MEDIA INFORMATION



MEDIA GUIDELINES

CREDENTIALS

Requests for press, radio, photography and television credentials should be made one week prior to the game to insure seating in the press box. Requests should be directed to Sports Information Director Mike Grosz. Only members of the working media will be issued credentials.

Credentials may be picked up at the will-call window, located at the west entrance to Cunningham Field. Credentials must be visible at all times.

RADIO

A visitor's radio booth, equipped with a courtesy phone line, is available on the upper level of the press box. Radio stations should contact the Sports Information Office a week before the game to receive broadcast information.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographers must follow all NCAA and WSC regulations concerning access to the sidelines. *Photographers are not allowed in the team boxes.*

PARKING

Limited space is available in a reserved parking lot located behind the west side of Cunningham Field. Contact the Sports Information Office for parking availability.

WEEKLY INTERVIEWS

WSC coaches and players will be available for interviews Monday through Thursday, except between 1:30-6 p.m. Interview requests should be made through the Sports Information Office.

POST GAME INTERVIEWS

After a brief "cooling off" period, WSC players and coaches will be available for post game interviews. Players will be available outside the WSC locker room, located directly west of Memorial Stadium. Coach McLaughlin will meet with the media following his radio show. Interview requests with WSC players will be taken toward the end of the game.

STATISTICS

A complete package of pre-game notes, depth charts and statistics will be available. Halftime and quarter statistics will also be provided.

Final statistics, including a play-by-play, will be distributed approximately 20 minutes after the game in the press box at Cunningham Field/Memoria Stadium.

Founded in 1891 as Nebraska Normal College, Wayne State College, in Wayne, Neb. earned a distinguished reputation as a teachers' college from its early days. We're still a great teachers' college—but so much more!

Innovative Programs

Wayne State's four academic schools—Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Counseling, and Natural and Social Sciences—offer a comprehensive selection of courses. You'll find over 150 majors and minors ranging from pre-professional studies to criminal justice to a nationally accredited undergraduate sports management program, and many others in 14 academic departments across campus.

The Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) at Wayne State College provides pre-professional training in medicine, pharmacy and dentistry in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Medical Center. Students who successfully complete the program at WSC are automatically accepted into medical, pharmacy, or dental school at UNMC.

Upper-level education majors at Wayne State have the opportunity to participate in the Northeast Nebraska Teacher Academy (NENTA), the first of its kind in the nation, where WSC students receive classroom experience with participating K-12 schools in the region.

Through WSC WebCat On-line, students can register for class, check on grades and student accounts, from the convenience of their home or residence hall room.

Excellent Career Preparation

Whether students plan to be accountants or wildlife biologists, they receive the preparation they need at Wayne State College. In addition to classes taught by experts in their fields, Wayne State College provides internship and cooperative programs for students in a number of majors. Many regional businesses actively recruit Wayne State students for internships, with many of these internships resulting in full-time employment after graduation.

The WSC Career Services office assists students with career exploration, job preparation skills, interviews, as well as arranging internships and cooperative experiences.



Personal Attention

Students at Wayne State College don't get lost in the crowd. With an average class size of 21 and a student/faculty ratio of 20:1, WSC students get to know their professors and classmates. Eighty percent of Wayne State professors have the highest degree in their field—and most teach first-year as well as upper-level classes. You will find dedicated professors and instructors at Wayne State College where teaching is their life's work and their enthusiasm is contagious.

Wayne State College offers a variety of support services and programs to students. The heart of the WSC campus is the Student Center, where academic and personal support services are located. The Learning Center and Peer Tutoring Program are designed to help all students achieve the highest possible level of success in their studies.

Active Campus Life

With more than 90 clubs and organizations on campus, Wayne State College students have many opportunities to be involved in campus and community life.

Wayne State College has an active Greek life, with Greek Olympics being held at Homecoming each fall, as well as other social and service activities. The Student Activities Board (SAB) plans a variety of special programs each year, bringing musical groups such as Dierks Bentley, Three Doors Down, Terri Clark, Vertical Horizon, Five for Fighting, Goo Goo Dolls, Sawyer Brown, Blackhawk, Firehouse, Jason Aldean, Blake Shelton and others to campus. Comedian Adam Sandler and other national performers have performed on campus.

The Multicultural Center, one of the newest campus programs, provides outreach and support to Wayne State College students and the region through special events during the year.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's track and field (indoor and outdoor), men's and women's cross country, baseball, softball and women's soccer.

Scenic Surroundings

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Willow Bowl, Student Center, Ramsey Theatre, Studio Arts Building and Connell Hall. A new state-of-the-art outdoor track was completed in the summer of 2014 while field turf was installed in the summer of 2013 to complete a \$1.3 million athletic renovation at Bob Cunningham Field/Memorial Stadium.

Wayne State College's seven residence halls provide students with a comfortable, affordable and convenient place to live with easy access to the entire campus community. Each hall has lounges and recreation areas, laundry facilities, mail service, academic tutors and study areas. Six of the seven halls are wired for access to the campus computer network from your personal computer.





WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Marysz Rames President

Dr. Marysz Rames was appointed the 13th president of Wayne State College by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees on June 18. She came to Wayne State from Dakota State University in Madison, S.D., where she had served as interim president since Aug. 15, 2014.

Rames earned her education doctorate in adult and higher education in 1997 from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. She earned her bachelor of science degree in business administration and communication studies, with a minor in economics, in 1982, and her master's degree in educational administration in 1986, from University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, Colo.

She has spent the past year as interim president at Dakota State University (DSU) in Madison, South Dakota. During this time she was instrumental in promoting a strong shared governance system, finalizing the university's five-year strategic plan, revitalizing the university's Foundation and actively raising funds to increase scholarships. Rames also worked with the legislature and others in several major new construction and renovation projects.

Prior to her interim appointment, Rames served as the vice president for student affairs from 2000 until June 2015 at South Dakota State University (SDSU) in Brookings. As the senior student affairs officer, Rames oversaw numerous university divisions and initiatives, including, but not limited to, enrollment management, student success, strategic planning, fundraising/fiscal management, diversity and inclusion, collaborative partnerships, leadership development, and increasing efficiency and effectiveness for students.

