MARTIN STADIUM HISTORY

NAME: Clarence D. Martin Stadium and Academic Center

CAPACITY: 32,952

HISTORY

1892—Built as Soldier Field.

1895 (November 9)—WSU defeated Idaho 10-4 in the first football game on Soldier Field.

1902—The field was renamed Rogers Field in honor of the Governor of the State of Washington, John R. Rogers.

1936—Washington State College built a completely new football stadium, but retained the same name; the new stadium was an all-wood structure built on concrete pilings. The field also featured new stands, an enlarged press box and an electronic scoreboard.

1970 (April)—Fire destroyed the south stands; a one-million dollar fund drive began after the decision was made to rebuild the stands rather than relocate or build an entirely new stadium; Dan Martin, a Los Angeles businessman, gave \$250,000 to the project with the stipulation the stadium be renamed after his father, Clarence D. Martin. Clarence Martin was Governor of the State from 1933-40.

1972 (summer)—first artificial turf (Astroturf) was installed.

1972 (Sept. 30)—WSU met Utah in the first game played in refurbished Martin Stadium;

1975—New north (student) stands were built.

1978 (fall)—Work began on the academic portion of the complex on the south side with the computer center relocating to the complex upon completion of the project in 1979.

1979 (January)—Another renovation of the stadium began to increase the seating capacity from 27,600 to 40,000; the floor of the stadium was excavated 16 feet to add 12,400 seats; the track was removed from the stadium and relocated to the Bailey Baseball Stadium area directly north of the football complex, while a new baseball stadium was then built just south and east of Friel Court, home of Cougar basketball; the entire project, like the one in 1970, was funded through contributions; gift-in-kind and the purchase of “stadium builder” seat options; it marked the first time a collegiate football stadium had been enlarged by digging down rather than building up; the project was also funded in part by the Martin family, with Charlotte Martin, widow of Dan Martin, giving \$250,000 to the project; a SuperTurf artificial surface was installed.

1979 (October 13)—WSU celebrated Homecoming by defeating UCLA 17-13 before a record crowd of 32,651 in the first game played in the enlarged Martin Stadium.

1990 (summer)—Installed the sand-filled Omni-Turf playing surface.

2000 (summer)—Installed FieldTurf in Martin Stadium and on Rogers Field.

2006—Current stadium renovation began.

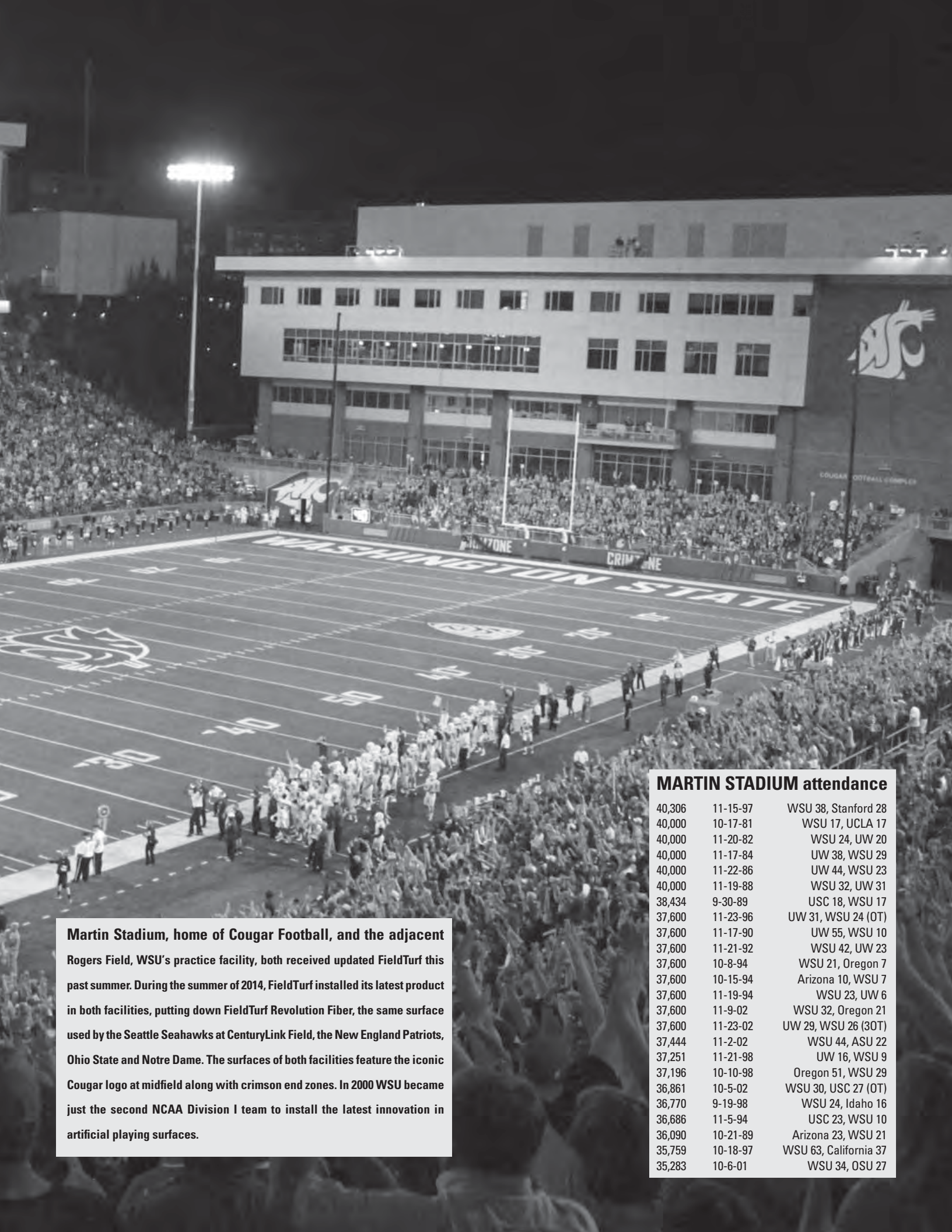
2006 (summer)—Replaced FieldTurf in Martin Stadium.

2008—Phase I and II completed.

2012 (summer)—The \$80 million Cougar Football Project, which began in Nov., 2011, replaces the old press box on the south stands with a new structure that includes a new press box, club seats, loge boxes, luxury suites and a club room.

2013 (summer)—A \$3.5 million scoreboard is added to the east end of Martin Stadium.

2014 (summer)—Construction began on the \$61 million, 84,000-square-foot Cougar Football Complex in winter, 2013 and completed in summer, 2014. The facility provides a home for the Cougar football program, including new weight room, lockers, equipment and training rooms for players, in addition to position meeting rooms and coaches’ offices. It also features a WSU Football heritage area and a game-day home for Gray W former letter winners.



Martin Stadium, home of Cougar Football, and the adjacent Rogers Field, WSU's practice facility, both received updated FieldTurf this past summer. During the summer of 2014, FieldTurf installed its latest product in both facilities, putting down FieldTurf Revolution Fiber, the same surface used by the Seattle Seahawks at CenturyLink Field, the New England Patriots, Ohio State and Notre Dame. The surfaces of both facilities feature the iconic Cougar logo at midfield along with crimson end zones. In 2000 WSU became just the second NCAA Division I team to install the latest innovation in artificial playing surfaces.

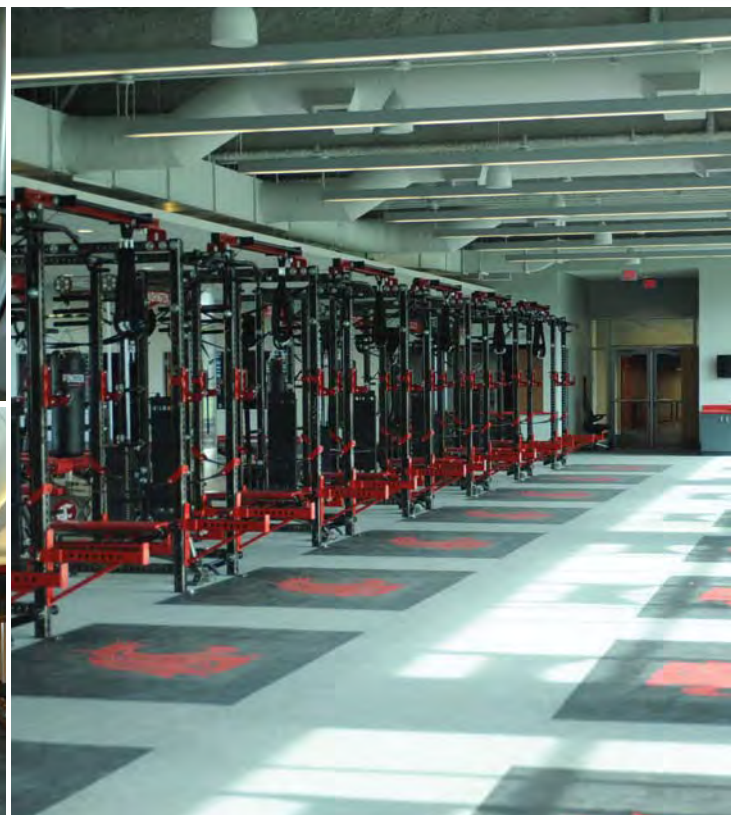

Mike Leach, the 2015 Pac-12 Co-Coach of the Year, begins his fifth season leading the Washington State Cougar football program after being named the Cougars' head football coach, Nov. 30, 2011. Leach has guided the Cougars to two bowl appearances in his first four years, a first for a WSU head coach.

In 2015 the Cougars ended the season with a 9-4 record, 6-3 in the Pac-12 Conference, capped by a 20-14 Sun Bowl victory over Miami. After starting the season 2-2, the Cougars went 7-2 over the final nine games, posting last-minute victories at Oregon and No. 18 UCLA, and rallying from a fourth-quarter deficit in a 38-24 victory against Arizona State. For the second-straight season WSU led the nation in passing at 389.5 ypg, while also finishing second in the nation in red zone offense, converting 94.5 percent of their opportunities inside the 20-yard line. WSU concluded the regular season by having 11 student-athletes named to All-Pac-12 teams and five to Pac-12 All-Academic teams. Senior offensive lineman Joe Dahl earned Second-Team All-America honors while defensive lineman Hercules Mata'afa garnered First-Team Freshman All-American honors by USA Today.

