MEDIA CREDENTIALS/PARKING

All requests for press, photo and broadcast credentials, and press box space for Washburn home football games should be made in advance and directed to Sports Information Director Mary Beth Brutton. Passes are mailed in advance as long as time permits, otherwise they are available in the requesting person's name at the will call window on the west side of Moore Bowl approximately one hour prior to game time.

The sports information office is located in Room 200-D of the Petro Allied Health Center. The telephone number is (913)231-1010, ext. 1791.

PRESS BOX

The Washburn press box is located on the west side of Moore Bowl. Washburn University and the Football Writers Association of America remind all media representatives, press box officials and statisticians that the press box is a working press area and cheerleading for either team will not be tolerated. Sports Information Director Mary Beth Brutton will instruct security personnel to direct violators to the exit. Your cooperation is expected and appreciated.

RADIO/TELEVISION BROADCASTS

Approval for radio/television broadcasts of all Washburn home football games must be received in advance from Mary Beth Brutton, sports information director.

WREN Radio (1250 AM) is the "New Voice of Washburn Athletics" for the 1994-95 academic year, and has the exclusive right to broadcast Washburn athletics events. WREN Radio provides one telephone line for use by visiting radio stations on a reciprocal basis. Radio stations wishing to use the courtesy line should contact WREN's Don Hanson well in

advance at (913)232-6700.

Television stations seeking video tape highlights may want to contact one of the Topeka affiliates listed below.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo credentials must be displayed at all times. A photo credential allows access to both the sideline and press box areas. Under NCAA playing rules, photographers must stay beyond the 25-yard line at each end of the field and must stay clear of the team/bench areas.

GAME SERVICES

Media representatives covering a game at Washburn will receive game programs, pre-game notes and statistics, in addition to halftime and final game statistics and play-by-play. The press box has only one telephone which is reserved for use by members of the sports information office. Media representatives are invited to install their own lines or use the telephones in the Washburn athletics department, located in the Petro Allied Health Center. Exceptions to this policy in order to meet a deadline can be made by Mary Beth Brutton, sports information director.

INTERVIEWS

Player interviews during the week must be arranged through Mary Beth Brutton. For best results, please make arrangements at least one day in advance. Members of the media may contact Head Coach Tony DeMeo in his office during the week. The best time to reach Coach DeMeo is 11 a.m. to Noon, Monday through Friday.

Postgame interviews may be conducted on the field or in the Petro Center locker room area following a 10-minute "cooling-off" period.

WHAT'S AN ICHABOD?

The name "Ichabod" was derived from the first name of Ichabod Washburn, an early benefactor of the university. Ichabod Washburn was born in Kingston, MA, on Aug. 11, 1798. In 1831, he began what was to be his life work -- and the pride of Worcester, MA -- when he essayed the drawing of wire. He was co-founder of Washburn and Moen Manufacturing (later American Steel and Wire).

His own lack of formal education made him acutely aware of its importance. When approached by residents of Topeka to help save the ailing Lincoln College, Ichabod Washburn responded with a \$25,000 gift. In May, 1869, Lincoln College was renamed Washburn College in recognition of his outstanding contribution.

Until 1938, there was no graphic representation or any particular characteristics associated with the mascot. During the 1937-38 school year, the editors of the KAW yearbook decided that such items were important to the university and began to accept suggestions for a design of Mr. Ichabod. The adopted design was drawn by Bradbury Thompson (BA '34).

The following explanatory material accompanied the first representation of an Ichabod in the Washburn KAW: "He has courage and enthusiasm as shown by his brisk walk. He is democratic and courteous, for he tips his hat as he passes. Sincere in his search for truth and knowledge, he studiously carries a book under his arm. His friendly smile makes you like him. He is neatly dressed and he fits well into his generation...but adopts himself with equal ease to any change of any age."

In 1992, the Ichabods tied for sixth place in a poll listing the top 25 college nicknames, conducted by the Collegiate Directories of Cleveland. Several national publications, including *Sports Illustrated*, included this information in their publications.

Washburn University, founded in 1865, is one of the oldest and largest universities in Kansas. As an urban and regional institution, Washburn serves many of the educational needs of Topeka, Shawnee County and the state of Kansas.

The university's success is measured in part by the achievements of its graduates who include a Nobel Prize winner in medicine, members of the U.S. Congress, members of the Kansas State Legislature, numerous judges who have graduated from the law school as well as many leaders in business, education, communications and service.

ACADEMICS

Washburn has traditionally provided quality education. Students may choose from more than 70 degree programs within the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Business, School of Law, School of Nursing, or the School of Applied Studies.

Washburn prides itself on having quality and experienced faculty. More than two-thirds of the Washburn general faculty hold a doctorate or the highest degree available in their discipline. Professors, not graduate assistants, teach in the classrooms at all academic levels.

Students enjoy modern classrooms and educational facilities. Since a tornado devastated the campus in 1966, more than \$43 million have been spent to construct new



buildings and laboratories, and to purchase new equipment and library holdings. The result is a modern campus with a rich heritage, conducive to living and learning.

ATHLETICS

Washburn teams compete for NCAA Division II championships as a member of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA).



