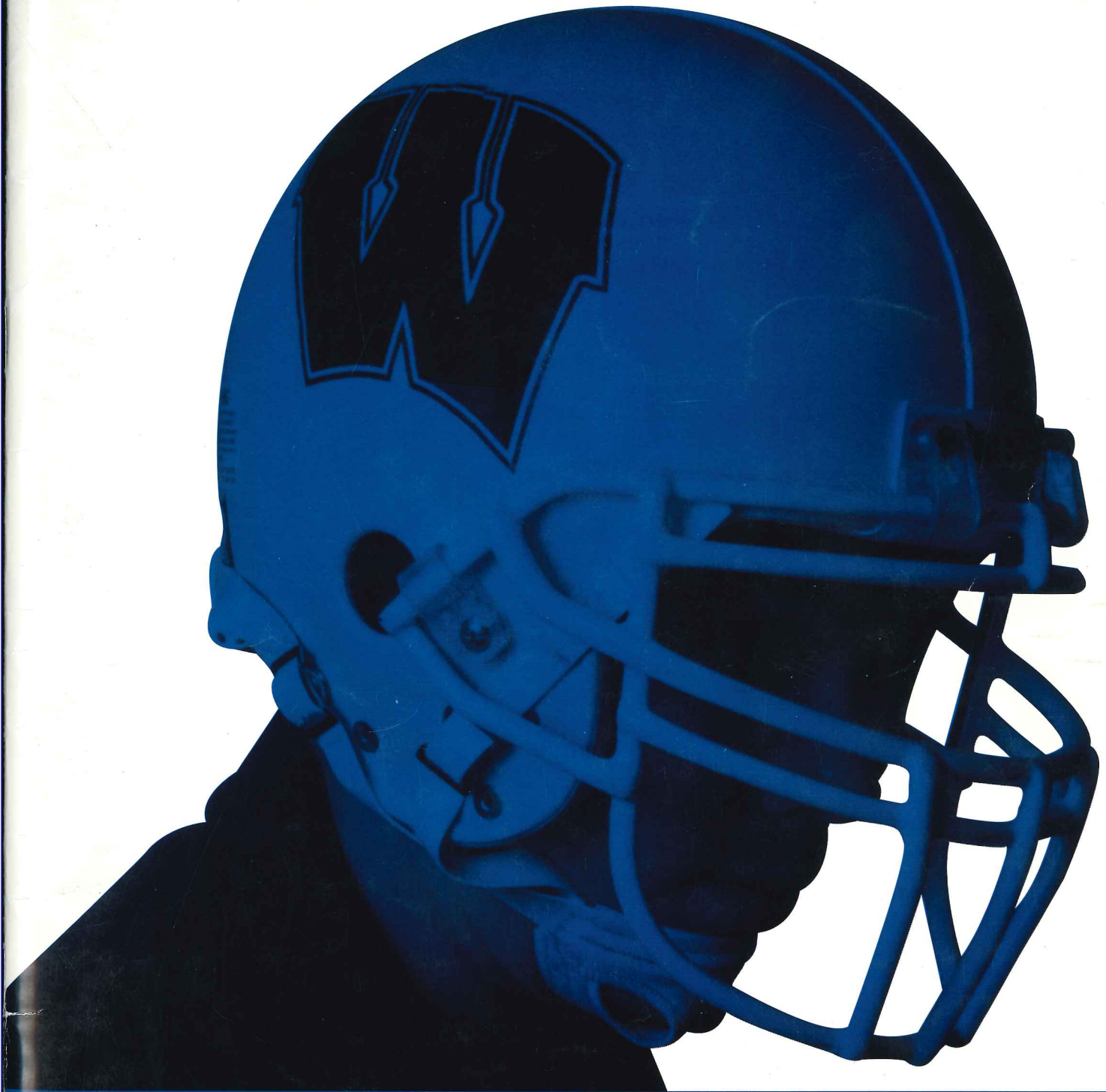

# MEDIA INFORMATION

## Media Credentials / Parking

All requests for press, photo and broadcast credentials, and press box space for Washburn home football games should be made in advance and directed to Sports Information Director Robert Rodgers. Passes are mailed in advance as long as time permits, otherwise they are available in the requesting person's name at the will call window on the west side of Moore Bowl approximately one hour prior to game time.

The sports information office is located in Room 200-D of the Petro Allied Health Center. The telephone number is (913) 231-1010, ext. 1791.

## Press Box (913-231-1010, x1563)

The Washburn press box is located on the west side of Moore Bowl. Washburn University and the Football Writers Association of America remind all media representatives, press box officials and statisticians that the press box is a working press area and cheerleading for either team will not be tolerated. Rodgers will instruct security personnel to direct violators to the exit. Your cooperation is expected and appreciated.

## Press Conferences / Interviews

Head Coach Tony DeMeo and selected players are available during weekly press conferences. The press conferences are conducted on Thursdays beginning Sept. 5. They begin at 1:00 p.m. in Whiting Room 350A. Members of the media wishing to request a specific player attend the press conference should contact Robert Rodgers no later than noon the day before.

Player interviews during the week must be arranged through Robert Rodgers. For best results, please make arrangements at least one day in advance. Members of the media may contact Head Coach Tony DeMeo in his office during the week. The best time to reach Coach DeMeo is 11 a.m. to Noon, Monday through Friday.

