BY THE NUMBERS

5 WVU's last five wins have all come after scoring the winning or go-ahead run in the ninth inning or later. West Virginia won three games in walk-off fashion at home, 4-3 over No. 11 Texas Tech and 1-0 and 4-3 in extra innings against Kansas on April 20, before two ninth-inning rallies at Texas, 3-2 and 9-8.

After a 15-3 victory in Charleston earlier this year, WVU has won six in a row against Marshall and eight of the last nine meetings. Since 1993, West Virginia has won 17 of the last 20 in the in-state series. WVU leads the all-time series, 47-24, which began in 1910.

15 On March 27, West Virginia notched a 15-3 victory at Marshall in Charleston. WVU scored in each of the first four innings, highlighted by a nine-run third, to lead 13-0 in the middle of the fourth. The offense was aided by 11 walks, including four with the bases loaded, and all but one starter had a hit and seven drove in at least one run.

Quick Hits: Key Team Notes

- The 2019 season marks the **127th year of baseball** at West Virginia. Founded in 1892, WVU owns an all-time record of 2,186-1,570-19 and is the second-oldest program in the Big 12.
- Coach Randy Mazey** is in his seventh season at the helm and owns a 215-169 record in Morgantown. He is the fourth-winningest coach in team history and the fifth to eclipse the 200-win mark. He won his 205th game on March 31, 2019, passing Ira Errett Rodgers (204-209-4 from 1921-42, 1946) for fourth place on the all-time list. Mazey is 402-329-2 in his career, while his 200th win as a Mountaineer came on March 16, 2019.
- The Mountaineers play at **Monongalia County Ballpark, one of the finest facilities in the country** and the newest Big 12 ballpark. WVU is 70-39 in the venue since it opened in 2015 and holds a .733 home winning percentage since April 2016. Additionally, 20 of the top 25 home crowds in WVU history have come at Monongalia County Ballpark, which seats 3,500.
- West Virginia is **26-15 on the season**, 13-3 at home, 7-5 against top-25 teams and 14-10 against teams that made the 2018 NCAA Tournament. WVU has won 12 of its last 16 games and five consecutive weekend series, the first three against top-25 teams.
- WVU is nationally ranked for the third consecutive week, coming in as high as **No. 17 in this week's D1Baseball and Baseball America polls**. WVU is No. 18 in the Perfect Game top-25, No. 19 in the NCBWA rankings and No. 20 in the Coaches Poll. West Virginia's No. 17 ranking is its highest since 1982, when the Mountaineers finished the season No. 16.
- The Mountaineers' **five consecutive conference series wins** are its most since it won six Big East series in a row in 2003. West Virginia has won five Big 12 series in a season for the first time since it joined the league prior to the 2013 season.
- A **program-record 3,494 fans** saw WVU walk off No. 11 Texas Tech, 4-3, on April 13, which eclipsed the previous record of 3,487, set 10 days earlier in a 5-4 win over Pitt, 5-4, on April 3.
- Junior Alek Manoah won **three consecutive Big 12 Pitcher of the Week** and Golden Spikes Award/D1Baseball.com Performance of the Week honors and was named the **NCBWA National Pitcher of the Week** two of the last three weeks. He has tossed back-to-back 15-strikeout, no-walk shutouts and has not allowed a run in 31.2 consecutive innings.

