ABOUT WAYNE STATE COLLEGE

Founded in 1891 as Nebraska Normal College, Wayne State College earned a distinguished reputation as a teachers' college from its early days. We're still a great teachers' college—but so much more!

Innovative Programs

Wayne State's four academic schools—Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Counseling, and Natural and Social Sciences—offer a comprehensive selection of courses. You'll find over 90 majors and minors ranging from pre-professional studies to criminal justice to a nationally accredited undergraduate sports management program, and many others in 14 academic departments across campus.

The Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) at Wayne State College provides pre-professional training in medicine, pharmacy and dentistry in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Medical Center. Students who successfully complete the program at WSC are automatically accepted into medical, pharmacy, or dental school at UNMC.

Thinking of teaching? Upper-level education majors at Wayne State have the opportunity to participate in the Northeast Nebraska Teacher Academy (NENTA), the first of its kind in the nation, where WSC students receive classroom experience with participating K-12 schools in the region. Through WSC WebCat On-line, students can register for class, check on grades and student accounts, from the convenience of their home or residence hall room.



Excellent Career Preparation

Whether you plan to be an accountant or a wildlife biologist, you'll receive the preparation you need at Wayne State College. In addition to classes taught by experts in their fields, Wayne State College provides internship and cooperative programs for students in a number of majors. Many regional businesses actively recruit Wayne State students for internships, with many of these internships resulting in full-time employment after graduation.

The WSC Career Services office assists students with career exploration, job preparation skills, interviews, as well as arranging internships and cooperative experiences.



Personal Attention

Students at Wayne State College don't get lost in the crowd. With an average class size of 21 and a student/faculty ratio of 20:1, WSC students get to know their professors and classmates. Eighty percent of Wayne State professors have the highest degree in their field—and most teach first-year as well as upper-level classes. You will find dedicated professors and instructors at Wayne State College: teaching is their life's work, and their enthusiasm is contagious.

Wayne State College offers a variety of support services and programs to students. The heart of the WSC campus is the Student Center, where academic and personal support services are located. The Learning Center and Peer Tutoring Program are designed to help all students achieve the highest possible level of success in their studies.

Active Campus Life

With more than 85 clubs and organizations on campus, Wayne State College students have many opportunities to be involved in campus and community life.

Wayne State College has an active Greek life, with Greek Olympics being held at Homecoming each fall, as well as other social and service activities. The Student Activities Board (SAB) plans a variety of special programs each year, bringing musical groups such as Vertical Horizon, Five for Fighting, Goo Goo Dolls, Sawyer Brown, Blackhawk, Firehouse, and others to campus. Comedian Adam Sandler and other national performers have performed on campus.

The Multicultural Center, one of the newest campus programs, provides outreach and support to Wayne State College students and the region through special events during the year.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's track and field (indoor and outdoor) baseball, softball and women's soccer.

Scenic Surroundings

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Student Center, Ramsey Theatre, Studio Arts

Building and Connell Hall. A new state-of-the-art outdoor track was completed in the summer of 2014 while field turf was installed in the summer of 2013 to complete a \$1.3 million athletic renovation at Bob Cunningham Field/Memorial Stadium.

Wayne State College's seven residence halls provide students with a comfortable, affordable and convenient place to live with easy access to the entire campus community. Each hall has lounges and recreation areas, laundry facilities, mail service, academic tutors and study areas.



WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Marysz Rames *President*

Dr. Marysz Rames was appointed the 13th president of Wayne State College by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees on June 18, 2015. She came to Wayne State from Dakota State University in Madison, S.D., where she had served as interim president since Aug. 15, 2014.

Rames earned her education doctorate in adult and higher education in 1997 from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. She earned her bachelor degree in business administration and communication studies, with a minor in economics, in 1982, and her master's degree in educational administration in 1986, from University of Northern Colorado in Greeley, Colorado.

