# HEAD COACH TIM LESTER



## THIRD SEASON Western Michigan, 2000

Tim Lester was named the 16th head football coach in school history on Friday, Jan. 13, 2017.

Lester has risen through the coaching ranks after completing a Hall of Fame playing career at Western Michigan. Lester was a four-year starter at quarterback at WMU from 1996-99, leading the Broncos to a Mid-American Conference championship appearance his senior season. Lester also made a stop as an assistant coach at his alma mater during the 2005 and 2006 seasons.

In his second season at Western Michigan in 2018 he led the Broncos to Bowl eligibility for the third-straight season, a program record, and a berth in the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Five Broncos earned All-MAC honors, including two First Team selections in LeVante Bellamy and Luke Juriga. WMU led the MAC in Academic All-MAC selections with 20 and five of them went on to earn MAC Distinguished Scholar Athlete honors. Lester and his staff's success on the recruiting trail continued, bringing in the MAC's best recruiting class for the second-straight season.

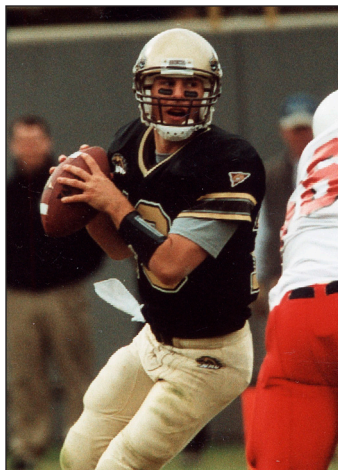
In his first season as head coach at Western Michigan in 2017, the Broncos led the Mid-American Conference with 12 all-conference selections and had 16 Academic All-MAC selections, five Distinguished Scholar-Athletes and a CoSIDA Academic All-District selection. As a team, the Broncos posted a 3.08 GPA, the second highest in program history. Offensive lineman Chukwuma Okorafor collected six All-America honors and Wyatt Pfeiffer was an All-American as a long snapper. As a unit, Western Michigan finished third in the nation in Special Teams Efficiency.

Several school records were broken as running back Jarvion Franklin became WMU's all-time leading rusher with 4,867 career yards, and also set a school record for most career touchdowns with 56. Darius Phillips became the FBS all-time leader for career runbacks with 12 and tied the FBS record with five career pick-sixes. Phillips was named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year for the second-straight season and had 100-yard kickoff returns in back-to-back weeks to open the season against #4 USC and Michigan State. On the recruiting front, Western Michigan signed the highest rated recruiting class in MAC history. Both Okorafor (3rd round, Pittsburgh) and Phillips (5th round, Cincinnati), as well as defensive back Sam Beal (3rd round, NY Giants) were NFL draft picks.

Prior to taking the head coaching position at Western Michigan Lester was the quarterbacks coach at Purdue in 2016 where he mentored sophomore signal-caller David Blough. Blough threw for 25 touchdowns and 3,352 yards, averaging over 279 yards passing a game in 2016.

Lester came to the Boilermakers from Syracuse, where he served as quarterbacks coach from 2013 to 2015 and doubled as offensive coordinator in 2014 and 2015.

Prior to working at Syracuse, Lester was the head coach at Division III Elmhurst (Illinois) College from 2008 to 2012. Over five seasons, he posted a 33-19 record for



a .635 winning percentage, second highest in school history. In his final season in 2012, he led the Blue Jays to a 10-2 record and a CCIW conference championship as well as Elmhurst's first-ever NCAA playoff appearance. It was just the third championship in school history and the first title since 1980. Lester was named the College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin Coach of the Year that season.

Lester served as an assistant at North Central College (2007) and Elmhurst (2002-03). He was the head coach at Division II Saint Joseph's College in 2004, leading the Pumas to a five-game improvement his first season from the year prior (2-9 to 7-4 record) on his way to Independent Football Alliance Coach of the Year honors. In addition, Lester coached at the prep level, serving as offensive coordinator at Saint Benedict High School in 2001 and at his alma mater, Wheaton Warrenville South High School in 2000.

Lester began his playing career at Western Michigan earning MAC Freshman of the Year honors in 1996. He would be a Second Team All-MAC selection his junior and senior seasons.

Lester finished his WMU career ranked fourth in FBS history in passing yards (11,299) and sixth in touchdown passes (87). Lester set 17 school passing records and eight MAC records. Following his senior season, in which he threw for 3,639 yards and 34 touchdowns, Lester participated in the 1999 Blue-Gray Classic.

As an assistant coach at WMU he coached quarterback Tim Hiller to MAC Freshman of the Year accolades in 2005. Lester was WMU's first QB to throw for over 11,000 career yards and Hiller went on to become the second.

After college, Lester played with the Chicago Enforcers of the NFL in 2001, the Nashville Kats and Carolina Cobras of the Arena Football League in 2001, and the Memphis Xplorers of the Arena Football League 2 in 2002.

A native of Wheaton, Illinois, Lester earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics from Western Michigan in 2000. He was inducted into the Western Michigan Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011.

Tim is married to wife, Dawn, and has four sons - Quinn, who is a sophomore men's volleyball player at Ball State in 2018-19, as well as three grade-school age sons - Cooper, Carter and Camden.