Washburn currently offers intercollegiate competition for men in the sports of baseball, basketball, football, golf and tennis. Women compete in basketball, softball, tennis and volleyball.

Success has been obtained by both teams and individuals. The Ichabods basketball team won its third straight MIAA regular season championship last March and advanced to the semifinals of the 1994 NCAA Division II national tournament while making a third straight NCAA appearance. The Lady Blues basketball team swept MIAA regular season and postseason titles during a 1992-93 season which saw them earn a No. 1 national ranking in the final poll. The Lady Blues have advanced to the NCAA Division II national tournament each of the past four seasons.

Individually, many student-athletes

HOW WASHBURN STUDENT-ATHLETES COMPARE

Since 1983, 71 percent of the student-athletes who received athletically related financial aid have graduated from Washburn.

The average grade point average for the Washburn student body during the 1990-91 academic year was 2.53. The average grade point average for the student-athletes was 2.77.

Freshman student-athletes had an average ACT score of 20.7 which was the same average of all students entering Washburn in 1990.

There were 47 student-athletes with grade point averages above 3.0 and only seven student-athletes with grade point averages below 2.0 during the 1990-91 academic year.

earn all-conference, all-region and All-America honors each year, including senior forward Clarence Tyson who was named a 1994 All-American by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC).

While Washburn strives for success on the playing field, the university also takes pride in the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. Many of them maintain grade point averages higher than the university-wide average and approximately one-third maintain a 3.0 grade point average or better. Each year, several student-athletes are honored at the district or national level through the GTE Academic All-America program. Last year, football student-athlete Michael Dritlein and basketball student-athlete Rhonda Matzke were both named second-team GTE Academic All-America in their respective sports.

Support services for the Washburn student-athlete include athletic training, academic advising, and weight training and conditioning.

THE CAPITAL CITY

Washburn students benefit from the work opportunities as well as the recreational facilities and social programs Topeka offers. As the state capital, the city is a tremendous laboratory for Washburn students. The city's businesses, services and government offices are generous in opening their doors to students for internships and work opportunities. Add to this the city's parks, lakes and recreational facilities and you have an excellent living and learning atmosphere.

Washburn also serves as the cultural center for the capital city metropolitan area. Attractions include performances by the Topeka Civic Symphony and Washburn's music department, exhibits in the Mulvane Art Center and stage productions in the University Theatre.

Moore Bowl has served as the home for Washburn football since it was dedicated on September 28, 1928. Throughout its 66-year history, the bowl has been witness to hundreds of high school and college games, long-standing conference rivalries and the tornado of 1966.

Construction of the bowl was part of a \$215,000 athletic project which also included the addition of Whiting Field House to the Washburn campus. The bowl was built in a natural depression south of Old Thomas Gymnasium and was designed to be similar to the facility at the University of Colorado. By taking advantage of the natural depression, the bowl was constructed in just seven months at a cost of approximately \$30,000. The construction work was under the direction of Cleveland S. Loper, head of the engineering department, with the contract for the excavation given to C.A. Ritchie of Topeka.

The football field is encircled by a seven-lane, quarter-mile track with a 220-yard straightaway. The original design for the horseshoe-shaped bowl (overall size of 400' by 650') called for 15,000 seats — 8,000 in the original construction with the remaining seats to be built along the north end of the horseshoe. Additional seating was not added and the bowl currently has a seating capacity of 7,200. A press box and concessions stands were added to the facility in 1963.

Less than three years later, on June 8, 1966, the press boxes, concession stands and equipment building were completely destroyed when a tornado touched down on campus. The bowl also sustained localized damage to the plank seats, bent or destroyed handrails, in addition to varying degrees of damage to the goal posts, scoreboard, fence and ticket booths. Only the rest room structures were left intact and undamaged by the tornado.

The bowl was named in honor of George Godfrey Moore, a Topeka sports enthusiast who had developed a reputation throughout the Midwest as a keen sportsman and friend of Washburn.

The day-long celebration which marked the dedication of Moore Bowl included pep rallies, parades, speeches and, unfortunately, a Washburn loss.

According to the *Topeka Daily Capital*, "Washburn began its celebration of the dedicatory ceremonies and football game early in the morning. Led by the school of law, the college of liberal arts and sciences took part

in a general student walk-out, the remainder of the morning being spent in pep meetings, rallies, and student parades thru the Topeka business district."

During the pregame ceremonies on Sept. 28, 1928, both Moore and Washburn president Parley P. Womer addressed the crowd with words of mutual support and apprecia-

bowl possible."

Moore, in turn, congratulated the college for "abundance of its present good athletic material and facilities." He gave a brief summary of Washburn's past athletic accomplishments and said it was his belief the college would soon attain a high position in sports.

"Athletics develop a spirit that higher institutions of learning cannot develop without the assistance of general athletic training," he concluded.

Following the ceremonies, the Ichabods opened the 1928 season with a 20-12 loss to William Jewell. Quarterback/fullback Fred

tion. Womer referred to Moore as the man who made it possible.

