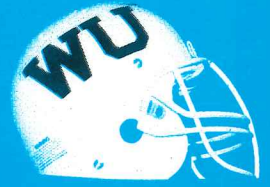
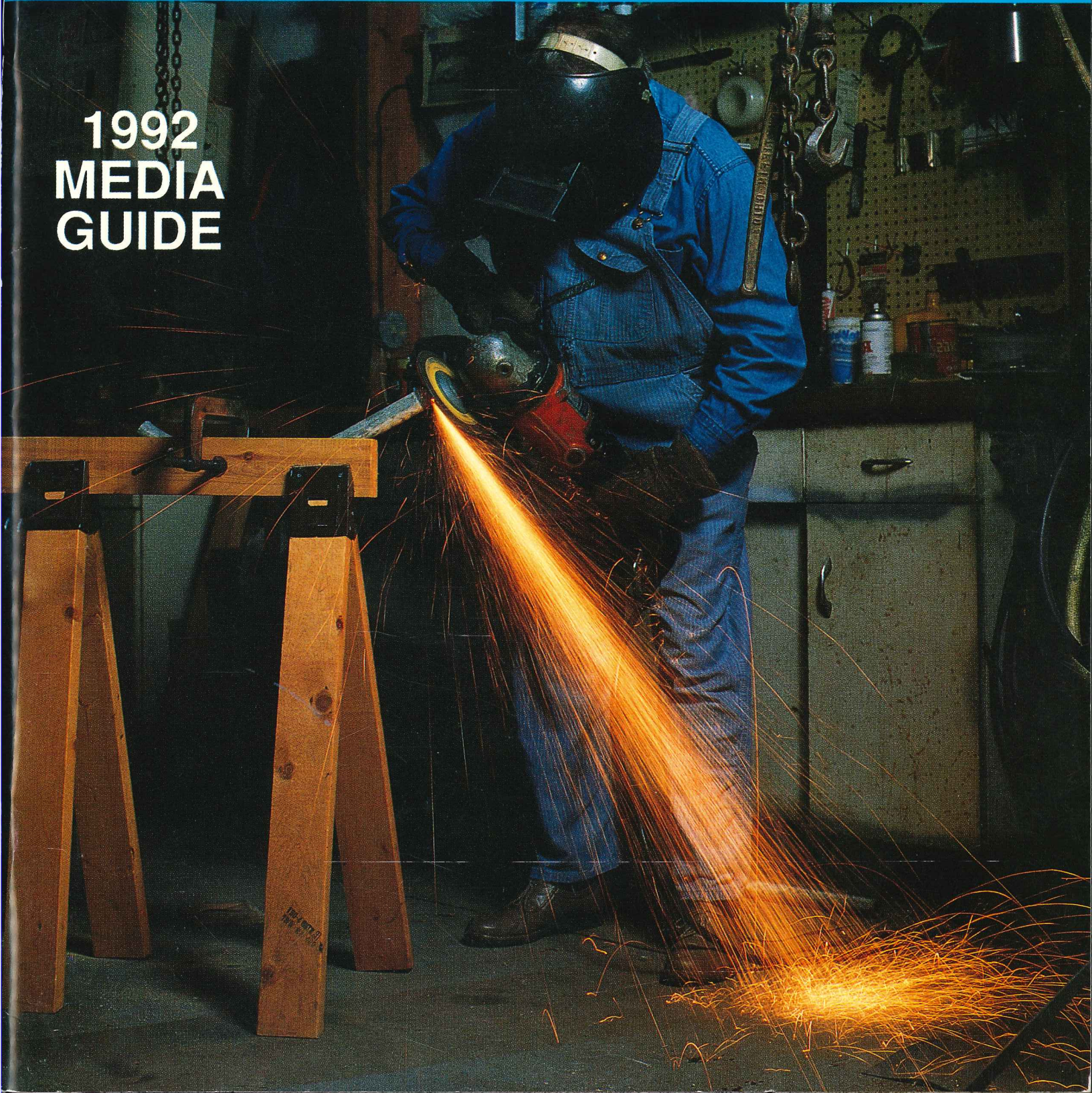

Washburn University, founded in 1865, is one of the oldest and largest universities in Kansas. As an urban and regional institution, Washburn serves many of the educational needs of Topeka, Shawnee County and the state of Kansas.

The university's success is measured in part by the achievements of its graduates who include a Nobel Prize winner in medicine, members of the U.S. Congress, members of the Kansas State Legislature, numerous judges who have graduated from the law school as well as many leaders in business, education, communications and service.

ACADEMICS

Washburn has traditionally provided quality education. Students may choose from more than 70 degree programs within the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Business, School of Law, School of Nursing, or the School of Applied Studies.

Washburn prides itself on having quality and experienced faculty. More than two-thirds of the Washburn general faculty hold a doctorate or the highest degree available in their discipline. Professors, not graduate assistants, teach in the classrooms at all academic levels.

Students enjoy modern classrooms and

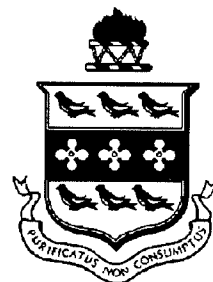
educational facilities. Since a tornado devastated the campus in 1966, more than \$43 million have been spent to construct new buildings and laboratories and to purchase new equipment and library holdings. The result is a modern campus with a rich heritage, conducive to living and learning.

ATHLETICS

Washburn has continued its strong athletic tradition during the university's recent move to NCAA Division II. Washburn teams now compete for NCAA championships as a member of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA).

Washburn currently offers intercollegiate competition for men in the sports of baseball, basketball, football, golf and tennis. Women compete in basketball, softball, tennis and volleyball.

Success has been obtained by both teams and individuals. Washburn swept the MIAA's postseason basketball titles in 1991-92, sending both the Ichabods and Lady Blues to the NCAA national tournament. The appearance was the first for the Ichabods, who reached the round of 16. The Lady



HOW WASHBURN STUDENT-ATHLETES COMPARE

Since 1983, 71 percent of the student-athletes who received athletically related financial aid have graduated from Washburn.

The average grade point average for the Washburn student body during the 1990-91 academic year was 2.53. The average grade point average for the student-athletes was 2.77.

Freshman student-athletes had an average ACT score of 20.7 which was the same average of all students entering Washburn in 1990.

There were 47 student-athletes with grade point averages above 3.0 and only seven student-athletes with grade point averages below 2.0 during the 1990-91 academic year.

Blues made the most of their second consecutive national tournament appearance, advancing to the quarterfinals. Individually, freshman Jennifer Subbert became the first Washburn student-athlete to compete at a national tennis tournament when she was participated at the 1992 championships. Many student-athletes earn all-conference, all-region and All-America honors each year.

While Washburn strives for success on the playing field, the university also takes pride in the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. Many of them maintain grade point averages higher than the university-wide average and approximately one-third maintain a 3.0 grade point average or better. Last year, three student-athletes were honored for their accomplishments by being selected second-team GTE Academic All-America.