Postgame interviews may be conducted on the field or in the Petro Center locker room area following a 10-minute "cooling-off" period.

## Photographers

Photo credentials must be displayed at all times. A photo credential allows access to both the sideline and press box areas. Under NCAA playing rules, photographers must stay beyond the 25-yard line at each end of the field and must stay clear of the team/bench areas.

## Game Services

Media representatives covering a game at Washburn will receive game programs, pre-game notes and statistics. In addition, NCAA scoring summaries, final team and individual stats, drive charts, tackle charts and quarterly updates are provided. All statistics are kept on computer using the *Automated Scorebook for Football* software from MRR Systems. The press box has only one telephone which is reserved for use by members of the sports information office. Media representatives are invited to install their own lines or use the telephones in the Washburn athletics department, located in the Petro Allied Health Center. Exceptions to this policy in order to meet a deadline can be made by Rodgers.

## Radio / Television Broadcasting

Approval for radio/television broadcasts of all Washburn home football games must be received in advance from Rodgers.

KDVV-FM 100.3 Radio (V100) holds exclusive rights to broadcast Washburn athletics events for the 1996-97 academic year. KDVV FM provides one telephone line for use by visiting radio stations on a reciprocal basis. Radio stations wishing to use the courtesy line should contact Rodgers.

Television stations seeking video tape highlights may want to contact one of the Topeka affiliates listed.

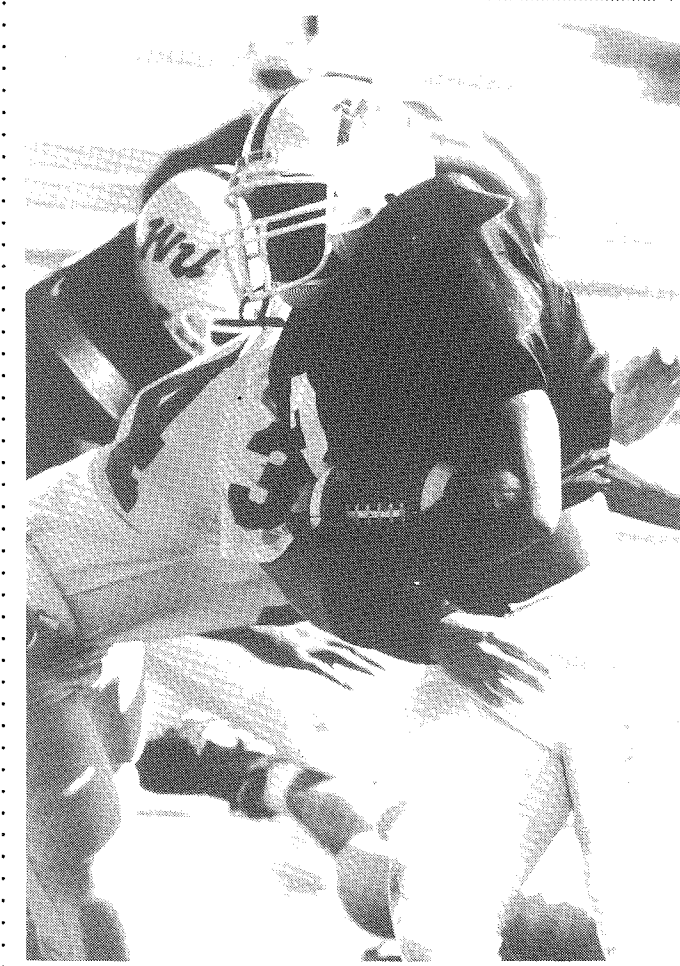

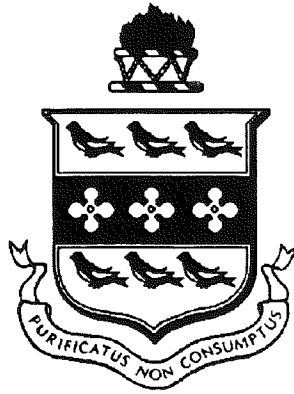

## Dr. Hugh Thompson, President



Dr. Hugh L. Thompson became Washburn's 13th president on Aug. 1, 1990. Under his leadership, the only municipal university in the country became a state-affiliated institution in 1991. This has

led to opportunities for cooperative endeavors, such as a jointly offered doctoral degree in education administration with Kansas State University.

Other accomplishments attributed to Thompson's guidance include a programmatic review and planning process to integrate assessment and accreditation, initiation of the Comer Project and Learning Exchange programs, development of associate degrees in 17 programs with the Kaw Area Technical School, automation of Mabee Library and plans to create a learning resources center at the library, establishment of an enrollment management program and the construction

of an on-campus building to house public television station KTWU.

Thompson has been very active as a member of committees and boards on several national professional organizations, such as the American Council on Education, American Association of State Colleges and Universities and American Association of University Administrators. He has edited two books and has published more than 80 articles.

Prior to coming to Washburn, Thompson was chancellor of Indiana University at Kokomo for 10 years. He also served as president of the Detroit Institute of Technology from 1977-80 and Siena Heights College from 1971-77.

A native of Martinsburg, W.V., Thompson earned an undergraduate degree in English from Shepherd College in 1956. He holds a master's in health and human development from Penn State University and a doctorate in higher education administration from Case Western Reserve University. He and his wife, Patricia, have four children: Cheri, Linda, Tempe and Vicki.