"And we are indebted to Mr. Moore for this fine bowl because of his interest in athletics and good sportsmanship," Womer told the crowd. "It was Mr. Moore's interest in good athletics that induced him to give the generous financial contribution to the college that made the actual construction of the

Dornbusch scored Washburn's first touchdown at Moore Bowl, but not before William Jewell scored two of its own. Starting on the Jewell 21-yard line, the Ichabods scored on second down when Dornbusch caught a pass and ran it into the endzone.

Both the pregame ceremonies and the game were broadcast on WIBW radio.





Hugh L. Thompson
President

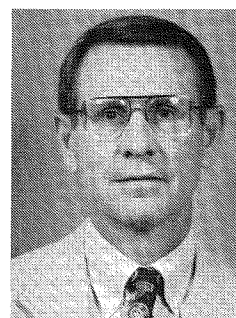
Hugh L. Thompson became Washburn's 13th president on Aug. 1, 1990. Under his leadership, the only municipal university in the country became a state-affiliated institution in 1991. This has led to opportunities for cooperative endeavors, such as a jointly offered doctoral degree in education administration with Kansas State University.

Other accomplishments attributed to Thompson's guidance include a programmatic review and planning process to integrate assessment and accreditation, initiation of the Comer Project and Learning Exchange programs, development of associate degrees in 17 programs with the Kaw Area Technical School, automation of Mabee Library and plans to create a learning resources center at the library, establishment of an enrollment management program and the construction of an on-campus building to house public television station KTWU.

Thompson has been very active as a member of committees and boards on several national professional organizations, such as the American Council on Education, American Association of State Colleges and Universities and American Association of University Administrators. He has edited two books and has published more than 80 articles.

Prior to coming to Washburn, Thompson was chancellor of Indiana University at Kokomo for 10 years. He also served as president of the Detroit Institute of Technology from 1977-80 and Siena Heights College from 1971-77.

A native of Martinsburg, WV, Thompson earned an undergraduate degree in English from Shepherd College in 1956. He holds a master's in health and human development from Penn State University and a doctorate in higher education administration from Case Western Reserve University. He and his wife, Patricia, have four children: Cheri, Linda, Tempe and Vicki.



Richard Johannngmeier
Director of Athletics

When Richard Johannngmeier became Washburn's director of athletics on Jan. 8, 1990, he brought a background as a student-athlete, coach and administrator to the position.

Under his guidance, the Washburn athletics program has blossomed at the NCAA Division II level. Events such as the Capital City Shootout and the Ichabod Club Girls Basketball Tournament, along with the corporate sponsorship of the most valuable player awards program, have helped increase the number of athletic scholarships funded by the Ichabod Club. Johannngmeier secured a grant from the NCAA which allows approximately 200 youths to attend the five-week National Youth Sports Program on the Washburn campus each summer.

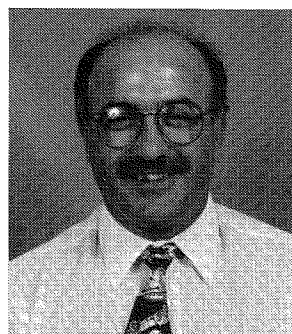
Johannngmeier's success at Washburn and his previous experience as an NCAA enforcement representative has led to his appointment to several committees, including the NCAA Council. The 46-member Council is empowered by the NCAA to establish and direct general policy, appoint committees and interpret the constitution and bylaws between conventions. Johannngmeier also is a member of the NCAA's Interpretations, Initial Eligibility Waivers, Legislative Review and Research committees.

Prior to joining the NCAA staff, Johannngmeier compiled a 58-44-5 record during 10 seasons as head coach at his alma mater, Southwest Missouri State University. He was a four-year letterman at tackle for the Bears. He gained 10 years of teaching and coaching experience in the New England area before assuming the helm of the Bears' program in 1976.

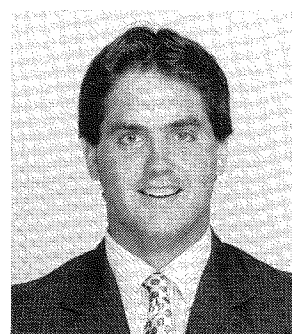

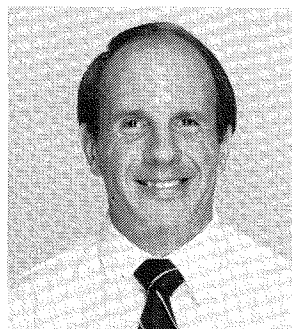

Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association

During more than 80 years, the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) -- formerly the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association -- has gained the reputation of being one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. MIAA members have won nine NCAA national championships while MIAA student-athletes have won more than 80 individual national titles.

The MIAA began a new era on July 1, 1992, when the 12-member conference assumed its new name and logo, reflecting changes in membership. The decision to change the conference name and logo originated in 1989 when Pittsburg State and Washburn became the first institutions outside the state of Missouri to attain MIAA membership. The new name was approved for 1992 to coincide with a third Kansas institution, Emporia State, gaining full membership status.

The MIAA conducts conference championships in 16 men's and women's sports. Its sponsors competition in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, soccer, and tennis for men. The conference offers championships for women in basketball, cross country, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, softball, tennis and volleyball.

The conference was first organized in 1912 with 14 member institutions. Of the current membership, only Central Missouri State, Northeast Missouri State and Northwest Missouri State are charter

members of the MIAA.