She spent one year (2014-15) as interim president at Dakota State University (DSU) in Madison, South Dakota. During this time she was instrumental in promoting a strong shared governance system, finalizing the university's five-year strategic plan, revitalizing the university's Foundation and actively raising funds to increase scholarships. Rames also worked with the legislature and others in several major new construction and renovation projects.

Prior to her interim appointment, Rames served as the vice president for student affairs from 2000 until June 2015 at South Dakota State University (SDSU) in Brookings. As the senior student affairs officer, Rames oversaw numerous university divisions and initiatives, including, but not limited to, enrollment management, student success, strategic planning, fundraising/fiscal management, diversity and inclusion, collaborative partnerships, leadership development, and increasing efficiency and effectiveness for students.

Rames served as an assistant professor of education at SDSU, teaching courses in administration and leadership in student affairs; serving on master's and doctoral students' graduate committees; and conducting research in financial trends in higher education, student retention and completion, and affordability and access to higher education. Rames also served as the interim associate vice president of student affairs (1997-1999) and the interim director for diversity enhancement (1999) at SDSU.

Prior to her arrival at SDSU, Rames worked at Aims Community College in Greeley, Colo., and the University of Wyoming in Laramie. Her scholarly presentations include topics such as student services, retention efforts, and working with today's college students.

Rames and her husband, Steve, have two children - Matthew and Jessica.



Mike Powicki *Director of Athletics*

Mike Powicki is in his eighth year (2019-20) as Athletic Director at Wayne State College. Powicki began his duties at Wayne State College on July 23, 2012 and has been instrumental in improvements to athletic facilities and staffing during his first six years at the institution. In his seven years at WSC, over \$7 million has been invested in facility improvements, staffing and operations enhancements.

Rice Auditorium benefitted from the most recent upgrades in the summer of 2019 with the addition of new (hanging) baskets, hallway graphics of current and past Wildcat athletes to enhance the look of Rice Auditorium and a newly designed floor/playing surface.

The Bob Cunningham Field Press Box Replacement project covering \$3.9 million was done in 2018. The project increased the amount of work space for media and staff working home events at Cunningham Field. The new facility also provides universal space on the lower level that will give WSC athletics an opportunity to host special events and create additional revenue through corporate sponsorships and donor stewardship.

In the fall of 2018 new Daktronics video scoreboards and a sound system totaling over \$200,000 were installed in Rice Auditorium to enhance the game day experience for Wildcat fans and student-athletes.

Wildcat student-athletes continued to excel in the classroom during the 2018-19 school year. 11 of the 13 sports at Wayne State posting a cumulative grade point average over 3.00. WSC had 236 Presidential Scholar Athletes and 107 NSIC All-Academic selections with 52 student-athletes posting a perfect 4.00 GPA in either the 2018 spring and/or fall semester. Wildcat athletics also produced three Academic All-Americans in the 2018-19 school year and had two NSIC Elite 18 Award winners (Aaron Ras in baseball and Brock Hegarty in men's track and field).

The first major athletic project that was completed under the guidance of Powicki was the Bob Cunningham Field/Memorial Stadium Renovation project. The project began in May, 2013 and was highlighted by installation of artificial turf, ornamental fencing, press box graphics and new goal posts. The \$1.6 million project also included the widening, lengthening and re-sodding of the Wildcat Soccer Pitch, along with installing new irrigation, facility fencing, scoreboard and making the facility ADA accessible. The Dr. LeRoy Simpson Track at Memorial Stadium was re-surfaced and painted in the summer of 2014 as the final phase of the project.

Powicki currently serves on the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association Board, NCAA Division II Central Regional Advisory Committee for baseball and is on the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame Committee. He also serves locally as the Wayne Kiwanis Board President, Vice President of the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors and Revitalize Wayne Committee.

Powicki currently serves on the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association Board, NCAA Central Regional Advisory Committee for baseball and is on the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame Committee. He also serves locally as the Wayne Kiwanis Board President along with the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors and Revitalize Wayne Committees.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Powicki served as Assistant Athletic Director at Minnesota State University in Mankato, Minnesota. He was the Assistant Athletic Director for Marketing and Corporate Partnerships from 2008-10 and was promoted to Assistant Director of Athletics for Development and Strategic Partnerships in 2010 where he served in that role until July 2012 when he arrived at Wayne State.

