NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP BEGINS AT HOME THURSDAY NIGHT

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (November 14, 2018) - The 2018 NCAA Championship begins in Morgantown on Thursday, Nov. 15, at 7 p.m. ET, as the No. 17 West Virginia University men's soccer team hosts LIU Brooklyn in the first round at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium.

The Mountaineers (13-6-0) are making their 13th NCAA Championship appearance and first since 2011. WVU, the 2018 Mid-American Conference regular-season champions, will open NCAA play against the Blackbirds (13-5-1), who won the Northeast Conference.

"We are excited for the opportunity to host the first round of the NCAA Tournament against a very good LIU Brooklyn team," WVU coach Marlon LeBlanc said. "LIU Brooklyn has won a lot of games this year, and they are an experienced, well-coached team. We are looking forward to the challenge and playing at home in front of Mountaineer Nation, and I know our fans be ready to support us tomorrow night, as they have all season long."

The Mountaineers will host an NCAA contest for the seventh time in program history and fourth in LeBlanc's 13-year tenure. All-time, WVU is 5-12-0 in the NCAA Tournament and 4-2-0 at home. WVU is 3-6-0 in the first round and 3-1-0 in the opening round at home.

West Virginia enters the 48-team NCAA Championship field having won 11 of its last 14 matches. The Mountaineers' 13 wins on the season are two shy of tying the program record of 15, set in 2006. WVU is ranked No. 17 in this week's Soccer America poll and No. 18 in the United Soccer Coaches and TopDrawerSoccer.com rankings.

Statistically, WVU leads the MAC in nearly every category. The Mountaineers rank No. 5 nationally in total assists (46), No. 10 in points (122), No. 11 in shot accuracy (.494) and fewest fouls per game (9.42), No. 15 in goals (38) and No. 16 in scoring offense (2.00). Additionally, West Virginia paces the MAC in saves per game (3.95) and save percentage (.758).

Individually, senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc ranks No. 6 in the country in assists per game (0.56) and No. 10 with five game-winning goals, while he leads the MAC with nine assists and 1.44 points per game. Junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino is No. 20 in the NCAA in shot accuracy (0.581), and sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky ranks No. 27 in minutes played (1711:37) and No. 30 in total saves (71). Tekesky also leads the league in saves per game (3.74).

QUICK STRIKES: KEY TEAM NOTES

- Founded in 1961, this is the **58th year of men's soccer** at West Virginia. WVU is 474-390-94 all-time.
- WVU is 13-6-0 in 2018, and its **13 wins are tied for 10th-most in the NCAA** and the most since a 14-win campaign in 2007. The Mountaineers are two wins shy of tying the program-record of 15, set in 2006.
- The Mountaineers are making their **13th NCAA Tournament appearance** and first since 2011.
- West Virginia won the Mid-American Conference with a 5-0-0 MAC record and was **one of just two teams nationally with a perfect 1.000 winning percentage** in conference play.
- The Mountaineers' **eight nonconference wins in the regular season are tied for fourth-most** in the NCAA.
- In the national rankings, **West Virginia is nationally ranked** in the following major polls this week: No. 17 by Soccer America and No. 18 by United Soccer Coaches and TopDrawerSoccer.com. Additionally, WVU is ranked No. 4 in the United Soccer Coaches North Regional poll.
- WVU **won its first MAC championship** and sixth conference title overall in 2018. West Virginia **came back to win its first four MAC matches** after trailing 1-0.
- After starting the season 2-3, with three 1-0 road losses in the first three weeks of the season, **WVU has won 11 of its last 14 matches**, which includes a 4-1 road record and a current five-match win streak to close the regular season, tied for the sixth-longest in the nation at the time.
- The Mountaineers are ranked **No. 21 in the NCAA RPI**, and the MAC is ranked No. 3 in the conference RPI.
- Joey Piatczyc is the second Mountaineer to be voted the **MAC Player of the Year**, while coach Marlon LeBlanc earned his second Gary V. Palmisano **MAC Coach of the Year** accolade and third in his 13-year tenure at WVU.
- Piatczyc and goalkeeper Steven Tekesky were named to the **All-MAC First Team**, and Albert Andres-Llop, Pascal Derwatsch, Ryan Kellogg and Andres Muriel Albino were recognized on the **All-MAC Second Team**. West Virginia's six All-MAC Team accolades are tied for its most since joining the league in 2012, while WVU is recognized with two first-team honors for the fourth time.
- West Virginia led the MAC with **six Player of the Week honors**, as Piatczyc is the third player in MAC history to be recognized five times (Aug. 28, Sept. 4, Oct. 16, Oct. 30, Nov. 6) and Tekesky was honored on Oct. 23. WVU is the ninth team in the league's 26-year history to be recognized with six or more weekly accolades in a year.
- Piatczyc, Tekesky and Andres-Llop also were recognized nationally on several outlet's **national teams of the week**.
- The Mountaineers are **98-36-18 all-time at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium**, while WVU is unbeaten in 17 of its last 21 regular-season nonconference matches at home.
- In his 13th season, **LeBlanc owns a 127-90-32 record at WVU** and is the second coach in team history to eclipse the 100-win mark, while he is 131-93-32 in his career.
- West Virginia has won 21 consecutive matches when **scoring two or more goals**, including a 13-0-0 mark this season.
- Eight of WVU's opponents have been ranked in a top-25 poll this season, with **five making an appearance in the top-10** and four currently in the top-25 nationally.
- Statistically, **WVU leads the MAC in nearly every category**. SCOUTING LIU BROOKLYN

LIU Brooklyn is 13-5-1 on the season and won the Northeast Conference regular-season and tournament titles. The Blackbirds have won 12 of their last 14 matches, a stretch that began with a nine-match win streak.

