Washburn University is located in Topeka, the capital of Kansas, at 175h and College. Greater Topeka, with a population of 127,000 is served by four railroads, Santa Fe, Union Pacific, Rock Island and Missouri Pacific; one airline, Central, and numerous bus lines and major highways, including the Kansas Turnpike and I-70.

The University encompasses 160 acres located in the heart of Topeka. The campus includes seventeen buildings, two fraternity and four sorority houses, and men's and women's residence halls. Four fraternities are located near the campus. The campus also includes an athletic stadium, a 9-hole golf course, tennis courts, practice football fields, baseball diamond and housing for married students.

Schools to be found in the college are Liberal Arts, Fine Arts, Law, Education, Business, USAF Reserve Officer Training Corps, Evening College and Summer School.

WILLIAM JENNINGS, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

In his first year as chief of the WU athletic program in 1964, Bill Jennings counted a CIC football title, a CIC tennis title and national rankings in football and golf.

Jennings came to Washburn in 1964 from the University of Kansas where he assisted Jack Mitchell for two years. Before that, he had been head coach at the University of Nebraska from 1957-1961.

The 47-year-old football veteran is a native of Norman, Okla. Jennings holds two degrees from the University of Oklahoma, a bachelor of science and a Masters in education. His major field of study was physical education.

As a wing back and end for the "Big Red" during the 1938-39-40 years, he established pass receiving records of 26 in one season; most passes caught in career, 70; and most career receiving yards, 753.

The year prior to WW II service in the marines, Jennings coached at Cushing, Okla., High School. From 1942-46, he served as a captain overseas with the Marine Corps.

In 1946, he joined the late Jim Tatum staff at OU, remaining there until 1953 when he entered the oil business. Jennings returned to coaching in 1956 at Nebraska and one year later took the head job there.

Jennings is married to the former Mary Yetman of Tulsa. They have two daughters, Mrs. Vicki Martin of Kansas City and Jan, a college freshman.

ED LINTA, HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

From line coach of last year's CIC championship team to head coach of the team that will defend that title is Ed Linta's fortune this fall.

Linta, who was responsible for the rock-ribbed WU line during the 1964 title run, came to the Big Blue from Eastern Arizona Juco last fall.

Linta replaces Ellis Rainsberger, who went to KU to join Jack Mitchell's staff.

Linta, an all-conference end his final two years in college, was graduated from Kansas State University in 1955. He has coached seven seasons of football since graduation including a 7-3 season at Petersburg, Va., High School in 1957 after he completed a two-year Army stint. In 1958, he joined Jim LaRue, a former KSU aide, at the University of Arizona where he was assistant until 1962. He joined Lloyd Eaton in 1962 at the University of Wyoming as an assistant and in 1963 he brought Eastern Arizona Juco a 6-4 year.

Linta holds a B.S. degree in physical education from KSU and received his M.A. in guidance and counseling from the University of Arizona. He is presently working toward a Doctorate in guidance at Wyoming U. Besides his coaching duties, Linta is Washburn's assistant Dean of Students.

Linta and his wife Jo Ann, have two children, Sue, 3 months and Cathy 6.

ASSISTANT COACHES

PHIL RAMSEY--Phil joins the Washburn football family after a six-year stint as assistant at the University of Arizona under Jim LaRue.

He was backfield coach of the Wildcats during the 1958-61 period when Blue head coach Ed Linta was line coach.

Ramsey holds a B.A. degree in physical education from the University of Utah and received his Master's degree in health education from Arizona U.

Ramsey was a player-coach in the old Western Professional Football League in 1956-57. His teams posted a 21-1 mark in two years.

Besides his assistant coaching duties with the Blues, he will instruct an advanced football class in the physical education department.

He and his wife, Mary, have two children, Edward 3, and Rosina 1½.

RON HECK--Ron, a 1963 Washburn graduate will work with the backs in 1965. Heck was a co-captain and star of the 1963 Blue footballers. This will be his second year of coaching since he graduated. He was a 4-year letterman.

BOB JONES--Washburn's most inspirational player on the 1964 CIC title squad will work with the backs for Coach Linta this fall. Jones was a three-year letterman as a halfback for the Ichabods. He hails from Blacksburg, South Carolina.

FORECAST

"Barring major injuries and with a little help from transfers and newcomers, Washburn should have another good year." Speaking was Ed Linta, Big Blue coach, on the prospects of a season comparable to 1964's 8-1 performance.