THE CAPITAL CITY

Washburn students benefit from the work opportunities as well as the recreational facilities and social programs Topeka offers. As the state capital, the city is a tremendous laboratory for Washburn students. The city's businesses, services and government offices are generous in opening their doors to students for internships and work opportunities. Add to this the city's parks, lakes and recreational facilities and you have an excellent living and learning atmosphere.

Washburn also serves as the cultural center for the capital city metropolitan area. Attractions include performances by the Topeka Civic Symphony and Washburn's music department, exhibits in the Mulvane Art Center and stage productions in the University Theatre.

Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association

The MIAA began a new era on July 1, 1992, when the conference assumed a new name and logo reflecting recent changes in membership. After 79 years as the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association, the 12-member NCAA Division II conference is now called the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association, retaining the MIAA acronym.

The decision to change the conference name and logo originated in 1989 when Pittsburg State and Washburn became the first institutions outside the state of Missouri to attain MIAA membership. The new name was approved for 1992 to coincide with a third Kansas institution, Emporia State, gaining full membership status.

During the past 79 years, the MIAA has gained the reputation of being one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. MIAA members have won eight NCAA national championships while MIAA student-athletes have won 75 individual national titles.

The MIAA conducts conference championships in 15 men's and women's sports. Its sponsors competition in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and tennis for men. The conference offers championships for women in basketball, cross country, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball, tennis and volleyball.

The conference was first organized in 1912 with 14 member institutions. Of the current membership, only Central

Missouri, Northeast Missouri and Northwest Missouri are charter members of the MIAA.

The first change in membership came in 1924 when the MIAA reorganized to include only the state's five regional colleges at Cape Girardeau, Kirksville, Maryville, Springfield and Warrensburg as members. Missouri-Rolla joined membership in 1935, followed by Lincoln in 1970 and Missouri-St. Louis in 1980.

The 1980s witnessed the biggest changes in conference membership and leadership since its founding. In 1981, Southwest Missouri withdrew from the conference to attain Division I status. The MIAA also hired its first full-time commissioner in 1981 in the person of Ken B. Jones. Southwest

Baptist joined the conference in 1986, returning the membership to eight institutions. The MIAA expanded to 12 members in 1989, and grew beyond the state borders, with the addition of Missouri Southern, Missouri Western, Pittsburg State and Washburn.

Southeast Missouri withdrew from the MIAA in 1991 to attain Division I status, and was replaced by Emporia State, bringing the MIAA to its current membership.

The conference office is maintained by Jones in Maryville. Media relations and statistical services are handled by Judy Willson, appointed as the MIAA's first full-time sports information director in August 1991. Willson maintains an office in the Kansas City area and can be contacted at (816)765-8989.

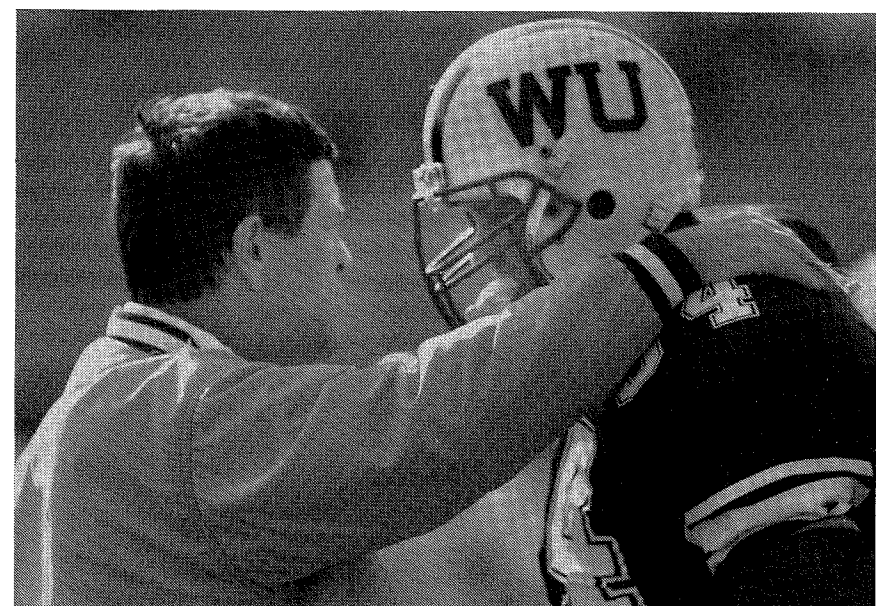


Dennis Caryl
Head Coach

During his seven previous seasons on the Washburn staff, Dennis Caryl has seen the extremes of Ichabod football. He was defensive coordinator for teams which advanced to the NAIA Division I national playoffs in 1986 and 1988, finishing 8-3 and 7-4, respectively. But, he also was head coach of a team which went 1-10 in 1991 and finished at the bottom of the MIAA standings. In between, there have been various recruiting philoso-

phies, changes in coaching responsibilities, a move to NCAA Division II and a new conference affiliation.

But for the third-year head coach, those are memories that belong to another house, a different building. As the 1992 season approaches, Caryl and his staff are ready to be the architects behind the rebuilding of the Washburn football program.

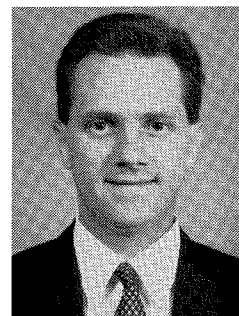

The 1992 campaign marks Caryl's eighth year at Washburn, in a coaching career which dates back to 1964. He joined the Washburn staff in 1985 after serving as offensive coordinator at Lincoln University during the 1984 season. He was named interim head coach just weeks prior to the 1990 season, and permanent head coach in December 1990. He enters the upcoming season with an overall career record of 21-31 in five seasons as a head coach.

During his 28-year coaching career, Caryl has gained experience at practically every level of football. He logged 11 years of experience and earned two coach of the year honors in the Iowa high school ranks before joining the staff at his alma mater, Northwestern College. He served the Red Raiders as offensive coordinator from 1974-76.

After his stint at Northwestern, Caryl served his first tour as a collegiate head coach, guiding Upper Iowa University to a three-year mark of 16-15-0 from 1977-79. After departing Upper Iowa, he gained further collegiate experience at Panhandle State University (1980) and Tennessee Technological University (1981-82). After a one-season return to the high school ranks, Caryl joined the staff at Lincoln in 1984.

A native of Sioux Rapids, Iowa, Caryl will turn 50 on September 1. He earned a bachelor's in physical education from Northwestern in 1964 and a master's in physical education from Northwest Missouri State University in 1971. He and his wife, Betty, reside in Topeka with their three children: Arrow, 19; Beau, 18; and, Misty, 16.

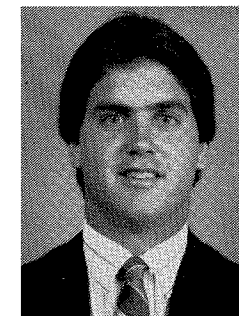


Steve Walter
Offensive Coordinator

Steve Walter begins his eighth season with the Washburn football program and his third as offensive coordinator. Walter began his association with Washburn in 1985 and has had responsibility for the outside linebackers, defensive secondary and the kicking game.

