ABOUT WAYNE STATE COLLEGE



Wayne State College has been a vital part of Northeast Nebraska since James M. Pile founded the college as Nebraska Normal College in 1891. From the early days as a private higher education institution with a handful of faculty and students until today, as a strong and proud member of the Nebraska State College System boasting more than 4,500 students and 450 faculty and staff, Wayne State has served as an educational, economic and cultural engine for Northeast Nebraska and beyond.

Wayne State College is a leading comprehensive college in Northeast Nebraska distinguished by providing quality academic programs in a personalized setting. We're located on a 128-acre campus and boast a 20:1 student-to-faculty ratio. Wayne State College is best known for our friendly atmosphere, affordability, academic excellence, and successful graduates. Wayne State is nationally ranked and has received recognition for affordability, academic excellence, and community service. We strive to produce graduates who will become successful, productive, and contributing members of society.

WSC began as a college primarily for teacher education but now offers more than 130 undergraduate programs and several graduate programs. Education students are provided with valuable opportunities for hands-on teaching experience. Business, criminal justice and pre-professional programs are also popular at WSC. We have a solid reputation in educating future healthcare professionals as well, thanks to a high placement rate in the allied health fields at University of Nebraska Medical Center, as well as other regional schools.

Service-Learning is an important component of education at Wayne State College. Students lead community projects designed to integrate meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility and strengthen communities.

Wayne State inspires students through access to affordable, high quality academic programs, personalized support services, and a culture committed to diversity, sustainability, and creativity. The College strengthens communities by engaging students in experiential learning and leadership opportunities. Wayne State serves the region through cultural opportunities, strategic partnerships, and innovative economic development programs.

WSC takes pride in the success of its extra-curricular activities as well, including performing arts and athletics. Rice Auditorium is the home to the WSC indoor sports programs. It seats approximately 1,700 for basketball and volleyball events. In addition, the auditorium, through the use of its stage, can accommodate 2,500 to 3,000 for commencement, theatrical performances, lectures and other similar events.

Memorial Stadium/Bob Cunningham Field: The stadium is used for seating up to 4,000 spectators for Wayne State College and Wayne High School football games. It also houses a press box and concession stand. WSC also hosts many high school track meets at this facility.



Ley Theatre, located in Brandenburg Hall, has fixed seating for 150. Additional seats may be added to accommodate up to 220. Ramsey Theatre, located in the Peterson Fine Arts Building, can accommodate 650 people on its main floor and balcony.

We are proud to offer exceptional education at an affordable cost. With low tuition rates and financial assistance given to most of our students each year, WSC is the most affordable and best quality four-year college in the region. Our value, combined with personalized attention from caring professors and staff, a friendly campus community, and opportunities to learn in and outside the classroom, makes WSC a great place for students to thrive and advance their futures.

Wayne State's four academic schools, Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Behavioral Sciences, and Science, Health, and Criminal Justice, offer more than 130 programs of study and 55 minors in 15 academic departments, awarding bachelor's, master's and education specialist degrees in a variety of programs and fields. There are 121 full-time, ranked faculty, 118 part-time faculty, and 18 graduate assistants.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's track and field (indoor and outdoor), men's and women's cross country, baseball, softball and women's soccer. Two new sports were added for the 2019-20 season - women's golf and beach volleyball.

Wayne State continues to invest in upgrades to athletic facilities. The most recent additions include the completion of the Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex (formerly the Carlson Natatorium). A new state-of-the-art press box was completed in the summer of 2018 at Bob Cunningham Field. In the last two years Rice Auditorium has installed a videoboard and new branded playing surface to enhance the Wildcat fan experience.

Construction began in the summer of 2023 on the Athletic and Recreation Complex Renovation and Addition project. The \$32-million project is a multi-phased construction project designed to have a significant impact on Wayne State and the region it serves. The project will include a new air-supported structure with an indoor track and turf field and renovations to Rice Auditorium and the Recreation Center and is expected to be completed by the fall of 2025.

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Willow Bowl, Student Center, Ramsey Theatre, Studio Arts Building and Connell Hall.





WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Marysz Rames President

Dr. Marysz Rames was appointed the 13th president of Wayne State College by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees on June 18, 2015. She came to Wayne State from Dakota State University in Madison, S.D., where she had served as interim president since Aug. 15, 2014.

Her tenure at Wayne State has been marked by a strong focus on the future of the college's academic programs, partnerships, Strategic Enrollment Planning, fundraising, raising the college's visibility and constructing and renovating campus facilities to enhance the student learning experience.

Under the leadership of President Rames, Wayne State's total enrollment has increased by 20 percent and academic programs have grown from 90 to 130 with a focus on degrees that align with the changing work force needs. Additionally, there has been a focus on building relationships and solidifying partnerships with institutions within the University of Nebraska system, community colleges and school districts to provide students with seamless pathways to reaching their goal of earning a degree.

Rames earned her education doctorate in adult and higher education in 1997 from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. She earned her bachelor of science degree in business administration and communication studies, with a minor in economics, in 1982, and her master's degree in educational administration in 1986, from University of Northern Colorado in Greeley, Colorado.

She spent one year (2014-15) as interim president at Dakota State University (DSU) in Madison, South Dakota. During this time she was instrumental in promoting a strong shared governance system, finalizing the university's five-year strategic plan, revitalizing the university's Foundation and actively raising funds to increase scholarships. Rames also worked with the legislature and others in several major new construction and renovation projects.

Prior to her interim appointment, Rames served as the vice president for student affairs from 2000 until June 2015 at South Dakota State University (SDSU) in Brookings. As the senior student affairs officer, Rames oversaw numerous university divisions and initiatives, including, but not limited to, enrollment management, student success, strategic planning, fundraising/fiscal management, diversity and inclusion, collaborative partnerships, leadership development, and increasing efficiency and effectiveness for students.

Rames served as an assistant professor of education at SDSU, teaching courses in administration and leadership in student affairs; serving on master's and doctoral students' graduate committees; and conducting research in financial trends in higher education, student retention and completion, and affordability and access to higher education. Rames also served as the interim associate vice president of student affairs (1997-1999) and the interim director for diversity enhancement (1999) at SDSU.

Prior to her arrival at SDSU, Rames worked at Aims Community College in Greeley, Colo., and the University of Wyoming in Laramie. Her scholarly presentations include topics such as student services, retention efforts, and working with today's college students.

Rames and her husband, Steve, have two children - Matthew and Jessica.



Mike Powicki Director of Athletics

Mike Powicki is in his 13th year (2024-25) as Athletic Director at Wayne State College. Powicki began his duties at Wayne State College on July 23, 2012 and has been instrumental in improvements to athletic facilities and staffing during his 12 years at the institution. Over \$13 million has been invested in facility improvements, staffing and operations enhancements during his time at WSC with more improvements planned to enhance Wildcat athletics.