"We will need help at the guard, tackle and fullback positions and depth will be a big problem," Linta continued.

All-CIC tackle Dode Lesser, 6-2, 232 pounds, and Rich Gilkerson, a 6-4, 250-pound newcomer will man the tackles, but back-up help is needed.

The guard situation is the biggest question mark but Chuck Coppola, "one of the best football players, pound for pound, in the area," according to Linta, at 5-7 and 195 lbs., along with Burton Clemons, 5-11, 200 pounds, both lettermen, should solve at least the front-line situation.

Mickey Romano, Washburn's leading ground gainer in 1964 with nearly 500 yards, returns for his junior year, but a second line fullback will have to be taken from reserves.

The center position is one of the strongest, according to Linta. All conference, honorable mention selectee Mike Sipotz is back for his junior year and senior Tom Caray, besides defensive duty, is a top flight back-up.

On the wings, Washburn is solid. All-conference selectee Rod Tiesing and Mike Weinbrecht return and they

will be bolstered by Ray Heniff, a junior from Chicago, Ill., at 6-0, and 210 pounds.

Quarterback should be no problem with three lettermen, seniors Bob Wallace and Tom Huber and junior Jack Wellman, contending for the spot. Wallace and Wellman were plagued with injuries in 1964, but were well in spring practice and should make Huber work if he wants to return as signal caller.

Grades and a professional baseball contract claimed Leonard Rogers and Frank Pickens, respectively, and Bob Hardy ran out of eligibility to make the halfback situation a wide-open affair. Charles White and Pat Scherzer are capable, but Melvin Myricks, a 5-11, 195-pound sophomore could win one of the spots with his blazing speed.

Washburn will operate from a split-T with variations. "We will pass if the situation warrants it," Linta said. The Blues passed only 69 times last year but led the league in rushing with a 231.4 average.

Defense was the key in 1964 and will play a vital role in the 1965 run. Washburn allowed only 47 points in nine games last season and only one touchdown was scored on the ground against the hard-nosed Blue defense.

Linta sees a three-way race among Pittsburg, Omaha and his own Ichabods for the 1965 CIC crown. He places Fort Hays in the darkhorse role with Emporia State, in a rebuilding year, in last.

WASHBURN UNIV. AT FRESNO STATE
Saturday, October 2 8 p.m.

This will be the third meeting in history between WU and Fresno. The Bulldogs will be fresh from a game with Colorado University. Eighteen junior college transfers and 15 returning lettermen make Fresno State a formidable foe. Coach Phil Krueger will field an offensive team that racked up 310 yards per game in 1964. His crop of transfers is so promising that five may grace the first team with perhaps half a dozen on the second. Krueger boasts a great offensive and defensive star in Dave Plumb (195) who has already been drafted by the San Francisco 49ers. Plumb intercepted seven passes in 1964 as a safety man, but his speed and running ability make it probable that Krueger will alternate him with Harry Miller at tailback. Steve Rodriguez (190) at the quarterback slot, right half Stu Horn and fullback Bill Aston (220) fill out the backfield. Larry Reynolds (240) and Richard Lowe (220) and all-conference center Paul War-kentin, bolster the line. Krueger employs a winged-T offense with a lot of power running.

1964 HONORS

Washburn's first clear-cut, CIC football championship since 1930 carried with it a 10th place ranking in the final National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics grid poll. After an opening season loss, the Blues rolled up eight straight victories.

Bob Hardy, the Big Blue's nifty half-back, was named to the first defensive team on the little All-American team of the NAIA. Hardy, who missed the Ichabod opener with a broken nose, averaged 5.9 yards on 77 carries for 496 yards and completed six of nine passes for 156 yards.

Dode Lesser, in his sophomore season, was selected to the Little All-American team as an honorable mention choice at offensive tackle and defensive end. Lesser, a 6-2, 232-pound specimen, was also All-CIC and All-District 10.

OUR NICKNAME

Our nickname, Ichabod, pronounced IK-A-BOD, has long been a mystery to sportswriters and readers and some students. In early 1868, when Deacon Ichabod Washburn of Worcester, Mass., made a contribution of \$25,000 to the college (then Lincoln) the university expressed its gratitude by changing its name to Washburn. Over the years, Washburn's teams and students have been known as the Ichabods, in honor of Washburn's early benefactor. Our athletic teams are also known as the Blues and the Big Blue.
