JAKE DICKERT
HEAD COACH / THIRD YEAR

Jake Dickert begins his third full season as the Cougars' Head Football Coach after being named to the position Nov. 27, 2021. Dickert became the 34th head football coach in program history.

The 2023 season began 4-0 under Dickert, including wins over nationally-ranked Wisconsin (#19) and Oregon State (#14). It marked the second-straight season Dickert led the Cougs to a win over the Badgers. A convincing 56-14 win over Colorado accounted for WSU's fifth win in a 5-7 season. Four of WSU's seven losses came by one possession. The Cougar defense continued its aggressive play from previous years as WSU led the nation in defensive touchdowns with five on the season, the third-most defensive scores dating back to the 1996 season. In 2023, WSU had five players named to All-Pac-12 teams, led by second-team edge Brennan Jackson. In the 2024 NFL Draft, three Cougars, all defensive players, were drafted, led by safety Jaden Hicks to Kansas City (4th round). Jackson (5th, Los Angeles Rams) and cornerback Chau Smith-Wade (5th, Carolina), were also selected, giving WSU its most draft picks in a season since the 2005 NFL Draft.

Dickert began the 2022 season, his first full year leading WSU, with three-straight wins, including a victory at No. 19 Wisconsin. The win was WSU's first in three meetings against the Badgers and WSU's first regular-season nonconference road win over a ranked team since 2003. The Cougars captured three of its final four games and reached a bowl game, the Jimmy Kimmel L.A. Bowl, for the seventh-straight season, then the second-longest current streak in the Pac-12. Under Dickert's leadership, WSU again was strong defensively, finishing in the top four of numerous Pac-12 categories, including second in Red Zone defense and tackles-for-loss, third in scoring defense and turnovers gained, and fourth in sacks. WSU also led the Pac-12 in Red Zone offense. In 2022, WSU had 10 All-Pac-12 players, including first-team linebacker and third-team All-American Daiyan Henley, while safety Jaden Hicks garnered third-Team Freshman All-America honors. Henley was selected in the third round of the NFL Draft by his hometown Los Angeles Chargers.

Dickert spent the final five games of the 2021 regular season serving as the Cougar's acting head coach, leading WSU to a 3-2 record with wins over Arizona State, Arizona and a dominating 40-13 Apple Cup victory in Seattle before WSU earned a trip to the Tony The Tiger

Sun Bowl. The Apple Cup win snapped a seven-game skid to Washington and was WSU's largest margin of victory in series history.

Under Dickert's leadership, the Cougar defense was a huge spark in 2021, leading the Pac-12 with 29 takeaways, fifth-most nationally, while also leading the Pac-12 and tied for ninth nationally in turnover margin. Last season, 14 players earned All-Pac-12 honors including first-team selections in right tackle Abraham Lucas, kicker Dean Janikowski and EDGE Ron Stone Jr. while punter Nick Haberer was named a Freshman All-American. In the 2022 NFL Draft, offensive lineman Abraham Lucas was selected in the second round by the Seattle Seahawks and cornerback Jaylen Watson went in the seventh round to the Kansas City Chiefs.

Entering the 2021 season, Dickert was in his second year as WSU's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. In his first season in Pullman, the Washington State defense produced four All-Pac-12 Conference selections including linebacker Jahad Woods, who was second on the team with 31 tackles and led the team with 4.5 tackles-for loss. The Cougars led the league with eight forced fumbles and was fourth in rush defense (154.8), a 30-yard improvement from the previous season.

Dickert arrived at WSU after working three seasons at the University of Wyoming (2017-19) including the 2019 campaign as the defensive coordinator while working with the linebackers and safeties.

In 2019, the Cowboys were sixth in the country in red zone defense, No. 11 in the country in rush defense (107.1) and scoring defense (17.8), No. 40 tackles-for-loss (83) and No. 43 in total defense. Dickert saw four Cowboys earned All-Mountain West Conference honors led by second-team All-American linebacker and Butkus Award Finalist Logan Wilson while redshirt-freshman defensive end Solomon Byrd was named a Freshman All-American by the Football Writers Association of America.

Dickert originally joined the Wyoming football staff in February, 2017 and coached the safeties for the 2017 and 2018 seasons before he was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2019 where he started the season coaching the linebackers and later coached the safeties. In his three seasons at Wyoming, Dickert coached a pair of future

NFL safeties including three-time first-team All-Mountain West Conference pick Andrew Wingard and saw four players earn All-MWC honors in 2019 while another earned 2019 Freshman All-America accolades on the defensive line.

In 2018, Wyoming's defense was among the best in the nation, finishing the season No. 19 in total defense (326.2), No. 25 in rushing defense (129.5), No. 28 in scoring defense (22.0) and No. 32 in pass defense (196.7). Dickert coached senior safeties Andrew Wingard and Marcus Epps as Wingard ended his career tied for the Mountain West Conference career tackle record with 454. Wingard earned First Team All-Mountain West honors for the third consecutive season after being named to the preseason watch lists for

the Chuck Bednarik, Bronko Nagurski and Jim Thorpe Awards in both 2017 and 2018. Epps concluded his career as the only three-time team captain in the modern era of Cowboy Football, recorded 325 career tackles and was a finalist for the 2018 Burlsworth Trophy, which is awarded to the nation's most outstanding player who began his career as a walk-on. Epps was selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings where he played in seven games before playing in eight more with the Philadelphia Eagles. Wingard played in the 2019 East-West Shrine Game, was invited to the 2019 NFL Draft Combine and signed a free-agent contract with the Jacksonville Jaguars where he played all 16 games and made two starts as a rookie.

In his first season at Wyoming, Dickert help the 2017 Cowboy defense become one of the best groups in the country as they led the country in takeaways (38), ranked ninth in scoring defense (17.5), were first in fumbles recovered (18), second in interceptions (20), eighth in defensive touchdowns scored (4 TD), No. 13 in pass defense (174.9) and No. 23 in total defense (335.2). Dickert coached first-team All-Mountain West strong safety Wingard while the safety tandem of Wingard and Epps led the Pokes in interceptions in 2017, with five and four interceptions, respectively.

Before arriving at Wyoming, Dickert spent the 2016 season as the safeties coach and co-special teams coordinator at South Dakota State. Earlier in his career, Dickert was a part of Bohl's coaching staff at North Dakota State from 2008-10.

In his one season on the South Dakota State coaching staff, Dickert helped guide the Jackrabbits to the 2016 Missouri Valley Football Conference Championship and a No. 8 seed in the 2016 NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Playoffs, where they advanced to the FCS National Quarterfinals.

As defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Minnesota State, Mankato for the

2014 and 2015 seasons Dickert was part of a coaching staff that led the Mavericks to back-to-back Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) championships and consecutive NCAA Division II Playoff berths, earning their way to the 2014 National Championship Game. Minnesota State posted a combined record of 24-3 over that two-year span. Dickert's 2014 defense ranked second in the nation in scoring defense (12.9), fourth in turnovers gained, No. 12 in pass defense efficiency and No. 15 in total defense. In 2015, the Mavericks ranked fifth in the nation in scoring defense (16.1), third in rushing defense, seventh in pass defense efficiency and sixth in total defense. He coached 16 All-Conference players, three First Team All-Americans and a two-time Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference Defensive Player of the Year.

In his first season as a college defensive coordinator in 2013 at Augustana, Dickert's defense ranked No. 20 in the nation at the NCAA Division II level in scoring defense, giving up only 19.5 ppg. Augustana ranked second in the NSIC in pass defense, third in rushing defense and third in total defense. He coached five All-Conference players at Augustana.

In 2012, he served as the defensive backs coach at Southeast Missouri State. The Redhawks ranked No. 18 in the nation



in turnovers gained (25) and No. 23 in interceptions (13). Southeast Missouri State ranked No. 2 in the Ohio Valley Conference in pass defense. Dickert also coached a First Team All-Conference strong safety at Southeast Missouri.

Dickert spent the 2011 season as the special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach at South Dakota, where the Coyotes ranked second in the Great West Conference in fewest passing yards allowed and interceptions. He coached three all-conference performers while at South Dakota and his special teams units ranked in the Top 10 in the nation in punting average and net punting and had an individual rank in the Top 10 in punt return yards.

He joined the North Dakota State coaching staff in 2008 as a defensive graduate assistant on Bohl's staff. In 2009 and 2010, he was elevated to serve as safeties coach for the Bison. The 2010 NDSU team advanced to the FCS National Quarterfinals. Dickert began his college coaching career in 2007 as a defensive graduate assistant at his alma mater, Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

He played football at Wisconsin-Stevens Point from 2002-06 where he earned All-Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) honors as a wide receiver his senior season of 2006 and was named his team's Wide Receiver of the Year both his junior and senior seasons. Dickert earned his bachelor's degree in secondary math education from Wisconsin-Stevens Point in 2007, and completed his master's degree in general education, also from UW-Stevens Point in 2009.

Dickert and his wife, Candice, have three children, daughter Rylee and sons Jett and Jace.





BEN ARBUCKLE

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / QUARTERBACKS
SECOND YEAR

Ben Arbuckle begins his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff, serving as the Cougars' offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach after being hired Jan. 6, 2023.

In his first season in Pullman, Arbuckle led an offense that ranked fourth in the nation in passing at 336.8 yards/game and eight in passing yards with 4,042. Both figures mark the ninth-most in program history. WSU's offense also averaged 31.7 points per game, sixth in the Pac-12 and 37th nationally while its 421.7 yards/game of total offense ranked 35th nationally. As a team, WSU completed 66.7 percent of its passes, 18th nationally and sixth in program history. The Cougars posted 400-plus yards of total offense in seven games, including a season-high of 718 in win over Northern Colorado and 528 in win over No. 14 Oregon State. Against OSU, quarterback Cam Ward completed 29-of-35 passes for 422 yards and four touchdowns, being named National Player of the Week following the game. Offensively, Arbuckle led an offense that produced two all-conference performers in Ward and wide receiver Lincoln Victor.

Arbuckle arrived in Pullman having spent the previous two seasons at Western Kentucky, serving as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach during the 2022 season. In his first season in that role, Arbuckle took the Hilltoppers to great heights as the team finished seventh in total offense (497.3 ypg) and 14th in scoring (36.4 ppg), while quarterback Austin Reed led the nation in passing yards (4,746) and was third in passing touchdowns (40). The season culminated with a win over South Alabama 44-23 in the New Orleans Bowl to cap a 9-5 season. In that game, WKU put up 677 yards of total offense, including a New Orleans Bowl record 522 passing yards.

For the season, Arbuckle guided a Hilltoppers offense that accounted for 497.3 ypg of total offense, which ranked sixth in the nation, while their 352.2 ypg in passing offense and 36.4 ppg rank second and 14th, respectively, nationally. Under Arbuckle's mentorship, graduate student quarterback Austin Reed finished second nationally in passing at 339.0 ypg and fourth in total offense at 355.0 ypg. Prior to the 2022 season, 247Sports included Arbuckle in its list of 30-Under-30 coaches who are rising stars in college football.

Prior to the 2022 season, Arbuckle spent the 2021 campaign at Western Kentucky in an offensive quality control role, assisting an offense that led the nation in passing

(433.7 ypg), finished second in total offense (353.3 ypg) and second in scoring at 44.2 ppg. Arbuckle helped mentor Bailey Zappe who broke NCAA FBS records for both passing yards and passing touchdowns in a single season with 5,967 and 62, respectively.

Arbuckle arrived at WKU having spent the 2020 season as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Seminole High School in Seminole, Texas. He began his coaching career in a quality control role at Houston Baptist for two years from 2018 to 2019, working mainly with the offensive line for one season and then the quarterbacks for another.

Arbuckle played quarterback at West Texas A&M University and graduated in 2018 with a dual degree in Finance and Economics. Originally from Canadian, Texas, he went to Canadian High School.

Arbuckle and his wife, Lauren, have a young son, Hudson.

JEFF SCHMEDDING
DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / LINEBACKERS
SECOND YEAR

Spokane native Jeff Schmedding begins his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff after being named the Cougars' defensive coordinator/linebackers coach Jan. 12, 2023.

Under Schmedding's direction, the Cougar defense led the nation in defensive touchdowns with five (2 int. ret./3 fumble), also marking the third-most by a Cougar defense since 1996. WSU held seven of its 112 opponents below its season scoring average, five coming in Pac-12 play. Schmedding mentored former walk-on linebacker Kyle Thornton, who went from 36 tackles in 2022 to a team-leading 87 in 2023, which ranked sixth in the Pac-12. He also coached three defensive players to All-Pac-12 honors, edge Brennan Jackson (second team) and defensive backer Jaden Hicks and Chau Smith-Wade (honorable mention). Those three players also were selected in the 2024 NFL Draft, which Hicks going to Kansas City in the fourth round, while Jackson (LA Chargers) and Smith-Wade (Carolina) went in the fifth round. It marked the first time WSU had three defensive players selected in the same draft since the 1995 Draft (4).

Schmedding returned to the Pacific Northwest in 2023 having spent the previous two seasons at Auburn, most recently as defensive coordinator. In 2022, Schmedding oversaw the development of All-SEC First Team edge rusher Derick Hall, who totaled 60 tackles, 12 TFL's and seven sacks, while also being awarded the national Freddie Solomon Community Spirit Award from the Premier Players Foundation of Tampa.

In his first season at Auburn (2021), Schmedding served as the Tigers' assistant head coach, linebackers coach and defensive run game coordinator. That season saw Auburn rank 29th in rushing defense and 17th in tackles-for-loss.

Schmedding spent the previous two seasons at Boise State as the defensive coordinator for the Broncos. After coaching Boise State's outside linebackers in 2019, he took over inside linebackers for the 2020 campaign. Schmedding's first season leading the defense was a strong one as the Broncos claimed the Mountain West championship with a 12-2 record and 8-0 mark in conference play. The Boise defense put together an impressive year, finishing in the top 15 nationally in team sacks (37) and in the top 25 nationally in scoring defense (20.6 ppg).

In 2019, Junior STUD end Curtis Weaver was named the 2019 Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year while leading the conference and finishing fifth nationally in sacks (13.5). His 34-career sacks are a Mountain West record as well. Weaver was selected in the fifth round of the NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins. Junior defensive back Kekaula Kaniho was also named to the All-Mountain West First Team. Additionally, the Broncos had five other defensive players named to the 2019 Mountain West Second Team.

Prior to arriving in Boise, Schmedding spent 15 seasons (2004-18) at Eastern Washington helping to lead the Eagles to the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) National Championship in 2010.

EWU also made the national title game in 2018 – one of 10 total FCS Playoff appearances during Schmedding's time with the program. In 2018, the Eagles' defense was first in the FCS in defensive touchdowns scored and second in forced turnovers.

Schmedding served as EWU's defensive coordinator from 2015-18, while also coaching safeties and rovers. He spent seven seasons (2008-14) as the Eagles' special teams coordinator, coaching linebackers (2008-09), safeties and nickels (2010-14) during that time. He began his career at EWU as a graduate assistant (2004-06) where he spent time with linebackers and the secondary before being promoted to a full-time role as safeties coach in 2007.

Schmedding's previous coordination of special teams was particularly impressive as well, especially in 2014. The Eagles ranked third in the FCS with four blocked punts, and was 10th in net punting (38.4), 15th in kickoff return average (22.8) and 28th in punt returns (11.8). That season, EWU scored touchdowns on a kickoff return, punt return and kickoff team.

As a position coach, Schmedding tutored several of the finest safeties in EWU history. Tevin McDonald earned All-America and first-team All-Big Sky Conference accolades in 2014 for the Eagles before signing a free agent NFL contract with the Oakland Raiders. In 2013, McDonald earned third-team All-Big Sky honors as well. Schmedding's safeties in 2012 featured Academic All-American Jeff Minnerly, Freshman All-American Jordan Tonani and second-team All-Big Sky selection Allen Brown.

In 2010 and 2011, Schmedding coached All-America safety Matt Johnson, who earned first-team All-Big Sky Conference honors both seasons before being selected in the fourth round of the NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys. Minnerly was honorable mention All-Big Sky both seasons.

Schmedding also coached cornerback in 2011, a group which included eventual three-time first-team All-Big Sky selection T.J. Lee III. In 2010, EWU led the FCS with 26 interceptions.

Schmedding coached linebackers in 2008 and 2009, including J.C. Scherritt, who in 2009 was named to all six All-America teams and was second in the voting for the

PETE KALIGIS

THIRD YEAR

Pete Kaligis begins his third season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff after being named the assistant head coach/defensive tackles coach on Jan. 3, 2022. Kaligis and Dickert previous worked together from 2017-19 while both were on Craig Bohl's defensive staff at Wyoming.

In 2023, the Cougar interior defense made strides after beginning the year with the top six tackles combining for just 10 games played in a Cougar uniform. Despite that, the unit totaled 102 tackles, eight tackles-for-loss and three sacks. Against No. 19 Wisconsin, the Cougar defensive tackles led a defensive that held the Badgers to just 90 rushing yards, it's second-lowest output of the season and 59.5 yards below its season average.

In his first season coaching the defensive tackles, the unit combined for 101 tackles, 11.5 tackles-for-loss and four sacks. It was part of a defense that finished second in the Pac-12 in TF's and fourth in sacks, while the defense also flexed in the Red Zone, finishing second in the Pac-12 and 15th nationally.

Kaligis arrived in Pullman having spent the previous 13 seasons at Wyoming. During his time in Laramie, Kaligis served multiple roles, beginning with offensive line coach (2009), adding running backs and assistant head coach duties in 2012, offensive coordinator/running backs/assistant head coach in 2013, then transitioned to the other side of the ball in 2014, spending six years working with defensive tackles, then added defensive run game coordinator duties for his final two seasons.

Kaligis coached six bowl teams during his tenure and was a part of some of the best defenses in the country. In 2017, he coached First-Team All-Mountain West defensive tackle Youhanna Ghaifan, while also mentoring notable players Sidney Malaulu and Patrick Mertens, both of whom signed NFL free agent contracts.

In 2019, the Cowboy defense was again among the best in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS), ranking: No. 11 in the nation in scoring defense, allowing opponents only 17.8 points per game, and No. 11 rushing defense, giving up only 107.1 rushing yards per game to opponents. Wyoming also ranked: No. 6 in the FBS in redzone defense (allowing opponents to convert only 68.9 percent of their opportunities), No. 12 in the country in defensive touchdowns scored (3), No. 31 in interceptions (12), No. 37 in defensive pass efficiency (123.23).