Construction began in the summer of 2023 on a \$30 million athletic/recreation facility addition and renovation project that includes the addition of an air-supported indoor structure and major renovations to the Recreation Center, Rice Auditorium and the Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex. The three-phase project has a tentative completion date set for the fall of 2025.

In 2023-24, the Wayne State volleyball team started the season sweeping Nebraska-Kearney at Volleyball Day in Nebraska in front of an all-time women's sporting event crowd of 92,003 fans at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln. WSC went on to win a second straight NSIC regular season title, hosted the Northern Sun Conference volleyball tournament in Rice Auditorium and won a second NCAA Central Region title resulting in a trip to the Elite 8 in Moon Township, Pa. Wayne State was also one of just nine schools in NCAA Division

II to earn a Make-A-Wish reveal as part of fundraising and work by the WSC Student Athlete Advisory Committee and made that wish come true at the 2024 WSC Ameritas Honors Banquet.

Wayne State student athletes continued to excel in the 2023-24 school year as all 15 Wildcat sports posted a cumulative grade point average above 3.00, finishing with a cumulative athletic department grade point average of 3.445. A record 20 WSC student athletes earned the NSIC Myles Brand All-Academic With Distinction Award while six Wildcats were named College Sports Communicator Academic All-Americans.

The 2021-22 school year saw two more projects created to benefit Wildcat athletics. The Rice Auditorium Stage Conversion Project, totalling \$1 million, will enclose the current stage and create an open-air room to provide premium fan seating and in-game hospitality area for Wildcat volleyball and men's and women's basketball games in Rice Auditorium along with providing a multi-use area for student-athlete recruitment and team meetings. Another project scheduled for completion in late August is field turf installed on the WSC Soccer Pitch.

Powicki was instrumental in the addition of two sports to Wayne State athletics in 2019-20 with the addition of beach volleyball and the re-instatement of the women's golf program. He also orchestrated the renovation of the former natatorium into the Indoor Athletic Complex that will benefit all Wildcat athletic programs. Powicki also helped orchestrate the largest single scholarship gift in the history of Wayne State as the Gardner Foundation announced on October 3, 2019 a \$1.8 million gift to the school. Included in the gift was a one-time donation of \$300,000 toward the Indoor Athletic Complex along with \$150,000 toward athletic operations and \$925,000 toward athletic scholarships to WSC.

In the summer of 2019, Rice Auditorium benefitted with the addition of several upgrades that included new (hanging) baskets, hallway graphics of current and past Wildcat athletes to enhance the look of Rice Auditorium and a newly designed floor/playing surface.

The Bob Cunningham Field Press Box Replacement project covering \$3.9 million was done in 2018. The project increased the amount of work space for media and staff working home events at Cunningham Field. The new facility also provides universal space on the lower level that will give WSC athletics an opportunity to host special events and create additional revenue through corporate sponsorships and donor stewardship.

In the fall of 2018 new Daktronics video scoreboards and a sound system totaling over \$200,000 were installed in Rice Auditorium to enhance the game day experience for Wildcat fans and student-athletes.

The first major athletic project that was completed under the guidance of Powicki was the Bob Cunningham Field/Memorial Stadium Renovation project. The project began in May, 2013 and was highlighted by installation of artificial turf, ornamental fencing, press box graphics and new goal posts. The \$1.6 million project also included the widening, lengthening and re-sodding of the Wildcat Soccer Pitch, along with installing new irrigation, facility fencing, scoreboard and making the facility ADA accessible. The Dr. LeRoy Simpson Track at Memorial Stadium was re-surfaced and painted in the summer of 2014 as the final phase of the project.

Powicki currently serves on the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association Board, NCAA Central Regional Advisory Committee for baseball and is on the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame Committee. He also serves locally as the Wayne Kiwanis Board President along with the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors and Revitalize Wayne Committees.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Powicki served as Assistant Athletic Director at Minnesota State University in Mankato, Minnesota. He was the Assistant Athletic Director for Marketing and Corporate Partnerships from 2008-10 and was promoted to Assistant Director of Athletics for Development and Strategic Partnerships in 2010 where he served in that role until July 2012 when he arrived at Wayne State.

While at MSU, Powicki successfully developed and executed the athletics department revenue generation plan, responsible for generating \$1.7 million annually. Powicki managed all fundraising, development and marketing operations while overseeing the athletic department marketing/fundraising staff.

Powicki also served as Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs at Upper Iowa University from 2004-2008 where he was a part of the Peacocks transition from NCAA Division III to NCAA Division II status and into the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. While at Upper Iowa, Powicki monitored all team operations, recruiting and fundraising budgets. Powicki oversaw the UIU Recreation and Fitness Center staff, budget and overall operation.

In his time at Upper Iowa he created and sold athletic corporate sponsorship opportunities, supervised and coordinated all athletic department fundraising activities, developed and implemented the Peacock Club for donors and successfully completed the "Road to Glory" athletic facility capital improvement project. He also served as tournament director for various national and regional NCAA Division II Championship events.

During his tenure at UIU, Powicki served as an adjunct professor for the Exercise and Sports Studies within the Department of Education. Powicki obtained his bachelor degree from the University of Iowa in exercise science in and earned his masters degree in exercise and sport science/sport administration from Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Mike has two daughters - Faith and Elle (pronounced L) - and resides in Wayne.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Rice Auditorium



Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat volleyball squad as well as men's and women's basketball teams. Recent upgrades to the arena include the stage conversion project in 2022, new baskets and rebranded playing surface in 2019 and a new scoreboard, videoboard and sound system in the fall of 2018.

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College president from 1951-56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships, the 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic, 2012 NCAA Division II Central Regional Women's Basketball Championships, 2022 NCAA Division II Central Region Volleyball Championships and 2023 NSIC Volleyball Championships.

Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field



Memorial Stadium has been "Home of the Wildcats" since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium followed World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The press box underwent a complete renovation with replacement done in 2018. The new structure is 5,220 square feet and includes an elevator along with club level for corporate events.

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans while the bleachers on the east side of the field can seat an additional 750 fans. During the summer of 2013, Cunningham Field underwent a renovation with synthetic field turf replacing the grass surface.