LIU Brooklyn is making its 15th NCAA Championship appearance and first since 2015. The Blackbirds are 7-13-2 all-time in NCAA play, including a national runner-up finish in 1966 and a semifinal appearance in 1967.

Rasmus Hansen leads the team with seven goals and joins Fredrik Mathisen with 15 points, while Filip Nordstrom has a team-best nine assists. Sam Ilin has made 58 saves for a .829 save percentage with a 0.86 goals-against average and 12 goals allowed.

TJ Kostecky is in his 20th season at LIU Brooklyn. He guided the Blackbirds to the NCAA Tournament in 2004 and 2015 and is 139-178-45 at LIU Brooklyn and 265-249-63 in his 31-year career.

SERIES HISTORY VS. THE BLACKBIRDS

West Virginia has never faced LIU Brooklyn, but is 31-9-1 all-time against current members of the NEC. That includes a 3-1 win over Saint Francis (Pa.), on Sept. 15, in Morgantown. LIU Brooklyn suffered a 1-0 loss at SFU on Oct. 21.

UP NEXT: NCAA SECOND ROUND

The winner between WVU and LIU Brooklyn will advance to the NCAA Championship Second Round to face No. 13-seeded Georgetown on Sunday, Nov. 18, in Washington, D.C.

LAST TIME OUT: LOSS IN MAC SEMIS

November 9: Akron 3, No. 12 WVU 1
No. 12 West Virginia's five-match win streak was snapped with a 3-1 loss to Akron in the MAC Semifinals on Nov. 9. The Mountaineers lost for just the second time at home this year, as their win streak, tied for the sixth-longest in the nation, came to an end on a rain-soaked evening in Morgantown.

WVU took a 1-0 lead 11 seconds into the match, but the Zips answered to tie it 92 seconds later and took the lead in the 43rd minute. West Virginia trailed by two goals for just the third time this year when UA added its final goal in the 66th minute.

WVU's goal came courtesy of junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino, with assists to sophomore defender Kevin Morris and senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc.

West Virginia was out-shot, 20-6, while Akron had seven shots on goal to WVU's four. Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made three saves and the defense cleared another ball off the line, while the Zips' Ben Lundt also made three saves.

MAC REGULAR-SEASON CHAMPS

West Virginia won its first MAC regular-season championship, and finished the regular season with a 5-0-0 record in the league. The Mountaineers are one of just two teams in the country this year to post a 1.000 winning percentage in conference matches, and WVU is the second team in the last six seasons to earn a perfect record in MAC play.

The conference title is West Virginia's sixth in team history and second regular-season crown. WVU won the Big East regular season in 2006, along with the Atlantic 10 tournament in 1992 and the Eastern 8 tournament in 1965, 66 and 67.

The Mountaineers opened league action with a 2-1 win at Western Michigan, last year's regular-season champions, and earned a 2-1 win in overtime the following weekend at Akron, the MAC's postseason champions in 2017. Two home wins followed, 5-1 over No. 20 SIUE and 3-2 against Bowling Green to clinch the conference title. The regular season wrapped up with a 4-3 win in overtime at NIU. Playing three of its five MAC games on the road, West Virginia erased 1-0 deficits in its first four league games, and rallied twice vs. BGSU.

LEBLANC'S WINNING TOUCH

In his 13th season at the helm, Marlon LeBlanc owns a 127-90-32 record with the Old Gold and Blue and is the second coach in program history to eclipse the 100-win mark. He has led WVU to five NCAA Tournaments, two conference titles and has earned three conference Coach of the Year awards.

LeBlanc has guided WVU to the NCAA Tournament in 2006, 2007, 2010, 2011 and 2018, with a third round appearance in 2007. West Virginia won the 2006 Big East regular-season crown, as LeBlanc was named the coach of the year by FieldTurf, Soccer America, the NSCAA (Northeast Region) and the Big East.

LeBlanc was named the Gary V. Palmisano MAC Coach of the Year in 2014 and again in 2018. The 2018 season saw the Mountaineers win their first MAC regular-season championship.

LeBlanc won his 100th match as WVU head coach in a 1-0 overtime victory over ETSU on Sept. 9, 2016. A 2000 PSU graduate, LeBlanc was an assistant coach at Penn State from 2001-05 and earned four wins as interim head coach in 2002. His career record is 131-93-32.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Mountaineers have had plenty of success at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium since it opened in 2004. WVU is 98-36-18 in the 1,650-seat venue. The impressive home record includes a stretch of 13 consecutive victories from 2010-11. Additionally, the Mountaineers are unbeaten in 17 of their last 21 regular-season nonconference home matches.

PIATCZYC BREAKING RECORDS

Senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc is having a record-breaking 2018 season, and has cemented his place atop the WVU record books in several statistical categories. The Lee's Summit, Missouri, native was named the MAC Player of the Year in 2018, becoming the second Mountaineer to earn the honor (Andy Bevin, 2014). Piatczyc also was named to the All-MAC First Team.