Before joining the staff, Walter served as defensive coordinator and assistant baseball coach at Friends University for the 1983 and 1984 seasons. While at Friends, Walter directed a defensive unit which ranked fourth in passing defense both seasons, and was nationally ranked in the top ten in total defense in 1984. Prior to his stint at Friends, Walter was a graduate assistant at the University of Kansas for three years (1980-83). He also was on the staff at his alma mater, Bethany College, when they posted back-to-back conference championships and NAIA Division II playoff appearances in 1978 and 1979.

A native of Hoisington, Kansas, Walter earned a bachelor's in physical education from Bethany in 1980 and a master's in physical education administration from Kansas in 1985. Walter, who will turn 34 on August 15, and his wife, Millie, live in Topeka.

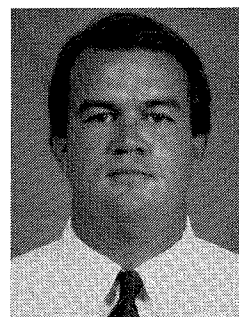


Andy Williams
Defensive Coordinator

A third-year staff member, Andy Williams begins his second season as the Ichabod's defensive coordinator. Williams, who joined the staff as secondary coach in March 1990, also is responsible for counseling all Washburn student-athletes as the department's academic advisor.

Williams was a quarterback for Missouri Western State College (1982-85) before embarking on his coaching career as a student assistant on the Griffon staff during the 1986 season. He spent the 1987 and 1988 seasons as a graduate assistant at Utah State University where he worked with the defensive backs and defensive special teams. He was defensive coordinator at Phoenix College during the 1989 season.

Williams, who will turn 29 on October 6, holds both an undergraduate and graduate degree in health, physical education and recreation. He earned his bachelor's from Missouri Western in 1986 and his master's from Utah State in 1989. While at Missouri Western, Williams won the Donn Christopher Faros Scholarship in 1985 and was named outstanding senior by the physical education department in 1986. Williams and his wife, Terry, live in Topeka with their two-year-old daughter, Kelsey.



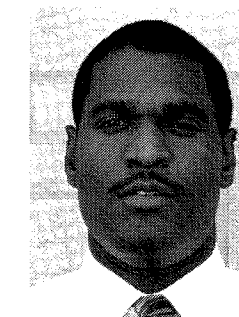
B.D. Kennedy
Assistant Coach

B. D. Kennedy begins his second season as Washburn's offensive line and special teams coach. While Kennedy is relatively new to the Ichabod program, he is no stranger to offensive lines or his role as offensive line coach.

Kennedy joined the staff in April 1991 after two seasons as offensive line coach at Hutchinson Community College. He also logged time as a graduate assistant at Baylor University and a student assistant at Bethany College.

Kennedy was a two-year letterman for Bethany teams which finished in the NAIA top 20 both seasons. He was voted the outstanding offensive lineman in 1986, an honor he also earned two years at Blanchard High School in Oklahoma. The 1979 Blanchard team posted a 15-0 record while winning a state championship.

A native of Blanchard, Oklahoma, Kennedy turned 28 on July 19. He earned his bachelor's in health and physical education from Bethany in 1987, while completing his master's in physical education from Baylor in 1989. Kennedy has a three-year-old son, Jonathan. He is single and resides in Topeka.



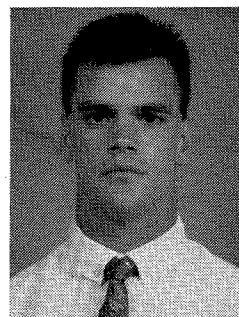
Dale Perine
Assistant Coach

For Dennis Caryl, his second-year defensive line coach passes the eye test. Dale Perine, a 6-4, 230-pound former player, joined the Washburn staff in April 1991.

Perine joined the Ichabod staff after one season as defensive line coach at San Francisco State University. He had previously served as graduate assistant at Utah State University where he worked with outside linebackers. Perine began his coaching career at Logan High School in Utah.

The former lineman lettered one season at Utah State after playing at Laney Junior College in California.

A native of Oakland, California, Perine will turn 30 on October 22. He earned his bachelor's in physical education from Utah State in 1986. He resides in Topeka, and is single.



Scot Koranda
Graduate Assistant

A four-year letterman for Washburn, Scot Koranda will continue to contribute to the Ichabod program in his role of graduate assistant. Koranda will work primarily with the running backs, tight ends and wide receivers.

Koranda did not miss a game during his final three seasons, playing free safety as a sophomore and junior before starting all 11 games at outside linebacker during his senior campaign. He recorded 173 career tackles with six fumble recoveries and two interceptions. He was named Budweiser player of the week for the final game of his career.

Koranda, who is majoring in English education and physical education, was recognized for his academic accomplishments by being named to the MIAA's all-academic teams in both 1990 and 1991, as well as the Athletics Director's Honor Roll for the 1992 spring semester. In addition, he is listed in the 1992 edition of *Who's Who Among Students at American Colleges and Universities*, and is an active member and officer in Washburn's chapter of Sigma Tau Delta.

A native of Lewis, Kansas, Koranda will turn 23 on Oct. 17.

Building Plan Begins in 1992 with Experience and Youth

Just like a university maps out a long-range plan for enhancing its campus, the Washburn coaching staff has devised a plan for improving the Ichabod football program. Phase 1 of the building plan begins this fall with the largest freshman class that third-year head coach Dennis Caryl can remember since joining the Washburn staff in 1984.

"This class is the first wave in the building process," Caryl says of a freshman class which numbered 41 on July 15. "We're trying to build stability for the Washburn football program for years to come. All levels of Washburn administration believe in the philosophy to build for the future and not try to constantly put 'quick-fixes' on the program. Basically, our philosophy is to build a base of high school players and not recruit the junior colleges as much."

Caryl says he hopes the stability he is looking for will turn around a program which has gone 8-23 the past three seasons, including a 1-10 mark and last place MIAA finish in 1991. But he is realistic about the impact the new recruiting philosophy could have on the upcoming season.

"I feel great about bringing in so much youth, because with youth comes enthusiasm," he explains. "Coming off a 1-10 season, you need to pump enthusiasm into every player. Every young kid thinks he can start. We have 41 young men who are at that age where they think they can lick the world."

But, with youthful enthusiasm comes collegiate inexperience, making patience a virtue for every Washburn coach, player and fan this fall.

"We must be patient this season. With what, 62 percent, of your team being first-time college players, you have to give them time to grow, teach them not to make stupid mistakes," Caryl cautions. "It's like with a baby, you have to crawl before you can walk, and walk before you can run. You just don't know how long it will take to crawl. Maybe it's the second week of the season, maybe it's the seventh."

Caryl also stresses the importance of hard work, belief and team unity for the 1992 season.

"Every player and coach has to believe that we can win. We have to work hard every day to visualize ourselves winning on the scoreboard," he says. "We feel we can develop this through implementing our plan during two-a-days and then scrimmaging on Sept. 5 to show ourselves we can do what it takes to win."

