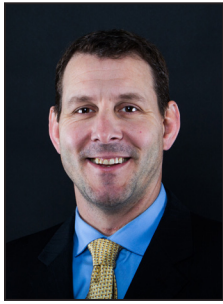

Tim Lester was named the 16th head football coach in school history on Friday, January 13, 2017.

Lester has risen through the coaching ranks after completing a Hall of Fame playing career at Western Michigan. He was a four-year starter at quarterback at WMU from 1996-99, leading the Broncos to a Mid-American Conference championship appearance his senior season. Lester also made a stop as an assistant coach at his alma mater during the 2005 and 2006 seasons. A native of Wheaton, Ill., Lester earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics from Western Michigan in 2000 and was inducted into the Western Michigan Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011.

In 2020, Lester guided the Broncos through an unprecedented season, impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. In a six-game, MAC-only schedule, WMU jumped out to a 4-0 start, highlighted by a third-straight win over rival Central Michigan, and dramatic victories over Toledo and Northern Illinois. That positioned the Broncos to head to Ball State in the season finale with the MAC West title on the line, but this time they fell short in dramatic fashion as the Cardinals kicked a game-winning field goal with 29 seconds left.

Lester's squad was recognized with 12 all-conference selections, including MAC Special Teams Player of the Year in D'Wayne Eskridge. Eskridge was also a finalist for the Paul Hornung Award, given annually to the most versatile player in college football, after leading FBS in all-purpose yards per game (213.0). The dozen All-MAC honorees ran the total number under Lester to 45, most in the league since 2017. The Broncos produced another high-flying offense, as they ranked 16th nationally in total offense and QB Kaleb Eleby finished third in the nation in passer rating, trailing only Heisman finalist Mac Jones (Alabama) and BYU's Zach Wilson.

Off the field, OL Mike Caliendo was named a semifinalist for the Wuerffel Trophy, as well as a MAC Distinguished Scholar-Athlete. Caliendo was one of 16 Academic All-MAC selections on the year, giving WMU 69 such honorees under Lester. That total ranks second in the league during his tenure.

His third season as head coach on the sidelines at Western Michigan featured an All-America linebacker, the MAC MVP, the league's offensive and defensive players of the year and the sixth consecutive year of bowl eligibility for the Broncos. WMU finished second in the MAC West Division and visited Dallas for the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

Under Lester's guidance, running back LeVante Bellamy led the nation in rushing touchdowns with 23 and was selected as the MAC's most valuable player and offensive player of the year. Second team All-America linebacker Treshaun Hayward was tabbed the league's defensive player of the year after leading the Broncos with 142 tackles, the most in the league and third most nationally. In all, 12 student-athletes received 13 All-MAC honors and three Broncos received East-West Shrine Bowl invitations: Bellamy, center Luke Juriga and tight end Giovanni Ricci. Bellamy also represented Western Michigan at the NFL Combine in Indianapolis from February 23 - March 2, 2020.

Off the field, 2019 was highlighted by quarterback Jon Wassink receiving the Wuerffel Trophy for his community service efforts and football performance, as well as being selected as a National Football Foundation (NFF) National Scholar-Athlete, making him a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy, commonly referred to as the Academic Heisman. Wassink was also named the NFF State of Michigan Chapter Michael R. Sadler D1 Scholar Athlete of the Year award winner.

The Broncos had 17 placed on the Football Academic All-MAC Team, and Wassink and offensive lineman Mike Caliendo received CoSIDA Academic All-District accolades. Since Lester took over the program in 2017, WMU leads the conference in Academic All-MAC selections with 53. Western Michigan had an additional six selections to the NFF Hampshire Honor Society, tied for the second most among Group of Five conferences. The Broncos have at least four players on the NFF Hampshire Honor Society in each of the last four seasons.

During the 2018 campaign, Lester guided the Broncos to bowl eligibility for the fifth-straight season, a program record, and a trip to the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl. Five Broncos earned All-MAC honors, including first team selections Bellamy and Juriga. WMU paced the conference in Academic All-MAC selections with 20, and five of them went on to earn MAC Distinguished Scholar Athlete honors.

In Lester's first season as head coach at Western Michigan, in 2017, the Broncos led the league with 12 all-conference selections and had 16 Academic All-MAC selections, five MAC Distinguished Scholar Athletes and a CoSIDA Academic All-District selection. As a team, the Broncos posted a 3.08 GPA. Offensive lineman Chukwuma Okorafor collected six All-America honors and Wyatt Pfeifer was an All-America long snapper.

Several school records were broken as running back Jarvion Franklin became WMU's all-time leading rusher with 4,867 career yards, and also set a school record for most career touchdowns with 56. Darius Phillips became the FBS all-time leader for career returns for TDs with 12 and tied the FBS record with five career interceptions returned for touchdowns. Phillips was named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year for the second-straight season and had 100-yard kickoff returns in back-to-back weeks to open the season at No. 4 Southern California and Michigan State.

Both Okorafor (3rd round, Pittsburgh) and Phillips (5th round, Cincinnati), as well as defensive back Sam Beal (3rd round, New York Giants), were NFL Draft picks.

Prior to taking the head coaching position at Western Michigan Lester was the quarterbacks coach at Purdue in 2016, mentoring sophomore signal-caller David Blough to 25 touchdown passes and 3,352 yards, averaging more than 279 yards passing per game.

Lester served as Syracuse's quarterbacks coach from 2013 to 2015 and doubled as offensive coordinator in 2014 and 2015.

Prior to working at Syracuse, Lester was the head coach at Division III Elmhurst (Illinois) College from 2008 to 2012. Over five seasons, he posted a 33-19 record for a .635 winning percentage, second highest in school history. In his final season in 2012, he led the Bluejays to a 10-2 record and a College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (CCIW) championship as well as Elmhurst's first NCAA playoff appearance. Lester was named the CCIW Coach of the Year that season.

Lester also served as an assistant at North Central College (2007) and Elmhurst (2002-03). He was the head coach at Division II Saint Joseph's College in 2004, receiving Independent Football Alliance Coach of the Year honors.

Lester started his playing career at Western Michigan with a bang, earning MAC Freshman of the Year honors in 1996. He was a Second Team All-MAC selection his junior and senior seasons. He finished his Bronco career ranked fourth in FBS history in passing yards (11,299) and sixth in touchdown passes (87). Lester set 17 school passing records and eight MAC records.

Lester and his wife, Dawn, have three sons, Camden, Carter and Cooper. Lester's oldest son, Quinn, is a three-year letterman (2018-19-20) on the Ball State men's volleyball team.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR (DE)
8TH SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
MEMPHIS, 2001

Lou Esposito joined the Western Michigan staff for his second stint in January of 2017 and serves as the defensive coordinator, mentoring Western Michigan's defensive ends. Esposito served as the defensive line coach from 2017-19 before shifting to defensive ends for the 2020 campaign.

Esposito began in 2017 as the co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach and was appointed as the interim defensive coordinator on November 14, 2018. The interim tag was removed during the spring of 2019. Esposito is entering his seventh season overall as an assistant coach at WMU, having served as the Broncos' defensive line coach from 2010-12.

The 2020 season proved a challenge unlike any other, as the Broncos played a six-game, MAC-only schedule due to the COVID-19 pandemic and Esposito had to navigate a season defined by injuries and uncertainty. Still, the WMU defense ranked 13th nationally with 3.17 sacks per game (19 in six games). In addition, the Bronco defense produced three All-MAC selections in first-team DL Ralph Holley, first-team safety Bricen Garner and third-team LB Treshaun Hayward.

Esposito's impact on the Bronco defense in 2019 was felt in the scoring column as WMU held opponents to just 25.9 points per game to stand second in the Mid-American Conference. The mark was the best for the program since yielding 19.8 in 2016. Western Michigan finished the 2018 season ranked 10th in the league, surrendering 34.5 points per contest.

The Broncos also went from 12th in the league in pass efficiency defense (160.69) in 2018 to seventh (136.70) under Esposito's direction in 2019. Western Michigan exceptionally stout in pass defense during the latter portion of the 2019 campaign, holding three of its final five opponents to less than 150 passing yards.

