Today's home game is the earliest home game in program history and first played at home in the month of February.

Previously, the earliest WVU baseball regular-season game played in Morgantown was when the Mountaineers hosted Duquesne on March 5, 2008.

On Opening Day, righty Alek Manoah struck out a career-best 13 batters in just 6.0 innings pitched. The 13-strikeout performance, which was the only double-digit strikeout total in the Big 12 last week, nearly doubled his previous career high of seven. The 13 strikeouts are the most by a Mountaineer since 2016.

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Home Game Added Tuesday vs. Canisius

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (February 18, 2019) – The West Virginia University baseball team has added a home game against Canisius on Tuesday, Feb. 19, at 2 p.m. ET, at Monongalia County Ballpark.

Admission will be free for all fans for the contest.

Due to the game's late addition to the schedule and prior to the originally-scheduled home opener on March 8, concession stands will not be open for Tuesday's game. Fans will be permitted to bring their own food and beverage into Monongalia County Ballpark on Tuesday.

To provide a safer environment for Mountaineer fans and to expedite entry into all ticketed WVU athletic events, the West Virginia Department of Intercollegiate Athletics enforces the NFL's Clear Bag Policy. The athletic department invites and encourages fans to visit WVUsports.com/clearbag for more information, to view pictures of permissible and non-permissible items and to obtain answers to frequently asked questions about the clear bag policy.

The Mountaineers (1-2) and Golden Griffins (1-2) meet for the second consecutive season, after CC came to Morgantown twice last year, for a three-game series and a midweek contest. West Virginia won three of four.

Tuesday's matchup is WVU's earliest home game in program history.

WVU comes home after opening the 2019 season at the Atlanta Challenge in Atlanta. The season began with a 5-3 loss at Kennesaw State on Feb. 15 and followed with an 8-2 win at Georgia State and a 5-4 loss in 11 innings at Georgia Tech on Saturday. Due to inclement weather expected in Atlanta on Sunday, West Virginia played three games in two days to open the season at three different opponents.

Quick Hits: Key Team Notes

- The 2019 season marks the **127th year of baseball** at West Virginia. Founded in 1892, WVU owns an all-time record of 2,160-1,555-19. The Mountaineers are the second-oldest program in the Big 12.
- Coach Randy Mazey** is in his seventh season at the helm and owns a 189-154 record in Morgantown. He is the fifth coach in team history to eclipse the 100-win mark and the second to accomplish the feat in his first four seasons. Mazey is 376-314-2 in his career.
- On Opening Day, junior Alek Manoah struck out a career-best 13 batters in just 6.0 innings pitched and allowed one earned run on five hits with no walks on Feb. 15 at Kennesaw State. He was named one of **Collegiate Baseball's National Players of the Week** on Feb. 18, as his 13 strikeouts are the most by a Mountaineer since the 2016 season, when Michael Grove had 13 strikeouts twice and Chad Donato had 13 once.
- Junior Alek Manoah was named to the **Golden Spikes Award Watch List and the Baseball America Preseason All-America Second Team**. Manoah is the third player in team history named to the Golden Spikes Watch List and the eighth on a preseason All-America team.
- Senior Darius Hill was voted to the **Preseason All-Big 12 Team** by the league's coaches.
- Junior Sam Kessler was recognized on the NCBWA **Stopper of the Year Award** Watch List.
- Nearly half of the Mountaineers' 54-game schedule, **24 games, is against teams that made the 2018 NCAA Tournament**. That includes nine games against teams that advanced to the 2018 College World Series, with a three-game series at Oregon State, the 2018 national champions, along with a home series against Texas Tech and a road set at Texas. NCAA Tournament teams also include Oklahoma, Canisius and Kent State at home and Baylor, Oklahoma State and Morehead State on the road.
- WVU's **36-man roster** features five seniors, 11 juniors, five sophomores and 15 freshmen. With several two-way players, four are catchers, 12 are infielders, nine are outfielders and 20 are pitchers. That includes 16 right-handers and four leftys.
- This year's freshman class is the **highest-ranked recruiting class in program history**. The signing class of 15 student-athletes was ranked No. 26 in the nation by Perfect Game, the best in WVU history and the first in the top 30.
- WVU was **picked to finish sixth in the Big 12** Preseason Coaches' Poll. West Virginia has advanced to three consecutive Big 12 Championship semifinals and has finished fourth in the final standings in three of its first six years in the league.
- Four Mountaineers were drafted last year**, and WVU has had 20 draft selection in coach Randy Mazey's six seasons, the most draft picks in a six-year stretch in team history. Highlighting the 2018 draft class was Michael Grove, who was picked by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the second round and became the fourth Mountaineer ever picked in the top two rounds and 11th in the top 10. He is WVU's highest draft pick since 2010.
- A pair of former Mountaineer left-handers **made their Major League debuts last season**, as Harrison Musgrave and John Means were called up by the Colorado Rockies and Baltimore Orioles, respectively. Musgrave made his debut on April 23 and made 35 relief appearances in 2018, while Means pitched in one game, on Sept. 26.
- With Musgrave and Means' debuts, **24 Mountaineers in program history have played in the big leagues**, and Means and Musgrave are the first players coached by Randy Mazey at WVU to earn an MLB call-up.
- Musgrave and Means join fellow Mountaineer and West Virginia native **Jedd Gyorko of the St. Louis Cardinals** currently on an MLB roster. Gyorko will begin his seventh MLB season in 2019.
- A total of **17 former Mountaineers played professional baseball** last season.