"But we have to be realistic and not expect success overnight. We have to work hard every day, keep locked in and focused," he emphasizes. "While we have to believe we can win, we can't worry about the score. We have to be concerned with how we're progressing, how we're learning our assignments. When all that gets going, then you'll win some games."

Melding the different personalities and work ethics of nearly 70 individuals into a team attitude could require some patience, too.

"I'm really hoping all the young men come together and play together as a team," the third-year head coach says. "We have lots of new faces. All the players will have to learn to respect each other, believe in each other. This is an area I'm really counting on our seniors to provide leadership."

Twenty-three returning players, including 11 returning starters from 1991, will be counted to provide playing experience while the freshmen mature and become familiar with the Washburn playbook.

Potent Backfield, Experience are Offensive Keys

Just a year after the Ichabods finished last in the conference in total offense (290.4) and scoring (8.6), Washburn fans might be surprised to learn that it's the offense rather than the defense which Caryl feels will be the strength of the Ichabods early this season.

"The offense came out of spring practice with lots of confidence and goes into the season with more experience than the defense," Caryl says of a unit which returns six starters. "They moved the ball well and I feel good about the returning front five. And, most importantly, we came out of spring with an established quarterback.

We haven't gone into the fall with one of those in a long time."

The established quarterback Caryl refers to is senior **Danny Turek** (5-11, 185), who will be counted on to handle the running and passing of the Wing-T offense. Among the trio of freshmen signal callers backing-up Turek are **Jeremy Smith** (6-5, 190), who Caryl says has the strongest arm of the young players, and **Myron Fisher** (6-0, 170), a quick player who can run and throw the ball.

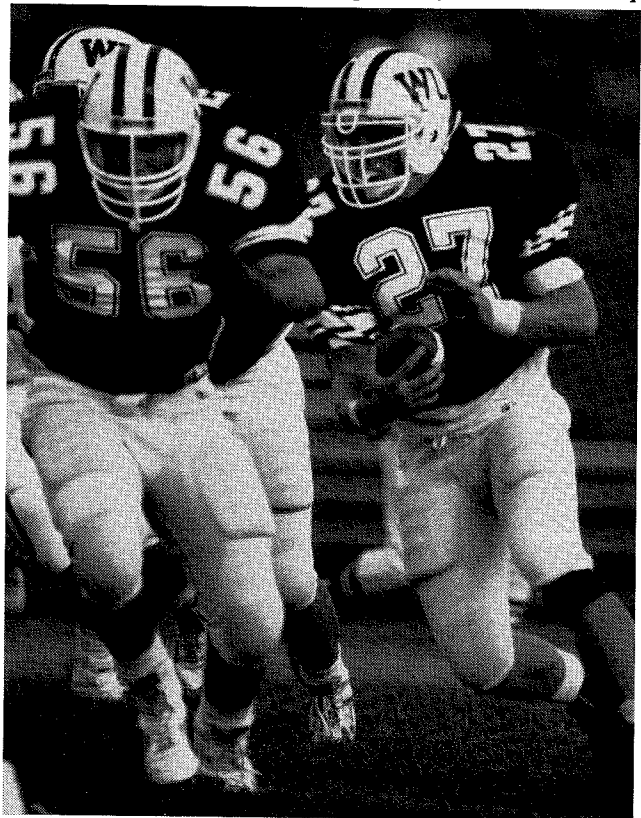
Protecting the quarterback will be an offensive line which Caryl says has a "nucleus of young men who can get the job done." The line includes returning starters **Joe Wells** (6-4, 270) at right tackle, **Wayne Peacock** (6-0, 250) at right guard and **Lee Hilstock** (6-1, 275) at left guard. Center **Mark Gloriod** (6-1, 260) is expected to take over the starting job for his senior season after sharing the snapping duties the past three years. Sophomore **Joe O'Neal** (6-0, 270) moves over from the defensive line and is likely to start at left tackle. Newcomers **Tom Faudere** (6-4, 260) and **Rob Hickey** (6-6, 240) also are expected to contribute.

If Caryl is excited about having an established quarterback and an experienced offensive line, he's ecstatic about his backfield.

"The main strength of our offense is our backfield," he says. "It's potent. We have depth, speed and experience. We have very talented people who can run, block and catch that ball, and that's important in the Wing-T."

Leading the group of eight running backs is returning starter **Joey Atwood** (6-0, 210), a player Caryl considers a key not only because of his ability to run, block and catch, but also of his senior leadership. Fullback **Talmadge Graham** (5-11, 210) is the other returning starter in the Ichabod backfield. The junior is the team's top returning rusher and scorer from a year ago when he compiled 454 yards on 102 carries with four touchdowns. Caryl expects senior **Camron Pitcher** (5-10, 200) to earn the starting assignment opposite Atwood.

The young running backs include two players who combined for more than 3,000 yards as they led their respective cities in rushing as high school seniors. After a year of adjusting to the college game, sophomore **Nick Cummings** (6-0, 210) is expected to challenge Graham for the starting fullback position. Cummings gained more than 1,400 yards while earning all-state honors as a senior at Hayden HS. Freshman **Andy Murray** (5-8, 200) is expected to contribute at right halfback. Murray gained 1,752 yards on 250 carries enroute to winning a 5A state championship and the Anthony Simone Award as



the top player in the Kansas City metro area.

Junior **Robert Trice** (6-0, 210) and freshman **DeMarko Coleman** (6-0, 160) also are expected to contribute at halfback.

Experienced tight ends and an improved receiving corps has Caryl confident that the Ichabods will have more success throwing the ball in 1992. Last season, Washburn quarterbacks completed just 40 percent of their passes for 105.9 yards a game, placing the Ichabods ninth in the MIAA in passing offense.

Caryl says the tight end spot, which is much more of a blocking than receiving position in Washburn's offensive scheme, is one of the stronger on the unit with the return of seniors **Sean Deal** (6-4, 250) and **Bobby Ramirez** (6-0, 225), and the addition of freshman **Brad Podojil** (6-3, 225). Deal started 10 games last season, making nine catches for 77 yards. Caryl says all three can block and catch the ball, and considers Podojil one of the top freshmen recruits.

Other top freshmen recruits are among five wide receivers on the preseason roster. It's not their ability that worries Caryl, but their lack of collegiate experience.

"We have added lots of speed at wideout, there's more than one that can run. We haven't had the speed to throw the home run ball in a few years," he says. "The only drawback is they're awfully young."

Battling for a starting position will be freshmen **Michael Dritelein** (6-2, 170) and **Anthony Simpson** (6-1, 170). Dritelein earned all-state honors while catching 19 passes for 481 yards as a senior for Olathe South HS, where he also set a school record in the 200-meter. Simpson earned all-conference honors while leading his Mehlville HS team in receptions, yards and touchdown catches.

