. The staff saw the transformation he is making with the defensive line and labeled it the "Jimmy Williams effect". He brings instant credibility after earning All-American status during his playing days at Nebraska and having a 10-year playing career in the NFL, mostly with the Detroit Lions. P.J. (Philip John) Fleck was announced as the 15th Head Coach in the 108 year history of the Western Michigan football program on Tuesday, December 18, 2012 to rebuild the program. Coach Fleck has received the reputation of being a program "turn around" coach by being under the tutelage of proven program builders including; Joe Novak (retired-Northern Illinois), Jerry Kill (Minnesota, Southern Illinois, Northern Illinois, Emporia State, Saginaw Valley State), Greg Schiano (Rutgers), and Jim Tressel (Youngstown State, Ohio St.). While being the second-youngest head coach in the FBS, Fleck is also distinguished as being one of two head coaches (along with Jim Harbaugh) currently in college football (FBS) that has played and coached in the NFL. ESPN ranked Coach Fleck as having the 12th best playing career of all FBS head coaches.

2015: Coach Fleck coached the Broncos to their first bowl win in program history, beating Middle Tennessee State 45-31, at the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl on Dec. 24. Western Michigan finished the season 8-5 after rattling off six straight wins during MAC play. The Broncos finished the regular season, beating No. 24 Toledo, 35-30, for their first win over a ranked opponent in program history. The win gave the Broncos their first share of a MAC West title since 2000. The team featured the fourth straight MAC Freshman of the Year, as Jamauri Bogan ran for over 1,000 yards and 16 TDs. He was named the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Offensive MVP after rushing for 215 yards and four touchdowns. Off the field, Fleck led Western Michigan to its highest team GPA in program history with a 2.93 in the fall semester. For its academic pursuits, the team featured a program record 12 Academic All-MAC Team selections and five MAC Fall Scholar-Athletes. He ended the year wrapping up the third straight No. 1 recruiting class in the MAC as well as the top Group of 5 recruiting class overall.

2014: Coach Fleck engineered the single greatest turnaround in WMU football history and the second-best turnaround in MAC history after leading the team to an 8-5 record overall, a 6-2 record in the MAC and a berth in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Fleck was named Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year and was also a semifinalist for the Maxwell National Coach of the Year award. His recruiting expertise produced the MAC Offensive Player of the Year, MAC Freshman of the Year and *USA Today* Freshman All-American running back Jarvion Franklin. In total, 11 Broncos were named All-MAC, including First Team selections Franklin, Corey Davis, Donald Celiscar. Celiscar and Third Team All-MAC selection Ronald Zamort ended the season as NCAA Statistical Champions for passes defended. The countless hours of charity in the community continued under Fleck as did excellence in the classroom with nine Academic All-MAC selections and three MAC Distinguished Scholar-Athlete selections. The team boasted a GPA of 2.91, the second-highest recorded GPA in program history.

2013: Under the leadership of Coach Fleck WMU had three All-Mid-American Conference selections, including MAC Freshman of the Year WR Corey Davis, Davis was also selected for All-MAC Second Team Offense. Linebacker Travonte Boles was selected for the All-MAC Second Team Defense. Defensive Back Donald Celiscar was selected for the All-MAC Third team. In the classroom Coach Fleck had 17 Academic All-MAC players including: Kyle Lark, Justin Currie, Chris Prom, Leo Alba, Andrew Aurand, Darrin Duncan, Brian Fields, Jon Hoffing, Taylor Moton, Alec Moulton, Clark Mussman, Kirk Nakama, J. Schroeder, Cory Sueing, Zach Terrell, Tyler Van Tubbergen, and Zack Wynn. Coach Fleck orchestrated the then-best recruiting class in the history of the MAC, ranking 58th nationally according to *Rivals.com*. It was the highest ranked recruiting class amongst all non-power five conference schools. It was later surpassed by the 2016 class which ranked 48th nationally. *Sporting News* named Coach

Fleck the “Best Head Coach Recruiter”, and *Sports Illustrated's* “Campus Union” blog named him the “Best Hire” of 2013. Fleck campaigned for funds which brought new turf for Waldo Stadium and the Seelye Center, WMU’s indoor practice facility, and a complete renovation of the team’s locker room and The Bill Brown Alumni Football Center. After the season Coach Fleck was inducted into the Kaneland High School Hall of Fame class of 2014 for his personal achievements.

2012: Fleck followed Rutgers head Coach Greg Schiano into the NFL with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. After just one season with Fleck as a wide receivers coach both Mike Williams and Vincent Jackson had the best seasons of their careers with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Jackson ranked fifth in the NFL in receiving yards (1,226), ninth in TDs (8) and fifth in receiving yards per game (87.6). Jackson went on to start for the NFC in the 2012 Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. Williams set a new career-best with 996 yards receiving and signed a multi-year deal worth approximately 46 million dollars in the off-season.

2010-11: The pipeline to the next level as a wide receivers coach continued for Fleck at Rutgers under Coach Schiano. Mohamed Sanu (Cincinnati Bengals), Quaron Pratt (Philadelphia Eagles), Mark Harrison (Kansas City Chiefs), Brandon Coleman (New Orleans Saints), and Tim Wright (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, New England Patriots) all saw success at Rutgers before heading to glory in the NFL. Sanu finished the 2011 season setting both a school and Big East Conference record with 115 receptions for 1,206 yards and seven touchdowns, earning All-Big East honors and becoming one of the top-rated prospects in the 2012 NFL Draft.

2007-09: Fleck returned to his alma mater, Northern Illinois, for three seasons as the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator (2009). The recruiting classes that Coach Fleck put together went on to have record-breaking success with players such as Jordan Lynch, Martell Moore (Atlanta Falcons), Perez Ashford (New England Patriots, Cleveland Browns, Seattle Seahawks), and Cameron Stingily. Under his tutelage, Wide Receivers Britt Davis (New York Jets, Denver Broncos, New England Patriots), current WMU wide receivers coach Matt Simon (New Orleans Saints), Nathan Palmer (San Francisco 49ers, Indianapolis Colts, Miami Dolphins, Denver Broncos)

and Landon Cox (Tampa Bay Buccaneers) all advanced on to the NFL.

2006: Coach Fleck was an offensive graduate assistant with Ohio State for their Big Ten Championship season. The Buckeyes went 8-0 in conference play and 12-1 overall with a trip to the BCS National Championship Game. Fleck worked with wide receivers Ted Ginn Jr. (Miami Dolphins, San Francisco 49ers, Carolina Panthers, Arizona Cardinals), Anthony Gonzalez (Indianapolis Colts, New England Patriots), Brian Hartline (Miami Dolphins), Roy Hall (Indianapolis Colts, New Orleans Saints, Detroit Lions) and Brian Robiskie (Cleveland Browns, Jacksonville Jaguars, Detroit Lions, Atlanta Falcons, Tennessee Titans), all of which went on to substantial careers in the NFL.