The defensive line excelled in 2019 as the Broncos finished third in the MAC in tackles for loss per game (6.50) and second in sacks per game (2.77). The Bronco defense finished 21st in the country in sacks per contest in 2019. A year earlier, WMU finished fifth in the league in sacks per contest with 2.4. Esposito's defense created 22 turnovers in 2019 to tie for the second most in the MAC, up from a seventh-place finish in the league in 2018.

Individually along the defensive line in 2019, Esposito guided junior Ali Fayad to second team All-MAC honors. The Dearborn, Mich., native finished first in the league with 0.31 fumbles recovered per game and sixth nationally. He also checked in second in the MAC in tackles for loss per game (1.13) and sacks per game (0.50). At Northern Illinois, Fayad finished with a career-high 4.5 TFL, the most by a Bronco in a game since Drew Nowak's 5.0 versus Akron on November 25, 2011.

Ralph Holley also grew under Esposito in 2019, collecting a team second-best 10.5 TFL to go along with 4.5 sacks. Holley recorded 38 tackles and a quarterback pressure and started every game.

All-America linebacker Treshaun Hayward thrived under Esposito, recording 142 tackles to stand third nationally. Fellow linebacker Drake Spears also turned in a strong senior year with Esposito at the helm of the defense, collecting 96 tackles, 2.5 TFL, 0.5 sacks, two interceptions and three quarterback pressures. Spears earned second team all-league honors.

As a whole, the Broncos' 2019 defense featured four players with 9.0 or more TFL, four with 4.5 or more sacks and six with 60 or more tackles. Involving the team's secondary in reaching the quarterback, Esposito was able to collect 12.5 TFL and 2.0 sacks from

WMU cornerbacks and safeties. Sophomore Patrick Lupro, who took over as a starting corner in week five, collected third team All-MAC accolades while racking up 64 tackles, 4.0 TFL, 1.0 sack, three interceptions and a team-high seven pass breakups.

The 2018 season had Esposito guide Fayad to 12.0 TFL and 7.5 sacks while racking up five quarterback pressures and four forced fumbles. Holley was another of Esposito's successful linemen, reaching 9.5 TFL and 7.0 sacks in 2018.

After Esposito's promotion to interim defensive coordinator, WMU defeated Northern Illinois 28-21 in the regular season finale. Esposito's unit limited the MAC West champion Huskies to 262 yards of total offense in the best league performance by the group of the season. As a team, Western Michigan finished the game against NIU with 4.0 sacks, 10.0 TFL and three turnovers gained.

During the 2017 season, sophomore Antonio Balabani was Esposito's most impactful defensive lineman, collecting 7.5 TFL and 4.0 sacks with three quarterback pressures. Senior Andre Turner chipped in with 6.0 stops behind the line of scrimmage, including 3.0 sacks.

Esposito returned to Kalamazoo prior to the 2017 season after serving as the first head coach in Davenport University's program since 2014.

At Davenport, the Panthers played their inaugural season in 2016, going 6-5. Off the field, Esposito was in charge of recruiting 125 student-athletes in two years to establish the program and oversee a multi-million-dollar fundraising campaign for the new football facility.

Prior to his time at Davenport, Esposito was defensive coordinator at Ferris State University, in 2013. While there, he improved the rush defense from 13th in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) to first in a single season and ranked in the top 25 in two of the national polls. He led a defense that finished in the top five in many GLIAC statistical categories in 2013. Ferris State led the GLIAC in total defense along with rushing defense and team passing efficiency defense.

During his first stop in Kalamazoo, from 2010-12, Esposito coached the defensive line. While working with the unit, he coached the 2011 MAC Defensive Player of the Year, Nowak, who led the league in sacks that year. Nowak went on to be named a Phil Steele All-American.

Esposito also coached Freddie Bishop, who went on to play for the New York Jets in the NFL. Paul Hazel was another NFL disciple of Esposito's, spending time with the Cleveland Browns, Houston Texans and New York Giants.

A past Division I offensive lineman at the University of Memphis, Esposito spent six years as the head coach at Division II Saint Joseph's (Ind.) College before moving to Western Michigan. At St. Joseph's, Esposito was the Great Lakes Football Conference (GLFC) Coach of the Year in 2006 and 2009 and posted a 30-25 record while recording a 100 percent graduation rate for four-year athletes in his years guiding the program. He led the team to a pair of GLFC championships in 2006 and 2009.

He coached 23 All-GLFC student-athletes in 2009 alone, ranking first in both rushing offense and defense. The Pumas also had the top-ranked red zone offense in the GLFC, boasting the 2009 GLFC Offensive Player of the Year and an unblemished record in conference play.

During his playing days at Memphis, Esposito was a four-year letterwinner on the offensive line and served as the team captain in 1999 and 2000.

Upon graduation, he signed a professional contract to play for the Arena Football League's Memphis Xplorers in 2001 and went on to join the Xplorers' coaching staff in 2002 and 2003.

Esposito and his wife, Brooke, have four children - Louis J. Esposito IV, Emilia Rose, Anthony and Mason.

**SPECIAL TEAMS COORD./SAFETIES
3RD SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
MIAMI (OHIO), 1998**

Joe Palcic joined the Western Michigan football staff in January 2019 and serves as the special teams coordinator and safeties coach. Palcic was the special teams coordinator in 2019 before adding duties as safeties coach for the 2020 season.

Special teams was a highlight in the abbreviated 2020 season, as D'Wayne Eskridge was named Mid-American Conference Special Teams Player of the Year and a finalist for the Paul Hornung Award (most versatile player in FBS). Eskridge was one of two players in the MAC with a kickoff return for a TD and his 27.5 yards per kickoff return led the league. He led FBS in all-purpose yards (213.0) and was the only player in the nation to average more than 200 all-purpose yards per game.

Eskridge aside, Palcic saw both of his position groups earn All-MAC honors in 2020, as Bricen Garner was named a first-team selection at safety and Nick Mihalic was named the league's third-team punter. Garner ranked ninth in the MAC in break-ups. Mihalic punted 18 times with just three touchbacks and six inside the opponent 20-yard line. He had four punts of over 50 yards and a long of 68 yards.

2019 featured tremendous special teams success for the Broncos. The kickoff return unit led the Mid-American Conference with 24.5 yards per runback to stand 17th nationally. Individually, graduate transfer Keith Mixon Jr. finished first in the league in kickoff return average (28.0) and 10th in the country. Mixon Jr. earned first team All-MAC honors as a kickoff returner and added third team accolades as a punt returner.

Palcic turned around WMU's punting game, guiding sophomore Nick Mihalic to a 41.9 yards per boot average, the sixth best in the MAC, and up from 37.3 yards a punt in 2018.

Palcic also took great strides in improving the Broncos' kickoff unit. Western Michigan averaged 56.3 yards a kickoff in 2019, up from 54.8 yards in 2018. As a team, the Broncos registered six touchbacks in 2018 to rank 129th out of 130 nationally. WMU finished with 15 touchbacks in 2019.

Palcic arrived in Kalamazoo after five seasons at Miami (Ohio), including the 2018 campaign as the RedHawks' special teams coordinator.

Miami led the Mid-American Conference and ranked No. 12 nationally for special teams S&P+ Ratings in 2018. S&P+ Ratings are derived from the play-by-play and drive data of all 800-plus of the season's FBS college football games (140,000-plus plays). The ratings take into account efficiency, explosiveness and factors related to field position and finishing drives. In regard to special teams, the ratings consider play-for-play special teams efficiency and are weighted for overall importance.

Palcic's special teams were dominant throughout the MAC in 2018, finishing first in the conference in both kick return average (25.7 yards) and kick coverage average (45.3 yards). The RedHawks produced a pair of All-MAC performers in Maurice Thomas and Kyle Kramer. Thomas finished first in the MAC in kick return average (26.7 yards), while Kramer had 30 of his 65 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line.