# ASSISTANT COACHES



## JAKE MORELAND

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR /  
OFFENSIVE LINE

10th Season  
Western Michigan, 2000

Jake Moreland is in his second season on head coach Tim Lester's staff at Western Michigan and is entering his ninth season overall as an assistant coach at WMU. Moreland was a four-year letterwinner as a tight end at Western Michigan, playing alongside Lester from 1996-99.

In his first season as offensive coordinator he coached an attack that boasted the 33rd-best rushing attack in the nation. The team averaged 32 points per game and 436.8 yards per game.

Moreland was the Co-Offensive Coordinator and worked with the Bronco offensive line in 2017 before getting promoted to Offensive Coordinator prior to the 2018 Spring. Moreland will continue to work with the offensive line this season. In his second stint in Kalamazoo, Moreland was also a tight ends coach for the Broncos from 2005-11.

During the 2017 season, Western Michigan produced three offensive linemen that earned All-Mid-American Conference honors. Offensive tackle Chukwuma Okorafor and center John Keenoy were first team selections, while right guard Luke Jurgia was named to the second team. The Bronco offensive line helped pave the way for a running game that was ranked 23rd in the nation in rushing offense with 224.8 yards per game.

Okorafor was one of six national semifinalists for the 2017 Outland Trophy and earned six All-America recognitions, including a first team nod from the *Football Writers Association of America*. He became just the third Bronco ever to earn All-American status from the FWA and only the second to be named to the first team. In April, Okorafor heard his name called in the NFL Draft, taken in the third round by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Okorafor was the first MAC player chosen in the 2018 draft, as well as the first player selected from the state of Michigan.

Prior to returning to Kalamazoo, Moreland coached tight ends at Air Force (2012-14, 2016) and Syracuse (2015). At Air Force, Moreland oversaw the development of several key contributors during 10-win seasons in 2014 and 2016, which included victories at the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl and the Arizona Bowl. Players he developed include Garrett Griffin, who went on to sign with the New Orleans Saints.

Throughout his coaching career, tight ends have had a period of success under Moreland, with three becoming semifinalists for the John Mackey Award given to the nation's top tight end. In 2008, Western Michigan's Branden Ledbetter finished his career with the most TDs by a tight end in program history (20) and recorded three consecutive seasons with at least six TDs. Three different tight ends scored six TDs in 2009.

In 2007, tight ends accounted for 10 of WMU's 23 scoring strikes (43 percent). Tight ends accounted for nearly 22 percent of the Broncos' aerial scores in 2008 and helped the offensive line block for the program's 15th 1,000-yard rusher.

During his first season back with the Broncos, Moreland had Tony Scheffler, ranked fourth in Mackey Award voting and a first-team All-MAC offense honoree, at his disposal and he came through with 670 yards

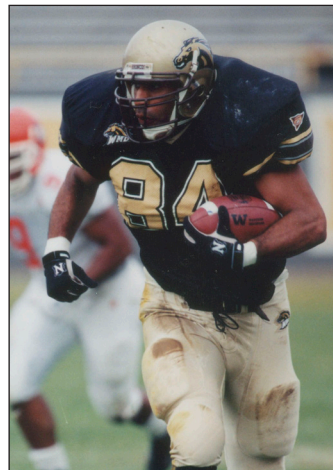
and nine scoring grabs. The tight end arsenal did not end there for Moreland as Ledbetter also came through in 2005 with a pair of touchdowns on 11 catches.

Scheffler was selected 61st overall in the 2006 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos. In two seasons, Scheffler hauled in 67 receptions for 835 yards and nine touchdowns. He grabbed five scoring receptions in 2007, bettering his rookie mark by one.

Moreland served as special teams coordinator and offensive assistant for Saint Joseph's College in 2004. During his tutelage, the Pumas set school records in seven offensive categories. Prior to arriving in Rensselaer, Moreland made his coaching debut at Elmhurst College in 2003. Working with tight ends, Moreland helped Elmhurst set 11 offensive records and record its first winning season in 15 years.

During his collegiate playing career, Moreland caught more passes (143) than any other tight end in school history and is tied for second in TDs (13) among tight ends. He earned All-MAC second-team honors and was tabbed WMU's offensive MVP in 1999, and was a first team All-MAC pick in 1998. Moreland went on to a professional career in the National Football League, playing for the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. He retired in 2002 shortly after signing with the Houston Texans.

A Milwaukee native, Moreland earned a bachelor's degree in business administration and marketing from Western Michigan in 2000. He and his wife, the former Anne Sampair, have three daughters, Courtney, Grace and Emma.

### **LOU ESPOSITO** DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / DEFENSIVE LINE

Sixth Season  
Memphis, 2001

Lou Esposito has served on Tim Lester's staff as the co-defensive coordinator/defensive line coach and was appointed as interim defensive coordinator on November 14, 2018. The interim tag was removed during the spring season, giving Esposito full control over the defense heading into 2019.

Esposito returned to Kalamazoo prior to the 2017 season after serving as the first head coach in Davenport University's program since 2014.

During his first stop in Kalamazoo from 2010-12, Esposito coached the defensive line. While working with the unit, he coached the MAC Defensive Player of the Year, Drew Nowak, in 2011. Nowak led the league in sacks with 2011. Nowak went on to be named a Phil Steele All-American. Esposito also coached Freddie Bishop who went on to play for the New York Jets in the NFL and Paul Hazel who played for Cleveland Browns, Houston Texans and N.Y. Giants.