NFL Playing Career

2004-2005: Fleck played for two seasons with the San Francisco 49ers (2004-05). After signing with the 49ers as a free agent in 2004, he spent most of that season on the practice squad before making an appearance versus the New England Patriots late in the year. He was placed on the injured reserve roster in 2005. In 2006, he left the 49ers to begin his coaching career.

Collegiate Playing Career (1999-2003): Fleck played from 1999-2003 at Northern Illinois, capping his collegiate career with the Huskies defeating Maryland, Alabama and Iowa State, rising to a No. 10 national ranking en route to a 10-2 mark. He ranks third in career receptions (179) and fourth in career receiving yards (2,162) in NIU history. Fleck has the second most receptions in a season (77) and led the Huskies in receiving yards in both 2001 (732) and 2003 (1,028). He holds the school record for punt returns (87) and ranks second in punt return yards (716) in a career. Fleck was named the National Player of the Week against Ohio University in 2003. In that game Coach Fleck had 14 receptions for 234 yards which ranks as the second best single game performance in NIU history.

Fleck earned First Team All-Mid-American Conference in 2003 along with being named Academic All-MAC and Second Team CoSIDA Academic All-American. Fleck showed his propensity for winning at the high school level (Maple Kaneland), winning 2 state championships in football. He was awarded all-state honors in three different sports three years in a row (football, basketball, and track).

Fleck (35/DOB: 11-29-1980) and his wife Heather have four children, Gavin, Carter, Paisley (P.J.) and Harper.

4TH SEASON

Kirk Ciarrocca (shuh-ROCK-uh) was officially named offensive coordinator of the Western Michigan football program on January 7, 2013.

Under his tutelage Western Michigan set numerous records on offense in 2015. The Broncos set new season bench marks in points scored (468), total yards (6,384) touchdowns (58). Against Ball State the Broncos also set a new single-game record for total yards with 711.

Individually, six players of the Broncos' offense were named to the All-MAC team led by first-teamers Daniel Braverman, Corey Davis and Willie Beavers. Braverman finished second in the FBS nationally with 108 receptions while Davis was fifth in the country and second in the MAC with 1,436 receiving yards. Beavers, who started every game at left tackle earned an invitation to the Senior Bowl and NFL Combine following the year.

Ciarrocca who also coaches the quarterbacks, had Zach Terrell earn third-team All-MAC honors. Terrell finished 2015 ranked seventh in the country and second in the MAC in quarterback efficiency with a mark of 162.3. His total of 3,526 passing yards is the fourth-highest mark in school history and his 29 passing TDs ranks fifth in a single season.

Ciarrocca also coached a dynamic running game led by redshirt freshman Jamauri Bogan who was named the MAC Freshman of the Year and 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl MVP after amassing 215 yards and four touchdowns. For the year, Bogan finished with 1,053 yards and two touchdowns. It is the first time since 2008-09 that Western Michigan has had 1,000-yard rushers in back-to-back seasons after Jarvion Franklin totaled 1,551 yards in 2014.

Overall the Broncos set numerous feats that had not been done in the FBS in quite some time. The duo of Braverman and Davis are the first WR duo since 2002 to go over 1,400 and 1,300 yards in the same year (Davis - 1,436, Braverman - 1,371). Adding in Bogan's 1,051 yards, Western Michigan became the first FBS team since 2001 to have a duo of 1,400 and 1,300 yard receivers to go along with a 1,000 yard rusher.

In 2014, he helped lead one of the most prolific offense's in program history. Under his guidance the team produced MAC Player of the Year and MAC Freshman of the Year in running back Jarvion Franklin. WMU also produced All-MAC honorees in Franklin (1st), Corey Davis (1st), Willie Beavers (2nd), Zach Terrell (2nd), Daniel Braverman (3rd) and James Kristof (3rd). The Broncos had the second-highest scoring offense in the MAC at 33.8 points per game and had the fourth-ranked total offense at 438.2 yards per game.

Ciarrocca, a graduate of Temple University, brings over 20 years of coaching experience to Western Michigan. He was instrumental in the development of NFL Pro Bowler Joe Flacco during his six seasons at the University of Delaware and was a member of the 2003 National Championship staff. Ciarrocca's Blue Hen 2007 offense ranked in the top 10 nationally in in scoring, total offense, passing offense, third down conversion and red-zone scoring. He had a pair

of quarterbacks drafted into the NFL during his first stint with the Blue Hens.

Ciarrocca's coaching career began at his alma mater where he assisted the offensive staff and served as the on-campus recruiting coordinator from 1990-91. He stayed on the East Coast, working with Western Connecticut State as the passing game coordinator in 1992, at Delaware Valley College, also as the passing game coordinator and quarterbacks/receivers coach in 1993. He returned to Western Connecticut as the offensive coordinator for two seasons before heading to coach in the Ivy League for seven seasons. He first coached the wide receivers at Princeton from 1996-99 and then did the same at the University of Pennsylvania from 2000-02 where the Quakers boasted the top ranked passing offense and claimed the 2000 Ivy League championship.

Ciarrocca worked with Fleck during his time at Rutgers when he was the co-offensive coordinator from 2009-10 also coaching the quarterbacks. He most recently served as the QB coach at Richmond in 2011 before returning to Delaware to coach running backs.

Ciarrocca (51/DOB: 8-12-1965) and his wife Kim have two children, a daughter named Colby and a son named Cade.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH

4TH SEASON
ALLEGHENY, 1975

Ed Pinkham was officially announced as the defensive coordinator for WMU football on January 7, 2013.

Coach Pinkham has been known to have his group be ball-hawkers and 2015 was no different as Darius Phillips who made the transition from wide receiver to cornerback, ranked sixth in the country in passes defended with 21. Phillips was also 25th in the country in interceptions with five, including one returned for a touchdown. Joining Phillips among the national leaders in passes defended was Ronald Zamort who ranked 14th with 19.

Overall as a defense, Pinkham had three of its members, all from the secondary, named to the All-MAC Team. Phillips and Zamort each earned second-team honors while safety Asantay Brown was named to the third team.

Brown led the Broncos with 103 tackles and had 3.0 tackles for loss, two interceptions, a sack, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Against Central Michigan, Brown had an interception, forced fumble and fumble recovery along with career-high 13 tackles.

In Pinkham's second season in 2014 the Broncos produced three All-MAC honorees in Donald Celiscar (1st), Justin Currie (3rd) and Ronald Zamort (3rd). Celiscar and Zamort went on to be NCAA Statistical Champions in passes defended, after averaging 1.6 per game. WMU had the third-ranked scoring defense in the MAC at 24.9 points per game and second in total defense at 371.2 yards per game.

Coach Pinkham brings 30 years of experience as a defensive coordinator to the Bronco football program. Prior to coaching Elon's defense over the past two seasons, he served in the same capacity at Rutgers in 2009-10. In his first season as co-defensive coordinator, Pinkham helped the Rutgers defense reach great heights as the Scarlet Knights ranked in the top-20 in five categories, including leading the nation in tackles for loss and ranking second in turnover margin. Rutgers was 15th in the country in rushing defense, 16th in scoring defense and 18th in total defense.