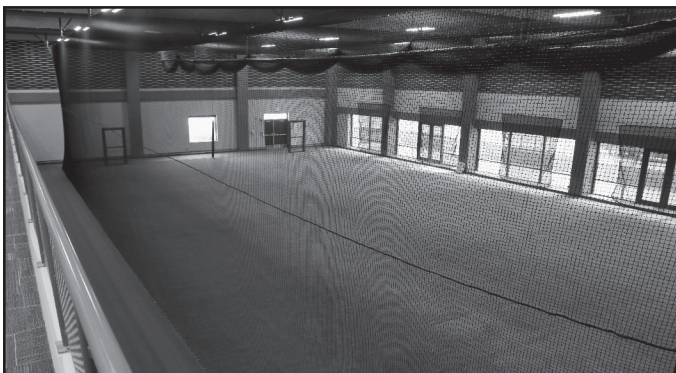
LeRoy Simpson Track



The track at Memorial Stadium/Bob Cunningham Field was named the LeRoy Simpson Track on October 8, 2011 in honor and recognition of the man who started the women's track program at WSC and coached cross country and track and field at Wayne State from 1968-1997.

LeRoy Simpson Track received a new surface in the summer of 2014, replacing the original surface that was installed as part of the Tim and Leslie Bebee Plaza Project at Cunningham Field in 2003.

Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex



The Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex was completed in September, 2020 and has benefitted all athletic teams at Wayne State College including softball. The space in the former Carlson Natatorium turned the indoor swimming pool area into an indoor turf sports facility.

The facility features three batting cages along with putting greens and volleyball net hook ups along with employee offices on the balcony above that overlooks the practice area.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Wayne Country Club

The Wayne Country Club is home to the Wayne State College women's golf team. The course, a par-72 6,384 yard layout from the blue tees, has hosted numerous collegiate and Nebraska Golf Association events over the years and is located right next to the Wayne State College campus (north side). The 11th hole, a 390-yard par-4, was chosen by the Nebraska Golf Association as one of the 18 most challenging holes in the state.

The Wayne Country Club opened in 1947 on the north side of Wayne with the course expanding to 18 holes following the purchase of extra land (south side of 21st Street) in 1968. In 2018, the Wayne Country Club completed a \$518,000 new clubhouse that seats approximately 200 people for golf outings and events in the Wayne area.



Wayne State Soccer Complex

Located east of Memorial Stadium and adjacent to the Pete Chapman Baseball Complex, the WSC Soccer Complex made its debut in the fall of 1997, in time for the inaugural Wildcat soccer season. The most recent improvements to the facility happened in 2022 when new field turf was installed replacing the natural grass surface.

During the spring and summer of 2013, the Wayne State Soccer Complex underwent major renovations that were part of the \$1.5 million athletic improvement project. Improvements to the soccer field included a new scoreboard, fencing and widened playing surface.



Pete Chapman Softball Complex

Located north of Memorial Stadium, the softball complex opened in the spring of 1996. In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Softball Complex in honor of the late Wayne State College athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department.

The Pete Chapman Softball Complex has evolved into one of the nicest facilities in the Central Region. Improvements made over the years include a concrete pad/walkway to the facility from the Rec Center parking lot, enclosed pitching cage and bullpen areas for both teams, a new wood fence in the summer of 2009 and digital scoreboard for the 2011 season.

The Pete Chapman Softball Complex hosted the 2010 NCAA Central Regional Softball Tournament.



Pete Chapman Baseball Complex

Located north of Memorial Stadium, the baseball complex opened in the spring of 1996 after playing its home games off campus at the local American Legion Field. In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball Complex in honor of the late Wayne State College athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department.

The baseball field received a facelift in the summer of 2004 with the additions of locker rooms, restrooms, a concession stand and press box. A new wood fence was installed on the baseball field in the summer of 2005 followed by a new 10-inning scoreboard placed in right-center field in the fall of 2007. The Pete Chapman Baseball Complex hosted the NSIC Baseball Tournament in 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008.



ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



Muffin Morris *Head Athletic Trainer*



Dr. Muffin Morris is in her 17th year (2024-25) at Wayne State College as the Head Athletic Trainer. She oversees athletic training for all 15 sports at Wayne State College and is the head athletic trainer for football and men's basketball.

She also serves as an advisor to the WSC Student Athlete Advisory Committee and worked three years (2013-16) as senior women's administrator.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Morris worked four years at the University of South Dakota. She served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and worked with football, swimming/diving, track and field/cross country and volleyball programs with the Coyotes.

Morris, a native of Chariton, Iowa, earned her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University in athletic training in 2004. She received her master's degree from the University of South Dakota in 2006 in health, physical education and recreation and obtained her doctorate degree in adult/higher education from the University of South Dakota on July 31, 2008.

Morris resides in Wayne.

Dr. Joseph Carreau *Board Eligible Orthopaedic Surgeon*



Dr. Joseph Carreau joined CNOS in 2016 after completing fellowship in Orthopaedic Sports Medicine at the University of Iowa. He is originally from Colorado where he attended Colorado State University for his undergraduate education. Thereafter, he pursued medical school at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska and in 2005 traveled to San Diego to complete his orthopaedic surgery residency at the University of California, San Diego. There he received

extensive training in adult and pediatric trauma and joint replacement surgery. He developed a special interest in advanced arthroscopy and the treatment of athletic injuries, thus chose to pursue fellowship training in Sports Medicine through the University of Iowa.

At the University of Iowa, Dr. Carreau was trained by national leaders in the practice of advanced arthroscopic techniques, cartilage transplantation, shoulder instability, patellofemoral problems, ligamentous injury of the knee and shoulder replacement surgery. He also received extensive training in the treatment of all athletes at the University of Iowa and was assistant team physician to the Hawkeye Football Team during their historic 2015 season.

Carreau currently serves as Orthopaedic team physician to the Wayne State Wildcats and assists with multiple local high schools. Dr. Carreau has published papers on various orthopaedic topics and is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery, the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine and the Arthroscopy Association of North America. Dr. Carreau and his wife have four children. He is an avid fisherman and enjoys the outdoors.

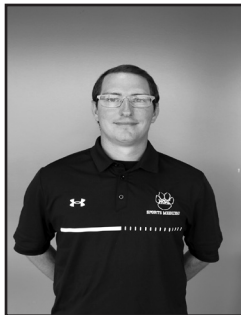

Recognizing the importance of first-class facilities for their student athletes, the Wayne State College athletic department completed a state-of-the-art renovation to its athletic facilities in the 2008-09 school year, including a new weight room constructed at Memorial Stadium.

All Wayne State student athletes have utilized the benefits of new weight room equipment that features 18 platforms and racks, dumbbells and selectorized machines. The facility allows 72 student athletes to work out at the same time.

The project has enhanced Wayne State's ability to attract high quality student athletes and provide current team members the resources necessary to compete at the NCAA Division II level.



