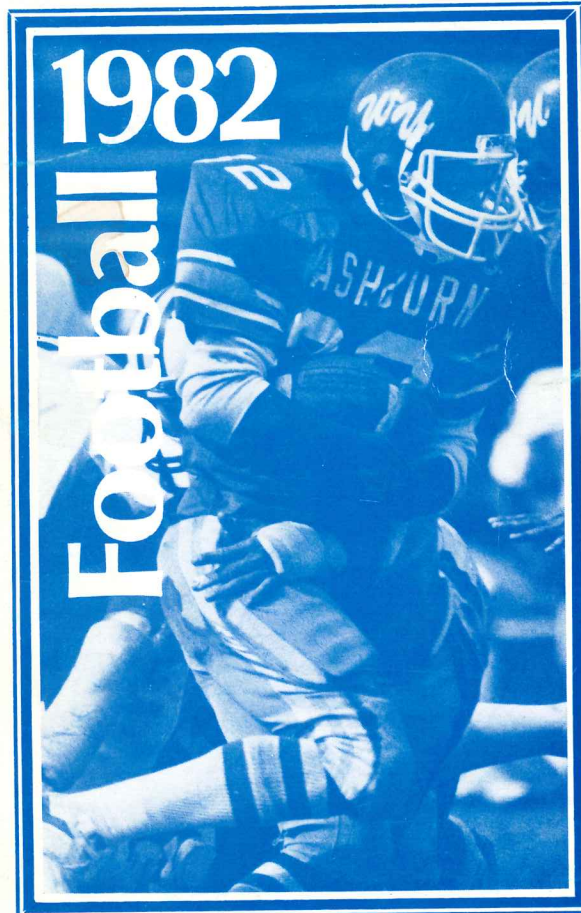
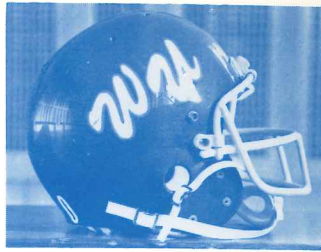

Washburn University

Washburn University of Topeka, America's only municipal university, enrolls approximately 6,000 students from the Topeka area, 50 states and 26 foreign countries. It was founded in 1865 as Lincoln College. The college's name was changed to Washburn in November 1868 in recognition of a timely \$25,000 gift from Deacon Ichabod Washburn of Worcester, Massachusetts.

Despite plaques, droughts and financial woes, Washburn expanded through the late years of the 19th Century and early 20th Century, building dormitories, a gymnasium, and library, and establishing a School of Fine Arts, a School of Law, and a School of Medicine.

Sound management brought Washburn through the drought and depression years in relatively good financial shape, and the school built the Mulvane Art Museum, Benton Residence Hall, and Whiting Field House. Even so, resources were greatly depleted, and the school's Board of Trustees thought it best that Washburn transfer its assets to the city of Topeka. By a vote of four to one, Topeka voters established a municipal university in April, 1941.

In January, 1952, the Board of Regents of the University changed the school's name for the first time to Washburn University of Topeka. Kansas state aid, began in 1961 based on student credit hours, was increased in 1965.

On June 8, 1966, a tornado swept through the campus and completely destroyed eight buildings and extensively damaged sixteen others. But, recovery began immediately and by 1971 most buildings and laboratory facilities had either been replaced or enlarged, and construction had been completed on a new \$3.5 million fine arts center, a \$1.5 million law school building, and a \$2.5 million learning resources center.

A \$750,000 School of Law addition was completed in the fall of 1977, and in May of 1978 the University dedicated the \$2.5 million Mabee Library, located west of Moore Bowl. Construction is slated to begin soon on a \$5.8 million allied health center which will provide space for new programs. The project will complete the restoration of the campus from the 1966 tornado.

Washburn's varied academic program designed to meet the needs of all its students, includes: a college of Liberal Arts and Sciences, which is comprised of education, science, social science and humanities, nursing and criminal justice areas; a School of Business offering majors in finance, management, marketing, economics, accounting, computer science and general business which will also soon be offering a Master of Business Administration degree; a School of Law, providing a three-year professional program for approximately 600 students; a graduate school, awarding a master's in elementary education or elementary school administration; and Master of Arts degree in Clinical Psychology; a continuing education program offering regular college courses during the day and evening, study discussion groups, seminars and television courses.

Washburn's KTWU, Channel 11, the first educational television station in the state, and the Washburn Review, the weekly student newspaper, give students practical experience in communication arts.