At Davenport, the Panthers played their inaugural season in 2016, going 6-5. Off the field he was in charge of recruiting 125 student-athletes in two years to establish the program and oversee a multi-million-dollar fundraising campaign for the new football facility.

Prior to his time at Davenport, Esposito was defensive coordinator at Ferris State University. While there he improved the rush defense from 13th in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference to first in a single season and ranked in the top-25 in two of the national polls. He led a defense that finished in the Top-5 in many GLIAC statistical categories under his guidance in 2013. Ferris State led the GLIAC in total defense along with rushing defense and team passing efficiency defense.

A past Division I offensive lineman at the University of Memphis, Esposito spent five years as the head coach at Division II Saint Joseph's (Ind.) before moving to Western Michigan. At St. Joseph's, Esposito was the Great Lakes Football Conference Coach of the Year in 2006 and 2009 and posted a 30-25 record while recording a 100% graduation rate for four year athletes in his six years guiding the program. He led the team to a pair of GLFC championships in 2006 and 2009.

He coached 23 All-GLFC student-athletes in 2009 alone, ranking first in both rushing offense and defense. The Pumas also had the top-ranked red zone offense in the GLFC, boasting the 2009 GLFC Offensive Player of the Year and an unblemished record in conference play.

During his playing days at Memphis, Esposito was a 4-year letterwinner on the offensive line and served as the team captain in 1999 and 2000. Upon graduation, Lou signed a professional contract with the Arena Football League's Memphis Explorers and went on to coach on the Explorers' staff in 2002 and 2003.

Esposito, an AFCA member since 2003, and his wife Brooke have four children - Louis J. Esposito IV, Emilia Rose, Anthony and Mason.

Palcic joined the Western Michigan football staff in January 2019. Palcic comes to Western Michigan from Miami (Ohio), where he spent the previous five seasons, including the 2018 season as the RedHawks' special teams coordinator.

Miami led the Mid-American Conference and ranked No. 12 nationally for special teams S&P+ Ratings in 2018. S&P+ Ratings are derived from the play-by-play and drive data of all 800-plus of the season's FBS college football games (140,000-plus plays). The ratings take into account efficiency, explosiveness, and factors related to field position and finishing drives. In regards to special teams, the ratings are measured play-for-play special teams efficiency and weighted for overall importance.

Palcic's special teams were dominate throughout the MAC in 2018, finishing first in the conference in both kick return average (25.7) and kick coverage average (45.3). The RedHawks produced a pair of All-MAC performers in Maurice Thomas and Kyle Kramer. Thomas finished first in the MAC in kick return average (26.7), while Kramer had 30 of his 65 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

Prior to focusing on Miami's special teams, Palcic coached safeties from 2015 to 2017 and the RedHawk linebackers in 2014. In 2017 Miami ranked third in the MAC in scoring defense, third in total defense and fourth in pass defense. The RedHawks were ranked first in the MAC in

total defense in 2016 and fourth in pass defense.

Palcic spent the 2013 season with Alabama as a defensive analyst. Prior to joining the Crimson Tide, he was the defensive backs coach at Ashland University for one season, helping the Eagles to a perfect 11-0 regular season and was part of a defensive unit that led the GLIAC in scoring and total defense.

Palcic spent six seasons as the co-defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at Indiana from 2005-10, helping the Hoosiers advance to their first bowl game in 13 years (2006 Insight Bowl). Palcic's defense led the Big Ten in sacks (47), turnovers (31) and interceptions (19) in 2007.

In his time with the Hoosiers, Palcic mentored two former National Football League draft picks: Tracey Porter (2008, second round) and Ray Fisher (2010, seventh round). Porter would go on to intercept Peyton Manning in the fourth quarter of Super Bowl XLIV, securing a victory for the New Orleans Saints.

Before coaching at Indiana, Palcic was also at Miami from 1999-2004. In his first season he coached linebacker Dustin Cohen, who was named the 1999 Mid-American Conference Defensive Player of the Year. Palcic oversaw defensive backs and special teams from 2000-03 and was named the team's defensive coordinator in 2004. The 2003 RedHawks won the MAC Championship and finished the season 10th in the AP poll.

Palcic began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Eastern Michigan in 1998. He was an outside linebacker at Miami from 1994-97, completing his degree in sociology in 1998.

Palcic and his wife, Courtney, have one son, Nicholas and a daughter, Gabrielle.

Knights' receiving corps in 2015 and 2016. His pass catchers stood fourth nationally in yards per reception with a 17.9 average in 2016 during Army's successful 8-5 campaign, which included a 21-17 win over Navy and a 38-31 overtime victory against North Texas in the Zaxby's Heart of Dallas Bowl.

In his first year at West Point, Gaither coached Edgar Poe and DeAndre Bell to notable performances. Poe produced a trio of 100-yard receiving games and caught six touchdown passes, which was the most by a Black Knight since 2007, while Bell turned in career highs in receptions and yards as a senior.

Gaither was wide receivers coach at Ball State from 2011 to 2014 and helped guide the Cardinals to back-to-back bowl appearances following the 2012 (Beef 'O' Brady's) and 2013 (GoDaddy.com) seasons.

While in Muncie, Gaither was responsible for a combined three All-Mid-American Conference first-team selections in 2012 and 2013, along with second-team and third-team All-MAC picks in 2014. One of his top pupils was Willie Snead, who set BSU single-season receiving records in yardage (1,516), catches (106) and touchdowns (15) in 2013.