Prior to focusing on Miami's special teams, Palcic coached safeties from 2015 to 2017 and the RedHawk linebackers in 2014. In 2017 Miami ranked third in the MAC in scoring defense, third in total defense and fourth in pass defense. The RedHawks were ranked first in the MAC in total defense in 2016 and fourth in pass defense.

Palcic spent the 2013 season with Alabama as a defensive analyst. Prior to joining the Crimson Tide, he was the defensive backs coach at Ashland University for one season, helping the Eagles to a perfect 11-0 regular season and was part of a defensive unit that led the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in scoring and total defense.

Palcic spent six seasons as the co-defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at Indiana from 2005-10, helping the Hoosiers advance to their first bowl game in 14 years (2007 Insight Bowl). Palcic's defense led the Big Ten in sacks (47), turnovers (31) and interceptions (19) in 2007.

In his time with the Hoosiers, Palcic mentored two former National Football League draft picks: Tracy Porter (2008, second round) and Ray Fisher (2010, seventh round). Porter went on to intercept Peyton Manning in the fourth quarter of Super Bowl XLIV, securing a victory for the New Orleans Saints.

Before coaching at Indiana, Palcic was also at Miami from 1999-2004. In his first season he coached linebacker Dustin Cohen, who was named the 1999 Mid-American Conference Defensive Player of the Year. Palcic oversaw defensive backs and special teams from 2000-03 and was named the team's defensive coordinator in 2004. The 2003 RedHawks won the MAC Championship and finished the season 10th in the AP poll.

Palcic began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Eastern Michigan in 1998. He was an outside linebacker at Miami from 1994-97, completing his degree in sociology in 1998.

Palcic and his wife, Courtney, have one son, Nicholas, and a daughter, Gabrielle.



Eric Evans

CO-OFFENSIVE COORD./QUARTERBACKS
5TH SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
DePAUW, 2004

Eric Evans joined the Western Michigan staff in January of 2017 and serves as the Passing Game Coordinator while mentoring the Bronco quarterbacks. On game days, Evans also serves as WMU's offensive play caller.

Evans was the running backs coach for WMU during the 2017 campaign and transitioned to his current role as quarterback coach and passing game coordinator in February of 2018. Prior to the 2019 campaign, Evans picked up offensive play calling duties.

He helped direct another prolific offense in 2020, in spite of playing just six MAC games due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Broncos ranked 23rd nationally in passing offense and led the nation in yards per completion (17.19). WMU finished ninth nationally at 41.7 points per game, reaching 30 points in five of six games. The offense thrived under the direction of QB Kaleb Eleby, the first-team All-MAC QB according to Pro Football Focus and third team according to the league's coaches. Eleby finished third in FBS in passer rating (195.1), trailing only Alabama Heisman finalist Mac Jones and BYU's Zack Wilson. Eleby was responsible for 22.0 points per game on the year, third in the nation.

Eleby's go-to-target was WR D'Wayne Eskridge, a first-team All-MAC selection at receiver. He ranked fourth in the nation and led the league with 130.7 receiving yards per game and was the only player in the country to average more than 200 all-purpose yards per game. In addition, third-team All-MAC receiver Jaylen Hall led the country in yards per reception with 26.92. Skyy Moore gave the Broncos a third All-MAC receiver in 2020, earning second team honors thanks to 388 receiving yards and three TDs.

The Broncos' 2019 season was highlighted by an explosive offense, guided by senior quarterback Jon Wassink. Western Michigan's offense finished the year ranked in the top 30 nationally in third-down conversions (45.3 percent/23rd), total offense (445.7 yards per game/25th) and scoring offense (33.1 points per game/30th).

Individually, Wassink earned third team All-MAC honors. He ended the campaign standing 29th nationally in total passing yards (3,097), 35th in total offensive yards per game (262.8), 37th in passing yards per completion (12.85) and 39th in passing yards per game (238.2).

The powerful offense helped Western Michigan produce a Doak Walker Award semifinalist, senior LeVante Bellamy, and a John Mackey Award semifinalist, senior Giovanni Ricci. The Doak Walker Award is given to the top running back in college football, and the John Mackey Award honors the nation's best collegiate tight end. The Broncos joined Alabama, Clemson, Iowa State, LSU, Minnesota, Oklahoma, SMU and Utah as the programs with two or more different semifinalists for the top offensive awards in the 2019 season.

Off the field, Wassink was named was one of 12 recipients of the 2019 NFF National Scholar-Athlete Award, presented by Fidelity Investments. The selection made him a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy® Presented by Mazda. The Campbell Trophy is commonly referred to as the Academic Heisman. Wassink also received the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy, presented by the Chick-fil-A® Foundation. The award is given annually to the FBS football player who best combines exemplary community service with academic and athletic achievement. Western Michigan's Tim Hiller won the 2009 Wuerffel Trophy, allowing Western Michigan to join Oklahoma as the only programs with multiple Wuerffel Trophies.

In Evans' first season as the passing game coordinator and quarterbacks coach, Wassink and Kaleb Eleby combined to throw 20 touchdowns in 2018. WMU gained 3,086

yards through the air and averaged 237.8 yards per game.

Wassink started the first nine games for the Broncos during 2018 before an injury forced true freshman Eleby into action. With Evans' guidance, Eleby completed 62.6 percent of his passes for 1,092 yards and four touchdowns during his time under center. The Broncos finished the year ranked 31st nationally in total first downs (296), 35th in total offense (436.8 yards/game) and 38th in rushing offense (199.5 yards/game) and scoring offense (32.0 points/game).

In 2017, WMU's running game was ranked 23rd in the nation with 224.8 yards per game in 2017 and five Bronco backs scored a touchdown.

Senior Jarvion Franklin set a number of school records, becoming WMU's all-time leading rusher with 4,867 career yards, and career rushing touchdowns leader with 52. A first team All-MAC selection, Franklin ran for a league-best 1,228 yards, averaging 102.3 yards per game. He totaled 11 touchdowns and was twice named MAC Player of the Week. Franklin signed a free agent contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers in April 2018.

Evans arrived in Kalamazoo after three years, 2014-16, as the University of Dayton's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He had two stints at Dayton, with the first coming as a graduate assistant from 2004-06. During his second stop, the Flyers went a combined 19-4 over the last two seasons and finished in the top 10 in numerous offensive categories. While also serving as quarterbacks coach, Evans developed Alex Jeske into a Pioneer Football League all-conference selection. In 2014 Evans worked with quarterback Will Bardo, who finished second in Dayton history in career yardage. Bardo upped his completion percentage by 10 points in one season after working with Evans.

Before going back to Dayton, Evans also spent the 2013 season at UAB. As the running back coach for the Blazers, he worked with Jordan Howard, who finished second nationally in rushing yards by a freshman. Howard went on to be selected by the Chicago Bears in the 2016 NFL Draft. Evans also coached Darrin Reaves, who signed in 2014 with the Carolina Panthers as an undrafted free agent.

He was at Albany for five seasons, from 2008-12, coaching wide receivers. Two of his wideouts, Ryan Kirchner and Tim Bush, finished first and second in career receptions at Albany. The Great Danes won Northeast Conference championships three times in those five years. They won the Gridiron Classic in 2008 and played in the NCAA FCS playoffs in 2011. Also in 2011, Evans participated at the NCAA Coaches' Academy.

At Northwestern, he was a graduate assistant for two years, from 2006-07. He worked with the quarterbacks, wide receivers and tight ends and helped build the Big Ten Conference's top passing offense at 307.9 yards per game.

During his first term at Dayton, from 2004-05, Evans coached tight ends and was part of the offensive staff that transitioned the Flyer attack from running the option out of the I formation to a spread passing attack. One of Evans' pupils, Matt Champa, was Dayton's first All-America tight end in 55 years.

As an undergraduate at DePauw University, Evans spent four years as a student assistant. He was the 2003 recipient of DePauw's Kenneth Brooks Holland Memorial Award.

Evans received his B.A. in kinesiology with a minor in history in 2004. A native of St. Charles, Ill., he earned a master's degree in exercise science from Dayton in 2006.