The 400 full-time and 100 part-time staff, faculty and administrators, along with the 605 students employed by Washburn University strive to make their school a "center for cultural life, a community for scholars, a patron of the arts, and source of special knowledge and skill for the benefit of the community."

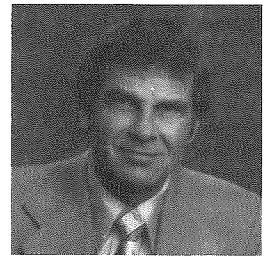

Athletic Director Glenn Cafer

Glenn Cafer will be serving his fourth year as Washburn University's Athletic Director. Before moving into his position as Athletic Director, Cafer was head coach of the Icabod basketball team from 1967-79. Cafer also had eight years of coaching experience prior to his transfer to Washburn.



Cafer began his 20-year coaching career at Washington (Missouri) High School. He was head coach at Moorhead State College (Minnesota) during the 1961-62 season. He also was head coach at Mehlville High School in St. Louis, Missouri and an assistant at Drake University and the University of Missouri. His overall coaching mark is 338-187 (.644).

Cafer's Icabod basketball teams have: played in the NAIA National Tournament three times; won three District 10 championships (in five attempts); and won three conference titles. Cafer's overall record at Washburn is 172-145 (.543).

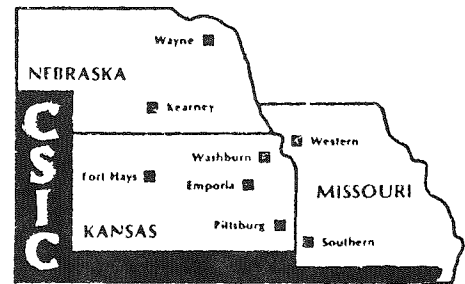
A native of Wright City, Missouri, Cafer attended Moberly Junior College and received his Bachelor's degree from Northeast Missouri State in 1953 and his Master's in 1956. He served in the Marine Corps from 1953 to 1955.

Cafer also served as Washburn's golf coach. He was named the 1974 NAIA District 10 Golf Coach of the Year after the Icabods won the district title and placed fourth in the national championship tournament. The 1975 squad repeated as District 10 champions.

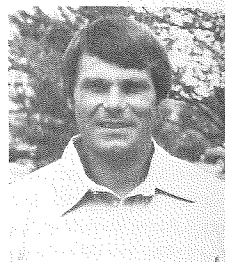

**Head Coach and Offensive Coordinator
Glenn Jagodzinske**

Glenn Jagodzinske heads into his second year as head football coach at Washburn. A year of experience in the CSIC Conference has also provided him time to evaluate and improve both the personnel and organization of the Washburn Football Program, and Jagodzinske looks for an improved 1982 edition of IChabod Football.



A native of Welcome, Minnesota, Jagodzinske earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1969 from Westmar College with majors in English and Physical Education. He received his Master of Arts Degree from the University of Northern Iowa in 1973 with a major in Physical Education.

Following a six-year stint in high school coaching at Hubbard, Iowa, and Sheldon, Iowa, Jagodzinske moved to the college ranks as head football and track coach at Huron College in South Dakota in 1975. Three years later, he returned to his alma mater, Westmar, as head football and track coach and mounted a rebuilding campaign that produced 22 wins and 8 losses in three seasons and saw Westmar enter the NAIA Division II top twenty ranks several times.

Jagodzinske joined the Washburn Athletic Staff in January, 1980, and began the task of restoring IChabod football fortunes. The 1981 season record of 3 wins and 7 losses put his overall collegiate coaching record at 35-32-1. Enthusiasm and improvement have been the trademarks of his IChabod football program thus far, and 1982 should yield positive results of the year-and-a-half of behind the scenes work that he and his staff have been involved in.

Coach Jagodzinske's wife, Brenda, works in Continuing Education at Washburn and their children, Dana 14, and Scott, 8, are students in the Shawnee Heights School District.

Offensive Line Coach Terry Szucs

Terry Szucs is in his second year as offensive line coach at Washburn University. Szucs received his B.S. in 1975 at Lock Haven State College, Lock Haven, Pennsylvania while playing four successful years as offensive guard. In 1977 he served as graduate assistant at South Dakota State and earned a masters degree in Physical Education. Prior to his move to Washburn, he coached the offensive lines at Westmar College, LeMars, Iowa, under Head Coach, Glenn Jagodzinske and coached one year at Wayne State College, Wayne, Nebraska. He has also accepted the responsibilities of Coordinating the Strength and Conditioning Program.



Defensive Coordinator Coach Mark Clark

Mark Clark is in his first year as a Defensive Coordinator at Washburn University. Clark made the move to Topeka just before spring practice. He comes to us from Western Kentucky University, where he received his master's and served as a full time assistant.