The Mountaineers return to the Peach State next weekend for a three-game set at Georgia Southern, from Feb. 22-24. The series in Statesboro, Georgia, begins on Friday, Feb. 22, at 6:30 p.m. ET. First pitch at J.I. Clements Stadium on Saturday is set for 3 p.m., while the series concludes at 11:30 a.m. on Sunday.

Last Time Out: Atlanta Challenge

West Virginia opened the 2019 season at the Atlanta Challenge and went 1-2 in Atlanta. The season began with a 5-3 loss at Kennesaw State on Feb. 15 and followed with an 8-2 victory at Georgia State and a 5-4 loss in 11 innings at Georgia Tech on Saturday. Due to inclement weather expected in Atlanta on Sunday, WVU's contest at Georgia Tech was moved up to Saturday night, and the Mountaineers' opening weekend featured three games, totaling 29 innings, in a 31-hour span against three different teams in three ballparks.

- In WVU's 5-3 loss at Kennesaw State on Opening Day, WVU right-hander Alek Manoah struck out a career-best 13 batters and allowed one unearned run on five hits with no walks in 6.0 innings. West Virginia led 3-1 in the middle of the sixth, but KSU rallied with a three-run seventh inning. Catcher Ivan Gonzalez had two RBIs and first baseman Marques Inman and second baseman Tyler Doanes each had two hits.
- The next day, WVU won at Georgia State, 8-2. West Virginia scored two runs in the first inning but were held hitless until a four-run sixth inning, and the pitching staff held GSU to two runs on six hits. The Mountaineer offense benefited from seven walks, while catcher Paul McIntosh and shortstop Tevin Tucker each had their first hits as Mountaineers and drove in a team-high-tying two runs. Lefty Jackson Wolf picked up the win and allowed one run on four hits in 5.0 innings.
- WVU closed the Atlanta Challenge with a 5-4 loss in 11 innings at Georgia Tech later on Saturday. West Virginia trailed 3-0 after two innings and 4-0 after six, but rallied with three runs in the seventh and another in the eighth to tie the game and send it to extra innings, however, Georgia Tech won it in the 11th on a bases-loaded single. The Mountaineers scored three two-out runs in the seventh with the help of a throwing error before first baseman Marques Inman homered to lead off the eighth, tying the game at 4-4.

Scouting Canisius

An NCAA Tournament team a year ago, Canisius is 1-2 on the season after a series loss at North Carolina Central to open the 2019 campaign. The Golden Griffins lost the opener, 5-2, before they evened the series with an 8-3 win on Saturday. NC Central won the series with a 9-0 victory on Sunday. Conner Morro led the team with five hits in 10 at-bats, while Andy Leader has a team-leading three RBIs. On the mound, Nolan Hunt picked up the win in relief on Saturday, with seven strikeouts in 5.0 shutout innings.

Matt Mazurek is in his second season as head coach and 14th overall at CC. In his first season, he led the Golden Griffins to a MAAC Championship and an NCAA Regional appearance. Mazurek spent 10 seasons as an assistant coach and graduated from Canisius in 2006.