Evans and his wife, Rebecca, have a son, Carter.



Trevor Andrews

LINEBACKERS

**3RD SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
DAYTON, 1998**

Trevor Andrews joined the Western Michigan coaching staff on January 14, 2019, as an assistant coach, mentoring the squad's linebackers.

Andrews mentored LB Treshaun Hayward to All-MAC honors for a second consecutive season. Hayward finished 2020 ranked seventh in the MAC in both total tackles (58) and solo tackles (30). During his first year in Kalamazoo, Andrews helped Hayward to All-America accolades from Sporting News. Hayward finished the season booking a team-high 142 tackles, good for the third most nationally. His 10.92 tackles per game were the sixth most in the country.

Hayward, a native of Ypsilanti, Mich., was named the Mid-American Conference Defensive Player of the Year, becoming the eighth MAC Defensive Player of the Year, joining John Offerdahl (1985), Mark Garalczyk (1986), Sean Mulhearn (1990), Jason Babin (2002 & 2003), Ameer Ismail (2006) and Drew Nowak (2011). Hayward was twice selected as the MAC West Division Defensive Player of the Week in 2019 and was named first team all-league for the first time in his career.

Andrews also mentored senior Drake Spears to second team all-league honors and a MAC Defensive Player of the Week nod after returning an interception 74 yards for a touchdown against Miami (Ohio). Spears finished second on the team in tackles with 96.

As a team, Andrews' linebackers helped WMU improve from allowing 34.5 points per game in 2018 to 25.9 in 2019, the second-best mark in the MAC and the best for the program since yielding 19.8 during the 2016 campaign.

Andrews arrived at Western Michigan from William & Mary, where he spent 18 seasons on staff, including five as the Tribe's defensive coordinator/linebackers coach and six seasons as the associate head coach.

Andrews established himself as one of the most accomplished defensive line coaches in the FCS ranks at William & Mary. During his decade-long stint leading the defensive line, he also served as the program's recruiting coordinator.

As the Tribe's defensive coordinator, Andrews developed outstanding student-athletes and produced the Colonial Athletic Association Defensive Player of the Year in 2014 and 2015 and a first team All-America, one of just three in school history.

All-conference accolades quickly accumulated during Andrews' stint as coordinator as well. Highlighting W&M's 15 all-conference defensive selections in the staff's tenure, five members of his linebacking corps earned all-league distinction.

In addition to the postseason recognition, four of his former players have gone on to sign NFL contracts during his final four years at William & Mary. DeAndre Houston-Carson highlighted the impressive group, as he was drafted in the sixth round by the Chicago Bears in 2016, while linebacker Luke Rhodes (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 2016), Mike Reilly (Cleveland Browns, 2015) and defensive tackle Jasper Coleman (Houston Texans, 2015) all signed as free agents.

During his tenure as the Tribe's defensive line coach, Andrews mentored a pair of 2010 NFL Draft picks - defensive end Adrian Tracy (New York Giants, sixth round) and tackle Sean Lissemore (Dallas Cowboys, seventh round). Both players garnered multiple All-America honors during their careers and joined former Tribe defensive line standout Adam O'Connor, who earned national distinction under Andrews' tutelage. Like Tracy and

Lissemore, O'Connor signed an NFL contract when he inked a free agent deal with the Minnesota Vikings in the summer of 2007.

Some of the Tribe's most dominant defensive units came during Andrews' tenure as an assistant, as W&M ranked second nationally in scoring defense in 2009 and 2013 and sixth in 2010. Additionally, the 2016 squad led the nation in passing yards allowed per game (154.2).

Prior to assuming his responsibilities as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator, Andrews worked as a defensive assistant at William & Mary for three seasons. Andrews assisted with the Tribe cornerbacks in 2003 and helped groom first-team all-league selection Billy Parker, who signed as a free agent with the Carolina Panthers upon graduation.

Andrews joined W&M after spending the 2000 season as an assistant at Randolph-Macon College, where he worked as the secondary coach and special teams coordinator.

As a three-year letterwinner at defensive back for the University of Dayton, Andrews was a member of three conference championship teams with the Flyers and played on Dayton's undefeated 1996 squad (11-0).

After earning his B.S. in physical education from Dayton in 1998, Andrews accepted a graduate position at Illinois Wesleyan University and coached the secondary while working toward his graduate degree in athletic administration.

Andrews and his wife, Danielle, have four children, James, Sophia, Aiden and Annabelle.



Mike Bath

**CO-OFFENSIVE COORD./RUNNING BACKS
3RD SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
MIAMI (OHIO), 2000**

Mike Bath joined the Western Michigan coaching staff as an assistant coach on January 14, 2019, and oversees the program's running backs.

The unprecedented 2020 campaign saw the Broncos play just six MAC games due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but Bath's running backs still proved an integral part of a WMU offense that ranked ninth nationally in scoring. La'Darius Jefferson paced the stable of running backs by earning second-team All-MAC honors after his 624 rushing yards (104.0 per game) ranked fourth in the league. In addition, Jaxson Kincaide made the most of his 31 carries by averaging 7.03 yards per rush, seventh in the league. All together, the WMU rushing attack ranked in the top four in the MAC in both total rushing yards (1,159) and touchdowns (14).

His first year in Kalamazoo was an undeniable success with senior LeVante Bellamy being named the Mid-American Conference Vern Smith Leadership Award as the league's MVP, as well as the MAC Offensive Player of the Year. Bellamy was one of 10 semifinalists for the Doak Walker Award, presented annually to the nation's top running back.

Bath helped Bellamy finish an outstanding 2019 season leading the country in rushing touchdowns with 23. Bellamy also finished the year ranked third nationally in points per game (10.6), fourth in total touchdowns scored (23), fifth in total points scored (138), ninth in rushing yards per game (113.2) and 10th in total rushing yards (1,472). At the conclusion of the 2019 campaign, Bellamy represented Western Michigan in the East-West Shrine Bowl and at the NFL Combine in Indianapolis from February 23 - March 2, 2020.

As a whole, Bath helped the offense to 33.1 points per game, good for 30th in the country. The Broncos also turned in a 6-0 home ledger, the 12th unbeaten home season in program history.

Bath arrived in Kalamazoo after five seasons at Wyoming (2014-18) and stints at Miami University (2004-09, 2011-13) and Ashland University (2009-10). Bath coached the Cowboy running backs, fullbacks and tight ends and was a co-special teams coordinator during his time in Laramie.

In 2017, Bath guided senior fullback Drew Van Maanen, who was a semifinalist for the National Football Foundation's William V. Campbell Trophy, also referred to as the Academic Heisman. The Cowboys' 2017 offense was extremely efficient in the red zone, scoring on 33-of-34 opportunities to rank No. 2 in the nation. The unit committed only 14 turnovers to stand 19th nationally and led the country in turnover margin at +24.

Cowboy special teams also were among the nation's best in 2017. Wyoming topped the country in kickoff returns (28.3 yards per return) and ranked 30th in punt returns (10.26 yards per return). The punt return coverage team was also extremely effective, ranking No. 2 in the conference and No. 27 nationally, allowing opponents only 4.72 yards per return. Individually, Cowboy kickoff returner Tyler Hall earned honorable mention All-Mountain West honors as a sophomore.

Bath coached former Cowboy running back Brian Hill, who set Wyoming career and single-season rushing records during his three-year career, which ended in 2016. Hill finished with 4,287 rushing yards, and, in 2016, set the Wyoming single-season rushing record with 1,860 yards. Hill was one of 10 national semifinalists for the 2016 Doak Walker Award and earned third team All-America honors from College Sports Madness. Hill was invited to and participated in the 2017 NFL Combine, and was selected in the fifth round of the 2017 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons.

Bath helped a 2016 Cowboy offense that averaged 35.9 points per game to rank second in the Mountain West and 25th in the nation. The passing game averaged a stout 15.3 yards per completion to stand eighth in the country.