Clark's undergraduate work was completed at Cornell College, where he set a school career rushing record while twice earning second team Academic All-American and first team All Conference honors.

Receiver Coach Pat Sullivan

Pat Sullivan coaches the receivers for the IChabods. An outstanding receiver during his own college career, Sullivan served as assistant receiver coach in 1981 and assumed full responsibility in his area last spring.

A resident of Overland Park, Ks., Sullivan graduated from high school in Denison, Iowa, where he enjoyed an extremely fine athletic career, earning All-State honors in football, basketball and baseball his senior year. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Buena Vista College in 1979, majoring in Political Science, English and Economics, and continued his athletic success as a three-year unanimous choice All-Conference wide receiver. He also was selected M.V.P. in football and served as co-captain of both the football and basketball teams in his senior year.

Sullivan is currently in his final year of law school at Washburn. He will graduate in the spring of 1983 and plans to pursue a career in labor law or corporate law.

Defensive Line Coach George Bistline

George Bistline joins the Washburn Football Staff this fall as defensive line coach. A veteran coach, teacher, and sports official in Topeka, Bistline is coaching at Washburn while teaching at Highland Park High School.

Coach Bistline earned his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts Degrees at Kansas State University and has done additional graduate work at several other universities. He coached and taught in high schools at Highland, Harper, and Leavenworth, Kansas, before coming to Topeka. For the past 19 years he has been a coach and teacher at Highland Park High School. He has coached in football,

wrestling and track at Highland Park, and also does extensive officiating in wrestling and basketball in northeast Kansas. His experience is a valuable addition to the Ichabod grid staff.

George and his wife, Bev, have one son, Greg, 28, who is currently on the athletic staff at the University of Texas as academic counselor to the Longhorn basketball program.

Defensive Secondary Coach Mark Percy

Mark Percy joins the Washburn football staff this fall as secondary coach. An Overland Park, Kansas, native, Percy is the son of veteran high school mentor, Glenn Percy, presently the head coach at Wichita West High School.

Percy graduated from Shawnee Mission West High School in 1975. He earned All-Conference football honors there as a senior and played in the Kansas City Big Brothers All-Star game. He attended Independence Community College and played football there for one year, then transferred to Allen County Community College to try his hand at baseball. He then attended William Jewell College and played football there for one year.

Following a two-year period of working and serving as an assistant coach with his father at Coffeetown High School, Percy is returning to college this fall to complete his Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education and Coaching. He is looking toward a career as a high school football coach upon graduation from Washburn.

1982 ICHABOD FOOTBALL PREVIEW

1982 should be a year of improvement in Washburn University football. The quality of player personnel is better, partly because of experience and partly because of transfers in several key positions. The addition of spring practice has provided the coaching staff additional teaching time.

Gone via graduation are All American Honorable Mention nose guard, Bob Leonard and All Conference offensive tackle, Dave Pitsch along with starters Mike Chiaverini (FB), Steve Pokrywka (TE) and Keith Brown (DE).

How much better will the 1982 edition of Washburn University football be than the 3/7 campaign of 1981? By all indications, much better. The player personnel is bigger and stronger at most positions. Several of last year's young starters are one year more experienced, and junior college transfers boost the talent at several key positions. The reinstatement of spring practice has provided additional teaching and evaluation time for the coaching staff. All-in-all, the 1982 team should be one year better in every way than its 1981 counterpart. Hopefully the improvement will show on the scoreboard and in the record book.

Here is a look at the 1982 squad by position:

OFFENSE

CENTER: Juco transfers Brad Steinle (6'4", 245) from Independence and Roger Stous (6'0", 230) from Fort Scott

will do battle for the starting position. Stous is also a fine long snapper. Freshman Joe Stringer from Topeka Hayden High School will provide quality depth.

GUARD: Senior co-captain Fred Palenske (6'2", 225) is the leader here. Sophomores Dennis Hickey (6'1", 225) and Dan Lawson (6'3", 220) and junior Curt Georgeson (6'3", 215) will battle for the other starting position.

TACKLE: Lack of size and experience is a concern here, but senior Russ Thogmartin (6'4", 240) and sophomore Jim Sardo (6'4", 245) had very good spring seasons, and junior transfer Paul Helliker (6'2", 240) from Fort Scott will battle for starting honors as well. Tom Cifrino, (6'2", 240) a transfer from Dean Junior College, Mass., will be a very welcome addition and also has an excellent chance to start.