Gaither also impacted his players off the field as Briggs Orsbon earned Capital One Academic All-America honors in 2011, while Connor Ryan was a Capitol One Academic All-District choice a year later. Orsbon completed his career as only the second receiver in Ball State history to record over 200 career catches.

During his two-year stint at Elon in 2009 and 2010, Gaither helped Terrell Hudgins establish 19 NCAA, Southern Conference and Phoenix records and to a runner-up finish in the voting for the 2009 Walter Payton Award, which formally recognizes the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Player-of-the-Year. Additionally, Gaither mentored All-American pass catcher and Baltimore Ravens draft pick Aaron Mellette while at Elon.

Gaither began his coaching career in 1997 as defensive backs coach at Greensboro (N.C.) College before moving to Tusculum (Tenn.) College for the 1998 and 1999 campaigns. Following a five-year run as an assistant at alma mater Thomasville (N.C.) High School, Gaither returned to the college ranks as Winston-Salem State's recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach from 2005 to 2008.

A four-year starter and two-time all-region performer as a member of the Phoenix secondary, Gaither earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Elon in 1997.

Gaither and his wife Holly have four children: Jonesha, Akeem, Madison and Hazel.

Eric Evans spent his first season at Western Michigan as the running backs coach and in February 2018 transitioned to quarterbacks coach and pass game coordinator.

In his first season as the passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach the Bronco quarterbacks Jon Wassink and Caleb Eleby combined to throw 20 touchdowns. WMU gained 3,086 yards threw the air and averaged 237.8 yards per game.

In 2017, WMU's running game was ranked 23rd in the nation with 224.8 yards per game in 2017 and five different Bronco backs scored a touchdown.

Senior Jarvion Franklin set a number of school records, becoming WMU's all-time leading rusher with 4,867 career yards, and career rushing touchdowns leader with 52. A first team All-MAC selection, Franklin ran for a league-best 1,228 yards, averaging 102.3 yards per game. He totaled 11 touchdowns and was twice named MAC Player of the Week. Franklin signed a free agent contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers this past spring.

Evans arrived in Kalamazoo after coaching for three years as the Dayton offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He had two stints at Dayton, with the first coming as a graduate assistant from 2004-06. During his most recent stop, the Flyers went a combined 19-4 over the last two seasons and finished in the top 10 in numerous offensive categories. While also serving as quarterback coach, he developed Alex Jeske into a Pioneer Football League all-conference selection.

In 2014 Evans worked with quarterback Will Bardo who finished second in Dayton history in career yardage. Bardo upped his completion percentage by 10 points in one season after working with Evans.

In addition to working at Dayton, Evans also coached at Northwestern, UAB and Albany. At Northwestern, he was a graduate assistant for two years. He assisted with the quarterbacks, wide receivers and tight ends and helped build the Big Ten Conference's top passing offense at 307.9 ypg.

He was at Albany for five seasons where he coached wide receivers. Two of his wideouts, Ryan Kirchner and Tim Bush, finished first and second in career receptions at Albany. The Great Danes won Northeast Conference championships three times in those five years. They won the Gridiron Classic in 2008 and played in the NCAA FCS playoffs in 2011. Also in 2011, Evans participated at the NCAA Coaches' Academy.

During his first term at Dayton, Evans coached tight ends and was part of the offensive staff that transitioned the Flyer attack from running the option out of the I formation to a spread passing attack. One of Evans' pupils, Matt Champa, was Dayton's first tight end All-American in 55 years.

Before going back to Dayton, Evans also spent one season at UAB. As the running back coach for the Blazers, he coached Jordan Howard, who finished second nationally in rushing yards by a freshman. Howard would go

on to be drafted by the Chicago Bears in the 2016 NFL Draft. Evans also coached Darrin Reaves who signed in 2014 with the Carolina Panthers as an undrafted free agent.

As an undergraduate at DePauw University, Evans spent four years as a student assistant. He was the 2003 recipient of DePauw's Kenneth Brooks Holland Memorial Award.

Evans received his B.A. in kinesiology with a minor in history. A native of St. Charles, Ill., he earned a master's degree in exercise science from Dayton in 2006.

Evans is married to his wife, Rebecca.

### BILL KENNEY

**TIGHT ENDS**

Bill Kenney brings nearly three decades of experience at the Big Ten level to the Western Michigan football program as the tight ends coach for the Broncos.

Over the last five years, Kenney has mentored Bronco tight end Donnie Ernsberger, who was a second team All-MAC selection in 2017 and a third team All-MAC selection in 2016. Ernsberger scored four touchdowns and totaled 394 yards on 34 receptions this past season. He was invited to and played in the NFLPA Bowl and was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers this past spring.

Kenney has worked with both the tight ends and offensive tackles since joining the staff at WMU. During the 2016 MAC Championship season WMU had two first team All-MAC tackle selections in Chukwuma Okorafor and Taylor Moton. Moton was named an All-American in 2016 and drafted in the second round by the Carolina Panthers. Okorafor earned All-American status in 2017 and was drafted in the third round by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

In 2015, Kenney coached left tackle Willie Beavers to first team All-MAC honors. Beavers was the first Bronco offensive lineman since 2012 to earn first-team honors. Beavers also would be drafted, going in the fourth round to the Minnesota Vikings. He was WMU's first offensive lineman drafted since 1995.