The 2015 season saw Cowboy running back Shaun Wick named to the Doak Walker Award Preseason Watch List. Later in the season, Hill was added to the Doak Walker Watch List and went on to be named one of 11 semifinalists for the award and was the only semifinalist from a non-Power 5 conference. Hill earned second team All-Mountain West honors in 2015, and ranked No. 8 in the nation in average rushing yards per game (135.9) and No. 9 in total rushing yards (1,631). His 1,631 rushing yards and 135.9 yards per game broke the Wyoming program records set by Ryan Christopherson in 1994. Wick ended his Wyoming career with 2,533 career rushing yards to rank No. 6 on

the Wyoming career list.

In 2014, Bath coached Wick and Hill who combined for 1,589 rushing yards and eight 100-yard rushing games. Hill was selected the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Offensive Player of the Week for his performance at Fresno State in that season as he accounted for 387 all-purpose yards against the Bulldogs - 281 rushing yards and 106 receiving yards. He became only the fifth player in NCAA history to rush for at least 200 yards and have at least 100 yards receiving in a single game. His 387 all-purpose yards set a Wyoming single-game record and a Mountain West Conference single-game record. His 281 rushing yards was the second best single-game performance in Wyoming program history.

Prior to joining Wyoming, Bath served as the interim head coach at Miami (Ohio), his alma mater, in 2013. He was named interim head coach on October 6, 2013, and assumed offensive coordinator duties at that time after beginning the season coaching the quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Bath had returned to his alma mater in 2011 to coach the wide receivers and tight ends. In 2012, he moved into the role of quarterbacks coach, and worked with Zac Dysert, who set program records for career total offense (12,678) and career passing yards (12,013). Dysert was drafted by the Denver Broncos in 2013 and was part of a Bronco team that made a run to the Super Bowl his rookie season.

Bath began his college coaching career in 2004 as a graduate assistant coach for his alma mater. After serving as a graduate assistant in 2004 and 2005, he was named a full-time assistant in 2006 and coached the RedHawk tight ends for three seasons, from 2006-08. During his time as an assistant coach at Miami, the RedHawks captured three MAC East Division Championships (2004, 2005 & 2007) and made an Independence Bowl appearance in 2004.

Two of his tight ends, Tom Crabtree and Jake O'Connell, went on to play in the NFL while wide receivers Andy Cruse, Chris Givens and Nick Harwell all went on to the NFL following Bath's guidance.

In 2009 and 2010, Bath served as the offensive coordinator at Ashland University in Ashland, Ohio. During the 2009 campaign, Bath helped quarterback Billy Cundiff to 2,482 passing yards, 24 touchdowns and a completion percentage of 65.9 while throwing just one interception. As a whole, the Eagle offense averaged 29.2 points per game, 403.0 yards per contest and 43 percent conversion rate on third downs. Cundiff capped his Ashland career with a trio of all-league selections.

A year later, in 2010, Bath helped first-year starting quarterback Taylor Housewright to 2,378 yards, 24 TDs and 13.3 yards per completion. Housewright guided the Eagles to 37.7 points per game, 421.4 yards per game and a 47 percent conversion rate on third down attempts.

Both Cundiff and Housewright signed NFL free agent contracts following their Eagle careers.

A three-year starter at quarterback for Miami from 1998-2000, Bath compiled a record of 23-10 as a starter and led the RedHawks to the MAC East Division co-championship as a sophomore in 1998. That team posted a 10-1 overall record and a 7-1 conference mark. Among those 10 wins in 1998 was a 13-10 upset victory over No. 12 North Carolina and a 14-13 victory over Army. During Bath's junior season, Miami upset Northwestern 28-3 in Evanston. As a senior, Bath helped the RedHawks win 33-30 at Vanderbilt. Bath was named his team's co-MVP his senior season.

At the conclusion of his college playing career, Bath held program career records of 6,524 yards passing and 49 passing touchdowns.

He graduated from Miami with a double major in marketing and organizational behavior in 2001.

Bath and his wife, Tara, have four children, Colton, Savannah, Case and Cannon.



Marvin Cleidor

CORNERBACKS

**2ND SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
LAFAYETTE, 2009**

Marvin Cleidor joined the Western Michigan coaching staff on March 4, 2020, as an assistant coach, mentoring the squad's cornerbacks.

Patrick Lupro, Calin Crawford and Keith Jones Jr. led the Bronco cornerbacks during the abbreviated 2020 campaign (only six MAC games due to the COVID-19 pandemic). Lupro made 28 tackles, including two for loss, while breaking up three passes. Crawford contributed 21 tackles and Jones made 18 tackles to go along with three break-ups.

Cleidor came to WMU after spending the last three seasons at Princeton University. He was with Princeton as the co-defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach since the 2017 campaign. In 2019, the Tigers posted an 8-2 record and went 5-2 in Ivy League competition. Under his watch, opponents scored just 18.1 points per game and were limited to 113.1 rushing yards per game. Individually, defensive back Delan Stallworth ranked third on the team with 60 tackles and paced the squad with four pass breakups en route to earning first team all-league honors. Cleidor helped linebacker Jeremiah Tyler receive unanimous first team all-Ivy accolades in 2019.

The 2018 campaign was a record breaker for Princeton as it turned in the second unbeaten season in program history at 10-0 and 7-0 in Ivy action. Cleidor helped the Tigers rank among the top 10 nationally in scoring defense (fourth, 13.0 points per game) and total defense (10th, 297.3 yards per game). He coached a trio of all-Ivy defensive backs during the season in TJ Floyd (first team), Stallworth (second team) and Ben Ellis (second team).

In his first season, Cleidor oversaw the development of a young defensive backfield that included two freshman starters, CJ Wall and Trevor Forbes. Wall was a two-time Ivy League Rookie of the Week, while Forbes earned the Harland "Pink" Baker Award as the team's top defensive freshman.

Prior to Princeton, Cleidor spent the 2015 and 2016 seasons at William & Mary. With the Tribe, he coached one of the top FCS defensive backs in DeAndre Houston-Carson, who was the 2015 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Co-Defensive Player of the Year and a consensus first-team All-America. Houston-Carson was drafted in the sixth round by the Chicago Bears and played eight games for the Bears during his rookie season. Cleidor also guided cornerback Trey Reed to multiple All-CAA honors during his time at William & Mary.

Cleidor joined the William & Mary staff after serving as the secondary coach and director of player development and personnel at Monmouth University for three seasons (2012-14). During his tenure with the Hawks, he helped develop cornerback Tevrin Brandon, a New York Jets signee, as well as first-team all-conference safety Mike Basile.

During the 2011 season, Cleidor worked as a defensive graduate assistant at Rutgers and helped the Scarlet Knights post a 9-4 record, which ended with a win in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. During his time with Rutgers, he coached first-team All-Big East safety Duron Harmon and second-team All-Big East cornerback Logan Ryan.

Cleidor's other coaching stops include one-year stints at Wagner College (2010) and Wilkes University (2009). At Wagner, he coached cornerbacks and helped develop a pair of all-conference standouts as the Seahawks ranked 15th nationally in pass defense in 2010.

A three-year starter as a defensive back at Lafayette College (2005-09), Cleidor helped the Leopards earn back-to-back Patriot League championships in 2005 and 2006. The two-time all-conference selection (2007-08) finished his career with 114 tackles and four interceptions, while he ranked second in the league in pass breakups as a junior.

Cleidor received his bachelor's degree from Lafayette in 2009 and earned an MBA from Wagner in 2012.



Greg Harbaugh Jr.

WIDE RECEIVERS

**2ND SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
AVERETT, 2009**

Greg Harbaugh Jr. joined the Western Michigan staff in January of 2020 and serves as an Assistant Coach while mentoring the Bronco wide receivers. Harbaugh Jr. (pronounced HAR-bow) returns to WMU after spending the 2015 and 2016 seasons as an offensive graduate assistant.