Piatczyc has 34 career assists, the most in program history, and also owns the school record for assists per game, with 0.50, and multi-assist matches, with five. Piatczyc ranks No. 2 all-time with 11 game-winning assists and is No. 6 with 21 career game-winning points.

On the season, Piatczyc's 0.56 assists per game is tied for No. 4 all-time, his 10 game-winning points are tied for No. 6 and his nine assists are tied for No. 8 in program history.

Piatczyc ranks No. 6 nationally in 2018 with 0.56 assists per match, No. 10 with five game-winning goals, No. 14 with nine total assists and No. 31 with 1.44 points per match. He also leads the MAC with 23 points. In league play, Piatczyc paced the MAC with 11 points and two game-winning goals and was second with four goals, 15 shots and eight shots on goal.

Additionally, Piatczyc is the third player in MAC history to earn five Player of the Week accolades in a single season.

Piatczyc's career assists record breaks the record of 27, set by Dan Stratford from 2004-07. Stratford also owns the WVU record for game-winning assists, with 13, while he and Andy Bevin (2011-14) share the program record for multi-assist games, with four.

In 2015, Piatczyc's 13 assists as a sophomore set a new program record and was No. 2 in the country. He had a program-record-tying five game-winning assists that season and had two multi-assist matches, tied for third-most all-time. Piatczyc set the team record with four assists in a single match on Aug. 30, vs. San Francisco.

As a freshman in 2014, Piatczyc tied for the team lead, was second in the MAC and No. 14 in the nation with eight assists. That total tied for No. 8 in program history at the time and currently ranks No. 9. The impressive first season helped Piatczyc earn MAC Freshman of the Year accolades.



WVU VOTED THIRD IN MAC POLL

West Virginia was voted to finish third in the 2018 Mid-American Conference Preseason Poll. In a vote by the league's head coaches, the Mountaineers finished third with 24 points, two points behind second-place Western Michigan, who received 26 points and one first-place vote. Akron was picked to win the league with 35 total points and five first-place votes and was unanimously voted to repeat as MAC Tournament champion in 2018.

Last year, the conference's RPI was ranked No. 4 in the country in 2017. Both Akron and Western Michigan made the NCAA Tournament, with Akron reaching the College Cup and Western Michigan the third round.

OT WIN CAPS PERFECT MAC SLATE

November 3: No. 16 WVU 4, NIU 3 (OT)

No. 16 West Virginia extended its win streak to five consecutive matches with a 4-3, overtime win at Northern Illinois on Nov. 3, to complete a perfect season in MAC play.

On a rainy, chilly evening in DeKalb, Illinois, WVU took a 1-0 lead in the first half and extended it to 2-0 just minutes into the second half. However, NIU rallied with a pair of goals in 50 seconds to tie the contest at 2-2, in the 56th minute. The Mountaineers wasted no time taking back the lead, with a goal 31 seconds later to regain a 3-2 advantage. After Northern Illinois tied it again in the 74th minute, junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch won it in the 97th minute.

Junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino scored WVU's first goal, his third in the last two matches and team-leading fifth in MAC play, and senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc tallied the Mountaineers' second goal. Sophomore defender Kevin Morris was credited with West Virginia's third goal, before Derwaritsch's game-winner.

Along with his goal, Piatczyc assisted on West Virginia's final two goals to break the school record for multi-assist matches, with five.

West Virginia had 11 shots, six on goal, while NIU had 19 shots, eight on goal. In goal, sophomore Steven Tekesky made four saves, while the WVU defense cleared another ball off the line, in overtime.

MAC-CLINCHING VICTORY

October 26: WVU 3, Bowling Green 2

A pair of late goals lifted West Virginia to its first MAC regular-season title with a dramatic, 3-2 victory over Bowling Green on Oct. 26. On a rain-soaked night at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium, the Mountaineers rallied twice and erased deficits of 1-0 and 2-1, tying the match at 2-2 in the 85th minute and netting the game-winner in the 88th.

Junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino scored West Virginia's first two goals, his first two-goal match as a Mountaineer, while senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc added the eventual winning goal. Senior midfielder Jorge Quintanilla earned assists on West Virginia's first and third goals, while junior defenders Albert Andres-Llop and Pascal Derwaritsch assisted on the second goal.

West Virginia fell behind 1-0 in the fourth minute, but Muriel Albino tied the match minutes into the second half, at 47:28. However, Bowling Green answered back in the 56th minute on a penalty kick, to reclaim a 2-1 lead. The Mountaineers applied heavy offense pressure and broke through with the match-tying goal at 84:16, off the foot of Muriel Albino. Piatczyc then gave WVU its first lead of the match at 87:29.

WVU out-shot BGSU, 16-9, with a 5-2 edge in shots on goal. Ten of West Virginia's 16 shots, and all five shots on goal, came in the second half.

Prior to the match, WVU recognized its senior class, who played their final regular-season contest in Morgantown.

BACKYARD BRAWL WIN

October 23: WVU 2, Pitt 1

West Virginia improved to 34-10-5 all-time against Pitt, and remains undefeated in the series at home since 1997, with a 2-1 win in the Backyard Brawl on Oct. 23.

WVU's goals came from freshman midfielder Josh DiMatteo, in the 16th minute, and senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc, in the 49th. Piatczyc and sophomore forward Tsubasa Takada earned assists on the first goal. Piatczyc's goal was off a free kick to give WVU a 2-0 lead.