While at MSU, Powicki successfully developed and executed the athletics department revenue generation plan, responsible for generating \$1.7 million annually. Powicki managed all fundraising, development and marketing operations while overseeing the athletic department marketing/fundraising staff. Powicki also served as the athletic department's senior development officer functioning as a liaison to the MSU Foundation and the Vice President for Advancement, focusing on major gifts and special projects.

Powicki also served as Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs at Upper Iowa University from 2004-2008 where he was a part of the Peacocks transition from NCAA Division III to NCAA Division II status and into the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. While at Upper Iowa, Powicki monitored all team operations, recruiting and fundraising budgets. Powicki oversaw the UIU Recreation and Fitness Center staff, budget and overall operation.

In his time at Upper Iowa he created and sold athletic corporate sponsorship opportunities, supervised and coordinated all athletic department fundraising activities, developed and implemented the Peacock Club for donors and successfully completed the "Road to Glory" athletic facility capital improvement project. He also served as tournament director for various national and regional NCAA Division II Championship events.

During his tenure at UIU, Powicki served as an adjunct professor for the Exercise and Sports Studies within the Department of Education. Powicki obtained his bachelor degree from the University of Iowa in exercise science in and earned his masters degree in exercise and sport science/sport administration from Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Mike has two daughters - Faith and Elle (pronounced L) - and resides in Wayne.



Mike Barry *Associate Director of Athletics* *Facilities/Rec Center Director*

Mike Barry is in his 20th year (2019-20) as Associate Director of Athletics/Director of Sport & Rec Center at Wayne State College. His duties include scheduling athletic contests and practices, home game management and serving as the athletic and recreational facilities' coordinator.

Barry, who is in his 30th year overall at WSC, was the Wildcat women's basketball head coach for seven seasons from 1989-96. He compiled a 96-91 record, which is third all-time on the school's career victory list. His best team was the 1993-94 squad which posted a 22-5 record.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Barry served two years as an assistant women's basketball coach at Pratt Community College in Kansas. He also coached at Chadron State, Eastern New Mexico University along with Fullerton and Stuart High Schools in Nebraska.

Barry, a native of Grant, was a four-sport athlete at Chadron State. He was a three-time NAIA national qualifier in the triple jump, and also lettered in basketball, football, and cross country. Barry earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Chadron State in 1983 and earned his master's degree in secondary education from Chadron State in 1988.

Mike and his wife, Jeannette, have two children: Jordan and Jalen, and they reside in Wayne.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field

Memorial Stadium has been “Home of the Wildcats” since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium following World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans while the bleachers on the east side of the field can seat an additional 750 fans. During the summer of 2013, Cunningham Field underwent a renovation with synthetic field turf replacing the grass surface.



Recreation Center

The Wayne State College Recreation Center opened in 1987 and is the college’s main facility for student recreation and selected athletic activities.

The main area in the Recreation Center provides a six-lane running track that was resurfaced in 2003 with one of the best surfaces used today. Three full-size courts for basketball, volleyball, tennis, and badminton are also housed in the rec center. Racquetball, weight training, aerobics, gymnastics, wrestling, and sauna facilities are all available to WSC students, faculty and staff as well as residents of the Wayne community.

The Recreation Center also houses locker rooms for Wildcat athletic teams and offices for the WSC athletic department.





WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Rice Auditorium

Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad. Recent upgrades to the arena include new baskets and rebranded playing surface in 2019, a new scoreboard, videoboard and sound system in the fall of 2018, new lights in 2011 and new/renovated locker rooms for all three teams in 2008.

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College president from 1951-56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships, 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic and the 2012 NCAA Division II Central Region Women's Basketball Championships.