His return to WMU proved fruitful in year one, in spite of WMU playing just a six-game MAC season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. WR D'Wayne Eskridge was a first team All-MAC selection at receiver, in addition to winning MAC Special Teams Player of the Year. Eskridge led the nation with 210.0 all-purpose yards per game, while 130.7 of those were receiving yards, a total which led the MAC and ranked fourth in FBS. In addition, Skyy Moore earned second-team All-MAC honors and Jaylen Hall was named third team. Moore ranked 11th in the MAC with 388 receiving yards, while Hall led FBS in yards per reception (26.92).

Harbaugh Jr. was with the University of Minnesota as a quality control assistant during the 2019 season, helping the Gophers to an Outback Bowl championship with a 31-24 victory against No. 9 Auburn. Minnesota finished the season with an 11-2 record, capturing 11 victories for the first time since 1904. The Gophers also posted two Associated Press top 10 wins (No. 5 Penn State and No. 9 Auburn) for the first time since 1956.

Harbaugh Jr., who was in the same role for the Gophers in 2017, spent the 2018 season coaching receivers at Chattanooga. The 2017 Minnesota squad picked up four home wins and started the season with a 3-0 mark.

In 2018 at Chattanooga, Harbaugh Jr. helped the Mocs to increases of 13 total receptions, 627 total receiving yards, 2 receiving touchdowns and 57.0 average receiving yards per game. Harbaugh Jr. helped Chattanooga receiver Bryce Nunnally to HeroSports.com Sophomore All-America accolades and first team All-Southern Conference honors after finishing second in the league and seventh in the nation with 112.5 receiving yards per game.

Prior to his first stint at Minnesota, Harbaugh Jr. was with the Broncos in 2015 and 2016 as they won the Mid-American Conference championship and earned a berth in the 2016 Cotton Bowl. Western Michigan also won the 2015 Bahamas Bowl with Harbaugh Jr. on staff.

Before his time at WMU, Harbaugh Jr. held many roles at Marietta College for the 2013 and 2014 seasons. He was the recruiting coordinator, academic coordinator, video coordinator and passing game coordinator. He also spent the 2011 and 2012 seasons as an assistant coach at Methodist University.

Harbaugh Jr. began his coaching career at North Carolina Wesleyan College in 2009-10, coaching receivers and running backs. The Battling Bishops won conference championships both years and earned an appearance in the NCAA Division III playoffs in 2009.

Harbaugh Jr. earned his bachelor's degree in sport management from Averett University in 2009 and his master's degree in sport management from Western Michigan in 2016.

He is married to his wife, Emily.



David Denham

**ASST. ST COORD./DEFENSIVE TACKLES
2ND SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
BALL STATE, 2006**

David Denham joined the Western Michigan staff on March 4, 2020, and serves as an assistant coach, mentoring the squad's defensive tackles, and an assistant special teams coordinator.

Denham's two postilion groups included three All-MAC honorees in 2020. Ralph Holley earned second team All-MAC honors on the defensive line after the nose guard tied for third in the MAC with 9.0 tackles for loss. All together, the Bronco defensive line led the MAC with 19 sacks on the year. On special teams, D'Wayne Eskridge was named MAC Special Teams Player of the Year and a finalist for the Hornung Award, given to the nation's most versatile player. Eskridge led the nation in all-purpose yards (210.0) and led the MAC in kickoff return yards at 27.5. In addition, punter Nick Michalic was named third team All-MAC.

Denham spent the last two years at Ulndy as the defensive line coach and special teams coordinator. During Denham's time on staff, the program tallied a 19-4 record, including a pair of NCAA Division II playoff appearances. The Greyhounds earned a 38-27 triumph against No. 19 Fort Hays State in 2018 to mark the program's second postseason victory.

In 2018, all four of Denham's starting defensive lineman garnered All-Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC) honors. Denham helped the 2019 squad to a final ranking of No. 17 in the AFCA Division II Coaches' Top 25 poll. This past fall, Denham guided defensive lineman Jacob Schmatz to his third consecutive All-GLVC first team selection while defensive lineman Jacob Jones also earned first team all-league accolades. Schmatz was tabbed the team's defensive lineman of the year.

Denham's work with the defensive line helped the team allow just 17.7 points per game in 2019, the best in the GLVC and 21st nationally. The Greyhounds finished second in the conference and 45th in the country in fewest sacks per game (2.55) while pacing the GLVC in yards allowed per game (323.5).

Denham arrived at Ulndy after five seasons at Wabash College, helping the Little Giants to a 47-8 mark and two NCAA Division III playoff bids.

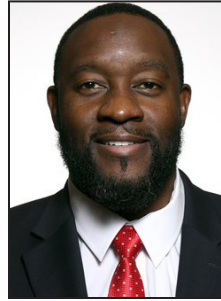
Before Wabash, Denham spent five years coaching in Division II at now-defunct Saint Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind. He wore many hats with the Pumas, including associate head coach, special teams coordinator, video coordinator and defensive line coach. He also mentored three consecutive GLVC Defensive Linemen of the Year, including two-time GLVC Player of the Year Anthony Rouba, and was named the 2011 GLVC Assistant Coach of the Year.

Denham began his coaching career at Division III Rose-Hulman in 2006 as a linebackers coach before taking over defensive line duties in 2007, helping Paul Spreen earn Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference Defensive MVP honors. Denham also planned team meals for road games and was responsible for national recruiting.

A native of Indianapolis, Denham served as a graduate assistant at Ball State University from March-July in 2007, where he helped with the breakdown of opposing teams' video, served as an academic liaison and aided in spring ball with the Cardinals' linebackers.

As a player, Denham was a standout athlete at Pike High School before moving on to a successful collegiate career. His post-prep journey started as a linebacker at Division II Tiffin University in 2001 before transferring to Ball State in 2003. He was one of nine game-day captains for the Cardinals and earned the 2005 Ray Louthen Senior Participation Award for his contributions to the team on and off the field. He graduated from Ball State in 2006 with a bachelor of science.

Denham and his wife, Rheannan, have three children, Anthony, Addison and Asher.

**TIGHT ENDS
1ST SEASON AT WESTERN MICHIGAN
WESTERN MICHIGAN, 2008**

Chris Chestnut will be in his first season as tight ends coach at his alma mater in 2021.

The Durham, North Carolina, native spent the past two seasons as receivers coach at Western Kentucky. He played receiver at Western Michigan from 2002-03 after starting his collegiate career at the College of the Canyons in California. Chestnut was a two-time letterman at WMU, serving as a team captain in 2003 and finishing with 30 catches for 412 yards in his two years in Kalamazoo.

While at WKU, Chestnut mentored a pair of receivers in Lucky Jackson and Jahcour Pearson who were one of just five duos in FBS to finish 2019 with at least 75 catches and 800 yards each. Jackson set a program record for receptions in a game with 17 catches in the First Responders Bowl against Western Michigan.

Prior to WKU, Chestnut spent three seasons at Tennessee State, including two as receivers coach. He mentored a pair of All-Ohio Valley selections, while also helping former University of Florida QB Treon Harris complete a transition to receiver.

Chestnut spent one season at Miami (Fla.) as an offensive assistant and interim tight ends coach. Prior to that, he spent two seasons as a high school coach in his native Durham, North Carolina, as well as stops at South Florida (graduate assistant), Campbell (running backs) and Ellsworth Community College (receivers).

After his collegiate playing career, Chestnut spent three seasons in the Arena Football League. He played for the New York Dragons, Las Vegas Gladiators and Georgia Wildcats and served as an assistant coach at Northern Durham (N.C.) High School during the offseason.

A 2008 Western Michigan graduate, Chestnut and his wife, Maria, have three children -- Jaylon, Carter and Christina.

Bill Kenney joined the Western Michigan staff on February 26, 2013, and serves as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. He began at WMU as the program's offensive tackles and tight ends coach before shifting to solely tight ends prior to the 2017 campaign. During the spring of 2020, Kenney transitioned to the offensive line coach.

In his first season over the entirety of the offensive line, Kenney's unit paved the way for the Bronco offense to rank among the top offenses in FBS. WMU finished the year ranked ninth nationally in scoring offense (41.7 points per game), 16th in total offense (479.7 yards per game) and 23rd in passing offense (286.5 yards per game). Two Broncos were All-MAC selections, as Mike Caliendo was a first-team honoree and Jaylon Moore earned a spot on the second team.