- The Mountaineers beat No. 3 Oregon State, 2-0, on March 3, a win that is **tied for WVU's highest-ranked win in program history**. In Corvallis, Oregon, the Mountaineers handed the Beavers, the defending NCAA champions, their first loss of the season.
- With the win at No. 3 OSU, **WVU improved to 3-2 all-time against defending national champions**, with all five games coming on the road.
- Junior Kade Strowd was named the **Big 12 Pitcher of the Week** on March 4, a day after he took a no hitter into the seventh inning to lead WVU to a 2-0 upset win at No. 3 Oregon State.
- On Opening Day, Manoah struck out a career-best 13 batters in just 6.0 innings pitched and allowed one earned run on five hits with no walks on Feb. 15 at Kennesaw State. He was named one of **Collegiate Baseball's National Players of the Week** on Feb. 18, as his 13 strikeouts are the most by a Mountaineer since the 2016 season, when Michael Grove had 13 strikeouts twice and Chad Donato had 13 once.
- Nearly half of the Mountaineers' 54-game schedule, **24 games, is against teams that made the 2018 NCAA Tournament**. That includes nine games against teams that advanced to the 2018 College World Series, with a three-game series at Oregon State, the 2018 national champions, along with a home series against Texas Tech and a road set at Texas. NCAA Tournament teams also include Oklahoma, Canisius and Kent State at home and Baylor, Oklahoma State and Morehead State on the road.
- The Mountaineers played **18 of their first 24 games away from home**, with two of the six home games, Canisius on Feb. 19 and Towson on Feb. 27, added to the schedule the day before and three days before, respectively.
- The added games against Canisius and Towson marked the **earliest home games in program history** and the first-ever February home games.
- Senior Darius Hill was voted to the **Preseason All-Big 12 Team** by the league's coaches.
- Junior Sam Kessler was recognized on the **NCBWA Stopper of the Year Award Watch List**.
- WVU's **36-man roster** features five seniors, 11 juniors, five sophomores and 15 freshmen. With several two-way players, four are catchers, 12 are infielders, nine are outfielders and 20 are pitchers. That includes 16 right-handers and four leftys.
- This year's freshman class is the **highest-ranked recruiting class in program history**. The signing class of 15 student-athletes was ranked No. 26 in the nation by Perfect Game, the best in WVU history and the first in the top 30.
- WVU was **picked to finish sixth in the Big 12 Preseason Coaches' Poll**. West Virginia has advanced to three consecutive Big 12 Championship semifinals and has finished fourth in the final standings in three of its first six years in the league.
- Four Mountaineers were drafted last year**, and WVU has had 20 draft selection in coach Randy Mazey's six seasons, the most draft picks in a six-year stretch in team history. Highlighting the 2018 draft class was Michael Grove, who was picked by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the second round and became the fourth Mountaineer ever picked in the top two rounds and 11th in the top 10. He is WVU's highest draft pick since 2010.
- A pair of former Mountaineer left-handers **made their Major League debuts last season**, as Harrison Musgrave and John Means were called up by the Colorado Rockies and Baltimore Orioles, respectively. Musgrave made his debut on April 23 and made 35 relief appearances in 2018, while Means pitched in one game, on Sept. 26.
- With Musgrave and Means' debuts, **24 Mountaineers in program history have played in the big leagues**, and Means and Musgrave are the first players coached by Randy Mazey at WVU to earn an MLB call-up.
- Three Mountaineers are **currently playing on MLB Teams**. Musgrave, with the Rockies, and Means, with the Orioles, are joined by West Virginia native Jedd Gyorko of the St. Louis Cardinals. Gyorko will begin his seventh MLB season in 2019.
- A total of **17 former Mountaineers played professional baseball** last season.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (April 29, 2019) – The No. 17 West Virginia University baseball team begins a week at home with the season's second meeting against Marshall on Tuesday, April 30, at 6:30 p.m. ET, at Monongalia County Ballpark.

Tickets for the in-state matchup are available at WVUGAME.com, by calling 1-800-WVU GAME, at the Mountaineer Ticket Office at the WVU Coliseum or on game day at Monongalia County Ballpark. Admission for WVU students is free with a valid student I.D.

The first 500 fans to Tuesday's game will receive a foam finger, courtesy of WVU Medicine, and all fans can play Baseball Bingo to win prizes. It is Faculty and Staff Appreciation Night, where WVU employees can purchase tickets for \$3 at the gate by showing their employee I.D.

The Mountaineers (26-15) are coming off a weekend series win at Texas, their fifth consecutive Big 12 series victory. WVU, which is in the top 25 in each major poll and as high as No. 17 in two polls, has won 12 of its last 16 games.

The Thundering Herd (23-20) come to Morgantown having lost five of their last six games after a series loss at UAB.