Pete Chapman Baseball & Softball Complex

The baseball and softball complex opened in the spring of 1996. Located north of Memorial Stadium, the complex provides a picturesque setting for baseball and softball games. The baseball field received a face lift in the summer of 2004 with the addition of lockerrooms, rest rooms, a concession stand and a press box. A new outfield fence was installed before the start of the 2005 season.

In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex in honor of the late Wayne State College athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department. In the fall of 2006, a locker room/press box was constructed at the softball field, giving softball players their own locker room facilities. Prior to the start of the 2007 season, a new 10-inning electronic scoreboard was installed at the baseball field.

In the fall of 2007, a concrete pad and walkway was installed from the Recreation Center parking lot to the baseball/softball complex. The concrete walkway replaced the previous hard rock path, making it easier for fans and the handicapped to watch Wildcat softball action. A large concrete pad was also poured between the softball and baseball fields and the area between the clubhouses had new sod installed, making the Pete Chapman Complex even more fan-friendly.

In the spring/summer of 2008, batting cages and an enclosed pitching cage/bullpen area were also constructed north of the softball clubhouse giving Wildcat softball players more tools to work on their skills. The summer of 2009 saw a new wood fence installed in the outfield for softball.

The Pete Chapman Softball Complex hosted the 2010 NCAA Division II Central Regional and a new digital scoreboard was installed at the softball field in the spring of 2011, making the Pete Chapman Complex one of the premier softball/baseball facilities in the Central Region.





SOCCKER FACILITIES



Weight Room

Recognizing the importance of first-class facilities for their student athletes, the Wayne State College athletic department completed a state-of-the-art renovation to its athletic facilities in the fall of 2008, including a new weight room constructed at Memorial Stadium.

All Wayne State student athletes have utilized the benefits of new weight room equipment that features 18 platforms and racks, dumbbells and selectorized machines. The facility allows 72 student athletes to work out at the same time.

The project has enhanced Wayne State's ability to attract high quality student athletes and provide current team members the resources necessary to compete at the NCAA Division II level.



Soccer Locker Room

Part of the \$4.5 million state-of-the-art renovation to Memorial Stadium and Rice Auditorium in 2009 included a locker room with shower facilities for the WSC women's soccer team located in Memorial Stadium. The locker room features custom-built wooden lockers made by Wayne-based Heritage Industries along with showers and restroom facilities for the Wildcat women's soccer players.



Soccer Press Box

Thanks to a donation from Vulcraft Corporation of Norfolk in 2012, the Wayne State College soccer field has a permanent press box. The metal structure has a roof and will allow for filming of all home soccer contests along with a stable setting for statistics, clock operators and P.A. announcers.





WSC SOCCER COMPLEX



Located east of Memorial Stadium and adjacent to the baseball field, the WSC Soccer Field made its debut in the fall of 1997, in time for the inaugural Wildcat soccer season. Prior to becoming the varsity soccer venue, the field was used as an athletic practice facility and an intramural playing field.

During the spring and summer of 2013, the Wayne State College Soccer Complex underwent major renovations that were part of the \$1.5 million athletic improvement project. Improvements to the soccer field included a new scoreboard, fencing and widened playing surface.





ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



Muffin Morris *Head Athletic Trainer*



Dr. Muffin Morris is in her 12th year (2019-20) at Wayne State College as the Head Athletic Trainer. She oversees athletic training for all 15 sports at Wayne State College and is the head athletic trainer for football and men's basketball.

She also serves as an advisor to the WSC Student Athlete Advisory Committee and worked three years (2013-16) as senior women's administrator.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Morris worked four years at the University of South Dakota. She served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and worked with football, swimming/diving, track and field/cross country and volleyball programs with the Coyotes.

Morris, a native of Chariton, Iowa, earned her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University in athletic training in 2004. She received her master's degree from the University of South Dakota in 2006 in health, physical education and recreation and obtained her doctorate degree in adult/higher education from the University of South Dakota on July 31, 2008.

Morris resides in Wayne.