In 2014 Leach's offense led the nation in passing at 477.7 yards per game, the second-highest total in FBS history, trailing only Houston's 511.3 in 1989. WSU set or tied 42 school, conference or NCAA records during the season, including quarterback Connor Halliday who threw for an NCAA single-game record 734 yards against California. WSU also placed five student-athletes on Pac-12 All-Academic teams and five on All-Pac-12 teams during the season.

In 2013, Leach's second season at the helm of the Cougars, he guided Washington State to the Gildan New Mexico Bowl, the first bowl game for the Cougars in a decade. Last season the Cougars ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, setting a school-record at 368.00 yards per game, eclipsing the previous mark of 343.3 ypg in 1997. The Cougar offense threw for more than 400 yards five times, including a 2013 NCAA FBS-best 557 yards at Oregon. Quarterback Connor Halliday set WSU single-season records for passing yards (4,587), attempts (714) and completions (449), the first WSU quarterback to surpass the 4,000-yard mark. The Cougars picked up more national recognition as safety Deone Bucannon became WSU's first All-America first-team selection since 2005 and was later selected as the No. 27 overall pick in NFL Draft by the Arizona Cardinals, the first Cougar taken in the first round since 2003. The Cougars also placed eight student-athletes on Pac-12 All-Academic teams during the season.

In his first season in Pullman, Leach's high-powered offense led the Pac-12 Conference in passing, averaging 330.42 yards per game. That figure ranked ninth nationally and marked the second-highest average in school history. Academically, nine Cougars received Pac-12 All-Academic honors while the 2012 fall semester football GPA of 2.66 marked the first time the football team had been over a 2.60 GPA for fall semester.

Leach brought a proven record of winning to Pullman. In 10 seasons as a head coach, all at Texas Tech (2000-09) his program earned 10 bowl bids. In addition, the Susanville, Calif., native who was raised in Cody, Wyo., recorded a school-record 84 victories during his tenure.

Leading the most prolific passing offense in the country, Leach received three national coach of the year awards in 2008 - the Woody Hayes Award, Howie Long/Fieldturf Coach of the Year, and George Munger Award. His offense spreads the field with his exciting brand of football and guided Texas Tech to six NCAA passing titles and three total offense titles during his 10 seasons in Lubbock. Leach's offense produced school records in nearly every passing category in 2000, his first season with the Red Raiders, but surpassed those numbers in each of his next nine seasons.

During Leach's time in Lubbock, Texas, the Red Raiders increased their yards per game by more than 150 and averaged nearly 20 points more per outing. In the passing game, Texas Tech threw for about 300 yards more per game in the decade Leach was at the helm.

Leach led Texas Tech to one of the most memorable seasons in school history

in 2008 as the team set a program record with 11 regular-season wins en route to an 11-2 record. The win total tied the mark, set previously by the 1953 and 1973 Red Raider squads. Numerous accolades poured in from across the country as an unprecedented four players earned first-team All-America status, in addition to Leach's three coach of the year honors. Quarterback Graham Harrell, offensive tackle Rylan Reed and offensive guard Brandon Carter each garnered first-team honors, while wide receiver Michael Crabtree was honored as a unanimous All-American for the second-straight season.

On the field in 2008, the Red Raiders led the nation in passing for the sixth time in Leach's ten seasons and ranked among the top five in total offense. Harrell finished his storied career second on the NCAA career passing yardage list with 15,793 yards. Harrell also broke the career NCAA passing touchdowns mark with 134.

The Texas Tech program has established itself as one of the nation's leading producers of productive quarterbacks since the 2000 season. Harrell threw for 4,555 yards in his debut as the starter in 2006 and became the sixth player and third Red Raider in NCAA history to throw for 5,000 yards in a season with his 5,705-yard effort in 2007 and 5,111 yards last season. He also is the third quarterback under Leach to win nine games in a season and the first Red Raider in history to win 11 in a regular season. Former quarterback Kliff Kingsbury in 2002 and Cody Hodges in 2005 each posted nine-win seasons during their careers, while 2003 and 2004 signal callers B.J. Symons and Sonny Cumbie each won eight games in their respective seasons as the starter.

The running game flourished under Leach as well. Former Red Raider Taurean Henderson holds the NCAA career record for receptions by a running back. The Red Raiders' 28 total rushing scores in 2008 were the most for a Tech team since the 1993 team scored 30. Despite Tech's offense revolving around the pass, Leach did a tremendous job of incorporating the running back position into the mix. Henderson finished his career with 303 receptions, which ranks first in NCAA history among running backs and fourth overall.

Leach has coached several players who have gone on to the NFL. While at Tech, 18 players have been drafted and 21 others have signed free agent contracts. In the spring of 2009, four players were selected among the first four rounds of the NFL Draft, marking the most successful draft for Texas Tech in the Leach era.

Safety Darcel McBath was selected by the Denver Broncos in the

second round, while offensive lineman Louis Vasquez was taken in the third by San Diego. Defensive end Brandon Williams went to the Dallas Cowboys in the fourth.

The program made strides academically as well under Leach. During his 10 years, Tech was recognized as one of the nation's top institutions for consistently being above a 70 percent graduation rate, according to the American Football Coaches Association.

Prior to coming on board at Texas Tech, Leach, in just one season at Oklahoma, directed a Sooner offense that went from one of the worst in the Big 12 Conference to one of the best. Leach guided an Oklahoma offense that went from 11th in the Big 12 in 1998 to first in 1999 and 101st in the nation to 11th. In just one year, OU's total offense numbers improved from 293.3 to 427.2 yards per game. Under Leach, the Oklahoma offense set six Big 12 Conference and 17 OU records.

Prior to joining Bob Stoops' Oklahoma staff, Leach served as offensive coordinator for Hal Mumme at the University of Kentucky and Valdosta (Ga.) State University. Under Mumme and Leach, the Kentucky offense set six NCAA records, 41 Southeastern Conference records and 116 school records in 22 games.

Named 1996 Division II Offensive Coordinator of the Year by American Football Quarterly magazine, Leach helped Mumme lead Valdosta State to a 40-17-1 record. The 1993 Blazer offense smashed 66 school records, 22 conference records and seven national records. In 1994, Valdosta State advanced to the Division II playoffs with Leach's offense shattering 80 school records, 35 conference records and seven more national marks.

Leach and Mumme first teamed up at Iowa Wesleyan College in 1989. From 1989 to 1991 Leach served as offensive coordinator and line coach for an offense that led the NAIA in passing yardage one season and finished second the other two. Iowa Wesleyan quarterbacks passed for more than 11,000 yards in Leach's three seasons and broke 26 national records.

Leach also has made coaching stops in Pori, Finland, where he served as a head coach in the European Football League (1989), as well as one-year stints at College of the Desert (1988) and Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo (1987).

After graduating with honors from BYU in 1983, Leach earned a master's degree from the U.S. Sports Academy and his law degree from Pepperdine University, where he graduated in the top one-third of his class.

The oldest of six siblings, Leach and his wife, Sharon, are the parents of four children; Janeen, Kim, Cody and Kiersten.

Alex Grinch begins his second season after being named the defensive coordinator at Washington State University Jan. 14, 2015. In addition to his defensive coordinator role, Grinch coaches the secondary.

The Washington State defense saw rapid improvement in 2015 under Grinch. The Cougars' defensive unit allowed an average of 27.6 ppg (74th nationally), a marked improvement over 2014 which surrendered 38.6 ppg (114th). By removing special teams touchdowns allowed, the Cougar defense allowed opponents just 23.4 ppg. WSU allowed 416.2 ypg (84th), compared to 442.3 ypg (97th) in 2014. The biggest difference may be in turnovers as the Cougar defense forced 24 turnovers in 2015 (T-34th). The 2014 defense forced just eight turnovers (124th) all season. Of those turnovers, WSU improved from three interceptions in 2014 to 13 in 2015. Backed primarily by its defense, WSU's turnover margin improved from -1.42 in 2014 (123rd) to -0.08 this year (T-75th). WSU made a huge jump in tackles-for-loss, averaging 7.8 per game (8th), after the Cougar defense managed 6.4 (T-44th) in 2014. WSU had five players that recorded 10-plus TFLs on the season, tied for the most in school history (2002) while no other Pac-12 school had more than two. Seniors Darryl Paulo and Destiny Vaeao were named All-Pac-12 Second Team, while Hercules Mata'afa was named a First-Team Freshman All-American by USA Today.

Additionally, five players received All-Pac-12 recognition with defensive linemen Darryl Paulo and Destiny Vaeao garnering second-team honors, while Shalom Luani, Hercules Mata'afa and Peyton Pelluer were named honorable mention. The previous two seasons WSU had a combined three defensive players each all-Pac-12 honors.

Grinch spent three seasons (2012-14) at Missouri where he coached safeties, helping Missouri to a 23-5 record over his last two years, two SEC East Division titles, a Citrus Bowl victory over Minnesota and a Cotton Bowl victory over Oklahoma State in 2014.

Grinch's safeties played a key role in Missouri's defensive improvement in 2014, as they combined to grab six of the Tigers' 12 interceptions on the year - led by senior SS Braylon Webb's team-high four picks. Webb earned Second-Team All-SEC honors for his 2014 season which included 69 tackles.

The 2013 season saw improved play from the Tiger safeties, which helped Missouri's defense be one of the most disruptive units in the country. Grinch's safeties combined for five interceptions, including three from Webb, who ranked second on the team with 89 tackles and seven pass break ups.

Grinch's first year at Missouri saw him get solid play from his starting safeties Kenronte Walker and Webb. Walker finished the 2012 season with 71 tackles (fifth on the team) and won the first-ever SEC Defensive Player of the Week honors for a Tiger player.

Prior to Missouri, Grinch spent three seasons coaching the Wyoming secondary. Three of his Cowboy defensive backs earned postseason honors in 2011, as Wyoming reached a bowl game for the second time in his three years in Laramie. Wyoming concluded the 2011 regular season ranked No. 34 in the nation in pass defense, allowing only 202.2 yards passing per game, and ranked No. 1 in the Mountain West and tied for No. 5 in the NCAA in most turnovers gained (31 total).

