WASHBURN FACILITIES

Washburn University's 160 acre campus is located in southwest residential Topeka, the capital of Kansas. Five years ago on June 8, 1966, a tornado destroyed nine campus buildings and damaged 14 others, but replacement of lost classroom space was officially completed this past spring with the dedication of the \$2.5 million Learning Resources Center, which was used for the first time this summer. The Center houses the psychology, American civilization, sociology, business administration and economics departments, and the Air Force ROTC.

The \$3.3 million Fine Arts Center, which houses the University Theater and the Elliott White Concert Hall, was dedicated in 1968. A new School of Law building was first used in the 1969-70 school year. A new Heating Plant was added a year ago, and as part of the campus face lifting, more than 800 trees have been planted on campus to replace the 650 lost in the tornado.

The latest addition is the recently completed \$50,000, 55 ft. high Fred C. and Julia Kuehne Belltower, which will house the four bells which pealed Westminster chimes from atop Thomas Gymnasium before it was destroyed in the tornado.

In addition to Moore Bowl, other athletic facilities include Whiting Field House, seven sand-green golf holes, tennis courts, a swimming pool, a practice football field and a baseball diamond.

The university also owns and operates KTWU, Channel 11, the first educational television station in the state.

Two fraternity and two sorority houses are on campus, as is married student housing. There are also three fraternity and three sorority houses located near the campus.

A total enrollment of about 4,800 last fall included 315 in the School of Law and 120 in the Graduate Education Program.

FORECAST

"With the experience we have and the desire and enthusiasm shown last spring and continuing into our fall camp, we are very optimistic and believe we can improve on last year's record. Our squad has set its goals very high, and even though we are not eligible for the conference title, we hope we can be the caliber of club that will participate in some type of post-season game. Of course we must remember that everyone on our schedule has a large number of experienced people returning and will also be improved."

Thus being both optimistic and realistic, first year head coach Bob Noblitt has indicated the football hopes for the 1971 Ichabods. With 28 lettermen returning, including all but five of last year's starters, Washburn does have experience. The two weak areas are at offensive tackle and defensive halfback, where all of the starters, including All-RMAC back Gene McBride, have graduated.

Alternating at defensive safety and at quarterback will be Gene Pettey and Jon Bakalar. Bakalar started at quarterback and Pettey at safety last year but Noblitt expects them to alternate at both positions this year. Transfer Gary Elliott and Pat Hardesty held the defense halfback spots in the spring, but should receive competition from freshmen Ed Clark and Eric Bevis. The Ichabods will be well off at linebacker with veterans Don Makalous, co-captain Ray Smith, Tony Chiaverini and Dave Bowen returning. Smith led the squad in unassisted tackles last year with 69. Lettermen Bob Roepke, Mike Gallant and Steve Ramsey will be back at defensive tackle and should receive competition from freshmen Bruce Tomlinson, and Cooper Johnson.

At defensive end returning starters Marvin Bailey and Tony Lampkins plus letterman from two years ago Mike Westgate, should make end runs a difficult chore for the opposition. Bailey had 42 unassisted

tackles and Lampkins had 30.

The Ichabods have ample returning talent in the offensive backfield with Kevin McCormick and Chat Carruthers at running back and Dale Sample and Rick Harrison at fullback. McCormick was the Washburn workhorse last year, carrying the ball 212 times for 690 yds. and a 3.3 yd. average.

With flanker Alan Dressman (30 catches, 877 yds.) and split end Irv McCoy (81 catches, 859 yds.), Noblitt has back the two leading pass receivers in Washburn history. At tight end rugged George Marvin (16 catches, 234 yds.), will be back catching an occasional pass but mainly doing what he does best, making contact with the opponents; he should be challenged by junior Tom Williams. Andy Marquardt will be back along with letterman Bob Baer at guard. Filling the vacated offensive tackle spots during spring practice were Jack Halula and letterman Bryce Cripps, but the positions will be open to challenges by other returning squadmen plus freshmen Richard Rogers and Ed Cowan. Center will be manned by the other co-captain, Lee VanRiper, who Noblitt considers, along with Ray Smith, as the Washburn All-RMAC candidates. Smith led the Ichabods in unassisted tackles last year with 69.