West Virginia is 8-5 all-time against Canisius, with all 13 meetings coming in Morgantown. Last season, the Mountaineers won three of four games against the Golden Griffins. From March 16-18, WVU won the first two, 10-9 and 2-0, before a 4-3 loss in the finale. West Virginia then earned a 9-2 victory on April 18.

Brandon White and Marques Inman each had a team-high-tying four hits in the series and Inman led the squad with six RBIs. Tristen Hudson and Alek Manoah each appeared in two games and did not allow a run on the mound, with Manoah's appearances totaling 9.0 innings and Hudson 4.1.

Coach Randy Mazzy is in his seventh season at WVU and is 190-156.

- After leading WVU to the NCAA Tournament in 2017, Mazzy was named the East Regional Coach of the Year by the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) and the Chuck Tanner College Coach of the Year Award by the Rotary Club of Pittsburgh.
- Mazzy became the fifth coach in program history to eclipse the 100-win mark in 2016 and the second to accomplish the feat in his first four seasons.
- Mazzy joins Ira Errett Rodgers (1921-42, 46), Steve Harrick (1948-67), Dale Ramsburgh (1968-94) and Greg Van Zant (1995-2012) with at least 100 wins at WVU.
- Along with Mazzy, only Van Zant won his 100th game in his fourth season. Harrick won his 100th game in his eighth, and Rodgers and Ramsburgh reached the milestone in their ninth seasons at WVU.
- In his career, Mazzy is 377-316-2 and eclipsed the 300-win mark in 2016.

- The signing class is ranked No. 26 in the nation by Perfect Game, the best in WVU history and the first in the top 30.
- This year's class eclipses the 2016 class, ranked No. 41 in 2015.
- The class features Ryan Bergert, Drew Britt, Alec Burns, Austin Davis, Phillip Dull, Brock Helverson, Madison Jeffrey, Gabe Kurtzhals, Jeremy Lapp-Barger, Beau Lowery, Paul McIntosh, Zach Ottinger, Daniel Ouderkirk, JJ Sousa and Tevin Tucker.
- McIntosh comes to West Virginia from Motlow State CC, and he was drafted by the Los Angeles Angels in the 34th round of the 2018 MLB Draft.
- Additionally, WVU's 2019 signing class is ranked No. 38 by Perfect Game, the second-best in WVU history and the second to be ranked in the top 40.

Record-Setting Draft Success

West Virginia has experienced unprecedented success in the Major League Baseball Draft in Randy Mazzy's tenure. WVU has had 20 draft picks in Mazzy's six seasons, the most in a six-year stretch in team history.

- At least two West Virginia players have been drafted in each of Mazzy's six seasons.
- In the 2018 draft, Michael Grove was selected in the second round by the Los Angeles Dodgers, Kyle Gray was drafted in the 14th round by the New York Yankees, junior Jimmy Galusky was picked in the 20th round by the Chicago White Sox and senior BJ Myers was selected by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 35th round.
- Grove became the fourth Mountaineer ever picked in the top two rounds, and 11th in the top 10. He is WVU's highest draft pick since 2010.
- WVU's four draft picks in 2018 are tied for third-most in a single draft in team history.
- There have been 90 Mountaineer draft picks since the first draft was held in 1965.

Season Preview

The West Virginia University baseball team officially opens the 2019 season on Friday, eager to prove itself against a challenging 53-game schedule in one of the nation's best baseball conferences.

As the season begins at the Atlanta Challenge in Atlanta, seventh-year coach Randy Mazey will have a veteran-laden team with plenty of experience alongside a freshman class that is the highest-ranked recruiting class in program history.

The Mountaineers return 13 of 17 position players from last year's team and seven of nine starters. On the mound, 10 of 17 pitchers are back in 2019. In total, 20 of 30 lettermen return.

"There's no substitute for experience," Mazey said. "I think the guys like (seniors) Darius Hill Ivan Gonzalez, (redshirt junior) Marques Inman, (sophomore) Tyler Doanes and (junior) Brandon White have played a lot in their careers. If you're going to have a good team, you have to look for experience and leadership, and we have it in some areas."

Hill, Gonzalez and White have started more than 100 games in their careers. Hill in right field, Gonzalez at catcher and White in center field, while Inman has 84 career starts, including 51 last year, primarily at first base. Doanes played in 43 games with 29 starts as a freshman and was a consistent presence at third base in the second half of the season.