In his second season at WMU in 2014, Kenney's work with the offensive tackles and tight ends helped produce the MAC's Offensive Player of the Year and Freshman of the Year in Jarvion Franklin.

Kenney brings 31 years of coaching experience to the Broncos with a bulk of that coming at Penn State University where he began as a graduate assistant (1988) and worked with the offensive line from 1989-2011. He took on the role of recruiting coordinator in 1992-95 and worked directly with offensive tackles and tight ends from 2000-11.

During his time with the Nittany Lions, Kenney coached six All-Americans and 18 All-Big Ten players. He coached 10 Academic All-Americans and 47 Academic All-Big Ten players.

Kenney developed 30 NFL players, 25 draft picks and five free agents, all of whom received their degrees from PSU. He recruited 32 NFL draft picks, including five first round picks. His offensive line paved the way for Larry Johnson to rush for a program record 2,587 yards and helped produce eight 1,000-yard rushers since 2002.

His offensive line ranked fourth nationally in sacks allowed in 2008, allowing just 13 sacks. In 2005 the Penn State offensive line allowed fewer than 15 sacks and finished second in the Big Ten in rushing and scoring.

Prior to joining Penn State, Kenney served as a graduate assistant at Nebraska (1986-87) and worked at his alma mater, Norwich University, in the offensive backfield in 1982. Kenney was a three-year starter at Norwich as a tight end/fullback and was team co-captain in 1981.

Kenney and his wife, Kathryn, have three children, Joseph, Matthew and Jacqueline.

Mike Bath joined the Western Michigan coaching staff as running backs coach on January 14, 2019.

Bath comes to Western Michigan after five seasons at Wyoming (2014-18) and previously was at Miami University (2004-09, 2011-19) and Ashland University (2009-11). Bath coached the Cowboy running backs, fullbacks, tight ends and has been a co-special teams coordinator during his time in Laramie.

In 2017, Bath coached senior fullback Drew Van Maanen, who was a semifinalist for the National Football Foundation's William V. Campbell Trophy, also referred to as the Academic Heisman. Wyoming's 2017 offense was extremely efficient in the red zone, scoring on 33 of 34 red-zone opportunities to rank No. 2 in the nation. The offense also did an excellent job of protecting the ball, committing only 14 turnovers to rank No. 19 in the country. UW's offense combined with its defense (38 turnovers forced) to rank No. 1 in the nation in turnover margin, with a +24 turnover margin.

Cowboy special teams also were among the nation's best in 2017. UW ranked No. 1 in the nation in kickoff returns (28.3 yards per return) and ranked No. 3 in the Mountain West and No. 30 in the nation in punt returns (10.26 yards per return). The punt return coverage team was also extremely effective, ranking No. 2 in the MW and No. 27 nationally, allowing opponents only 4.72 yards per return. Individually, Cowboy kickoff returner Tyler Hall earned Honorable Mention All-Mountain West honors as a sophomore.

Bath coached former Cowboy running back Brian Hill, who set the Wyoming career and single-season rushing records during his three-year career at Wyoming that ended in 2016. Hill concluded his career with 4,287 rushing yards, and in 2016 he set the Wyoming single-season rushing record of 1,860 yards. He ranked No. 3 in the nation in rushing yards in 2016 (1,860), ranked No. 4 in the NCAA in rushing touchdowns (22) and was 23rd in the nation in all-purpose yards (139.57 yards per game). Hill averaged 9.4 points per game to rank No. 12 in the nation, and he scored a total of 132 points to rank No. 7 nationally. Hill was one of only 10 national semifinalists for the Doak Walker Award, honoring the nation's premier running back each season. He earned Third Team All-America honors from College Sports Madness, and was selected First Team All-Mountain West by conference head coaches and media. Hill was invited to and participated in the 2017 NFL Draft Combine, and was selected in the fifth round of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons.

Bath helped coach the 2016 Cowboy offense that averaged 35.9 points per game to rank No. 2 in the Mountain West and No. 25 in the nation. The passing game, averaged 15.3 yards per completion to rank No. 8 in the NCAA, and in red-zone offense the Pokes converted 90.6 percent of their red-zone opportunities into scores to rank 14th in the country. Wyoming's offense ranked No. 1 in the MW and No. 22 in the NCAA in first downs (312), was No. 32 in the nation in time of possession (31:34), ranked No. 33 in the country in passing efficiency (143.82 rating) and No. 36 in the nation in rushing offense, averaging 205.4 yards per game.

The 2015 season saw Cowboy running back Shaun Wick named to the

Doak Walker Award Preseason Watch List. Later in the season, UW sophomore running back Hill was added to the Doak Walker Watch List, and Hill went on to be named one of only 11 semifinalists for the award and was the only semifinalist from a non-Power Five conference. Hill earned Second Team All-Mountain West honors in 2015, and ranked No. 8 in the nation in average rushing yards per game (135.9) and No. 9 in total rushing yards (1,631). His 1,631 rushing yards and 135.9 yards per game broke the Wyoming school records originally set by Ryan Christopherson in 1994. Wick ended his Wyoming career with 2,533 career rushing yards to rank No. 6 on the Wyoming career list.