Pinkham's return to the FCS level saw his defensive unit rate third nationally against the pass as Elon allowed an average of just 153.55 yards per game through the air. The unit also rated in the top 40 nationally in total defense. The Phoenix defense amassed 17 sacks, besting its total from the previous season by four.

Pinkham led the defense at Colgate from 1996 through 2008. During his tenure at Colgate, the Raiders captured five Patriot League titles and earned five trips to the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision playoffs. The defensive unit led the Patriot League in total defense in 1999, 2003, 2004 and 2006, and three times paced the league in rushing defense.

Pinkham's defensive unit ranked top-10 in the nation in rushing defense three times, twice in passing defense and once in total defense. The Raiders were fifth in the nation in pass efficiency defense and ninth in total defense in 2004. In 1999, he directed the Raiders to one of their greatest defensive efforts while setting the school record for fewest total yards and rushing yards allowed in a season.

Prior to Colgate, Pinkham was defensive coordinator and associate head coach at the College of the Holy Cross for four seasons. For the first two seasons he coached the outside linebackers, before moving over to the secondary. He also enjoyed a 12-year stint at the University of New Hampshire, where he was secondary coach during his entire stay and defensive coordinator the last seven seasons. In 1989, he joined the staff at the University of Minnesota as secondary coach.

Pinkham (62/DOB: 9-6-1953) and his wife Karen have three grown children, Matthew, Kelly and Jessica.

Kenni Burns is in his first season beginning in 2016 at Western Michigan coaching the running backs. He comes to Kalamazoo after coaching at Wyoming, North Dakota State and Southern Illinois and was a three-year letterwinner at Indiana.

He was the Cowboys' receivers coach and passing game coordinator in 2014 where he had seven receivers average over 13.0 yards per catch. Burns came to Wyoming from North Dakota State with new Wyoming head coach Craig Bohl. Burns coached the wide receivers at NDSU for four seasons from 2010-13. His last two seasons with the Bison, he also served as the recruiting coordinator.

Burns was the wide receivers coach for each of North Dakota State's three consecutive FCS National Championships in 2011, '12 and '13. In 2013, the Bison offense ranked No. 10 in the nation in scoring offense (38.7 points per game) and No. 14 in total offense (457.5 yards per game).

From 2011 through 2013, Burns helped NDSU to a 43-2 (.956) overall record and a 22-2 (.917) Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) mark on way to its three consecutive FCS national titles. The 2013 NDSU squad became the first undefeated (15-0) FCS National Champion since Marshall went 15-0 to win the 1996 title. That 15-0 record by the Bison also set a North Dakota State school record. NDSU extended its winning streak to 24 consecutive games with the 2013 FCS Championship. That tied both the FCS and NDSU records for consecutive victories. The University of Pennsylvania set the FCS record of 24 consecutive wins from 1992-95. Montana later tied the record from 2001-02. The NDSU record was originally set from 1964-66.

In 2013, Burns coached junior wide receiver Zach Vraa, who recorded a 1,000-yard receiving season, with 1,191 yards on 67 receptions and had 15 touchdown receptions. Vraa earned First Team All-Missouri Valley Conference honors as a junior. Burns coached former NDSU receiver Warren Holloway in 2011, who had 77 receptions for 1,003 yards and eight receiving TDs. Burns also coached Ryan Smith, who earned Second Team All-MVFC honors at both wide receiver and return specialist in 2012.

In 2011, '12 and '13, the NDSU offense featured a pair of 1,000-yard rushers. Burns receiving corps played a key role in blocking for the successful running game. Two of those years also saw a Bison receiver record a 1,000-yard season. The 2011 season was the first time in NDSU school history that the Bison offense featured a 1,000-yard receiver and two 1,000-yard rushers in the same year. Wide receiver Holloway had 1,003 receiving yards, while Sam Ojuri rushed for 1,105 yards, and DJ McNorton ran for 1,020. In 2012, Ojuri (1,047 yards) and John Crockett (1,038) each rushed for 1,000 yards. The 2013 season saw receiver Vraa tally 1,191 receiving yards as Ojuri (1,398) and Crockett (1,277) duplicated

their 1,000-yard seasons of the previous year.

Burns will be entering his eighth year as a college coach in 2014. Prior to joining the NDSU coaching staff in 2010, he spent two seasons as the tight ends coach at Southern Illinois. In addition to being part of three National Championships and three Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) titles at NDSU, he was also part of two MVFC titles at Southern Illinois and two FCS playoff appearances with the Salukis. SIU played in the First Round of the 2008 FCS Playoffs and advanced to the Quarterfinals of the 2009 Playoffs. Southern Illinois had a combined overall record of 20-5 (.800) in 2008 and '09 and a combined conference record of 15-1 (.938). The Salukis tied for the MVFC title in 2008, with a 7-1 conference mark, and won the league outright in 2009, with a perfect 8-0 MVFC record.

The tight ends played a key role in the SIU offense. Burns coached two-time Honorable Mention All-Conference tight end Ryan Kernes at SIU. The Southern Illinois offense ranked No. 5 in the nation in rushing offense in 2009, averaging 221.1 yards per game.

Burns began his coaching career at Millersville (Pa.) University in 2007, where he coached the running backs.

He played running back himself at Indiana University from 2003-06. Burns was a three-year letterwinner for the Hoosiers. As a student-athlete at IU, Burns was active in student government. He served as the Athletic Project Manager, and served as a liaison between student government and the athletic department.

Burns completed his bachelor's degree in general studies at Indiana in December 2006.

He and his girlfriend Ciara have a daughter Razi.

Brian Callahan officially joined the Western Michigan Broncos on Jan. 11, 2013. Callahan returns to the Mid-American Conference after coaching the offensive line at Akron from 2004-09.

Callahan coached two MAC All-Conference selections in 2015 in first-team selection Willie Beavers and third-team selection Taylor Moton. Beavers became the first Bronco offensive lineman to earn First-Team honors since Dann O'Neill in 2012 and just the second lineman since 2001.

As a group, the Bronco line paved the way for redshirt running back Jamauri Bogan to rush for 1,051 yards, and earn MAC Freshman of the Year. It is the first time since 2008-09 that WMU has had a 1,000 yard rusher in back-to-back seasons.

Overall, the Broncos rushed for 204.6 yards per game, good for second in the MAC and 29th in the country. Western Michigan also punched it in on the ground for 28 rushing TDs good for 30th in the country with an average of 2.2 per game.

Individually, Beavers was invited to the Reese's Senior Bowl and NFL Combine after the season. *NFL.com* projected Beavers as the fifth best tackle in the draft. The Broncos had not had an offensive lineman drafted since 1995 prior to Beavers being selected in the fourth round in May by the Minnesota Vikings.

In his second season Callahan helped produce All-MAC honorees in Willie Beavers (2nd) and James Kristof (3rd) that anchored an offensive line that also helped produce the MAC Freshman/Offensive Player of the Year in Jarvion Franklin.