Athletic Training Room

The Athletic Training Room is the site of taping, treatment and injury evaluations. It has a variety of up to date, quality equipment. A partial inventory of modalities available for athletes include: three whirlpools, RichMar Theratouch 7.7 electrical stimulation machine, RichMar HV-II combination ultrasound/electrical stimulation machine, RichMar portable ultrasound machine, Game-ready intermittent compression machine, Therabath Parafin machine, and Hydrocollator heat pack units. The athletic training room also has six computers.



Dr. Joseph Carreau *Board Eligible Orthopaedic Surgeon*



Dr. Joseph Carreau joined CNOS in 2016 after completing fellowship in Orthopaedic Sports Medicine at the University of Iowa. He is originally from Colorado where he attended Colorado State University for his undergraduate education. Thereafter, he pursued medical school at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska and in 2005 traveled to San Diego to complete his orthopaedic surgery residency at the University of California, San Diego. There he received extensive training

in adult and pediatric trauma and joint replacement surgery. He developed a special interest in advanced arthroscopy and the treatment of athletic injuries, thus chose to pursue fellowship training in Sports Medicine through the University of Iowa.

At the University of Iowa, Dr. Carreau was trained by national leaders in the practice of advanced arthroscopic techniques, cartilage transplantation, shoulder instability, patellofemoral problems, ligamentous injury of the knee and shoulder replacement surgery. He also received extensive training in the treatment of all athletes at the University of Iowa and was assistant team physician to the Hawkeye Football Team during their historic 2015 season.

Carreau currently serves as Orthopaedic team physician to the Wayne State Wildcats and assists with multiple local high schools. Dr. Carreau has published papers on various orthopaedic topics and is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery, the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine and the Arthroscopy Association of North America. Dr. Carreau and his wife have four children. He is an avid fisherman and enjoys the outdoors.

Dr. Michael Nguyen *Team Orthopedist*

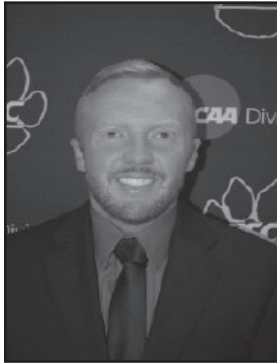

HEAD COACH JOE CLEARY



Joe Cleary Head Coach

Joe Cleary moves into his third season as Head Women's Soccer Coach (fifth overall) at Wayne State College. He was promoted to head coach of the Wildcat women's soccer program on March 7, 2017, becoming the ninth head coach in program history. In two seasons as Wildcat leader, Cleary has coached WSC to records of 8-20-7 overall and 7-17-6 in NSIC contests.

In 2018, Wayne State was 4-12-1 overall and 12th place in the NSIC with a 4-10-1 league mark. The team posted its first ever win in 18 career meetings vs. Minnesota Duluth (2-0) and won for the first time ever at Upper Iowa (1-0). Wayne State's 6-0 win over Minnesota Crookston were the most goals scored by the Wildcat team since 2010. Senior forward

Christina Stasi made school history by becoming the first ever Academic All American, earning Google Cloud Third Team honors with a 4.00 grade point average.

In his first season as head coach, Cleary guided the Wildcats to records of 4-8-6 overall and 3-7-5 in the NSIC. WSC improved its shots on goal average from 11.8 to 13.8 and saw 12 different players score goals during the season. Academically the team excelled receiving the National Soccer Coaches Association of America Team Academic Award for a fourth straight year with a cumulative grade point average of 3.57.

Cleary spent two years as an assistant coach with the Wildcats before taking the head coaching position. In his two years as an assistant, he helped WSC make a six-win improvement and the schools' second winning season in the last 11 years.

In 2016, Cleary helped coach the Wildcats to a 9-6-3 overall record and 6-6-3 mark in the NSIC. The nine overall wins were the most at WSC since 2006 and the six conference wins were the most since the 2005 campaign.