Football Locker Room

As part of the \$4.5 million state-of-the-art renovation to Memorial Stadium and Rice Auditorium, the Wayne State College football team received a new locker room at the start of the 2009 season. The locker room features custom-built wooden lockers made by Wayne-based Heritage Industries along with new showers and restroom facilities for the Wildcat football players.

The press box is 5,220 square foot and includes an elevator and provides space for all of the existing functions of the press box while increasing the size of several spaces to meet current and future needs. The new space provides more working space for game-day staff and a better working environment for local and regional media. The first event hosted in the new facility was the Wildcat home football game vs. Winona State on Thursday, August 30, 2018.

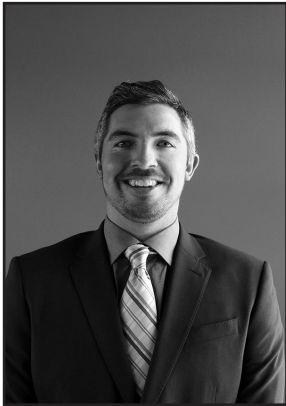

HEAD COACH LOGAN MASTERS



Former Wildcat standout receiver Logan Masters enters his third year (2024) as head football coach at Wayne State College. He was promoted to head coach of the Wildcat football program on February 11, 2022 and is the 23rd head coach in the 107-year history of Wayne State football.

Under Masters in 2023, the Wildcats finished 8-3 overall and 7-3 in the NSIC, just missing the NCAA Division II playoffs after being listed in every regional ranking. Highlighting the 2023 campaign were a pair of home wins over

nationally ranked teams, beating #17 Minnesota Duluth on homecoming 28-18 and a 14-12 victory over #12 Augustana in a late October snow storm. Coupled with a nine-win season in 2022, it marked just the third time in Wildcat history that a WSC football team won eight or more games in back-to-back seasons, joining the 2008 (9-3) and 2009 (8-3) teams and the 1948 (8-1) and 1949 (9-0) Wildcat squads to achieve the rare feat. Masters coached 12 All-NSIC performers including NSIC Newcomer of the Year Kendrick Watkins-Hogue to go with three players that received All-Super Region 4 honors.

It was a memorable first season on the Wildcat sidelines for Masters, who guided Wayne State to a first-ever Northern Sun Conference overall championship with a 9-2 regular season record while also leading the 'Cats to the NCAA Division II playoffs for just the second time in school history. Wayne State was a perfect 6-0 at home and the nine wins matches the most wins in school history for a single season. Masters, who coached nine All-NSIC selections and pair of All-Super Region 4 performers, was rewarded with NSIC Coach of the Year honors in his first season as head coach at WSC as the 'Cats closed with a 9-3 record following a first round NCAA Division II playoff setback at #19 Minnesota State 26-9.

Masters served the previous two years (2020 and 2021) as offensive coordinator, coaching WSC to a 7-4 record in the 2021 and the schools' first national ranking in a decade after a 5-1 start that included road wins at #11 Minnesota Duluth and #11 Minnesota State within three weeks of each other. Under Masters in 2021 the WSC offense ranked third in the NSIC in rushing offense (182.1 yards per game) and the 414.5 yards per game in total offense were the most by a Wildcat offense since 2014.

Masters returned to the Wildcat sidelines after spending three seasons (2017-19) at Chadron State College where he was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2019 and served as wide receivers coach and game operations manager the previous two years. He coached Chadron State's first-ever 3,000 yard passer in 2019 and was a part of three straight winning seasons with the Eagles (6-5 in 2019, 7-3 in 2018 and 6-5 in 2017).

Masters got his coaching start working six years on the Wayne State sidelines from 2010-16. He started as tight ends coach in 2010, was a graduate assistant/wide receivers coach in 2011-12, served as wide receivers coach in 2013 and '14 and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2015 when John McMenamin departed WSC for Central Missouri and served in that role for two more years before moving on to Chadron State College.

A native of Storm Lake, Iowa, Masters attended Wayne State College and had a standout playing career at wide receiver from 2006-09, helping the Wildcats make two post season appearances while setting nearly every receiving record at WSC. He finished his career as the all-time leader in receptions (258) and receiving yards (3,863) and caught at least two passes in every game (46) he played in a Wildcat uniform.

As a senior, he was First Team All-NSIC South Division and one of 24 candidates for the Harlon Hill Trophy, given to the top player in NCAA Division II. In his junior season (2008), Masters hauled in a career-best 80 catches for 1,179 yards and was First Team All-NSIC South Division and Daktronics First Team All-Super Region #3 while helping WSC to a 9-3 record and the schools' first-ever trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Masters, inducted into the WSC Athletic Hall of Fame in 2021 and the NSIC Hall of Fame in 2023, and his wife Amber reside in Wayne with their four sons - Lincoln, Langston, Leyton and Lawyer.

Collin Prosser
Offensive Coordinator

Collin Prosser is in his third season (2024) as offensive coordinator for the Wayne State College football team. He will also coach the offensive line.

Wayne State finished the 2023 season with records of 8-3 overall and 7-3 in the NSIC. Prosser coached a Wildcat offensive line that allowed an NSIC-low six sacks while helping a WSC offense average 376.4 yards per game.

In his first season at WSC, Prosser coached a Wildcat offense that ranked fourth in the NSIC overall (389.6) and third in the league in rushing as the 'Cats finished 9-3 overall while winning its first-ever Northern Sun Conference overall championship while advancing to the NCAA Division II playoffs for the second time in school history. Prosser's offense gained over 500 yards in four games while the 2,241 rushing yards by WSC were the fourth-most in school history, earning him NSIC Assistant Coach of the Year honors in his first season on the Wildcat sidelines.

Prosser came to Wayne State after serving five years (four seasons) at Minnesota State where he served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach the last two years after working as offensive line coach his first three seasons in Mankato. He helped the Mavericks reach the NCAA Division II playoffs three of his four seasons with a national runner-up finish in 2019 along with back-to-back NCAA semi-final playoff appearances in 2017 and 2018.

Prior to coaching in Mankato, Prosser spent two seasons (2015, 2016) at South Dakota where he coached special teams, offensive line and defensive line.

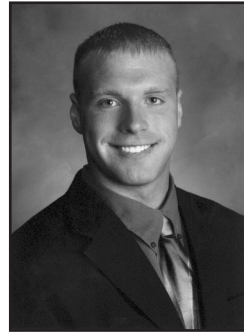
Prosser also coached four seasons at several positions at Morningside College. In the 2013 and 2014 seasons, he was co-offensive coordinator, offensive line and tight ends coach. The 2014 season saw the Mustangs average 662 yards per game and Prosser was twice named finalist for the Football Scoop Offensive Coordinator of the Year award. In his first two seasons at Morningside Prosser served as the head coach of the JV team and worked with running backs.