The punting will again be done by Bakalar, who averaged 36.5 yds. per kick. Russ Hill, who last year set a new university field goal mark of 43 yds., will be doing PAT's and field goals; he was 18-22 in PAT attempts last year.

On offense the Ichabods will place more emphasis on the option plays and the play-action-pass, while adjusting the offense against different opponents. With the strong potential for a winning season Noblitt summed up the squad feelings by saying, "I am very anxious to get the season started, to get out on the field and get the contact going."

-FORECAST-

The Vikings return 28 lettermen including 17 starters from an 8-2 team that averaged 31.2 points and won the MCAU championship. This is the Vikings' first year in the Heart of America Collegiate Conference and they have another potential champion.

Only the interior of the defensive line will be manned by inexperienced sophomores, but elsewhere the defense, led by linebacker Bill Schuchardt, is sound. Three 220 pound sophomores are competing for the defensive tackle positions.

On offense there is a surplus of talent with honorable mention All-NAIA wide receiver Dan Kratzer, All-MCAU center John Morris, and All-MCAU running back Tony Chandler heading the list. Kratzer led the team in scoring with 13 T. D.'s and Chandler averaged 78.7 yds. per game rushing. Fullback Dewey Buck led the rushing with 731 yds. for a 5.2 yd. average.

Guiding the offensive attack is quarterback Bruce Ayers who led in total offense with 142 yds. per game and threw 13 touchdown passes.

-FORECAST-

The Cavaliers 5-5 record in 1970 included three losses by fewer than five points and they will be trying to turn those losses in close games into victories this year. Capable of scoring points, Matt May's offensive unit averaged 22.8 points per game.

The entire offensive backfield returns intact in addition to 14 other lettermen. Don Kremer became the Cavaliers' Most Valuable Player after replacing Randy Jakious, who was injured in the Washburn game last year, but Jakious will be back this year and Kremer will probably be moved to safety. Leon Kremer may be moved from his starting running back position to split end with leading receiver Dennis Baska (28 catches, 532 yds.) moved to flanker. Leading rusher Ken Williams (172 carries, 848 yds.) also returns. The interior of the offensive line will remain the same with Dennis Meehan at center and Pat McGlynn and Tamara Walker as guards.

Defensively the Cavaliers will find it difficult to replace All-District 10 linebacker Jerry Marks as well as two All-KCAC safeties.

-FORECAST-

Despite losing do-everything player Sam Singleton, who broke all Wayne rushing records as a tailback and sometimes played defense, the Wildcats should have another potential NCC champion as 28 lettermen return plus some outstanding transfers who are expected to fill vacated spots.

Fullback Jerry Luedtke and wingback Greg Walker, the top pass receiver for two years, are also gone. Juniors Mel Tarpley, Mike Wise and Freshman Bill Volk are expected to battle for the backfield positions. Quarterback Marty Going is back for his third season as the starting Wildcat quarterback. However, transfer Jim Kearney is expected to play some too. Replacing four starters on the offensive line will be a problem.

Defensively Wayne will be strong with only two regulars missing. Back are Mike Wynn, senior defensive tackle, 6-1, 230, who has twice been elected the most valuable defensive player, and defensive halfbacks Charles Ross, Charles Wendt and Pat Holston. Place kicker Dan Ernst gives the Wildcats close to a sure thing on PAT's as he kicked 30 of 32 last year.

Since a 7-4 season is considered a poor one for the Cardinals, they will be anxious to improve it this year, but only 6 offensive and 6 defensive starters return, so sophomores will have to take up the slack.

Coach Jim Nelson, whose three-season record at Jewell is 25-7, seeks a better balanced attack this year. To do that he must first find replacements for quarterback Danny Brown and fullback Bill Cantrell. Top back prospects are two-year part time starter Tom Geer, Rick Atha, who has clocked 9.9 for the 100 yd. dash, and Linzy Teegarden. Two experienced linemen, 6-3, 195 pound tackle Roger Meers and 6-2, 200 pound guard John Wilkinson, should be able to open holes for any back.