During his time in Laramie, Grinch coached two Freshman All-Americans, six All-Mountain West Conference recipients and five MWC All-Academic honorees. Two of his players, Chris Prosinski and Tashaun Gipson, remain in the NFL with Prosinski being a fourth round-round selection by Jacksonville in 2011 and Gipson spending the past three seasons with Cleveland, earning a Pro Bowl selection in 2014.

Grinch coached at New Hampshire from 2005-08. In his first two seasons he coached the cornerbacks before being promoted to secondary coach and recruiting coordinator for in 2007. At UNH the Wildcats reached the FCS playoffs four times, including three quarterfinal appearances and a No. 7 ranking in the final FCS Coaches' Poll of 2008. He coached four players to a total of six all-conference honors, including cornerback Corey Graham, who was a fifth-round selection of the Chicago Bears in the 2007 NFL Draft and was a 2012 NFL Pro Bowl selection.

Prior to New Hampshire, Grinch was the defensive graduate assistant coach at Missouri for the 2003 and 2004 campaigns, and was an administrative graduate assistant at Missouri for the 2002 season.

Grinch enjoyed an outstanding college playing career at Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio. He was a member of three NCAA Division III National Championship teams at Mount Union in 1998, 2000 and 2001. Over his four-year career, Grinch's Mount Union teams posted a 54-1 record and won four-consecutive Ohio Athletic Conference Championships. His senior season of 2001, he was named a Third Team All-America safety by D3football.com and a First Team Academic All-Conference selection.

Grinch and his wife, Rebecca, have two children, a son, Tyler, and a daughter, Corbi.

Roy Manning begins his second season on Head Coach Mike Leach's staff after joining the Washington State coaching staff as the outside linebackers coach in January, 2015.

Last season Manning's outside linebackers combined for 26.5 tackles-for-loss and 12.0 sacks, while registering 146 tackles. Seniors Ivan McLennan (9 TFL/6 sacks) and Kache Palacio (10 TFL/5 sacks) joined with redshirt-junior Parker Henry (72 tackles/7.5 TFLs) as the core of the unit.

Manning arrived in Pullman after serving the previous two seasons at his alma mater, Michigan, serving as the cornerbacks coach in 2014 after coaching the outside linebackers in 2013. Under his direction, Michigan's SAM linebackers Cam Gordon and Jake Ryan combined for 70 tackles, 13 tackles for loss and five sacks in 2013 while defensive back Raymond Taylor earned 2014 All-Big Ten honors in 2014.

Prior to arriving back in Ann Arbor, Manning served as the running backs coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2012. That season Manning's group led the Big East in rushing in 2012, averaging 201.5 yards per game. Running back George Winn totaled the second-best rushing season in school history with 1,334 rushing yards (102.6 per game) and 13 touchdowns, both conference bests.

Prior to joining the Cincinnati staff, Manning served as offensive graduate assistant at Michigan, where he worked with the offensive line and was part of a coaching staff that led the Wolverines to an 11-2 record and a victory in the 2012 Allstate Sugar Bowl. Manning's first coaching experience came at Cincinnati in 2010, when he worked as a defensive assistant.

Prior to his appointment in Cincinnati, Manning spent three seasons in the NFL with five different teams. He signed as a free agent with the Green Bay Packers in 2005. He played in 15 games and started two contests as a rookie, tallying 41 tackles and one pass breakup. Manning tied for third on the team with 21 tackles on special teams. He also had stints with the Houston Texans, Buffalo Bills, Jacksonville Jaguars and Cincinnati Bengals.

Manning played in 37 career games and made 10 starts at linebacker as a fifth-year senior with Michigan. He was named the Roger Zatkoff Award winner as the team's top linebacker in 2004 after posting 39 tackles, six tackles-for-loss and one sack. Manning finished his career with 72 stops, nine TFLs and three sacks.

Manning, a native of Saginaw, Mich., earned his bachelor's degree in general studies from Michigan in 2004.

Jim Mastro, a veteran in the collegiate coaching ranks for more than two decades, begins his fifth year as running backs coach on Mike Leach's staff.

Since arriving on staff Mastro has guided a youthful core of backs, teaching the intricacies of the Air Raid offense from the backfield perspective. It started to come together in 2015 as Cougar running backs averaged 6.1 yards per carry, the highest for a Cougar backfield since the 2005 season. The trio of backs, sophomores Gerard Wicks and Jamal Morrow, and freshman Keith Harrington, combined for 152.5 all-purpose yards per game while scoring 12 touchdowns. The combined for 1,195 rushing yards, the most at WSU under Leach, while catching 114 passes for 734 yards and seven touchdowns.

Redshirt-freshman Jamal Morrow set a WSU record for running backs in 2014 with 61 receptions and the second most by a running back in the nation. Another redshirt freshman, Gerard Wicks, rushed for a team-leading four touchdowns.

In 2013, Mastro guided a running back group that doubled its yards-per-carry average, nearly doubled its total rushing yardage and rushed for 10 touchdowns. Running back Marcus Mason led the team in all-purpose yards and finished second on the team in receptions

Prior to WSU Mastro coached tight ends and F-backs at UCLA in 2011 and also played a key role in UCLA's running attack, which averaged more than 190 yards per game, third in the Pac-12 Conference in 2011.

Mastro, 46, spent the previous 11 seasons at Nevada (2000-10), building one of the top running attacks in the nation. In five of those seasons, a Wolf Pack running back led the Western Athletic Conference in rushing. In his last four years, he has helped Nevada running backs produce five 1,000-yard seasons.

In 2010, senior Vai Taua recorded his third consecutive 1,000-yard season, finishing seventh nationally with an average of 123.9 yards per contest. As a team, Nevada ranked No. 3 nationally with an average of 292.2 yards per game. The Wolf Pack led the nation in 2009 and ranked third nationally in 2008.

Mastro's 1,000-yard rushers at Nevada included: Taua (2008, 2009, 2010); Luke Lippincott (2007, 2009); B.J. Mitchell (2005); Chance Kretschmer (2001, 2003); and Matt Milton (2002). Five of those running backs also led the WAC in rushing: Tava (2008 and 2010); Lippincott (2007); Mitchell (2005); and Kretschmer (2001).

The success in the Nevada backfield began in Mastro's second season (2001), when he developed Kretschmer, a walk-on redshirt freshman, into the nation's leading rusher. The following year, with Kretschmer out with injury, Mastro guided Milton to 1,000-yard season.

The creation of the Pistol offense by head coach Chris Ault began the latest onslaught by Nevada backs. Beginning with Mitchell in 2005, Nevada has had at least one 1,000-yard rusher and a first-team All-WAC selection in each season since with the exception of 2006. That year, Robert Hubbard came four yards short of the 1,000-yard mark.

Mastro also served as Nevada's recruiting coordinator and oversaw several top recruiting classes. He enjoyed tremendous success recruiting the Bay Area during most of his tenure and had recently been focused on Orange County.

Prior to coaching at Nevada, Mastro was on the staff at Idaho for two years (1998-99). During his tenure in Moscow, he coached the 1998 Big West Player of the Year and Idaho's career rushing leader, Joel Thomas.

Prior to that, Mastro was a linebackers and special teams coach at San Jose State in 1995. He spent one season (1994) as the defensive run game coordinator at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and was the running backs coach for five years (1989-93) prior to that at his alma mater. His coaching career started at Cal Poly SLO in 1989, while he was completing his undergraduate degree.

Mastro, who earned his Bachelor's degree in Physical Education at Cal Poly in 1994, earned two letters as a running back at Cal Poly (1987-88). During the 1987 season one of Mastro's coaches was Mike Leach, who began his coaching career that year as Cal Poly's offensive line coach. Prior to that, he was a starting running back at San Jose City College (1985-86), earning All-America honorable mention as a sophomore.

Mastro married his wife Terri in 2002. Mastro has one son, Michael.

Clay McGuire begins his fifth season as offensive line coach at Washington State University and ninth season working on a Mike Leach-coached staff. McGuire played for Leach at Texas Tech, then later served four seasons on the Red Raider staff.

Last season the Cougar offense again led the nation in passing at 389.5 ypg, the second-highest mark in Pac-12 history. The offensive line also bolstered the WSU running game as the Cougars rushed for 80.0 ypg in 2015, more than double the output from 2014. Senior Joe Dahl was named a Second-Team All-American by USA Today and was a First-Team All-Pac-12 selection. Cole Madison and Riley Sorenson received Pac-12 honorable mention honors.

In 2014 the Cougar offensive line paved the way as WSU led the nation in passing at 477.7 yards per game, setting a Pac-12 record as well. The WSU offense also set 10 school single-season records, including total offense, first downs and yards per game. The offensive line was playing with three players seeing their first significant college action while junior offensive lineman Joe Dahl received All-Pac-12 honorable mention.

McGuire saw the offensive line make huge strides in 2013 from the season prior, doubling the yards-per-carry average, nearly doubling the total rushing yardage and nearly cutting the number of sacks allowed in half. Senior center and team captain Elliott Bosch closed his career earning All-Pac-12 honorable mention for the second straight season after anchoring and offensive line that protected the Cougars air raid offense that finished with the fourth-best passing attack in the country, Pac-12 single-season records for completions, pass attempts and WSU single-season records for passing yards and total yards.

In his first season with the Cougars in 2012, McGuire guided an offensive line that saw just two players start all 12 games and a total of seven players take a snap. Junior center Elliott Bosch, the only player to start every game in the same position, earned All-Pac-12 Conference honorable mention honors.

McGuire arrived in Pullman having spent the previous two years coaching running backs and special teams on Ruffin McNeill's staff at East Carolina. He was initially hired to solely direct the Pirates' rushing game, but added special teams duties prior to the 2010 fall camp.

In addition to guiding Jonathan Williams (847/52) and Giovanni Ruffin (384/25) to single-season career-highs in ground and reception totals in 2010, McGuire also provided direct oversight to special teams units which ranked among the Top 35 nationally in punt return average (30th), punt return defense average (31st) and kickoff return defense average (29th).