Wyoming's 2018 defense was one of the best in the

nation. The Cowboys ranked No. 19 in the nation in total defense (allowing opponents only 326.2 yards per game), were No. 25 in the NCAA in rushing defense (129.5 yards per game), ranked No. 28 in scoring defense (giving up only 22.0 points per game) and were No. 32 in pass defense (196.7 yards per game). The UW defense also ranked No. 16 in the country in fewest first downs allowed to opponents (223). One of the Cowboy seniors coached by Kaligis in 2018 was nose tackle Sidney Malaulu, who attended rookie camp with the San Francisco 49ers following the 2019 NFL Draft.

In 2017, the Cowboy defense enjoyed an exceptional season. Wyoming's defense ranked No. 1 in the nation in takeaways in 2017, forcing 38 opponent turnovers. The Pokes ranked No. 9 in the country in scoring defense, allowing opponents only 17.5 points per game. UW ranked No. 1 in the NCAA in fumbles recovered (18), No. 2 in the nation in interceptions (20), No. 8 in defensive touchdowns scored (4 TDs), No. 13 in pass defense (174.9 passing yards allowed), and No. 23 in total defense (335.2 total yards allowed). Kaligis coached First Team All-Mountain West defensive tackle Youhanna Ghaifan in 2017.

As a unit, the 2016 Cowboy defense scored five defensive touchdowns to rank No. 1 in the Mountain West and No. 3 in the nation. Wyoming recovered 12 opponent fumbles, ranking No. 1 in the MW and No. 15 in the NCAA. The Cowboys' 15 interceptions were second best in the conference and 22nd nationally. UW's 27 total forced turnovers ranked No. 2 in the Mountain West and No. 10 in the country.

In his first season coaching the Cowboys' interior defensive line in 2014, he coached senior defensive tackle Patrick Mertens. Mertens signed as a free agent with the Baltimore Ravens of the NFL following his senior year.

Kaligis served as Wyoming's assistant head coach, co-offensive coordinator and running backs coach in 2013. Sophomore running back Shaun Wick narrowly missed the 1,000-yard plateau in 2013, rushing for 979 yards. Wick ended his Wyoming career in 2016 with 2,533 career rushing yards to rank No. 6 on the Wyoming career list.

In 2013, Wyoming ranked 22nd in the nation in total offense (472.8 yards per game) and 26th in passing offense (282.4 yards per game). The Wyoming offense ranked second in the Mountain West Conference and 38th in the nation in passing offense in 2012, averaging 265.4 yards per game.

The 2012 season saw Kaligis coach First Team All-Mountain West center Nick Carlson. Carlson was named to the Rimington Trophy Watch List for the second time his senior season. The Rimington Trophy honors the nation's top center each season. Carlson was also named to the 2012 Rotary Lombardi Award Watch List, and was one of only 10 national finalists for the ARA Sportsmanship Award as a senior. Carlson (Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and senior offensive tackles Josh Leonard (Oakland Raiders) and Kyle Magnuson (Oakland Raiders) each were invited to NFL camps as free agents following their senior seasons.

In 2011, the Cowboy offense ranked No. 11 in the nation in fewest sacks allowed, allowing only 12 sacks in 13 games. Three UW offensive linemen earned Mountain West All-Conference honors in 2011. Senior tackle Clayton Kirven and junior center Nick Carlson were named Second Team All-Mountain West. Sophomore offensive guard

Tyler Strong earned Honorable Mention All-Conference recognition. Carlson was named to the Rimington Trophy Watch List for the first time in 2011.

Kaligis coached sophomore center Carlson in 2010. Carlson went on to earn Honorable Mention All-Mountain West Conference honors. One of Kaligis' 2009 Cowboys, offensive tackle Ryan Otterson, signed a free-agent contract with the San Diego Chargers following the 2010 NFL Draft.

Kaligis has been a part of 16 teams that advanced to postseason play, including nine bowl appearances with NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams. Six of those bowl appearances came at Wyoming, including the Cowboys' victories in the 2021 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, the 2019 NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl, the 2017 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, appearance in the 2016 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, bid to the 2011 Gildan New Mexico Bowl and win in the 2009 New Mexico Bowl. Kaligis was a strength and conditioning coach at Washington when the Huskies played in the 1999 Holiday Bowl, won the 2000 Rose Bowl (defeating Purdue, 34-24) and played in the 2002 Sun Bowl.

An outstanding college football player and track and field athlete, Kaligis started all 12 games at offensive guard for the Washington Huskies and late head football coach Don James when they captured the 1991 National Championship. The Huskies posted a perfect 12-0 record and defeated Michigan, 34-14, in the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1, 1992, to win the national title. Kaligis was a member of the Husky Football team from 1990-94.

He was an All-American in track and field in the shot put. He won the gold medal at the 1995 U.S. Olympic Festival, and placed third in the 1995 University Games. He participated in the 1996 Olympic Trials in track and field in the shot put.

Kaligis earned his B.A. degree in sociology and law enforcement at Washington in 1994. He and his wife, Kristine, have a daughter, Harlie Grace, and a son, Cooper.

Mark Atuaia begins his third season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff after being named running backs coach on Jan. 3, 2022. Following the 2022 season, he added the title of Associate Head Coach.

For the 2023 season, Atuaia mentored a young nucleus that showed growth as the year went along. With three of the top four running backs underclassmen, the trio averaged 5.28 yards/carry on limited (76) attempts. WSU posted a season-high 229 rushing yards in a 64-21 win over Northern Colorado in the third week of the season. A glimpse of the future came late in the year at Cal, when freshmen Djouvensky Schlenbaker and Leo Pulalasi combined for 128 yards on 20 carries.

In 2022, Atuaia mentored junior Nakia Watson to All-Pac-12 Conference Honorable Mention honors after posting 769 yards rushing with nine touchdowns. Watson added four receiving touchdowns with his 13 total scores ranking fourth in the Pac-12 and tied for seventh in WSU single-season history. Atuaia also guided freshman Jaylen Jenkins to Pac-12 Freshman of the Week honors as he set season-highs with 13 carries for 130 yards including four carries for 10+yards and had 45-yard catch at No. 6 USC.

Atuaia (Ah-too-why-ah) spent the previous six seasons at the University of Virginia under head coach Bronco Mendenhall as the running backs coach.

With over three decades of experience in college football, Atuaia has guided multiple running backs to the NFL while leading his teams to success. In 2021, Atuaia helped Virginia amassing over 5,000 yards of total offense for the third time in the past four seasons.

Atuaia has been credited in playing a major role in the success of Virginia's running backs throughout his tenure. He was instrumental in the development of running back Wayne Taulapapa, who surpassed the 1,000-yard mark in his career during his 2021 campaign. In 2019, Taulapapa rushed for 12 touchdowns, the most by a Cavalier running back since Keith Payne's 14 in 2010. Taulapapa had four games with multiple rushing touchdowns, highlighted by three in the win over Florida State, including the game-winning score.

Atuaia guided Jordan Ellis to a stellar senior season in 2018, rushing for 1,026 yards and 10 touchdowns, becoming just the third 1,000-yard rusher at UVA since 2004. Ellis was UVA's first 1,000-yard rusher since 2013 and 15th overall. Ellis went on to appear in the East-West Shrine All-Star Game and sign a free agent contract with the Cincinnati Bengals.

Atuaia helped All-ACC running back Taquan Mizzell take a big step as a senior in 2016 as the tailback became the first player in ACC history with at least 1,500 career rushing and 1,500 career receiving yards. Under Atuaia's watchful eye, Mizzell developed into one of the nation's most durable backs, and was one of four players in the nation in 2016 to led his team in rushing (940) and receptions (52).

Community service was a hallmark of Atuaia's coaching experience at UVA. The team's Thursday's Heroes program has been recognized for its efforts to honor individuals across the state of Virginia who are dealing with personal adversity. In 2020, the ACC honored the Thursday's Heroes program with its "Game Changers" award, which recognizes and highlights specific conference teams' involvement with their local communities. Atuaia's position players were frequent visitors to the University's Children's Medical Center and local elementary schools as part of UVA's ACE (Athletes Committed to Education) program.

Atuaia has been with Mendenhall since 2013 when he joined the BYU staff as the running backs coach. In 2013 BYU's run game ranked No. 10 in the nation averaging 267.3 yards per game, setting a school record with 3,475 rushing yards. He tutored Jamaal Williams as the Cougar rushed

for 1,233 yards and seven touchdowns in 2013 as a sophomore. Atuaia assisted in BYU's offense ranking No. 14 in scoring offensive in 2014 as BYU put up 37.1 points per game, the most points by a BYU team since 2001. In 2015 the BYU offense ranked No. 4 in the nation in red zone offense, scoring at a 94.3 percent clip.

Atuaia mentored Paul Lasike, a former BYU rugby All-American from Auckland, New Zealand. Under Atuaia's tutelage, the big running back played football for the first time ever in his life and after three seasons at BYU Lasike signed with the Chicago Bears in 2015.

Atuaia has a history of working with big, strong and powerful running backs. As a student assistant at BYU from 2005-11, Atuaia was instrumental in the development of former NFL running backs Fahu Tahi, Fui Vakapuna, Harvey Unga and Manase Tonga during their time at BYU.

A former running back at BYU during the 1991 and 1994-96 seasons, Atuaia first joined the BYU athletic department in June 2012 as the assistant to the athletics director for student services. He previously worked as the assistant to the dean of Student Life at BYU. He accepted that position after graduating in 2011 with both a doctor of jurisprudence from BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School and a master of public administration from the George W. Romney Institute of Public Management at BYU's Marriott School of Management.

During Atuaia's four-year playing career, BYU achieved a 39-11-2 record, won three conference titles and was ranked in the final top-25 national rankings three times. In addition, the offense was ranked in the top 10 nationally during three of his four seasons.

As a senior in 1996 he started 13 games on BYU's 14-1 Cotton Bowl team that finished the year ranked No. 5 in the country after defeating Kansas State 19-15 on New Year's Day 1997. Atuaia also helped BYU defeat Oklahoma 31-6 in the 1994 Cooper Bowl to

finish ranked No. 10 by CNN and No. 18 by The Associated Press with a 10-3 record.

Atuaia totaled 1,247 yards on 301 carries (4.1 yards per attempt) with 11 touchdowns during his college career, while adding 68 catches for 668 yards (9.8 yards per catch) and four scoring receptions. His career-long rush was 51 yards while his long reception went for 61 yards. Atuaia also added 113 return yards as a member of the kick return team his freshman and sophomore seasons.

A native of Laie, Hawaii, Atuaia prepped at Kahuku High School before attending BYU. He served as a missionary for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Tucson, Ariz., from 1992-93. He received his bachelor's degree from BYU-Hawaii in 2003.

Atuaia and his wife Elizabeth, an accomplished recording artist and lead singer for the 1980s pop group The Jets, are the parents of seven children. His brothers Alema (1993, 1995-96) and Donny (1995-1999) also played football at BYU.





NICK WHITWORTH
TIGHT ENDS / SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR
THIRD YEAR

Nick Whitworth begins his third season as a member of Head Coach Jake Dickert's coaching staff, being named tight ends coach/special teams coordinator on Jan. 14, 2022.

Whitworth joined the Cougar program having spent the previous three seasons as the special teams coordinator/running backs coach at Texas State in San Marcos, Texas.

In 2023, Cougar special teams shined, finishing second in the Pac-12 and 18th nationally in net punting at 41.7 ypp. The kickoff return unit also finished second in the Pac-12 at 22.0 ypr, which ranked 32nd nationally. That included a 98-yard kickoff return by Leyton Smithson against Colorado, the first by a Cougar since the 2018 season. Junior punter Nick Haberer was fourth in the Pac-12 and 26th nationally at 44.4 ypp, the highest average of his three-year career.

Whitworth's first season in Pullman saw the Cougar special teams finish second in the Pac-12 in net punting at 41.4 ypp and punt return defense (3.9 ypr), both which placed 20th nationally. WSU was third (21.6 ypr) in kickoff returns and fifth in punt returns (9.1 ypr) in the Pac-12, respectively. Whitworth mentored punter Nick Haberer and punt returner Robert Ferrel to All-Pac-12 Honorable Mention honors.

During his time at Texas State, Whitworth led a resurgence in special teams play as the Bobcats led the Sun Belt Conference in punt returns and kickoff coverage during the 2020 season. During that season, The Bobcats featured Texas State's first FBS First-Team All-American return specialist Jeremiah Haydel, an All-Sun Belt Conference punter, and kicker. Haydel ranked third nationally in combined kick return yardage and was one of only two FBS players to return a kickoff and punt for touchdowns in his first season as a returner. Seamus O'Kelly was named Second-Team All-Sun Belt Conference punter by Pro Football Focus after averaging 41.0 yards on 57 punts. Phil Steele named Seth Keller a Fourth-Team All-Sun Belt kicker after scoring 62 points with eight field goals and 32 extra points.

The Bobcat offense was also stellar in 2020, increase its rushing output by nearly 65 percent from the previous season and averaged 369.7 yards of total offense and 27.7 points per game. It was the most yards gained for the Bobcats since 2015 and the most points scored since 2014.

Whitworth also coached running backs Brock Sturges, Calvin Hill, and Jahmyl Jeter, who combined to rush for 1453 yards and 13 touchdowns on 259 carries in 2020. Hill was a Third-Team All-Sun Belt selection by Pro Football Focus, and Sturges was named Honorable Mention All-Sun Belt in a poll of Sun Belt coaches and media.

The Bobcats also ranked third among Sun Belt leaders in kickoff returns with a 23.1 average in 2019. DeJordan Mask led the league in kickoff returns with a 29.5 average, while Hutch White was second in punt returns with an 8.6 average that year.

Prior to Texas State, Whitworth spent four

seasons (2015-18) at Portland State and turned former wide receiver David Jones into a 1,000-yard rusher as a running back. The Vikings ran for over 3,000 yards and 33 touchdowns in 2015. Meanwhile on special teams, kicker Jonathan Gonzales enjoyed an All-Conference season and punter Marcus Kinsella became one of the most reliable players on the team, kick returner Kahlil Dawson averaged over 25 yards per return, and long snapper Kameron Canaday earned Third-Team All-American honors.

In 2016, Portland State's offensive backfield averaged 243 yards per game and 35 total touchdowns. Nate Tago and Paris Penn earned Honorable Mention All-Big Sky Conference honors after combining for over 1,400 yards and 20 TDs. Meanwhile, Gonzales was named Third-Team All-Big Sky and Kinsella was an Honorable Mention All-Big Sky selection.

Mitchell Thompson earned Second Team All-Big Sky honors in 2016 and was an Honorable Mention selection in 2017 as a special teams player. In 2018, his freshman kicker Cody Williams was named a Third-Team All-Conference kicker

Whitworth arrived at Portland State after serving in a similar role at Central Washington from 2011-14. In 2013, his Wildcat special teams ranked fifth nationally in punt return defense, 11th in kick return average and 13th in kick coverage. The 2014 team led the nation in kick return average (25.7) and 18th in punt return average (14.4).

Before joining Central Washington's staff, he was the offensive coordinator at Montana Western in 2010, and Idaho State's special teams recruiting and summer coordinator from 2003-10.

His 2010 special teams unit was the top overall unit in the Big Sky Conference after leading the league net punting, kick return defense and punt returns, and finishing second in kick returns.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Bengals, working with the running backs and special teams, from 2001-2002.

Whitworth also played at Idaho State, earning Honorable Mention All-Conference honors as a running back and kick returner. He earned bachelor's degree in business administration and business finance at Idaho State in 2001.

ALLEN BROWN
CORNERBACKS / FIRST YEAR

Washington State Head Football Coach Jake Dickert announced March 5, 2024, the addition of Allen Brown as the Cougars cornerbacks coach.

Brown arrived in Pullman having spent the 2023 season in a quality control role at the University of Florida, working with the defensive backs. In his one season in Gainesville, Brown worked with Jordan Castell, who was recognized with Freshman All-SEC and Freshman All-America honors.

He joined Florida after spending the 2022 season at Cal in the role of quality control - defense. While there, Brown worked with three All-Pac 12 defensive backs including safety Daniel Scott, who was selected on the fifth round of the 2023 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. Brown also mentored Freshman All-American cornerback Jeremiah Earby during his time at Cal.

Brown coached at his alma mater, Eastern Washington University from 2019-2021 as the cornerbacks coach / defensive pass game coordinator. During his time with the Eagles, the program had five all-conference defensive backs and a freshman All-America selection in Tre Weed. EWU concluded the 2021 season ranked No. 7 in the country after making it to the second round of the FCS playoffs.

Prior to his return to Cheney, Brown was the cornerbacks coach at Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo for four seasons (2015-18) after being a defensive intern for Eastern Washington in 2014. While at Cal Poly, the Mustangs finished the 2016 season at 7-5 after reaching the FCS Playoffs for the first time in four years. In 2018, Brown mentored Dominic Frasch to third-Team All-America honors after the senior led the nation in passes defended with 1.9 per game.

Brown was a safety for EWU from 2009-13. He played in 51 career games and totaled 237 tackles, 15 pass breakups and four interceptions. Brown was a three-time all-conference selection and was part of the 2010 FCS national championship team, as well as FCS Playoff

semifinal appearances in 2012 and 2013. In his four years on the field as an Eagle, Brown helped EWU compile a 42-13 record overall and 27-5 mark in the Big Sky Conference.

A native of Tacoma, Wash., Brown graduated from Eastern Washington in 2014 with a bachelor's degree in business administration. He is a 2009 graduate of Foss High School in Tacoma, Wash., where he was a wide receiver and defensive back in football and also competed in basketball and track and field. His high school and EWU teammate was Nick Edwards, who is WSU's wide receivers coach.

NICK EDWARDS
WIDE RECEIVERS / SECOND YEAR

Nick Edwards begins his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff after being named the Cougars' wide receivers coach on Jan. 24, 2023. Edwards is no stranger to the Pacific Northwest or the Pac-12, having graduated from Eastern Washington University and also spending three seasons on the staff at California.