The university's success is measured in part by the achievements of its graduates who include a Nobel Prize winner in medicine, members of the U.S. Congress, members of the Kansas State Legislature, numerous judges who have graduated from the law school as well as many leaders in business, education, communications and service.

## Learning Opportunities

Washburn is committed to providing a quality education that will enable its students to embrace the responsibility of an ever changing world.

Students may choose from more than 70 degree programs within the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Business, School of Law, School of Nursing, or the School of Applied Studies.

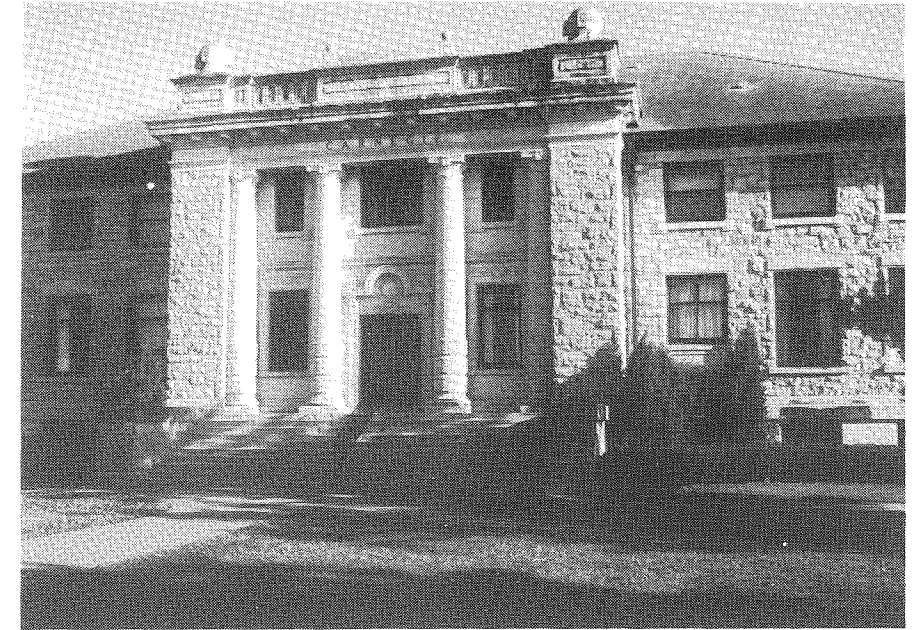

## ATHLETICS AT WASHBURN UNIVERSITY

### A Winning Tradition

Washburn teams compete for NCAA Division II championships as a member of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA).

Washburn currently offers intercollegiate competition for men in the sports of baseball, basketball, football, golf and tennis. Women compete in basketball, softball, tennis and volleyball.

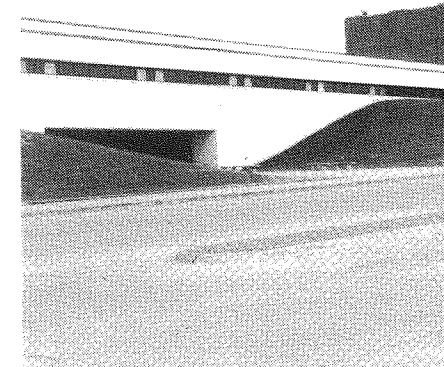
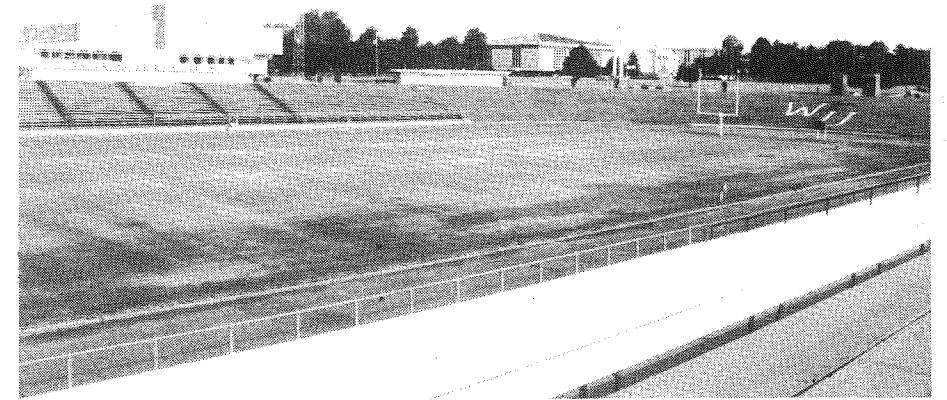
Success has been obtained by both teams and individuals. The Ichabods basketball team has won its four MIAA regular season championships in the last five years and advanced to the NCAA Division II national tournament during those same seasons. The Ichabods reached the semifinals of the national tournament in 1994.

The Lady Blues basketball team reached the "Sweet 16" of their 1995 national tournament while making a fifth straight appearance at the national event.

Both basketball teams finished the 1994-95 season ranked in the top 20 of their respective national polls.

The men's tennis team was selected for its first appearance in the NCAA Division II national tournament in 1995, while Washburn was selected to host both the men's and women's Midwest regionals.

Individually, many student-athletes earn all-conference, all-region and All-America



honors each year. During the 1995-96 seasons, 12 student-athletes representing nine of Washburn's teams earned first-team all-MIAA honors in their respective sport.

### Academic Success

While Washburn strives for success on the playing field, the university also takes pride in the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes.