Pitt cut into WVU's lead with a goal at 49:11, but it proved to be the Panthers' lone shot on goal in the contest.

WVU out-shot Pitt, 15-4, and held a 5-1 advantage in shots on goal. UP had 23 fouls to WVU's 11, and the Panthers had a 4-3 edge in corner kicks. Piatczyc led the team with five shots, while DiMatteo had two shots, both on goal.

DOMINANT 2ND HALF VS. NO. 20 SIUE

October 20: WVU 5, No. 20 SIUE Edwardsville 1

A dominating second half helped West Virginia maintain its place atop the Mid-American Conference with a 5-1 victory over No. 20 SIUE Edwardsville on Oct. 20. In a matchup between the top two teams in the conference standings, the Mountaineers scored four second-half goals, as the Cougars saw their eight-match unbeaten streak come to an end.

The Mountaineers were out-shot 12-6 in the opening 45 minutes, and SIUE took a 1-0 lead in the 12th minute. However, sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made seven saves to keep WVU in it, and junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch found the equalizer at 35:17.

West Virginia responded in the second half with eight shots, six on goal, and scored four goals. Defensively, the Mountaineers held the Cougars to three shots, two on goal as they erased a 1-0 deficit to win for the third time in the last four contests.

West Virginia took a 2-1 lead in the 64th minute on an own goal, and extended its advantage to 3-1 less than five minutes later, at 68:25, when junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino bent one into the upper corner of the far post from just inside the corner of the box. The Mountaineers added to their lead as sophomore defender Kevin Morris headed it in to make it a 4-1 match at 72:27. Nine minutes later, at 81:17, junior defender Albert Andres-Llop picked up his first goal of the year.

Muriel Albino led the Mountaineers with five shots and three shots on goal. Piatczyc added four shots, two on goal. Tekesky had nine saves, while SIUE keeper Noah Heim had four, two in each half.

THRILLING OT WIN AT AKRON

October 13: WVU 2, Akron 1 (OT)

Senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc tied the match with 13 seconds left in regulation and scored the game-winner three minutes into overtime to propel West Virginia to a 2-1 victory at Akron on Oct. 13.

The Mountaineers trailed 1-0 12 minutes into the second half but responded with an offensive attack that resulted in Piatczyc's game-tying goal at 89:47. The game-winner came at 92:27. Following Akron's goal in the 57th minute, WVU out-shot the Zips, 10-1.

The game-tying goal began with junior midfielder Logan Lucas, who sent the ball up to senior midfielder Jorge Quintanilla near the top of the penalty arc. Quintanilla quickly flicked it up to Piatczyc, who was running into the box. Near the corner of the six, Piatczyc beat a defender and scored into the far corner of the net, past the keeper.

Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky set up the game-winner by sending a long ball up to Quintanilla, who, just past midfield, flicked it to Piatczyc. He then dribbled across the top of the box and scored into the bottom right corner of the net.

Quintanilla's and Lucas' assists were their first of the year, while Tekesky's was his second. Piatczyc, Lucas and sophomore defender Kevin Morris all had three shots, while Piatczyc led the team with three shots on goal.

In goal, Tekesky made three saves, all in the first half. Akron's Ben Lundt stopped five shots, all in the second half. The Mountaineers out-shot the Zips, 15-9, and had eight shots on goal to Akron's four. WVU held a 10-3 advantage in shots in the second half.

FIRST RANKED LOSS

October 9: No. 17 Wright State 3, WVU 0

Playing its first ranked opponent of the season, West Virginia lost at No. 17 Wright State, 3-0, on Oct. 9. The Mountaineers allowed more than one goal for just the second time this season and were shut out for the fourth time and the first since Sept. 10.

The Raiders took a 1-0 lead in the 10th minute and made it 2-0 in the 38th. They took a 3-0 lead in the 86th minute. WVU was out-shot, 14-12, and WSU held an 8-4 advantage in shots on goal.

Nine of the 12 shots came in the second half, with all four shots on goal coming in the final 45 minutes. WVU had six corner kicks, four in the second half, and WSU had five, all in the first half.

Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made five saves, three in the first half and two in the second. Senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc led the team with three shots, while junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch, junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino and sophomore forward Spenser Myers each had two shots, one on goal.

MAC-OPENING WIN

October 6: WVU 2, Western Michigan 1

WVU came from behind to earn a 2-1 victory at Western Michigan on Oct. 6, to open MAC play.

Freshman midfielder Josh DiMatteo scored the game-tying goal in the 31st minute and junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino netted the game-winner in the 84th. It was DiMatteo's second goal of his career, both in the last two matches, while it was Muriel Albino's first as a Mountaineer.

Sophomore defender Kevin Morris and junior midfielder Sebastian Garcia-Herreros earned assists on the Mountaineers' first goal, while Muriel Albino's was unassisted. It was Garcia-Herreros' fourth assist in the last three contests.

Western Michigan's goal came at 21:56 on a penalty kick. It was the first penalty kick attempt by a WVU opponent this season.

In goal, sophomore Steven Tekesky made nine saves, and Lukas Von Lienen had five saves for the Broncos. Muriel Albino and senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc led the team with four shots apiece, and Muriel Albino had three shots on goal. WVU had 18 shots to WVU's 14, while the Broncos held a 10-7 advantage in shots on goal.