In his first season in Pullman, Edwards mentored a group of receivers that featured six different players with double-digit receptions, including three with 60-plus. Senior Lincoln Victor went from 26 receptions for 245 yards and zero touchdowns as a junior to a team-leading 89 catches, fourth in the Pac-12, for 860 yards and five touchdowns en route to All-Pac-12 honors. His 8.1 catches per game were tops in the Pac-12 and third nationally while also setting WSU single-game and Autzen Stadium record with 16 catches at No. 9 Oregon. First-year Cougar receivers Kyle Williams and Josh Kelly combined for 122 catches, 1,766 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Edwards arrived in Pullman having spent the 2022 season as an offensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons, working alongside the offensive coordinator with game plan duties.

Edwards joined Atlanta's staff after spending two seasons (2020-21) as the offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at Cal Poly University in San Luis Obispo, Calif. In 2020, Edwards participated in the NFL's Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship with the Minnesota Vikings.

Prior to his time at Cal Poly, Edwards spent three seasons (2017-19) as the wide receivers and running backs coach at Cal. Edwards spent his first two campaigns at Cal working with the team's wide receivers, including the duo of Vic Wharton III and Kanawai Noa, before coaching running backs in 2019.

Edwards also spent three seasons (2014-16) at his alma mater, Eastern Washington University, as the wide receivers coach where he coached future NFL wide receivers Cooper Kupp and Kendrick Bourne. In 2015, Kupp was named the FCS ADA National Offensive Player of the Year, STATS FCS National Offensive Player of the Year and was first-team All-Big Sky for a second consecutive season. In 2016, both Kupp and Bourne earned all-conference honors, while Kupp earned FCS ADA National Offensive Player of the Year for a second consecutive year.

As a student-athlete, Edwards played four seasons (2009-12) at Eastern Washington University, where he helped the Eagles win the 2010 FCS national title as a sophomore when he started all 15 games and had 57 catches for 614 yards with seven touchdown grabs. As a junior in 2011, Edwards was selected to nine FCS All-America teams – seven first-team selections – after catching a school-record 95 passes for 1,250 yards and 19 touchdowns to lead the FCS. After graduating in 2012, he was signed by the Minnesota Vikings following the 2013 NFL Draft.

Edwards was on offseason NFL rosters with Arizona and Seattle and turned down an opportunity to play for Edmonton in the Canadian Football League before moving into coaching full-time in 2014.

A graduate of Foss High School in Tacoma, Wash., Edwards and his wife, Macca, have two sons, Kashmir and Kyrie.

Frank Maile begins his second season on Jake Dickert's staff after being named the Cougars' edges coach Jan. 6, 2023.

In his first season coaching the edges, Maile elevated WSU's arguably strongest unit into one of national prominence. Under Maile's tutelage, Brennan Jackson earned All-Pac-12 Second Team honors after posting 57 tackles, 12.5 TFL's and 8.5 sacks, which ranked fourth in the Pac-12 and 20th nationally. Against Colorado, Jackson became the first Cougar to record two fumble recoveries for touchdowns in a game in program history. Jackson's bookend, Ron Stone, Jr., added 11 TFL's and five sacks en route to All-Pac-12 honors. Maile mentored Jackson's ascension into a fifth-round draft pick of the Los Angeles Rams while Stone signed a free agent contract with the Las Vegas Raiders.

Prior to WSU, Maile (MY-lay) spent two seasons at Boise State where he served as the Broncos' assistant head coach and defensive line coach. During the 2022 season, the Bronco defense led the way to a 10-4 overall record, including a victory over North Texas in the Frisco Bowl. The Broncos finished ninth in total defense, sixth in pass defense and 16th in scoring defense. Senior defensive tackles Scott Matlock and Devini Obichere led all defensive linemen with 6.5 tackles-for-loss while senior edge Demetri Washington had a team-best 4.5 sacks.

Under Maile's guidance in 2021, seven different Bronco defensive linemen registered a sack, including 2021 All-Mountain West Second-Team honoree Scott Matlock who notched a team-leading seven sacks. Matlock also accounted for 8.5 tackles-for-loss, the most among all Bronco defenders, and his 41 tackles (29 solo) led all Boise State defensive

linemen.

Prior to Boise State, Maile spent five years at his alma mater, Utah State. In 2020, he served as the Aggies' co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. He was also the interim head coach for Utah State's final three games of the season.

Maile began his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at Utah State in 2009. He moved into a full-time role as the Aggies' defensive line coach in 2011.

After a two-year stint (2014-15) at Vanderbilt as the defensive line coach, he returned to his alma mater as the Aggies' assistant head coach, co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach in 2016. He was the interim head coach in Utah State's 2018 New Mexico Bowl victory over North Texas.

In 2019, he worked with tight ends. Four Aggies earned All-Mountain West honors on offense, including tight end Caleb Repp, an honorable mention selection. Repp signed an NFL contract with the Atlanta Falcons.

During the 2018 campaign, Maile helped coach a Utah State defense that led the country in turnovers forced (32), interceptions (22) and three-and-outs forced (5.69 per game). The Aggies also ranked third in the NCAA with six defensive touchdowns. The Aggies tied the school records for wins (11) and home wins (six). Utah State was nationally-ranked for six-straight weeks for the first time in school history and finished No. 22 in the final Associated Press poll.

The Aggies allowed 182.5 passing yards per game in 2017 to rank 19th nationally. Utah State forced 29 turnovers, sixth-most in the NCAA. The Aggies were tied for second nationally with 16 forced fumbles and were fourth with five defensive touchdowns.

Utah State yielded 176.5 passing yards per game in 2016 to rank 10th in the NCAA. Ricky Ali'ifua was All-Mountain West honorable mention before signing a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs and playing for the Seattle Seahawks.

At Vanderbilt, Maile helped the Commodores rank in the top 35 nationally in nine defensive categories during the 2015 season.

From 2011-13, Maile coached five all-conference honorees in his role as the defensive line coach, including first-team selection Al Lapuaho. Utah State was 28-13 during that span, won a pair

of bowl games (three appearances) and captured the 2012 Western Athletic Conference title.

In 2013, the Aggies' defense led the Mountain West in scoring defense (17.1 points per game), rushing defense (106.7 yards per game) and total defense (330.9 yards per game). Utah State was in the top 15 nationally in all three categories.

The Utah State defense was ranked in the nation's top 15 in five categories during the 2012 season, including leading the WAC in scoring defense (15.4 points per game) and total defense (322.1 yards per game). The Aggies also led the WAC in total defense (366.2 yards per game) in 2011.

A native of West City, Utah, Maile played at Utah State from 2004-07. He made 21 starts in 42 appearances and was a team captain as a senior in 2007.

Maile earned his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from Utah State in 2007 and added a master's in education in 2010.

He and his wife, Heather, have three sons, Maximus, Samson and Titan, and a daughter, Cecilia.



JORDAN MALONE

DEFENSIVE PASS GAME COOR. / SAFETIES / NICKELS
FIFTH YEAR

Jordan Malone begins his fifth season at Washington State, and third coaching the safeties and nickels on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff. Malone began in 2020 as a defensive analyst before being named the cornerbacks coach Oct. 22, 2021, under Dickert. Following the 2023 season, Malone added defensive pass game coordinator to his title.

In 2023, Malone's safeties/nickels group accounted for two of the top three tacklers on the team as RS-sophomore Jaden Hicks was second with 79 tackles, six TFL's and two interceptions. Senior Sam Lockett added 73 tackles, three TFL's and two picks. Malone's unit accounted for six of the team's eight interceptions, taking two back for touchdowns. Under Malone's guidance, Hicks became a fourth-round selection in the 2024 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs.

During the 2022 season, the Cougar defense ranked third in the Pac-12 Conference in scoring at 22.9 ppg, and second in red zone defense. Cougar safeties and nickels accounted for five of WSU's 12 interceptions, while also having three of the top five tacklers in 2022. Malone mentored safety Jaden Hicks to Freshman All-America Third Team honors by College Football News, finishing second on team with 76 tackles, most among Pac-12 Conference freshmen defenders. He also guided redshirt-senior nickel Armani Marsh to All-Pac-12 Honorable Mention accolades for the second-straight season.

Malone finished his second year on the Cougar coaching staff in 2021, beginning the year as a defensive analyst before being elevated to cornerbacks coach on Oct. 22. During his seven games overseeing that unit, the Cougar pass defense showed dramatic improvement, allowing 193.7 yards per game over the final six contests, compared to 236.6 ypg in the first seven games. Under Malone, the Cougar defense picked off eight passes in the final six games.

Malone mentored senior Jaylen Watson, who garnered 2021 All-Pac-12 honorable mention honors for the second-straight season, while Watson and fellow senior Derrick Langford Jr. each had two interceptions in 2021. Watson was drafted in the seventh round of the 2022 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs, winning a Super Bowl title as a rookie.

Prior to WSU, Malone worked three seasons as the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Augustana University (S.D.) where he produced one of the top Division II defenses in the country in 2019; fourth in scoring defense, fifth in takeaways, eighth in the third-down defense, No. 12 in rush defense and No. 19 in total defense. In his three seasons leading the Augustana defense, Malone produced one All-American, one All-Region selection and 16 all-conference honorees.

Prior to Augustana, Malone worked the 2015 and 2016 seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Minnesota State University, Mankato where he coached the defensive backs, the punt and punt return teams and served as the recruiting coordinator. The 2015 defense finished among the top Division II defenses in the country including

total defense, rushing defense, scoring defense and fourth-down defense while the punt team led all of Division II in net punting. In 2015, Malone helped three players earn All-NSIC honorees, including an All-NSIC First Team selection in Jared Gillespie. Senior Justin Otto also went on to receive CoSIDA Academic All-American honors. In total, Maverick defensive backs tallied a total of nine interceptions and one fumble recovery.

In 2014, Malone served as the defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator for Augustana (S.D.). The Augie defensive backs tallied eight interceptions and two fumble recoveries. Prior to joining the Vikings' coaching staff, Malone spent the 2013 season with Augustana (Ill.) where he was responsible for the defensive backs and the strength and conditioning program. Malone boasted one all-conference player as the defense notched 24 turnovers.

Malone spent the 2010 season as the defensive coordinator and co-special teams coordinator at Simon Fraser University in British Columbia. Prior to his stint north of the border, he coached the outside linebackers and nickel backs at Central Arkansas in the 2008 and 2009 seasons where he guided three all-conference players. Malone also served as a graduate assistant working with the defensive backs at Emporia State University (Kan.) and Wayne State College (Neb.).

In the classroom, Malone earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from MSU in 2006, before completing his master's degree in health, physical education and recreation at Emporia State in 2007.

As a player, Malone played in 44 games through four seasons with the Purple and Gold and received All-NCC First Team and All-American honors in 2004. For his career, he tallied 216 tackles, seven interceptions, three fumble recoveries and ranked eighth all-time in solo tackles 141.

Jared Kaster begins his first season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff after being named offensive line coach on March 1, 2024.

Kaster spent the 2023 season at Austin Peay, serving as co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. Following the 2023 campaign, Kaster briefly served as the offensive line coach at UTEP, before joining Coach Dickert's staff.

During the 2023 season, Kaster helped the Governors to their second-straight conference title, and first in the United Athletic Conference. He helped guide an offense averaged 34.1 points per game, ninth in the FCS and first in the UAC, while its 427 yards per game of total offense ranked second in the conference. Austin Peay's passing efficiency (162.2) ranked third in the country and first in the conference.

During his one season at Austin Peay, the Governors produced six all-conference players on offense, including three offensive linemen: center Jalen Armstrong, right guard/center Chandler Kirton and left tackle Isaiah Wright.

Kaster arrived at Austin Peay after spending five seasons (2018-22) at Houston Christian. During the 2021 season, Kaster mentored Christian Hood in becoming the first offensive lineman in program history to earn First Team All-Southland honors. During the 2019 slate, Kaster's offensive line helped the Huskies rack up 462.6 yards of total offense per game, ranking 12th in the FCS and second in the Southland Conference.

Prior to joining the HCU staff, Kaster was the offensive line assistant and offensive quality control for head coach Kliff Kingsbury at his alma mater, Texas Tech, in 2016 and 2017.

He played four seasons for the Red Raiders from 2012-2015, where he was voted one of five team captains in 2015 and earned All-Big 12 Honorable Mention three times at center. He started 37-straight games to finish his career and in 2015, helped pave the way for Texas Tech's first 1,000 yard rusher since 1998. He earned a bachelor's degree in university studies in 2015.

An Altair, Texas, native, Kaster played at Altair Rice High School, where he was ranked the No. 5 center prospect in the nation by Rival.com, No. 8 by ESPN.com and was a Class 2A All-State selection in 2010.

Kaster and his wife, Caitlyn, have one daughter, Sadie.

Brent Vernon is in his third season as the chief of staff for Head Coach Jake Dickert. Dickert and Vernon spent three seasons together (2017-19) when both worked on Craig Bohl's staff at Wyoming. Vernon's role at WSU includes the administrative operations of the team, including oversight of team budget, serving as liaison with the athletic administration as well as academic and Cougar medical staffs. In his first season with the Cougars, WSU earned a trip to the LA Bowl.

Vernon arrived in Pullman after spending the previous 13 seasons at Wyoming. Vernon was promoted to Associate A.D. for Football Operations in the summer of 2018. He was previously promoted to the position of Assistant Athletics Director for Football Operations in the spring of 2017. He previously served in the roles of Executive Assistant to the Head Coach and Assistant Director of Football Operations in 2012. In 2011, Vernon served as Wyoming's Director of Recruiting, being promoted from his previous position as the Cowboys' offensive graduate assistant in 2009 and '10.

In 2021, Vernon was a member of Wyoming's victorious Famous Idaho Potato Bowl squad after Wyoming defeated Kent State, his 10th bowl game of his young career. He helped the Cowboys to the 2019 NOVA Home Loans Arizona Bowl while helping in Wyoming's win in the 2017 Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, appearance in the 2016 San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, its appearance in the 2011 Gildan New Mexico Bowl and its 2009 New Mexico Bowl Championship, as the Cowboys defeated Fresno State 35-28 in double overtime. While a student assistant at Missouri, the Tigers appeared in four consecutive bowl games from 2005-08.

While at Wyoming, Vernon coordinates a variety of administrative duties for Cowboy Football, including: planning team travel, monitoring the football budget, serving as a liaison with the academic counseling staff and helping coordinate team functions.

While serving as the Director of Recruiting in 2011, Vernon was responsible for coordinating all recruiting efforts for Cowboy Football, including: implementing Wyoming's recruiting plan for the year, scheduling recruiting travel, organizing recruiting weekends, assuring compliance with NCAA rules relative to recruiting and managing the recruiting budget.

Vernon was Wyoming's offensive graduate assistant in 2009 and 2010. He assisted with practice preparation, scout team coordination and a variety of other administrative and coaching duties for the Cowboy Offense. He also was involved in signaling plays from the sideline on game days.

Prior to Wyoming, Vernon was at the University of Missouri where he was a student assistant with the Mizzou Football program for five seasons from August 2004 to December 2008. At Missouri, he assisted the tight ends' coach, broke down practice and game film and prepared scouting reports. During that five-year span, Missouri enjoyed unprecedented success. The Tigers won the 2005 Independence Bowl over South Carolina, played Oregon State in the 2006 Sun Bowl, won the Cotton Bowl over Arkansas at the conclusion of the 2007 season and defeated Northwestern in the 2008 Alamo Bowl.

Vernon completed his bachelor of science degree in business administration, with an emphasis in management, at Missouri in December of 2008. Vernon achieved Dean's List honors all four years of college. He was also named the University of Missouri Athletics' Student Assistant of the Year in 2008.

He and his wife, Emily, were married in the summer of 2017. They have a son, Theo, and a daughter, Sophie.

Former Cougar defensive lineman Kingston Fernandez returned to Pullman prior to the 2023 season and is in his second season as Washington State's Assistant Director of Football Operations.

Fernandez worked the 2021 season coaching the defensive line at Willamette University in Oregon.

Fernandez played five seasons at Washington State (2014-18), lettering twice and was a member of four straight bowl teams. The Kapolei, Hawaii native appeared in eight games on the 2016 Holiday Bowl team, played in four games on the 2017 Holiday Bowl team and capped his career with the 2018 team who set a school record with 11 wins and a win in the Alamo Bowl.

Fernandez played at Kapolei High School where he earned All-State honors as a senior, was named a team captain and rated the No. 2 overall prospect in Hawaii.

Fernandez graduated with his degree in social sciences from Washington State in 2019. Fernandez and his wife, Miranda, have a young son, Kash.



Ben Iannacchione begins his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff after being named WSU Football's Head Strength and Conditioning Coach December 20, 2022. Iannacchione is no stranger to Dickert as the two worked together when both were on Craig Bohl's staff at Wyoming during the 2018-19 seasons.

Tristan White begins his second season on the Cougar Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff as an assistant football strength and conditioning coach.

Iannacchione arrived in Pullman having spent the 2022 season as the head strength and conditioning coach at Akron on Joe Moorhead's staff. A former standout offensive lineman who played collegiately at Boise State, Iannacchione arrived at Akron after spending the 2021 campaign on the Pitt football strength and conditioning staff.

White arrived in Pullman having spent the past three years with the football program at Montana State. He began as a graduate assistant for the first two years before moving into a full-time role as the assistant director of football strength and conditioning in January of 2022.

Iannacchione returned to his hometown of Pittsburgh with impressive coaching credentials having previously served as the director of sports performance for the football programs at Kansas (2020) and Wyoming (2018-19). Iannacchione was the associate strength and conditioning coach at LSU (2016-17), where he had oversight of the Tigers' running backs, fullbacks, tight ends, and linebackers.

White began in the field serving an internship with the University of Wyoming football programs in 2019 while finishing up his undergraduate degree in Kinesiology. He also holds a master's of health science in community health from Montana State.

Iannacchione worked at LSU for four years from 2011-15 before returning in 2016. After a one-year intern stint in Baton Rouge, Iannacchione was elevated to fulltime assistant strength coach in 2012, overseeing the training of the Tigers' offensive line. Additionally, he was the lead strength coach for the men's and women's swimming teams.



During his time at LSU, Iannacchione was an instrumental figure for six bowl teams, including the 2011 SEC-title team that advanced to the BCS National Championship Game.

In 2015, he was the head strength and conditioning coach at Youngstown State, where he worked primarily with the football program.

A first-team All-Quad East performer at Baldwin High School, Iannacchione played collegiately at Boise State, lettering twice on the offensive front. Over his four-year career (2005-08), the Broncos compiled a 44-8 record, including three Western Athletic Conference (WAC) titles and three bowl games. David Terrebonne begins his second season with the Cougars Football Staff as Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach.