Team co-captains for 1971 are four year starter Tom Crossett at linebacker, and 2nd team All-MCAU offensive guard Dave Smith.

With record setting sophomore quarter-back Jonathan Douglas again leading the way, the Tigers should be an improved club this year. Douglas tied or broke six school passing records as a freshman last year, and this year 26 other lettermen return along with him to give Hays an experienced team.

Sophomore split end John Woodworth was fifth in the RMAC last year in pass receiving with 40 catches for 700 yds. and a 70.0 per game average. Junior fullback Steve Crosby gained 889 yds. on the ground in 1970 but may not be available because of Army Reserve duty. Centering the ball to Douglas will be All-District 10 Mike Butler. So with the passing attack and some good transfer running backs, the triple option should go.

All RMAC corner back Lionel Jenkins leads a defense which should be improved.

Although new head coach Jim Frazier had only 10 days of spring practice with his new team, he believes that a new pro offensive system, led by school record setting quarterback Ray Harding, should put more points on the scoreboard. One of the people most likely to score those points is 1970's leading rusher Larry Ping. A new passing target for Harding will be transfer tight end 6-4, 225 pound Tenon Jackson, who was rated the best performer in spring practice.

The defense will be led by junior corner-back Larry Galbraith and by junior college transfer John Lukas who at 195 pounds still has excellent quickness for his linebacker position.

Frazier was the head coach at Hastings College last year where his club had a 7-1 record, the best in 16 years at Hastings. He looks for the Lions defense to be the key to their success in 1971, when he will have the same task that he did at Hastings--turning a 2-8 team into a winner.

The Indians expect 48 returning players including 32 lettermen and 50 newcomers, only five of which are junior college transfers. The small number of transfers gives some idea as to the strength the Indians have returning. "Although injuries were a problem last year," says Coach Thrower, "we resultingly have experience at practically all positions this year."

Defensively the Indians are touted to have one of the best units in the school's history. The defense is led by 6-2, 230 pound guard Jack Huelskamp, 6-0, 200 pound linebacker Doug Mackey and defensive back Richard Lewis, who was 2nd team All-NAIA.

Fullback Eddie Moss led the team in rushing and scoring last year and was elected to the All-NAIA squad. Also back is flanker Art Miller who caught 27 passes for 488 yards. Sophomore quarter back Lance Brune led the team in total offense with 1273 yards passing and 83 rushing, and he has another sophomore, running back Rich Attig who led the conference in yards averaged per carry with 6.2, to hand the ball to again this year.

Former Washburn head coach Bud Elliott has only 12 lettermen back from last year's 1-8 team and the outlook is for a young and inexperienced football squad whose success will depend on how quickly it can adjust to Elliott's system.

Top returnees are running back Bryan Schurle, a 6-0, 190 pound senior who runs the 40 in 4.7 seconds and is a top pass receiver, 6-2, 220 pound offensive guard Mike Fox, and senior co-captain Tim Miller, a defensive tackle.

Seven offensive and 6 defensive starters are among 28 returning lettermen, but the Indians will be hard pressed to replace quarterback Rocco Gonnella who threw for over 4,700 yards in his career, and All-RMAC running back Phil Wise. Coach Caniglia has installed a new "Inverted Y" formation which is designed to provide the club with greater balance than before.

Top returning ball carrier is fullback Bill Walker, who gained 559 yards for a 4.3 yard average. Charles McWhorter, who was the top kick-off and punt returner, is expected to replace Wise. Also back are two quality pass receivers, Mark Poole, 33 catches, 543 yards, 6 TD's, and Dan Crnkovich, 26 catches, 386 yards, 5 TD's.

The defense will be inexperienced with only two returnees, defensive end Bill Kozel and linebacker Lou King.

Those covering Washburn University football games will receive both half-time and final statistics along with a scoring summary each half.

The University Relations staff will phone beeper reports to radio and TV stations desiring them, following all home games and most road contests. The staff will also file game stories on request to newspapers.

With advance notice, halftime interviews with WU officials can be arranged.