ANOTHER 2-0 WIN

October 2: WVU 2, Binghamton 0

Two first-half goals less than five minutes apart propelled West Virginia to a 2-0 victory against Binghamton on Oct. 2, at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium. The Mountaineers improved to 5-1-0 at home with its fifth clean sheet of the season thanks to goals in the 22nd and 27th minute and a defense that held the Bearcats to four shots, one on goal.

West Virginia's goals came from junior defender Ryan Kellogg, his third in the last two games, and freshman midfielder Josh DiMatteo, the first of his career. WVU out-shot Binghamton, 18-4, and held a 13-1 advantage in shots on goal.

DiMatteo led the team with five shots, two on goal, while junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino had four shots, all on goal, and earned his first assist as a Mountaineer. Junior defender Albert Andres-Llop and junior midfielder Ethan Shim assisted on WVU's first goal, while Muriel Albino and junior midfielder Sebastian Garcia-Herreros assisted on the second. In goal, sophomore Steven Tekesky stopped the one shot on goal he faced.

BACK ON TRACK

September 29: WVU 2, Delaware 0

A pair of second-half goals by junior defender Ryan Kellogg led West Virginia to a 2-0 victory over Delaware on Sept. 29, at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium. Kellogg recorded his first two-goal game of his career as the Mountaineers shut out the Blue Hens for their fourth clean sheet of the season.

Kellogg led the Mountaineers with three shots and two shots on goal. His first career multi-goal game gives him three goals this season and four in his career. Kellogg's first goal came in the 62nd minute, and his second came less than 10 minutes later, in the 71st. His game-winning goal was the second of his career.

Junior midfielder Sebastian Garcia-Herreros assisted on both goals, while sophomore forward Spenser Myers earned an assist on the first goal and sophomore midfielder Nic Short assisted on the second.

Both teams had nine shots in the match, while WVU had six shots on goal to UD's three. Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky had three saves in the victory.

STREAK SNAPPED

September 25: Radford 4, WVU 1

West Virginia saw its three-match win streak come to an end with a 4-1 loss to Radford on Sept. 25. The Mountaineers were out-shot, 18-11, while the Highlanders held a 9-4 advantage in shots on goal.

Junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch scored for WVU in the 57th minute, his team-leading fourth goal of the season. He led the team with three shots, all on goal. Junior midfielder Ethan Shim also had three shots for the Mountaineers. Junior defender Albert Andres-Llop assisted on WVU's goal, his second assist of the year.

Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made four saves for West Virginia, while Radford's Sam Farrell stopped three shots on goal, including a WVU penalty kick in the 70th minute.



ROAD SHUTOUT EXTENDS STREAK

September 22: WVU 2, Dayton 0

West Virginia won its third consecutive match with a 2-0 victory at Dayton on Sept. 22. The Mountaineers earned their second consecutive shutout and third of the season and handed the Flyers their first home loss of the year. WVU's two goals were the first given up by UD at Baujan Field this season.

Junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch gave West Virginia a 1-0 lead in the 35th minute for his team-high-tying third goal of the year, and sophomore forward Spenser Myers scored his first career goal to make it 2-0 in the 73rd minute.

Junior defender Albert Andres-Llop and sophomore defender Kevin Morris earned assists on West Virginia's first goal, and freshman midfielder Josh DiMatteo was credited with an assist on WVU's second goal. It was Morris' and DiMatteo's first career assists, and Andres-Llops' first of the year.

In goal for the Mountaineers, sophomore Steven Tekesky made three saves, two in a three-minute span in the second half. West Virginia was out-shot 18-7, but had a 4-3 advantage in shots on goal. Both teams had two corner kicks.

SHUTOUT WIN

September 18: WVU 2, Cincinnati 0

A pair of second-half goals and a shutout performance defensively lifted West Virginia to a 2-0 home victory over Cincinnati on Sept. 18. Sophomore defender Kevin Morris scored his first career goal in the 52nd minute and junior defender Ryan Kellogg added a goal, his first of the year, in the 71st.

The Mountaineers recorded their second clean sheet of the season and held the Bearcats to just two shots, both in an 11-minute span in between WVU's two goals in the second half. Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky saved both shots he faced.

Sophomore forward Tsubasa Takada had a career-best two assists, while junior midfielder Sebastian Garcia-Herreros also had an assist, on WVU's second goal.

Offensively, WVU had 13 shots, four on goal. Takada led the team with five shots and was one of four Mountaineers with one shot on goal. Kellogg added three shots in the win.

West Virginia held a 9-0 advantage in shots in the first half, with two shots on goal. The Mountaineers had four corner kicks to the Bearcats' one.

HOME WIN VS. SFU

September 15: WVU 3, Saint Francis (Pa.) 1

West Virginia won its fourth consecutive non-conference home match with a 3-1 victory over Saint Francis (Pa.) on Sept. 15.

The Mountaineers took a 1-0 lead in the 37th minute and added a goal on a penalty kick in the 63rd minute to extend their lead to 2-0. Eight minutes later, in the 71st minute, West Virginia made it 3-0 before the Red Flash scored their lone goal in the 86th minute.

Senior forward Rushawn Larmond scored WVU's first and third goals, recording his first multi-goal game of his career, while senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc converted on the penalty kick for his second game-winning goal of the year.