In his first season with the Wildcat program, Wayne State was 4-11-3 and 4-10-1 in the NSIC. The team allowed 10 fewer goals and the team's goals against average dropped from 2.39 to 1.83 in one season under Cleary.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Cleary spent the 2014 season as a graduate assistant coach with the University of Mary women's program helping the Marauders to a 6-8-4 record overall and 5-7-3 mark in the NSIC.

Cleary worked the 2013 season as an assistant coach for the Concordia (Minn.) College men's program, was a volunteer assistant coach in 2012 for the University of Wyoming women and worked as an assistant with the University of Mary men in the 2011 season.

Serving as a high school coach since 2008, Cleary was an assistant for the West Fargo High boys in 2008, Bismarck High School boys (2009-11), Bismarck High School girls (2010), Century High girls (2013) and head coach for two seasons (2014-15) for the St. Mary's Central High School girls team. His 2015 team at St. Mary's Central recorded a fourth place finish at the North Dakota State Tournament.

Cleary has also served as a club coach since 2007 with the Dakota United Soccer Club and worked as the Select Program Director for the Tri-City Storm Soccer Club in Fargo, North Dakota. He has also been involved with the Dakota and Wyoming Soccer Olympic Development Programs and has served on several soccer camp staffs, including Regis University, University of Denver, University of Wyoming, University of Colorado, North Dakota State University, Rushmore Soccer and Steamboat Soccer Academy.

Cleary obtained his bachelor degree in athletic training from the University of Mary in 2012 and earned a master's degree in human performance in 2018. Joe is a certified athletic trainer and earned his USSF "C" license in 2013. Cleary resides in Wayne.





ASSISTANT COACH CHRIS MCNAUGHTON

Chris McNaughton is in his first year (2019-20) as an Assistant Women's Soccer Coach at Wayne State College.

McNaughton comes to Wayne State after serving the last three seasons as head coach at Missouri Southern, where he inherited a team that was 2-15-1 and improved the Lions' win total each season culminating with a 7-8-3 mark and 4-6-2 league record in 2018.

Prior to Missouri Southern, McNaughton was an assistant coach at Division I Louisiana-Monroe for three years (2013-15) and four seasons (2009-12) as assistant coach at Arkansas-Little Rock.

McNaughton gained head coaching experience at Lyon College, an NAIA program in Arkansas where he was 34-19-3 in three years after inheriting a program that was 8-39 prior to his arrival. He was 13-6 in his first year as head coach (2006) and coached 15 players that received First or Second Team TranSouth All-Conference honors.

McNaughton began his coaching career as an assistant men's and women's soccer coach for four years at his alma mater, Ottawa University in Kansas. He helped coach the women's team to three consecutive KCAC post season tournament titles and three straight regular season championships while reaching the NAIA Region IV Tournament four straight seasons. The men's team won the 2004 KCAC postseason tournament title and made its first-ever Region IV tournament appearance under McNaughton.

As a player at Ottawa, McNaughton was a five-time NAIA Academic All-American and graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration and minor in management information systems in 2002 followed by a master's degree in business administration from Ottawa in 2004.

2019 WILDCAT SEASON OUTLOOK



There's good news and bad news for third-year head coach Joe Cleary entering the 2019 women's soccer season. The good news is that the Wildcats return four of its top six scorers from last season while the bad news is the WSC defense took a major hit due to the graduation of six seniors.

Wayne State was 4-12-1 overall and 12th place in the NSIC in 2018 with a 4-10-1 league mark. In two years as leader of the Wildcats, Coach Cleary has played 13 overtime contests and is just 1-9-3 in extra session games, a stat that will have to improve if Wayne State looks to make the NSIC Tournament for the first time since 2006.

"We need to improve defensively and in holding leads," remarked Cleary. "We were 13th in goals conceded last year and we lost too many games where we scored the first goal."

The Wildcats will be relatively young this season as the teams' 26-player roster has six seniors, three juniors, six sophomores and 11 freshmen.

"Our recruiting class was the largest it has been since my time here," added Coach Cleary. "All 11 are unique in both the way they play and their personalities. I am excited to see what they can add to our current roster. I thought the competition for playing time last year was fierce, but it will be at another level this year."