"Experience is the best teacher; most of the guys in the lineup have been playing since their freshman year, so they've played in every Big 12 stadium," Mazey added. "They're not going to see anything that they haven't seen before. That has a calming effect on the rest of the crowd, when those guys don't get too out of control with their emotions. I'm hoping the experience of this team really helps us."

With plenty of returning star power, the Mountaineers have several players who have been recognized with regional or national preseason accolades. Junior right-hander Alek Manoah was named to the Golden Spikes Award Watch List and the Baseball America Preseason All-America Second Team, while Hill was named to the Preseason All-Big 12 Team. Junior righty Sam Kessler was recognized on the preseason watch list for the Stopper of the Year Award.

Despite those preseason honors and returning experience, not to mention three consecutive Big 12 Championship semifinal appearances, the Mountaineers were picked to finish sixth in the 2019 Big 12 Conference Preseason Coaches' Poll.

The low ranking is just fine with Mazey though.

"That's not very good for everybody else; I think that's really good for us," Mazey said. "I think our guys know we're better than that, and that's going to enable them to play with a chip on their shoulder, something to prove. Any time you get a group of kids with something to prove and they're willing to do it, that can be dangerous for the other team."

That mentality has helped West Virginia in its first six seasons in the Big 12. WVU has finished in the top four in the final Big 12 standings in three of its first six seasons in the league and, despite its early success since joining the conference, has never been voted better than

fifth in the preseason poll.

"Just do what we do," Mazey said of his team's success since joining one of the toughest conferences in the country. "We've had a history here of really playing better in the Big 12 than we have in (non-conference games). I'm not worried about our kids as far as that goes, with the experience of this team and the fact that we're not going to get in awe of anybody at this point. We know that we can beat anybody we play on our schedule. We've had a lot of success in the Big 12, and I don't see why this year will be any different."

The Mountaineers' challenging 53-game schedule features 22 home games and 30 road contests, including the Backyard Brawl against Pitt at PNC Park in Pittsburgh, and a matchup with Marshall at Appalachian Power Park in Charleston.

Additionally, nearly half of the schedule, 23 games, is against teams that made the 2018 NCAA Tournament. That includes nine games against teams that advanced to the 2018 College World Series, with a three-game series at Oregon State, the 2018 national champions, along with a home series against Texas Tech and a road set at Texas. NCAA Tournament teams also include Oklahoma and Kent State at home and Baylor, Oklahoma State and Morehead State on the road.

On Opening Day, WVU's 36-man roster will feature five seniors, 11 juniors, five sophomores and 15 freshmen. With several two-way players, four are catchers, 13 are infielders, eight are outfielders and 21 are pitchers. That includes 17 right-handers and four leftys.

"The beautiful part about this team is that I think we can win games in a variety of ways," Mazey said. "If the power doesn't show up one day, I think the speed will, and if the speed doesn't show up, the power will. We're pretty multi-dimensional as far as that goes."

Position-by-Position Breakdown

INFIELD

While there will be some turnover in the infield from last season, many of those changes are familiar faces.

Inman, who started 51 games as a redshirt sophomore in 2018, will get the start at first base, where he made 41 starts at the position last season and had an impressive year at the plate. Expected to man second base will be Doanes, who earned his way into a starting role and made 23 starts at third base as a freshman in 2018. Freshman Tevin Tucker is anticipated to be the shortstop, while there are several candidates to play third.

An All-Big 12 Honorable Mention in 2018, Inman led the team with 20 doubles and 40 RBIs, was third with a .319 batting average, 61 hits, six home runs, a .529 slugging percentage and 101 total bases. He was fourth with 20 walks, fifth with 31 runs scored and a .387 on-base percentage.

"Marques Inman has locked down the first base position," Mazey said. "He has a lot of experience there, and is a middle of the lineup hitter. Additionally, Kevin Brophy and Andrew Zitel can back him up if need be."

Doanes was on the Big 12 All-Freshman Team and collected All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades in an impressive first-year campaign. In 43 games, Doanes led the team with four

triples, was second with a .407 on-base percentage and fourth with a .317 batting average and a .475 slugging percentage with 32 hits, 20 RBIs and five doubles.

"Tyler Doanes, at least for the time being, is going to move to second base, which is a position that suits him a lot better," Mazey said. "He's a great communicator, has great leadership abilities. Right up the middle we can surround those young kids with experience."