With the two points on the game-winning goal, Piatczyc has 15 game-winning points in his career, tied for eighth-most in program history.

Junior defender Ryan Kellogg and sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky earned assists on Larmond's first goal. Tekesky's assist was the first of his career. In goal, Tekesky made one save, as the WVU defense held SFU to just three shots, two on goal. The Mountaineers had 10 shots, five on goal.

WVU EDGED AT MARYLAND

September 10: Maryland 1, WVU 0

WVU suffered a 1-0 loss at Maryland on Sept. 10. In front of a lively crowd of 1,195 on a rainy night in College Park, Maryland, the Mountaineers out-shot the Terrapins, 12-10, and held a 6-5 advantage in shots on goal. However, a goal that deflected in off a UMD player's shoulder in the 77th minute was the difference.

WVU's second half featured a 10-4 advantage in shots and a 5-1 edge in shots on goal. West Virginia had six corner kicks in the final 45 minutes while preventing Maryland from a corner kick opportunity.

Junior midfielder Andres Muriel Albino led the team with five shots, three on goal, and senior forward Rushawn Larmond, sophomore defender Kevin Morris and sophomore forward Tsubasa Takada all had two shots, one on goal. Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made four saves for West Virginia, all in the first half.

TEKESKY STANDS TALL AT UCF

September 7: UCF 1, WVU 0

Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made a career-best 10 saves in a 1-0 loss at UCF on Sept. 7. On a muggy night in Orlando, Florida, the Mountaineers were out-shot 11-2 in the first half, but Tekesky stopped all seven shots that came on goal. The Knights opened the second half with a goal in the 48th minute that proved to be the difference in the contest.

Tekesky's 10 saves are tied for the eighth-most in a single match in program history. He is the first Mountaineer goalkeeper to post double-digit saves since Alec Boerner was credited with 11 in 2015, at Princeton.

UCF had 18 shots to WVU's five, while the home side held an 11-3 advantage in shots on goal. In the second half, West Virginia had three shots and held UCF to seven.

Junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch led the team with two shots, and senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc, sophomore defender Kevin Morris and sophomore forward Tsubasa Takada all had one shot, which came on goal.

HOME OPENER A RECORD-BREAKING WIN

August 31 - WVU 5, American 1

Senior midfielder Joey Piatczyc had three assists to break the school record for career assists to lead West Virginia to a 5-1 victory over American on Aug. 31, at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium.

Piatczyc assisted on the first goal for the Mountaineers to tie the record for career assists in the 20th minute, and he broke the record with an assist on WVU's third goal in the 48th. He added an assist on West Virginia's fourth goal in the 72nd minute, his 29th career assist.

In its home opener, WVU's offense was not limited to just Piatczyc. Junior defender Pascal Derwaritsch and junior midfielder Ethan Shim both scored a career-high two goals. Shim notched the first goal of the night in the 20th minute, and Derwaritsch's first was the eventual game-winner on a penalty kick in the 27th minute. Senior forward Rushawn Larmond also scored for the Mountaineers, giving WVU a 3-0 lead in the 48th minute.

West Virginia out-shot the Eagles, 21-8, with a 13-4 advantage in shots on goal. WVU held a 9-3 edge in corner kicks. In goal, sophomore Steven Tekesky made three saves for the Mountaineers, while American's Lucas Manso had eight saves.

OPENING WEEKEND IN CHARLESTON

August 24 - WVU 2, College of Charleston 0

August 26 - UNC Wilmington 1, WVU 0

The Mountaineers opened the 2018 season with a 2-0 victory at the College of Charleston on Aug. 24. Senior midfielder

Joey Piatczyc and junior midfielder Ethan Shim scored for WVU, both in the second half, while Piatczyc also assisted on Shim's goal. Shim's goal was the first of his career. Sophomore goalkeeper Steven Tekesky made two saves in the win.

Two days later, on Aug. 26, WVU suffered a 1-0 loss to UNC Wilmington to close out play at the Aaron Olitsky Memorial Soccer Classic in Charleston, South Carolina. WVU held an 18-13 advantage in shots, but a UNCW goal in the eighth minute was the difference. Junior Andres Muriel Albino led the team with five shots and two shots on goal. Tekesky made a career-best six saves, while UNCW's keeper stopped all seven shots on goal.

SEASON PREVIEW

As the West Virginia University men's soccer team begins its 2018 season on Friday, it's coming off a strong preseason and brings back several key pieces from last year's team.

Sixteen lettermen return to the pitch this year, including nine who played in at least 15 matches. Coach Marlon LeBlanc, who enters his 13th season in Morgantown, likes this year's squad and is pleased with the progress shown in training.

However, the team is taking a blue-collar approach and staying humble. The Mountaineers have been ranked inside the top 15 after hot starts in 2016 and '17, but they struggled down the stretch and missed the NCAA Tournament each year.

Learning from the past, this team's approach is geared towards avoiding a late-season cold spell.

"There has been a great amount of humility in this team," LeBlanc said. "We use the word 'blue collar' to describe this group. We have been really, really good this preseason. However, we haven't stopped working. That's going to be the key. We've had two very good starts the last two years, where we've jumped out and gotten ahead, and maybe in some ways mentally checked out. I'm hoping this group has the leadership in it and has the added benefit of perspective, seeing two years of being in the top 15 early on and then taking the foot off the gas, how that has hurt us. That mistake won't happen again."