The first change in membership came in 1924 when the MIAA reorganized to include only the state's five regional colleges at Cape Girardeau, Kirksville, Maryville, Springfield and Warrensburg as members. Missouri-Rolla joined membership in 1935, followed by Lincoln in 1970 and Missouri-St. Louis in 1980.

The 1980s witnessed the biggest changes in conference membership and leadership since its founding. In 1981, Southwest Missouri State withdrew from the conference to attain Division I status. The MIAA also hired its first full-time commissioner in 1981 in the person of Ken B. Jones. Southwest Baptist joined the conference in 1986, returning the membership to eight institutions. The MIAA expanded to 12 members in 1989, and grew beyond the state borders, with the addition of Missouri Southern, Missouri Western, Pittsburg State and Washburn.

Southeast Missouri State withdrew from the MIAA in 1991 to attain Division I status, and was replaced by Emporia State, bringing the MIAA to its current membership.

Tony DeMeo
Head Coach

Tony DeMeo brings a new offense, a new philosophy and a new attitude to the Ichabods, attributes which he hopes, in turn, will bring respectability back to the Washburn football program.

After five seasons as an assistant coach at the NCAA Division I level, DeMeo returned to the head coaching ranks when he was named the 36th head Ichabod in Washburn football history on Dec. 28, 1993.

DeMeo brings 20 years of coaching experience to his position at Washburn, including 11 seasons as a collegiate head coach. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Pace University (1973-74) before returning to his alma mater, Iona College, as head coach from 1975 to 1978. While at Iona, DeMeo compiled a 22-10-2 record. He left the Gaels' program to serve two seasons as assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania (1979-80).

DeMeo was plucked from the Pennsylvania staff prior to the 1981 season to build from scratch a program at Mercyhurst College. During the next seven seasons, the Lakers posted a 41-21-2 record while DeMeo saw 94 percent of his student-athletes graduate. Mercyhurst was nationally ranked during his final four seasons at the helm and also were among the national statistical leaders in total offense, scoring offense and total defense.

In addition to his experience at Mercyhurst and Iona — where he had a combined record of 63-31-4 — DeMeo has gained experience as an offensive coordinator at Temple University (1988), James Madison

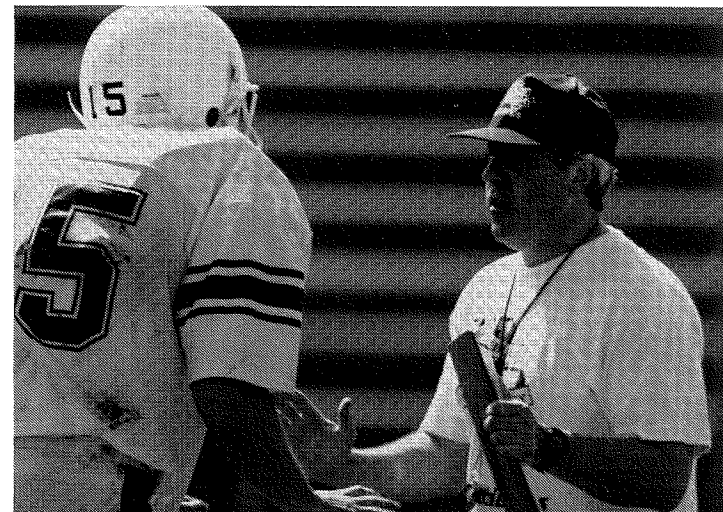
University (1990) and Murray State University (1992). He has logged time as an assistant coach at Pace (1973-74), Pennsylvania (1979-80), University of Delaware (1989) and University of Massachusetts (1991).

DeMeo has shared his knowledge of the game in numerous publications. He is author of *Explosive Football with the Multi-Bone Attack* (1990) and has written more than 30 articles for such publications as *Scholastic Coach* and *American Football Coaches Manual*.

An accomplished speaker, DeMeo has been the featured speaker at nearly 250 events, including sports banquets, business seminars, fund-raisers, football clinics and service clubs. His message was spread on a national level when he was a featured speaker for the Riddell-Ultra Power Football Coaches Clinics, a series of instructional coaching seminars conducted nationwide. On the local level, DeMeo has addressed more than 40 organizations since arriving in Topeka in January.

In addition to bringing strong football credentials to Washburn, DeMeo brings a deep commitment to community involvement to Topeka. DeMeo has extensive experience in community affairs, charity events and service clubs. In 1985 he became the first sports figure ever honored as recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from the Pennsylvania Jaycees. Since arriving in Topeka, he has been an active volunteer for the Capper Foundation and Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church, among other organizations.