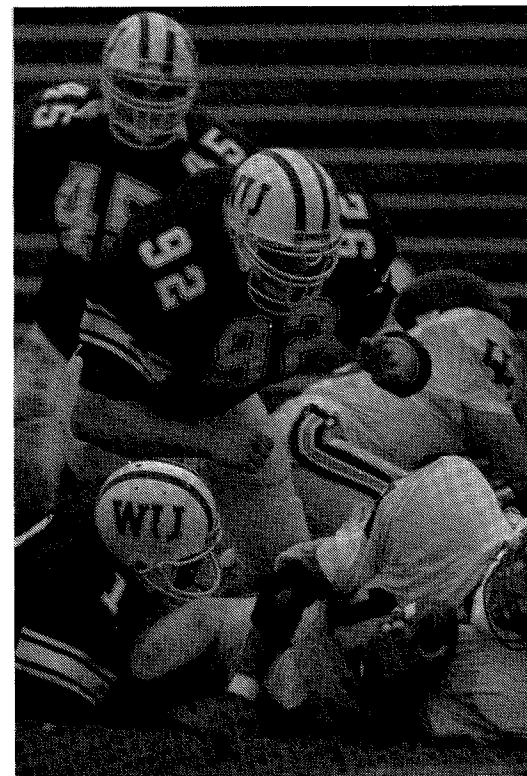
Experience Blends with Youth on Defense

While Caryl might have tabbed the offensive unit as the team's strength early in the season, he's not discounting the defense's long tradition of success. He's just concerned the youth movement will have a greater impact on the Ichabod defense, requiring more time for the players to develop into the kind of unit which was third in the MIAA in total defense (363.2) last season.

Caryl points to the linebacking corps as the strength of the defensive unit because the majority of the youth is on the line and in the secondary.

"The linebackers have experience, speed and power," he says. "They're like bees, they swarm to the ball."

Headlining the defensive returners is senior inside linebacker **Dave Noot** (6-1, 230). A four-year team member, Noot is the team's most experienced defensive player and the leading returning tackler from 1991 (48 solos, 44 assists, 8.4 per game). Also providing experience at linebacker is junior **Everald Flowers** (6-0, 185), who is



expected to move into a starting position at outside linebacker this season. Rounding out the expected starters is inside linebacker **Brett Miller** (6-0, 230), a red-shirt freshman at Iowa State last season who won the starting spot during Washburn's spring practice. A trio of freshmen need to contribute quickly if the linebacking corps is to remain strong: **Robert Goeden** (6-1, 190), an all-state linebacker who set a Topeka West HS record with 98 tackles as a junior; **Chase Kime** (6-1, 230), an all-state linebacker off a state championship runner-up team at Oologah HS; and, **Jason Lloyd** (6-3, 205), an all-conference linebacker who won a state championship with Pittsburg HS.

The defensive line poses a couple of questions for Caryl. If the question of injury rehabilitation is answered as he hopes, the question of youth won't be such a problem.

Senior **John Miller** (6-1, 260), who will move from tackle to end this season, is the only returning starter off the 1991 defensive line. But, he's not the only player with starting experience. Tackles **Brett Keir** (6-1, 270) and **Tim McDaniel** (6-1, 300) both started all 10 games in 1990, but missed the entire 1991 campaign with knee injuries.

"A lot will depend on Keir and McDaniel, they've waited a long time for their senior seasons and we need them to improve our pass rush," Caryl says. "With Miller, we could have the makings for a decent front four. But if they can't come off their injuries, we will be very green. We could have three freshmen starting on the line."

The freshmen who are expected to contribute, either as starters or reserves, include **Beau Caryl** (6-1, 230), and all-state linebacker from Topeka High; **Greg Gaul** (6-6, 280), an honorable mention all-division lineman who had 49 tackles as a senior at Creighton Prep; **Sean Goodsell** (6-2, 210), an all-state lineman who had 96 tackles with 10 sacks as a senior at Miami (OK) HS; and, **Jeff Howard** (6-2, 250) who averaged six tackles and two sacks a game as a senior at Muskogee (OK) HS.

Despite having three of four starters returning to the Ichabod secondary, it's an area of concern for Caryl because the fourth starter and all backups will come from a pool of 10 freshmen.

"We have the potential to have a good secondary with three returning starters, but we're young after that," he says. "We have to have some quick development out of our freshmen. They have good speed and there is potential for some of them to contribute right away."

Providing the experience in the secondary are senior **Leonard Jackson** (5-10, 175) and juniors **James Thornhill** (5-10, 180) and **Donnovan Shirley** (6-0, 195). The trio combined for 79 solo tackles, 40 assisted tackles and one interception last year while Thornhill led the team in pass break-ups with seven.

Caryl's biggest concern is finding one of the freshmen to replace free safety Kevin Marshall the team's 1991 Budweiser Most Valuable Player. Likely candidates are **Nolan Jeffery** (6-3, 180), a two-time all-district pick from Ross S. Sterling HS in Houston, and **Rory Seals** (5-11, 165), an honorable mention all-conference defensive back from Hazelwood West HS in St. Louis. Other freshmen in the secondary include **Michael Aziz** (6-0, 155) from Roosevelt HS in St. Louis; **Maurice Ragland** (5-11, 165), a two-time first-team all-conference pick from Ruskin HS; and, **Eryc Reese** (5-10, 180), a first-team all-conference back who recorded 78 tackles in 10 games as a senior at Grandview HS.

Kicking Game Has Highest Percentage of Freshmen

No area on the team has a greater percentage of freshmen than the kicking game: 100 percent. **Dan Brown** (5-9, 140), an all-league pick from Olathe North HS, will take over the placekicking duties from Dave Ruder while freshman classmate **Aaron Sigg** (6-4, 195), an all-state punter from Yates Center HS, will assume replace all-conference punter Alan Kaniper.

"Hopefully we have another dynamic duo like Ruder and Boomer. We haven't had this much youth there since those two were freshmen four years ago," Caryl says. "The key will be to keep the pressure off Dan and Aaron early. I hope we don't put them in too many pressure situations too early so they can establish themselves mentally and physically, and build up some confidence. They have the potential to be a great pair and make our kicking game one of the best in the MIAA."

Notes: Performances by a young but improving defense and the offensive line are keys to the 1992 season as the Bulldogs try to better last year's 5-6 overall record and third-place finish in the MIAA. Eighteen of 22 starters are slated to return. Eric Holm's 1991 defense surrendered 32 points per outing, but most of the unit was comprised of freshmen and sophomores. Key holdovers are senior linebacker Greg Godi, junior linebacker Robby Flanagan, junior nose guard Mike Roos and junior tackle Geoff Hiddleston. Three 1991 All-Americans, senior running back Chad Guthrie, senior wide receiver Fontaine Walker and junior quarterback Chris Livingstone, spearhead a talented core of returning skill personnel, who helped the Bulldogs score at a 28.9 pace a year ago. Last fall, Guthrie landed on the *Football Gazette* first-team All-America squad and the Associated Press second-team All-America listing. Walker was named to the *Gazette's* second-team, while Livingstone garnered *Gazette* honorable mention notice. Although Holm is concerned about replacing three offensive linemen, including All-American Owen Doak, he still has talent up front, led by Matt McKnight.