McGuire also tutored a pair of first-year performers in placekicker Michael Barbour and punter Ben Ryan during notable campaigns, which included a No. 42 FBS standing with a 1.23 field goals per game average. The Pirates also broke a single-game record which had stood since 1980 under McGuire's watch when ECU racked up 303 kickoff return yards against Southern Miss during a 44-43 victory on Oct. 9.

Prior to East Carolina, McGuire enjoyed a total of nine bowl appearances as a player and staff member at his alma mater, Texas Tech, before his move to East Carolina.

He had spent four seasons on the Texas Tech staff, but the 2009 campaign however, marked his first heading the running backs corps - a position he lettered in for four years. His move to the backfield followed service as special teams coordinator in 2008, an offensive graduate assistant in 2007 and a video intern in 2006.

McGuire's three primary running backs, which included two freshmen, all averaged over 5.0 yards a carry in 2009. Junior Baron Batch was Texas Tech's offensive MVP after racking up a team-high 1,279 all-purpose yards - 884 on the ground, 395 receiving - and 15 touchdowns. He assumed the special teams coordinator role early in 2007 on an interim basis, after McNeill moved over to the defensive coordinator position before the fifth game.

The special teams units responded to McGuire immediately when he took over in 2007 as the punt team thwarted any attempt at return opportunities for the opposition. Tech opponents averaged a mere 6.7 yards per return and returned only 18 of 30 punts. The kickoff coverage unit was also second in the Big 12.

McGuire appeared in 45 games at the H-Back position for the Red Raiders during the course of four seasons from 2000 to 2004. A big, physical player, he was noted for his effectiveness as a blocker in Tech's offense, and also factored into the passing game, catching 32 passes for 320 yards and two touchdowns during his career.

McGuire earned a bachelor's degree in history from Texas Tech in 2004 before following with a master's in secondary education in 2007.

McGuire, a native of Crane, Texas, and his wife, Jeri, are the parents of two daughters - Jorja and Addison.

Eric Mele begins his second full season as the Cougars special teams coach. He was promoted to the full-time coach in February, 2015, after serving in the same role on an interim basis the final two months of the 2014 campaign. Mele spent the previous two and a half seasons in an offensive quality control position, working with film breakdown and assisting with the development of quarterbacks.

In 2015 the Cougar special teams showed improvement from 2014 in many statistical categories, including kickoff coverage, kickoff return, punt return and punt return defense. Freshman kick returner Tavares Martin, Jr. was eighth in the Pac-12 in kickoff returns at 22.1 ypr while kicker Eric Powell made 20 field goals, fourth-most in WSU history.

Prior to Washington State, Mele spent five seasons as the special teams coordinator/running backs coach at Wingate University. In his time at Wingate, Mele helped guide the Bulldogs to a 36-19 record highlighted by a second-appearance in the 2010 NCAA Division II playoffs.

Prior to his time at Wingate, Mele spent the 2006 season as the wide receivers coach/passing game coordinator at Saint Peter's College (N.J.), the 2005 season as the co-defensive coordinator at Marist High School (N.J.) and two seasons as the special teams coordinator/defensive backs coach at William Paterson University (N.J.).

Mele was a three-year starter at strong safety and outside linebacker at William Paterson where he earned his bachelor's degree in sociology and criminal justice in 2002. He earned his master's degree in sports management from the American Military University in 2007.

Mele and his wife, Melissa, have four daughters, Samantha, Jordan, Taylor and Madison.

Dave Nichol begins his first on Washington State's staff after being named the Cougars outside receivers coach in Dec., 2015, and reunites with Head Coach Mike Leach.

Nichol is no stranger to a Mike Leach-coached team, having spent three seasons (2003-05) as an offensive line assistant at Texas Tech under the current Cougar head coach. Most recently, Nichol served as the offensive coordinator at East Carolina this past season.

Nichol has coached on staffs that have reached 10 bowl games since 2000. In 2015 he was elevated to East Carolina's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after serving the previous three seasons as the Pirates' outside receivers coach. While at ECU, Nichol played a vital role in guiding an offense that finished third nationally in passing and fifth in total offense during the 2014 season. The Pirate offense established successive single-season school records for passing yards and total offense, and combined he was part of 70 individual or team single-game, single-season and career offensive standards that were tied or set from 2012-14.

Prior to East Carolina, Nichol spent five seasons on the staff at Arizona. He began as a graduate assistant in 2007, focusing on the offensive line, he was promoted to outside receivers coach after one season and added the insider receivers the following year. With Nichol on staff, the Wildcats saw their offense increase 130 yards per game over the previous offensive system as Arizona reached three-straight bowl games. His final season in Tucson the Wildcat offense moved from 10th to 3rd in passing nationally, ending the 2011 season averaging 370.8 ypg.

Nichol began his coaching career as a student coach at his alma mater Texas Tech following his playing career as a wide receiver. He followed that with a year at Cisco (Texas) Junior College, three years back at Texas Tech as an offensive assistant, and a year at Baylor (2006) as a staff assistant.

Nichol, 39, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise sports sciences from Texas Tech in 1999 and followed with a master's in interdisciplinary studies from the same institution three years later.

A native of Chicago, Ill., Nichol graduated from Jesuit College Preparatory School of Dallas (Texas) before enrolling at Texas Tech.

Nine-year National Football League veteran Joe Salave'a begins his fifth year on Mike Leach's Washington State coaching staff, the first three as the defensive line coach and adding the title of Assistant Head Coach prior to the 2015 season.

Since arriving at WSU Salave'a has energized the Cougar defensive line, posting three of the top four season sack totals in the past 10 years, and the most tackles-for-loss since the 1999 season.

Last season the Cougar defense showed vast improvement over the previous year, tallying 102 tackles-for-loss (7.8 pg), eighth in the country and the second-highest total in school history. That included 33 sacks, led by redshirt senior defensive lineman Darryl Paulo and redshirt freshman defensive lineman Hercules Mata'afa, with 7.0 each. They were part of a group of five players that recorded 10-plus TFLs on the season, tied for the most in school history (2002). Paulo and senior Destiny Vaeao were named All-Pac-12 Second Team, while Mata'afa received All-Pac-12 honorable mention honors. Mata'afa also was named a First-Team Freshman All-American by USA Today.

In 2014 WSU registered 29 sacks and 77 tackles-for-loss, both improvements over 2013 totals. In 2013, the defensive line played a huge part in the Cougar defense forcing 30 turnovers, second-most in the Pac-12 Conference. Salave'a saw his young group take another step forward as junior defensive tackle Xavier Cooper posted team-highs in tackles-for-loss (13.5) and sacks (5).

Salave'a guided a young group in 2012 that included only four players who had taken snaps at the Division I level. The youthful line led WSU to its most tackles-for-loss (92) since the 2003 season and most sacks (35) since 2006. Both figures ranked among the nation's best, finishing eighth in tackles-for-loss and 11th in sacks.

Salave'a spent the 2011 season at Arizona after returning to his alma mater as a defensive line coach on Mike Stoops' staff in time for December preparations for the 2010 Valero Alamo Bowl.

Salave'a began his coaching career as defensive line coach for Dick Tomey at San Jose State (2008-09). Tomey served as head coach at Arizona when Salave'a played in Tucson.

Salave'a made an immediate impact in his first coaching venture after a noteworthy pro football career. In 2008, he mentored San Jose State Spartans' tackle Jarron Gilbert, the NCAA leader in tackles for loss and the Chicago Bears' first pick in the 2009 NFL Draft.

Salave'a was drafted in the fourth round by Tennessee in 1998 and spent five seasons with the Titans, one split year with the Baltimore Ravens and San Diego Chargers (2003) and his final three years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins from 2004-06.

He recorded 157 career tackles at Arizona, all as an interior lineman, with 43.5 tackles for loss and 21.5 sacks. He led the team in sacks and tackles for loss in both 1996 and 1997, and in fumbles caused in 1994 and 1996.

Salave'a lettered at Arizona as a defense tackle from 1994-97, serving as team captain in 1996. He earned honorable mention All-Pacific-10 Conference honors in 1995, second-team honors in 1996 and was a first-team selection in 1997.

Salave'a was recruited by Tomey in 1993 and became one of the mainstays of the Arizona defenses of the mid-1990s at defensive tackle. He was selected team captain and named the team's Most Valuable Player for the 1996 season. Salave'a has the unique distinction of being invited to the East-West Shrine and Hula Bowl All-Star Games after both his third and fourth seasons because he was awarded an additional year of playing eligibility.

His Arizona career was an academic success story as well, capped by NCAA eligibility restoration after he graduated within four years. He enrolled at UA in 1993-94, but was ineligible for football as a partial qualifier, losing the year of eligibility. After his senior year in 1996-97, the NCAA changed its rules in spring 1997, and as a May graduate he was afforded a fourth year of playing eligibility (fifth year in residence), one of the first such student-athletes to benefit under the new rule.

A native of Leone, American Samoa, Salave'a has been one of the territory's foremost football ambassadors promoting the game among Samoan youth, including founding a foundation to help introduce the game and strengthen its appeal.

His NFL career spanned 100 games, 28 as a starter, where he totaled 82 tackles, 7.5 sacks and two forced fumbles. He was the 107th overall draft selection and a member of the Titans' Super Bowl XXXIV team that lost to St. Louis, 23-16.

JaMarcus Shephard joined Mike Leach's staff in January, 2016, and will oversee the inside receivers group.

Shephard arrives at WSU following two seasons as the receivers coach at Western Kentucky University. This past season WKU finished fourth in FBS in passing average at 372.2 yards per game, with junior receiver Taywan Taylor, who broke the majority of WKU's career records, leading the way with 86 receptions for 1,467 yards and 17 touchdowns en route to all-conference first-team honors. Another receiver, Jared Dangerfield, who broke the single-season school record for receptions in 2014, repeated as an all-conference performer and has been invited to the East-West Shrine Game this weekend.

Over the past two seasons Shephard has coached a receiving group that has combined for 553 receptions and 86 touchdowns, including 290 catches and 48 touchdowns in 2015. In addition to his duties as receivers coach the past two seasons, Shephard added special teams duties in the spring of 2015.