A Petersburg, Virginia, native, Tucker comes to WVU from Prince George High, where he helped his team with its first-ever state title in 2019. Tucker was a two-time first team all-conference, first team all-region, second team all-state and all-academic team honoree. He was ranked No. 7 overall and No. 2 among shortstops in Virginia by Perfect Game.

"He's a really dynamic kid, a dynamic kid who's fun to be around," Mazey said. "I just want him to have fun and play baseball. He has a lot of older guys around him at those positions that are going to help calm him down. So, just go do what you do, that's why you're here. We'll live with some mistakes, but that's how you grow, that's what he's going to do."

At third base, junior Kevin Brophy, senior Andrew Zitel and Gonzalez all have experience at the hot corner, while sophomore Tristen Hudson also could see time at third. Brophy is back after suffering a season-ending injury last season. In 18 games with 16 starts, he hit six home runs and had a .566 slugging percentage with a .226 batting average, 12 hits and 13 RBIs. Fourteen of his 16 starts came at first base, but Brophy saw time at third base as a freshman, where he appeared in 25 games and had three starts at third.

Prior to the 2018 season, Zitel played in a total of 29 career games with four starts. Last season, he played in 44 games with 28 starts and hit .235 with 27 hits, 18 runs scored, 16 RBIs, five doubles, one home run and a .304 slugging percentage.

Primarily a catcher, Gonzalez is another player who could see time at third base. He saw consistent time at the hot corner as a freshman and 20 starts at the position while serving as the backup catcher. He started another six games in 2017 and eight in 2018 at third.

Hudson played in 12 games in the field as a freshman, with six appearances as a pinch runner, four as a pinch hitter and two at second base. He hit .125 with one hit, a double, in eight at-bats with a run scored.

OUTFIELD

Much like three of the four infield positions, right and center field are set by a pair of veterans who have patrolled the outfield nearly every game of their career. Hill will once again be in right, with White in center. There are several options in left field, including redshirt junior TJ Lake and freshman Austin Davis. Senior Braden Zarbnisky, who also is a pitcher, will miss the season with an injury.

"Brandon White and Darius Hill have been experienced starters out there and really good players for us," Mazey said. "With the loss of Braden Zarbnisky in left field, that opens up a spot for somebody. TJ Lake has stepped up and played really well in left field, and I have a young kid named Austin Davis who is pretty dynamic and will probably see some time there as well."

Hill, who ranks in the top-10 in program history in five career statistical categories, is a multiple-time freshman All-American, has been named to two ABCA All-Region teams and three All-Big 12 teams in his career. Last year, he led the team with 79 hits and 20 doubles, was second with a .329 batting average, 41 hits and 115 total bases, third with 36 RBIs and two triples and fourth with a .479 slugging percentage.

White earned All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades in each of his first two years as a Mountaineer. While making highlight-reel plays in center, he finished second on the team with 22 stolen bases in 2018, which ranked No. 6 in WVU history. White was third with 33 walks, fourth with 58 hits and a .392 on-base percentage, fifth with a .289 batting average and 72 total bases and had 20 RBIs, 30 runs scored and seven doubles.

Lake played in 45 games as a redshirt freshman in 2017 and 11 of WVU's first 18 games with six starts last season, before he suffered a season-ending injury. Fifteen of his 23 career starts have come in the outfield. In 2017, Lake hit .233 with 17 hits, five RBIs and six stolen bases in eight attempts.

Davis comes to WVU from Orlando, where he was named a Rawlings-Perfect Game Honorable Mention All-American in 2016 and 2018. He is a two-time all-metro honoree and can play both the infield and outfield.

CATCHER

A freshman All-American and two time- All-Big 12 Honorable Mention honoree, Gonzalez has plenty of experience behind the plate, with 91 starts as catcher, and ranks No. 10 in WVU history with 780 career putouts.

Gonzalez has produced solid offensive numbers throughout his career. As a junior in 2018, he finished fourth on the team with 11 doubles, fifth with 51 hits, 25 RBIs and 18 walks and hit .255 with one home run, 25 runs scored and a .325 slugging percentage.

Sophomores Connor Hamilton and Paul McIntosh will be Gonzalez's backups behind the plate. Redshirt junior Chase Illig will miss the season with an injury.

Hamilton played in 24 games last year with four starts, one as catcher. He hit .132 with five hits and five RBIs. McIntosh comes to West Virginia from Motlow State CC. He hit 16 home runs with 48 RBIs, a .331 batting average, 57 hits and a .680 slugging percentage and a .510 on-base percentage. McIntosh joined the Mountaineers after he was drafted by the Los Angeles Angels in the 34th round of the 2018 MLB Draft.