Prosser's coaching career began at South Dakota where he was a graduate assistant coach with the Coyotes working with tight ends and serving as the team's video coordinator while obtaining his master's degree.

Prosser played at Wayne State from 2005-08 and was a teammate of Masters as the two helped the Wildcats to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2008 along with a Mineral Water Bowl berth in the 2007 season. He served as a captain for the Wildcat team in his 2008 senior season and was a tight end, fullback and offensive lineman during his time at Wayne State.

Collin and his wife Heather have three sons – Colton, Camden and Brevin.

2022 NSIC Assistant Coach of the Year



Scott McLaughlin
Defensive Coordinator

Scott McLaughlin is in his 18th season (2024) as an Assistant Football Coach and 10th season as Defensive Coordinator at Wayne State College. McLaughlin also works with the Wildcat linebackers. McLaughlin was promoted to defensive coordinator following the 2014 season after serving six seasons as special teams coordinator and linebackers coach.

He also worked with the defensive line for four seasons prior to being special teams coordinator.

The Wildcats were 8-3 in the 2023 season and 7-3 in conference play. Under McLaughlin, the WSC defense led the NSIC and ranked third in NCAA Division II in turnover margin at +18 and was first in the NSIC in interceptions (19) while ranking second with 10 fumble recoveries.

In the 2022 season, McLaughlin's Wildcat defense ranked fourth overall in the Northern Sun Conference allowing just 303.8 yards per game as WSC finished the season at 9-3 overall while collecting its first-ever NSIC overall championship to go with second-ever NCAA Division II playoff appearance. Wayne State's defense ranked #1 in the NSIC in passing defense allowing just 170.3 yards per game and #1 in defense efficiency rating allowing opponents to complete as NSIC-low 50.9 percent of its passes.

Wayne State's defense ranked sixth in the NSIC during the 2021 season allowing 375.5 yards per game as the Wildcats posted a 7-4 record for the first seven-win season in a decade.

In 2018, the Wildcat defense notched its first shutout since the 2011 season with a 34-0 victory at Minot State. Under McLaughlin, Wayne State ranked second in the NSIC in pass defense allowing just 199.8 yards per game and featured the NSIC's top tackler in junior linebacker Tyler Thomsen, who averaged 10.9 tackles per contest.

Under McLaughlin in 2017 the Wildcat defense tied for the most interceptions (24) in NCAA Division II in the regular season and created 32 total turnovers to rank third nationally while helping WSC to a 6-5 record.

Scott is a graduate of the University of Nebraska-Omaha and played defensive line for the Mavericks. He also served as a student assistant at UNO and worked as the team's video coordinator for three seasons before coming to Wayne State College.

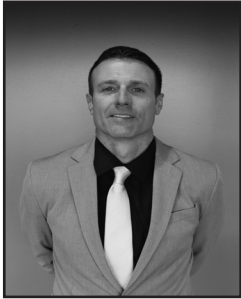

Willrich coached at Nebraska-Kearney from 2015-2022 where he was special teams coordinator along with linebackers coach and defensive backs, helping the Lopers to the second round of the 2021 NCAA Division II playoffs along with 2019 Mineral Water Bowl champions.

Willrich coached the 2023 season at Kearney High School where he was defensive backs coach while also acting as a lecturer in the UNK Kinesiology and Sports Science Department. Other coaching stops for Willrich include five seasons as defensive coordinator, secondary coach and strength and conditioning coach at Division III Austin College in Texas (2010-14), assistant coach at Hastings College from 2006-09 and graduate assistant coach at Northwest Missouri State from 2004-05. Willrich was a three-time All-MIAA linebacker at Truman State in Missouri finishing in the top five in career tackles for the Bulldogs.

Anglin comes to WSC after coaching one season (2022) at Alderson Broaddus in West Virginia where he served as cornerback coach and recruiting coordinator.

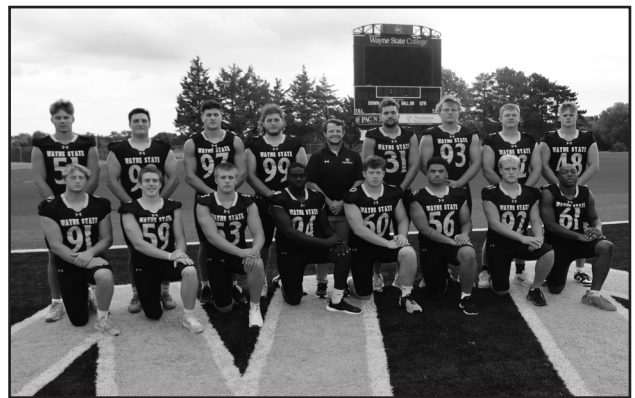

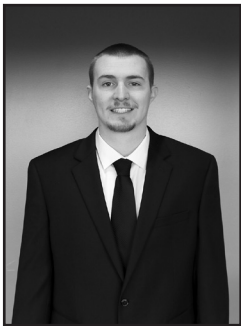
Brody Rohach

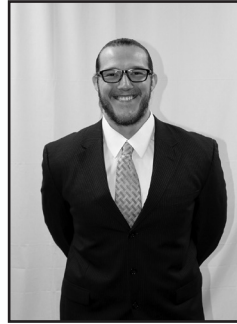

Kaleb Gaster is in his second year (2024) as a graduate assistant football coach at Wayne State College and will serve as running backs coach in 2024 for the second straight season after working with tight ends and running backs in the 2023 season

with the Wildcats.

Gaster comes to Wayne State after graduating from Western Colorado where he was a member of the Mountaineer football team for six years. He played offensive line, earned four letters and was Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (RMAC) All-Academic First Team in 2022.

Gaster hails from Colorado Springs, Colorado and attended Mesa Ridge High School where he was an All-State offensive lineman along with All-Conference and All-Area Gazette selection during his senior season. He was a three year starter and served as team captain during his junior and senior seasons.

Isaiah Powell-Major is in his first season as a graduate assistant coach with the Wildcat football program and will coach defensive backs.

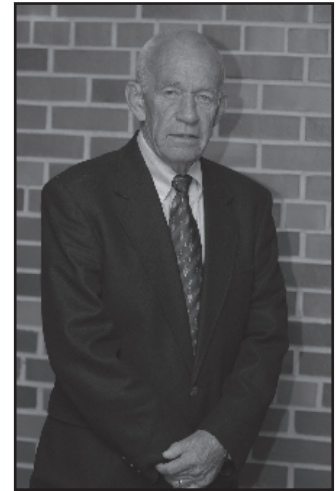

WILDCAT COACHING HISTORY



Dan McLaughlin (2005-19) is the all-time wins leader at Wayne State posting a 79-88 record in 15 years as head coach. He rebuilt the Wildcat program and turned WSC into a contender in the NSIC resulting in a trip to the Mineral Water Bowl in 2007 and the school's lone trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2008.