Shephard had been at WKU since 2013, serving two years as a defensive analyst and volunteer assistant in 2011 and 2012, before moving to offensive quality control assistant in 2013 under then-head coach Bobby Petrino.

Shephard began his coaching career in 2005 working with wide receivers at Northrop High School in Fort Wayne, Ind., followed by a year at Broad Ripple High School in Indianapolis where he worked with receivers and defensive backs. He moved on to his alma mater, DePauw University, in 2007 where he was an assistant track coach working with long jumpers and sprinters. From 2007-11, he spent four years at the National Center from Drug Free Sport in Kansas City, Mo.

A 2005 graduate of DePauw, Shephard participated in the 2005 Hula Bowl as well as the 2004 Aztec Bowl in Cancun, Mexico. As a senior he caught 47 balls for 815 yards and seven touchdowns while also taking home first team all-conference honors. He finished his collegiate career as DePauw's all-time leader in kickoff return yards and kickoff return average. His 168 career receptions still rank No. 5 all-time at DePauw while his 2,382 career receiving yards are No. 6 all-time.

Shephard graduated from DePauw in 2005 with a degree in sports medicine while also serving as a team captain for both football and track and field. He later obtained his master's degree in Recreation and Sport Administration at Western Kentucky.

Shephard and his wife Hallie have a son, Jaylan, and a daughter, Alana.

Ken Wilson joined Coach Leach's staff in February, 2013 after spending the previous 23 years at the University of Nevada, 19 on the Wolf Pack coaching staff.

This past season Cougar linebackers finished one-two in tackles, with redshirt sophomore Peyton Pelluer and senior Jeremiah Allison leading the way. Pelluer had 101 tackles, fourth in the Pac-12, en route to all-conference honorable mention honors, while Allison was close behind with 97 tackles.

During his time with the Cougars, Wilson has overseen a linebacking group that in 2013 produced four of WSU's top five tacklers led by Justin Sagote's 106 tackles, fifth in the Pac-12 Conference, and helped develop the Cougar defense that forced 30 turnovers, second-most in the conference and the most by WSU since 2006. In 2014 Wilson coached All-Pac-12 linebacker Jeremiah Allison, who finished second on the team in tackles.

Wilson, who worked with current Cougars running backs coach Jim Mastro for seven seasons at Nevada, helped the Wolf Pack appear in 11 bowl games and claim nine conference championships during his 13 seasons on the sidelines. Wilson served the last five seasons as the associate head coach/linebackers coach and also worked six seasons with linebackers, one with safeties, one with defensive ends and a total of three seasons as the defensive coordinator.

Wilson has seen 16 of his former players sign professional contracts including six linebackers who were under NFL contract in 2012. Wilson mentored first team All-WAC selection Dontay Moch, who was taken by the Cincinnati Bengals with the 66th overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft. He put another defensive end into the NFL after the 2011 season as Kaelin Burnett signed with the Oakland Raiders.

In 2009, Wilson headed up the linebacking corps and oversaw the development of a youthful group that included second-team All-WAC selection James-Michael Johnson in 2009. He also coached current NFL linebacker Joshua Mauga (New York Jets) and former New York Giant and St. Louis Ram, Jerome Johnson. During the 2007 season, Wilson served as the defensive coordinator and was also the safeties coach. Nevada's starting safeties, Uche Anyanwu and Justin Jackson, combined for 144 tackles. Overall, the defense was fourth in pass defense and fifth in total defense.

Prior to that, Wilson headed up the Pack's inside linebacking corps while also serving as the team's assistant head coach. In 2006, two of Wilson's pupils - Jason DeMars and Joshua Mauga - finished second and third on the team in tackles, tallying over 110 tackles combined.

Prior to going back to coaching when Ault took over the program in December 2003, Wilson had served as an assistant athletics director/sports services at Nevada the previous four and half years. He oversaw football, men's basketball, baseball, track and tennis while coordinating grant-in-aid for all student-athletes in Nevada's 19-sport athletics program.

Wilson spent six seasons working with Ault from 1989-92 and 1994-95. He was also an assistant coach for Jeff Horton in 1993 and Jeff Tisdell from 1996-98, spending those final three seasons as defensive coordinator. As the nation's youngest Division I defensive coordinator, he directed the 1996 defense to the top of the conference in every defensive category and was part of the Las Vegas Bowl victory over Ball State.

The North Central (Ill.) graduate (1986) has coached six players who signed professional contracts, three of them in the NFL, including Nevada's all-time tackles leader, DeShone Myles, as well as Mike Crawford and Steve Bryant. Two of his pupils - Mylwa and Matt Clifton - were named to Nevada's All-Century team at linebacker.

Wilson has coached defensive line, linebackers and secondary during his career, which also included stints at his alma mater (1986) and at New Mexico (1987-88).

Wilson and his wife, Heather, have a son, Tyler who plays football at Nevada, and a daughter, Baylie.

When Mike Leach was named head coach at Washington State University, he wasted no time in naming David Emerick as his chief of staff, a position similar to what Emerick held while he and Leach were at Texas Tech.

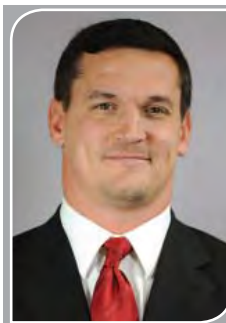

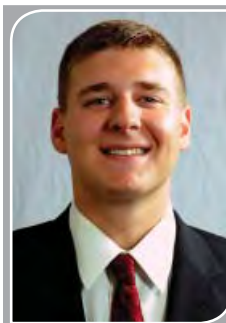

Anderson graduated in 2014 with a bachelors in sport management and is currently working towards his master's degree in sport management.

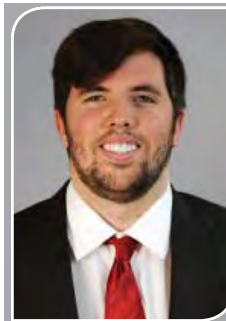

PORTLAND STATE VS. WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Portland State of the FCS upset Washington State 24-17 in a driving rainstorm that hampered WSU's high-flying offense. Portland State scored all 24 of its points in the second half, and won despite being out-gained 411 yards to 294 yards. It was the first time Portland State beat a Pacific-12 team in 15 tries, and lifted their record to 3-32 against FBS teams. It was Washington State's first loss to an FCS team in 20 outings. Steven Long scored on a 1-yard run with just over 2 minutes left in the game to lift Portland State to the upset. The rain and unseasonably chilly temperatures stymied Washington State's passing game under quarterback Luke Falk, who this year replaced national passing leader Connor Halliday. But Portland State had the stronger ground attack, out-rushing Washington State 233 yards to 104 yards. Portland State quarterback Alex Kuresa completed just 7 of 12 passes for 61 yards, but led all rushers with 92 yards on 16 carries in the opener for both teams. Falk completed 27 of 41 passes for 289 yards with two touchdowns for WSU. He left the game in the closing minutes with an undisclosed injury. Washington State's opening drive stalled on Portland State's 4-yard line, and the Cougars settled for Erik Powell's 21-yard field goal and a 3-0 lead. The Cougars had a bizarre drive on their second possession, moving forward and back over 90 yards because of penalties, and converting three fourth-down plays, before Powell's 22-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Aaron Sibley. Washington State's first touchdown came on a screen pass from Falk to Keith Harrington, which the freshman running back turned into a 24-yard gain that gave the Cougars a 10-0 lead midway through the second quarter. That lead stood at halftime, as the Cougars outgained Portland State 274 yards to 86 yards in the first half. Portland State came out strong in the third quarter, driving 75 yards with Paris Penn scoring on a 4-yard rush to cut Washington State's lead to 10-7. On Portland State's next possession, Jonathan Gonzales kicked a 42-yard field goal to tie the score at 10 with 4:37 left in the third. Washington State turned the ball over on downs on its next possession, with Portland State taking over on its own 28. The Vikings were forced to punt, but WSU's Kyrin Priestler fumbled the catch and Portland State recovered on WSU's 11. Nate Tago pounded over from the 8 to give Portland State a 17-10 lead with 13:06 left. Tavares Martin returned the ensuing kickoff to Portland State's 46, aided by a facemask penalty against the Vikings. Gabe Marks caught a 5-yard touchdown pass from Falk to tie the score at 17 with 9:11 left. Kuresa led Portland State on a 14-play, 69-yard drive that consumed nearly 7 minutes, with Long rushing from the 1-yard line to lift Portland State to a 24-17 lead with 2:19 left. Sibley intercepted a pass from WSU's Peyton Bender with 42 seconds left to seal the win.

PISCATAWAY, N.J. – Luke Falk led a 10-play, 90-yard touchdown drive, finding River Cracraft with an eight-yard strike with :13 left to lift Washington State past Rutgers, 37-34. Falk threw for 468 yards and four touchdowns. While Janarion Grant tried to be the hero for Rutgers, returning two kicks for touchdowns, he couldn't return the final kickoff for a touchdown. The ball was kicked to Leonte Carroo and Rutgers tried to do their Stanford vs. California impression, before the ball was thrown forward after several laterals. Grant had the best game of his collegiate career, returning a kickoff and a punt for late touchdowns. With Rutgers trailing 30-27 with 1:45 left, Grant returned a punt 55-yards for a touchdown to give Rutgers the 34-30 lead. The playmaker returned a kickoff 100 yards to give Rutgers its first lead of the game, 27-23 and finished a school record 339 total yards. Washington State answered Grant's 100-yard return with an eight play, 82-yard drive in 2:59. Falk hit Gabe Marks, who made a dazzling 23-yard touchdown catch. On its next two drives Rutgers negated two touchdowns with penalties. Rutgers running back Josh Hicks fumbled on the ensuing drive after catching a screen pass and Isaac Dotson recovered for the Cougars. That came one play after a 21-yard touchdown was negated on a holding penalty on Chris Muller. The Scarlet Knights defense stopped Washington State on fourth down with 6:10 left, but Justin Goodwin's offensive pass interference penalty negated a 29-yard touchdown catch by Grant. The high-scoring second half came after just one touchdown in the first. Trailing 13-6 and after leading a 52-yard drive to start the second half, Chris Laviano, making his first career start, fumbled near the sideline, recovered on the 40-yard by defensive tackle Destiny Vaeao. Laviano finished with 204 yards, going 23-of-29 with one touchdown and an interception. Falk then led a 64-yard touchdown drive with a 7-play drive. Keith Harrington caught a 5-yard swing pass to make it 20-6 midway through the third quarter. Rutgers answered with a 73-yard touchdown drive that included a fourth-and-five conversion on a 20-yard pitch and catch from Laviano to Grant. Robert Martin ended the drive with a 15-yard touchdown run before Washington State blocked the extra point, leaving Rutgers down 20-12. Rutgers stopped Washington State on fourth-and-three with 2:27 left in the third quarter, then embarked on a 68-yard, 7-play drive capped by a 1-yard toss to Matt Flanagan. Carroo caught the two-point conversion to knot it at 20. Falk completed his first 13 passes of the game against Rutgers' depleted secondary. Four defensive backs were dismissed from the team 10 minutes before the season opener last week. Washington State's Erik Powell hit field goals from 46- and 47-yards in the second quarter as Falk went 24-of-29 for 201-yards in the first half.