Lost to graduation was All-NSIC Second Team selection Christina Stasi, who produced a team-high four goals and 10 points last season and was Wayne State's leading scorer each of the last two seasons.

The Wildcats do return plenty of firepower offensively and Coach Cleary feels one of the team's strengths will be its' attack.

"We were in the top half of the conference in scoring last year and while we graduated Christina Stasi we still have a lot of returning and incoming firepower to our forward line."

Senior midfielder Sophia Ketchmark, an All-NSIC honorable mention selection last season, is the most experienced returner after producing two goals and three assists (seven points) in 2018.



Another key returner is junior forward Rylie Wehner, who accounted for seven points with three goals and one assist while tied for the team lead with 26 shots last year.

Sophomore midfielder Megan Phillips produced two goals and five points last year while tied for the team lead in shots on goal (13) while Madison Kemp, another sophomore, scored two goals in 12 games before suffering a season-ending injury to cut her season short.

Other returners that scored goals last season for Wayne State were senior forward Carleigh Wilson and junior defender Megan Schuster.



At goalkeeper, senior Rachel Grisham (Columbus HS) is a 2 ½ year starter and brings experience between the posts. 5-11 freshman Regan Ott of Fresno, California is the other goalkeeper on the Wildcat roster and will contend for playing time.

Wayne State has just seven home contests this season and Cleary says the goal for the season is to make the conference tournament.

"Outside of that, we just want to improve from last season," stated Cleary. "As much as we want to say our record doesn't do us justice, at the end of the day it is how we are measured as a program."

The 2019 season opener for Wayne State is Friday, September 6th battling Harding (Ark.) at the Nebraska-Kearney Tournament. The first home contest for the Wildcats is Friday, September 27th battling Minot State at the WSC Soccer Complex in a 3 p.m. game.

"The six seniors this year want team success more than anything," boasted Cleary. "They will each have an important role in our success this year and so far they have embraced their roles and I hope that continues. We are blessed to have all of them as the faces of our program."

THE NORTHERN SUN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE



THE HISTORY OF THE NSIC

From its modest origin as a six-team alliance over eight decades ago, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference has matured into a 16-team union of upper Midwest colleges and universities to form arguably the strongest affiliation in NCAA Division II.

The NSIC can trace its roots to 1932 when six schools, including Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University, Mankato, Minnesota State University Moorhead, St. Cloud State University, University of Minnesota Duluth and Winona State University signed on as charter members. All remain active subscribers of the league today. Southwest Minnesota State University was added in 1969, followed by Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (NE) in 1998, Concordia University-St. Paul and the University of Minnesota Crookston in 1999, the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006, Augustana College in 2008 and Minot State University and the University of Sioux Falls in 2012.

Minnesota State, St. Cloud State and Minnesota Duluth left the league to join the North Central Conference but returned to the NSIC in 2008. University of Minnesota, Morris and Michigan Tech University were once part of the NSIC family as well.

In 1992 the NSIC became a true athletic showcase for both men and women with the merger of the traditional Northern Intercollegiate Conference (NIC) and the Northern Sun Conference (NSC), the home of women's athletics since 1979. Before NSIC affiliates became certified for championship competition in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in 1995, its member institutions filled prominent roles in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). NIC and NSC clubs annually dispatched qualified student-athletes to national tournaments and captured several NAIA teams and individual championships.

The NSIC continues to make a major imprint nationally, winning 23 national titles since 2006. Winona State men claimed NCAA II Basketball Championships in 2006 and 2008 and narrowly missed a third crown, falling in a last second shot in 2007. In addition, the Warriors established a NCAA II record of 57 consecutive victories.