Callahan came to WMU from his alma mater, coaching at Eastern Illinois since the 2010 season. He helped lead the Panthers to the 2012 Ohio Valley Conference Championship and into the Division I FCS Playoffs. EIU finished seventh in the total offense, sixth in passing offense and eighth in scoring offense in 2012.

While at Akron, Callahan helped the Zips to their first ever MAC Championship in 2005 and a berth in the 2005 Motor City Bowl. He was the program's run game coordinator from 2005-09, helping the Zips to a win over North Carolina State in 2006 and the most improved offense in the nation in 2008. Callahan coached the tight ends and offensive line during his four-year tenure at the University of Texas-El Paso, helping the Miners to the 2000 Western Athletic Conference title and the 2000 Humanitarian Bowl.

David Duggan is in his first season at Western Michigan coaching the linebackers. He comes to Kalamazoo after a few seasons at Southern Miss.

“Coach David Duggan was an absolute no brainer hire,” head coach P.J. Fleck said. “To be honest I think it was a little bit of a surprise he was available. A former NFL head coach in NFL Europe, defensive coordinator at multiple stops, he has an incredible resume and incredible energy and a passion to teach and coach along with a willingness to come take our program to a completely different level. I hope our players truly understand the resource they now have at the linebacker position. We want to welcome him, his wife Lynn and his two daughters Olivia and Grace.”

At his second stop with Southern Miss from 2013-15, Duggan recently led one of the best turnarounds in the FBS in the 2015 season, taking the Golden Eagles from a 3-9 record in 2014 to a 9-5 record in 2015 which included a berth in the Conference USA Championship game as well as a berth in the Heart of Dallas Bowl against the University of Washington. His defense ranked third in C-USA along with the top ranked player in interceptions as Kalan Reed had four.

Prior to returning to Southern Miss, Duggan was at North Carolina in 2012 where he was the outline linebackers coach and special teams coordinator with the Tar Heels. He helped lead the team to an 8-4 finish, the best winning percentage in the program since 1997. The team blocked three punts and returned a kickoff for a touchdown.

His first stop in Hattiesburg had the Golden Eagles set an NCAA record for most interceptions returned for touchdowns with 12. He coached eventual NFL draft pick Jamie Collins who went to the New England Patriots.

Aside from his college days, Duggan was the head coach of the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe from 2006-07. His defense ranked No. 1 in the overseas league both seasons. He spent a total of six seasons in NFL Europe with Cologne along with the Berlin Thunder. He was a member of the staff that won the World Bowl in 2001 and 2002 with Berlin.

Duggan also had multiple stops in the northeast, coaching at Brown, Colgate, Holy Cross, New Hampshire and Alleghany College. He earned his Bachelor’s degree from New Hampshire in 1986 where he played from 1982-86.

Duggan and his wife, Lynn, have two daughters Olivia and Grace.

TIGHT ENDS / OFFENSIVE TACKLES COACH

4TH SEASON

Bill Kenney brings nearly three decades of experience at the Big Ten level to the Western Michigan football program as the tight ends/offensive tackles coach for the Broncos.

Kenney coached left tackle Willie Beavers to All-MAC First-Team honors in 2015. It makes him the first Bronco offensive lineman since 2012 to earn first-team honors.

Individually, Beavers was invited to the Reese's Senior Bowl and NFL Combine after the season. *NFL.com* projected Beavers as the fifth best tackle in the draft. The Broncos had not had an offensive lineman drafted since 1995 prior to Beavers being selected in the fourth round in May by the Minnesota Vikings.

As a team Kenney coached the tackles and tight ends, led by Donnie Ernsberger, to propel a Bronco rushing attack that ran for 204.2 yards per game, 29th in the country and second in the MAC. The team also ran it in 28 times for TDs which ranked 30th nationally with an average of 2.2 times per game.

In his second season Kenney's work with the offensive tackles and tight ends helped produce the MAC's Offensive Player of the Year and Freshman of the Year in Jarvion Franklin. The potent running attack proved too much for several opponents as the Broncos had one of the top running attacks in the MAC.

Kenney brings 31 years of coaching experience to the Broncos with a bulk of that coming at Penn State University where he began as a graduate assistant (1988) and worked with the offensive line from 1989-2011. He took on the role of recruiting coordinator in 1992-95 and worked directly with offensive tackles and tight ends from 2000-11.

During his time with the Nittany Lions, Kenney coached six All-Americans and 18 All-Big Ten players. He coached 10 Academic All-Americans and 47 Academic All-Big Ten players.

Kenney developed 30 NFL players, 25 draft picks and five free agents, all whom received their degrees from PSU. He recruited 32 NFL draft picks, including five first round picks. His offensive line paved the way for Larry Johnson to rush for a program record 2,587 yards and helped produce eight 1,000-yard rushers since 2002.

His offensive line ranked fourth nationally in sacks allowed in 2008, allowing just 13 sacks. In 2005 the Penn State offensive line allowed fewer than 15 sacks and finished second in the Big Ten in rushing and scoring.

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

3RD SEASON

Matt Simon was officially announced as the wide receivers coach for the Western Michigan football program in February of 2014.

In 2015 Matt Simon coached the most prolific receiver duo in the country since 2002. The duo of Daniel Braverman and Corey Davis were the first WR duo since 2002 to go over 1,400 and 1,300 yards in the same year (Davis – 1,436, Braverman – 1,371).

Braverman and Davis were each named to the All-MAC team in 2015. Braverman finished second in the FBS nationally with 108 receptions, eighth in receiving yards with 1,371 and eighth in receiving TDs with 12. Davis was fifth in the country with 1,436 receiving yards and in receiving TDs with 13 while placing 12th in total receptions with 90.

Davis enters the 2016 season as the active leading receiver in the FBS with 3,785 yards. He is currently 26th in FBS history and second in MAC history just 400 yards away from the all-time record in MAC career yards (Jordan White, 4187). His 1,400 yards in 2014 and 2015 made him the first FBS receiver since Justin Blackmon in 2010-11 to have back-to-back 1,400 yard seasons.

Davis and Braverman asserted themselves in history in the Western Michigan history books in 2015 as the 12 TD receptions by Braverman put him fifth in a single season at WMU while Davis' 13 TDs put him fourth. Braverman's 1,371 yards are fifth most in one year by a Bronco and Davis' 1,436 yards are second most all-time.

WMU's receivers flourished under Simon in his first season. Corey Davis was named First Team All-MAC, while Daniel Braverman was named Second Team All-MAC. Both had career-best seasons in every statistical category. Heading into the 2015 season Davis was named a Presason All-American by Phil Steele.

Simon, who spent two seasons at Rutgers, is rejoined with WMU head coach P.J. Fleck, who was the Edina, Minn., native's position coach at Northern Illinois.

In 2012 with the Scarlet Knights, Simon assisted the coaching and academic personnel in day-to-day duties, also aiding with special teams film breakdown and game plans. He worked with the scout team by utilizing weekly scouting reports on upcoming opponents. Simon helped with calls and adjustments during games. The following season he moved on to work with Rutgers' wide receivers.