The late **Del Stoltenberg**, inducted into the WSC Athletic Hall of Fame in 2004, was the second-longest tenured coach in Wayne State football history, serving 14 seasons (1969-82).

2024 SEASON OUTLOOK



Expectations are high for the Wayne State football team in 2024. Third-year head coach Logan Masters is coming off an 8-3 season (7-3 NSIC) and was ranked in the NCAA Division II Super Region 4 rankings while just missing the playoffs.

For just the third time in 107 years of Wildcat football, Wayne State has recorded back-to-back seasons with eight or more wins following a 9-3 record in 2022 and second-ever NCAA Division II playoff appearance to go with last year's 8-3 mark.

Wayne State returns 17 starters from last season and will look to compete again this season for a Northern Sun Conference regular season crown and Division II playoff berth.

"We return a good number of guys that have a lot of experience for us over the past couple of seasons and have played in big games," said Coach Masters. "Our older guys have done a great job of leading by example for our younger players. Our team leadership and accountability are at a great spot going into our 2024 season."

Senior leaders Nick Bohn (quarterback) and Dexter Larsen (linebacker) have been listed as Wayne State's Players to Watch in the NSIC this season.

Last season, Bohn earned All-NSIC honors (Second Team) for a third straight season completing 60.8 percent of his passes (178-293) for 2,677 yards and 22 TD's. He added another 12 rushing TD's (third in NSIC) and ranked second in the league in total offense yards per game (259.7) while ranking third in passing yards per game (243.3) and pass efficiency rating (156.8).

"This will be Nick's fourth season as our starting quarterback," boasted Masters. "Each season Nick has grown as a football player and as a leader. We are very excited that we have a young man like Nick

leading our offense and our football program."

Larsen, a graduate of Blair High School, is tabbed as the Wildcats' Defensive Player to Watch this season after a stellar junior campaign where he was named All-NSIC First Team and D2CCA All-Super Region 4 First Team after leading the Wildcat defense with 91 tackles. He was tied for second in the NSIC in tackles per game (8.3), tied for third in forced fumbles (2) and tied for fourth with two fumble recoveries.

"Dexter had a big season last year," remarked Masters. "Dex is relentless worker and one of the most competitive young men I have ever been around. He has grown as a leader on

and off the field. We are excited to have a young man like Dexter leading our defense and our football program."

At running back, the Wildcats return their top three rushers from last season led by junior Dawson Forgy and sophomore Latravious Boyd. Boyd ran for 714 yards on just 101 carries, averaging 7.1 yards per carry with seven TD's to rank ninth in the NSIC in rushing yards per game (64.9). Forgy followed with 503 yards averaging 4.5 yards per rush and added 15 catches out of the backfield for 134 yards.

The wide receiving corps is filled with depth led by last year's NSIC Newcomer of the Year Kendrick Watkins-Hogue, who hauled in 59 catches (sixth-NSIC) for 743 yards (fifth-NSIC) and eight TD's, which tied for fourth in the league. Senior Ashten Schmaderer led the NSIC in yards per catch (23.7) with 27 receptions for 640 yards and six scores. Trevor Marshall was a steady target for Bohn with 32 grabs for 451 yards and two touchdowns.

At tight end, Wayne State returns junior starter Trey Miller along with sophomores Cory Hollinger, Tanner Houck and senior Lane Vander Wal.





2024 SEASON OUTLOOK



The Wildcat offensive line returns four starters from last year, leading the NSIC with a league-low six sacks allowed. Headlining the group is senior left tackle Jett Janssen, who has started every game in his Wildcat career. He was All-NSIC First Team and D2CCA All-Super Region 4 Second Team last season.

Other returning starters on the offensive line include a pair of All-NSIC Second Team selections from last season – junior center Will Washenberger and junior right tackle Tierel Tompkins – along with junior left guard Chris Graham Jr.

The Wildcat defense also returns plenty of experience at all positions. Along with the return of Dexter Larsen at linebacker, WSC also returns Alex Kowalczyk, who missed all of last season with an injury after earning All-NSIC First Team and D2CCA All-Super Region 4 First Team honors after leading the 'Cats in tackles in 2021 and 2022.

Other key returners at linebacker are senior Alex Schall, All-NSIC Second Team last season with 88 tackles, senior Tyler Leclair 62 tackles last season (third on team) and sophomore Clyde Hinton.

The Wildcat defensive line has a blend of experience and younger players who gained valuable playing time last season. Senior defensive end Jaxon Johnson is a returning starter along with junior defensive tackle Trent Rasmussen. Senior Drake Peed brings three years of experience to a talented front while sophomores Carter Sitzman, James Frank and Luke Lambert all saw considerable time on the field last season. The 'Cats also added Iowa State transfer Kaden Sutton to fill the gap at nose guard due to the graduation of All-NSIC First Team selection Luke Sims.

Wayne State's secondary brings back three starters, led by veteran Jacob Byrd at strong safety. The senior from Sioux Falls, S.D. earned All-NSIC Second Team honors last season with 59 tackles and six pass breakups. Also back is sophomore Joe Morrison, who collected All-NSIC First Team and D2CCA All-Super Region 4 Second Team honors with a team-high four interceptions and 13 passes

defended that was tied for second in the NSIC.

Other key returners in the secondary are senior safety Gerale Flye and sophomore Brayden Chaney.

Special teams saw placekicker Boston Hensley post a stellar freshman season for the Wildcats, leading the NSIC in touchbacks (29) while making 46 of 48 PAT kicks and 7 of 8 field goals.

The return game also appears to be strong again as WSC returns senior Jadon Johnson and junior Dawson Forgy at kickoff return and Jacob Byrd as punt returner.

Wayne State was picked fourth in the Preseason NSIC Football Coaches' Poll released August 6th and collected several points in voting for the AFCADivision II Preseason Top 25 Coaches Poll. The Wildcats face a pair of NCAA Division II playoff teams from last season in Minnesota State (September 14th) and at Bemidji State (November 2nd).

The 2008 Wildcat football team was inducted into the WSC Athletic Hall of Fame last fall (October 14th, 2023). Wayne State went 9-3 and qualified for the NCAA Division II Playoffs for the first time in school history and shared the NSIC South Division title (the only one since joining the NSIC) with Minnesota State.

The nine wins tied a school record for most wins in a season, matching the 1949 team (9-0), 1993 team (9-1) and last year's team (9-3). The team earned its first national ranking since 1995 (13 years) and finished the season ranked 19th in the final AFCA DII Coaches Poll and 20th in the final D2Football.com Media Poll. Coach Dan McLaughlin was named AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year.