Beckett arrived in Pullman after spending the previous year in a similar capacity at Florida Atlantic. From 2019-20, he served as a graduate assistant at the University of South Carolina, where he was responsible for the day-to-day accountability of the players, Catapult analytics and assisted with daily weight room training sessions and on-field sprinting and conditioning sessions.

Prior to joining the Washington State University staff, Terrebonne served as personal training counselor in Pasadena, Texas. He was also the director of sports performance for RedLine Athletics Webster, a speed and agility training center in Webster, Texas.

Beckett has spent time as a strength and conditioning coach at Tennessee Martin at Middle Tennessee State after beginning his coaching career as an intern at South Carolina.

Additionally, Terrebonne has completed strength and conditioning internships for Texas Tech football and La Porte High School.

Beckett played three seasons of Rugby at Coastal Carolina, earning 2015 NCAA Division II honorable mention honors. He received his bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science in 2016 and his master's in family and consumer science from Tennessee Martin in 2020.

Terrebonne received his bachelor's degree in health human performance (strength and conditioning) from Henderson State University, where he was a member of the football team. In 2019 he served as team captain, served as a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), and was a representative for the university at the NCAA APPLE Conference, an annual three-day national training institute for student-athletes, athletics administrators and campus partners dedicated to substance abuse prevention and health promotion of college athletes



Colt Garrett begins his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff, serving as a graduate assistant on the offensive side of the ball.

Garrett spent the 2022 season as an offensive quality control assistant at Western Kentucky, working under current Cougar Offensive Coordinator Ben Arbuckle. Last season, Western Kentucky posted a 9-5 record, defeated South Alabama in the New Orleans Bowl, and finished seventh nationally in total offense and second in passing offense.



During the 2021 season, Garrett worked as a graduate assistant coach at Mary Hardin-Baylor, working primarily with quarterbacks. That season, Mary Hardin-Baylor went 15-0 and captured the NCAA Division III National Championship.

Garrett played quarterback at Texas Tech University from 2016-2019 and at Angelo State University in 2020. He was an All-Big XII Academic Team member from 2016-2018 and earned all-LSC honors in 2019 and 2020. Garrett graduated from Texas Tech University in 2019 with a degree in kinesiology. He also earned his MBA from Angelo State University in 2020.

Carter Webb is in his first season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff, serving as an offensive graduate assistant, working primarily with the offensive line.

Webb arrived in Pullman having spent the previous four seasons on the staff at Western Kentucky, where he worked under current Cougar offensive coordinator Ben Arbuckle, first as a student assistant followed by a year as a graduate assistant for the Hilltoppers. In his first season as a GA (2022), WKU's offense accounted for 497.3 ypg of total offense, which ranked sixth in the nation, while their 352.2 ypg in passing offense and 36.4 ppg rank second and 14th, respectively, nationally.

Webb received his degree from WKU in 2020.



George Hicks III is in his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff, serving as a defensive graduate assistant.

Hicks begins his coaching career at his alma mater, where he spent five seasons in a Cougar uniform (2017-21).

On the field, Hicks appeared in 46 games totaling 127 tackles, four of those being for loss. He had two career interceptions, three forced fumbles, and 12 pass breakups during his time at WSU. During his final year, Hicks was named Pac-12 Conference Defensive Player of the Week after making 10 tackles and an interception in the win over Oregon St. Hicks helped WSU to four bowl games and matched a career high of six tackles against Air Force in the Cheez-It Bowl during his junior year.

Hicks graduated in 2021 with a bachelor's degree in political science.

Jihad Woods is in his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff and first as a defensive graduate assistant. In his first season back in Pullman, Woods served as a defensive high school scout in the recruiting area and also served as a liaison with Cougar football alumni.

Woods returned to Pullman after spending 2016-2021 as a student-athlete and a five-year letterwinner on the Cougar Football team.

Appearing in 56 games, Woods tied the Cougar career record of games played, and also had the fourth-most career tackles at WSU, 428. He set the record for most forced fumbles, 10, and also had three career fumble recoveries to go along with five career interceptions.

Woods was a four-time All-Pac 12 Conference recipient while setting the record for most starts in WSU history with 51. Woods was a part of five bowl games during his time in Pullman and set the WSU bowl game and Cheez-It Bowl game record with 20 tackles against Air Force to end the 2019 season.

After graduating in 2021 with a bachelor's degree in humanities, Woods signed a free-agent contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers.



Justin Kramer begins his third season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff, and first as the special assistant to the head coach and assistant offensive line coach. In 2022, Kramer served as the program's director of scouting.

Kramer arrived in Pullman after spending the previous two seasons at Southeast Missouri State, where he was the assistant head coach and coached tight ends. It marked the second stint at SEMO for Kramer, who was an assistant coach with the Redhawks from 2006-12 before moving on to coaching positions at Missouri and Missouri State.

He was at Missouri State for five years (2015-19) as the Bears offensive coordinator and offensive line coach, and worked with the tight ends and special teams during his time in Springfield.

Under Kramer's direction, MSU's special teams were some of the most consistent units in the Missouri Valley Football Conference. The Bears ranked among the Valley's top three units in kickoff return average (22.2), punt return average (13.0), punt average (41.0) and field goals made per game (1.09) in 2018.

Kramer initially left SEMO to join Gary Pinkel's staff at Missouri, where he worked with Dave Steckel in shaping one of the SEC's top defensive units. Steckel was later the head coach at Missouri State.

Kramer was a key defensive analyst for the Tigers and also served as the assistant director of recruiting during his tenure at Mizzou. In that role, he helped oversee scouting and assisted the staff with scripting and practice planning. Kramer helped coordinate Missouri's football camps, as well.

At SEMO, Kramer coached four First-Team All-OVC offensive linemen. He mentored three All-Americans, including Sean Middleton, the FCS Rimington Award winner. Kramer's offensive line paved the way for the nation's #3 rushing offense and led the FCS with six sacks allowed in 2010.

Kramer joined the SEMO coaching staff for the first time as a graduate assistant in 2006, where he worked with the defensive line. He also served as director of football operations for a year and a half. A native of Liberty, Missouri, Kramer was a four-year letterman at Southern Illinois from 2002-05. He was a standout offensive lineman who was part of three Saluki NCAA Playoff teams and three Missouri Valley Football Conference titles.

Kramer and his wife, Killian, have a daughter, Leyna, and a son, Vince.



Justin Mesa begins his fourth season in Pullman and third under Head Coach Jake Dickert.


In his first season on the Cougar staff, Mesa served as the Cougars' Director of Transfer Recruiting after being hired in the summer of 2021. Last season, Mesa worked in an offensive quality control role.

Prior to Washington State, Mesa was the head coach for two seasons (2019, 2020) (played in Spring, 2021) at San Marino High School in California. Prior to SMHS, Mesa was the Director of Player Personnel at Wyoming for two seasons (2017-18), coached the wide receivers and field goal units at Dixie State University in 2016 and served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Loyola High School in Los Angeles, Calif., for three seasons (2013-15).

Mesa spent six seasons serving in a variety of administrative and coaching roles at the University of Southern California from 2007-12. He originally was involved as a recruiting and operations assistant at USC in 2007 and later assisted in coaching the Trojan wide receivers in 2008. The 2009 season saw Mesa being hired as a graduate assistant coach and was elevated to an assistant quarterback coaching position in 2010 before coaching the USC tight ends for two seasons (2011-12).

While at USC, Mesa was part of the Trojans' Rose Bowl Championship teams at the conclusion of the 2007 and 2008 seasons. He was also on the coaching staff when USC won the 2009 Emerald Bowl and earned a berth in the 2012 Sun Bowl.

Mesa completed his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from USC in 2007.



John Kuceyeski begins his second season on Head Coach Jake Dickert's staff, and first as the quarterbacks coach. Kuceyeski served in an offensive quality control role in 2023.

Kuceyeski arrived in Pullman from Western Kentucky, where he spent one season as the Hilltoppers director of player personnel. There he worked alongside current Cougar Offensive Coordinator Ben Arbuckle. Last season, Western Kentucky posted a 9-5 record, defeated South Alabama in the New Orleans Bowl, and finished seventh nationally in total offense and second in passing offense.

Prior to Western Kentucky, Kuceyeski served as the offensive coordinator and tight ends coach at Eastern Illinois for three seasons from 2019 to '21. While at EIU, he coached three All-OVC Newcomers, two All-Conference honorees and one Freshman All-American.

Kuceyeski worked at Cornell University as the running backs and tight ends coach for one season (2016) before becoming the offensive line coach for two years (2017-18). He also made stops at Iowa State University (Spring 2016) as the director of scouting, three years at Toledo (2013-15), the final two as the recruiting coordinator and Western Michigan (Spring 2013) as the Director of Player Personnel. Kuceyeski served as an offensive graduate assistant coach at Northwestern (2010-12), where he assisted with the offensive line, tight ends, wide receivers and special teams.

Kuceyeski graduated from Penn State University in 2009 with a bachelor's degree in finance while serving as a student manager and undergraduate assistant coach during his four years at the school. He is a native of Libertyville, Ill.



Calin Criner is in his first season as a member of Jake Dickert's staff, serving as assistant secondary coach. Criner arrives in Pullman after spending the past two years as a defensive graduate assistant at Boise State, culminating with a Mountain West Championship in 2023.

A two-time team captain at Eastern Washington (2016-21), Criner tallied nine interceptions, 273 tackles (eight for loss), 20 passes broken up, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in his 54-game career (32 as a starter). His number of games played ties for the third-most in EWU history. Criner is tied for 11th in interceptions and pass break ups, and he places 15th on the all-time tackles leaderboard. He had five performances in his career with at least 10 tackles. Criner continued the legacy of wearing the No. 4 jersey for the Eagle Football team. Since the 2008 season when senior Jason Belford had the number, the coaching staff has selected a leader on defense to wear the jersey. It symbolizes the defensive player who most embodies the characteristics of defense at Eastern -- grit, toughness, effort, leadership and academic success.

His father, Mark, is a former player at Boise State and most recently spent three seasons (2021-23) as an assistant coach at Southern Miss. The long-time college coach previously had tenures at Idaho, Portland State, Utah State, Minnesota, Eastern Michigan, Cincinnati, Middle Tennessee State, Lamar, and Colorado State Pueblo, as well as stints with Seattle and Las Vegas in the XFL.

Calin is the grandson of former Boise State University head football coach Jim Criner (1976-82), who guided the Broncos to the 1980 NCAA Championship Subdivision (then I-AA) title. He was 59-21-1 overall and 34-12 in the Big Sky at BSU, and was later head coach at Iowa State (1983-86). Cal also has twin siblings, Jackson and Brooklyn.

Rob Schlaeger begins his third season on the Washington State Football staff and second as the program's General Manager. Schlaeger spent the 2020 season as the Cougars' director of player personnel.

Under Dickert, Schlaeger will oversee all of the Cougars' recruiting efforts, from identifying talent at the high school and collegiate levels, as well as managing the transfer portal.

Prior to WSU, Schlaeger spent the 2018 and 2019 seasons working with the defense at Minot State University (N.D.). Schlaeger worked as the MSU defensive front coordinator and defensive line coach. 



FORT COLLINS, Colo. — Cameron Ward threw for three touchdowns and ran for another and Jaden Hicks returned an interception 37-yards for a touchdown and Washington State beat Colorado State 50-24 Saturday night. Ward was 37 of 49 for 451 yards passing, including touchdowns of 3 yards to Kyle Williams, 12 yards to Nakia Watson and 25 yards to Josh Kelly. Ward also rushed for 40 yards, including a 1-yard score, helping Washington State start the season with a victory for the fifth time in six years. Lincoln Victor led a productive group of Washington State playmakers with 11 catches for 168 yards. Dean Janikowski kicked a career-best 55-yard field goal and John Mateer, who spelled Ward several times, had touchdown runs of 1 and 3 yards. Kobe Johnson returned a kick 98 yards for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter for Colorado State, which lost an opener for a sixth consecutive season. Brayden Fowler-Nicolosi relieved starting quarterback Clay Millen after he was shaken up in the third quarter, completing fourth quarter touchdown passes of 75 yards to Justus Ross-Simmons and 20 yards to Dallin Holker. Up 14, the Cougars scored two touchdowns in a 28-second span in the third as Mateer scored the first of his two touchdown runs and Hicks picked off Millen, heading down the sideline untouched to put the Cougars 29-3 early in the third. Washington State went up 17-3 at halftime. Colorado State marched to a 38-yard field goal by Jordan Noyes on its opening possession but Ward responded by leading three first-half scoring drives, two for touchdowns. Ward sparked the first TD drive with two scrambles for 26 yards before eventually going up the middle on a sneak from the 1. The Cougars led 14-3 on Ward's 3-yard pass to Williams and added a 55-yard field goal by Janikowski as time ran out in the second quarter. THE TAKEAWAY Washington State: The Cougars got off to a strong start, showcasing a balanced effort that highlighted a productive offense and a solid defense. The late scores by Colorado came after the Cougars had the game in hand and their offense also helped stave off a potential rally by producing another late score. Colorado State: The Rams offense showed some signs of life late in the game but still needs to develop its scoring punch. Coach Jay Norvell undertook a major roster reconstruction, including an overhaul of the offensive line, partly to spark an offense that was held to 17 points in each of its three wins last season while never scoring more than 20 points in any game.

NO. 19 WISCONSIN AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. — Cameron Ward passed for 212 yards and two touchdowns and added another 43 yards rushing, Nakia Watson scored on a 1-yard run with 5:30 remaining and Washington State upset No. 19 Wisconsin 31-22 on Saturday night. Ward scrambled for runs of 23 yards and 14 yards during a pivotal fourth-quarter drive to help the Cougars avoid a second-half meltdown and beat the Badgers for the second straight season. Watson capped the drive with his 1-yard plunge. Washington State (2-0) hosted its first Power Five nonconference opponent since 1998 and played its first home game since the collapse of the Pac-12 this summer. Facing an uncertain future as a Power Five program, Washington State put on a show in the first half to race to a 24-6 lead. In this moment, it's everything. "We belong in the Power Five," Washington State coach Jake Dickert said on the field as it was flooded by celebrating fans after the upset. "These kids have worked their (tails) off. I'm so damn proud of them." Wisconsin (1-1) scored 16 straight points and was driving in the fourth quarter with a chance to take the lead before running back Chez Mellusi fumbled near midfield. The Badgers lost three fumbles and had little go right in the first half. Nathaniel Vakos made three field goals in the first half, but Wisconsin didn't find the end zone until Mellusi's 2-yard run midway through the third quarter that cut Washington State's lead to 24-16. Mordecai hit Skyler Bell on a 16-yard touchdown pass late in the third quarter to pull Wisconsin to 24-22, but the two-point conversion attempt failed. Mordecai was 25 of 40 for 278 yards and fumbled twice, both on sacks by Ron Stone Jr. One of the fumbles was recovered by Brennan Jackson for a touchdown in the first half. Washington State held the Badgers' potent running back duo of Mellusi and Braelon Allen to 69 yards on 19 carries. "The reality is, we have enough talent to win," first-year Wisconsin coach Luke Fickell said. The Cougars punted on their first four second-half possessions and totaled just 119 yards after halftime. But they got a much-needed jolt when safety Jaden Hicks forced the Mellusi fumble and cornerback Jackson Lataimua recovered. "We didn't have the second half we wanted as an offense," Ward said. "But we didn't flinch." STATEMENT WIN Dickert was proud of how his team responded in gut-check time of a nationally televised game and in front of 33,024 fans at Gesa Field. "This is a crucial point for Washington State and Washington State football," Dickert said. "We're carrying the flag for all the transition, and this is a pivotal moment for where we want to go. Wherever we end up, we're got to commit to being great. And I think that's what this statement (win) means is that we are here. We're fighting, and even as college football is changing, we're still getting pretty good results." LEACH HONORED Black pirate flags and shirts were all over Martin Stadium in honor of Mike Leach, the former Washington State coach who died in December. The Cougars burst through the tunnel before the game with eight players waving pirate flags. A handful of former players then raised a large black flag with the Cougars logo and crossing swords in the southeast corner of the stadium. Most Washington State coaches also wore black pirate shirts in honor of the coach who led the Cougars to six bowl games from 2012-2019. KLAY THOMPSON IN THE HOUSE Former Washington State basketball star Klay Thompson was on the sideline for the big matchup and presented the Washington State women's basketball team with the Pac-12 conference championship trophy during a timeout in the first quarter. THE TAKEAWAY Washington State may not have a future as a Power Five conference, but it showed it belonged "for the second straight year" against the Badgers of the Big Ten.

NORTHERN COLORADO AT NO. 23 WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Cameron Ward passed for 327 yards and accounted for five first-half touchdowns, and No. 23 Washington State breezed to a 64-21 victory over FCS member Northern Colorado on Saturday. The Cougars (3-0) were locked in after their emotional win over Wisconsin last week and showed no signs of looking ahead to next week's Pac-12 Conference opener against No. 16 Oregon State at home. Ward and the Washington State offense were crisp and explosive from the outset. The junior quarterback completed his first 12 passes — including a 37-yard touchdown strike to Kyle Williams and a 28-yard TD pass to Lincoln Victor — to give Wazzu a 22-0 lead in the first quarter. Victor had six catches for 119 yards with a pair of TDs. Ward also ran for an 8-yard touchdown on Washington State's opening possession. He completed 20 of 26 passes. "I thought Cam was phenomenal," Washington State coach Jake Dickert said. "He was sharp. I thought he stayed in the pocket and stayed square." Ranked for the first time since 2019, the Cougars racked up 386 yards in the first half and scored touchdowns on all six of their drives to go up 43-0. Their 43 points in the first half were their most since scoring 55 before the break against Arizona in 2018. It was the focused effort Dickert wanted to see against a lesser foe sandwiched between big games. "This was the one time we said, hey, we felt really confident about being the dominant team," Dickert said. "So coming in here and really performing and not messing around and not turning the ball over, I think it speaks to the team, of the mindset of where we really want to go." Northern Colorado (0-3) punted on its first five possessions, including three and-outs on the first two. Jamarii Robinson's juggling 18-yard touchdown catch gave the Bears their first points 12 seconds before halftime. Northern Colorado quarterback Jacob Sirmon was 16 of 24 for 167 yards and two touchdowns returning to his home state. Sirmon also threw a 52-yard touchdown pass to Darius Stewart in the fourth quarter. **KEEPING THE PRESSURE** After a career-best two-sack game against Wisconsin, Washington State edge rusher Ron Stone Jr. added a sack and tackle for loss in the first half against overmatched Northern Colorado. Fellow edge rusher Brennan Jackson also racked up a sack after recovering two fumbles last week on Stone Jr. sacks. **FLAWLESS STARTS** Washington State backup QB John Mateer did his best to match Ward's flawless start. Mateer started the second half in relief of Ward and completed his first six passes with two TD tosses to on the first two drives of the third quarter. Mateer finished 7 of 8 passing for a career-high 138 yards before third-string QB Emmett Brown entered in the fourth quarter. **THE TAKEAWAY** The only slight downside for Wazzu was struggling early in the run game against a team picked by coaches and media to finish 10th in the Big Sky Conference. Walk-on Dylan Paine led WSU with 81 yards rushing and scored his first career touchdown early in the fourth quarter. Starter Nakia Watson had 41 yards and a touchdown on nine carries.