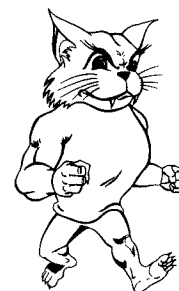

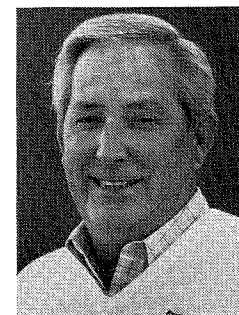

Notes: The Bearcats face the 1992 season without quarterback Jeremy Wilson and fullback Ed Tillison, two of the prime operators in a triple-option offense that has set numerous school records since Bud Elliott installed it upon his arrival in 1988. This year's quarterback could be junior Lawrence Luster, who took over for an injured Wilson last year, or Joseph Johnson, a two-year starter at offensive halfback, who ran at quarterback throughout spring drills. Several excellent running backs return, including junior halfback Jason Krone (654, 7 TDs) and Reggie St. Romain (479, 7 TDs). Filling Tillison's big shoes at fullback will probably be holdover Grant McCartney, who ran for 64 yards on only 10 carries. All-time Bearcat great offensive tackle George Dousharm is missing from the forward wall, but veterans Tony Borchers (tackle), Lance Johnston (guard), Sam Moen (guard), and Matt Theriksen (center) return. Defensively, senior cornerback Percy Coleman is already being watched by NFL scouts and should be one of the top cornerbacks in NCAA Division II this year. Coleman accounted for a team-high five interceptions and made 51 tackles in 1991. Three-time first-team all-MIAA defensive end Erik Petersen has graduated, but the Bearcat front four is in good shape, with the return of tackles John LuBow and Clarence Green, and end Curtis Bingham. Linebacker Bryce Stephens and defensive backs Tyrone Elmore, Kenny Stokes and Cody Buhrmeister are other returning defensive starters. Placekicker/punter Robert Godard also returns. He led the team in scoring last season (31-35 PATs, 5-13 FGs) while averaging 35.0 yards a punt.

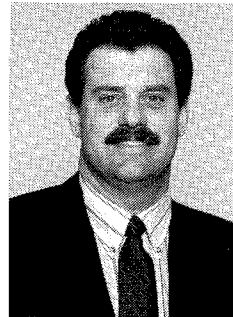

Notes: After posting their best record in eight seasons, the Lions look to be a contender for the MIAA title as 30 lettermen, including 10 starters, are expected to return. Six starters are back on defense, led by two first-team all-MIAA picks, cornerback John Buchanan (3 int.) and tackle Jay Pride (83 tackles). Also returning are second-team all-league performers Ron Burton (99) at linebacker and Tony Hughes (8 sacks) at end, and third-team all-MIAA linebacker Greg Prosak (102). Two of the four starters returning on offense were among the nation's best last season as wide receiver Rod Smith (60 for 1,439, 15 TDs) led Division II in receiving yardage (130.8) to earn MIAA offensive player-of-the-year honors and a spot on two different All-America teams, while quarterback Matt Cook (141 of 275 for 2,637, 25 TDs) was a first-team all-MIAA choice finishing sixth in passing efficiency and 10th in total offense nationally. Also back are running back Scott Wynn and tackle Brian Hargis, who is the only returning starter along the offensive line. Other losses include second-team all-MIAA pick Chuck Duke, wide receiver Heath Helsel and running back Marques Rodgers, as well as placekicker/punter Rick Lairmore.

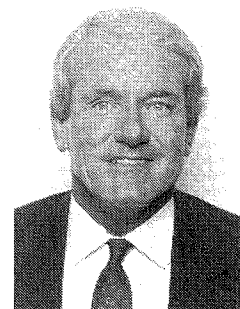

Notes: With 19 starters (9 on defense, 10 on offense) back from last year's 5-6 team, Terry Noland heads into his 10th season with a lot of optimism. After a disappointing 1-4 start last year, the Mules won four of their last six games. In their season finale, they led eventual NCAA Division II national champion Pittsburg State 14-7 at halftime, before falling, 28-14. Heading the list of returners on defense are three first-team all-MIAA selections - senior linebacker Joe Grubb, senior cornerback Ray Lingard and junior end Bart Woods. Grubb, a potential all-American, had 141 tackles last year to lead the team and 89 of those were solos. Lingard was second in tackles with 67, while Woods was fourth with 58, and led the team tackles for loss with seven. On offense, Noland will have to decide on either junior Carl Lawrence or red-shirt freshman Deno Hairston as his quarterback. Both figure to be in the lineup somewhere. If Lawrence gets the nod, Hairston is slated for action at tailback, and vice versa. Lawrence started the final two games at quarterback last year. He rushed for 181 yards and threw for 141 in his first start. The Mules also return Henry Caldwell, last year's top rusher (546, 7 TDs), plus leading receivers Vince Jordan (24 for 578, 4 TDs) and Chad Snyder (19 for 387, 2 TDs), as well as placekicker Chris Pyatt (24-25 PATs, 5 FGs) and punter Denny Cox (36.7). In the offensive line, the Mules will need to replace Shawn Schmelzle and Todd Wright, both of whom graduated.

Notes: The Miners improved four and one-half games last year, going from 0-10 to 4-6-1 in Charlie Finley's final year as head coach. Now under new mentor Jim Anderson, UMR looks to continue the climb in 1992. 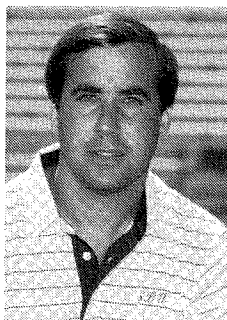

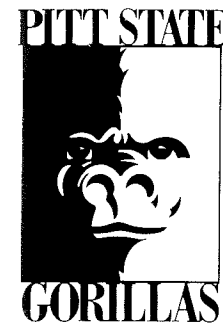

Notes: The three-time defending MIAA champions have something else to defend this season: the 1991 NCAA Division II national championship. Chuck Broyles, the 1991 Kodak national coach of the year, must replace 14 seniors, including 11 starters. Among those to replace are 1991 Harlon Hill Award winner, wide receiver Ronnie West, 1,000-yard rusher Darren Dawson, and linebacker Shane Tofoya, the 1991 MIAA defensive player of the year and the team's leading tackler the past two seasons. But Broyles returns a solid nucleus on each side of the ball. Senior fullback Ronald Moore, a candidate for this year's Harlon Hill Award, will lead PSU's option veer attack, while senior All-American Troy Wilson anchors the defense from his end position. The Gorillas are deep at quarterback with junior Brian Hutchins, who returned from a shoulder injury in time to lead PSU through the playoffs, and sophomore Jeff Moreland who went 8-0-1 filling in for the injured Hutchins. Junior center Doug Ballard, a third-team all-MIAA pick, will anchor the offensive line, along with Mike Brockel, a first-team all-MIAA pick at guard, and veteran tackle Andy Kesinger. Many experienced players return from last season's top MIAA defensive unit. The secondary is the strength of the unit with third-team all-MIAA defensive back Joe Thornton. Wilson, who recorded 23 sacks last year, anchors a line which will include senior Ronnie Fuller and junior college all-American Chance Rudzig. At linebacker, PSU must replace three of last year's four starters, returning only Lance Gosch.