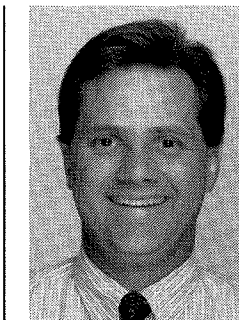

Assistant Coach

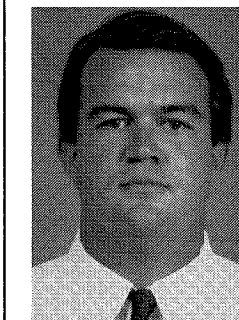

Assistant Coach



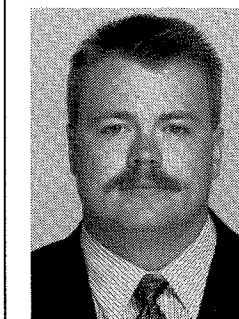
B.D. Kennedy begins his fourth season as Washburn's offensive line and special teams coach. He brings experience as a lineman and a coach to his position.

Student Assistant

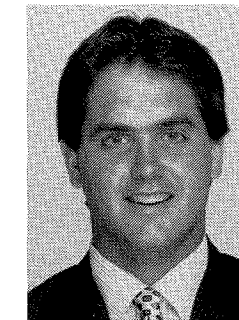


Brian Walsh begins his second season as a student assistant with the Ichabods and shares the duties of coaching the defensive line this season. He also directs the video exchange program.

Defensive Coordinator

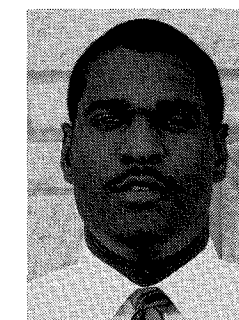

Assistant Coach



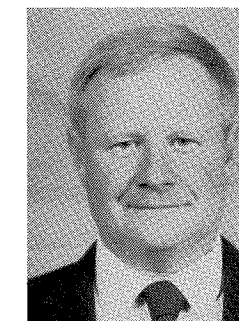

Moddrell has been involved with the Washburn football program since 1988 and has been an instructor at the university since 1990. In addition to his duties with the football team, Moddrell has developed weight training, conditioning and testing programs for several Washburn teams.

The 47-year-old Moddrell grew up in rural Cass County in Missouri. He earned his bachelor's in physical education from University of Kansas in 1979 and is currently completing the requirements for a master's in physiology of exercise and biomechanics at Kansas. He and wife, Carol, live in Lawrence with their children Mike (22), Andrew (15) and Mary Beth (10).

New Offense in the Cards as DeMeo Makes "A Whole New Deal"

Like an out-of-town gambler striding into a Western saloon with an air of confidence — maybe because of that ace up his sleeve— Tony DeMeo strode onto the Washburn campus last December ready to deal a new hand to the Ichabods. And, card players beware, this man has not one, but *four* aces up his sleeve.

When DeMeo was named the 36th head coach in team history last December, the hand he inherited was not the kind you hope to draw at the poker table. The Ichabods had strung together five straight losing seasons — compiling a 10-41 record — since advancing to the NAIA Division I playoffs in 1988. The 1993 Ichabods tied a dubious school record at the end of their winless campaign when their losing skid hit 12 straight games. Washburn has not won a game since defeating Southwest Baptist on Oct. 31, 1992. By the end of the 1993 season, there was player unrest and grumbings about the program within the Topeka community.

But a good gambler knows when to fold his hand and wait for the next game, and that is exactly what DeMeo has done. The new head coach is keeping the past in the past while promising Washburn players and fans "A Whole New Deal" in 1994.

"Basically, the 'Whole New Deal' is about building a new foundation for Washburn University football based on recruitment, retention, relationships and research," DeMeo explains.

"I feel we had an outstanding recruiting year," he says of the 50 newcomers who join 35 returning players. "Our retention program was based on the players' performance in the classroom and their ability to perform in the weight room and in the running program. We called it our 'Run to Win' program because it developed not only the ability to run, but the attitude, discipline and effort needed to develop a winning program."

DeMeo has been aggressive in working to improve the relationship between the Ichabods and the Topeka community. Since arriving on campus in January, he has taken his message about Washburn football to more than 40 clubs or civic organizations. He hopes that fostering better community relations, combined with a little success on the field, will bring respectability back to the program.

The new head coach explains that research is an important element of his philosophy because "you have to put together a strategy to maximize the effectiveness and potential of the players already here and those we recruited. Research allows you to make the most of hand dealt you."

Players learned this spring that the hand DeMeo has dealt holds "Four Aces:" Awareness, concentration, effort and synergy.

"The 'Four Aces' is based on the idea that focusing on performance instead of results will produce better results," DeMeo explains. "We instituted a program for the players to focus on things in their control. 'Awareness' is knowing your assignment so well it becomes second nature. 'Concentration' is focusing on using the proper technique at all times. 'Effort' is something the players learned to identify and quantify. 'Synergy' is not only getting better as an individual but consciously enhancing a teammate's performance."

"Embracing this overall philosophy leads to making excellence a habit whether you are in the classroom, on the football field or living everyday life," DeMeo concludes.

New Offense to Make Most of Personnel

DeMeo's goals for the offensive unit sound pretty simple: "do the things needed to win the game and that involves ball security, ball control and scoring."

While that sounds simple, those were areas the Ichabods had trouble in last year. Last year's unit turned the ball over 54 times — 33 times on fumbles and 21 times on interceptions — while finishing ninth in the MIAA in scoring at 17.1 points per game.

DeMeo hopes that improving in two of the four aces, namely concentration and effort, will decrease the number of turnovers while increasing the number of points scored.