West Virginia opened preseason practice on Aug. 7, and had a productive two weeks of training with exhibition matches at Virginia Tech and against Mount St. Mary's.

The Mountaineers have played well in the preseason and continued to get better, incorporating a group of eight newcomers to a strong returning group. Despite the positives, the team hasn't stopped working hard and continuing to get better.

"We're working very hard as a staff to keep us humble, even right now, when things are going well," LeBlanc added. "Preseason has gone very well, and heading into the early stages of the season, you never can get too high or too low. You always continue to work. Regardless of whether we win or lose opening day, we continue to be a working team. This group has had that perspective every day of preseason."

The 25-man roster features four seniors – goalkeeper Stephen Banick, forward Rushawn Larmond and midfielders Joey Piatczyc and Jorge Quintanilla – along with six juniors, seven sophomores and eight newcomers – five freshmen and three transfers.

The team hails from nine states and four countries outside of the United States.

Seventy percent of last year's starts return, including every start in goal and nine of the 11 players who started at least 10 matches. The wealth of returners does not include Piatczyc, a two-time All-MAC Team honoree, who is back on the pitch after missing the 2017 season with an injury.

"It's a very good team," LeBlanc said. "I think our first 15 or 16 guys are as good as any. We have some young players who are going to supplement and be complementing pieces to that group. We're still a young team, believe it or not, with four seniors. However, there's so much experience in this team."

Along with the four seniors, the returners include juniors Ryan Kellogg, a 2017 CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team honoree and Pascal Derwaritsch, who was named to the Mid-American Conference All-Tournament Team a year ago, and junior Sebastian Garcia-Herreros, a MAC Distinguished Scholar-Athlete last season.

"We're ahead of where I thought we'd be at this point in the preseason in terms of the way we're playing, the way we're moving the ball and the way we're defending," LeBlanc said. "I want this team to stay hungry, and I think they are. The infusion of leadership and quality from Joey Piatczyc makes us a better team right now than we were a year ago. We were 9-6-4 last year, so we were a good team, but now we're a better team."

WVU's 18-match schedule is highlighted by home matchups against Pitt and Cincinnati, as well as MAC foes SIU Edwardsville and Bowling Green, while the road slate features contests at perennial national-championship contenders Akron and Maryland.

"The goals are quite simple, we're not going to look too far ahead, but we want to win each game, day-by-day. A conference championship is a priority, and making a run at it, especially with the new format and the potential to host. In the Mid-American Conference, being the fourth-best conference in America last year, we take care of business and the NCAA Tournament will take care of itself. The goal is to win the conference, be the best team that we can be in the conference. Being in one of the better conferences in the country will take care of the postseason for sure."

West Virginia enters its seventh year in the MAC and was voted to finish third in the 2018 preseason poll. In a vote by the league's head coaches, the Mountaineers received 24 points, two points behind second-place Western Michigan, who earned 26 points and one first-place vote. Akron was picked to win the league with 35 total points and five first-place votes.

The conference's RPI was ranked No. 4 in the country in 2017. Akron finished 16-3-1 in 2017 and reached the NCAA College Cup. Western Michigan, the reigning MAC regular-season champions, also is coming off an NCAA Tournament appearance after advancing to the third round.

With a blue-collar work ethic and a strong core of returners, the Mountaineers' one game at a time approach begins with the season opener on Friday, Aug. 24, at 7:30 p.m. ET, at the College of Charleston.

GOALKEEPERS

Senior Stephen Banick and sophomore Steven Tekesky return in goal after the duo combined to play all but 50 minutes last season. They combined for nine shutouts, tied for the fifth-most in a single season in program history.

A CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team honoree in 2017, Banick led the team with 11 starts and 924:32 minutes played while compiling a record of 6-3-2. He had a team-best 28 saves, a .718 save percentage and six shutouts with a 1.07 goals-against average.

Tekesky played in 10 matches with eight starts and 830:01 minutes as a freshman. He posted a 3-3-2 record and led the team with a 0.98 goals against average while making 18 saves with a .667 save percentage and three shutouts.

"We are really secure in goal," LeBlanc said. "We are not a team that has conceded very many goals, and a lot of that has to do with the quality of guys we have on defense and protecting the goal in Steven Tekesky and Stephen Banick. Tekesky had a good second half of the season last year when he had an opportunity to play, and again in the spring. Banick is a sixth-year senior with a lot of experience as well. We have a very challenging system that we ask our goalkeepers to play. That includes them using their feet more than their hands, but both of them are certainly quality enough and capable enough to be able to do what we ask of them, and I think we feel really secure as we normally do in the goal."

DEFENDERS

Several key defenders are back in 2018 after helping WVU

to its nine shutouts in 2017. Among them are juniors Albert Andres-Llop, Sebastian Garcia-Herreros and Logan Lucas and sophomore Kevin Morris.

Andres-Llop played in 18 matches with 14 starts in 2017, leading the team with five goals, two game-winners, and 12 points. The Coaches' Award recipient a year ago, Garcia-Herreros started 18 of 19 matches as a sophomore and logged 1,688 minutes. He was fourth on the team with eight points and scored two goals.

Lucas started 18 matches and totaled 1,620 minutes in 2017, while Morris' freshman season included 10 starts in 19 matches with 1,368 minutes played.