Rames served as an assistant professor of education at SDSU, teaching courses in administration and leadership in student affairs; serving on master's and doctoral students' graduate committees; and conducting research in financial trends in higher education, student retention and completion, and affordability and access to higher education. Rames also served as the interim associate vice president of student affairs (1997-1999) and the interim director for diversity enhancement (1999) at SDSU.

Prior to her arrival at SDSU, Rames worked at Aims Community College in Greeley, Colo., and the University of Wyoming, in Laramie. Her scholarly presentations include topics such as student services, retention efforts, and working with today's college students.

Rames and her husband, Steve, have two children. Their son, Matthew, is attending college in Missouri and daughter, Jessica, will start college this fall in Minnesota.



Mike Powicki Director of Athletics

Mike Powicki is in his fifth year as Director of Athletics at Wayne State College. Powicki began his duties at Wayne State College on July 23, 2012 and has been instrumental in improvements to athletic facilities during his three years at the school.

In his first four years at WSC, over \$2.3 million has been invested in facility improvements, staffing and operations enhancements. WSC athletics is currently on pace to successfully complete a second major capital improvement project under Powicki with the Memorial Stadium Press Box Construction Project covering \$1.75 million.

Wildcat student-athletes continued to excel in the classroom during the 2015-16 school year. The overall athletic department grade point average was 3.2 with 12 of the 13 sports at Wayne State posting a cumulative grade point average over 3.00. WSC led the NSIC with 14 Myles Brand All-Academic With Distinction recipients to go with 213 Presidential Scholar Athletes and 93 NSIC All-Academic selections.

The first major athletic project that was completed under the guidance of Powicki was the Bob Cunningham Field/Memorial Stadium Renovation project. The project began in May, 2013 and was highlighted by installation of artificial turf, ornamental fencing, press box graphics and new goal posts. The \$1.6 million project also included the widening, lengthening and re-sodding of the Wildcat Soccer Pitch, along with installing new irrigation, facility fencing, scoreboard and making the facility ADA accessible. The Dr. LeRoy Simpson Track at Memorial Stadium

was re-surfaced and painted in the summer of 2014 as the final phase of the project.

Powicki currently serves on the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association Board, NCAA Central Regional Advisory Committee for baseball and is on the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame Committee. He also serves locally as the Wayne Kiwanis Board President along with the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors and Revitalize Wayne Committees.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Powicki served as Assistant Athletic Director at Minnesota State University in Mankato, Minnesota. He was the Assistant Athletic Director for Marketing and Corporate Partnerships from 2008-10 and was promoted to Assistant Director of Athletics for Development and Strategic Partnerships in 2010 where he served in that role until July 2012 when he arrived at Wayne State.

While at MSU, Powicki successfully developed and executed the athletics department revenue generation plan, responsible for generating \$1.7 million annually. Powicki managed all fundraising, development and marketing operations while overseeing the athletic department marketing/fundraising staff. Powicki also served as the athletic department's senior development officer functioning as a liaison to the MSU Foundation and the Vice President for Advancement, focusing on major gifts and special projects.

Powicki oversaw the implementation of numerous media rights contracts for MSU's athletic department including radio broadcast rights, television broadcast carriage rights and the department's multi-year advertising sales rights with the firm Front Row Marketing Services.

Powicki also served as Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs at Upper Iowa University from 2004-2008 where he was a part of the Peacocks transition from NCAA Division III to NCAA Division II status and into the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. While at Upper Iowa, Powicki monitored all team operations, recruiting and fundraising budgets. Powicki oversaw the UIU Recreation and Fitness Center staff, budget and overall operation.

In his time at Upper Iowa he created and sold athletic corporate sponsorship opportunities, supervised and coordinated all athletic department fundraising activities, developed and implemented the Peacock Club for donors and successfully completed the "Road to Glory" athletic facility capital improvement project. He also served as tournament director for various national and regional NCAA Division II Championship events.

During his tenure at UIU, Powicki served as an adjunct professor for the Exercise and Sports Studies within the Department of Education. Powicki obtained his bachelor degree from the University of Iowa in exercise science in and earned his masters degree in exercise and sport science/sport administration from Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Mike has two daughters – Faith and Elle (pronounced L) - and resides in Wayne.



Mike Barry Associate Director of Athletics Facilities/Rec Center Director

Mike Barry is in his 17th year (2016-17) as associate director of athletics and in his 19th year as the director of sports and recreational facilities at Wayne State College. His duties include scheduling athletic contests and practices, home game management and serving as the athletic and recreational facilities' coordinator.

Barry was the Wayne State women's basketball head coach for seven seasons from 1989-96. He compiled a 96-91 record, which is second all-time on the school's career victory list. His best team was the 1993-94 squad which posted a 22-5 record.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Barry served two years as an assistant women's basketball coach at Pratt Community College in Kansas. He also coached at Chadron State, Eastern New Mexico University, and Fullerton and Stuart high schools in Nebraska.

Barry, a native of Grant, was a four-sport athlete at Chadron State. He was a three-time NAIA national qualifier in the triple jump, and also lettered in basketball, football, and cross country. Barry earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Chadron State in 1983 and earned his master's degree in secondary education from Chadron State in 1988.

Mike and his wife, Jeannette, have two children: Jordan (24) and Jalen (21), and they reside in Wayne.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field

Memorial Stadium has been "Home of the Wildcats" since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium following World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The press box was built at the time of the grandstand construction, with a second level being added in 1969.

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans. New bleachers were installed on the east side of the field in the fall of 2007 with seating for another 750 fans. Cunningham Field underwent a renovation in the summer of 2013 with synthetic turf replacing the natural grass surface.



Recreation Center

The Wayne State College Recreation Center opened in 1987 and is the college's main facility for student recreation and selected athletic activities.