If you ask DeMeo to explain the new "Multiple" offense which he has installed at Washburn, you get a very serious and straight-faced

answer from the man handling the duties of offensive coordinator: "Thirty-five percent wishbone, 35 percent run and shoot, 15 percent Delaware wing-T, 10 percent Bill Walsh pro-style and five percent sales tax."

DeMeo will be looking to return some balance to an offensive unit which last year led the MIAA in passing with 257.8 yards a game, but which also finished last in rushing at a meager 82.3 yards per game.

"Trying to achieve balance is part of our plan," DeMeo says. "We want to be able to pass against a run defense and run against a pass defense with equal efficiency."

And the new head coach thinks he has the personnel to execute the type of multiple offense he has implemented. Washburn returns eight offensive starters for the 1994 season, including three linemen, a quarterback and two of the best receivers in the MIAA.

"We are blessed to have two outstanding wide receivers in Mike Dritlein and Eric Kincade," DeMeo says, "but we will try to spread the ball around to all the skill people and make all of them part of the receiving corps."

Dritlein (6-1, 175, JR) and **Kincade** (6-2, 205, SR) finished Nos. 1 and 3, respectively, in MIAA receptions per game stats last season while Dritlein was second and Kincade fifth in yardage per game. Dritlein was a unanimous first-team all-conference pick who earned

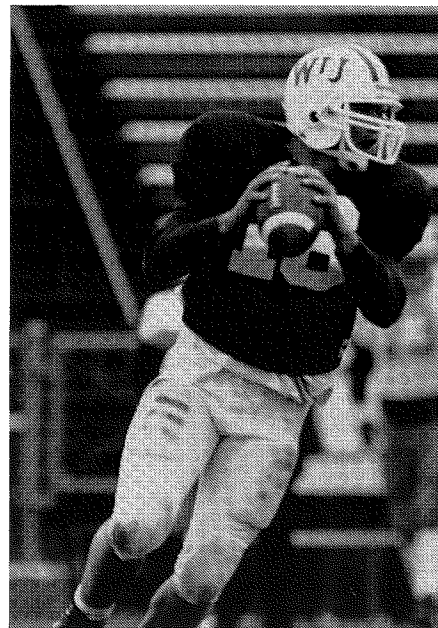
second-team all-region honors after grabbing 51 catches for 742 yards while playing in eight games. Kincade was the Ichabods' second-leading receiver with 538 yards on 39 catches. Senior **Kirk Potter** (5-10, 200) rounds out the group of returning wide receivers.

If Dritlein and Kincade were two of the reasons the Ichabods led the MIAA in passing offense, then quarterback **Joe Schartz** (6-2, 200, SO) was most certainly a third reason. Schartz saw action in all 10 games and started the final five games of the season. The freshman completed 109 of 233

passes for 1,430 yards, placing him fifth on Washburn's all-time single-season passing chart.

"Sartz has shown the ability to throw the ball consistently and was hitting over 62 percent in the spring," DeMeo says of his projected starting quarterback. "In spring drills, Shartz showed outstanding ability to run the triple option, which is the basis of our running game. The fullbacks are key to the triple option and Nick Cummings and Keith Coleman both adapted to the triple option in the spring and were our leading ball carriers. DeMarko Coleman and some of the recruits give us big play potential on the pitch dimension of the triple option."

Cummings (5-11, 200, SR), **D. Coleman** (6-0, 170, JR) and **K. Coleman** (5-8, 185, SO) finished one, two and three in team rushing stats last season. Cummings was the workhorse, carrying the ball 112 times for 400 yards. D. Coleman was second in rushing with 199 yards on 48 carries while finishing third in receiving with 223 yards on 27 catches. K. Coleman, who is moving from halfback to fullback this season, carried the ball 39 times in his freshman campaign for 124 yards. Also returning among the specialists are halfback **Mike Joyce** (5-10, 180, SO) and tight end-turned-halfback **Brad Podojil** (6-4, 260, JR).



While the multiple offense is well-suited to the personnel at the specialist positions, it is even better suited to the players up front, DeMeo says.

"This offense is much more in line with their individual abilities than what was run in the past," DeMeo says of his offensive line. "The lineman will have simpler blocking schemes which will allow them to concentrate more on technique and second effort."

Three returning starters are among 15 players listed at offensive line positions on the preseason chart, giving the Ichabods more depth than they have enjoyed in years. Junior **Bryan Dugan** (6-7, 270) returns to the left tackle spot where he started all 10 games a year ago enroute to earning honorable mention all-conference accolades. Next to him is another 10-game starter in the person of senior **Erik Smith** (6-3, 245). Also returning to a starting job is senior **Steve Stegman** (6-4, 255) who is slated to start at center. Other veterans returning to the line are sophomores **Matt Bainbridge** (6-4, 275), **John Curry** (6-6, 265), **Josh Parker** (6-6, 295) and **Paul Snider** (6-6, 285).

"I feel that Stegman, Smith and Dugan are outstanding drive blockers and good pass blockers, and are made to order for this offense," DeMeo says. "Snider was one of the big surprises of the spring and took to the offense very well. Parker, Bainbridge and Curry also performed well in spite of their positions being jockeyed around."