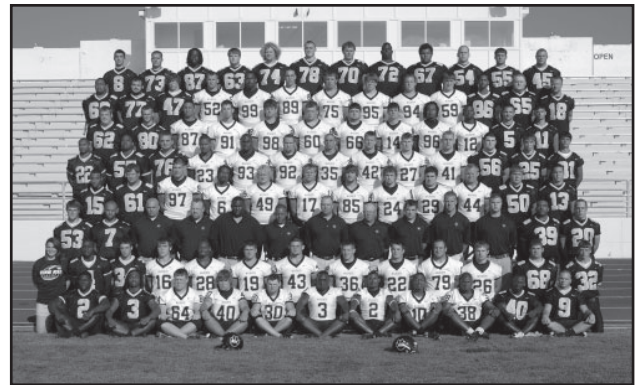

The 2022 Wildcats became the first Wayne State football team to capture the Northern Sun Conference regular season title, going 9-2 in league play. The 2022 team advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs for the second time in school history and ended the year at 9-3 following a 26-9 loss at Minnesota State.



The 2008 Wayne State football team won a share of the NSIC South Division title with an 8-2 league record and was the first-ever club to qualify for the NCAA Division II playoffs. Wayne State finished the 2008 year at 9-3 overall following a 23-17 loss at Chadron State in the opening round of the playoffs.

Wildcat linebacker Dexter Larsen led the Wayne State defense in the 2023 season with 91 tackles to receive All-NSIC First Team and D2CCA All-Super Region 4 First Team honors. The Blair native tied for second in the NSIC in tackles per game (8.3) last season.



Luke Sims was voted All-NSIC First Team at defensive line last season recording 41 tackles to rank sixth on the Wildcat defense. He was credited with 4.5 tackles for loss along with a 31-yard interception return at Sioux Falls.



THE NORTHERN SUN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE



THE HISTORY OF THE NSIC

From its modest origin as a six-team alliance over nine decades ago, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference has matured into a 15-team union of upper Midwest colleges and universities to form arguably the strongest affiliation in NCAA Division II.

The NSIC can trace its roots to 1932 when six schools, including Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University, Mankato, Minnesota State University Moorhead, St. Cloud State University, University of Minnesota Duluth and Winona State University signed on as charter members. All remain active subscribers of the league today.

Southwest Minnesota State University was added in 1969, followed by Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (NE) in 1998, Concordia University-St. Paul and the University of Minnesota Crookston in 1999, the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006, Augustana University in 2008 and Minot State University and the University of Sioux Falls in 2012.

Minnesota State, St. Cloud State and Minnesota Duluth left the league to join the North Central Conference but returned to the NSIC in 2008. University of Minnesota, Morris and Michigan Tech University were once part of the NSIC family as well. Upper Iowa left the league following the 2022-23 season.

In 1992 the NSIC became a true athletic showcase for both men and women with the merger of the traditional Northern Intercollegiate Conference (NIC) and the Northern Sun Conference (NSC), the home of women's athletics since 1979.

Before NSIC affiliates became certified for championship competition in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in 1995, its member institutions filled prominent roles in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). NIC and NSC clubs annually dispatched qualified student-athletes to national tournaments and captured several NAIA teams and individual championships.

The NSIC continues to make a major imprint nationally, winning 27 national titles since 2006. Winona State men claimed NCAA II Basketball Championships in 2006 and 2008 and narrowly missed a third crown, falling in a last second shot in 2007. In addition, the Warriors established a NCAA II record of 57 consecutive victories.

Concordia University launched an ongoing streak of seven consecutive NCAA II Volleyball Championships in 2007. In 2008 the Golden Bears won 37 straight matches after a season opening loss on their way to a second consecutive title and scripted a marvelous encore in 2009 with a perfect 37-0 finish, a third straight national crown and a winning streak of 74 straight matches. In 2010 the Golden Bear extended that NCAA record win streak to 75 before dropping their second match of the season. They started 2010 with a 10-4 record before ripping off 22 straight wins on their way to their fourth straight national title. In 2011, after overcoming midseason injuries, the Golden Bears hit their stride. The Golden Bears knocked off No. 1 and undefeated Cal State San Bernardino to become the first team in the history of NCAA Division II women's volleyball, to capture a fifth consecutive NCAA Division II Championship. Then in 2012, the Golden Bears again made a late season and championship match surge as they defeated Tampa 3-2 after trailing 0-2 to win their sixth straight NCAA DII Volleyball National Championship. In 2013 Concordia-St. Paul won the NSIC regular season title, but was defeated in the NSIC Tournament Championship by Minnesota Duluth. But from there the Golden Bears ripped off six straight NCAA postseason wins, extending their streak to 42, on their way to a 3-0 sweep of BYU-Hawaii to win another NCAA National Championship. After a two year hiatus, the Golden Bears return to the top of Division II volleyball as they won the 2016 and 2017 national championships.

In a most surprising run, Minnesota Duluth completed a perfect 15-0 season by winning the 2008 NCAA Division II Football Championship. The Bulldogs, limited to only 24 scholarships by league rule, swept a field of fully-funded teams, including top ranked Grand Valley State and number three Northwest Missouri State. Two years later, in 2010, the Bulldogs repeated that feat, going 15-0 again to win the national championship. The Bulldogs became the first NCAA DII football squad to win two national championships with undefeated records.

Minnesota State added more luster to the league by finishing 32-2 and claiming the 2008-09 NCAA II Women's Basketball Championship. The Mavericks rolled to a wild 103-94 victory over Franklin Pierce to set a NCAA record for total points in the title game.

In 2017 the Maverick softball team went 64-7 to win the National Championship. The Mavericks went 10-1 in NCAA play, including 5-0 in Salem Virginia as they defeated Angelo State 5-1 in the championship game.

The Mavericks added their third team national championship in 2021-22 when they took home the women's indoor track & field championship. Makayla Jackson took home individual national championships in the long jump and the 60m dash, while Denisha Cartwright won the 60m hurdles title, helping the Mavericks score 56 team points.

In 2023-24, Minnesota State became just the second institution in NCAA Division II history to win both men's and women's basketball national titles. The men's team used a last second three pointer by Kyreese Willingham, assisted by his brother Malik, to defeat Nova Southeastern 88-85 while the women avenged three regular season losses in their playoff run, including defeating Texas Women's University 89-73 in the title game.

Augustana got into the mix of national championships in 2011 when their women's cross country team turned in a true team performance in Spokane, Washington. All five Viking runners earned All-American status as Augustana won the first cross country national championship in NSIC history.