Concordia University launched an ongoing streak of seven consecutive NCAA II Volleyball Championships in 2007. In 2008 the Golden Bears won 37 straight matches after a season opening loss on their way to a second consecutive title and scripted a marvelous encore in 2009 with a perfect 37-0 finish, a third straight national crown and a winning streak of 74 straight matches. In 2010 the Golden Bear extended that NCAA record win streak to 75 before dropping their second match of the season. They started 2010 with a 10-4 record before ripping off 22 straight wins on their way to their fourth straight national title. In 2011, after overcoming midseason injuries, the Golden Bears hit their stride. The Golden Bears knocked off No. 1 and undefeated Cal State San Bernardino to become the first team in the history of NCAA Division II women's volleyball, to capture a fifth consecutive NCAA Division II Championship. Then in 2012, the Golden Bears again made a late season and championship match surge as they defeated Tampa 3-2 after trailing 0-2 to win their sixth straight NCAA DII Volleyball National Championship. In 2013 Concordia-St. Paul won the NSIC regular season title, but was defeated in the NSIC Tournament Championship by Minnesota Duluth. But from there the Golden Bears ripped off six straight NCAA postseason wins, extending their streak to 42, on their way to a 3-0 sweep of BYU-Hawaii to win another NCAA National Championship. After a two year hiatus, the Golden Bears return to the top of Division II volleyball as they won the 2016 and 2017 national championships.

In a most surprising run, Minnesota Duluth completed a perfect 15-0 season by winning the 2008 NCAA Division II Football Championship. The Bulldogs, limited to only 24 scholarships by league rule, swept a field of fully-funded teams, including top ranked Grand Valley State and number three Northwest Missouri State. Two years later, in 2010, the Bulldogs repeated that feat, going 15-0 again to win the national championship. The Bulldogs became the first NCAA DII football squad to win two national championships with undefeated records.

Minnesota State added more luster to the league by finishing 32-2 and claiming the 2008-09 NCAA II Women's Basketball Championship. The Mavericks rolled to a wild 103-94 victory over Franklin Pierce to set a NCAA record for total points in the title game.

In 2017 the Maverick softball team went 64-7 to win the National Championship. The Mavericks went 10-1 in NCAA play, including 5-0 in Salem Virginia as they defeated Angelo State 5-1 in the championship game.

Augustana got into the mix of national championships in 2011 when their women's cross country team turned in a true team performance in Spokane, Wash. All five Viking runners earned All-American status as Augustana won the first cross country national championship in NSIC history. The Vikings men's basketball team won the 2015-16 National Championship after going 34-2 and defeating Lincoln Memorial 90-81 in Frisco, Texas. The 2018 Augustana baseball team became the first NSIC institution to win a national championship in baseball, as the Vikings had an impressive post season, going 8-1 in NCAA play and a perfect 4-0 in Cary, North Carolina to finish the season 52-9.

In 2019 it was the Augustana Softball team that made a run to the national championship as the Vikings went 61-11 and defeated Texas A&M Kingsville twice by the score of 6-4 to win the National Championship.

After multiple runner-up finishes, the St. Cloud State Huskies finally captured the national championship in wrestling in 2015. They repeated in 2016 and then took home the title again in 2018 and 2019.

The NSIC has also had 12 athletes awarded with the NCAA Elite 90 Award on 15 occasions. Earning the award were DJ Pollard (Northern State, Men's Basketball, 2018) Grant Pulver (UMD, Cross Country 2017), **Leisa McClintock (WSC, Volleyball 2015)**, Tavia Rutherford (USF, Golf, 2015) Claire Sames (SMSU, Volleyball, 2014), Kara Pioske (Concordia-St. Paul, Volleyball 2013), Billy Brockmueller (Sioux Falls, Cross Country 2012, 2014 & IDTF 2014), Ben Keller (Minnesota State, Baseball 2012 & 2013), Cody Lensing (Augustana, Wrestling 2012), Kendra Huettl (Minnesota State, Softball, 2011), Matt Braithwaite (Augustana, Cross Country, 2010) and Lauren Brown (Winona State, Outdoor Track & Field, 2010).

Member schools continue to emphasize the educational, entertainment and unifying value of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. The NSIC is committed to providing rewarding experiences for its student-athletes, and while the challenges that loom are sizable, indeed, the NSIC is surely well positioned for the future.