"Ivan has been a mainstay behind the plate," Mazey said. "We rely heavily on him, but we can't expect him to catch all 56 games. Paul McIntosh is a very talented hitter who does a good job catching. He'll see some time behind home plate, and could also play in left field, while Connor Hamilton is another option we have."

DESIGNATED HITTER

There are several options in the designated hitter spot, and a lot of that depends on who is playing third base and left field. For Mazey, he doesn't have a set way he uses the position. Whoever can help the team score runs and win, he'll use.

"The DH spot for me is anybody who can help you score runs, however they can do it. If they're a bunter and a runner, or a hit-and-run guy that helps the offense, you can slide into that DH spot that way too."

Early candidates include Brophy, Davis Hamilton, Hudson, Lake, McIntosh and Zitel.

PITCHING

Mazey's starting rotation for the opening weekend is set, with Manoah getting the ball on Friday at Kennesaw State. Sophomore left-hander Jackson Wolf will start on Saturday at Georgia State and junior righty Kade Strowd will toe the rubber on Sunday at Georgia Tech.

Manoah's Friday start comes after a strong summer in the Cape Cod League. That followed a sophomore season in which he appeared in 23 games with eight starts. He was second on the team with 60 strikeouts and posted a 3-5 record with two saves and a 4.00 ERA.

"He's been really good so far," Mazey said. "I think he made a decision this summer that he's going to get really serious about playing this game for a living, and I think the results have shown. He's been pitching really well so far this spring. He's going to have to be a workhorse for us, go out and give us 100, 120 pitches every time out."

"He has all three pitches going on really well right now; he has command of all three pitches. The stuff is off the charts; he throws really hard, has a great changeup, great slider, but he's put it all together. And, he's cleaned up his body. That's the first thing he had to do, and he couldn't do that until he made a decision to clean up his body, like we all try to do every day, right? But, he's done that, and I think that's what's enabled him to turn the corner."

Wolf made 17 appearances with two starts as a freshman. He posted a 1-1 record with a 4.07 ERA in 24.1 innings pitched.

Strowd collected All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades as a sophomore. He made 15 appearances with a team-best 13 starts and led the team with four wins, going 4-7, 61 strikeouts and 62.2 innings pitched. His ERA was 5.74.

Another candidate to start games is junior Nick Snyder, who made seven appearances last season and pitched 4.0 innings after coming to WVU from Mercer County CC.

"There's some experience with our starters as well," Mazey said. "Kade Strowd has started some games for us last year in Big 12 play. Jackson Wolf has made a jump; he's a big tall left-hander who has been throwing pretty well. Nick Snyder had as good a fall for us as anybody, and he's very capable. Depth is going to be a little bit of an issue between starters and once we get to the back end of the bullpen where Sam Kessler is going to sit. We're going to need some new guys in that role to fill in some quality

innings. That'll probably dictate our success, how well those new guys pitch in that role."

Kessler once again will be WVU's closer in 2019, after he earned four wins and four saves last year. His 25 relief appearances as a sophomore tied for fourth-most in a single season in team history. He led the team with a 2.86 ERA and allowed nine earned runs on 25 hits with 32 strikeouts.

Between the starters and Kessler, Mazey notes the relief corps could include freshmen Ryan Bergert, Brock Helverson and Beau Lowery, all who have thrown the ball well in preseason practice.

"Sam Kessler has proven that he can finish games for us," Mazey said. "He has the chance to be a pretty quality closer in this league. We just need to fill the gap between what we feel like are quality starters and quality closers. And that's where the loss of Zarbnisky and some other guys are really going to open the door for some young guys to step in ... Ryan Bergert and Brock Helverson are two freshmen who pitch pretty well who should see some time, and Beau Lowery, a West Virginia kid, has really pitched well this spring as well."

A Look Back on 2018

West Virginia reached the Big 12 Championship semifinals for the third consecutive season in 2018, as the Mountaineers went 29-27 on the season. In the Big 12, the No. 2 RPI conference in the country, WVU went 9-15, and became one of two teams to reach the Big 12 semifinals three years in a row.