TIGHT END: Senior Aron Fass (6'2", 215) made the move from defensive back to tight end in the spring. He adapted very well, and has the strength, speed and hands to be an excellent tight end. Junior Stu Smith (6'0", 210) will push hard and play a key role in double tight end situations. Sophomores Dan Remboldt (6'3", 205) lack experience, but have ability to help as well.

WIDE RECEIVER: A lot of new faces will be present here. Returnees Rick Davey (6'0", 185) and Mark Beffort (5'11", 160) saw a lot of action last year and both started some games in 1981. Juco transfer Steve Hardesty (5'11", 180) from Butler County and junior Rick Nichols (6'1", 180) will challenge very hard. All are very adequate blockers and pass receivers.

RUNNING BACK: Speed and finesse will be the forte as seniors Ron Davis (6'0", 180) and Wes Warrick (5'10", 170) both run super well in the open field. Transfer Robert Bailey (5'10", 180) from Garden City Juco and all-state freshman Craig Darnell (5'10", 190) from Derby are quality additions and sophomores Troy Grindol (5'10", 180) and D. D. Criglar (5'7", 160) will provide depth and may challenge as the season goes on.

QUARTERBACK: Juco transfer Jeff Leiker (5'11", 180) had a fine spring, and adapted well to the Washburn Veer Offense. Mark Elliott (6'1", 175) started most of last year and is a fine passer. Freshmen Eric Daniels (6'0", 175) of Perry-Lecompton High School and James Gambrell (6'2", 175) of Tampa, Fla. bring fine credentials and should provide quality depth at the key position on offense.

DEFENSE

NOSEGUARD: Junior Bill Middendorf (6'1", 235) leads all candidates here. Senior Ben Short (6'0", 215) and sophomore Ken Boyd (6'1", 220) provide depth and additional help is needed from newcomers.

TACKLE: Senior Roger McVay (6'3", 235) returns as a starter and juco transfer Dave Rupert (6'1", 250) from Dean Junior College, Mass., has adapted well and will be a frontrunner. Junior John Jelovic (6'2", 240) has moved over from offensive tackle and should be a factor as the season progresses.

OUTSIDE LINEBACKER: This area is a strong one, and the competition for starting berths should be fierce. Senior co-captain John McGivern (6'1", 220) is the front-runner while junior Mark Lutz (6'3", 220) and senior Luke

Schmille (6'2", 210) will do battle for the other starting spot. Sophomores Mark Remboldt (6'3", 215) and Jay Jay Yaws (6'2", 215) provide excellent depth.

INSIDE LINEBACKER: Little depth but great quality characterize this area. Seniors Tom Luedke (6'2", 215) and Matt Cahill (5'11", 200) and sophomore Tony Essman (6'0", 210) are all solid players. All three started during the 1981 season. Injuries could be very damaging here, but the addition of quality freshmen will provide insurance as the season progresses.

SECONDARY: Junior free safety Paul Silovsky (6'3", 210) who earned All-CSIC honors last year, senior strong safety Dave Silva (5'11", 185) and sophomore corner-back R. D. Helt (5'11", 185) return as starters, although all three are coming back from injuries incurred last season or in the off-season. Transfers Kevin Beard (6'0", 180) from Coffeyville and A. C. Poynter (5'9", 175) from Butler County add needed experience. Senior Kyle Pierce (5'10", 175) and sophomore Larry Cox (6'1", 185) and several excellent freshmen candidates will add depth to the secondary. The degree of recovery of Silovsky and Helt and the development of the freshmen candidates will be key factors for excellence.

The first unit on offense and the first unit on defense should be solid in terms of size, talent and experience. Depth will be a problem at every position, and freshmen will be first-line back-ups at several positions. Developing our young players and avoiding injury to starters are key factors in shaping a successful season. It is also very important for us to experience winning in the early part of the season.

What's An Ichabod?

The name Ichabod was derived from the first name of Ichabod Washburn, an early benefactor of the University. Until 1938 there was not a graphic representation or any particular characteristics associated with Mr. Ichabod. During the 1937-38 school year, the editors of KAW, the university yearbook, decided that such items were important to the University and began to accept suggestions for a design of Mr. Ichabod. The adopted design was drawn by Bradbury Thompson (BA '34).



The following explanatory material accomplished Ichabod's first representation in the Washburn Kaw: "He has courage and enthusiasm as shown by his brisk walk. He is democratic and courteous, for he tips his hat as he passes. Sincere in his search for truth and knowledge, he studiously carries a book under his arm. His friendly smile makes you like him. He is neatly dressed and he fits well into his generation...but he adopts himself with equal ease to any change or any age."