NO. 14 OREGON STATE AT NO. 21 WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Josh Kelly caught three touchdowns, two in highlight-reel fashion, Cameron Ward passed for 404 yards and accounted for five scores, and No. 21 Washington State withstood a late rally to upend No. 14 Oregon State 38-35 on Saturday in the Pac-12 Conference opener for both teams. In a game billed as the Pac-2 championship on the Palouse, the Cougars pulled out their second victory of the season over an AP Top 25 foe. They led by 17 points early in the fourth quarter before the Beavers (3-1, 0-1 Pac-12) mounted a furious rally. Oregon State's DJ Uiagalelei tossed a 5-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jack Velling with 1:12 left to pull the Beavers within 38-35. The Cougars (4-0, 1-0) recovered the ensuing onside kick after a mad scramble for the ball, and once the final snap was taken, fans rushed the field like they did after Washington State beat Wisconsin two weeks ago. Ward, who entered third in the nation in passing yards and fourth in total offense, threw three of his four touchdown passes in the first half. He also had a 1-yard TD run to continue his sizzling start to the season. "I'll say it again: We belong," said Washington State coach Jake Dickert, who hasn't shied away from campaigning for his program that along with Oregon State has been left behind by the rest of the Pac-12. "This is one of those games that can really springboard your program to new places," Dickert said. "The team really believes in what we have." The Cougars and Beavers have formed a strong bond off the field as they search for a new conference home - or try to salvage the Pac-12 by recruiting new schools to join. But once their mascots came out the tunnel together before the game, the good feelings ended. On the second play from scrimmage, Ward found Kyle Williams wide open for a 63-yard touchdown. Ward's TD run on the next possession gave Washington State a 14-0 lead. Playing without leading receiver Lincoln Victor, who left in the first quarter with an ankle injury, Ward ended the first half with 14 straight completions and finished 19 of 20 for 293 yards before halftime. Kelly, a transfer wideout from Fresno State, stepped up in Victor's absence. The rangy 6-foot-1 redshirt junior caught eight passes for 159 yards and hauled in two spectacular one-handed grabs, the latter of which went for a 19-yard touchdown in the third quarter. Early in the second quarter, Kelly spun out of the grasp of three Beavers on his way to the end zone for a 44-yard TD. Asked which of his highlight catches was his favorite, Kelly said, "I'd say that was probably the first one-handed catch because that's what started getting me going." The Beavers' defense came in ranked 13th in the FBS, but it gave up 352 yards in the first half and couldn't slow down Washington State's attack. The Cougars finished with 528 total yards. Uiagalelei completed 17 of 34 passes for 198 yards and was intercepted once. Deshaun Fenwick led Oregon State with 101 rushing yards and touchdown runs of 38, 9 and 4 yards. Damien Martinez added 81 yards on the ground but it wasn't enough to keep up with the Cougars. "Just too little, too late," Oregon State coach Jonathan Smith said. **NATIONAL PERCEPTION** Dickert was upset with some of the comments made during ESPN's College GameDay on Saturday where the Washington State-Oregon State matchup was referenced as the "No One's Watching Bowl." "I don't really understand that," Dickert said. "The facts say people watch the Cougs. And people watch the Cougs more than every team left over in the Big 12. It's well documented what ESPN has done to try to get our league where it's at." **THE TAKEAWAY** Oregon State: The Beavers were effective on the ground as usual, but their passing attack and defense now face questions as they enter a short week before another Top 25 showdown. Washington State: The Cougars are 4-0 for the first time since 2017 and will enter a bye week with one of the hottest quarterbacks in the nation and impressive wins against Wisconsin and Oregon State on their resume.

NO. 13 WASHINGTON STATE AT UCLA

Oct. 7, 2023 • Rose Bowl • Att.: 35,437 • TV: Pac-12 Networks

PASADENA, Calif. – Keegan Jones had a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter, UCLA's defense forced four turnovers and the Bruins rallied for a 25-17 victory over No. 13 Washington State on Saturday at the Rose Bowl. Carson Steele added 140 yards on 30 carries and Dante Moore completed 22 of 44 passes for 290 yards with a touchdown and interception as the Bruins (4-1, 1-1 Pac-12) got back on track after their loss two weeks ago at Utah. Washington State's Cameron Ward came into the game third nationally in passing yards per game (347.2 yards). The junior was under pressure most of the day and completed only 19 of 39 passes for 197 yards and a touchdown. UCLA's defense sacked Ward three times along with six QB hurries. Ward also threw his first two interceptions of the season. Washington State (4-1, 1-1) went three-and-out on eight of its 16 possessions and was held to 216 total yards. The Bruins also converted the four takeaways into 16 points (two touchdowns and a field goal). Jones didn't get a carry until late in the third quarter, but his last two rushes resulted in touchdowns. The senior had a 13-yard run up the left sideline to put UCLA on top 17-17 just 92 seconds into the fourth quarter. After Oluwafemi Oladejo picked off Ward on the first play of the ensuing drive, Jones scored four plays later from 22 yards out to make it an eight-point lead. It is only the second time Ward has completed less than half of his passes in two seasons at Washington State. Moore struggled early as both of his first-half interceptions led to Washington State points. The freshman was picked off on the opening drive and had a Pick-6 for the second straight game. Dean Janikowski's 32-yard field goal gave the Cougars a 3-0 lead. Washington State had a short field after Sam Lockett III picked off Moore's pass intended for J. Michael Sturdivant and returned it 25 yards to the Bruins 19. The Bruins appeared to be on the verge of scoring right before halftime, but Kepena Gushiken jumped up for an interception as Moore was trying to throw a flare pass to T.J. Harden and returned it 88 yards down the left sideline with 7 seconds remaining to put Washington State up 10-9 at halftime. After Janikowski's field goal, UCLA scored nine straight points to take the lead. Moore lofted an 18-yard pass to Logan Loya, who caught it in the back right corner of the end zone with 11:31 remaining in the second quarter, but R.J. Lopez was wide right on the extra point. The Bruins extended their advantage to 9-3 with 90 seconds left in the first half when Lopez split the uprights from 37 yards. Lopez's second field goal - a 32-yarder - helped UCLA regain a 12-10 advantage midway through the third quarter. One play earlier, Moore appeared to throw his second TD of the game when Sturdivant made a diving 14-yard catch, but it was reversed after a replay review. The Cougars answered on their next drive as Ward beat UCLA's blitz with a 9-yard screen pass to Nakia Watson to give Washington State a 17-12 lead. The TAKEAWAY Washington State: Ward was only the fifth quarterback for a Power Five school since 1996 to throw for over 1,300 yards, at least 13 touchdowns and no interceptions in his team's first four games, but opposing defenses the rest of the season will study the UCLA film to see how they neutralized him. UCLA: The Bruins finally have a defense that can take over games for the first time in Chip Kelly's six seasons in Westwood.

ARIZONA AT NO. 19 WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. – Noah Fifita threw for 342 yards, Jonah Coleman had 168 yards from scrimmage and three rushing touchdowns and Arizona forced three turnovers in a 44-6 victory over No. 19 Washington State on Saturday night. The Wildcats (4-3, 2-2 Pac-12) scored 44 straight points to break through in a big way after nearly upsetting top-10 teams the last two weeks. "Washington State's top 20 in the country, and we went on the road and played our best brand of football," Arizona coach Jedd Fisch said. "I'm excited about our offense, excited about our defense, excited about our kicking game. And more importantly we as a staff are excited about the direction of our program." Arizona lost last week at Southern California in triple overtime and the week before lost 31-24 at home to Washington. The Wildcats were tired of coming close and felt they were getting close to a breakthrough signature victory. Fifita started his third straight game in place of the injured Jayden de Laura, a former Washington State quarterback. He was masterful from the start against the Cougars, who dropped their second consecutive game after starting 4-0 and reaching No. 13 in the AP Top 25. Fifita was 34-of-43 passing, but didn't throw for any touchdowns. All of Arizona's scores came on the ground. Coleman had 70 yards rushing and scored on runs of 1, 1 and 23 yards. Rayshon Luke rushed for 70 yards, including a 40-yarder for a score, and DJ Williams scored from 15 yards. Coleman also had four catches for 98 yards. The Wildcats outgained Washington State 516-234 and forced three turnovers on downs, grabbed two interceptions and one fumble recovery. The Cougars (4-2, 1-2) scored on Nakia Watson's 1-yard run on their first drive but looked lifeless on offense after that. They were stopped on fourth down deep in their own territory, threw an interception on a double-pass and punted on their next three possessions before halftime. After a sizzling first month of the season, the Cougars' offense sputtered for the second straight week. Cameron Ward was 22 of 30 for 192 yards and two turnovers. Watson led Washington State with 88 yards receiving. When the Cougars tried to get tricky, it backfired. Backup quarterback John Mateer was intercepted on a double-pass in the second quarter, and the Wildcats answered with Luke's 40-yard TD run. Arizona led 20-6 at halftime and was never threatened in the second half. "We've got to find some answers to (our offensive struggles)," Washington State coach Jake Dickert said. "Obviously, the main answer is running the football, being physical, and getting to the point of attack." WAZZU'S RUSHING WOES For the second straight week, the Cougars couldn't get their rushing attack going. They managed 35 yards on the ground after netting 12 yards last week at UCLA. Washington State entered 117th in the FBS in rushing, averaging 103.6 yards per game. THE TAKEAWAY Arizona: The Wildcats may look back at this win as a pivotal moment in the early in Fisch's tenure. After two overtime losses and a near-upset of USC last week, they will now have the full attention of the rest of the Pac-12. Washington State: A season that started so promising has gone sideways in a hurry. After their first loss of the season last week at UCLA, the Cougars looked out of sorts in all facets.

WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 9 OREGON

Oct. 21, 2023 • Autzen Stadium • Att.: 58,886 • TV: ABC

EUGENE, Ore. – Bo Nix threw for 293 yards and two touchdowns while setting the NCAA record for most career starts and No. 9 Oregon rebounded from its first loss of the season with a 38-24 victory over Washington State on Saturday. Nix started in his 54th college game and the Ducks (6-1, 3-1 Pac-12) became bowl eligible after a disappointing 36-33 loss at rival Washington last weekend. Bucky Irving ran for 129 yards and two touchdowns, while also catching a scoring pass from Nix to keep Oregon undefeated at home this season. Washington State (4-3, 1-3) lost its third straight game. The Cougars were ranked as high as No. 13 in the AP Top 25 earlier this season but they lost 25-17 to UCLA in Pasadena and then fell 44-6 to Arizona in Pullman last weekend. The game was billed as a battle between two of the Pac-12's top quarterbacks. Nix, a Heisman hopeful, went into the game averaging 299.3 yards passing a game - third in the league behind Washington's Michael Penix and Colorado's Shedeur Sanders. With his 54th start, Nix - who transferred to Oregon from Auburn before the 2022 season - passed Boise State's Kellen Moore and Colt McCoy of Texas, who made 53 during their careers. Washington State's Cameron Ward averaged 296.5 yards a game, ranked 12th in the nation. He threw for 438 yards and a touchdown for the Cougars. Lincoln Victory caught a WSU single-game record 16 passes for 161 yards. Nix threw a touchdown pass to Troy Franklin on the team's first series, but it was nullified by a holding call. The drive ended when Camden Lewis' 47-yard field goal attempt went wide left. The Cougars, who were nearly 20-point underdogs earlier in the week, scored first on Dean Janikowski's 36-yard field goal. But on the next series, Nix connected with Tez Johnson on a 46-yard pass to get to the Washington State 10. But again, the Ducks were stalled by the Cougars and settled for a 27-yard field goal to tie it at 3. The Cougars went up 10-3 in the second quarter on Nikia Johnson's 4-yard touchdown dash up the middle. The 97-yard drive was highlighted by Ward's 47-yard pass to Kyle Williams. The Ducks answered with Irving's 2-yard scoring run to once again tie it. The Ducks went ahead on Nix's 2-yard keeper with 44 seconds left in the half, but Washington State narrowed the gap with Janikowski's 33-yard field goal as time ran out. After Nix found Irving with a 42-yard scoring play to put the Ducks up 24-13, Janikowski made a 50-yard field goal for Washington State. Irving ran 43 yards for a touchdown before the end of the third quarter. There was a scary moment in the fourth quarter when he went down with an injury, prompting the crowd to chant his name. But he walked, unaided, off the field and was seen laughing on the sideline, but did not return. Nix threw a 17-yard scoring pass to Johnson with just under nine minutes left to give the Ducks a 38-16 lead. Ward's only touchdown throw of the game came with 52nd seconds left, when he hit Isaiah Hamilton with a 16-yard pass. THE TAKEAWAY Washington State: Back for the Oregon game was tight end Cooper Mathers, who missed two games with a hamstring injury. ... Lincoln Victory was limited last weekend against Arizona because of a high ankle sprain. ... The Cougars managed just 28 yards rushing in the first half. Oregon: The Ducks have won five straight against the Cougars. ... Oregon wore throwback "Mighty Oregon" uniforms with yellow pants and helmets with bright green jerseys, which paid tribute to the 1984 team. The Ducks wore a version of the look during a game against Washington in 2014, too. ... Oregon has just one turnover this season, fewest in the nation.

WASHINGTON STATE AT ARIZONA STATE

TEMPE, Ariz. – DeCarlos Brooks ran for a career-high 67 yards and three touchdowns in his first start of the season and Arizona State posted a 38-27 victory over Washington State on Saturday. Cameron Skattebo had 121 yards rushing and a touchdown for the Sun Devils (2-6, 1-4 Pac-12), who had a season high in points and also had season highs with 502 yards total offense and 235 yards rushing. Cameron Ward passed for 315 yards and a touchdown and ran for two scores for the Cougars (4-4, 1-4), who have lost four in a row for the first time since 2014. Ward, who entered the game ranked fifth in the FBS in total offense at 335.4 yards per game and sixth with 316.7 yards passing per game, moved the Cougars to the Arizona State 2-yard with two minutes remaining but threw an incomplete pass on fourth down and Arizona State ran out the clock. Trenton Bourguet passed for 274 yards and wide receiver Elijah Badger ran for a touchdown for the Sun Devils, who had not won since beating FCS Southern Utah 24-21 in the season opener. Brooks, who returned last week against Washington after missing four games with an injury, scored twice in the first half, and Arizona State took a 24-21 lead on Dario Longhetto's 51-yard field goal as time expired. Badger and Brooks scored to cap 75-yard drives in the second half for a 38-24 lead. Washington State countered with two Dean Janikowski field goals. Washington State has not won since a 38-35 victory over then-No. 14 Oregon State in the Pac-12 opener Sept. 23. THE TAKEAWAY Washington State: The Cougars have played in a bowl game in the last seven non-COVID-seasons, second only to Utah among Pac-12 schools, and while they have some work to do, the schedule is favorable. The Cougars face Pac-12 second-division teams Stanford, California and Colorado the next three weeks before closing the regular season against Washington in the Apple Cup in Seattle. Arizona State: Kenny Dillingham, the youngest head coach in NCAA Division I, has made sound progress with a team that has 78 newcomers and is about as young as he is. The Sun Devils have shown marked improvement in the last month - their previous three losses were by three, three and eight points, the most recent a 15-7 seat at No. 5 Washington on Oct. 21.

STANFORD AT WASHINGTON STATE

PULLMAN, Wash. — Stanford kicker Joshua Karty hit the go-ahead field goal with less than six minutes left, and the Stanford defense shut out Washington State in the second half in a gritty 10-7 victory on Saturday night. The Cardinal (3-6, 2-5) snapped a six-game losing streak to the Cougars in the last Pac-12 Conference matchup between these longtime league foes. Washington State (4-5, 1-5 Pac-12) lost its fifth straight game after starting the season 4-0 and reaching No. 13 in The AP Top 25 poll. After a quiet three quarters, Stanford wide receiver Elic Ayomanor caught a key 30-yard pass on third down and Cardinal backup QB Justin Lamson converted a fourth-and-1 to set up Karty's 31-yard field goal with 5:56 remaining. The Cardinal forced a three-and-out on the Cougars' ensuing possession and salted away the game with a 10-play drive. Stanford quarterback Ashton Daniels was 15 of 31 passing for 115 yards. Sam Roush had seven catches for 61 yards, including a crucial 27-yard grab on a fake-reverse pass from Lamson. Lamson led the Cardinal with 54 rushing yards and ran for a 1-yard touchdown late in the third quarter to pull Stanford even at 7-7. He effectively ended the game with a 2-yard rush on fourth-and-1 with 2:36 left. The Cardinal were able to run the remaining time off the clock and picked up their third road victory. Washington State quarterback Cameron Ward passed for 240 yards and one touchdown. Wideout Lincoln Victor had 12 catches for 86 yards, and Josh Kelly caught four passes for 82 yards. Kelly had the only touchdown for Washington State on a 9-yard TD catch in the second quarter. **HOBBLING COUGARS** Washington State was without its top two running backs, Nakia Watson and Dylan Paine, because of injuries. Watson took two early carries before leaving. Redshirt freshman running back Djouvensky Schlenbaker, in his first career start, had 34 yards on 13 carries. The Cougars also played with starting cornerback Chau Smith-Wade due to injury. **THE TAKEAWAY** Stanford: The Cardinal showed lots of moxie in wet, ugly conditions on the Palouse. After giving Washington a major battle the week before, this win continues the upward trend in the second half of coach Troy Taylor's first season. Washington State: The talsipau continues. Over the last few weeks the Cougars biggest problem had been their defense. Against Stanford it was an offense that went totally quiet in the second half.