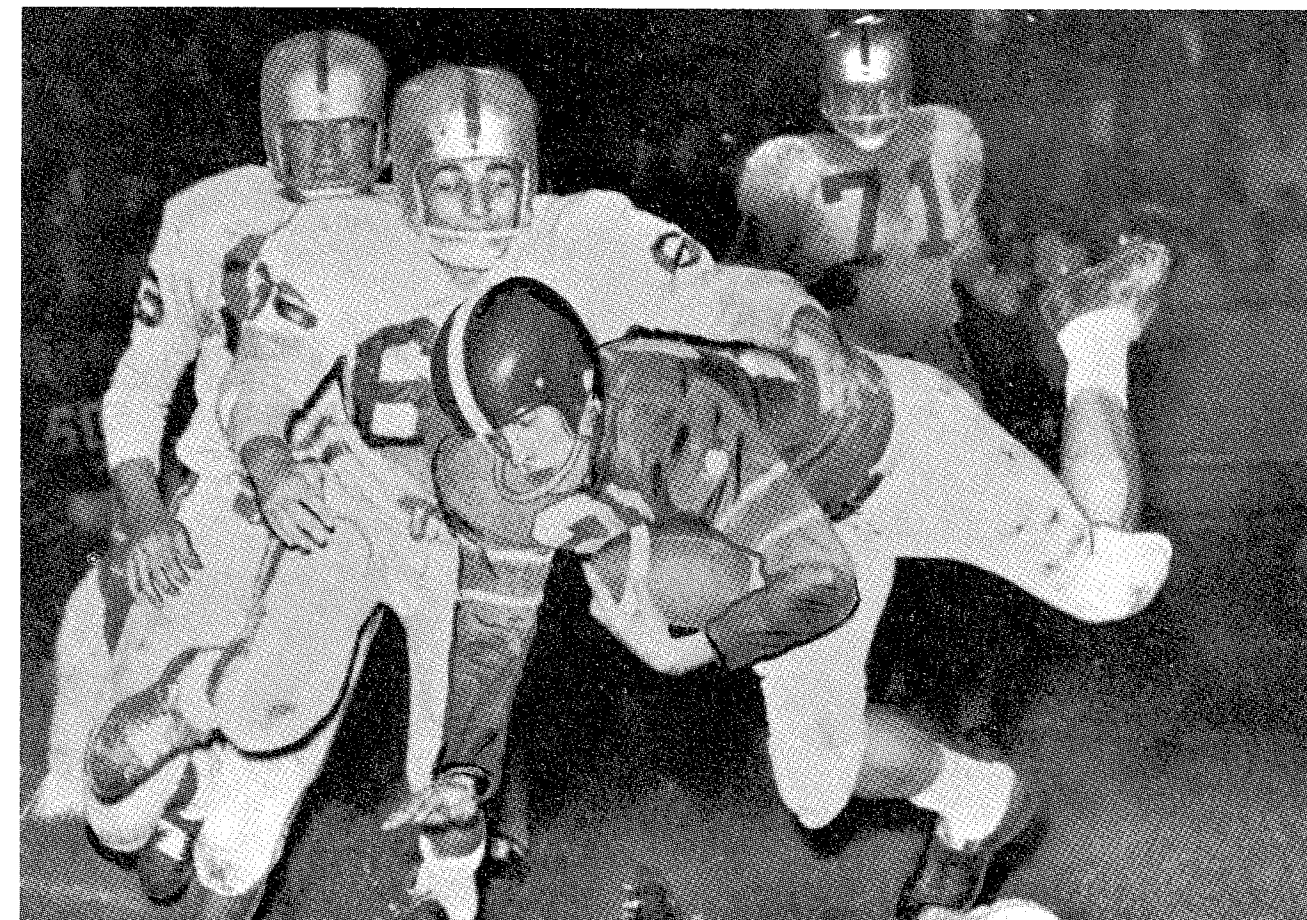

The Griffons improved to 4-7-0 last season and could become a contender in the MIAA this season if the defense lives up to the accomplishments of last year's offense. Fifteen offensive school records fell last season, as the team threw for 2,866 yards and 23 touchdowns, averaging 399.4 yards per game. Senior All-America candidate Terren Adams caught 61 passes for 1,232 yards and 12 touchdowns. Senior quarterback Mark Ramstack returns after throwing for 1,770 yards and 14 touchdowns in last year's platoon system. Sophomore running back Dameon Kazee (164 for 862) also returns for the Griffons. A solid recruiting year has strengthened the offensive line where three starters graduated. Five starters return to a defensive unit that allowed an average of 433.7 yards per game. Junior transfer Troy Lane practiced with the team last year and is expected to become an impact player on the line. Junior outside linebacker Terry McCray had 65 tackles while senior Glenn DuBois returns to the free safety spot where he had a team-high 115 tackles last year.

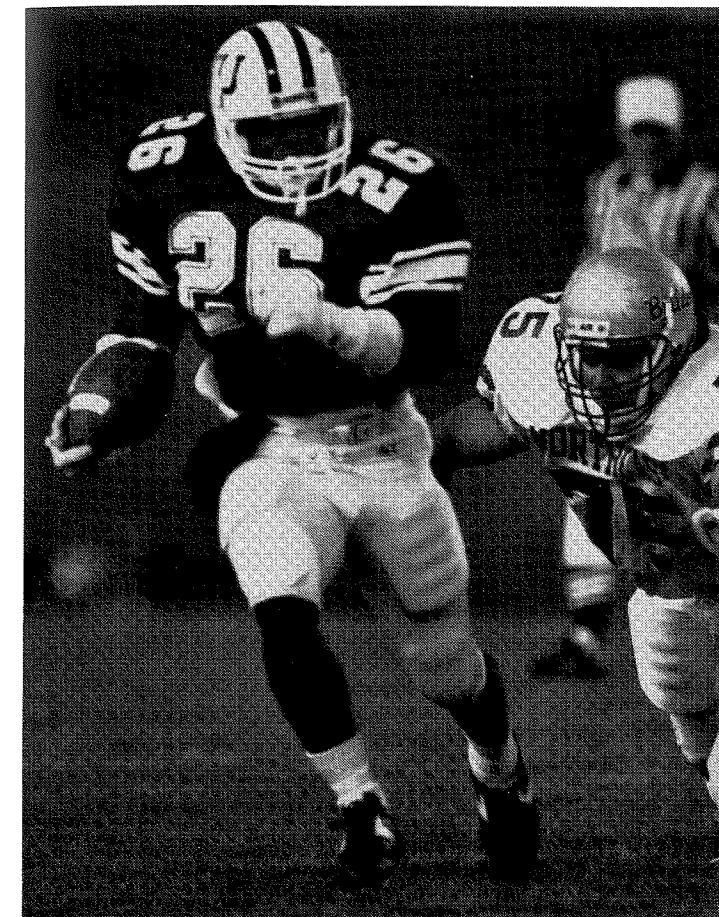

Football Comes to Campus in 1885

Back in 1885, when there were no paved streets in Topeka, and "MacVicar" was the name of the Washburn president and not one of those unpaved streets, an Englishman brought football to the Washburn campus.