In 2014, Bath coached Wick and Hill who combined for 1,589 rushing yards and eight 100-yard rushing games. Hill was selected the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Offensive Player of the Week for his performance at Fresno State in 2014. He accounted for 387 all-purpose yards against the Bulldgcs – 281 rushing yards and 106 receiving yards. Hill became only the fifth player in NCAA history to rush for at least 200 yards and have at least 100 yards receiving in a single game. His 387 all-purpose yards was the best single-game performance in the nation for the 2014 season and set a new University of Wyoming single-game record and a Mountain West Conference single-game record. His 281 rushing yards was the second best single-game performance in Wyoming school history.

Prior to coming to Wyoming, Bath served as the interim head coach at Miami, his alma mater, in 2013. He was named interim head coach on Oct. 6, 2013, and also assumed the role as offensive coordinator at that time after beginning the season coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Bath returned to his alma mater in 2011 to coach the wide receivers and tight ends. In 2012, he moved into the role of quarterbacks coach, and coached Miami QB Zac Dysert, who set school records for career total offense (12,678) and career passing yards (12,013). Dysert was drafted by the Denver Broncos in 2013, and was part of a Bronco team that made a run to the Super Bowl his rookie season. Bath also coached wide receiver Andy Cruse at Miami. Cruse signed a free-agent contract with the Houston Texans in 2013 and was on the Texans' practice squad his rookie year.

Bath began his college coaching career in 2004 as a graduate assistant coach for his alma mater. After serving as a graduate assistant in 2004 and 2005, he was named a full-time assistant in 2006 and coached the RedHawk tight ends for three seasons from 2006-08. Two of his tight ends, Tom Crabtree and Jake O'Connell, went on to play in the NFL.

In 2009, Bath accepted the opportunity to become the offensive coordinator at Ashland University in Ashland, Ohio. After serving as the offensive coordinator, quarterbacks and wide receivers coach for two seasons (2009-10), he returned to Miami in 2011.

During his time as an assistant coach at Miami, the RedHawks captured three Mid-American Conference (MAC) East Division Championships (2004, '05 and '07) and made an Independence Bowl appearance in 2004.

A three-year starter at quarterback for Miami from 1998-2000, he compiled a record of 23-10 as a starter and led the RedHawks to the MAC East Division Co-Championship as a sophomore in 1998. That team posted a 10-1 record overall and a 7-1 conference mark. Among those 10 wins in '98 was a 13-10 upset victory over No. 12 ranked North Carolina and a 14-13 non-conference victory over Army. His junior season, Miami upset Northwestern of the Big Ten by a score of 28-3 on the road, and his senior season, the RedHawks defeated Vanderbilt of the SEC 33-30 in

Nashville, Tenn. Bath was named his team's Co-MVP his senior season.

At the conclusion of his college playing career, Bath had set then Miami career records of 6,524 yards passing and 49 passing touchdowns.

He earned a double major at Miami in marketing and organizational behavior in 2001. Bath and his wife, Tara, have three children, Colton, Savannah and Case.

Trevor Adams joined the Western Michigan coaching staff as linebackers coach on January 14, 2019.

Adams arrived to Western Michigan from William & Mary, where he spent 18 seasons on staff, including five as the Tribe's defensive coordinator/linebackers coach and six seasons as the associate head coach.

Adams established himself as one of the most accomplished defensive line coaches in the FCS ranks at William & Mary. During his decade-long stint leading the defensive line, he also served as the program's recruiting coordinator.

As defensive coordinator, Adams developed outstanding student-athletes and produced the Colonial Athletic Association Defensive Player of the Year in 2014 and 2015 and a First Team All-American, one of just three in school history.

All-conference accolades quickly accumulated during Adams' stint as coordinator as well. Highlighting W&M's 15 all-conference defensive selections in the staff's tenure, five members of his linebacking corps have earned all-league distinction.

In addition to the postseason recognition, four of his former players have gone on to sign NFL contracts during the past four seasons. DeAndre Houston-Carson highlights the impressive group, as he was drafted in the sixth round by the Chicago Bears in 2016, while linebacker Luke Rhodes (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 2016), Reilly (Cleveland Browns, 2015) and defensive tackle Jasper Coleman (Houston Texans, 2015) all signed as free agents.

During his tenure as the Tribe's defensive line coach, Adams mentored a pair of 2010 NFL Draft picks - defensive end Adrian Tracy (New York Giants, sixth round) and tackle Sean Lissemore (Dallas Cowboys, seventh round). Both players garnered multiple All-America honors during their careers and joined former Tribe standout Adam O'Connor as defensive linemen who have earned national distinction under Adams' tutelage. Like Tracy and Lissemore, O'Connor signed an NFL contract when he inked a free agent deal with the Minnesota Vikings in the summer of 2007.

Some of the Tribe's most dominant defensive units came during Andrew's tenure as an assistant, as W&M ranked second nationally in scoring defense in 2009 and 2013 and sixth in 2010. Additionally, the 2016 squad led the nation in passing yards allowed per game (154.2).

Prior to assuming his responsibilities as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator, Adams worked as a defensive assistant at William & Mary for three seasons. Adams assisted with the Tribe cornerbacks in 2003 and helped groom first-team all-league selection Billy Parker, who signed as a free agent with the Car-

olina Panthers upon graduation.

Andrews came to W&M after spending the 2000 season as an assistant at Randolph-Macon College, where he worked as the secondary coach and special teams coordinator.