WYOMING VS. WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. — Luke Falk threw for 303 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another as Washington State beat Wyoming 31-14. Dom Williams caught two scoring passes for Washington State (2-1), which had not won a game in Pullman since beating Portland State last September. The Cougars had not beaten an FBS opponent at home since 2013. Brian Hill ran for 139 yards for Wyoming (0-3), who came in as a 24-point underdog. Cowboys quarterback Cameron Coffman, who missed last week's game with an injured knee, completed 25 of 36 passes for 296 yards, with two touchdowns and an interception. Falk completed 37 of 45 passes and was intercepted once. Wyoming outgained the Cougars 409 yards to 378. Wyoming scored on a 45-yard touchdown pass from Coffman to Tanner Gentry on the first possession of the game. Coffman had been intercepted the play before, but the pick was negated by a hand-in-face penalty against WSU's Hercules Mata'afa, giving the Cowboys new life. Washington State tied the game on Falk's 1-yard run late in the first quarter, capping a 44-yard drive that began with Wyoming punting out of its own end zone. Wyoming took possession on its own 37 on the ensuing series and ran the ball six straight times, down to the WSU 5. Then Coffman fired a touchdown pass to Jake Maulhardt for a 14-7 lead. Washington State replied with a 70-yard drive, with Falk passing 35 yards to Williams in the end zone to tie the game at 14-14. Tristan Bailey missed a 38-yard field goal attempt on Wyoming's next possession. Washington State took over on its 21 and grabbed its first lead of the game when Keith Harrington ran 36 yards into the end zone for a 21-14 advantage they never relinquished. Harrington ran or caught the ball on six of the nine plays. Washington State's defense held Wyoming scoreless in the second half. Falk was picked off early in the third by Marcus Epps, giving Wyoming the ball on its 49. But the Cowboys' drive stalled and they turned the ball over on downs. Washington State returned the favor, as Harrington was stopped on fourth-and-1 and Wyoming got the ball back on the WSU 40. Wyoming couldn't move the ball and had to punt. Early in the fourth, Gentry fumbled after catching the ball and Mata'afa recovered, giving Washington State possession at midfield. A targeting call against Wyoming cornerback Robert Priester on receiver River Cracraft got Priester ejected from the game and put WSU on the Wyoming 24. The Cougars drove to the 4, but had to settle for Erik Powell's 22-yard field goal and a 24-14 lead. Falk added a touchdown pass to Williams late in the game.

WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 24 CALIFORNIA

Oct. 3, 2015 • Memorial Stadium • Att.: 42,042 • TV: Pac-12 Networks

BERKELEY, Calif. — Jared Goff got off to a shaky start and still threw for 390 yards and four touchdowns to lead No. 24 California to a 34-28 victory over Washington State. Goff threw an early interception and was off target on a few throws before finding his groove. He threw two TD passes in a span of less than 2 minutes late in the third quarter surrounding a successful inside kick to erase an eight-point deficit and lead the Bears (5-0, 2-0 Pac-12) to their best start since 2007. Luke Falk threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score for the Cougars (2-2, 0-1), who have lost 28 of their past 28 games against ranked opponents. Washington State was in position to reverse that trend after Falk threw a 4-yard TD pass to Gabe Marks midway through the third quarter and Kenny Lawler lost a fumble on Cal's ensuing possession. Stefan McClure then changed the tide on a safety blitz that gave Cal one of its seven sacks on the day. Erik Powell then missed a 40-yard field goal wide right and Goff took over from there. He drove Cal 77 yards to a score on a 20-yard touchdown pass to Kenny Lawler that made it 28-26. McClure's sack was one of two momentum-changing plays he made in the quarter. Washington State tried a fake punt on the opening drive of the quarter only to have punter Zach Charme fumble. McClure scooped up the ball and ran 45 yards for the touchdown. Cal needed another big play from its defense after the Bears were stopped on fourth down at the Cougars 38 with 4:38 to go. Damariay Drew delivered with an interception and Goff converted two third downs to run out all but the final 12 seconds of the game. After winning just six games in coach Sonny Dykes' first two seasons, Cal has matched its best start since 1950 in Dykes' third year. The Bears need just one more win to be bowl eligible for the first time since 2011 and are in position to contend in the Pac-12 North. But the schedule gets much tougher from here with road games against No. 10 Utah and No. 7 UCLA, followed by a home game against No. 17 Southern California and a trip to Oregon. Cal was stopped twice on fourth down in the first half and Goff threw an interception on the third play from scrimmage as Washington State broke out to a 21-7 lead. Goff then threw his first of two TD passes to Lawler late in the second quarter to start the comeback.

WASHINGTON STATE AT OREGON

Oct. 10, 2015 • Autzen Stadium • Att.: 57,775 • TV: Pac-12 Networks

EUGENE, Ore. – Luke Falk threw for season-high 505 yards and five touchdowns, including an unusual scoring pass in the second overtime, and Washington State snapped an eight-game losing streak to Oregon with a 45-38 victory in overtime over the Ducks. Knotted at 38, an unnecessary roughness foul on the Ducks helped the Cougars in the second OT, and then Falk appeared to hit River Cracraft with a pass that landed in the hands of Robert Lewis for a 4-yard touchdown. The play withstood review, and Oregon's subsequent drive ended in an interception - sending the Cougars rushing onto the field in celebration. Falk had marched Washington State (3-2, 1-1 Pac-12) downfield in the final two minutes of regulation, capping the drive with an 8-yard pass to tie the game at 31 and send it to overtime. Jeff Lockie hit Bralon Addison with a 9-yard touchdown pass for the Ducks (3-3, 1-2) on the opening possession of the extra period. The Cougars answered with Falk's close 1-yard keeper that withstood a review that again tied the score. Royce Freeman ran for a career-high 246 yards and two touchdowns, and also caught a TD pass, for Oregon. Both Lockie and Taylor Alie have rotated. Lockie shouldered most of the load, throwing for 123 yards and two touchdowns. Both QBs leaned on Freeman, just as they had in last week's 41-24 victory at Colorado when he ran for 163 yards and two scores. Freeman ran for 135 yards and a touchdown against Washington State in the first half alone. Falk threw a 7-yard touchdown pass to Gabe Marks on Washington State's first series of the game. Marks has been seeing a lot of action in coach Mike Leach's offense, going into the game with an average of 91 yards receiving per game, and leading the Pac-12 with an average of 8.3 catches per game. He finished with eight catches for 111 yards against the Ducks. Oregon was ranked 114th in the nation for passing yards allowed going into the game, allowing an average of 287.2 yards a game. But the Ducks attempted to switch things up against the Cougars, playing wide receiver Charles Nelson at safety at times. It was the sophomore's first career appearance on defense, although he played at safety during the Spring Game. Nelson also played at receiver and on special teams during the game. Oregon's initial drive ended with a 26-yard field goal from Aidan Schneider. Oregon switched to Alie midway through its second series, and he ran 8 yards for a touchdown to give Oregon a 9-3 lead. After Freeman's 2-yard touchdown run, Falk hit Marks again with a 4-yard scoring pass just before the break to cut Oregon's margin to 17-14 at halftime. Falk gave the Cougars a 21-17 lead early in the third quarter with a 27-yard touchdown pass to Tavares Martin Jr. But Freeman caught a 17-yard scoring pass from Lockie that put the Ducks back in front 24-21. He added a 1-yard scoring run early in the fourth quarter. Erik Powell added a 22-yard field goal for the Cougars before Falk's game-tying drive.

OREGON STATE AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Luke Falk tied the school record with six touchdown passes, all in the first half, as Washington State beat Oregon State 52-31. Washington State (4-2, 2-1 Pac-12), coming off an upset victory at Oregon, hadn't beaten a Pac-12 opponent in Martin Stadium since November 2013. They have already eclipsed the three wins they had all of last season, and this was the 100th win of coach Mike Leach's career. The Cougars scored on all seven of their first-half possessions and piled up 520 yards of offense. Quarterback Seth Collins threw for 176 yards and ran for 124 yards for Oregon State (2-4, 0-3), which gave up more than 40 points for the third consecutive week. The Beavers rushed for 215 yards in the game. Falk, who threw for 505 yards and five touchdowns at Oregon, completed 39 of 50 passes for 407 yards, with two interceptions. Dom Williams caught 11 passes for 158 yards and two touchdowns for WSU. Oregon State, under new coach Gary Andersen, produced 394 yards of total offense, but couldn't slow the Cougars in the first half. Washington State's Tavares Martin Jr. returned the opening kickoff 51 yards and the Cougars marched down the field, with Falk throwing a 3-yard touchdown pass to River Cracraft. Oregon State went three-and-out, and Washington State replied with a 69-yard drive that ended with Falk's 3-yard touchdown pass to Williams. Garrett Owens kicked a 50-yard field goal to put Oregon State on the scoreboard near the end of the first quarter. Gabe Marks caught a 23-yard touchdown pass from Falk in the opening seconds of the second quarter for a 21-3 lead. Oregon State tried a fake punt from its own 20, but punter Nick Porebski was dropped for a 6-yard loss. After a touchdown pass to Marks was called back for offensive interference, the Cougars had to settle for a 30-yard field goal by Erik Powell and a 24-3 lead. Oregon State's Victor Bolden returned the ensuing kickoff 100 yards down the right sideline to cut the WSU lead to 24-10. The Beavers then tried an onside kick, but the Cougars recovered on the 50. After a 28-yard reception by Williams, Falk's fourth touchdown pass was for eight yards to Jamal Morrow. After an OSU punt, Washington State drove 69 yards, with Falk throwing a 22-yard touchdown pass to Morrow for a 38-10 lead. Oregon State's Collins led an 80-yard drive that ended with his 12-yard touchdown run. But WSU replied with Falk's 11-yard touchdown pass to Williams in the closing seconds of the half, for a 45-17 halftime lead. Falk's six touchdown passes in the first half tied the school record for most touchdown passes in a full game, set by Connor Halliday last year. The Cougars had 399 yards of offense in the first half. Neither team scored in the third quarter. Collins threw a short touchdown pass to Jordan Villamin late in the fourth, to close within 45-25. The Beavers then recovered the on-side kick with 5:44 left in the game. But Collins was intercepted by Shalom Luani, who returned the ball 84 yards for a touchdown. Luani had a second interception to end Oregon State's next possession. The Beavers came in with the Pac-12's top-ranked pass defense, allowing an average of 177 yards a game.