During the 1995-96 academic year, 86 of the university's 200 student-athletes maintained a 3.0 grade point average or above. 27 Ichabods and Lady Blues representing nine Washburn teams were named to the MIAA all-academic team for their respective sport.

Each year, several student-athletes are honored at the district or national level through the GTE Academic All-America program. Senior wide receiver Michael Dritlein was named second team GTE Academic All-America in 1993 and 1995.

Also in 1995-96, Michael Dritlein was named the recipient of two significant awards. First he was honored by with the Burger King Scholar Athlete of the Week in September. That award was \$25,000 to the WU athletic scholarship fund in his name. He was then awarded the Ken B. Jones Student Athlete of the Year distinction during the spring. It is the highest award for a student-athlete in the MIAA.

### Loren Ferre', Director of Athletics



Loren Ferre' became Washburn's director of athletics in February of 1996 after a six-year appointment at Black Hills State University in Spearfish, S.D.

Ferre' is a dynamic leader that has implemented many internal changes within the athletic department since arriving on campus.

He has put increasing scholarships and departmental fund raising at the top of his list.

While at BHSU, Ferre' was also director of the Donald E. Young Sports Fitness Center, a 172,000 square foot, \$10.2 million facility.

During his Black Hills tenure, the athletics department nearly tripled its outside revenue, including large increases in ticket sales and scholarship funding. All 10 varsity teams won

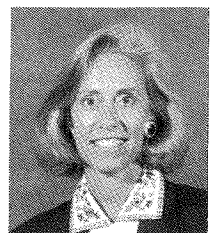
a conference title in his final three years while services for student-athletes were enhanced.

Prior to joining the staff at Black Hills State, Ferre' spent 17 years at the University of North Texas, serving in several capacities. He was director of the Coliseum (1987-90), associate director of the Coliseum and assistant director of athletics (1983-87), assistant director of the Coliseum (1980-83) and event coordinator (1978-80).

The 47-year-old is a 1971 graduate of Texas Christian University, earning a bachelor of arts degree. He earned a master's in journalism from North Texas in 1982. He is currently completing course requirements for a doctorate of education in sports administration from the University of Northern Colorado. He expects to complete his work in 1996.

Ferre' and his wife Sarah have two daughters, six-year-old Caitlin and nine-month-old Hope.

Assistant Athletic Director

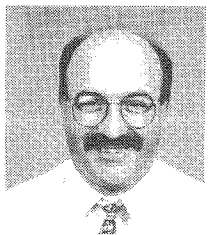
Janet Degginger is entering her ninth year as Washburn's assistant athletic director.

Head Athletic Trainer

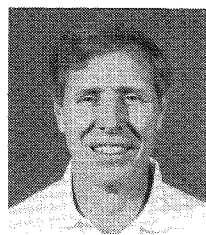
Steve Ice enters his 15th year as the Head Athletic Trainer at Washburn University.

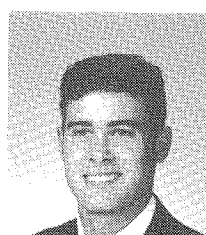

Robert Rodgers enters his first year as Sports Information Director at Washburn after being named to the post in June of 1996.

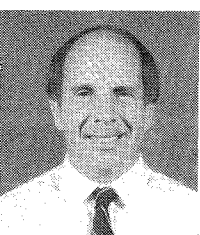

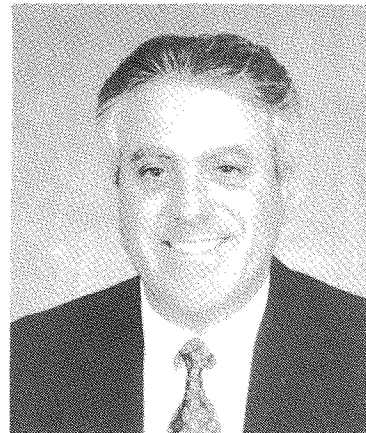

## HEAD COACH TONY DEMEO



**"We've made great strides since during the past two seasons. When I arrived in 1993, we had only nine players benching over 300 pounds. Today we have the strength and speed to compete in this conference."**

Tony DeMeo enters his third season at the Ichabod helm in search of the final pieces of a tremendous turnaround of the Washburn Ichabods football program.

DeMeo brought a new offense, a new philosophy and a new attitude to the Ichabods as their new head coach for the 1994 season. Those attributes have, in turn, brought respectability back to the Washburn football program. Twice picked in the preseason to finish last in the MIAA, the Ichabods claimed eighth place in the standings at the end of their 2-8 1994 season and a 4-6 mark for a sixth place finish in 1995.

After five seasons as an assistant coach at the NCAA Division I level, DeMeo returned to the head coaching ranks when he was named the 36th head Ichabod in Washburn football history on Dec. 28, 1993.

DeMeo possesses 21 years of coaching experience, including 12 seasons as a collegiate head coach. His current career record stands at 69-45-4.