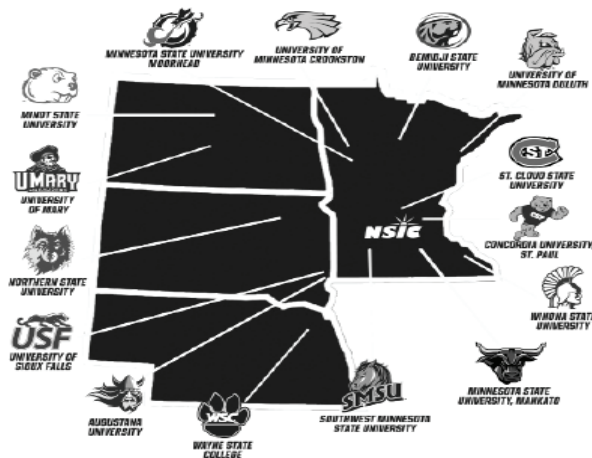
The Vikings men's basketball team won the 2015-16 National Championship after going 34-2 and defeating Lincoln Memorial 90-81 in Frisco, Texas. The 2018 Augustana baseball team became the first NSIC institution to win a national championship in baseball, as the Vikings had an impressive post season, going 8-1 in NCAA play and a perfect 4-0 in Cary, North Carolina to finish the season 52-9.

In 2019 it was the Augustana Softball team that made a run to the national championship as the Vikings went 61-11 and defeated Texas A&M Kingsville twice by the score of 6-4 to win the National Championship.

After multiple runner-up finishes, the St. Cloud State Huskies finally captured the national championship in wrestling in 2015. They repeated in 2016 and then took home the title again in 2018, 2019 & 2021.

Member schools continue to emphasize the educational, entertainment and unifying value of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. The NSIC is committed to providing rewarding experiences for its student-athletes, and while the challenges that loom are sizable, indeed, the NSIC is surely well positioned for the future.

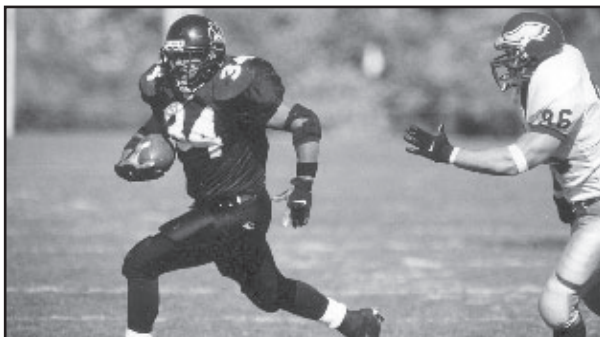

Wayne State head football coach Logan Masters was inducted into the NSIC Hall of Fame on July 11, 2023. Masters is the all-time leading receiver in Wildcat football history and one of the best all-time in the NSIC, ranking third in NSIC games with 207 catches for 3,118 yards and 20 TD's.

All four seasons he earned All-NSIC honors, starting with honorable mention as a freshman, All-NSIC Second Team as a sophomore and All-NSIC First Team as a junior and senior. Masters helped a Wildcat football turnaround that included a trip to the Mineral Water Bowl in his sophomore season and the school's first-ever trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs as a junior in 2008.

Masters closed his Wildcat career with 258 receptions for 3,863 yards averaging 15.04 yards per catch, all WSC school records.

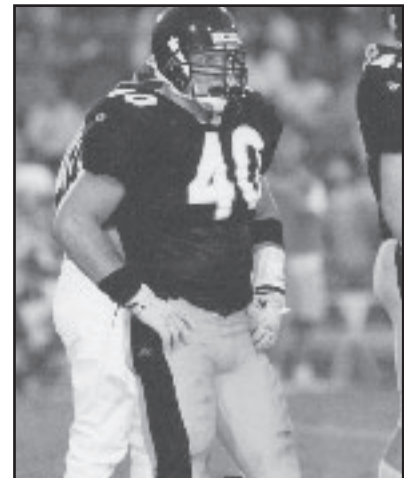

Wakefield graduate Luke Hoffman became the latest Wildcat football player to be inducted into the WSC Athletic Hall of Fame during last fall's 2023 induction ceremony on October 14th.

Hoffman started every game in his four-year career at linebacker for the Wildcats from 2005-2008. He led Wayne State in tackles as a freshman and sophomore and was second on the team as a junior and senior. Hoffman ranks third all-time in tackles at WSC with 385 and was a consistent performer on the Wildcat defense with 98, 100, 90 and 97 tackles in his four seasons.

Hoffman helped turn around a WSC football program that went from 3-8 at the start of his career to 9-3 as a senior and the school's first-ever NCAA Division II playoff appearance (2008) along with playing in the Mineral Water Bowl in 2007 during his junior season.

Hoffman was First Team All-NSIC and First Team All-Super Region #3 as a senior. Academically, Luke was an ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District selection as a junior and senior and was First Team All-American as a senior with a 3.87 GPA majoring in elementary education.

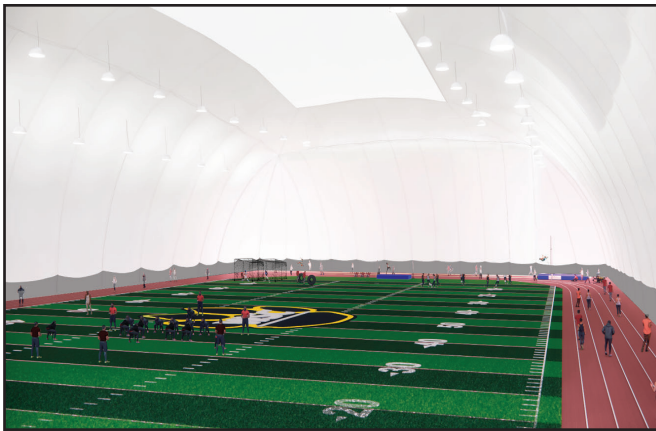
ATHLETIC AND RECREATION COMPLEX

Dirt work began in June, 2023 with a formal ground-breaking ceremony held September 15th on the WSC Athletic and Recreation Complex Renovation and Addition Project.

The \$30-million project is a multi-phased construction project designed to have a significant impact on Wayne State and the region it serves. The project will include a new air-supported structure with an indoor track and turf field and renovations to Rice Auditorium and the Recreation Center.

A new 97,000-square-foot air-supported structure with a 300-meter synthetic track, two pole vault boxes, two jumping pits, and two throw circles with safety cages. The infield of the track will have a multi-functional artificial turf with a perimeter protective netting system and four baseball/softball/golf hitting cages.

The project is scheduled for completion in January, 2025.