Prior to arriving in Piscataway, he worked as an assistant coach at the University of St. Thomas (Minn.) for the 2011 season and focused on tight ends and all four special teams units. Simon performed breakdown of opponent film, also

coordinating film responsibilities and data entry. He recruited the state of Florida (Dade, Broward, Lee and Collier counties).

Simon started his coaching career at his alma mater in offensive quality control in 2010. He put together weekly opponent scouting reports after breaking down film to help formulate game plans.

A wide receiver, Simon earned four letters for the Huskies from 2004-08 and served as a co-captain. He collected 1,660 receiving yards on 96 catches for an average of 17.3 yards per catch. Simon caught passes in 20 straight games during one stretch and totaled five career 100-yard receiving games.

He racked up a team-best 969 yards on 52 catches in 2007, ranking seventh on NIU's single-season receiving yards list. During his senior year, he was one of only 22 players in nation selected to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team for leadership and work in the community.

After graduating with a bachelor's degree as a science in organizational management major, Simon (30/DOB: 12-4-85) signed a contract with the New Orleans Saints and spent six months on the practice squad.

Simon married his wife Charlotte in July, 2016.

Rob Wenger joined the WMU football staff as a graduate assistant prior to the 2013 season. He has experience as a member of the support staff at the BCS level along with coaching experience at both the high school and Division III levels. He quickly rose through the ranks and was appointed Special Teams Coordinator in August of 2013.

Wenger saw two of his players recognized by the MAC for their breakout seasons in 2015. Darius Phillips earned second-team honors as a kick returner while Andrew Haldeman was named third-team as a place kicker.

Phillips made national headlines the first week of the season when he returned a kick 100 yards for a touchdown against No. 4 Michigan State. It earned him the first of two Special Teams Player of the Week honors after also getting the nod following his two returns totaling 101 yards against Central Michigan.

Haldeman broke the Western Michigan career scoring record with 337 points and for field goals made with 57. In the MAC, Haldeman placed sixth all-time in points scored and tenth in field goals made. His season-long was a 48-yarder against Bowling Green on national TV.

Another record-breaker under Coach Wenger was first-year kickoff specialist Derrick Mitchell who tied the Western Michigan record with 36 touchbacks. Mitchell averaged 62.5 yards per kickoff.

In his second season in 2014, the Broncos saw significant improvements in their special teams. Punter J. Schroeder was named Third Team All-MAC and made the Ray Guy Watch List. Freshman kick returner Darius Phillips was named a Sporting News Freshman All-American and led the conference in kick return yards and average at 26.1.

After graduating from Colgate in 2008, Wenger spent two seasons at Rutgers as an operations assistant in 2008 and on the player development staff during the 2008 and 2009 seasons. From 2010-12, Wenger coaches at St. Thomas Aquinas H.S. as well as Allegheny College, working primarily with defensive players.

In 2009-10, Wenger was an assistant coach at St. Thomas Aquinas in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. In 2010-11, he served in the same capacity at Allegheny in Meadville, Pa. In 2011-12, he was elevated to defensive coordinator at St. Thomas Aquinas and then was elevated to the same position, as well as recruiting coordinator, in 2012 at Allegheny.

JIMMY WILLIAMS

DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Jimmy Williams is in his first season as defensive line coach for the Broncos in 2016. Williams has coached with UAB, Eastern Michigan, Buffalo, Toledo, Grand Valley State and Nebraska in his career. His most recent stop was with Eastern Michigan this last season. Prior to that he was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at UAB.

A standout player at the University of Nebraska, Williams spent 12 seasons in the NFL playing for the Detroit Lions, Minnesota Vikings and Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Since joining the coaching ranks, he has been a part of two teams that participated in the Mid-American Conference Championship game as well as another that advanced to the Division II National Championship game.

In his first season in Ypsilanti, Williams' defensive line showed vast improvement on the field, as the squad recorded more tackles-for-loss (63) than it did in all of 2013. Individually, junior defensive lineman Pat O'Connor earned first team All-MAC honors. O'Connor became just the second EMU player to lead the conference while sitting at No. 44 nationally with 7.5 sacks.

At UAB, he served as assistant head coach. During the 2013 campaign, he worked directly with the inside linebackers before also taking over as the defensive coordinator midway through the season. In 2012, Williams coached the UAB defensive line.

Prior to coming to UAB, Williams was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the University at Buffalo, where he spent three seasons. Williams' college coaching career includes stints at the University of Toledo as well as Grand Valley State University and Nebraska.

While at Buffalo in 2007, Williams mentored a pair of linebackers to All-MAC honors. Overall, the Bulls had four defensive players selected to All-MAC teams in 2007.

At Toledo, Williams helped lead the Rockets to a 9-5 record, a berth in the MAC Championship game and an invite to the Motor City Bowl.

Williams also has coaching experience as a defensive line coach at Grand Valley State in 2001, when he helped lead GVSU to a GLIAC Championship and to the Division II playoffs for the first time. Grand Valley State posted a 13-1 record, losing only in the Division II championship game to North Dakota, 17-14. Three of his defensive linemen earned all-conference honors.

One of the greatest defensive players in Cornhuskers history, Williams walked on to the team from Washington, D.C. He was the 15th pick of the 1982 draft and played nine seasons with the Lions (1982-90), one with Minnesota and finished his stellar NFL career with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1992 and 1993. During his career with the Lions, Williams recorded 653 tackles (sixth all-time), 25.5 sacks and 11 interceptions. Williams recorded a career-high 143 tackles in 1984 and was the Lions' defensive MVP.

In 1987, Williams earned defensive MVP honors for the second time in his career, and was honored by the Lions' Quarterback Club as the team's overall MVP. In 1989, Williams led all NFL linebackers with five interceptions and ranked third on the team in tackles with 95. Williams was a team captain for each of his three NFL teams, and served as the Athletes in Action Chaplain leader.

At Nebraska, Williams was a 6-foot-3, 220-pound defensive end for the Huskers when NU played out of a 5-2 formation, lettering in 1979, 1980 and 1981. He recorded 198 career tackles in three years, including 97 solo stops. As a senior, Williams earned first team All-America (Walter Camp, *Associated Press*), All-Big Eight honors and was named the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year by UPI, after recording 61 tackles, including 18 for loss, and played in the Japan and Hula Bowls. As a player, he still has the fastest 40-yard dash time ever recorded at NU by a defensive end (4.6 electronic). He played in three bowl games with the Huskers and was named the defensive MVP of the 1980 Sun Bowl after Nebraska defeated Mississippi State, 31-17.

He was inducted into the Nebraska Hall of Fame in 2001.

He earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from William Tyndale College in Michigan in 1999 while coaching in the high school ranks. He was the defensive coordinator and coached the linebackers at Pontiac Northern High from 1994 through the 1998 season and was the head coach at Pontiac Central from 1999 to 2000.