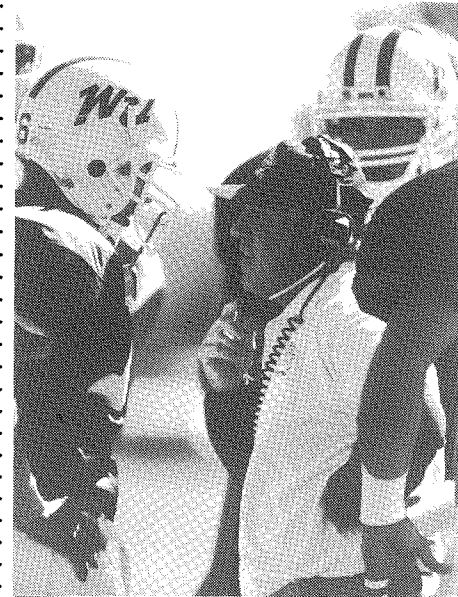
He began his coaching career as an assistant at Pace University (1973-74) before returning to his alma mater, Iona College, as head coach from 1975 to 1978. While at Iona, DeMeo compiled a 22-10-2 record. He left the Gaels' program to serve two seasons as assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania (1979-80).

DeMeo was plucked from the Pennsylvania staff prior to the 1981 season to build from scratch a program at Mercyhurst College. During the next seven seasons, the Lakers posted a 41-21-2 record while DeMeo saw 94 percent of his student-athletes graduate. Mercyhurst was nationally ranked during his final four seasons at the helm and also was among the national statistical leaders in total offense, scoring offense and total defense.

In 1994, DeMeo was honored with the Dr. William P. Garvey Lifetime Achievement Award for a major and significant contribution to Mercyhurst College Athletics.

Since leaving Mercyhurst, DeMeo has gained experience as an offensive coordinator at Temple University (1988), James Madison University (1990) and Murray State University (1992). He also has logged time as an assistant coach at University of Delaware (1989) and University of Massachusetts (1991).

DeMeo has shared his knowledge of the game in numerous publications. He is author of *Explosive Football with the Multi-Bone Attack* (1990) and has written more than 40 articles for such publications as *Scholastic Coach* and *American Football Coaches Manual*. His most recent publication, *The Grass Isn't Greener; It's Only AstroTurf*, went on sale in



November 1994. DeMeo was recently named to a three-year term on the American Football Coaches Association's Summer Manual Committee. The committee gathers technical articles for the AFCA's annual summer manual.

In addition to being appointed to the AFCA committee, DeMeo also has been named to the NCAA Football Rules Committee. His four-year term on that committee began last fall. The Washburn head coach is one of four NCAA Division II representatives on the 16-man committee.

An accomplished speaker, DeMeo has been the featured speaker at more than 350 events, including sports banquets, business seminars, fund-raisers, football clinics and service clubs. His message was spread on a national level when he was a featured speaker for the Riddell-Ultra Power Football Coaches Clinics, a series of instructional coaching seminars conducted nationwide. On the local level, DeMeo has addressed more than 60 organizations since arriving in Topeka.

In addition to having brought strong football credentials to his position at Washburn, DeMeo also brought a deep commitment to community involvement. DeMeo has extensive experience in community affairs, charity events and service clubs. In 1985 he became the first sports figure ever honored as recipient of the Distinguished Service Award from the Pennsylvania Jaycees. Since arriving in Topeka, he has been an active volunteer for the Capper Foundation including being named Honorary Chairperson of the annual Capper Walk. DeMeo has also been active with the Most Pure Heart of Mary Catholic Church, and many other organizations.

The 47-year-old DeMeo is a native of the Bronx, NY. He earned a bachelor's degree in history with a minor in education from Iona in 1971. He has done post-graduate work at City University of New York. He lives in Topeka with his wife, Joanne, and three of their four daughters: Annie (15), Mary Kate (14) and Michelle (7). Oldest daughter Sara (19) is a sophomore at College of the Holy Cross.

## A CLOSER LOOK AT THE ICHABOD MENTOR

### Tony DeMeo's Washburn Ichabods

**TOPEKA, Kan.** — CAUTION: CONSTRUCTION AHEAD! Just as a jackhammer chisels away at the concrete of a highway to prepare it for resurfacing, Washburn University third-year head coach Tony DeMeo inspires and chips away at the hard, rocklike exterior of a losing attitude that the team had prior to his arrival in December of 1993. He's succeeded and has continued to coach the Ichabods toward the ultimate goal they've set: a national championship.

The Washburn football program is a true example of a work in progress entering the 1996 season. Since his appointment, DeMeo has accepted a monumental task and is now beginning to see the fruits of his labor.

"We've been able to instill a confidence in our players that has translated into effort and wins," said DeMeo. "We're ahead of schedule of where I thought we'd be when I took over the program in 1993. We've redshirted nearly our entire freshman class for the past two seasons and have created the kind of depth needed to compete in the toughest Division II conference in the country."

The Ichabods have endured some long seasons in the recent past. In addition to the 0-10 season in 1993, WU went just 2-8 in 1992, 1-10 in 1991 and 4-6 in 1990. Since 1980, the Washburn football program had only four winning seasons in 15 and three of those were under Larry Elliott from 1986 to 1988.

DeMeo was left with 27 returning players after Dennis Caryl's resignation. Tony didn't waste any time and recruited from the get-go to just get enough players to scrimmage in the spring.

After three solid recruiting classes, DeMeo is able to save his freshmen for the future of the program instead of throwing them to the Gorillas, Lions, 'Cats and 'Dogs of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

"I couldn't believe how behind we were to the rest of the MIAA in just physical and mental toughness when I came here," said DeMeo. "Now we're able to redshirt our entire freshman class, giving them time to mature and develop without forcing them into action when they're not ready."