The main area in the Recreation Center provides a six-lane running track and three full-size courts for basketball, volleyball, tennis, and badminton. The rec center running track was resurfaced in 2001 with one of the best surfaces in the world. Racquetball, weight training, aerobics, gymnastics, wrestling, and sauna facilities are all available to WSC students, faculty and staff as well as residents of the Wayne community.

The Recreation Center also houses locker rooms for Wildcat athletic teams and offices for the WSC athletic department.



Carlson Natatorium

Carlson Natatorium adjoins the Recreation Center and Rice Auditorium. The 25-yard long pool is used for a variety of functions, including lap swimming, aquasize classes, senior wellness aquasize classes, HHPS classes, intramural activities and athletic training rehabilitation exercises. The natatorium is open in the summer for use by athletic camps and Rec Center members.





WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Pete Chapman Baseball & Softball Complex

The baseball and softball complex opened in the spring of 1996. Located north of Memorial Stadium, the complex provides a picturesque setting for baseball and softball games. The complex was necessary after the previous softball field was converted into a parking lot. In addition, the baseball team played its games off campus at the local American Legion field.

The baseball field received a facelift in the summer of 2004 with the additions of locker rooms, restrooms, a concession stand and press box. A new wood fence was installed on the baseball field prior to the start of the 2005 season.

In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex in honor of the late athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department. In the fall of 2006, a locker room/press box was built at the softball field. A new 10-inning scoreboard was placed at the baseball field in the fall of 2007 in right-center field. In the summer of 2009, a new wood fence was installed on the softball field.



Rice Auditorium

Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad. Recent upgrades to the arena include: new lights in 2011, new/renovated locker rooms and offices as part of the \$4.5 million Rice/Memorial Stadium renovation project in 2008, new balcony seats and new stage curtain in the summer of 2007 and a new playing surface in 2005.

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College's president from 1951-'56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships, the 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic and the 2012 NCAA Division II Central Regional Women's Basketball Championships.





ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



Muffin Morris *Head Athletic Trainer*



Dr. Muffin Morris is in her ninth year at Wayne State College serving as the head athletic trainer. She oversees athletic training for all 13 sports at Wayne State College and serves as the head athletic trainer for Wildcat football and men's basketball.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State College, Morris worked four years at the University of South Dakota. She served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and worked with football, softball, swimming/diving, track/cross country and volleyball programs at USD.

The Chariton, Iowa native earned her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University in athletic training in 2004. Morris then obtained her master's degree from the University of South Dakota in 2006 in health, physical education and recreation and earned her doctorate degree in adult/higher education from the University of South Dakota on July 31, 2008.

Morris resides in Wayne.

Athletic Training Room

The Athletic Training Room is the site of taping, treatment and injury evaluations. It has a variety of up to date, quality equipment. A partial inventory of modalities available for athletes include: three whirlpools, RichMar Theratouch 7.7 electrical stimulation machine, RichMar HV-II combination ultrasound/electrical stimulation machine, RichMar portable ultrasound machine, Game-ready intermittent compression machine, Therabath Parafin machine, and Hydrocollator heat pack units. The athletic training room also has six computers.



Dr. Benjamin Bissell *Team Orthopedist*



Dr. Benjamin T. Bissell joined CNOS in 2013 after practicing at an Orthopaedic and Sports Medicine Clinic for several years in North Platte, Neb. He earned his bachelors degree in biochemistry from the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, Neb. and his medical degree from the University of Nebraska College of Medicine. Dr. Bissell completed his residency in orthopaedic surgery at the University of Vermont/Fletcher Allen Health Care in Burlington, Vt., where he also served as chief resident for one year. In 2010 he completed an orthopaedic sports medicine/shoulder fellowship at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Dr. Brian Johnson *Team Orthopedist*



Brian Johnson, MD was raised in a military family in multiple areas around the country. He received his undergraduate degree in Molecular Biology from Brown University graduating with honors. While there, he started on the Division 1 Football Team as a lineman and later started on the Rugby team that won the Ivy League Crown three years in a row and were Division 1 National Quarter Finalists.

He attended the University of Texas, Houston School of Medicine. While at the University of Texas, Dr. Johnson graduated in the top two percent of his medical school class with the distinction of Junior A.O.A. Dr. Johnson later completed his residency training at the University of Utah and completed a

Sports Medicine fellowship in San Diego, where he specialized in complex shoulder and knee reconstructions. He had the opportunity to study cartilage reconstructive procedures at the Rizzoli Institute in Italy during his residency and has published several scientific papers on this topic and other sports medicine related topics. Dr. Johnson has worked for CNOS since 2009.

Dr. Michael Nguyen *Team Orthopedist*



Dr. Michael Nguyen joined CNOS as a Primary Care Sports Medicine Physician after completing his fellowship training in Sports Medicine at Morristown Medical Center in Morristown, N.J. He initially trained in family medicine in Waterloo, Iowa through the University of Iowa. Weight Room

Recognizing the importance of first-class facilities for their student athletes, the Wayne State College athletic department completed a state-of-the-art renovation to its athletic facilities in the 2008-09 school year, including a new weight room constructed at Memorial Stadium.

All Wayne State student athletes have utilized the benefits of new weight room equipment that features 18 platforms and racks, dumbbells and selectorized machines. The facility allows 72 student athletes to work out at the same time.

The project has enhanced Wayne State's ability to attract high quality student athletes and provide current team members the resources necessary to compete at the NCAA Division II level.



Football Locker Room

As part of the \$4.5 million state-of-the-art renovation to Memorial Stadium and Rice Auditorium, the Wayne State College football team received a new locker room at the start of the 2009 season. The locker room features custom-built wooden lockers made by Wayne-based Heritage Industries along with new showers and restroom facilities for the Wildcat football players.





HEAD COACH DAN MCLAUGHLIN



Dan McLaughlin is in his 12th year as head football coach at Wayne State College. Heading into the 2016 campaign, McLaughlin has a career record of 63-60 (.512) overall and 59-49 (.546) in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Inheriting a struggling program, McLaughlin turned Wayne State into a constant winner that included six straight winning seasons (2007-12), a feat never achieved in the program's 100-year history.