Williams has assisted with college football camps at Nebraska, Michigan and Michigan State and served a two-week internship with the Detroit Lions in 2001. He also served an internship with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2004.

A native of Washington, D.C., Williams played high school football at Woodrow Wilson High School.

He and his wife Jameka have 10 children.

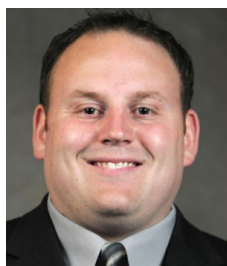

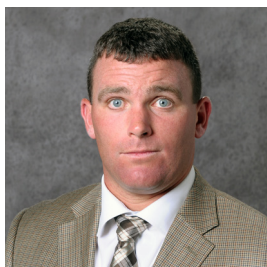
Nick Uhlenhopp is in his first season as director of football operations at Western Michigan. Uhlenhopp comes to Kalamazoo after six years at Iowa State.

This is the Mid-American Conference

Providing leadership in education and diversity, the Mid-American Conference moves into its 71st year of service to our students.

Since its inception in 1946, the Mid-American Conference has progressively grown and developed into one of the most aggressive Division I conferences in the country. One of only 10 football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences, the MAC named Dr. Jon A. Steinbrecher as its eighth commissioner in March of 2009.

The league has grown its commitment to championship events as it hosts championships in 23 sports, including neutral site events at some of the finest facilities in the nation – football (Ford Field, Detroit), men's and women's basketball (Quicken Loans Arena, Cleveland), softball (Firestone Stadium, Akron) and baseball (All Pro Freight Stadium, Avon, Ohio). The MAC secured a four-year contract extension with Ford Field to host the MAC Football Championship Game through the 2019 football season, anchored a six-year contract extension for the MAC Men's and Women's Basketball Tournaments at Quicken Loans Arena through the 2023 season, and stabilized a five-year contract extension through the 2020 season for the MAC Baseball Tournament at All Pro Freight Stadium in Avon, Ohio.

In addition to growing its commitment to MAC championships, Steinbrecher has strategically positioned the MAC's participation in hosting NCAA events and championships. The MAC recently served as the host for the 2015 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Midwest Regional at Quicken Loans Arena in Cleveland and will also serve as host of the 2018 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships, also at Quicken Loans Arena. The MAC has previously hosted both the 2012 and 2014 NCAA Women's Bowling Championships under Steinbrecher's direction.

In the summer of 2014, the MAC and ESPN announced a historic 13-year rights extension deal through the 2026-27 season for expanded national television and digital distribution. This is the largest and most extensive agreement in the history of the Conference and brings long-term security for the MAC through the 2026-27 academic year.

ESPN has exclusive television and digital distribution rights for all MAC sporting events, and guarantees coverage of every football game, and select men's and women's basketball and Olympic sporting events. The MAC and ESPN will establish on-campus production capabilities that will provide a significant increase in the national coverage of baseball, softball, soccer, volleyball, wrestling and Olympic sports on ESPN3. This will open up nearly 92 million households from ESPN3 for exposure to MAC sports for the first time in Conference history. Through this ESPN partnership, the MAC and CBS Sports Network announced a four-year sub-licensing agreement to expand its national coverage of football and basketball through the 2018-19 season.

During the 2015 season, the MAC tied a Conference record with seven programs receiving a bowl invitation. Bowling Green (GoDaddy Bowl), Northern Illinois (San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl), Toledo (Marmot Boca Raton Bowl), Ohio (Raycom Media Camellia Bowl), Western Michigan (Popeyes Bahamas Bowl), Akron (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl), and Central Michigan (Quick Lane Bowl) represented the MAC in bowl games last season.

The seven MAC bowl invitations matches the Conference record for programs receiving a bowl invitation in a single season, which also occurred during the 2012 bowl season. This also marks the eighth time in MAC history to have five or more programs receive a bowl invitation (2004, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015) in a single-season.

In December of 2015, the MAC named Bowling Green QB Matt Johnson as the league's Vern Smith Leadership Award Winner and MAC Offensive Player of the Year. Also receiving accolades, Akron LB Jatavis Brown earned MAC Defensive Player of the Year, Western Michigan RB Jamauri Bogan won MAC Freshman of the Year, NIU kick returner Aregeros Turner won MAC Special Teams Player of the Year Award and former Toledo head coach Matt Campbell won MAC Coach of the Year.

Four MAC students were named 2015 Academic All-Americans as selected by the College of Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Buffalo senior tight end Matt Weiser and Kent State senior safety Jordan Italiano were named Academic All-America First-Team, while Kent State junior safety Nick Cuthbert and Bowling Green sophomore punter Joe Davidson were named Academic All-America Second-Team.

In December of 2013, former Northern Illinois quarterback Jordan Lynch finished third overall in the Heisman Trophy voting, the highest ever finish by a MAC student. Lynch was invited to the Heisman Trophy Award ceremony in New York City and became only the third MAC student-athlete to receive an invitation to the ceremony – Marshall QB Chad Pennington (1999) and Marshall WR Randy Moss (1997).

During the 2014 NFL Draft, Buffalo Bulls linebacker Khalil Mack was the fifth overall selection by the Oakland Raiders. Mack's selection was the highest-ever for the Buffalo program and the second highest ever selection for a MAC student. This marked the second consecutive year for the MAC to have its two highest ever selections in the NFL Draft. In the 2013 NFL Draft, Central Michigan offensive tackle Eric Fisher was selected as the first overall selection by the Kansas City Chiefs, making Fisher the first-ever football player from the MAC selected first overall in the NFL Draft.

In 2012, the MAC witnessed a record setting seven teams receive bowl invitations, including the first ever BCS Bowl invitation with Northern Illinois playing in the Discover Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2013. The MAC also had four football programs ranked in the top 25 of national polls – Northern Illinois, Kent State, Toledo and Ohio—as the BCS Standings had two MAC programs in the Top 25 at the end of the regular season with No. 15 Northern Illinois and No. 25 Kent State. The MAC also set a conference record for the most wins against FBS opponents with 16 victories.

In the fall of 2013, the MAC announced the creation of newly created bowl games in Boca Raton, Fla., Nassau, Bahamas, Miami Beach, Fla., and Montgomery, Ala. for a six-year period (2014-2019). The creation of the Marmot Boca Raton, Popeyes Bahamas and Miami Beach Bowls is the centerpiece of a joint agreement between several FBS conferences and will be supported by several FBS conferences on a six-year rotating basis.

The Marmot Boca Raton Bowl will be owned and operated by ESPN and will be played at FAU Stadium, an open air stadium which seats nearly 30,000 fans on the campus of Florida Atlantic University. The Popeyes Bahamas Bowl will be played at Thomas A. Robinson Stadium. The Miami Beach Bowl will be played at Marlins Park. The Raycom Camellia Bowl, based in Montgomery, Ala., is owned and operated by ESPN and will be played in the Cramton Bowl, a 25,000 seat stadium.