The first thing DeMeo did as the Ichabod mentor was use a jackhammer approach at the recent losing trend of Washburn football. After WU finished the 1993 season with a 0-10 record, DeMeo was brought in to regain the lost pride on the Washburn gridiron. A master plan was devised and a strict regimen was installed for the football team: Work hard and improve every day toward a championship, or find somewhere else to play.

"I've always looked for a certain kind of football player," said DeMeo "Our student-athletes at Washburn must maintain the highest standards on and off the field. A college degree and a championship is our ultimate goal."

The next item on the agenda was installing a new offense. The Multi-Bone, an offense designed by DeMeo in his days at Iona, is a perfect fit for the Ichabods. Most service academies run the offense that is easily adaptable to the personnel on hand. That was one advantage DeMeo had stepping in, an offense that could be productive right away.

Community support is always a big part in the success of a collegiate athletic program. Topeka has long supported the Ichabods but the past decade has seen the hometown fires burn dim for the local football program.

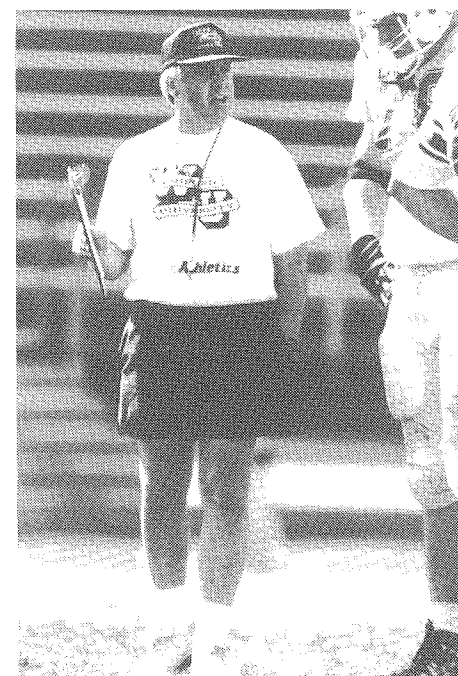
"One thing I've seen since I've been here is genuine, positive community support from the citizens and businesses in Topeka," said DeMeo. "They want us to succeed and that's exactly what we're doing."

Another way that DeMeo has drawn closer to the community is in the form of public service. The team is involved in many community projects including the annual Capper Foundation walk for children with physical disabilities, campus blood drives and raising money for other charities.

The final piece of the Ichabod puzzle will be a consistent winner with championship possibilities. "With the size of Topeka and the great people in northeast Kansas behind us, we'll give them something to cheer about," added DeMeo.

Work in progress. Championships are won by those who work hard for 365 days a year. That is the only way Tony DeMeo and the Washburn Ichabods like it. Watch your step.

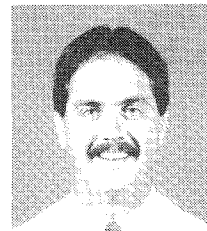

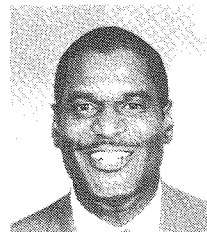
### ANDY WILLIAMS Defensive Coordinator

### DALE PERINE Assistant Coach

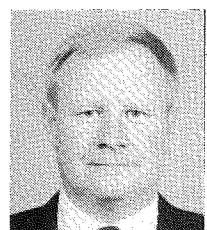

Todd Rundle begins his first season as an assistant coach after serving as head football coach at Maine Central Institute for the past three years.

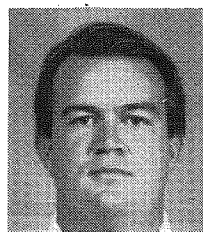
Rundle will handle the running backs and receivers as well as arranging the team's travel schedule.

### B.D. KENNEDY Assistant Coach

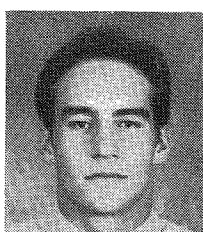
B.D. Kennedy begins his sixth season as Washburn's offensive line coach.

### About Moore Bowl



Moore Bowl has served as the home for Washburn football since it was dedicated on September 28, 1928. Throughout its 67-year history, the bowl has been witness to hundreds of high school and college games, long-standing conference rivalries and the tornado of 1966.

Construction of the bowl was part of a \$215,000 athletic project which also included the addition of Whiting Field House to the Washburn campus. The bowl was built in a natural depression south of Old Thomas Gymnasium and was designed to be similar to the facility at the University of Colorado. By taking advantage of the natural depression, the bowl was constructed in just seven months at a cost of approximately \$30,000. The construction work was under the direction of Cleveland S. Loper, head of the engineering department, with the contract for the excavation given to C.A. Ritchie of Topeka.

The original design for the horseshoe-shaped bowl (overall size of 400' by 650') called for 15,000 seats—8,000 in the original construction with the remaining seats to be built along the north end of the horseshoe. Additional seating was not added and the bowl currently has a seating capacity of 7,200. A press box and concessions stands were added to the facility in 1963 but destroyed three years later in the '66 tornado.

The bowl was named in honor of George Godfrey Moore, a Topeka sports enthusiast who had developed a reputation throughout the Midwest as a keen sportsman and friend of Washburn.

## Q & A WITH COACH TONY DEMEO

**Q: You and your staff have a lot of expectations entering the 1996 season. What are some of those expectations?**

**A:** We want to improve on what we started two seasons ago when I first took on the head coaching job at Washburn. We are looking forward to this season because we think we have the depth and talent to significantly improve on what we have accomplished in the past two seasons.