McLaughlin became Wayne State's all-time win's leader on October 24, 2015 following a 20-17 at home win over Concordia-St. Paul. It was his 63rd win as Wildcat Head Coach, surpassing Del Stoltenberg who was 62-70-5 in his 14 years as Head Coach at WSC from

1969-82. Entering his 12th season, McLaughlin is the second longest tenured coach in school history.

Under McLaughlin in 2015, Wayne State finished 4-7 overall and 1-6 in the NSIC South Division.

Wayne State finished the 2014 season at 5-6 overall and tied for fourth in the NSIC South Division with a 3-4 record. Marquee wins during the year included a 27-7 rout of #25 Winona State on Homecoming and a wild 48-45 overtime win at Southwest Minnesota State.

The Wildcats were 2-9 in the 2013 season with five of the teams' losses by seven points or less, including a season-opening 29-27 triple overtime loss at Northern State that was the longest game in school history.

Under McLaughlin in 2012, the Wildcats recorded a 6-5 record for a sixth straight winning season. Three of the team's five losses were by seven points or less. For the fifth straight season, Wildcat football had at least one player receive All-America honors under McLaughlin as senior punter Randy Weich was named to six different All-America teams.

In 2011, Wayne State finished with a record of 7-4 overall and 7-3 in the NSIC. The Wildcats were nationally ranked for a fourth straight season with the team's signature win coming in a 7-0 triumph over #1 ranked and defending national champion Minnesota Duluth ending the Bulldogs 31 game win streak against NSIC opponents. McLaughlin moved into second place on the all-time wins list at Wayne State following a thrilling 44-41 overtime win over Upper Iowa on October 29th, surpassing Dennis Wagner (44-37-1/1989-96) for second place on the Wildcat all-time wins list.

The Wildcats were 6-5 overall and 5-5 in the NSIC during the 2010 season. WSC was ranked for part of the season and was as high as 18th in the AFCA Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll. Two of the Wildcat wins were over top 15 teams that made the playoffs, beating #13 Nebraska-Kearney and #7 Augustana, handing the Vikings their lone loss during the regular season.

McLaughlin's 2009 team was 8-3 and ranked a majority of the season - as high 11th in the D2Football.com and 14th in the AFCA Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll. The Wildcats accumulated an impressive 24-11 mark under McLaughlin from 2007-09 (9-3 in 2008 and 7-5 in 2007), marking the most wins in a three year span in Wayne State's 95 years of football.

Predicted for a seventh place finish out of 14 teams in the NSIC for the 2008 season, McLaughlin coached the Wildcats to a 9-3 record and the programs' first-ever berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs. The Wildcats won seven straight games to finish the regular season and earned a share of the NSIC South Division title with Minnesota State, going 8-2 in league play.

The nine wins in 2008 tied the school record, matching the 1949 (9-0) and 1993 (9-1) teams that also won nine games in a season. WSC finished the regular season ranked 22nd in NCAA Division II, the first national ranking for a WSC football team since 1995. For leading WSC to a 9-3 season, McLaughlin was named the AFCA (American Football Coaches Association) NCAA Division II Region V Football Coach of the Year.

The Wildcats posted a 7-5 overall record in 2007, the first winning season by a WSC football team since 1995. Wayne State finished second place in the Northern Sun Conference with a 7-2 league mark despite a predicted fifth place finish in the NSIC preseason poll. It was the best-ever finish in conference play for the Wildcat football team since joining the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference in 1999 and resulted in Coach McLaughlin being named the 2007 NSIC Football Coach of the Year.

The Wildcats' second place finish in the NSIC resulted in just the second-ever post season bowl appearance in 91 years of football for the school as Wayne State represented the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference in the Mineral Water Bowl played in Excelsior Springs, Missouri on December 1, 2007. Other milestones accomplished in the 2007 season under McLaughlin included the school's first six-game win streak on the gridiron since 1993 and the first regional ranking (10th in the Northwest Region) for a Wildcat football team since 1993 when WSC was ranked as high as fourth in the former Midwest Region.

Under McLaughlin in 2006, the Wildcats went 5-6 with three of the losses by a combined nine points. WSC recorded their first three-game winning streak in football since 1995 during the 2006 campaign and posted back-to-back shutout wins for the first time since the 1976 season. Also serving as offensive line coach, the Wildcats allowed an NSIC-low two sacks in league play under the coaching of McLaughlin in the 2006 season.

WSC amassed a 4-7 mark under McLaughlin in his first season at the school in 2005 and the teams' 4-3 mark in the NSIC that season was the school's first-ever winning mark in football since joining the league.

Dan McLaughlin was hired as the 21st head football coach at Wayne State College on Dec. 9, 2004. He came to Wayne State after spending one season as offensive coordinator at Minnesota State in Mankato, Minnesota where he helped the Mavericks to a 6-5 record in 2004 after the team went 0-11 in 2003. It was Minnesota State's first winning season in football since 1994. He also served as offensive line coach with the Mavericks under head coach Jeff Jamrog. In 2003, McLaughlin was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Nebraska, working as an assistant offensive line coach and assistant special teams coach while coordinating Nebraska's walk-on program.

Before moving to the college ranks, McLaughlin achieved success at the high school level in Nebraska by winning state championships at three different schools. He was the head coach at Millard West from 1995 to 2002, guiding the Wildcats to seven consecutive playoff appearances. His 2001 team went 12-1 and captured the Class A state title. McLaughlin was the head coach at Norfolk High School from 1988 to 1994, leading the Panthers to the Class A state title in 1994. McLaughlin also coached at Broken Bow High School in 1987 and led the school to the Class B state crown in his only season at Broken Bow.

Believed to be the only head coach in Nebraska high school football history to win state titles at three different schools, McLaughlin compiled a high school coaching record of 110-59.

McLaughlin earned his master's degree from Wayne State College in 1992. He is a native of Sheridan, Montana and is a 1982 graduate of Bellevue College. Dan and his wife Nadine have two sons (Scott and Sean) along with three grandchildren and they reside in Wayne.