Six years later, in 1891, the Ichabod football tradition entered a new era as Washburn played its first season of intercollegiate competition. According to Washburn records, there were no games played in 1895, allowing the 1991 squad to celebrate the 100th season in Washburn football history.

Washburn celebrated the 50th anniversary of football's debut on campus in 1935. Robert Stone, a member of the team in 1885, penned a brief sketch of the first 50 years of Washburn football which appeared in the Oct. 30 issue of the *Topeka Journal*. In the article, Stone recalled:

"Fifty years ago the Washburn college students organized the first college football team in the state. A young Englishman, who worked in the Santa Fe shops, brought with him from the old country an enthusiasm for the Rugby game. He organized a Santa Fe football team and challenged the Washburn students to organize and play. We accepted the challenge, organized a team and beat him. We then induced other colleges in the state to get into the field, and until after I graduated Washburn college our team was unbeaten on the football field. As I recollect, the first defeat was suffered at Columbia, Mo., in 1890."



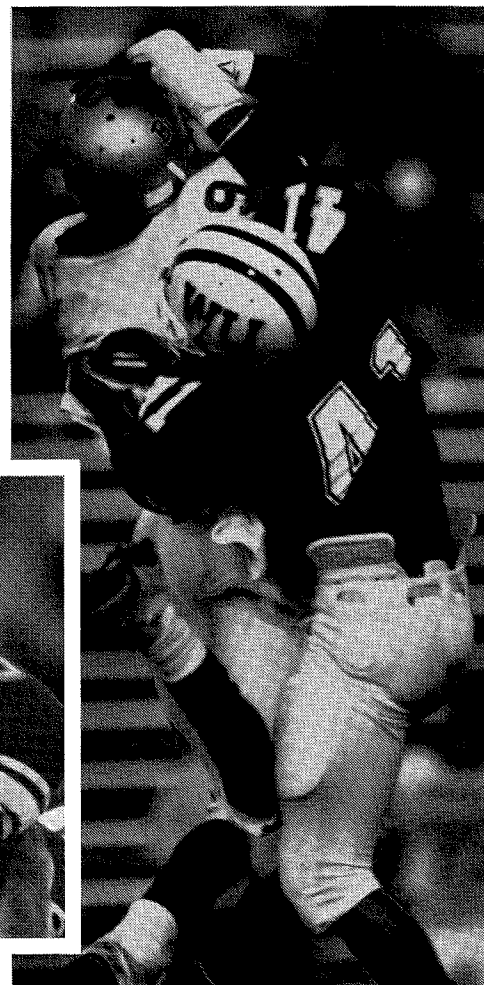

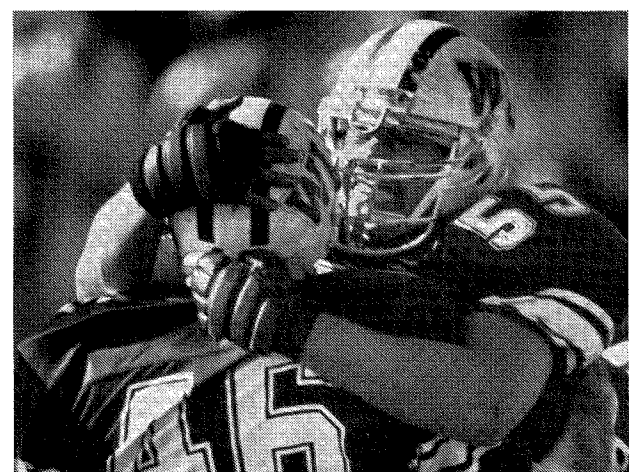

Ichabods Claim Six Conference Titles During Stints with Nine Conferences

Throughout its athletic history, Washburn has looked beyond the state borders of Kansas to find conference affiliations. The university has competed in nine different conferences, including its current association with the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA), an NCAA Division II league consisting of institutions in Missouri and Kansas.

Washburn's longest association was with the Central Intercollegiate Conference, of which the Ichabods were members from 1941 to 1968. Like the MIAA, the CIC included institutions in Missouri and Kansas.

Membership in three conferences was more regional in nature, forcing the Ichabods to travel throughout five states. The Missouri Valley Conference consisted of schools in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Iowa and Missouri, many of whom are currently NCAA Division I member institutions. Both the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference and the Great Plains Athletic Conference put the Ichabods on the road to Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Nebraska and Kansas.

Did Washburn Throw First Forward Pass?

When an athlete or team accomplishes a "first" these days, all America can witness as modern technology is capable of bringing it into our living rooms. Firsts which happened decades ago, like who threw the first forward pass, are a little less clear.

Many schools — Washburn included — claim to have thrown the first forward pass. Whether Washburn did or not depends on how the implementation of the rule is viewed.

Records indicate that the forward pass rule was written by Navy coach Paul Dashiell and became a legal part of the game in 1906. Any forward pass thrown before the official rule would be illegal, and in this researcher's opinion, not a historical first. Accepting that view prohibits one from believing that the first forward pass was thrown during either a Yale-Princeton game in 1876 or a North Carolina-Georgia game in 1895, as various documents show.

According to Pat Harmon, historian at the National College Football Hall of Fame, the first legal collegiate forward pass was thrown by St. Louis University during a Sept. 5, 1906, against Carroll College.

So we have illegal forward passes before the 1906 rule, and legal forward passes after the rule. But what about a pass thrown during a game designed to test proposed rules changes? That is where Washburn's claim comes into play. If you believe a "first" can happen during a game testing proposed rules, then Washburn is correct in claiming it threw the first forward pass.

The Capper/MRI Quick-Fact Book of Kansas states on p. 15: "The first forward pass in football history was thrown in December 1905 in a football game between Washburn University and Fairmount College."

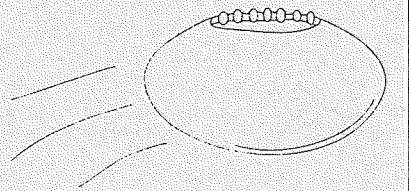
An article in the Oct. 30, 1935, edition of the *Topeka Journal*, entitled "Washburn Played Game 30 Years Ago Testing New Grid Rules Suggested," reports: "Washburn was in the football spotlight Christmas Day in 1905 when the

Ichabods played a postseason game with Fairmount in Wichita to test the proposed rules changes. It was known as the "Walter Camp" game."

The *Kansas Historical Quarterly* published an article entitled "Evans: College Football in Kansas," which quotes Bliss Isely, who played in the 1905 game: "The first forward pass in history was thrown that afternoon by Bill Davis to Art Solter and was good for a 10-yard gain."

The article goes on to say "Isley said that the pass delivery was primitive. Davis heaved the ball with both hands like a basketball player shooting a free throw and it wobbled through the air."

From these sources, this researcher concludes that Washburn did indeed through the first forward pass on Christmas Day, 1905, during a game designed to test a new set of rules. The game in question was not the regular season contest listed in this media guide — in which Washburn prevailed 10-6 — but rather a scoreless tie which is not listed with the 1905 scores.