BERKELEY, Calif. — California's defense had its best game of the season, returning two fumbles for touchdowns and recording a season-high six sacks as the Golden Bears beat Washington State 42-39 on Saturday to end a four-game losing streak and keep their slim bowl hopes alive. Washington State kicker Dean Janikowski missed a pair of field goal attempts in the fourth quarter, including a 49-yarder that was wide left with 50 seconds remaining. Running back Jaydn Ott rushed for 167 yards and accounted for two touchdowns for Cal (4-6, 2-5 Pac-12). Ott, who went over 1,000 yards for the season, missed a chance at a third score when he fumbled in the end zone. Teammate Brian Driscoll recovered and got the touchdown. It was Cal's defense that made the biggest impact despite being on the field for 97 plays and allowing 483 yards. "Our defense, they all came up big," said Bears quarterback Fernando Mendoza, who lost a fumble on the Bears opening drive of the second half. "It's a testament to those guys. I know our defense is elite and it saved the offense today and it saved me." Mendoza also had a fairly strong day, completing 14 of 21 passes for 150 yards and two touchdowns. Washington State quarterback Cameron Ward kept the Cougars in it, throwing for 358 yards and three touchdowns. Josh Kelly had nine catches for 130 yards and a touchdown. The Cougars (4-6, 1-6) have lost six straight since opening the season 4-0. Cal's defense has had troubles all season but got a big lift from linebacker Cade Uluave, who forced a fumble on fourth-and-1 and returned it 51 yards for a touchdown. "You could tell they were trying to quarterback sneak it, and I thought, 'What if I just go over the top?'" Uluave said. "So I kind of jumped over the top, we were kind of scrambling around. Then the ball popped out. My eyes were wide open." Uluave later recovered another Washington State fumble to set up Cal's fourth touchdown of the first half, then made the game-sealing interception as time ran out in the fourth quarter. Cal's defense came up big all day. Linebacker David Reese sacked Ward and knocked the ball free. Nohl Williams scooped it up and returned it 52 yards to help Cal go up 42-24. That was big on a day the Bears' defense committed penalties that wiped out an interception and negated two third-down incompletions. The Cougars didn't go quietly. Ward threw two touchdown passes in the fourth quarter, the second a 5-yard toss to Djouvensky Schlenbaker that pulled Washington State within a field goal with 5:23 remaining. But his Hail Mary attempt was intercepted by Uluave. "We're on the field for a lot of snaps," Bears coach Justin Wilcox said. "I'm really proud of how the guys fought and competed. We made enough plays to win the game." **THE TAKEAWAY** Washington State: The Cougars kept it close despite a rash of self-inflicted mistakes. Ward, in particular, was very sharp, although he was under pressure by Cal's defense most of the afternoon. California: The Bears needed a win to keep their bowl hopes alive, and they did that with one of their best all-around games of the season. Cal's final two games are both on the road and are must-wins to get into the postseason.

PULLMAN, Wash. — Cameron Ward threw for 288 yards and accounted for four touchdowns, Brennan Jackson had two scoop-and-score touchdowns and Washington State beat Colorado 56-14 on Friday night to snap a six-game losing streak and end the Buffaloes hopes of a bowl game in the first year under Deion Sanders. Colorado quarterback Shedeur Sanders left the game in the second quarter after taking a big hit on a botched snap. Sanders was slow to get up but walked off the field on his own before being taken to the locker room. The junior was 6 of 10 for 86 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown strike to Travis Hunter. Sanders, the coach's son, was sacked four times before leaving the game. "He had some numbness in his hand and couldn't really grip the ball," Sanders said. "But then that second hit he just got rolled up on, we decided not to send him back out." Colorado (4-7, 1-7 Pac-12 Conference) and 'Coach Prime' were the darlings of college football after a 3-0 start, but the team has lost seven of eight since. Despite a massive improvement over last year's win total, Sanders said the program measures itself against its own expectations. "We're falling short of what we're capable of, that's the part of this that's tough to digest. We've got high expectations here, so this is tremendously disappointing," said Sanders. Washington State (5-6, 2-6) kept its hopes for a bowl game alive with the victory, but the Cougars will need to find a way to topple rival Washington next week in the Apple Cup to finish the job. Jackson returned a pair of fumbles for touchdowns covering 48 and 78 yards, respectively, helping the Cougars to their largest Pac-12 victory since 2016. The Cougar defense forced three turnovers on a Colorado offense that had only committed seven all season. On the Buffs' second possession, Ron Stone Jr.'s strip-sack of Sanders was picked up by Jackson who returned it for his first score of the night to put the Cougars up 14-0. The hit sidelined Sanders for a series before the big hit in the second quarter took him out for the night. Hunter's 45-yard touchdown brought the Buffs within a score for one play before Leighton Smithson stifled any Colorado momentum with a 98-yard kickoff return, the first for Washington State since 2018. Ward piled it on from there, finding Nakia Watson for a 23-yard touchdown before calling his own number on touchdowns of 1 and 2 yards on consecutive possessions to give the Cougars a 42-7 lead at the half. Ward dropped in a 34-yard touchdown throw to Kyle Williams before Jackson picked up his second fumble and returned it for a touchdown and a 56-7 lead. "They came to play from start to finish. They executed early, they executed often, they came to play," Sanders said. "And with Shedeur out on top of that, it was tough." Ryan Staub and Gavin Kuld rotated possessions in relief of Sanders but combined for just 79 passing yards and two turnovers. Hunter led the team with 82 receiving yards. The TAKEAWAY Washington State: The Cougars snapped their longest losing streak since 2013 with a 42-point barrage in the first half after averaging just 20 points per game through the last six weeks. Their defensive line was disruptive from the start, knocking out Sanders with four sacks in the first quarter alone. Colorado: The Buffaloes' postseason hopes were dashed in their largest loss of the 'Coach Prime' era. The Buffs have allowed an FBS-worst 54 sacks this season, and the Cougars' pass rush proved too much to handle.

WASHINGTON STATE AT NO. 4 WASHINGTON

SEATTLE — Putting the cap on a perfect regular season, just the second in school history, required Washington coach Kalen DeBoer to make one of the riskiest calls of his career. It helped to know the ball was likely to end up in the hands of Rome Odunze. Odunze's 23-yard run on fourth-and-1 deep in Washington's own end helped set the stage for Grady Gross to kick a 42-yard field goal on the final play as the fourth-ranked Huskies beat Washington State 24-21 on Saturday in the Apple Cup for an undefeated regular season. "I think way back there's been some risky plays, but I'd say it's certainly up there given the moment, given the situation, given the field location, the time of game, all those things," DeBoer said. Playing likely his final game at Husky Stadium, Odunze caught a 40-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter and hauled in a 21-yarder on the final play of the third quarter to give the Huskies a 21-14 lead. But it's his run play, and the call made by DeBoer and offensive coordinator Ryan Grubb that'll live on in the history of the rivalry even with the teams no longer in the same conference starting next season. Facing fourth-and-1 at their own 29 with 1:11 left, Odunze took a pitch from quarterback Michael Penix Jr. and ran into Washington State territory. "Man, what a play call. Got to give kudos to the offensive staff and coach DeBoer for believing in us on that," Odunze said. "We just went out there and executed. It was perfect." The Huskies picked up 15 more yards later in the drive when Ron Stone Jr. was flagged for a questionable roughing call. After Odunze had to break up a potential interception at the goal line, Gross nailed the winner. "I'm happy to do a little bit of something for all the big things that the rest of the team has done," said Gross, who found out he was being put on scholarship in the locker room after. Washington's past eight wins were decided by 10 points or less with six of those by one-score margins. "Just being able to find a way to win in those tough moments I feel like it just shows this team's character and our will to win. That's what makes it so special," Penix said. In the final year of the Pac-12 before most of its members scatter to other conferences, Washington (12-0, 9-0) became the first school in the 12-team era to go unbeaten in the regular season. The last conference team to finish the regular season unbeaten was Oregon in 2010 before the conference expanded to 12 teams. Prior to that, the last unbeaten season belonged to Southern California during its run atop the conference in the mid-2000s. The Huskies still have one more challenge ahead, facing No. 6 Oregon in the Pac-12 championship game Friday in Las Vegas with a victory likely putting Washington into the College Football Playoff. They'll need Penix to be better than he was against the Cougars (5-7, 2-7). Penix had several miscommunications with his pass catchers and the final drive had a few questionable throws. He finished 18 of 33 for 204 yards, not exactly the closing statement that could have boosted his Heisman Trophy campaign. But he made a handful of big plays and often looked Odunze's way when they were needed. Odunze's 40-yard TD came on a play-action pass and a blown coverage by the Cougars. His 21-yard score came one play after Jack Westover made a diving grab for 19 yards. For much of the game, Washington State (5-7, 2-7) was the better team. The Cougars needed a win to reach bowl eligibility after snapping a six-game losing streak last week against Colorado. "Our guys put it all out there. We came in here ready to attack, ready to win a game. Had a vision, had a plan," Washington State coach Jake Dickert said. "For the most part, lived out that plan. Shot ourselves maybe in the foot one too many times." Washington State quarterback Cam Ward threw for 317 yards and three touchdowns, but also had three interceptions. Ward threw touchdowns of 21 yards to Josh Kelly and 25 yards to Kyle Williams in the first half, and his 8-yard TD pass to Lincoln Victor with 5:58 left pulled the Cougars even at 21. But Washington State couldn't take advantage of holding the Huskies to a three-and-out on Washington's ensuing possession. Ward was incomplete on third down from his own 47 and the Cougars punted back to Washington with 1:59 remaining. Victor had 11 catches for 88 yards and Kelly finished with eight receptions for 106 yards. It's bittersweet. It came down to a few plays," Victor said. Like I said, they were the better team tonight." **LAST CALL** The Apple Cup will continue after the schools reached agreement on a five-year deal to keep the game going through 2028. But it'll never be the same. It will lack the stakes of the previous generations when the Huskies and Cougars were members of the same conference. The next meeting is scheduled for Sept. 14, 2024, at Lumen Field. "Will it ever be the same? We'll see," Dickert said. "But I know it means something to everybody." **THE TAKEAWAY** Washington State: The defense deserves a lot of credit and recognition for the job in slowing down Washington's offense. The Huskies finished 306 total yards and Penix was sacked twice. Washington: Offensive coordinator Ryan Grubb wasn't happy with the performance last week against Oregon State and will be equally irritated with the mistakes made versus the Cougars. They must be better next week against Oregon.






1916 ROSE BOWL

WSU 14, BROWN 0

January 1, 1916, Pasadena, Calif. – A crowd of 10,000 was on hand at the Pasadena Rose Bowl January 1 to watch as undefeated Washington State took on eastern power Brown University in the first of the continuous Rose Bowls. WSU used third and fourth quarter touchdown runs by Ralph Boone and Carl Dietz to shutout the Bruins 14-0. Brown entered the game a two-to-one favorite, despite a modest 5-3-1 record. The Bruins' 3-0 win over Yale was the key accomplishment that earned the Rhode Island team an invitation to play in the Rose Bowl. A cold spell, followed by a heavy rain and some snow for three days prior to the game, turned the playing field into a sea of mud that slowed both teams. Brown came close to scoring twice in the first half, but each time Washington State's defense, which had allowed just one field goal and one touchdown all season, rose to the task and halted the Bruins short of the goal line, once at the four yard line. Bruin star Fritz Pollard gained just 47 yards in 13 carries. Pollard later became the first black named to a Walter Camp All-America team and was the first black head coach in the National Football League. In the second half WSU's size advantage began to pay off as the Cougars took command, scoring once in each quarter. WSU's preparation for the game had been, to say the least, odd. Coach William "Lone Star" Dietz, out of the Carlisle Indian School, and his Cougar squad served as extras in the football film "Tom Brown of Harvard" each morning, then practiced for the bowl game during the afternoon. Each WSU player earned \$100 for the 14 mornings of movie work. During practice sessions, Dietz appeared in his "classic" coaching attire: a silk hat, Prince Albert cutaway coat, striped pants, yellow gloves, and a walking stick. Originally known as the Pasadena Tournament of Roses East-West game (it was 1923 when the real Rose Bowl facility was completed that the name changed), the WSU-Brown game was played at Tournament Park.



ALABAMA 24, WSU 0

January 1, 1931, Pasadena, Calif. - The Alabama Crimson Tide used a second-quarter blitz, including touchdown runs of one and 43 yards by quarterback Monk Campbell, to post a 24-0 win over previously undefeated Washington State in the 17th Rose Bowl game, viewed by 65,000 fans. Alabama's coach was Wallace Wade, who had been a member of the Brown University team that lost to WSU in the 1916 Rose Bowl. Wade, during his career, coached in five Rose Bowls.




"Babe" Hollingbery's fifth Cougar team went a perfect 9-0-0 to earn a Rose Bowl berth in 1930, including a 6-0 mark during the Pacific Coast Conference schedule. Included in the list of Cougar victims were California 16-0, USC 7-6, Washington 3-0 and Villanova 13-0. Two members of the WSU team later earned recognition in the College Football Hall of Fame, Mel Hein and Glen "Turk" Edwards.

1981 HOLIDAY BOWL

#14 BYU 38, #20 WSU 36

December 18, 1981, San Diego - Three games in one was more than the 52,000-plus fans at San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium paid for, but three games is what they saw as the Brigham Young Cougars held on to defeat the Washington State Cougars 38-36. The BYU squad won the first game, a 31-minute affair that generated a 31-7 lead for the team from Provo. The next 25 minutes just as convincingly belonged to WSU 29-7. In the end, however, the game belonged to BYU as much for defense as anything. They stopped the Pullman team with just over three minutes to play by forcing a punt, then ran out the clock to preserve the win. Jim McMahon, in his last collegiate game, completed 27 of 43 passes for 342 yards and three touchdowns. More importantly, he did not throw an interception. The WSU Cougars used the running of Don LaBomme and quarterback Ricky Turner to baffle the BYU team, especially in the second half. Turner gained 92 yards in 12 carries and scored twice, while LaBomme added 79 yards in 14 carries and scored once. Robert Williams and Mike Martin also scored for the Cougars. WSU's failure on a two-point conversion late in the third quarter, an interception BYU's Ron Holmoe returned 35 yards for a touchdown on the third play of the third quarter, and a key sack of Casper on WSU's last possession loomed big in a game that had numerous turning points.



1988 ALOHA BOWL

#18 WSU 24, #14 HOUSTON 22

December 25, 1988, Honolulu - Washington State scored 24 second-quarter points and forced a last-second Houston turnover in notching a 24-22 win over the Texas Cougars Christmas Day. The bowl appearance was WSU's second of the 1980s and evened the Cougars bowl record to 2-2. In a close game there are many heroes, but for WSU, none stood out more than senior Victor Wood. He picked up a fumble early in the second quarter and zipped five yards for a touchdown that put his Cougars ahead 7-3. On WSU's next possession, Wood caught a 15-yard scoring pass from Timm Rosenbach to put WSU up 14-3 and well on its way to a bowl victory viewed by a national ABC-TV audience. Wood's heroics were catching as WSU added a Jason Hanson 33-yard field goal and another touchdown, this one by Rosenbach, before halftime to put Washington State in command 24-9. WSU limited the Texas visitors to just five first half firstdowns, 46 yards rushing, and 77 yards passing before intermission. The Cougars picked off two Houston passes, one each by Shawn Landrum and Vernon Todd. In the end, however, it was Tuineau Alipate's hard hit that forced a Houston fumble recovered by Artie Holmes at the WSU five yard line. James Dixon was the recipient of Alipate's jarring tackle after catching a David Dacus pass over the middle that appeared for a moment to set up a potential game-winning score by Houston. The Cougars then controlled the ball for the final 2:44, with a key six-yard Rosenbach to Tim Stallworth pass giving WSU the much-needed first down just before the game ended.



1992 COPPER BOWL

#18 WSU 31, UTAH 28

December 29, 1992, Tucson, Ariz. - Perhaps no college bowl game following the 1992 gridiron season was more offensive minded than the Copper Bowl matchup between WSU and Utah, but after all the running and passing that accounted for more than 1,100 yards, the deciding play was a 22-yard field goal by WSU's Aaron Price. The Cougars scored 21 unanswered points in the first quarter and one additional score just before halftime for a 28-14 lead. WSU then held on until Price gave them their final lead with 5:08 to play. Even then, they had to watch anxiously as Chris Yergensen's 20-yard chip shot sailed wildly to the left with 3:18 remaining. Though the 40,000-plus fans left the stadium talking about the offensive plays that stood out, it was WSU's defense in the fourth quarter that made this win possible. The Utes scored twice in the second quarter and added two more scores to pull even with a quarter to play. Both teams then turned to their defenses. The key play came with 6:29 to play when Utah's Frank Dolce avoided a strong WSU rush and hooked up with Henry Lusk on a short sideline pass. John Rushing then stripped Lusk of the ball and Singor Mobley scooped it up at the Utah 36 yard line. Fifteen yards later, at the Utah 21, Mobley was dragged down, setting up the Cougars with great field position. Drew Bledsoe immediately drove the Cougars to the Utah five yard line before turning the scoring chores over to Price. Like he did the closing seconds of WSU's 23-20 win over Arizona in the same stadium early in the season, Price came through with the kick. Bledsoe completed 30 of 46 passes for a school record 476 yards. Phillip Bobo caught TD passes of 87 (equalling a school record) and 48 yards, and Shaumbe Wright-Fair picked up 123 yards rushing and scored on a pair of three-yard line smashes.