WILDCAT ASSISTANT COACHES



Logan Masters
Offensive Coordinator

Logan Masters is in his sixth season as an assistant football coach and second season as offensive coordinator at Wayne State College. The former Wildcat stand-out receiver was promoted to offensive coordinator following the 2014 season and will also coach quarterbacks after serving as wide receivers coach the previous four years.

Masters served as the wide receivers coach during the 2013 and '14 seasons and worked as a graduate assistant wide receivers coach for WSC in 2011-12. He also served as an intern coach in 2010 working with tight ends.

Masters, a graduate of Storm Lake High School in Iowa, finished his Wildcat career with new school records of 258 catches and 3,863 yards. He set a then NCAA Division II record by catching at least two passes in 46 consecutive games (every game he played in a Wildcat uniform in his four years at WSC). As a senior, he was a First Team All-NSIC South Division selection and was one of 24 candidates for Harlon Hill Trophy, given to the top player in NCAA Division II college football.

As a junior in 2007, Masters hauled in a career-high 80 receptions for 1,179 yards to earn First Team All-NSIC South Division and Daktronics First Team All-Super Region #3 honors, helping WSC to a 9-3 record and the school's first-ever trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs. Masters had 64 catches for 1,097 yards in 2006 as a sophomore, making him the first-ever WSC receiver to record back-to-back 1,000 yard receiving seasons.



Scott McLaughlin
Defensive Coordinator

Scott McLaughlin moves into his 10th year as an assistant football coach and second season as defensive coordinator at Wayne State College.

McLaughlin was promoted to defensive coordinator following the 2014 season after serving six seasons as special teams coordinator and linebackers coach. He also worked with the defensive line for four seasons prior to being special teams coordinator.

Scott is a graduate of the University of Nebraska-Omaha and played defensive line for the Mavericks. He also served as a student assistant at UNO and worked as the team's video coordinator for three seasons before coming to Wayne State College.

McLaughlin earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska-Omaha in continuing education and received his master's degree at Wayne State College in sport management in May, 2009.

Scott and his wife Lindsay reside in Wayne with their sons Cooper and Noah.



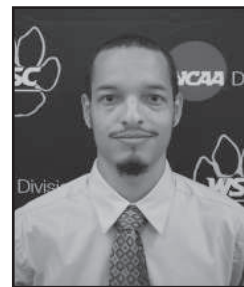
James Miles Jr.
Special Teams Coordinator

James Miles Junior is in his second year as an assistant football coach at Wayne State College. He will serve as special teams coordinator and secondary coach.

Miles Junior comes to Wayne State after working the 2014 season as a strength and conditioning coach at the University of Houston. Prior to that, he worked two years (2012-13) as a graduate assistant defensive backs coach at Bethel University in Tennessee. While at Bethel, Miles Jr. was credited with developing All-American cornerback Jocquel Skinner (Dallas Cowboys) and 2013 Mid-South Conference Player of the Year Stoney Burns.

Other coaching experience for Miles Junior includes a two-year stint at the University of Mary, working as the cornerbacks coach in 2008-09.

Miles Junior graduated from the University of Mary where he received a bachelor's of science degree in social and behavioral sciences. He was a standout defensive back for the Marauders, earning All-NSIC honors in 2007 as a senior when he ranked third in the NSIC and 26th in NCAA Division II in passes defended that season at 1.3 per game. Miles Jr. was named Most Valuable Defensive Back in 2006 and '07 and was selected the NSIC Newcomer of the Year in 2004.



Kendall Wright
Wide Receivers Coach

Kendall Wright is in his second season as an assistant coach at Wayne State College and will work with wide receivers.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Wright served three seasons as a graduate assistant coach at Northwest Missouri State. He worked with running backs in 2013 and 2014 and coached wide receivers in 2012. All three seasons, the Bearcats qualified for the NCAA Division II playoffs. NMSU won the national title during the 2013 season (15-0) while posting records of 10-2 in 2014 and 10-3 in the 2012 season.

Wright enjoyed a standout playing career as a wide receiver and kick returner at Northwest Missouri State from 2005-08, playing in four NCAA Division II national championship games for the Bearcats. He was a three-time All MIAA First Team selection and three-time Don Hansen All-Region honoree while collecting Daktronics Second Team All-American honors during his senior season as a return specialist.

Wright closed his playing career ranking second in career receptions (243) at Northwest Missouri State while ranking fourth in career yards (3,253). He was the leading receiver for the Bearcats three seasons (2006, '07, '08). As a return specialist, Wright holds the career record for punt returns at NWMSU with 115 while ranking third in career punt return yards with 1,233.

Wright earned a bachelor degree in corporate recreation and a master degree in education, both from Northwest Missouri State.



WILDCAT ASSISTANT COACHES



Roy Moody *Running Backs*

Roy Moody enters his second year as a graduate assistant coach for the Wayne State College football team and will help coach the running backs in the 2016 season.

Moody comes to Wayne State after working one year (2014) as special teams coach and assistant wide receivers coach at Hartnell College in California. Before that, he spent two seasons (2012-13) as special teams coordinator and receivers coach at

Gavilan College in California. He also coached wide receivers at Phoenix College in Arizona for two seasons.

Prior to coaching at Phoenix College, Moody worked five years as the wide receivers coach at Millennium High School in Goodyear, Arizona.

Moody earned a bachelor degree in administrative justice from Arizona State (2001). He began work on a master's degree in athletic administration and coaching from Concordia University in Irvine, California in 2011.



Sean Reeder *Offensive Line*

Sean Reeder moves into his second year as a graduate assistant football coach at Wayne State College and will work with the offensive line.

Reeder comes to WSC after serving one season (2014) as an assistant coach at California Lutheran University where he coached the offensive line and tight ends.

Reeder attended Johns Hopkins University in Maryland where he played right guard on the offensive line from 2009-13, earning a bachelor of science degree in biomedical engineering.