As a three-year letterwinner at defensive back for the University of Dayton, Andrews was a member of three conference championship teams with the Flyers and played on Dayton's undefeated 1996 squad (11-0).

After earning his B.S. in physical education from Dayton in 1998, Andrews accepted a graduate position at Illinois Wesleyan University and coached the secondary while working toward his graduate degree in athletic administration.

Andrews and his wife, Danielle, have four children: James, Sophia, Aiden and Anabelle.

James Adams joined the Western Michigan coaching staff as cornerbacks coach on January 14, 2019.

Adams previously was at Charlotte, where he was one of the five original staff members to start the 49ers football program. He served as the team's secondary coach from 2011-18. He also assisted with coaching special teams units including, kickoff, kickoff return, field goal block, punt and punt block.

In 2016 Charlotte led Conference USA with 16 interceptions (14th in NCAA DI) and ranked second in turnover margin (+8). He coached 2016 Freshman All-American, 2017 national leader in forced fumbles and 2018 team leader in tackles, Ben Deluca.

In 2015, Adams oversaw a secondary that ranked fourth in C-USA in pass defense in the program's first season at the FBS level. Charlotte ranked 25th in the FCS with 15 interceptions during the 49ers inaugural season of 2013. Charlotte added another 13 INT's in 2014. In 2015, Charlotte had 10 picks, led by CB Terrance Winchester who tied for first in C-USA with four interceptions.

In 2015, 49ers safety Desmond Cooper became the first Charlotte player to sign an NFL contract when he signed with the Jacksonville Jaguars. In 2016, safety Branden Dozier was invited to the Pittsburgh Steelers mini-camp.

Adams was at Wofford as the cornerbacks coach from 2010 to 2011, helping the Terriers win the 2010 Southern Conference championship. Wofford ranked first in the SoCon in total defense and passing defense that season.

Prior to Wofford, Adams worked at Wake Forest as recruiting assistant in 2008 and offensive graduate assistant in 2009.

A former Wake Forest linebacker whose career was cut short by a knee injury, Adams graduated in 2006. A Durham native, Adams attended Northern Durham High.

Adams and his wife, Tori, have two children: Londyn and Royce.

Wright joined the Western Michigan football staff in February 2018. He previously was an assistant on the Tennessee Tech staff in 2016 and 2017, overseeing special teams and defensive ends. At the beginning of the 2017 season, Wright was also promoted to be the defensive coordinator.

Before joining the Tennessee Tech staff, Wright spent the previous three seasons (2013-15) at Morehead State. Wright was a graduate assistant at Kentucky from 2007 to 2009, working with the linebackers his first season and the defensive line the following two. The Wildcats went to two Music City Bowls and one Liberty Bowl in his three years.

As a player, Wright was a four-year letterwinner at Miami University (Ohio) from 2003-06 and was part of two Mid-American Conference East Division championship teams. The RedHawks won the conference outright in 2003 and played in the GMAC Bowl, then won a division crown in 2004 and participated in the Independence Bowl. Wright started at linebacker his senior year and also played on special teams. He was teammates with NFL star Ben Roethlisberger.

A native of Louisa, Ky., Wright earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Miami in 2007.

## 1961 AVIATION BOWL

*New Mexico 28, Western Michigan 12*

Western Michigan made its postseason debut in the inaugural Aviation bowl on Dec. 9, 1961. The Broncos were led by quarterback Ed Chlebek, who completed 18 passes for 207 yards and one touchdown.

WMU fell behind 14-0 but bounced back on a Bob White scoring run from four yards out. New Mexico added two more scores before Chlebek found Dave Cooke in the end zone from five yards out for the final score of the game.



## 1988 CALIFORNIA BOWL

*Fresno State 35, Western Michigan 30*

Twenty-seven years after its first bowl trip, WMU made its second after capturing nine wins and winning its first Mid-American Conference title in program history and.

Western Michigan fell behind by two scores before fighting back to take a 17-14 lead into halftime. Robert Oliver hauled in a 31-yard pass from Tony Kimbrough for the team's first touchdown. Robert Davis followed with a 51-yard rushing TD to tie the game. John Creek made good on a 29-yard field goal to give the Broncos a 17-14 lead at the half.

Fresno State scored three touchdowns in the third quarter to regain the lead and held WMU to seven points in the third and six points in the fourth quarter.



## 2007 INTERNATIONAL BOWL

*Cincinnati 27, Western Michigan 24*

The Broncos played in the second inaugural bowl game in program history, taking on Big East opponent Cincinnati in the 2007 International Bowl.

Cincinnati raced out to a 24-0 lead, but the Broncos scored 17 unanswered points in the second quarter to cut the deficit to 24-17 at halftime. The Broncos had a chance at a late game-tying field goal to force overtime, but missed.

Western Michigan used trickery to get its offense jump started. Sophomore cornerback E.J. Biggers hit a streaking Jamarko Simmons on a 76-yard option pass off a double reverse in the second quarter. Quarterback Ryan Cubit then hit Herb Martin with a 30-yard touchdown pass. Matt Ludeman then intercepted a pass to set up a 30-yard field goal by Nate Meyer's, as WMU pulled within a touchdown, 24-17.

The Broncos tied the score at 24-24 in the fourth quarter on a 7-yard rushing touchdown by Brandon West. Cincinnati kicked a 33-yard field goal with 6:11 remaining to go ahead 27-24. The Broncos missed a 51-yard field goal on their final drive of the game.