DeMeo Looks for Speed in Simplified Defense

If the offensive goals sound simple, than DeMeo's defensive goals are downright simplistic: improve the overall speed and tackling ability.

Improvement in those areas should allow the 16 returning players to erase the bad memories of 1993 when the injury-plagued and young unit allowed a team record 414 points while finishing last in the MIAA in total defense (462.1), rushing defense (306.0), pass defense efficiency (136.8) and scoring (31.4).

But DeMeo feels the unit made great strides during spring practice. And the playing experience from a year ago should season the unit a little. While seven of the returners are classified as "returning starters," 15 of the 16 returning players started at least one game sometime during the season.

"We have simplified the defense to let loose the players' natural aggressiveness," DeMeo says. "Simplicity, speed and hitting intensity are key to our defense and what we are looking for."

DeMeo says that while each area of the unit — linebackers, secondary and line — made improvements this spring, he feels the greatest improvements were made in the linebacker corps.

"The linebackers made the biggest improvement. John Grundy has added a punishing tackler to our group," DeMeo says. "Keith Small and Kevin Peck have improved their mobility and are capable of making the big hit. Wendell Snodgrass will definitely push his way into more playing time in that group and Jeff Koch gives us good depth in the middle."

Grundy (6-0, 250, SO) has spent the last year at Washburn establishing residency after transferring from Purdue. After sitting



out fall practice, Grundy returned to action in the spring and is expected to win a starting job this fall. **Peck** (6-2, 205, SO) was the team's second-leading tackler during his freshman season when he made seven starts, compiling 40 solos and 21 assists. Small (5-10, 220, SO) started five of the nine games in which he played compiling 31 total tackles to average 3.4 per game. **Snodgrass** (6-0, 210, SO) compiled 17 of his 20 total tackles in the last half of the season when he saw an increase in playing time after spending much of his time on punting duties early in the season. After starting the last two games of the 1993 season at defensive tackle, **Koch** (6-0, 225, SO) moved back to a linebacker position this spring.

The majority of the Ichabods' returning starters are in the secondary where a quartet of juniors — **Nolan Jeffery** (6-3, 195), **Maurice Ragland** (5-11, 170), **Eryc Reese** (5-10, 195) and **Rory Seals** (5-10, 180) — return to starting assignments.

"I was very pleased with the secondary's development this spring," the new head coach says. "They played with enthusiasm. They are outstanding tacklers as a group and they have the speed to prevent the big play."

"The big thing I like about the four returning starters is that they all have big play potential. And they all have speed, are all great tacklers and are good cover guys," he adds. "Zuri Stokes and Toby Thomas give us tremendous depth while Scott Perkins and J.T. Collor had productive springs."

Reese was the team's third leading tackler a year ago with 58 total stops from the strong safety position. He led the team with 45 unassisted tackles. Jeffery is a two-year starter at free safety although injuries limited his playing time to seven games last season. But he made the most of his final appearance of the season when he had a career-high 17 total tackles — including 15 solos — in the season finale at Southwest Baptist. Ragland and Seals each played in the first nine games of the season before missing that Southwest Baptist game with a concussion and shoulder injury, respectively. On the season, Ragland had 33 tackles to average 3.7 per game while Seals had 26 to average 2.9 per game. Seals also was second on the team in pass deflections with three. **Stokes** (5-10, 165, SO) was one of only a handful of defensive players to remain healthy for all 10 games. He had 29 tackles to average 2.9 per game during his freshman campaign.

After reviewing game films from 1993, DeMeo concluded the biggest problem of the defensive line was a lack of depth as injuries took a big toll on the line. Two of the four starters in the season opener — **Beau Caryl** (6-1, 235, SO) and **Brien Swingle** — were lost for the season by halftime of the third game while the other two starters — **Mike Floyd** (6-0, 265, SR) and **Daina Williams** — missed a combined total of five games. **Brian Lay** (6-5, 250, SO) and **Grant Webber** (6-3, 220, SO) were the only two linemen to play in all 10 games while a third player, **Jason Lloyd** (6-3, 210, JR), appeared in all 10 but was a converted defensive end. Other returners coming off injuries from a year ago are **Kiley Rice** (6-5, 235, SR) and **Greg Gaul** (6-6, 290, JR).

"The biggest problem on the line in 1993 was depth and I feel our recruiting class fixes that," DeMeo says. "In the spring, I saw great improvement by Mike Floyd and Greg Gaul inside while Beau Caryl, Grant Webber and Jason Lloyd came on strong outside. Brian Lay showed great potential at both end and tackle, in addition to having great endurance; he has a tremendous future at Washburn."

"Kiley Rice is coming back from a knee injury in the spring, but should help shore up the front four," DeMeo adds.

Recruits Add Depth to Kicking Game

With the return of **Dan Brown** (5-10, 160, JR) and **Aaron Sigg** (6-4, 200, SO) and the addition of two freshman kickers — **Brian Fuemmeler** (6-0, 170) and **Artur Oczko** (6-4, 190), the Ichabods have more depth in the kicking department than in the past several seasons.