A native of Camarillo, California, Reeder also coached one season at the high school level, serving as the offensive line coach at Agoura High School. Reeder is pursuing a master's degree in exercise science at Wayne State College.



Abdullah Sabir *Defensive Backs*

Abdullah Sabir moves into his second year as a graduate assistant football coach at Wayne State College and will help coach defensive backs.

Sabir comes to Wayne State from Benedictine College in Kansas where he was a player and coach at the school. He served as an assistant coach for 1 1/2 years. As a player, he was the team's second leading tackler in the 2013 season as a senior with

87 stops while helping the Ravens to a 10-2 record and a berth in the NAIA Division II playoffs. Sabir added five tackles for loss, two interceptions and two fumble recoveries to earn All-Heartland of America Athletic Conference Third Team honors.

Sabir started his playing career at San Francisco City College where he played from 2007-09 and was a member of the national championship team in 2007. He then transferred to the University of Kansas in 2010 where he sat out that season as a redshirt.

Earning a bachelor degree in mass communications/media studies from Benedictine, Sabir has also served two year as a youth counselor at YMCA of San Francisco tutoring inner city youth. He is pursuing a master's degree from Wayne State College in sport management.



Ryan Busz *Defensive Line*

Ryan Busz is in his first season at Wayne State College. Before getting hired in January as a defensive graduate assistant and defensive line coach, Ryan spent a year coaching linebackers at Garden City Community College after working at Indiana University for six seasons

At Garden City Community College, Ryan worked under Head Coach Jeff Sims and helped lead one of the more dominate defenses in the NJCAA. He coached the Spaulding NJCAA Defensive Player of the Year Jeremy Faulk as well as All-KJCCA linebackers Delshawn Phillips and Gabriel Luyanda.

At Indiana, Ryan worked for Head Coach Kevin Wilson who led the Hoosiers to their first bowl bid in seven seasons last year. Under Wilson and his staff, he worked as a student assistant. In his six seasons, Ryan worked for two coaching staffs, three defensive coordinators and a number of highly accredited coaches. He graduated Indiana University with a history degree.

A native of North Manchester, Indiana, Busz is pursuing a master's degree from Wayne State College in sport management.



Brad Ottis *Defensive Line*

Arguably the greatest defensive player in Wayne State football history, Brad Ottis moves into his second season on the Wildcat coaching staff as a volunteer coach working with the defensive line.

Ottis was a dominating defensive lineman/end for the Wildcats during his playing career from 1990-93. The Fremont Bergan graduate recorded 45 career sacks and 217 career tackles which led to a standout NFL career in the late 1990's.

As a senior in 1993, Ottis helped WSC to a 9-1 record and was named to several All-America teams. He was later selected to play in the Blue-Gray All-Star football classic on Christmas Day and the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Alabama in January, 1994. Despite being double-teamed much of the season, Ottis racked up 82 tackles and 14 quarterback sacks (124 yds) and 27 tackles for loss (173 yds).

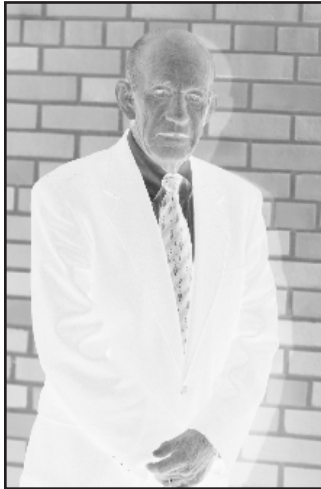
Ottis was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in the 1994 NFL draft. He played in 13 games in his first NFL season. The Rams then moved to St. Louis where he played one more season for the Rams before signing a free agent deal with the Arizona Cardinals in 1996. Ottis played for the Cardinals through the 2000 season, starting 11 games for Arizona in the 2000 season while recording a career high 38 tackles.

Following his NFL career, Ottis played several seasons of indoor football with the Sioux City Bandits. He also worked as a defensive line coach for the Nebraska Lawdawgs as recent as 2011.

Ottis resides in Norfolk.

2016 SEASON OUTLOOK



The Wayne State College football team hopes to shake the injury bug that has hit the Wildcat program the last two seasons.

Wayne State opened 3-1 last year, but the Wildcats suffered numerous injuries that included three different starting quarterbacks and WSC ended the year winning just one more game to finish 4-7 overall and 1-6 in the NSIC South. Two years ago following a 4-2 start, WSC saw 19 players either miss one game or suffer a season-ending injury as the 'Cats won just one game the rest of the year to finish 5-6 in 2014.

"Staying healthy is big this season," said 12th year head coach Dan McLaughlin, who became Wayne State's all-time wins leader last season and is now 63-60 overall and 59-49 in the NSIC. "All of the injuries have taken its toll, but we also have a lot of younger players that gained a year of experience at the same time."

The Wildcats return seven starters on offense and six on defense and feature a roster with just six seniors entering the 2016 campaign.

"We have a lot of speed, kids that can run and our defense is much improved," added McLaughlin. "We had more kids than ever stay over the summer with workouts and I see lots of improvement in a lot of areas."

Back to lead the offense this season is junior quarterback Zach Osborn (Harlan, Iowa), a medical redshirt last year after suffering a broken thumb on the second series in the second game of the season at nationally ranked Minnesota Duluth.

In his first two seasons as a starter (2013 and 2014), Osborn threw for 5,440 yards and 43 TD's. Osborn's 3,291 passing yards in 2014 (260-446/58%) were the third-most in a single season by a Wildcat quarterback.

Norfolk sophomore Taylor Reedy was pressed into action last year as a redshirt freshman and started seven games and will serve as the backup this season. Reedy posted efficient numbers one year ago completing 146 of 286 passes for 1,538 yards and 10 TD's with just four interceptions. The third spot at quarterback is open with four players competing for the position – redshirt freshman Aaron Bleil (Iowa City West), Mitchell Hansen (Madison, SD), Troyante McConico (Pinole, Calif.) and Victory Sikes (Burwell).