PRESS FACILITIES

Washburn's press box provides space for two field phone booths, two scouting booths, one clock booth, and three broadcasting areas. There are also large areas for news writers and photographers. The box has two restrooms, heating, and air conditioning.

PRESS BOX RESERVATIONS

Requests for press box space should be made through the University Relations Office at least one week prior to the scheduled game.

STADIUM REMODELING

Fans purchasing tickets in the reserved seat area between the 35 yard lines on either side of Moore Bowl will find new aluminum-plank seating and concrete walkways. The old wooden-plank seats were removed this summer and the new aluminum ones installed at a cost of \$30,000.

This past spring the center two-thirds of the playing section of the field was resodded and the turf should be in excellent condition this fall.

The Ichabod Club assists the athletic program of Washburn University by providing funds for scholarships to student athletes who must maintain the high academic standards of the university.

HEAD COACH - BOB NOBLITT

Bob Noblitt became the 29th head coach in Washburn's history on January 1, 1971, after two seasons as first assistant in charge of both the offensive and defensive lines.

He was an All-CIC and All-NAIA guard at Washburn in 1964 and began his coaching career in 1965 at Claflin High School, Claflin, Kansas. In 1966-67, he was an assistant coach at Southern Illinois University, where he finished work for his master's degree in health education. The head coach at Southern Illinois at the time was Noblitt's former coach at Washburn, Ellis Rainsberger.

Noblitt moved from Southern Illinois to Yankton College, Yankton, South Dakota, where he was wrestling coach and defensive line coach in football from 1967 to 1969.

He began his football career at Kansas State University under Doug Weaver, but after starting all the games in his sophomore season, did not feel that he was part of the program and subsequently dropped out of school for a year and a half. It was Rainsberger who urged him to return to school--Washburn this time--and to football.

Noblitt sees three particular groups benefiting from the football program at Washburn. "First, I believe the program builds character and leadership in the students who participate. Second, the games provide the students and alumni a place to come together whereby they can achieve unity. And third, the program is a benefit to the university in general, for it is one of the most publicized areas that the university has."

The football philosophy which Noblitt employs will not be appreciably different from that of last season. "We will put stress on the option game and the play-action pass and also maintain the same defensive alignments which we had last year."

BACKFIELD COACH - LARRY ELLIOTT

Elliott, former All-CIC performer in both football and basketball for Washburn, is in his fifth year on the coaching staff. He graduated from Washburn in 1959 and received his master's from KU in 1966.

He is the second leading passer the university has produced with 1,934 yards, and also holds the record for best completion average for one game with eight of nine for 111 yards.

Elliott coached all sports at Silver Lake, Kansas from 1959 to 1966. He coached two baseball teams to the state tournament and his football teams won the Mideast League title in 1959, 61, 63 and 1966. He also serves as head baseball coach at Washburn and coached the 1967 Ichabods to a 21-8 mark and the CIC championship.

He and his wife, the former Jayne Bronson (AB'58), have two children.

LINE COACH - DAVE NOBLITT

Dave Noblitt's arrival at Washburn gives the Ichabods a double threat--two brothers on the same coaching staff. Dave will assume Bob's former duties as head line coach.

He was a second team All-Big Eight selection as a defensive guard under Bus Mertes at Kansas State in 1959. He holds both the bachelor's and master's degrees from Kansas State.

After graduation he was all sports coach at Cullison High, Cullison, Kansas for two years. From 1965 to 1969 he was head football and wrestling coach at Manhattan Junior High. For the past two years he has been assistant football and head wrestling coach at Raytown South High, in Kansas City, Missouri.

Dave and his wife Jean have four boys.

DEFENSIVE COACH - CLAY JOHNSON

Johnson will be in his second year as the defensive secondary coach. He is a 1966 graduate of Ottawa University where he was the all-sports trainer for the Braves for four years.

He was the head coach at Winfield Junior High School, Winfield, Kansas, for one year before traveling east to become the defensive coordinator at Robert E. Fitch High School in Groton, Connecticut, for three years.

In addition to coaching and duties as an instructor in the physical education department, Johnson is also completing work for his master's degree in physical education at the University of Kansas.