## 2008 TEXAS BOWL

*Rice 38, Western Michigan 14*

Western Michigan played in front of what was then the second-largest bowl crowd in Mid-American Conference history against Rice in the Texas Bowl.

Rice rattled off 38 points before the Broncos were able to get on the board in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Tim Hiller found senior Kirk Elsworth from two yards out for WMU's first touchdown with 6:33 remaining in the game. Hiller completed a 13-yard touchdown to Schneider Julien with under a minute to go for the Broncos' second TD of the day.



## 2011 LITTLE CAESARS PIZZA BOWL

*Purdue 37, Western Michigan 32*

The Broncos posted 485 yards of offense in a narrow loss to Purdue in the 2011 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl.

WMU scored first on a 49-yard flea flicker to go up 8-0 after making a two-point conversion. The Broncos held a 15-10 advantage with seven minutes left in the second quarter. Purdue scored 17 unanswered to take the lead for good, going ahead 27-15 at halftime. WMU

outscored Purdue 17-10 in the second half, but fell short of the comeback.

Jordan White set a MAC bowl record with 265 receiving yards and his one-handed grab in the second half was the top play on that night's SportsCenter. Alex Carder threw for over 400 yards in a game for the fifth time in 2011, racking up 439 yards.



## 2014 FAMOUS IDAHO POTATO BOWL

*Air Force 38, Western Michigan 24*

Western Michigan was rewarded with its sixth bowl appearance in program history after an historic turnaround from 1-11 in 2013 to an 8-4 regular season finish in 2014.

Future No. 5 overall NFL draft pick Corey Davis had all three of WMU's touchdowns in the bowl game, making TD receptions of 47, 35 and 51 yards. Davis' three receiving TDs set a WMU bowl record. He had catches for 176 yards, second most receiving yards by a Bronco in a bowl. He was named WMU's MVP for the game.

The Broncos took an early 3-0 lead and led 10-6 after Davis' 47-yard touchdown reception from Zach Terrell to start the second quarter. Air Force responded with two TDs, taking a 20-10 advantage into halftime. The Falcons went up 23-10 with a field goal in the third quarter and outscored WMU 15-14 in the fourth quarter.



## 2015 POPEYES BAHAMAS BOWL

*Western Michigan 45, Middle Tennessee State 31*

WMU captured the first bowl victory in school history, defeating Middle Tennessee State, 45-31, in the Popeyes Bahamas Bowl.

The two teams combined for 34 points and 475 yards in the first quarter alone and the score was tied 17-17 at the half.

Western Michigan pulled away in the fourth quarter, taking a 14-point lead after back-to-back touchdown runs by MAC Freshman of the Year and the 2015 Popeyes Bahamas Bowl Offensive MVP Jamauri Bogan. Bogan rushed for 215 yards and four TDs. Corey Davis had 183 yards receiving and one touchdown. Daniel Braverman totaled 101 yards receiving and also had a touchdown.



## 2017 GOODYEAR COTTON BOWL CLASSIC

*#8 Wisconsin 24, #12 Western Michigan 18*

Western Michigan earned a trip to the second New Year's Six bowl game in Mid-American Conference history after finishing the regular season as MAC champions and with a perfect 13-0 record.

Western Michigan fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter before holding the Badgers to just seven points in the second half. Zach Terrell scored WMU's first touchdown on a 2-yard quarterback keeper in the second quarter. Butch Hampton drilled a 27-yard field goal for the Broncos in the third quarter. WMU pulled within a possession with 3:27 to go in the fourth quarter as Terrell hit Corey Davis on fourth down for a touchdown, throwing an 11-yard fade in the corner of the end zone.



## 2019 FAMOUS IDAHO POTATO BOWL

*BYU 49, Western Michigan 18*

Western Michigan was rewarded with its seventh bowl appearance in program history after finishing the regular season with a 7-5 record.

After an early touchdown pass by BYU's Dylan Collie gave the Cougars a 7-0 lead, the Broncos scored 10 points in the second quarter on a 33-yard touchdown run by Jamauri Bogan and a 37-yard field goal by Gavin Peddie. WMU held a 10-7 lead going into the half.

The second half was all BYU, with the Cougars scoring four touchdowns in the third quarter. Freshman quarterback Kaleb Eleby rushed for a touchdown in the midway through the fourth quarter to cut the score to 42-18 before BYU would add another late touchdown.

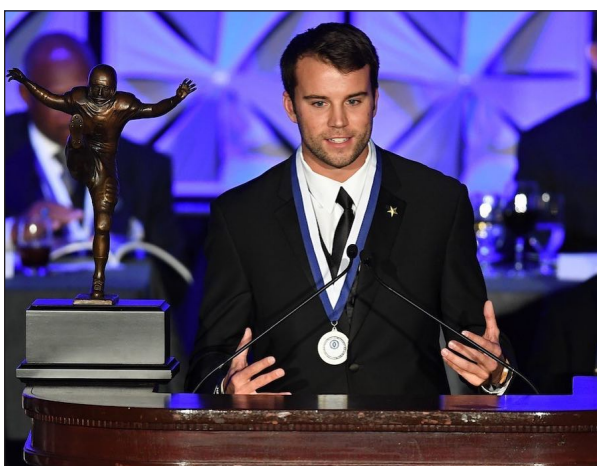