- The 2018 campaign included a 5-3 mark against top-25 teams, highlighted by a series win over No. 19 Texas. West Virginia also posted a 5-0 record against regional foes, highlighted by a walk-off win in 10 innings at PNC Park to improve to 2-0 at the home of the Pittsburgh Pirates.
- Coach Randy Mazey concluded his sixth season in Morgantown. He is 189-154 at WVU and is the fifth-winningest coach in the program's 126-year history.
- Numerous Mountaineers earned national postseason awards, highlighted by junior second baseman Kyle Gray, who was recognized on the ABCA All-America Third Team. That continued a stretch of four consecutive years with an All-America honor for West Virginia. Gray became the 18th All-American in program history, while the honor was the 16th total in Mazey's tenure.
- Gray was joined by fellow junior Darius Hill on the ABCA East All-Region First Team, marking the sixth consecutive year West Virginia has had a representative on the all-region list and the third year in a row it has had a member on the first team. The pair are the 50th and 51st players in program history to be named to the East All-Region First or Second Team since 1983.
- Nine players were named to an All-Big 12 Team. Gray was named to the All-Big 12 First Team, WVU's sixth first team honoree, and Hill was selected to the second team. The Mountaineers earned a total of 10 All-Big 12 accolades for the third consecutive season, and the seven honorable mention accolades are tied for the most in program history.
- Gray and Hill also added Big 12 All-Tournament Team accolades, marking the third consecutive year West Virginia has had at least two All-Tournament Team selections after it had just one prior to 2016. Additionally, five student-athletes were honored on an Academic All-Big 12 Team.
- WVU also continued its streak of having several players selected in the Major League Baseball Draft, as four Mountaineers were selected. Junior Michael Grove was drafted in the second round by the Los Angeles Dodgers, Gray was selected in the 14th round by the New York Yankees, junior Jimmy Galusky was picked in the 20th round by the Chicago White Sox and senior BJ Myers was drafted by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 35th round.
- Grove became the fourth Mountaineer ever picked in the top two rounds, and 11th in the top 10, and is WVU's highest draft pick since 2010.
- WVU's four selections in 2018 are tied for third-most in a single draft in program history. In Mazey's six seasons, West Virginia has had 20 draft picks, the most in a six-year stretch in program history. At least two players have been drafted every year in that timespan. The Mountaineers have had 90 draft selections in program history, since the first draft was held in 1965.
- The Mountaineers again played in front of record-breaking crowds at Monongalia County Ballpark in 2018. A total of 35,101 fans filled the stands, the third-most in program history, for an average of 1,526 per game, the second-highest in program history. The attendance totals were highlighted by two crowds that ranked in the top-10 all-time and four in the top 25.
- Statistically, the Mountaineers stole 95 bases, which led the Big 12, was No. 17 nationally and was third-most in program history. Additionally, WVU's 12 team saves and 462 strikeouts also were No. 3 in the record books. Individually, Myers set the record with 49 career starts and 305.1 innings pitched.
- West Virginia had three walk-off wins in 2018, tied for sixth-most in the country. The victories, two at Monongalia County Ballpark and one at PNC Park, came after WVU played 21 of its first 24 games, including its first 15, on the road thanks to a pair of rain-postponed games. Six of the first seven weeks of the season were spent away from home. However, the Mountaineers followed it up with 16 of their next 18 games at home.
- A challenging 56-game schedule featured 23 games against teams that made the NCAA Tournament in 2018. Three opponents hosted regional contests, three reached the super regionals and two nationally-seeded teams hosted super regionals and advanced to the College World Series. Fourteen of the 23 games against postseason squads came away from Morgantown.
- Gray's 14 home runs tied for sixth-most in a single season in program history and were WVU's most since 2010. The Blanco, Texas, native added a 23-game hit streak, the longest by a Mountaineer since 2009. He led the Big 12 with a .391 batting average, was second with a .759 slugging percentage and 66 total bases, third with eight home runs and fourth with a .460 on-base percentage and 34 hits.
- Hill, from Dallas, led the team and finished second in the Big 12 with 79 hits, was third in the conference with a team-high-tying 20 doubles and was ninth in the league with 115 total bases. He was second on the team with a .329 batting average and 41 runs scored and added four home runs, 36 RBIs, a .479 slugging percentage and a .362 on-base percentage. Hill's 240 at-bats led the team and ranks No. 7 in a single season in team history. In conference action, Hill was sixth in the Big 12 with a .364 batting average and finished second with 36 hits and sixth with nine doubles.