"The back line stabilizes the tactics that we use defensively," LeBlanc said. "We don't concede much and we transition very well defensively, but it all starts with the back line. We'll have Albert Andres-Llop, who played in the midfield and on the back line last year, and Sebastian Garcia-Herreros, who played midfield last year, moves into the back line. Kevin Morris and Logan Lucas anchor a very, very experienced team."

"When I say very experienced, none of them are seniors, but they all have played a lot of games for us. When you have a system and a tactical way that you want to approach it, and the guys have so much experience having already done it, I think that you hope that you're not going to skip a beat in terms of the consistency that you show on that side of the ball. Our motto has always been if the other team doesn't score, then they can't win."

"First and foremost defensively, we want to be stout, and Albert, Sebastian, Kevin and Logan in particular gives us the opportunity to do that. Then we have a number of other guys who are capable of contributing and have been in our system for quite some time, such as redshirt sophomores Tyler Schafer and Jake Cole. We have some freshmen who have come in and have done really well, in particular Josh DiMatteo. I think they all have gotten a bit of playing time in the spring and preseason. We have enough in the back that we can mix and match some people and change shape and do all sorts of different things that allow us to be secure but also make sure that they are our starting point in terms of our attack and building out of the back. They all are very comfortable on the ball, and because of that, we can play a specific way and we can also adapt."

MIDFIELDERS

Joey Piatczyc wasn't supposed to be on the pitch for the Mountaineers in 2018, but a season-ending injury prior to the start of preseason training last year changed those plans and extended his WVU career. What was a negative in 2017 has now turned into a positive, as not only is Piatczyc back, but so are several players who had an opportunity to fill his role.

A two-time All-MAC Team honoree and the 2014 MAC Freshman of the Year, Piatczyc's 25 career assists are two shy of tying the program record. He is No. 2 in program history with 10 career game-winning assists and tied for No. 3 with three multi-assist matches.

Junior Pascal Derwaritsch will join Piatczyc in the midfield. He was a MAC All-Tournament Team honoree and started all 19 matches in his first season in the Old Gold and Blue. Derwaritsch was second on the team with 1,793 minutes played, scored two goals and was a key member on defense.

Additional contributors in the midfield this year are expected to be junior Ethan Shim, who played in six matches, and sophomores Tsubasa Takada, who played in 14 contests with two starts, and Spenser Myers, who played in 10 matches.

Junior Andres Muriel Albino joins the Mountaineers from Central Connecticut State. He was named to the All-Northeast Conference Team in 2016 and '17 and led the team with six goals, two game-winners and 16 points as a sophomore while starting all 17 matches.

"Last year was maybe a step backwards in the midfield to go forward," LeBlanc said. "Losing Joey Piatczyc, I told people it was like the football team losing Will Grier or the basketball

team losing Jevon Carter, when all you've done is plan around those guys for the season. A number of guys had to step up and play big minutes without Joey in there. Now he's back, and as we saw in the spring and preseason, he's arguably better than ever. He looks great, he's our leader in the midfield. I think the midfield will be our strength this year."

"We have a lot of dynamic players in there in a very good system that suits our players. Pascal Derwaritsch, Tsubasa Takada, Ethan Shim, Spenser Myers, all those guys have gotten playing time in the midfield. You add in the likes of Andres Muriel Albino and obviously our captain, Joey Piatczyc, our midfield is going to be as good as any other in the country. I think we now have a midfield that's capable of giving us goals and assists, and Joey's pretty close to breaking the school's all-time assist record, but I don't think you can just hone in on Joey, because Tsubasa and Andres will get at you as well. We have a multi-faceted midfield who is capable of doing a lot of damage. They're all very fit, very hard workers and very technical, so there are a lot of things you can do with those guys."

FORWARDS

LeBlanc has several options at forward, including seniors Rushawn Larmond and Jorge Quintanilla, juniors Ryan Kellogg and Ethan Shim and sophomore Brendan Hogan.

Larmond saw action in 17 matches with 10 starts as a junior, scoring two goals with two assists. He ranked fifth on the team with six points. Quintanilla played in 18 matches with 13 starts in his first season in Morgantown after transferring from Louisburg College. He led the team with five assists, scored two goals and ranked No. 2 on the team with nine points.

Kellogg, who has been a valuable player on the back line, started all 19 matches and played 1,717 minutes, fourth-most on the team in 2017. He scored one goal and had nine shots. Hogan played in 15 matches as a freshman with two starts.

"The forward position will probably be a little bit by committee," LeBlanc said. "Whether it's Jorge Quintanilla or Rushawn Larmond, two seniors, or Brendan Hogan, he has come on strong and had a really strong spring for us. Ethan Shim could see some time up there. There are a number of different players we could utilize. Ryan Kellogg has played up in the midfield and up front a little bit for us. In the leadup to the season, he's a guy who can play anywhere on the field, all three lines in terms of up front, in the midfield and on the back line."

"We have a very healthy stable of players that, depending on the opponent, and depending on what we need on the day, can be called on to get the job done. We're looking for more goals out of the No. 9 position, without a doubt goal scoring was probably the biggest issue for us a year ago. Not even just creating chances, but missing chances. We missed a lot of chances to score goals last year, but the hope is that a year wiser, a year better and a little bit more refined, those guys now start putting balls into the back of the net. I think the guys behind them will help make it a little bit easier for them as well."