The MAC is also a partner with the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl as a primary partner in 2017 and 2019, and a secondary partner in 2015, 2016 and 2018 bowl seasons. The MAC will play the Mountain West in both the 2017 and 2019 bowl seasons, played at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego.

Each football season the MAC has a minimum five guaranteed bowl opportunities. The MAC has long-term primary contracts with the Mobile Alabama Bowl (based in Mobile, Ala.) through the 2017 season and Famous Idaho Potato Bowl (based in Boise, Ida.) through the 2019 season.

During the 2015 football season, Bowling Green won the 2015 Marathon MAC Football Championship with a 34-14 win over NIU. This marked the second MAC Championship for Bowling Green in the last three seasons and the programs 12th overall Conference Championship. Bowling Green also clinched the East Division title for the program's third consecutive East Division crown, while Northern Illinois won its sixth consecutive MAC West Division title as the Huskies won the tie-breakers in the four-way tie for first place in the West with NIU, Toledo, Western Michigan and Central Michigan.

The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame named 25 MAC students as members of the 2016 Hampshire Honor Society, which recognizes college football players that maintained a 3.20 GPA or better throughout their college career. Six more MAC players were selected in the 2016 NFL Draft – OT Willie Beavers (Western Michigan) by Minnesota (4th Round, 121st overall); WR Tajae Sharpe (UMass) by Tennessee (5th Round, 140th overall); LB Jatavis Brown (Akron) by San Diego (5th Round, 175th overall); S Kavon Frazier (Central Michigan) by Dallas (6th Round, 212nd overall); RB Darius Jackson (Eastern Michigan) by Dallas (6th Round, 216th overall); and WR Daniel Braverman (Western Michigan) by Chicago (7th Round, 230th overall).

History of the MAC

Based in Cleveland since July 1999 following a 15-year stay in Toledo, Ohio, the MAC has established historic measurements in both football and men's and women's basketball since moving to Northeast Ohio. The MAC was founded as a five-school league on February 24, 1946 in Columbus, Ohio with Ohio, Butler, Cincinnati, Wayne State and Western Reserve admitted as charter members. The Mid-American Conference membership consists of 12 universities across five states (Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, New York and Ohio).

MAC Commissioner John Steinbrecher

Steinbrecher has expanded bowl opportunities for the conference and stabilized conference membership, increased television exposure with a historic national television and digital distribution

rights deal with ESPN, launched the conference's first-ever digital network, renegotiated the conference marketing rights agreement with IMG College.

This past year Steinbrecher orchestrated the development of a first of its kind Mental Health Summit to focus on student well-being, specifically with interactive discussion topics in mental health ranging from identifying problems, discussing solutions and highlighting best practices. He also established a working group on the issue of inclusion and diversity as well as a messaging program to define the MACtion brand.

Steinbrecher played an integral role in the development of the College Football Playoff and serves on the Administrative Committee and the Site Selection Committee. Steinbrecher led the MAC bid to host the 2015 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional at Quicken Loans Arena and also developed and implemented a new MAC Coaches Orientation program. He was recently named to the newly formed NCAA Football Oversight Committee.

In the summer of 2014, Steinbrecher announced a historic 13-year rights extension agreement with ESPN through the 2026-27 season and brings long-term security for the Conference. This agreement provides ESPN with exclusive television and digital distribution rights for all MAC sporting events, guarantees coverage of home football and men's basketball games, and select women's basketball and Olympic sporting events.

In addition, the MAC and its member institutions, with assistance from ESPN, will establish on-campus production capabilities that will provide a significant increase in the national coverage of baseball, softball, soccer, volleyball, wrestling and Olympic sports on ESPN3. In June of 2015, the MAC announced a four-year sub-licensing agreement with CBS Sports Network to expand its national exposure in football and basketball.

Specifically in football, Steinbrecher has overseen historic achievements in the overall growth of MAC football. Over the last five seasons 11 different MAC programs have appeared in a bowl game and during the last four seasons the MAC has twice set the Conference single-season bowl record with seven programs receiving a bowl invitation in both the 2012 and 2015 bowl seasons.

Also, the MAC became the first non-AQ conference in the BCS era to have two teams vying for a BCS berth in the same year without an undefeated season. In 2012, both Northern Illinois and Kent State entered the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game with 11-1 records and ranked in the BCS Top 25.

In January, 2013, Steinbrecher witnessed Northern Illinois earn the first ever BCS bowl berth by a MAC member in the Discover Orange Bowl and during the 2012 bowl season a conference record seven teams receive bowl invitations.

Last season, Steinbrecher had seven different MAC programs receive bowl invitations - Bowling Green (GoDaddy), Northern Illinois (San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia), Toledo (Marmot Boca Raton), Ohio (Raycom Media Camellia), Central Michigan (Quick Lane), Western Michigan (Popeyes Bahamas) and Akron (Famous Idaho Potato) represented the MAC during the 2015 bowl season.

Steinbrecher orchestrated the creation of four new bowl games in 2014 - the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl (Montgomery, Ala.), the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl (Nassau, Bahamas), the Marmot Boca Raton Bowl (Boca Raton, Fla.) and the Miami Beach Bowl (Miami, Fla.).

Steinbrecher has built the MAC primary bowl agreements to a conference-best five guaranteed bowl games (GoDaddy Bowl; Famous Idaho Potato Bowl; Raycom Media Camellia Bowl; Popeyes Bahamas Bowl and Marmot Boca Raton Bowl) and three additional secondary agreements (San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl; Detroit-based Quick Lane Bowl and ESPN owned bowl games such as the Birmingham Bowl and St. Petersburg Bowl).

These bowl agreements provide the MAC the opportunity to build on relationships with multiple bowl partners, expand national television exposure and broaden geographical opportunities to perform against peer FBS conferences.

Steinbrecher directed a strategic planning process for the MAC, increased national exposure for the conference, as well as new opportunities for the conference in the areas of a new regional television network deal,

marketing and sponsorships and securing long-term partnerships for MAC neutral site championship events.

Steinbrecher launched the first-ever MAC Digital Network in 2011 and re-launched the MAC Digital Network with a new partnership with SIDEARM. The Digital Network provides the conference with a new website, enhanced live streaming and programming, mobile platforms via the iPhone, iPad and Android.

In 2011, Steinbrecher also negotiated a new marketing agreement with ISP for the conference marketing and sponsorship rights through 2019. ISP merged with IMG and this long-term deal solidified the conference marketing partnership with the new IMG College brand.

Steinbrecher negotiated a four-year contract extension with Ford Field as the site to host the MAC Football Championship Game through the 2019 season. He secured a six-year contract extension with Cleveland's Quicken Loans Arena to host the MAC Men's and Women's Basketball Conference Tournament through 2023. The contract extension guarantees the continuation of the conference tournament at the same neutral site since 2000. In addition, Steinbrecher also signed a five-year contract extension for the MAC Baseball Tournament to be played at All Pro Freight Stadium in Avon, Ohio through the 2020 season.