1994 ALAMO BOWL

#24 WSU 10, BAYLOR 3

December 31, 1994, San Antonio - The Washington State offense scored on the opening drive of the game and on the last play of the second quarter to provide all the points the Cougar defense needed as WSU held off Baylor's late challenge in a 10-3 win at the second annual Builders Square Alamo Bowl before a crowd of 44,106. Despite some anxious moments in the closing seconds of the game, the Cougar defense made those 10 points stand up by limiting the record-setting Bear offense to eight first downs, 151 yards in total offense and just one field goal. The Cougars did something against Baylor they had not done all season, take the opening kickoff and drive the length of the field for a touchdown. The drive totaled 91 yards, equalling the longest scoring drive of the season, and ended when Kevin Hicks busted through the left side of the line from one yard out to put WSU on top 7-0. The score came six minutes, 32 seconds after the kickoff. WSU's offense provided three more points just before halftime to give the Cougs a 10-0 lead at intermission. Taking the ball after Baylor's Jarvis VanDyke missed his second field goal attempt of the first half, WSU drove from its own 30 yard line to the Baylor 20 yard line, where Tony Truant banged home a 37-yard field goal with two seconds left in the first half. A sideline pass to Jay Dumas for a key first down, then another similar pass to Albert Kennedy put the ball in perfect position for Truant. Davis, named the game's most valuable offensive player, hit six of eight passes on the drive. Davis, who completed 27 of 35 passes for 286 yards, gave Cougar fans a few anxious minutes in the third quarter when he took a hard blow to the back while scrambling out of the pocket. He was able to return one play later and finished the game. Defensively WSU was especially tough in the first half. Baylor came into the game averaging nearly 33 points per game and 382.4 yards per contest. In the first half WSU's defense, led by the game's most valuable defensive player, Ron Childs, limited the Bears to just 41 net yards, 24 rushing and 17 passing. Childs had 10 tackles in the game, including eight solo, of which two were for negative yardage. Only on its last possession did Baylor come close to the WSU endzone, where Todd Jensen, a senior who backed up John Rushing all year, picked off a Jeff Watson pass to halt any Baylor hope of scoring. The bowl victory was WSU's second in the last three years and third in seven years. Joining Childs defensively were Chris Hayes with seven tackles, Mark Fields with six and Chad Eaton with five.



1998 ROSE BOWL

#1 MICHIGAN 21, #8 WSU 16

January 1, 1998, Pasadena, Calif. - The Washington State Cougars, making their first Rose Bowl appearance in 67 years, pushed national champion and number one ranked Michigan to the last play of the game before falling to the Wolverines 21-16 before 101,219 fans and a world-wide television audience. The victory left Michigan a perfect 13-0 for the season, bumping the Cougars to a 10-2 record. After Michigan thwarted two WSU drives to start the game, the Cougar defense forced a Wolverine punt that would set up WSU's first scoring drive. The Cougs took over on the Michigan 47-yard-line with 6:26 to play in the first quarter. Ryan Leaf completed two passes during the drive, including a 15-yard touchdown toss to Kevin McKenzie with 3:17 left in the first quarter. Rian Lindell's point-after gave WSU the early 7-0 advantage. WSU came close to taking a 14-point lead, but Heisman Trophy winner Charles Woodson halted a WSU drive in the Michigan endzone when he intercepted a Leaf pass from the 12 yard line. The Wolverine's answering scoring drive began from their own 34-yard-line at the 8:04 mark in the second quarter and ended with a 58-yard pass from Bob Griese to Tai Streets that completed the first half scoring. Early in the second half, WSU took over 99 yards from the endzone after Michigan's Jason Vinson dropped a perfect punt just outside the endzone. Shawn Tims put the finishing touches on WSU's 99 yard drive in nine plays, taking a reverse handoff the final 14 yards. Leaf hit four of five passes in the drive that amassed 73 yards. Lindell's PAT attempt was blocked by Michigan's James Hall, leaving the WSU advantage at 13-7. The Wolverines responded immediately, moving the ball on their next possession to their 39 yard-line to set up another Griese-to-Streets touchdown combination, this time 58 yards. Baker's point-after gave Michigan their first lead, 14-13 with 6:07 left in the third quarter. Michigan then padded their lead with a 14-play, 77-yard drive that ended in Griese's third touchdown pass of the game, a 23-yarder to Jerame Tuman. Baker's extra-point kick increased the Michigan advantage to 21-13 with 11:21 to play. Washington State responded immediately with an eight-play, 49-yard drive that set up a 48-yard field goal by Lindell, cutting Michigan's lead to five points, 21-16 with 7:25 remaining. The Wolverines then put together a 51-yard drive that consumed almost seven minutes off the game clock. When Jay Feely's pooch punt rolled dead at the WSU seven-yard-line, the Cougars' victory hopes were 93 yards and 29 seconds away. After two incomplete passes, the Cougars faced third-and-10 with only 16 seconds left. Leaf then found Nian Taylor along the sideline for a gain of 46, to the Michigan 47-yard-line. After a delay of game penalty, Leaf hit Love Jefferson at the Michigan 25 and the Cougar tight end lateraled to a streaking Jason Clayton, who managed nine more yards before being brought down in bounds at Michigan's 16 yard line with 0:02 on the game clock. Out of timeouts, WSU was forced to try and spike the ball on first-down, but officials ruled that the final two seconds slipped away before the ball was effectively downed, thus preventing WSU's one final shot at a major upset.





2003 ROSE BOWL

#8 OKLAHOMA 34, #7 WSU 14

January 1, 2003, Pasadena, Calif. – Oklahoma’s vaunted defense stifled Washington State’s high-flying passing attack and captured the 89th Rose Bowl Game 34-14 in front of 86,848 fans New Year’s Day. The Sooners broke the game open with a pair of touchdowns inside the two-minute mark of the first half. The first came on a 12-yard touchdown pass from Nate Hybl, the game’s most valuable player. Antonio Perkins extended OU’s lead to 17-0 with a 51-yard punt return just :42 seconds later. Hybl connected on 19 of 29 passes for 240 yards and two touchdowns. Sooner running back Quentin Griffin carried the ball 30 times for 144 yards. WSU quarterback Jason Gesser finished his career by completing 17 of 34 passes for 240 yards and a touchdown. Sammy Moore provided the game’s final highlight, returning an OU kick 89 yards for a score with just 1:15 remaining. Linebacker Teddy Lehman led the Big XII Champions with six tackles, including two sacks, while free safety Erik Coleman recorded 10 tackles and recovered a fumble for the Cougars.



2003 HOLIDAY BOWL

#15 WSU 28, #5 TEXAS 20

December 30, 2003, San Diego, Calif. – Washington State reached the 10-win plateau for the third time in as many seasons with a 28-20 comeback victory over Texas in the Pacific Life Holiday Bowl. Facing a 10-7 halftime deficit, the Cougars rallied to score three touchdowns in the third quarter and take a 26-10 lead into the final stanza. The second half fireworks began with a 54-yard touchdown pass from Matt Kegel to Sammy Moore with just over nine minutes left in the third. WSU used a trick play to get in the end zone once again four minutes later. Kegel lined up under center, but instead of taking the snap, ran in motion to the right sideline, leaving running back Jonathan Smith alone in the backfield. Smith fumbled the snap, but recovered and ran 12 yards for a touchdown. Two Texas possessions later, the WSU defense continued the onslaught when Jason David recovered a fumble and took it 18 yards for the Cougs’ final touchdown of the game. Washington State’s defense forced a fourth quarter safety to push its total to 28. Moore earned most valuable offensive player honors after converting both of his catches for touchdowns and setting up another with a 51-yard punt return. Sophomore Kyle Basler was named the game’s most valuable defensive player after pinning the Longhorns inside their own five on four occasions.



2013 NEW MEXICO BOWL

COLORADO STATE 48, WSU 45

December 22, 2013, ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - With less than two minutes to play and Colorado State down by eight points, Shaquill Barrett knew the Rams needed the ball back quickly to finish an improbable comeback against Washington State. Once down by 22 points in the New Mexico Bowl, the Rams got their chance when Cougars running back Jeremiah Laufasa came barreling toward Barrett. That fumble, at the Cougars 33, set up Kapri Bibbs' 1-yard run score and Donnell Alexander's two-point conversion run that tied it at 45 with 33 seconds left. Then, Washington State's Teondray Caldwell fumbled a kickoff return at the 24, setting up Jared Roberts' 41-yard field goal with 3 seconds left that gave Colorado State a 48-45 victory. It was a quarterback shootout that saw close to 800 passing yards combined and a game largely dominated by Washington State until the last 2 minutes. And Colorado State did not have a led the entire game until that winning field goal. Garrett Grayson threw for 369 yards and Bibbs ran for 169 yards and three touchdowns for Colorado State (8-6). The Rams overcame three early turnovers. Meanwhile, Washington State's Connor Halliday threw touchdown passes to six receivers and finished with 410 yards for Washington State (6-7). Those six touchdown passes tied West Virginia's Geno Smith and Iowa's Chuck Long for an NCAA bowl record. After the first touchdown pass, Halliday got into a shouting match with a Colorado State coach when Halliday ran into the Rams' sideline. That exchange created a social media buzz and McElwain vowed to look into it. Washington State scored 35 points in the first half, but had only 10 in the second.



WSU 20, MIAMI 14

EL PASO, Texas - Luke Falk threw two touchdown passes to lead Washington State to a 20-14 victory over Miami on Saturday in the snowy Sun Bowl. Erik Powell added field goals of 30 and 25 yards to help the Cougars (9-4) win a bowl game for the first time since the 2003 Holiday Bowl. Miami (8-5) lost its sixth consecutive bowl game. Washington State led 20-7 at the half and looked in total control, limiting Miami to three first downs over the second and third quarters. The Hurricanes rallied in a blizzard in the fourth. Braxton Berrios' 60-yard end-around run set up Mark Walton's 5-yard scoring run that cut it to 20-14 with 13:10 left. The Cougars, the top passing team in the nation during the regular season, were shut out in the second half, leaving it to their defense to wrap up the victory. Miami had a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brad Kaaya to Stacy Coley called back on a penalty with 5:14 to play. Two players later, Washington State's Marcellus Pippins recovered Walton's fumble at the 4. After a Cougars punt, the Hurricanes were at the Washington State 28, but an end-over-end halfback pass from Joe Yearby was easily intercepted by Shalom Luani with 2:58 to play to seal it for Washington State. Falk, the game's MVP, was 29 of 53 for 295 yards and no interceptions. He threw touchdown passes of 31 yards to running back Jamal Morrow and 25 yards to receiver Gabe Marks. The scoring play to Morrow, during which he turned up the right sideline and carried two defenders into the end zone, gave Washington State a 7-0 lead. Miami tied it at 7 on a 4-yard pass from Brad Kaaya to Coley. The first quarter ended 7-7, but the Cougars ran off 13 straight points in the second. Kaaya was 17 of 30 for 219 yards with one interception. He appeared to give the Hurricanes a 14-7 lead in the second quarter when he connected in the end zone with receiver Rashawn Scott, but the ball came out of Scott's hands and was intercepted by Peyton Pelluer. One of the keys for the Cougars was winning the turnover battle, 3-1. Washington State fumbled in the second quarter, but the defense forced a three-and-out. On the next series, the Cougars used a 14-play drive to get Powell's first field goal and a 10-7 lead. Washington State made it 17-7 on Falk's TD pass to Marks, and Powell made it 20-7.



2016 HOLIDAY BOWL

MINNESOTA 17, WSU 12

SAN DIEGO - Shannon Brooks caught a tipped pass from Mitch Leidner for a 13-yard, go-ahead touchdown in the third quarter and the Minnesota Golden Gophers, beset by turmoil after 10 players were suspended after a sexual assault investigation, upset Luke Falk and the Washington State Cougars 17-12 in the Holiday Bowl on Tuesday night. It was one of the few exciting plays in an otherwise pedestrian edition of what traditionally has been one of the country's most exciting bowl games. WSU cornerback Marcellus Pippins reached up with his right hand and deflected Leidner's pass in the end zone but it went right to Brooks for the TD and a 10-6 lead. That capped an 84-yard, 10-play drive on Minnesota's first possession of the second half. The Golden Gophers (9-4) were looking to regroup after backing down from a threat to skip this game if 10 teammates suspended after a sexual assault investigation weren't reinstated. Their boycott lasted less than 36 hours, with university leadership never blinking. The players backed down amid pressure from many who read details of the allegations. WSU (8-5) ended on a three-game losing streak and was held to its lowest point total of the season. The Cougars had scored more than 50 points four times this season, a school record. The Golden Gophers frustrated Falk most of the game, holding him to 264 yards - 86 below his average - on 30-of-51 passing. Falk didn't crack 200 yards until the final minutes, when he led a drive capped by an 8-yard TD pass to Kyle Sweet. After three tries due to Minnesota penalties, the conversion attempt failed. Minnesota then recovered an onside kick. Falk came in having completed 71 percent of his passes in throwing for 4,204 yards and 37 touchdowns. The Cougars were ranked second in the nation in passing. Falk was intercepted by Adekunle Ayinde on fourth down with 3:05 left. That set up Rodney Smith's 9-yard TD run with 2:06 left for a 17-6 lead. WSU led 6-3 after a lackluster first half that included just three field goals. The Cougars couldn't get their vaunted Air Raid offense going and crossed the 50 just twice, getting field goals of 26 and 41 yards by Erik Powell. Powell's second field goal was set up when Nnamdi Oguayo hit Leidner and forced a fumble that Isaac Dotson recovered at the Golden Gophers' 38. Minnesota got a 43-yard field goal by Emmitt Carpenter in the second quarter.

2017 HOLIDAY BOWL

NO. 18 MICHIGAN STATE 42, NO. 21 WSU 17

SAN DIEGO - Brian Lewerke threw for 213 yards and three touchdowns, and LJ Scott ran for 110 yards and two scores for No. 18 Michigan State, which took advantage of Luke Falk's absence to rout No. 21 Washington State 42-17 in the Holiday Bowl. Lewerke also rushed for 73 yards for Michigan State (10-3), which rebounded from a dismal 3-9 record last year to reach double digits in wins for the eighth time in program history. Falk, who was photographed earlier in the week with a cast on his left wrist, went through warmups but came out in street clothes at game time. He was replaced by redshirt sophomore Tyler Hilinski, who made his first start and eighth appearance of the season. It's unclear precisely when Falk injured the wrist on his non-throwing hand, but he had issues with it throughout the season. Coach Mike Leach refused to give specifics during the week. Hilinski led WSU (9-4) to a 45-yard field goal by Erik Powell on the Cougars' second drive, but the Cougars were overpowered by the Spartans. Lewerke threw the first of two TD passes to Cody White, a 7-yarder midway through the second quarter, when he was flushed to the left but found the receiver in the back of the end zone. On MSU's next possession, Lewerke took the snap and glanced at his running back, which froze the secondary and allowed Felton Davis III to get wide open for a 49-yard scoring pass. Scott scored on a 3-yard run to give the Spartans a 21-3 halftime lead. Early in the third, Lewerke rolled left and had his pass tipped, but a sliding White caught it for a 7-yard touchdown. Lewerke, who finished 13 of 21, was hit hard on a keeper in the third quarter and came out for a few plays. His backup, Damien Terry, scored on a 6-yard keeper to make it 35-3. The Cougars closed the gap when Hilinski threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Tay Martin late in the third quarter and a 15-yarder to Tay in the fourth quarter. Scott scored on a 28-yard burst up the middle with about six minutes left to play. Hilinski was 39 of 50 for 272 yards and two touchdowns, with one interception. THE TAKEAWAY Washington State: It was the second straight lackluster Holiday Bowl for Leach's Cougars, who lost 17-12 to Minnesota last year. Besides being without Falk, leading receiver Tavares Martin Jr. was kicked off the team after the regular season and third-leading receiver Isaiah Johnson-Mack left the squad. Michigan State: Scott had his third 100-yard game of the season and ninth of his career. Felton had four catches for 118 yards.

2018 ALAMO BOWL

NO. 12 WSU 28, NO. 25 IOWA STATE 26

SAN ANTONIO – Gardner Minshew II and that glorious mustache conjured up a final bit of magic in a grand finale for Washington State. The graduate transfer quarterback whose whiskered upper lip was loved and mimicked by Cougars fans all season, threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score in sending No. 12 Washington State to a 28-26 win over No. 25 Iowa State in the Alamo Bowl. Minshew's passing and scrambling earned the Cougars (11-2) a school record for wins in a season. He threw for 299 yards, none of them bigger than a play made out of desperation when Iowa State had all the momentum. After watching a 21-10 lead dwindle to 21-20 by the fourth quarter, the Cougars stripped the ball from Iowa State running back David Montgomery at the Cyclones' 30. Minshew, who had been held in check in the third quarter, escaped a third-down pass rush to flip a last-second shovel pass to Tay Martin that went for 20 yards. The play stunned the Cyclones, and Max Borghi scored on a 10-yard run the next play. It was just another big fourth-quarter moment for the transfer from East Carolina who coach Mike Leach had lured out West with the promise he could lead the nation in passing. Minshew was the nation's leading passer in yards per game this season and won the Johnny Unitas Award as the nation's top senior quarterback in a season the Cougars fell one game short of playing for the Pac-12 championship. Nearly all of his completions this season were more orthodox than the flip to Martin. None were bigger for the season and the legacy it set for the program. "I want to say thank you to these coaches, this university and these fans for taking me in," Minshew said. "So glad to be a part of this," he said. "One thing I've always been told is to leave a place better than we found it. This place could be really special." The Cyclones did a good job in bottling him up for much of the game. Iowa State's defense held Washington State 10 points and 135 yards below their season averages and two of the Cougars' touchdowns came on short drives after turnovers. But after Minshew found a way to get Washington State in the end zone, the Cougars' defense made the one play it had to at the end. Iowa State's last chance came after quarterback Brock Purdy scored from a yard out with 4:02 left. The Cyclones went for two, but a pass to Montgomery was stopped well short of the goal line after a false-start penalty pushed the line of scrimmage back to the 8. Iowa State had seven false start penalties and had two players ejected for targeting hits on Minshew. Purdy passed for 315 yards and Cyclones receiver Hakeem Butler caught nine passes for 192 yards, six yards shy of the Alamo Bowl record. Montgomery rushed for 124 yards. The Cyclones (8-5) had rallied from a 1-3 start to finish third in the Big 12, the program's best conference finish in 40 years. **THE TAKEAWAY** Washington State: Minshew completed 9 of 13 passes in the fourth quarter for 78 yards. After Iowa State's final touchdown, he completed three passes, two of them converting third downs, as the Cougars ran out the clock. Iowa State: Turnovers and targeting calls were critical. Purdy threw two first-quarter interceptions and Montgomery's fumble was a game-changer. Iowa State had two key defenders ejected in the second quarter for targeting hits to Minshew. **TOUCHDOWN TAUNTING** Washington State cornerback Marcus Strong had a long touchdown interception return wiped out in the first quarter when he was flagged for taunting on his way into the endzone. Strong stepped in front of a pass intended for Butler and had a clear path to the goal line. He was penalized because he held the ball out and looked back as Purdy made a futile dive for his feet. Instead of the score, the Cougars got the ball on the Iowa State 20 and scored two plays later when Minshew connected with Renard Bell.