At running back the Wildcats need to replace Ryan Ludlow, who graduated after rushing for 1,039 yards and seven TD's last season to rank third in the NSIC. Juniors Alex Kline and Rashad Trimble expect to get most of the carries in the backfield this season. Kline produced 347

yards last season on 55 carries (6.3 avg.) and two scores serving as backup to Ludlow while Trimble (Bellevue East) sat out last season as a medical redshirt. Oakland-Craig sophomore Nick Arlt is coming off a solid spring and true freshman Isaiah Otis (Camarillo, Calif.) will also contend for playing time in the backfield this season.

Stanton sophomore Houston Huss returns at fullback for the Wildcats after scoring twice last season on seven rushes in short yardage situations.

Sioux City East junior Marcel Dunson returns as the top wide receiver for the Wildcats with 45 catches for 544 yards (12.1 avg.) and six TD's last season. Other top returners in the receiving core include senior Nick Roth from Millard North (18 catches, 189 yds) and sophomore Jacob Hjorth (Norfolk HS) with 12 catches for 142 yards and one score.

Another boost to the wide receiver position is the return of 6-5 sophomore Nathan Rogers of South Sioux City, who returns to the Wildcat roster following academic issues the



past two seasons.

Other wide receivers that will see playing time this season include Des Moines North sophomore Shymere Williams, redshirt freshman Sam Wegner (IKM Manning HS in Iowa) and Boone Central redshirt freshman Zach Glidden.

Keaton Slaughter returns as starting tight end for the Wildcats. The Sioux City Heelan graduate hauled in 17 catches for 182 yards (10.7 avg.) with one TD last season.

Omaha Burke redshirt freshman MJ Blankenfeld will also see time at tight end along with Laurel-Concord/Coleridge junior Justin Saunders, who impressed in the spring after moving from outside linebacker.

The offensive line lost two starters from last season, both guards (Taylor Jensen and Austin Heesacker), to graduation. WSC does return both tackles with senior Shane Finley (First Team All-NSIC South Division last season) starting at right tackle for a third straight season while sophomore Mike Milenkovich (Millard North) returns at left tackle. Junior Kevin Camacho is also a returning starter at the center position.

Senior Ryan Porter will start the season at left guard while sophomore Matt Doeschot (Omaha Skutt Catholic HS) is coming off an excellent spring and opens the year as the starter at right guard.

Sophomore Tyler Garrett (Grand Island Northwest) will rotate as a backup at the two guard positions while sophomore Austin Pelc and redshirt freshman Jayle Hinkle will serve as backups at center. True freshmen Marquise Jones (Cedar Falls, Iowa)

and Michael Bentley (Atlanta, Ga.) will also factor into the mix on the Wildcat offensive line this season.

Both kicking positions will feature newcomers this year. The placekicker will be Harlan, Iowa freshman Ethan Knudson, a Class 3A First Team All-State kicker as a senior after going 49 of 52 on PAT kicks and 10 of 12 on field goals while recording 76 touchbacks in his career. Carroll, Iowa sophomore Cody Netusil makes the move to punter this season after playing tight end. He was an Iowa Class 3A Second Team All-State punter as a senior in high school averaging 38 yards per punt.

The Wayne State defense returns six starters, led by three returners in the secondary.

Sophomore Logan Weinandt is Wayne State's Player to Watch on defense in the NSIC this season after posting a strong second half in the 2015 campaign. The Hartington Cedar Catholic graduate was third on the team in tackles for loss (6.5 for 31 yds) and was sixth in total tackles with 37. Senior Jarrod Bazata will man the other defensive end position with redshirt freshmen Kory Fitch and Richard Stevenson along with junior Randy Bryan all battling for playing time.

Juniors DaQuan Samuel and Jonathan Bland are the top returners on the defensive interior line. Bland (Lincoln North-east) started all 11 games last season while Samuel played regularly and made two starts at defensive tackle. Sophomores Trevor Carstens (Wahoo) and Austin Gubbels (Randolph) and junior college transfer Justin Pleasant will push for playing time as well.

Junior DeWayne Scott and sophomore Christian Campos return at the middle linebacker position. Scott is the team's top returning tackler from one year ago (3rd with 47 tackles) while Campos appeared in eight games and was stellar late in the season and finished with 32 tackles.

Senior Taylor Hoffman will start the year at Sam linebacker with junior college transfer Emeka Etta and Omaha Central redshirt freshman Kolbie Foster battling for playing time as well. Redshirt freshmen Tyler Thomsen (Fremont Bergan) and Cody Eischeid (IKM Manning in Iowa) both had solid springs and will compete for the Will linebacker spot.

The Wildcat secondary has the most returning experience and some talented underclassmen that will make it the strong suit of the defensive unit.

Senior Cam Montgomery returns at strong safety. Junior college transfer Glenn Harris and Cedar Falls, Iowa sophomore Nick deBuhr will also see action at strong safety. Redshirt freshman Ian Ailts and true freshmen Corbin Foster (Omaha Central) and Kevin Ranson (Port Allen, La.) are battling for the free safety position.

Junior Tyri Bethea and sophomore Jamaal Conway-Smith return as starters at the cornerback position. Conway-Smith (Omaha Westside HS) led WSC in interceptions (3-52 yds) and

passes defended (15) last season to rank fourth in the NSIC while Bethea ranked fourth on the team in tackles with 44 while ranking second in breakups (5) and third in solo tackles with 36.

Wayne State opens the 2016 season on Thursday evening, September 1st visiting MSU Moorhead in a Northern Sun Conference contest starting at 6 p.m.

The 11-game schedule features four teams that are pre-season nationally ranked (Minnesota State seventh, Sioux Falls 23rd and Augustana 25th in the AFCA Coaches' Poll and Bemidji State 19th in Sporting News Magazine) and three that qualified for the NCAA Division II playoffs last season (Minnesota State, Sioux Falls and Augustana) with eight of the opponents over .500 last season.

Wayne State was picked to finish 12th in the NSIC overall and seventh in the South Division in the NSIC Preseason Coaches' Poll that was released on August 3rd.