**Q: You talk about your depth. What has that meant to your team?**

**A:** It means everything. Good team depth is what wins championships. Players being able to step in and contribute due to an injury or illness really makes the difference. We've been able to redshirt our entire freshman class for the past two seasons and that builds a program two ways. First is that it gives your players an extra year of school to adjust to both academics and athletics. Secondly, it makes your team stronger physi-

cally. When I first took over, we had to sacrifice our young players because that is all we had. Now three years later, our freshmen are brought along at the pace we set for them and that makes us a better football team.

**Q: What were some of your goals going into spring practice?**

**A:** With the loss of Mike Dritlein at wide receiver, we knew we needed to find a way to get the football in our other talented, skill peoples' hands. Our receivers spent got in a lot of repetitions and

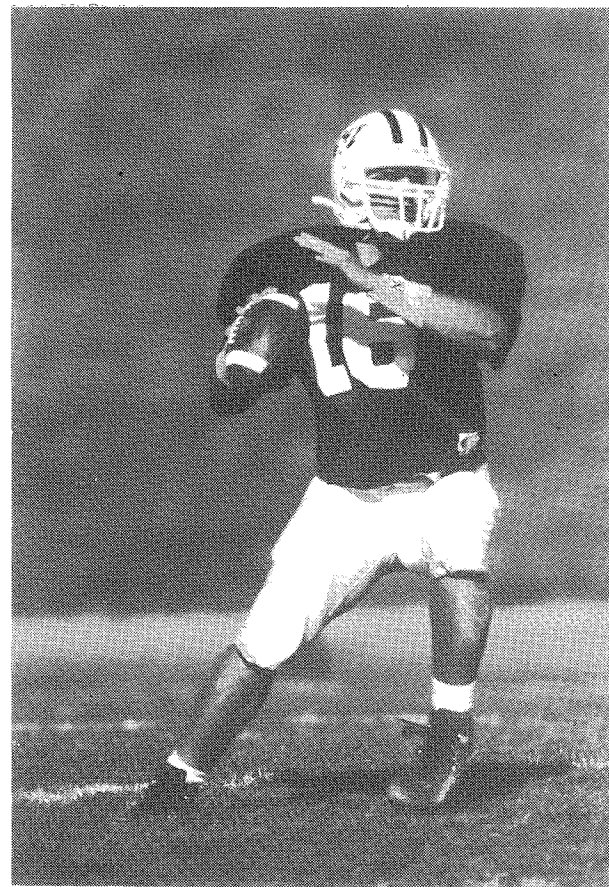
our backs looked great. Defensively, we looked at viturally a new secondary after losing Maurice (Ragland), Nolan (Jeffrey) and Eryc (Reese). Depth on the defensive line and at linebacker was also important during the spring. Finding depth that can come in and play was a key.

**Q: The Ichabods have improved every year under your guidance. Is there any reason to think that will not keep continuing?**

**A:** We've built a solid foundation during the past two seasons. We are stronger mentally and physically. Our players want to win but they also want to be a consistent winner. We still have a lot of work to do but I know that our recent past is proof that we are building in a positive direction.

During more than 80 years, the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) -- formerly the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association -- has gained the reputation of being one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. MIAA members have won nine NCAA national championships while MIAA student-athletes have won more than 80 individual national titles.

The MIAA began a new era on July 1, 1992, when the 12-member conference assumed its new name and logo, reflecting changes in membership. The decision to change the conference name and logo originated in 1989 when Pittsburg

sports. Its sponsors competition in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, soccer, and tennis for men. 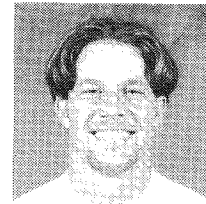