He and his wife Carol have one daughter.

ABOUT THE RMAC

The second oldest active collegiate organization of its kind in the United States, the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (founded in 1909) entered a new era on April 30, 1968, as a result of its merging with the Central Intercollegiate Conference of Kansas and Nebraska and adding six independent colleges and universities.

On that date, the RMAC expanded to fifteen members, which were assigned to two geographical divisions over a five-state area including Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Utah, and New Mexico.

Conference competition is held in nine sports: football, cross-country, basketball, wrestling, swimming, baseball, track and field, tennis, and golf. Championship playoffs are held annually between the division champions in football and basketball, and Conference-wide tournaments or meets are held in the other seven sports.

WASHBURN ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Washburn's Athletic Hall of Fame was established in the fall of 1970 with the induction of the first four members. It is designed to honor those individuals who have gained recognition and fame for themselves and the university as a result of their endeavors and accomplishments while a student-athlete, coach or director of athletics.

The candidate must have been one who:
(1) distinguished himself as an athlete, coach or director of athletics at Washburn;
(2) unless deceased, will be personally present to accept the award; and (3) if an athlete, must have completed his athletic competition ten years prior to selection.

The first four members of the Hall of Fame are Dr. Marvin "Mal" Stevens, of New York City; Charles "Dee" Erickson, of Topeka; Warren "Waddy" Shaw, of Topeka; and Clarence "Curly" Edwinson, of Austin, Texas. Stevens lettered in five sports just after World War II and then transferred to Yale University, where he was chosen on the 1923 All-American team. Erickson captained Ichabod basketball teams in the early twenties and later served Washburn as a coach and athletic director. Shaw captained the powerhouse football teams of the Ernie Bearg era in the late twenties and early thirties, while Edwinson rewrote the record books in the early thirties as a football halfback and track star.

In January the five members of the 1925 National AAU Basketball Champions and their coach, Arthur C. "Dutch" Lonborg, of Lawrence, became the second group of inductees. Members of the 1925 team were Clarence "Kid" Breithaupt, of Oklahoma City, Okla., captain; Arthur "Art" Brewster, of Leawood, one of three All-Americans on the team; Gerald "Jerry" Spohn, of Kearney, Neb., an All-American center; Lambert "Butch" Lowe, of Waterloo,

Iowa, the third All-American on the team; and Orson "Shorty" McLaughlin, of Topeka, a four-year letterman for the Ichabods.

Usually, the Hall of Fame members are announced at Homecoming.

WHAT'S AN ICHABOD

The name Ichabod is derived from the first name of Ichabod Washburn, an early benefactor of the university. Until 1938 there were no particular characteristics associated with Mr. Ichabod and there was no graphic representation of him (see inside cover). During the 1937-38 school year, the editors of Kaw, the university yearbook, decided that such items were important to the university and began to accept suggestions for a design of Mr. Ichabod. The design which was accepted was drawn by J. Bradbury Thompson, (BA '34).

The following explanatory material accompanied Ichabod's first representation in the Washburn Kaw: "He has courage and enthusiasm as shown by his brisk walk. He is democratic and courteous, for he tips his hat as he passes. Sincere in his search for truth and knowledge, he studiously carries a book under his arm. His friendly smile makes you like him. He is neatly dressed and he fits well into his generation.. ..but he adapts himself with equal ease to any change or any age."

MAY STAND FOREVER

In 1948 Washburn's great Leroy Harmon attempted 80 passes, completed 32 for 484 yards. But more important, none of the passes were intercepted by the opposition which is a record that may be hard to beat.

Second year track coach Galen Mote feels it is essential for Washburn to have a good cross country schedule if it is to have a competitive track program, and after an encouraging response last year, anticipates continued improvement in 1971.

"Running is like any other sport," Mote says, "to compete successfully you must devote time to practice all during the year and not just begin a few days before the first meet." Mote points to two Washburn performers of last year who, after participating in cross country, improved their times considerably. "Marshall Spade, who will serve as student assistant this year, lowered his best time by 5 seconds in the mile and in the process tied the school record. Dave McKee improved his 3-mile time by 6 seconds in the first meet."