"We didn't get much respect in the league...nobody is looking at us," remarked Coach McLaughlin. "The NSIC South is so strong that if you can

compete in our division you also have a chance of making the NCAA Division II playoffs."

The home opener for Wayne State College is Saturday, September 10th when the Wildcats host Minot State in a 6 p.m. contest at Bob Cunningham Field.

THE NORTHERN SUN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE



From its modest origin as a six-team alliance over eight decades ago, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference has matured into a 16-team union of upper Midwest colleges and universities to form arguably the strongest affiliation in NCAA Division II.

The NSIC can trace its roots to 1932 when six schools, including Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University, Mankato, Minnesota State University Moorhead, St. Cloud State University, University of Minnesota Duluth and Winona State University signed on as charter members. All remain active subscribers of the league today.

Southwest Minnesota State University was added in 1969, followed by Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (NE) in 1998, Concordia University-St. Paul and the University of Minnesota Crookston in 1999, the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006, Augustana College in 2008 and Minot State University and the University of Sioux Falls in 2012.

Minnesota State, St. Cloud State and Minnesota Duluth left the league to join the North Central Conference but returned to the NSIC in 2008. University of Minnesota, Morris and Michigan Tech University were once part of the NSIC family as well. In 1992 the NSIC became a true athletic showcase for both men and women with the merger of the traditional Northern Intercollegiate Conference (NIC) and the Northern Sun Conference (NSC), the home of women's athletics since 1979.

Before NSIC affiliates became certified for championship competition in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in 1995, its member institutions filled prominent roles in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). NIC and NSC clubs annually dispatched qualified student-athletes to national tournaments and captured several NAIA teams and individual championships.

The NSIC celebrates its 83rd season this year and clearly continues to make a major imprint nationally, winning 16 national titles since 2006. Winona State men claimed NCAA II Basketball Championships in 2006 and 2008 and narrowly missed a third crown, falling in a last second shot in 2007. In addition, the Warriors established a NCAA II record of 57 consecutive victories.

Concordia University launched an ongoing streak of seven consecutive NCAA II Volleyball Championships in 2007. In 2008 the Golden Bears won 37 straight matches after a season opening loss on their way to a second consecutive title and scripted a marvelous encore in 2009 with a perfect 37-0 finish, a third straight national crown and a winning streak of 74 straight matches. In 2010 the Golden Bear extended that NCAA record win streak to 75 before dropping their second match of the season. They started 2010 with a 10-4 record before ripping off 22 straight wins on their way to their fourth straight national title. In 2011, after overcoming midseason injuries, the Golden Bears hit their stride. The Golden Bears knocked off No. 1 and undefeated Cal State San Bernardino to become the first team in the history of NCAA Division II women's volleyball, to capture a fifth consecutive NCAA Division II Championship. Then in 2012, the Golden Bears again made a late season and championship match surge as they defeated Tampa 3-2 after trailing 0-2 to win their sixth straight NCAA DII Volleyball National Championship. In 2013 Concordia-St. Paul won the NSIC regular season title, but was defeated in the NSIC Tournament Championship by Minnesota Duluth. But from there the Golden Bears ripped off six straight NCAA postseason wins, extending their streak to 42, on their way to a 3-0 sweep of BYU-Hawaii to win another NCAA National Championship.

In a most surprising run, Minnesota Duluth completed a perfect 15-0 season by winning the 2008 NCAA Division II Football Championship. The Bulldogs, limited to only 24 scholarships by league rule, swept a field of fully-funded teams, including top ranked Grand Valley State and number three Northwest Missouri State. Two years later, in 2010, the Bulldogs repeated that feat, going 15-0 again to win the national championship. The Bulldogs became the first NCAA DII football squad to win two national championships with undefeated records.

Minnesota State added more luster to the league by finishing 32-2 and claiming the 2008-09 NCAA II Women's Basketball Championship. The Mavericks rolled to a wild 103-94 victory over Franklin Pierce to set a NCAA record for total points in the title game. Augustana College got into the mix of national championships in 2011 when their women's cross country team turned in a true team performance in Spokane, Wash. All five Viking runners earned All-American status as Augustana won the first cross country national championship in NSIC history.

After multiple runnerup finishes, the St. Cloud State Huskies finally captured the national championship in wrestling in 2015 and repeated again in 2016. The Augustana men's basketball team won their first-ever NCAA Division II national title in 2016 for the league's 16th national championship.

The NSIC has also had 10 athletes awarded with the NCAA Elite 89 Award on 12 occasions. Earning the award were **Leisa McClintock (Wayne State, Volleyball, 2015)**, Tavia Rutherford (USF, Golf, 2015) Claire Sames (SMSU, Volleyball, 2014), Kara Pioske (Concordia-St. Paul, Volleyball 2013), Billy Brockmueller (Sioux Falls, Cross Country 2012, 2014 & IDTF 2014), Ben Keller (Minnesota State, Baseball 2012 & 2013), Cody Lensing (Augustana, Wrestling 2012), Kendra Huettl (Minnesota State, Softball, 2011), Matt Braithwaite (Augustana, Cross Country, 2010) and Lauren Brown (Winona State, Outdoor Track & Field, 2010).

Member schools continue to emphasize the educational, entertainment and unifying value of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. The NSIC is committed to providing rewarding experiences for its student-athletes, and while the challenges that loom are sizable, indeed, the NSIC is surely well positioned for the future.

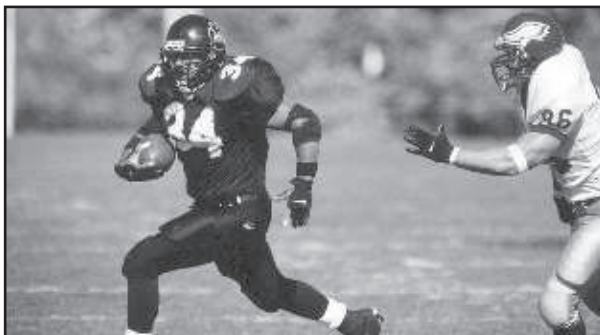