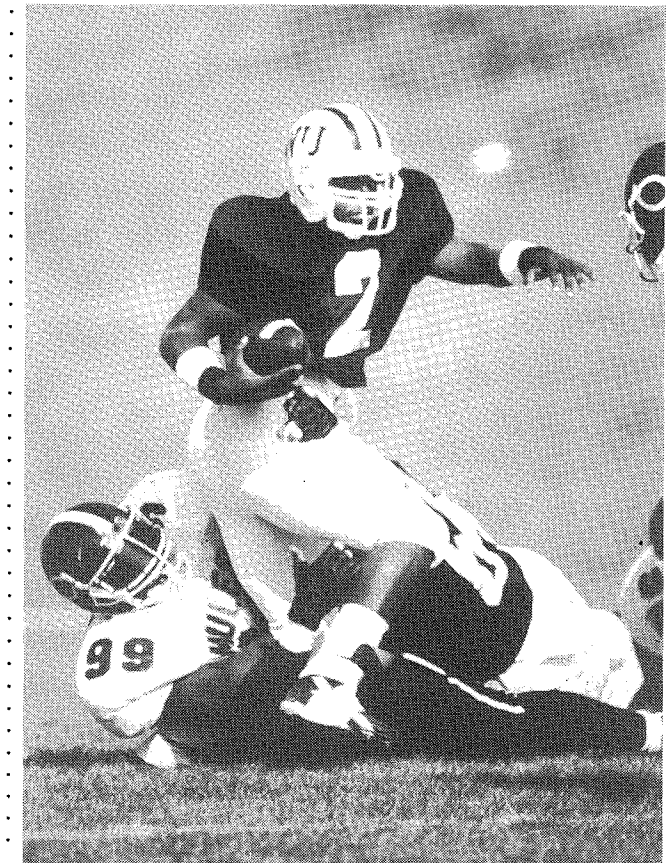

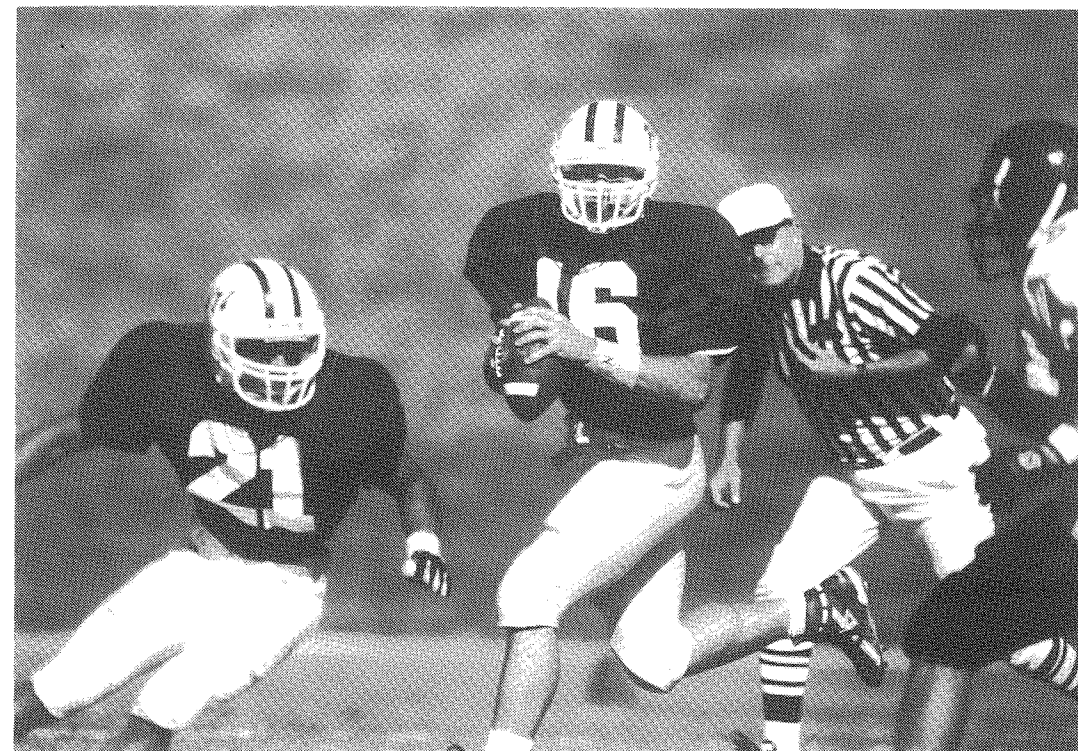

## Did Washburn Throw First Forward Pass?

When an athlete or team accomplishes a "first" these days, all America can witness as modern technology is capable of bringing it into our living rooms. Firsts which happened decades ago, like who threw the first forward pass, are a little less clear.

Many schools — Washburn included — claim to have thrown the first forward pass. Whether Washburn did or not depends on how the implementation of the rule is viewed.

Records indicate that the forward pass rule was written by Navy coach Paul Dashiell and became a legal part of the game in 1906. Any forward pass thrown before the official rule would be illegal, and in this researcher's opinion, not a historical first. Accepting that view prohibits one from believing that the first forward pass was thrown during either a Yale-Princeton game in 1876 or a North Carolina-Georgia game in 1895, as various documents show.

According to Pat Harmon, historian at the National College Football Hall of Fame, the first legal collegiate forward pass was thrown by St. Louis University during a Sept. 5, 1906, against Carroll College.

So we have illegal forward passes before the 1906 rule, and legal forward passes after the rule. But what about a pass thrown during a game designed to test proposed rules changes? That is where Washburn's claim comes into play. If you believe a "first" can happen during a game testing proposed rules, then Washburn is correct in claiming it threw the first forward pass.

The Capper/MRI Quick-Fact Book of Kansas states on p. 15: "The first forward pass in football history was thrown in December 1905 in a football game between Washburn University and Fairmount College."

An article in the Oct. 30, 1935, edition of the *Topeka Journal*, entitled "Washburn Played Game 30 Years Ago Testing New Grid Rules Suggested," reports: "Washburn was in the football spotlight Christmas Day in 1905 when the Ichabods played a postseason game with Fairmount in Wichita to test the proposed rules changes. It was known as the "Walter Camp" game."

The *Kansas Historical Quarterly* published an article entitled "Evans: College Football in Kansas," which quotes Bliss Isely, who played in the 1905 game: "The first forward pass in history was thrown that afternoon by Bill Davis to Art Solter and was good for a 10-yard gain."

The article goes on to say "Isley said that the pass delivery was primitive. Davis heaved the ball with both hands like a basketball player shooting a free throw and it wobbled through the air."

From these sources, this researcher concludes that Washburn did indeed through the first forward pass on Christmas Day, 1905, during a game designed to test a new set of rules. The game in question was not the regular season contest listed in this media guide — in which Washburn prevailed 10-6 — but rather a scoreless tie which is not listed with the 1905 scores.