2019 CHEEZ-IT BOWL

NO. 24 AIR FORCE 31, WSU 21

PHOENIX – Air Force clung to a three-point lead, the clock showing plenty of time left for one of the nation's most prolific offenses. A field goal was not going to be good enough. The Falcons needed a touchdown to leave Washington State no chance. Going for it on fourth down was the only option - and it worked. Kadin Remsberg ran for 178 yards and stretched to the pylon for a 3-yard touchdown on a late fourth down, lifting No. 24 Air Force to a 31-21 victory over Washington State in the Cheez-It Bowl on Friday night. The Falcons (11-2) had their triple option working to near perfection, grinding out 371 yards rushing while setting a Cheez-It Bowl time of possession record of 43:24. Donald Hammond III scored two touchdowns and Air Force carried a 10-point lead into the fourth quarter, yet couldn't shake the high-scoring Cougars. Anthony Gordon, the FBS passing leader, kept Washington State within reach, throwing for 351 yards and three touchdowns. He hit Brandon Arconado on a 13-yard TD to pull Washington State (6-7) within 24-21 late in the fourth quarter, giving the Cougars a shot at the comeback finish. Air Force methodically worked the ball down to Washington State's 4-yard line, but failed to punch the ball into the end zone on three tries. After a timeout, Hammond ran an option left and pitched the ball to Remsberg, who got the edge and reached the ball to the pylon with a defender draping him. The touchdown was upheld on review. The 2018 game was dubbed the Cheez-INT Bowl after TCU and California combined for nine interceptions. A year later, Air Force and Washington State brought philosophical differences to the desert. The Falcons like to stay grounded, running 57 times a game while finishing third in the FBS at 292.5 yards per game. The Cougars love to fly, putting it up 56 times a game to lead the nation with nearly 450 yards a game. Washington State started the Cheez-It Bowl quickly, racing down the field with a series of completions, only to get stuffed by an Air Force goal-line stand. The Falcons' opening drive was a yard-churning, clock-winding grind, covering 98 yards in 20 plays and 12:23. Hammond capped it with a 1-yard TD run. Air Force's next two drives took less time combined than the first, ending in Jake Koehnke's 28-yard field goal and Taven Birdow's 3-yard run after Gordon lost a fumble at Washington State's 23. The Cougars had two more quick-hitting drives to pull within 17-14 at halftime on Gordon's two TD passes. Air Force went right back to the ground to open the second half; 13 plays, 75 yards, capped by Hammond's 7-yard TD run. Washington State had another fourth-down failure, this one at Air Force's 5-yard line, but bounced back quickly with Gordon's TD pass to Arconado. The Cougars just couldn't stop Air Force and Remsberg's diving TD run capped another long scoring drive to seal it. **THE TAKEAWAY** Air Force won the line of scrimmage and its 11th game of the season, second only to 12-win seasons in 1985 and 1998. Washington State was hurt by the two failed fourth downs and its inability to decipher Air Force's triple option. **FOURTH-DOWN DECISIONS** Leach has been known as a gambler on fourth downs, often preferring to go for it over punting or kicking field goals. He stuck by his decisions at the Cheez-It Bowl, even though neither worked.

2021 SUN BOWL

CENTRAL MICHIGAN 24, WSU 21

EL PASO, Texas – Lew Nichols III ran for 130 yards and a touchdown, leading late replacement Central Michigan to a 24-21 victory over Washington State in the Sun Bowl on Friday. The Chippewas (9-4) ended a five-game bowl losing streak with their fifth consecutive victory this season. When Boise State opted out of the Arizona Bowl because of COVID-19 issues, Central Michigan switched about 300 miles west from Tucson, Arizona, to the Texas border city of El Paso. Miami skipped the Sun Bowl for COVID-19 reasons as well. Central Michigan stayed in Arizona before bussing to El Paso the day before the game. Washington State (7-6) never could get its offense going in the first half, finishing with just 53 yards and trailing 21-0 at the break. The Cougars dropped to 8-9 all-time in bowls. The Cougars rallied in the second half behind backup quarterback Victor Gabalis, scoring three times to make it close. Gabalis was 12 of 23 passing for 180 yards and two TDs. After a 13-yard scoring toss to Lincoln Victor pulled the Cougars within three points with 3:13 remaining, they had another chance starting at their 14-yard line with 2:41 remaining. Central Michigan stopped Joey Hobert a yard short on a catch on fourth-and-5. Marshall Meeder kicked three field goals for Central Michigan, including a 52-yarder for a 6-0 lead and a 43-yarder for a 10-point lead early in the fourth quarter. **THE TAKEAWAY** Central Michigan: It was the first victory in a bowl against a Power Five opponent for the Mid-American Conference team. The Chippewas were seven-point underdogs. Washington State: The Cougars were without starting tackles Liam Ryan and Abe Lucas for coach Jake Dickert's first game on the sideline since having the interim tagged removed. Running backs Max Borghi opted out and Deon McIntosh did not play.

2022 JIMMY KIMMEL LA BOWL

FRESNO STATE 29, WSU 6

LOS ANGELES – Jordan Mims rushed for a career-high 205 yards and two scores, Jake Haener threw two TD passes and Fresno State completed the biggest in-season turnaround in Football Bowl Subdivision history with a 29-6 victory over Washington State in the LA Bowl on Saturday. Fresno State - which won the Mountain West Conference title - is the first team to get to 10 wins after dropping four of the first five. The Bulldogs (10-4) were 1-4 in early October before winning their final nine games. Mims accounted for 232 all-purpose yards and outgained Washington State, which had 182 offensive yards. Both of Mims' touchdowns were on direct snaps out of the Wildcat formation. Early in the second quarter, the senior went 4 yards around left end to give the Bulldogs a 14-0 advantage. In the fourth quarter, he carried it 2 yards up the middle to make it 29-6. Haener completed 24 of 36 passes for 284 yards in his final game for Fresno State. The senior connected with Zane Pope on a 22-yard touchdown to complete the Bulldogs' opening possession. He added an 11-yard score to Nikko Remigio late in the third quarter to extend the lead to 22-6. Cameron Ward was 22 of 32 for 137 yards for Washington State (7-6). Nakia Watson rushed for 33 yards and had the Cougars only touchdown in the third quarter, when he scored from 1 yard to bring Washington State within 16-6. **GETTING DEFENSIVE** Fresno State made it 16-0 on Washington State's ensuing possession with a safety. On third-and-14 from the Cougars' 3-yard line, Ward was pressured by Bulldogs' defensive lineman Leonard Payne Jr. and stepped on the end line in the back of the end zone. It was the second time in the last three games the Bulldogs have scored on a safety. **THE TAKEAWAY** Fresno State: The Bulldogs have won four straight bowl games and have their second consecutive season with double-digit victories. It also completes a great first year for Jeff Tedford, who is in his second stint at Fresno State after Kalen DeBoer left for Washington. Washington State: The Cougars have dropped their last three bowl games but were short-handed after both coordinators left for other positions. Washington State also was impacted at wide receiver and linebacker with players opting out of the game or putting their name in the transfer portal.

Kirk H. Schulz is the 11th president of Washington State University and a tenured professor in the Gene and Linda Voiland School of Chemical Engineering and Bioengineering. A nationally respected leader in higher education and a fervent supporter of intercollegiate athletics, President Schulz has leveraged his decades of expertise to take WSU to new heights.


Since joining Washington State University in June 2016, President Schulz has made great strides in expanding the reach and effectiveness of the WSU system of campuses, Extension offices, and other programs to better serve the State of Washington. As part of that work, Schulz has set a course for the strategic direction of the university, advocated for higher education policy, furthered philanthropic priorities, and represented WSU at the state and federal levels. The milestones achieved under his leadership include record highs in student enrollment, record-level fundraising, the expansion of academic offerings across the system, and the growth of the Elson S. Floyd College of Medicine.

President Schulz began his career shortly after graduating with his Ph.D. in Chemical Engineering in 1991. He held various leadership positions as a faculty member at the University of North Dakota and Michigan Technological University before transitioning to Mississippi State University. At Mississippi State, Schulz continued to assume roles of increasing responsibility, starting with his position as the Director of the Dave Swalm School of Chemical Engineering and culminating with his role as Vice President for Research and Economic Development. Schulz later became the 13th president of Kansas State University, where he served for seven years.

In addition to his role as the university's president, Schulz is also deeply involved in intercollegiate athletics. He currently sits on the Pac-12 Board of Directors and is the Pac-12 representative on the College Football Playoff Board of Managers. He previously served as chair of the NCAA Board of Governors, the association's governing body and highest-ranking committee.

President Schulz earned his undergraduate and doctoral degrees in chemical engineering at Virginia Tech, where he met his wife, Dr. Noel Nunnally Schulz. The pair have two sons together, Tim and Andrew.





Washington State University President Kirk Schulz removed the interim tag and named Anne McCoy as the WSU Director of Athletics, it was announced June 25, 2024. McCoy, who spent the last three months as Interim Director of Athletics, officially became the 15th person to lead Cougar Athletics and the first woman to hold the position.

McCoy is no stranger to WSU, serving a variety of roles on the senior administrative team since arriving in 2001 as associate director of athletics for internal operations. McCoy, who was hired by former Cougar Athletic Director Jim Sterk, has risen within the athletic department. Most recently, she served as senior deputy director of athletics and senior woman administrator (SWA) before assuming the interim director of athletics title in March of this year.

Throughout her time on WSU's senior leadership team, McCoy has been actively involved with all facets of the department, having a role in all head coaching hires since her arrival, including all current head coaches. McCoy has played a role in each area of Cougar Athletics during her tenure and served in a supervisory capacity for every WSU sport.

Most recently, McCoy served as WSU's interim director of athletics since late March of 2024. In the span of three months in the interim role, McCoy secured the hiring of WSU Men's Basketball Head Coach David Riley, Head Swimming Coach Russ Whitaker and Head Women's Golf Coach Kevin Tucker, extending the contract of Women's Head Basketball Coach Kamie Ethridge, secured a home for baseball and women's swimming through affiliate membership with the Mountain West Conference for the 2024-25 and 2025-26 seasons, and was involved with the Pac-12 Conference' securing a media rights agreement with the CW Network and FOX for the 2024 football season.

Prior to serving in the interim role, McCoy served as senior deputy director of athletics where she was charged with supervising all aspects of WSU's day-to-day operations. McCoy is also the athletic department liaison to WSU's Compliance and Civil Rights office on all matters relating to Title IX.

In 2023, McCoy received the Chancellor's Awards for Leadership, an honor bestowed to top leaders at WSU. McCoy has been active on national and conference committees throughout her time at WSU, most recently, concluding an appointment as the liaison to the Pac-12 Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Coaches.

She has completed positions on several other national and conference committees, including being Vice President of the Pac-12 Executive Committee and serving on the Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament and Nominating Committees, the Pac-12 Diversity Leadership Initiative, the Pac-10 Senior Woman Administrator and Television committees, the Pac-10 Budget, Finance, Compliance and Enforcement committee and past chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Rowing Committee.

Prior to arriving in Pullman, McCoy spent five years on the staff at Portland State University, beginning in 1996 as associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator, and was promoted to senior associate director of athletics in 1998. At PSU, she managed all internal staff and the daily operations of the department, representing the director of athletics as needed. McCoy also supervised men's and women's golf, cross country/track and field, and women's volleyball, soccer, tennis and softball.

From 1989-95, McCoy served in several capacities at the University of Maine, lastly as associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator. At Maine, she supervised men's basketball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's swimming and softball in addition to the athletic business office, ticket office, retail store and cheerleading staff and operations. She took a similar administrative position at Saint Louis University for the 1995-96 academic year.

A Wisconsin native, McCoy earned a bachelor's degree in sports management in 1989 from the University of Massachusetts. While an undergraduate, she worked for the Pittsburgh Penguins professional hockey organization, expanding the club's season ticket base. McCoy also served an internship as the assistant athletic business manager at the University of Connecticut.

McCoy and her husband Brian have two children, daughter Taylor, a former swimming student-athlete at Washington State who holds two school records, and son Jake, a highly recruited high school swimmer who will attend Tennessee in the fall of 2025.

Ike Ukaegbu is in his third year as WSU’s Deputy Director of Athletics after being named to the position in June of 2022.

Ukaegbu leads the group of sport administrators charged with providing day-to-day oversight of WSU’s varsity sports. The group develops consistent policies/procedures, and each sport administrator oversees all aspects of their respective program(s), including public relations, personnel, budgeting, capital projects, fundraising, student-athlete welfare and overall program evaluation.

Ukaegbu serves as sport administrator for two of WSU’s 17 sports – football and men’s basketball. Within his football and men’s basketball duties, he oversees postseason/bowl game selection & planning and nonconference scheduling. He currently serves on the athletics department committee coordinating the design and construction of the Taylor Sports Complex (Indoor Practice Facility) and Champions Center (Academic, Student-Athlete Professional Development and Mental Health Services Facility).

In addition to his senior leadership and sport oversight responsibilities, Ukaegbu supervises several department units, including strength and conditioning, athletic medicine, equipment operations and nutrition.


Ukaegbu was one of ten senior-level athletics administrators throughout the FBS participating in the LEAD1 Fellows Program 2023-2024 cohort. The goal of the Fellows program is to help senior administrators deemed most ready to assume the athletics director position advance their careers through critical industry networking and interview preparation.

Prior to WSU, Ukaegbu served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Compliance at Texas Christian University (TCU) from 2014-2022. While there, he oversaw all areas of TCU’s comprehensive athletics compliance operations for the department’s 22 sport programs, was the sport administrator for the men’s basketball, swimming & diving and rifle programs, and was also a member of the Athletic Director’s Executive Team. Prior to TCU, Ukaegbu held compliance positions at Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU), Boise State, Cal State Fullerton, American University and Florida Atlantic University (FAU).

Throughout the 2020-21 academic year, Ukaegbu was one of 20 individuals who participated in the yearlong NCAA Pathway Program, which prepares senior-level athletics administrators to attain positions as directors of athletics or conference commissioners. He has served on numerous institutional, conference and national committees and organizations including, but not limited to the National Association for Athletics Compliance (NAAC) Convention Committee in which he chaired the Networking Subcommittee, the NCAA Eligibility Center Vice President Search Committee in which he represented the Division I membership and the TCU Chief Inclusion Officer Search Committee in which he represented the athletics department.

In August 2020, he was selected as the TCU Chancellor’s Staff Award recipient, which recognizes a university staff member noted for exemplary service and above and beyond contributions to the welfare of the campus community. Ukaegbu, in collaboration with other athletics department staff members and campus partners, spearheaded the launch of TCU’s Name, Image & Likeness program, “Scaled to Succeed.”

Ukaegbu earned a B.A. in Political Science with a Minor in Pre-Law from the University of Arizona in 2007 and a Master’s of Science in Sports Administration from St. Thomas University (Miami, Fla.) in 2008. He and his wife, Katie, have three children, Devin, Rosie and Spencer.

Dr. Nancy Swanger begins her seventh year as WSU’s Faculty Athletics Representative to the Pac-12 Conference. Dr. Swanger is the Associate Dean and Director of the School of Hospitality Business Management in the Carson College of Business at Washington State University, starting back in 2000.

Cougar football games are broadcast live on the radio throughout the Pacific Northwest via the Washington State Sports Network from Learfield. The 15-station football network reaches from British Columbia to Oregon and across the state of Washington and can be heard worldwide via the internet on the Varsity Network App and Sirius XM Satellite radio. Cougar football broadcasts begin two hours before kickoff, carry through the game and conclude with post-game coach and player interviews and the Coug Talk call-in show.

The Washington State Sports Network also features radio coverage of WSU men’s basketball, baseball, women’s basketball and women’s volleyball, and the Cougar Coaches Show in the fall, winter and spring seasons.

Learfield manages corporate marketing opportunities and on-site promotions at WSU football and basketball games as well as oversees sales for all signage at Gesa Field, Friel Court at Beasley Coliseum and all Cougar competition sites.

Washington State Athletics and Learfield’s Washington State Sports Properties announced Washington State alumnus Chris King as the new “Voice of the Cougs” August 16. King takes over play-by-play duties for Cougar Football, Men’s Basketball and Baseball. King returned to Pullman – where he graduated from the Edward R. Murrow College of Communication in 2009 – after gaining 13 years of Division I broadcasting experience in neighboring Idaho. After two years announcing women’s basketball at Boise State, King became the men’s basketball broadcaster for the Idaho Vandals in 2013 before adding football broadcasting duties in 2021. In addition to his play-by-play role, he also hosted weekly hour-long coaches shows and created and hosted the Vandal Insider Podcast. In addition to his time calling college football and basketball, King also has extensive baseball experience, broadcasting Minor League Baseball for the Tri-City Dust Devils from 2012-2021. He spent three seasons before his time with the Dust Devils as the radio broadcaster for the Wenatchee AppleSox. Away from the radio booth he has worked in a communications role with the West Coast League since 2016, most recently as the league’s deputy commissioner. King has twice been honored as the Idaho Sports-caster of the Year (2017, 2023) by the National Sports Media Association for his work with the Vandals.

ALEX BRINK

Alex Brink begins his seventh year as an analyst on the Cougar football broadcasts. As a student-athlete for WSU, Brink was a three-time All-Pac-10 quarterback from 2004-07, setting school records for career touchdowns and passing yards. He is also the only starting quarterback in school history to lead the Cougars to three Apple Cup victories. The Eugene, Ore. native was also a three-time All-Academic honoree and a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete during his senior year. Brink was selected in the seventh round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Houston Texans, where he played two seasons before spending six seasons in the Canadian Football League.

Brink is co-founder of EForce Sports, a performance training, skill development and fitness company in Portland and has served as a quarterback coach at the Elite11 Quarterback Competition. He has previously been part of the IMG Cougar Roadshow pregame broadcast and was a contributor on NBCSports Northwest as well as ESPN 1080 and Rip City Radio in Portland.

JESSAMYN MCINTYRE

Jessamyn McIntyre returns for her 13th season as a sideline reporter for Cougar football. McIntyre is the assistant program director of Sports Radio 93.3 KJR in Seattle and previously was an executive producer for Q13 FOX in Seattle, was an executive producer for 710 ESPN Seattle (2009-20) and for ESPN Radio in Bristol, Conn. (2005-09). Additionally, she hosted the Seattle Seahawks postgame show on Northwest Cable News and served on the board of directors for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.