Kenney's 2019 unit was highlighted by senior Giovanni Ricci, who was named a semifinalist for the John Mackey Award, presented annually to the top tight end in college football. Ricci was a first team All-Mid-American Conference selection who finished tied for third nationally among tight ends with eight touchdowns. He caught 51 passes for 642 yards, tying for eighth in the conference in receptions and standing 13th in receiving yards. At the conclusion of the 2019 campaign, Ricci represented Western Michigan in the East-West Shrine Bowl.

During the 2019 campaign, of the Broncos' 21 receiving scores, 10 were from Kenney's tight ends (47.6 percent). His group helped WMU rank third in the MAC in scoring offense (33.1 points per game) and second in total offense (445.7 yards per game).

Off the field, Ricci was named to his fourth Academic All-MAC squad and was joined by junior tight end Brett Borske, who received his second selection.

In 2018, Kenney helped Ricci to 35 catches for 392 yards and a trio of touchdowns. Odell Miller also proved to be a key piece to the run game, blocking for first team All-MAC running back LeVante Bellamy's 1,228 yards and third team all-league selection Jamauri Bogan's 16 ground scores. Borske claimed his first academic all-league honor in 2018 while Miller and Ricci each received his third.

Kenney mentored Bronco tight end Donnie Ernsberger, who was a second team All-MAC selection in 2017 and a third team All-MAC selection in 2016. Ernsberger scored four touchdowns and totaled 394 yards on a team second-best 34 receptions in 2017. Ernsberger also finished second on the squad in 2017 with four receiving scores. He was invited to and played in the NFLPA Bowl and was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

During the 2016 MAC championship season, WMU had two first team All-MAC tackle selections in Chukwuma Okorafor and Taylor Moton. Moton was an All-America in 2016 and a second round NFL Draft pick by the Carolina Panthers. Okorafor earned All-America status in 2017 and went on to become a third round NFL Draft selection by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

In 2015, Kenney helped left tackle Willie Beavers to first team All-MAC honors, becoming the first Bronco offensive lineman named to the top team since 2012. Beavers also became WMU's first drafted offensive lineman since 1995 when he was the Minnesota Vikings' fourth round choice.

In his second season at WMU, in 2014, Kenney's work with the offensive tackles and tight ends helped produce the MAC's Offensive Player of the Year and Freshman of the Year in Jarvion Franklin.

Prior to Western Michigan, Kenney racked up 31 years of coaching with the bulk coming at Penn State University, where he began as a graduate assistant (1988) and worked with the offensive line from 1989-2011. He took on the role of recruiting coordinator in 1992-95 and worked directly with offensive tackles and tight ends from 2000-11.

During his time with the Nittany Lions, Kenney coached six All-Americans and 18 All-Big Ten players. He coached 10 Academic All-Americans and 47 Academic All-Big Ten players.

Kenney developed 30 NFL players, 25 draft picks and five NFL free agent signees, all of whom received their degrees from PSU. He recruited 32 NFL draft picks, including five first round selections. His offensive line paved the way for Larry Johnson to rush for a program record 2,587 yards and helped produce eight 1,000-yard rushers since 2002.

His offensive line ranked fourth nationally in sacks allowed in 2008, limiting opponents to just 13. In 2005, the Penn State offensive line allowed fewer than 15 sacks and finished second in the Big Ten in rushing and scoring.

Before joining Penn State, Kenney served as a graduate assistant at Nebraska (1986-87) and worked at his alma mater, Norwich University, in the offensive backfield in 1982. Kenney was a three-year starter at Norwich as a tight end/fullback and was a team co-captain in 1981.

Kenney and his wife, Kathryn, have three children, Joseph, Matthew and Jacqueline.

Aviation Bowl • December 9, 1961 • Dayton, Ohio

Western Michigan made its postseason debut in the inaugural (and only) Aviation Bowl on December 9, 1961.

New Mexico struck for touchdowns early in the first and third quarters to defeat the Broncos 28-12. Freezing weather, including sleet and snow, nearly grounded the Aviation contest and limited the game to approximately 4,000 fans even though advance sales had surpassed 5,000.

The Broncos were led by quarterback Ed Chlebek, who completed 18 passes for 207 yards and one touchdown.

WMU fell behind 14-0, but bounced back on a Bob White scoring run from four yards out. New Mexico added two more scores before Chlebek found Dave Cooke in the end zone from five yards out for the final score of the game.

California Raisin Bowl • December 10, 1988 • Fresno, Calif.

Twenty-seven years after its first bowl trip, Western Michigan made its second after capturing nine wins and winning its first Mid-American Conference title.

Western Michigan fell behind by two scores before fighting back to take a 17-14 lead into halftime.

The Bulldogs hopped ahead 14-0 with 55 and 38-yard touchdown passes from Mark Barsotti to Andre Alexander. WMU rallied as Robert Oliver hauled in a 31-yard pass from Tony Kimbrough for the team's first touchdown.

Robert Davis followed with a 51-yard rushing TD to tie the game. John Creek made good on a 29-yard field goal to give the Broncos a 17-14 lead at the half.

The two teams traded touchdowns in the early portion of the third quarter before Fresno State scored two more TDs later in the frame with a running attack that had Darrell Rosette score from four yards away and Myron Jones from 26.

WMU closed the gap to five points on a Kimbrough six-yard score in the fourth quarter, but the ensuing two-point conversion failed and the Broncos were kept out of the end zone, sealing the Fresno State victory.

Western Michigan played in its third bowl game in program history, taking on Big East opponent Cincinnati in the 2007 International Bowl and falling 27-24.

Cincinnati raced out to a 24-0 lead with 10 minutes to play in the half, but the Broncos scored 17 unanswered points in the latter portion of the second quarter to cut the deficit to 24-17 at intermission.

With WMU trailing 27-24 in the final frame, the Broncos missed a 51-yard game-tying field goal with less than two minutes to play that would force overtime.

Cincinnati jumped ahead 24-0 with a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown, a pair of 21-yard touchdown passes from Nick Davila to International Bowl Most Valuable Player Dominick Goodman and a 37-yard field goal.

The Broncos used trickery to get the offense started. Sophomore cornerback E.J. Biggers found a streaking Jamarko Simmons on a 76-yard option pass off a double reverse in the second. Quarterback Ryan Cubit then hit Herb Martin with a 30-yard touchdown pass. Next, Matt Lude-man intercepted a pass to set up a 29-yard field goal by Nate Meyer as WMU pulled within a touchdown, 24-17.

The Broncos tied the score at 24-24 in the fourth quarter on a seven-yard rushing touchdown by Brandon West. Cincinnati kicked a 33-yard field goal with 6:11 remaining to go ahead 27-24. The Broncos then missed the potential game-tying field goal and Cincinnati ran out the clock.

On a night when Western Michigan seemed to come up just short or just long, the Broncos could never get any momentum in a 38-14 loss to Rice in the Texas Bowl.

The Owls took a 7-0 lead with 5:21 to go in the opening quarter as Chase Clement scampered 26 yards into the end zone. Clement finished with 307 yards and three passing TDs on the night. He also caught a touchdown pass in the third quarter.

Western Michigan had five offensive possessions in the first half and the final four resulted in two punts and two interceptions. The Broncos' Achilles' heel throughout the first half and most of the game was third downs, offensively and defensively. Western Michigan was one-for-seven in the first 30 minutes, while Rice was a staggering nine-for-12 in the first half alone. Rice's second score, a 30-yard field goal from Clark Fangmeier to take a 10-0 lead, was aided in part by a pair of 15-yard penalties on WMU over a span of three plays. The lead grew to 24-0 by the break with Clement finding Toren Dixon from six yards out at the 6:53 mark of the second quarter and James Casey from 45 yards out with 1:15 to go.