He joined the MAC after serving six years as commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference (OVC). Prior to the OVC, Steinbrecher served as commissioner of the Mid-Continent Conference (the Summit League). He is the only person to serve as commissioner in all three NCAA Division I Subdivisions (FBS, FCS, DI).

In six years with the OVC, Steinbrecher significantly increased the league's exposure through additional television coverage at the regional and national level. In 2005, he negotiated a five-year contract with ESPN that secured increased exposure for the league. That included being the first conference to sign a deal to have games appear on ESPNU; the OVC had the first sporting event telecast on that network (the 2005 OVC Men's Basketball Tournament Semifinals).

In July 2006, Steinbrecher helped spearhead a venture into streaming video with the launch of OVCSports.TV. The multimedia platform provided live and on-demand coverage of OVC football and men's and women's basketball games as well as selected other sports, coaches' shows, press conferences and special events. In its first two years of existence, OVCSports.TV streamed over 800 events and recorded nearly 5,000 paid subscribers.

Under his leadership, the OVC re-emphasized its commitment to sportsmanship by implementing a series of good sports initiatives, including sportsmanship affidavits signed by coaches and administrators, student-athlete ethical conduct orientation and an institutional and team sportsmanship awards. Steinbrecher also initiated a Conference Basketball Issues Committee and oversaw increased promotional efforts for the OVC Basketball Tournament, which resulted in an increase in ticket sales revenue. He also spearheaded the efforts in bidding for, and ultimately securing, the 2014 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Final Four for Nashville.

Steinbrecher has served on a number of prominent NCAA committees, including the Division I Basketball Issues Committee, serving as a member of subcommittees for both men's and women's basketball, and in 1999 he became the first non-Division I-A commissioner elected as president of the Collegiate Commissioner's Association (CCA). In June 2007, he was appointed to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Academic Enhancement Group by the late NCAA President Myles Brand. He has served on the NCAA Division I Legislative Council, the NCAA Championship Cabinet, the NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification and the NCAA Men's Basketball Issues Committee.

Steinbrecher is currently Chair of the College Football Officiating Board of Managers and the NCAA Playing Rules Oversight Panel.

Steinbrecher is a 1983 graduate of Valparaiso University, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education and journalism. In 2006, he was bestowed an Alumni Achievement Award from his alma mater and in 2014 was inducted into the Valparaiso Athletics Hall of Fame. Steinbrecher graduated with a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University in 1984, and he was awarded the doctorate of physical education in sports administration from Indiana University in 1989.

An all-conference and academic all-conference selection in football and a conference champion in tennis, Steinbrecher was named Valparaiso's and the Heartland Collegiate Conference's Student-Athlete of the Year in 1983. In 2006, he was inducted into the Watauga County (N.C.) Sports Hall of Fame.

Steinbrecher and his wife Anne have three children, daughter Grace and twin sons Matt and Will.

1961 AVIATION BOWL

New Mexico 28, Western Michigan 12

Western Michigan made its postseason debut in the inaugural Aviation bowl on Dec. 9, 1961. The Broncos were led by quarterback Ed Chlebek, who completed 18 passes for 207 yards and one touchdown.

WMU fell behind 14-0 but bounced back on a Bob White scoring run from four yards out. New Mexico added two more scores before Chlebek found Dave Cooke in the end zone from five yards out for the final score of the game.



1988 CALIFORNIA BOWL

Fresno State 35, Western Michigan 30

Twenty-seven years after its first bowl trip, WMU made its second after winning the only outright Mid-American Conference title in program history and capturing a program-record nine wins.

For the second time in a bowl game, WMU fell behind by two scores but this time, the Broncos fought back to take a 17-14 lead into halftime. Robert Oliver hauled in a 31-yard pass from Tony Kimbrough for the team's first score. Robert Davis followed with a 51-yard scoring run to tie the game. It is still the longest rush in WMU bowl history. John Creek made good on his only field goal of the game to give the Broncos its first lead of the game.

Fresno State outscored the Broncos, 21-7, in the third quarter to put the game away. WMU's Kimbrough accounted for all but one of Western Michigan's touchdowns on the day.



2007 INTERNATIONAL BOWL

Cincinnati 27, Western Michigan 24

The Broncos played in the second inaugural bowl game in program history, taking on Big East opponent Cincinnati in the 2007 International Bowl. For the third time in as many postseason games, WMU fell behind 14-0 early and had to climb out from behind the eight ball.

Western Michigan eventually dug itself into a 24-point hole before getting its offense kick started. Cornerback E.J. Biggers and Jamariko Simmons connected on a 76-yard touchdown completion, the longest in WMU bowl history, for WMU's first score. The Broncos bounced back with another TD through the air, this time on a Ryan Cubit to Herb Martin hook up from 30 yards out. WMU scored 17 points in the second quarter to pull within a score at half.

Brandon West tied the game at 24-all with a seven-yard run at the 10:53 mark of the fourth quarter, but the Bearcats punched in a 33-yard field goal to take the lead back four minutes later.



2008 TEXAS BOWL

Rice 38, Western Michigan 14

Western Michigan played in front of the second-largest bowl crowd in Mid-American Conference history against Rice in the Texas Bowl.

Rice jumped out to a big lead early before the Broncos responded. Tim Hiller found senior Kirk Elsworth from two yards out for WMU's first points of the game in the fourth quarter. He hooked up with Schneider Julien near the game's end for another touchdown, giving two on the day to tie a WMU bowl record.



2011 LITTLE CAESARS PIZZA BOWL

Purdue 37, Western Michigan 32

Western Michigan's offense was on the national stage in the program's fifth bowl game and third in the past six seasons. The Broncos posted 485 yards of offense in a narrow loss to Purdue in the 2011 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl.

Jordan White set a MAC bowl record with 265 receiving yards and his one-handed grab in the second half was the top play on that night's SportsCenter. Alex Carder threw for over 400 yards in a game for the fifth time in 2011, racking up 439 yards.

The Broncos had an early strike with a 49-yard pass from Carder to White on a flea flicker at the 9:14 mark of the opening quarter.



2014 IDAHO POTATO BOWL

Air Force 38, Western Michigan 24

Western Michigan's was rewarded with its sixth bowl appearance in program history after an historic turnaround from 1-11 to 8-4 heading into the bowl game. The Broncos displayed a prolific offense with Corey Davis setting a WMU bowl record with 176 yards receiving and three touchdown catches. He was named WMU's MVP for the game.

Air Force grinded out over 300 yards on the ground and converted off of key Bronco turnovers to pull away in the game.



2015 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL

Western Michigan 45, Middle Tennessee State 31

The Western Michigan football team captured the first bowl victory in school history, defeating Middle Tennessee State, 45-31, in the Popeye's Bahamas Bowl at Thomas Robinson Stadium.

The game started and ended nothing short of an old-fashioned shootout. The two teams combined for 34 points and 475 yards in the first quarter alone and the score was tied 17-17 at the half.

Western Michigan pulled away in the fourth quarter, taking a 14-point lead after back-to-back touchdown runs by MAC Freshman of the Year and the 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Offensive MVP Jamauri Bogan.