Brown and Fuemmeler are expected to challenge for both the placekicking and punting duties while Sigg adds a third placekicker to that race. Oczko is the third punter vying for that job.

"The kicking game is wide open," DeMeo says, "but it needs to be resolved in the preseason."

Football Comes to Campus in 1885

Back in 1885, when there were no paved streets in Topeka, and "MacVicar" was the name of the Washburn president and not one of those unpaved streets, an Englishman brought football to the Washburn campus.

Six years later, in 1891, the Ichabod football tradition entered a new era as Washburn played its first season of intercollegiate competition. According to Washburn records, there were no games played in 1895, allowing the 1991 squad to celebrate the 100th season in Washburn football history.

Washburn celebrated the 50th anniversary of football's debut on campus in 1935. Robert Stone, a member of the team in 1885, penned a brief sketch of the first 50 years of Washburn football which appeared in the Oct. 30 issue of the *Topeka Journal*. In the article, Stone recalled:

"Fifty years ago the Washburn college students organized the first college football team in the state. A young Englishman, who worked in the Santa Fe shops, brought with him from the old country an enthusiasm for the Rugby game. He organized a Santa Fe football team and challenged the Washburn students to organize and play. We accepted the challenge, organized a team and beat him. We then induced other colleges in the state to get into the field, and until after I graduated Washburn college our team was unbeaten on the football field. As I recollect, the first defeat was suffered at Columbia, Mo., in 1890."

Ichabods Claim Six Conference Titles During Stints with Nine Conferences

Throughout its athletic history, Washburn has looked beyond the state borders of Kansas to find conference affiliations. The university has competed in nine different conferences, including its current association with the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA), an NCAA Division II league consisting of institutions in Missouri and Kansas.

Washburn's longest association was with the Central Intercollegiate Conference, of which the Ichabods were members from 1941 to 1968. Like the MIAA, the CIC included institutions in Missouri and Kansas.

Membership in three conferences was more regional in nature, forcing the Ichabods to travel throughout five states. The Missouri Valley Conference consisted of schools in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Iowa and Missouri, many of whom are currently NCAA Division I member institutions. Both the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference and the Great Plains Athletic Conference put the Ichabods on the road to Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Nebraska and Kansas.

Washburn has won two outright conference championships, while earning co-championships four times. The Ichabods were Central Conference co-champions in 1931. They held the title of Central Intercollegiate Conference co-champions in 1949, 1953, and 1954.

In 1964, Washburn won its first outright championship by claiming the Central Intercollegiate Conference title. Washburn's most recent conference crown was won in 1983 as members of the Central States Intercollegiate Conference.

Did Washburn Throw First Forward Pass?

When an athlete or team accomplishes a "first" these days, all America can witness as modern technology is capable of bringing it into our living rooms. Firsts which happened decades ago, like who threw the first forward pass, are a little less clear.

Many schools — Washburn included — claim to have thrown the first forward pass. Whether Washburn did or not depends on how the implementation of the rule is viewed.

Records indicate that the forward pass rule was written by Navy coach Paul Dashiell and became a legal part of the game in 1906. Any forward pass thrown before the official rule would be illegal, and in this researcher's opinion, not a historical first. Accepting that view prohibits one from believing that the first forward pass was thrown during either a Yale-Princeton game in 1876 or a North Carolina-Georgia game in 1895, as various documents show.

According to Pat Harmon, historian at the National College Football Hall of Fame, the first legal collegiate forward pass was thrown by St. Louis University during a Sept. 5, 1906, against Carroll College.

So we have illegal forward passes before the 1906 rule, and legal forward passes after the rule. But what about a pass thrown during a game designed to test proposed rules changes? That is where Washburn's claim comes into play. If you believe a "first" can happen during a game testing proposed rules, then Washburn is correct in claiming it threw the first forward pass.

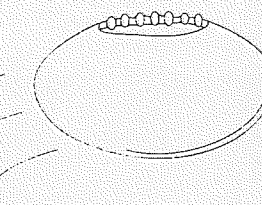
The Capper/MRI Quick-Fact Book of Kansas states on p. 15: "The first forward pass in football history was thrown in December 1905 in a football game between Washburn University and Fairmount College."

An article in the Oct. 30, 1935, edition of the *Topeka Journal*, entitled "Washburn Played Game 30 Years Ago Testing New Grid Rules Suggested," reports: "Washburn was in the football spotlight Christmas Day in 1905 when the Ichabods played a postseason game with Fairmount in Wichita to test the proposed rules changes. It was known as the "Walter Camp" game."

The *Kansas Historical Quarterly* published an article entitled "Evans: College Football in Kansas," which quotes Bliss Isely, who played in the 1905 game: "The first forward pass in history was thrown that afternoon by Bill Davis to Art Solter and was good for a 10-yard gain."

The article goes on to say "Isley said that the pass delivery was primitive. Davis heaved the ball with both hands like a basketball player shooting a free throw and it wobbled through the air."

From these sources, this researcher concludes that Washburn did indeed throw the first forward pass on Christmas Day, 1905, during a game designed to test a new set of rules. The game in question was not the regular season contest listed in this media guide — in which Washburn prevailed 10-6 — but rather a scoreless tie which is not listed with the 1905 scores.
