WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 18 UCLA – NOV. 14, 2015

GAME NOTES

- Washington State won the toss and elected to receive

TEAM NOTES

- WSU's win over No. 18 (AP) UCLA is its highest win over a ranked opponent since beating No. 16 Oregon in 2006
- WSU improves to 7-3 overall, its best start since starting 8-2 in 2003
- WSU blocked its first punt (Dylan Hanser) since the 2013 New Mexico Bowl
- WSU forced two more turnovers, recovering two fumbles, pushing season turnover total to 18

PLAYER NOTES

- Kyle Sweet (WR) and Kirkland Parker (CB) each made their first career starts
- Peyton Bender's second-quarter touchdown pass to Dom Williams was the first of his career.
- Gerard Wicks scored his third touchdown of the season, seventh of his career
- Dom Williams caught his ninth TD pass of the season
- Williams' 28th career touchdown reception keeps him at No. 2 in WSU history and moves him into a tie for 11th in conference history
- Williams recorded his ninth career 100-yard game and third of the season
- Erik Powell connected on a 25-yard FG, his 15th field goal of the season, tied with Jason Hanson (1988) for ninth-most in WSU single-season history
- Luke Falk threw two touchdown passes, setting a WSU single-season record with 35 TD passes, breaking the record of 34 set by Ryan Leaf (1997) and Connor Halliday (2013)
- Falk threw for 331 yards, upping his season total to 4,067, the second-most in WSU single-season history
- Falk added 331 passing yards to his career total, giving him 5,926, ninth-most in WSU history
- Falk recorded his fourth 4th-quarter comeback of the season and fifth of his career
- Gabe Marks caught 12 passes to up his career reception total to 204, breaking Michael Bumpus' WSU career record of 195
- Marks recorded his fifth career game with 10+ receptions, most in the WSU history
- Marks caught TD passes No. 12 and 13 of the season, tied with Jason Hill (2005) for the most in WSU single-season history
- Marks caught his 21st and 22nd career TDs, tied for the fourth-most in WSU history