WASHINGTON STATE AT ARIZONA

TUCSON, Ariz. — Luke Falk threw for 514 yards and hit Gabe Marks on four of his five touchdown passes, helping resurgent Washington State beat Arizona 45-42. Washington State (5-2, 3-1 Pac-12) beat Oregon in Eugene two weeks ago and tacked on another impressive road victory behind the arm of Falk to remain in the thick of the Pac-12 North race. The sophomore completed 47 of 62 passes and had the most passing yards ever against Arizona, breaking the mark of 511 yards set by Arizona State's Ryan Kealy in 1998. Marks caught eight passes for 97 yards, the last one a 9-yard touchdown that put the Cougars up 45-35. Arizona (5-3, 2-3 Pac-12) rallied in the second half after Jerrard Randall replaced Anu Solomon at quarterback, but the Wildcats had no answer for Falk and Washington State's Air Raid offense. Randall threw for 137 yards and ran for 105 on 10 carries. He hit Johnny Jackson on a 20-yard touchdown pass with 44 seconds left, but the Wildcats failed to come up with the onside kick. Arizona rolled over Washington State 59-37 in Pullman last season in a game that featured 994 yards of offense. This one had 1,114 total yards, though the Cougars got off to a quicker start behind Falk, who had thrown for 911 yards and 11 touchdowns the previous two games combined. Given all kinds of time to throw by his offensive line, he made it look easy picking apart Arizona's secondary. Falk hit Marks on a 6-yard touchdown on the opening drive, then Marks turned a short pass into a 43-yard score and 14-0 lead. Falk found Marks for a third score in the second quarter, a 1-yarder, and hit Kyrin Priester in the corner of the end zone for a 6-yard TD that put Washington up 28-14. Falk had 335 yards and four touchdowns on 30-of-38 passing in the first half, helping Washington State build a 31-21 lead. Arizona took a while to get its offense in gear, finally putting together a drive that led to Jared Baker's 1-yard touchdown run to open the second quarter. Nate Phillips followed with a 69-yard punt return touchdown that tied the game at 14-14, but Shun Brown fumbled a kickoff to set up Priester's touchdown. Baker added a 7-yard touchdown run in the second quarter to keep the Wildcats within reach at halftime. Falk kept firing and completing to start the second half, hitting Kyle Sweet on a 28-yard pass on third-and-19 to set up Gerard Wicks' 1-yard touchdown run to put the Cougars up 38-21. Randall replaced Solomon on Arizona's second drive and reeled off a 59-yard run on his first play, but that drive ended with a turnover on downs at Washington State's 11. Next series, Randall found Cayleb Jones on a 3-yard touchdown pass to pull the Wildcats within 38-28 late in the third quarter. Randall converted a fourth-and-2 with a run on the next drive and Baker pulled the Wildcats within 38-35 with a 6-yard touchdown run. Falk ended Arizona's rally with a 9-yard touchdown pass to Marks, putting Washington State up 45-35.

NO. 8 STANFORD AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. — Washington State kicker Erik Powell finally missed on his sixth kick of the game, going wide right on a 43-yarder as time expired to allow No. 8 Stanford to escape with a 30-28 win. Powell tied Drew Dunning's 2003 school record with five field goals despite rainy, windy conditions, but pulled the last one wide. Conrad Ukropina kicked a 19-yard field goal with 1:54 left to put Stanford ahead. Quarterback Kevin Hogan ran for 112 yards and two touchdowns for Stanford (7-1, 6-0 Pac-12), which is the only undefeated team in Pac-12 play. Washington State (5-3, 3-2) had a three-game winning streak snapped. The Cougars haven't beaten a Top 10 team since topping No. 5 Texas in the 2003 Holiday Bowl. Stanford punted while trailing 28-27 with 5:08 left, but got the ball back on Quenton Meeks' second interception of the game with 3:27 remaining. That set up Ukropina's field goal. Stanford scored first on Ukropina's 32-yard field goal, but then Powell hit four straight kicks — including makes from 46 and 47 yards — to put Washington State up 12-3 at halftime. The Cougars opened the second half by driving to the Stanford 11, but two incomplete passes killed the drive and Powell kicked a 28-yard field goal for a 15-3 lead. Stanford replied with the game's first touchdown on Remound Wright's 2-yard dive. The score was set up by Hogan's 39-yard bootleg scramble. Washington State came right back with a 75-yard drive in four plays, the final a 19-yard touchdown pass from Luke Falk to Gabe Marks for a 22-10 lead. Ukropina kicked a 32-yard field goal late in the third, then Hogan's 59-yard touchdown run cut the Washington State lead to 22-20. On the next series, Meeks intercepted Falk, giving Stanford the ball on Washington State's 17. Hogan ran 6 yards untouched up the middle to give Stanford a 27-22 lead in the opening seconds of the fourth. Washington State came back with an 81-yard drive that ended with Falk hitting River Cracraft for a 1-yard touchdown pass. Falk's conversion pass failed and the Cougars led 28-27. After Ukropina's kick, Washington State marched to the Stanford 29 and Powell hooked his attempt wide. The Cardinal have won seven straight over the Cougars.

PULLMAN, Wash. — Luke Falk threw for 497 yards and five touchdowns as Washington State beat Arizona State 38-24 Saturday to become bowl-eligible for the second time in coach Mike Leach's four years with the program. Dom Williams caught six passes for 123 yards and two touchdowns for Washington State (6-3, 4-2 Pac-12), which overcame a 14-0 first quarter deficit. Arizona State (4-5, 2-4) scored a touchdown on each of its first two possessions, then was held to one more the rest of the game. It was the Sun Devils' third consecutive loss. Washington State, which lost on a last-second missed field goal last week against No. 9 Stanford, managed to protect Falk from one of the best pass rushes in the Pac-12. He completed 36 of 55 passes, with one interception, and was sacked three times. Arizona State quarterback Mike Bercovici completed 27 of 44 passes for 229 yards. The Sun Devils did get 111 rushing yards from Demario Richard and 84 from Kalen Ballage. Jamal Morrow, Keith Harrington and John Thompson each caught touchdown passes for Washington State. Arizona State scored on its opening drive, with Richard running into the end zone from the 6-yard line. Richard had runs of 26 and 15 yards during the 70-yard drive. Ballage scored on a 9-yard run on Arizona State's second series, capping a 64-yard drive, for a 14-0 lead midway through the first quarter. Falk was intercepted by Kareem Orr on the first play of the ensuing series, giving the Sun Devils the ball at WSU's 22. Bercovici tried to run in on fourth down from the 3-yard line and was tackled for no gain, turning the ball over on downs. Washington State took over and marched 92 yards down to the 5-yard line, where the drive stalled. Erik Powell kicked a 22-yard field goal to put the Cougars on the scoreboard. On the next series, Marcellus Pippins recovered an Arizona State fumble at WSU's 32, but the Cougars had to punt. The Cougars got the ball back at the Arizona State 16 on a 38-yard punt return by Gabe Marks. Washington State failed to convert on fourth-and-5, but got a second chance on an inadvertent whistle by a game official. Falk then threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Williams to cut Arizona State's lead to 14-10 at halftime. Falk threw a 23-yard touchdown pass to Harrington on WSU's first drive of the second half, lifting the Cougars to their first lead at 17-14. The drive covered 94 yards in nine plays. Arizona State used a trick play on fourth-and-12 to keep its next drive alive. Punter Matt Haack threw a pass to a wide open D.J. Foster for a 21-yard gain, giving the Sun Devils first down on the WSU 13. Bercovici ran over from the 1 to lift the Sun Devils to a 17-17 lead late in the third. Washington State replied with a 73-yard drive, kept alive by a 16-yard pass reception by Marks on fourth-and-1. Thompson caught an 8-yard touchdown pass from Falk to put the Cougars up 24-21 with 13 minutes left in the game. After an ASU punt pinned them on the 1-yard line, Washington State drove 99 yards, with Falk throwing the final 12 to Morrow for a touchdown. That put the Cougars ahead 31-21 with 8 minutes left. Zane Gonzalez kicked a 22-yard field goal with 4:13 left to cut Washington State's lead to 31-24. The Cougars replied with a 75-yard touchdown pass from Falk to Williams on the first play of the ensuing possession for a 38-24 lead.

WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 18 UCLA

PASADENA, Calif. — Gabe Marks made a diving 21-yard touchdown reception with 3 seconds to play, sending Washington State to a jaw-dropping 31-27 victory over No. 18 UCLA. Josh Rosen scrambled 37 yards and dived for the go-ahead touchdown with 1:09 to play for the Bruins (7-3, 4-3 Pac-12), capping a desperate 80-yard drive. Luke Falk answered for Washington State (7-3, 5-2) with his own spectacular 75-yard drive ending with a remarkable, physical catch by Marks, who became the Cougars' career receptions leader earlier in the game with his 196th catch. Falk returned from a mid-game injury after passing a concussion protocol to throw for 331 yards. He threw two TD passes to Marks, and the Cougars punctuated their resurgent season with their first win over a ranked team in 10 tries since 2013. Coach Mike Leach's club has won five of its last six games, giving the Cougars seven victories for the first time since 2003. Rosen went 33 for 57 for 340 yards, and the precocious freshman appeared to clinch the win after Jaleel Wadood's end-zone interception with 3:13 left. Rosen sprinted through the defense for his score and subsequently hit Thomas Duarte for the 2-point conversion. But the Cougars went 75 yards in 66 seconds, and Marks hung on to the ball despite contact with the UCLA defender. The Bruins were whistled for pass interference on the play. UCLA lost after leading at halftime for the first time in 32 games under coach Jim Mora. The Bruins had won their last three games after a two-game skid and also lost despite holding Washington State's prolific Air Raid offense to 288 yards in the first three quarters. Nate Starks had an early TD run for the Bruins, who still control their fate in the Pac-12 South despite a mediocre home finale. UCLA would win the division with season-ending road victories over Utah and Southern California. Although Washington State would still need ample help to contend for the Pac-12 North title, Stanford's loss to Oregon gave the Cougars reason to hope their comeback season could get even better. Falk returned to the game in the second half after taking a violent sack and leaving the field in the second quarter. Falk, the Pac-12's leader in yards passing and total offense, appeared to hit his head on the ground while getting hit by Jacob Tuoti-Mariner. Freshman Peyton Bender threw his first career touchdown pass to Dom Williams during Falk's absence. The Bruins allowed Washington State to stay close by hurting themselves: Ishmael Adams fumbled a punt return at the UCLA 14 in the second quarter and then committed defensive holding while his teammates sacked Bender on third down, allowing Bender to hit Williams for a short TD and a 14-13 lead on the extra snap. UCLA kicker Ka'imi Fairbairn became the leading scorer in Pac-12 history with his 392nd career point when the Bruins' opening drive ended with a 22-yard field goal. UCLA center Jake Brendel set a school record on the same drive with his 49th career start, surpassing linebacker Spencer Havner's 10-year-old mark. Marks' TD catch midway through the third quarter put Washington State up 21-16. Marks broke Michael Bumpus' school receptions record early in the second half.

COLORADO AT NO. 24 WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Gabe Marks and Dom Williams both had touchdown receptions and No. 24 Washington State beat Colorado 27-3 on Saturday night in a game the Cougars saw quarterback Luke Falk carted off the field with an apparent head injury. Falk was taken off the field on a backboard with 8:16 left in the third quarter after being sacked by Samson Kafovalu. Falk, whose head slammed against the turf on a below-freezing night on the Palouse, appeared to be knocked out and was tended to on the field for 7 minutes. His facemask was removed and he was immobilized as he was carted away. Falk gave two thumbs up and waved his hands as he left the field. Falk's injury came a week after he was checked for a concussion against UCLA and passed protocol allowing him to return in the second half. Against Colorado, he finished 27 of 35 for 199 yards and one touchdown. The Cougars (8-3, 6-2 Pac-12) have a short turnaround before facing rival Washington in the Apple Cup on Friday. Washington State won for the sixth time in seven games, reached the eight-win mark for the first time since 2003 and preserved hopes for just the sixth 10-win season in school history if the Cougars can beat Washington on Friday and win their bowl game. That chance to get to 10 wins will largely depend on Falk's health. The sophomore entered the week leading the Pac-12 in passing and was second in the country. His 11-yard TD pass to Williams in the second quarter gave him 36 TD passes for the season, six behind Marcus Mariota's Pac-12 record of 42 last season. Falk was replaced by Peyton Bender, who was 13 of 21 for 133 yards including a 16-yard TD toss to Marks with 14:25 remaining for a 24-3 Washington State lead. It was Marks' 14th touchdown catch of the season, setting a new single-season school record. Marks also went over the 1,000 yards receiving for the season, becoming the 11th different wide receiver in Washington State history to reach that mark. Gerard Wicks rushed for 123 yards, becoming Washington State's first 100-yard rusher since James Montgomery in 2010 against Montana State. Keith Harrington added a 1-yard TD run for the Cougars. Colorado quarterback Cade Aspay was 26 of 40 for 238 yards in his first college start replacing Sefo Lulua, who is out for the season due to a foot injury. Aspay was intercepted twice and the Buffaloes (4-8, 1-7) got just three points out of six drives into Washington State territory, including a poor snap on fourth-and-goal at the 2 with 7:42 left that Aspay could only dive on. Diego Gonzalez missed field goals of 47 and 33 yards in the first half and Aspay was picked off by Taylor Taliulu on fourth-and-19 early in the fourth quarter. Gonzalez hit from 24 yards late in the third quarter, but the three points were the fewest allowed by Washington State to a Pac-10/12 opponent since beating Oregon State 24-3 on Oct. 12, 1996. Nelson Spruce had 10 catches for 120 yards, his seventh career game with double-digit receptions. Before his injury, Falk was content to throw underneath as the Cougars couldn't push the ball downfield. Aside from Williams' 29-yard reception on fourth down that set up the Cougars first score, Falk's longest throw in the first half was a 15-yard strike to Marks. Falk completed 21 of 23 passes in the first half, but averaged just 6.8 yards per attempt.

NO. 20 WASHINGTON STATE AT WASHINGTON

SEATTLE – Myles Gaskin rushed for 138 yards and two touchdowns, Sidney Jones, Darren Gardenhire and Azeem Victor all returned turnovers for touchdowns in the second half and Washington became bowl eligible with a 45-10 win over No. 20 Washington State. The Huskies (6-6, 4-5 Pac-12) removed any doubt about their postseason status by stemming the best passing game in the country and taking advantage of seven turnovers by the Cougars, the most by Washington State since 2009 against Hawaii. Peyton Bender made his first college start for Washington State because of an injury to Luke Falk and looked the part of an inexperienced freshman. Bender threw for 288 yards, but the Cougars (8-4, 6-3) failed to take advantage of three good scoring opportunities in the first half. Bender started after Falk suffered an apparent concussion last week against Colorado. Jones returned an interception 69 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter and Gardenhire scooped up a fumble and returned it 28 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter after Washington State standout wide receiver Gabe Marks was bent awkwardly and appeared to suffer a right knee injury. On the next play from scrimmage after Gardenhire's TD, Victor nabbed Bender's pass and returned it 27 yards for another score. The Cougars will still be going to a bowl game for the second time under coach Mike Leach but lost out on a chance at just the sixth 10-win season in school history and may tumble down the Pac-12 pecking order. The Cougars were held more than 100 yards passing below their season average, although the absence of Falk was a significant reason why. Gaskin was also a big reason why the Huskies pulled away. Held to 29 yards rushing in the first half, Gaskin ran for 67 yards in the third quarter alone and plowed in for a 5-yard TD on the first play of the fourth quarter and a 31-10 Washington lead. Even with a bowl game remaining Gaskin posted just the 18th 1,000-yard season in school history and most ever by a freshman with 1,111. Washington quarterback Jake Browning was 14 of 20 for 203 yards. His interception in the third quarter set up Washington State's only touchdown, but was the only mistake Browning made. Meanwhile, the Cougars couldn't stop making mistakes on a day they needed to be close to perfect with Bender running the show. Bender started well hitting 6 of 7 passes on the Cougars opening drive, but Washington State's missed opportunities started immediately. Dom Williams dropped a potential touchdown on a screen pass on third down and the Cougars settled for a field goal on its opening possession. Erik Powell missed wide left from 42 yards on Washington State's next series and two fumbles inside Washington territory cost the Cougars chances at points later in the half. It was just the second time this season Washington State did not score a touchdown in the first half. The only other time was against Stanford in a game the Cougars led 12-3 at the break. Washington State finally got into the end zone with 4:14 left in the third quarter after Marcellus Pippins interception led to Bender's 1-yard TD pass to Williams.

MIAMI VS. WASHINGTON STATE

Dec. 26, 2015 • Sun Bowl Stadium • Att.: 41,180 • TV: CBS

EL PASO, Texas – Luke Falk threw two touchdown passes to lead Washington State to a 20-14 victory over Miami on Saturday in the snowy Sun Bowl. Erik Powell added field goals of 30 and 25 yards to help the Cougars (9-4) win a bowl game for the first time since the 2003 Holiday Bowl. Miami (8-5) lost its sixth consecutive bowl game. Washington State led 20-7 at the half and looked in total control, limiting Miami to three first downs over the second and third quarters. The Hurricanes rallied in a blizzard in the fourth. Braxton Berrios' 60-yard end-around run set up Mark Walton' 5-yard scoring run that cut it to 20-14 with 13:10 left. The Cougars, the top passing team in the nation during the regular season, were shut out in the second half, leaving it to their defense to wrap up the victory. Miami had a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brad Kaaya to Stacy Coley called back on a penalty with 5:14 to play. Two players later, Washington State's Marcellus Pippins recovered Walton's fumble at the 4. After a Cougars punt, the Hurricanes were at the Washington State 28, but an end-over-end halfback pass from Joe Yearby was easily intercepted by Shalom Luani with 2:58 to play to seal it for Washington State. Falk, the game's MVP, was 29 of 53 for 295 yards and no interceptions. He threw touchdown passes of 31 yards to running back Jamal Morrow and 25 yards to receiver Gabe Marks. The scoring play to Morrow, during which he turned up the right sideline and carried two defenders into the end zone, gave Washington State a 7-0 lead. Miami tied it at 7 on a 4-yard pass from Brad Kaaya to Coley. The first quarter ended 7-7, but the Cougars ran off 13 straight points in the second. Kaaya was 17 of 30 for 219 yards with one interception. He appeared to give the Hurricanes a 14-7 lead in the second quarter when he connected in the end zone with receiver Rashawn Scott, but the ball came out of Scott's hands and was intercepted by Peyton Pelluer. One of the keys for the Cougars was winning the turnover battle, 3-1. Washington State fumbled in the second quarter, but the defense forced a three-and-out. On the next series, the Cougars used a 14-play drive to get Powell's first field goal and a 10-7 lead. Washington State made it 17-7 on Falk's TD pass to Marks, and Powell made it 20-7.