The lead swelled to 38-0 after a Clement TD catch in the third and 18-yard scoring strike to Jarett Dillard in the fourth. WMU quarterback Tim Hiller found Kirk Elsworth from two yards out for the Broncos' first score, at 6:33 in the fourth. The TD pass broke Tim Lester's single-season mark, giving Hiller 35 scoring strikes on the year and 75 for his career. Hiller added another TD toss, from 13 yards to Schneider Julien with 25 seconds to play.

The Broncos jumped out to an early lead just six minutes in after a Boilermaker fumble set up a White touchdown on a flea-flicker. The ensuing two-point conversion gave WMU its first lead in a bowl game in program history at 8-0. A Purdue one-yard touchdown pass at the end of the first made it 8-7 after one.

The Falcons tacked on another TD for a 20-10 advantage at the half.

Trailing 23-10 in the fourth, the Broncos gave one last push, cutting the deficit to six points with Davis' second TD catch at the start of the frame. With less than 10 minutes to play, Air Force's Dexter Walker returned a fumble 60 yards for a score. A nine-yard touchdown run by the Falcons' D.J. Johnson with 5:20 remaining all but sealed the win.

Wisconsin tight end Troy Fumagalli made a leaping eight-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter and the Badgers won 24-16 in the Cotton Bowl to deny Western Michigan (13-1) an undefeated season.

The TD catch by Fumagalli with just over 12 minutes left, in the back of the end zone between two defenders, came three plays after a rare interception thrown by Zach Terrell and made it 24-10.

The Broncos and No. 1 Alabama were the only FBS teams that entered their final games with chances for undefeated seasons. But Wisconsin (11-3), which finished with 11 wins for the fourth time in seven seasons, was clearly bigger and stronger — especially up front. The Big Ten Badgers set the tone early, with rushing touchdowns on their first two drives to take a 14-0 lead against the Group of Five team.

Fumagalli had several other highlight catches, including a one-handed 20-yard grab on the Badgers' opening drive, and a 26-yard catch to convert third-and-eight after Western Michigan scored in the fourth quarter.

Terrell combined with All-America receiver Corey Davis for 51 career touchdowns, tying the FBS record on an 11-yarder on fourth down with 3:27 left. Even with cornerback Sojourn Shelton's arms wrapped around him in the back of the end zone, Davis broke free to make the catch.

Western Michigan's senior quarterback had 33 touchdowns and only four interceptions for the season, the last pick by Wisconsin linebacker T.J. Edwards.

Western Michigan saw its season come to an end after falling 49-18 to Brigham Young University at the 2018 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl at Albertson Stadium on the campus of Boise State University.

Brigham Young got on the board first after a poor punt gave the Cougars the ball at the WMU 27. Zach Wilson connected with Dylan Collie from 26 yards out for a 7-0 lead with 2:20 to go in the first quarter.

After being held in check by the BYU defense, WMU's fortunes changed thanks to the defense. The Cougars attempted a trick play, but Corvin Moment forced a fumble that was recovered by Stefan Claiborne at the BYU 40. On fourth-and-three, Jamauri Bogan picked up the 43rd rushing touchdown of his career, evening the game with 3:07 in the half.

WMU forced a punt and Kaleb Eleby got the offense to the BYU 20, where Gavin Peddie connected on a 37-yard field goal to send the Broncos to the half with a 10-7 lead.

Brigham Young responded with 28 points in the third. Wilson found Collie in the end zone for the second time of the game to take a 14-10 lead before three more touchdowns pushed the Cougars ahead 35-10 heading to the fourth. Eleby ran in from one-yard out after a 54-yard completion to D'Wayne Eskridge to cut the score to 42-18. BYU added a late touchdown by Bray El-Bakri for the 49-18 final.

Western Michigan fell in heartbreaking fashion with Western Kentucky kicking two field goals in the final two minutes, including the game-winning 52-yard make with no time remaining in regulation, for a 23-20 final.

Kicker Thiago Kapps gave the Broncos the lead with under five minutes left in the first quarter with a 30-yard field goal. The Hilltoppers answered 4:06 into the second, when Ty Storey completed a 17-yard touchdown pass to Jahcour Pearson. WKU made it 10-3 on a 26-yard field goal with 2:22 remaining in the half.

WMU regained momentum before the end of the half thanks to Kareem Ali's 88-yard interception return for a touchdown with 59 seconds to go in the second. It was the first INT return for TD and longest scoring play in WMU bowl history and longest interception runback in Mid-American Conference bowl history.

On the Broncos' first possession of the second half, Jon Wassink tossed a six-yard TD pass to DaShon Bussell. Western Kentucky tied it at 17-17 with 10:40 left in the fourth quarter as Storey hit Lucky Jackson in the end zone from five yards away.

A 20-yard field goal by Kapps with 4:58 to play put WMU up 20-17, only to have a Cory Munson 31-yard field goal even the score with 1:36 left in the game.

Western Kentucky failed to convert on a Hail Mary with three seconds remaining. The Broncos, however, were penalized for having 12 men on the field, giving the Hilltoppers an untimed down. They settled on a Munson 52-yard field goal try, which he drilled, giving his team the dramatic victory.

In its first Mid-American Conference Championship game appearance, Western Michigan ran out to a 20-0 halftime lead and pushed its advantage to 23-0 midway through the third quarter before Marshall answered and eventually scored the game-winning touchdown with seconds remaining in the game.

The Broncos started their scoring parade on a 16-yard touchdown pass from Tim Lester to Corey Alston at 7:47 in the first quarter. A pair of Brad Selent field goals and a Robert Sanford one-yard run led to a 20-0 halftime advantage. The third quarter started much the same, with Selent drilling a 36-yard field goal with 8:34 remaining in the frame. From there, the Thundering Herd rally began.

Chad Pennington made it a 23-7 deficit with a 38-yard TD toss to Nate Poole. The Herd followed with a 24-yard run by Doug Chapman to draw to 23-13. Maurice Hines then picked off Lester, setting up a 16-yard James Williams TD catch.

Early in the fourth, the Herd claimed the lead on a two-yard run by Chapman. WMU regained the advantage on a four-yard pass from Lester to Jake Moreland. The teams swapped punts and Marshall took over at its own 26 with 3:08 left. A sack knocked the Herd back to the 18-yard line, but three consecutive completions and a Pennington 33-yard run put the ball on WMU's 28.

A Bronco personal foul gave the Herd a first down at the Western Michigan 14. Facing third-and-goal from the one-yard line with seven seconds to go, Pennington fired a strike to Eric Pinkerton for the first touchdown of Pinkerton's career.

WMU fought back, scoring with 47 seconds left in the third quarter when Jeff Welsh passed to Steve Neal for a 22-yard touchdown. On its next possession, WMU took its only lead at 14-13 on Welsh's 41-yard TD strike to Josh Bush and Brad Selent's PAT.

Leftwich's 29-yard TD pass to John Cooper with 6:14 on the clock reclaimed the lead for Marshall.

The Broncos' chances for victory were thwarted when their next drive stalled at the Marshall 37-yard line with 3:36 on the clock and their last gasp ended with 1:21 on the clock when Danny Derricott intercepted a Welsh pass attempt.

Robert Spillane intercepted a pass with 51 seconds remaining as No. 13 Western Michigan remained undefeated, holding off Ohio 29-23 to win its first Mid-American Conference title since 1988.

The Broncos (13-0, No. 17 CFP) led 23-7 at halftime, but Ohio rallied and had the ball in WMU territory in the final minute, when Spillane intercepted Greg Windham's pass. The Bobcats (9-4) never led and didn't do much on offense until the final quarter.

WMU became the first undefeated team to win the MAC title game since Marshall in 1999.

Western Michigan's Corey Davis had eight catches for 144 yards, including a 70-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter. Butch Hampton kicked five field goals, the last a 34-yarder that gave the Broncos a 29-23 lead with 1:24 remaining.

Davis was named the game's Offense MVP while Hampton was the Special Teams MVP. Hampton's five field goals set a MAC championship record.

A Marathon MAC Football Championship Game attendance record was set with 45,615 on hand at Ford Field.