- Two late home runs and another quality start by junior right-hander Alek Manoah powered West Virginia to a 3-2, comeback win to open the series on April 26. The Mountaineers were held hitless for 6.2 innings before junior pinch hitter TJ Lake hit a go-ahead home run with two outs in the eighth inning to take a 2-1 lead. After the Longhorns rallied to tie it at 2-2 in the bottom of the eighth, junior first baseman Marques Inman launched a mammoth home run in the top of the ninth to regain a 3-2 advantage. UT's only run off of Manoah came in the third.
- West Virginia clinched the series with a 9-8 win on April 27, thanks to a run in the eighth inning and two in the ninth after trailing 8-6. Six of WVU's nine runs, including its first five, were all unearned. The Mountaineers trailed 8-7 in the ninth, but Inman doubled home the tying run, and after a balk put freshman pinch runner Austin Davis on third, Lake executed a safety squeeze to score Davis, the go-ahead run. Texas took an 8-6 lead in the seventh, but senior lefty Zach Reid came in and allowed just one hit in 1.2 innings to earn the win, as he got the final two outs of the seventh and pitched a scoreless eighth.
- WVU lost the finale on April 28, 10-2, as Texas avoided the sweep. West Virginia scored first for the first time in the series, but UT responded to lead 3-1 after three. The Mountaineers cut the deficit to one in the top of the fourth, but Texas scored seven unanswered, with three in the bottom of the fourth and four in the sixth. Lake led the squad with two hits and an RBI.

On Deck: Mountaineers Host TCU

West Virginia hosts its final home Big 12 series against TCU from May 3-5. The series begins on Friday, May 30, at 6:30 p.m. ET, and continues on Saturday, at 4 p.m. The finale is set for Sunday, at 1 p.m. Saturday's contest will air regionally on AT&T SportsNet. Tickets are available at WVUGAME.com, by calling 1-800-WVU GAME, at the Mountaineer Ticket Office at the WVU Coliseum or on game day at Monongalia County Ballpark. Friday is Friday Night Happy Hour, with half-off beverages available from 5:30-6:30 p.m., and all fans can participate in Trivia Night and play Baseball Bingo. Saturday is the final Family Day of the season, where fans can purchase four tickets and receive a \$10 concession voucher for just \$25. There will be a bobblehead giveaway to the first 500 fans to Saturday's game, courtesy of United Bank. Saturday also is Alumni Day. Sunday is the final trading card giveaway, courtesy of United Bank, to the first 250 kids, 16 and under. Sunday also is the final Kids Day of the year, presented by WVU Medicine, which features a Kids Zone, inflatables and Mr. Twister's Balloon Art and Face Painting, and kids can run the bases after the game. Additionally, Sunday is Cinco De Mayo at the Ballpark, with free necklaces and shakers to the first 500 fans and walking tacos.

Statistically, West Virginia's pitching staff is No. 10 nationally with 7.27 hits allowed per nine innings, No. 14 with 10.0 strikeouts per nine innings, No. 19 with a 3.41 ERA and No. 27 with a 1.28 WHIP. The Mountaineers also lead the Big 12 and are No. 25 in the NCAA with 78 stolen bases.

Individually, junior right-hander Alek Manoah is No. 6 nationally in strikeouts (103), No. 8 in WHIP (0.85), No. 20 in ERA (1.76), No. 26 in hits allowed per nine innings (5.63) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (6.06) and No. 31 in strikeouts per nine innings (12.09). Junior center fielder Brandon White is second in the Big 12 with 20 stolen bases, while junior right-hander Sam Kessler is third in saves (7), sophomore second baseman Tyler Doanes is third in stolen bases (16) and freshman shortstop Tevin Tucker is third in sacrifice bunts (7).

Scouting Marshall

Marshall is 23-20 on the season and 7-9 on the road. The Thundering Herd are coming off a series loss at UAB, though a 15-10 victory on Saturday snapped a four-game losing streak.

Shane Hanon leads the team with a .375 batting average in 88 at-bats, while Tucker Linder paces the squad with 62 hits and 38 RBIs. Michael Guerrero owns a 1.90 ERA and four saves in 23.2 innings of relief.

Jeff Waggoner is in his 13th season at the helm at MU and owns a 315-409-1 record. He was named the 2016 Conference USA Coach of the Year after leading the Thundering Herd to a program-record 34 wins.

West Virginia is 47-24 all-time against Marshall and 30-8 at home in a series that began in 1910. The Mountaineers have won six in a row in the series and swept the season series in 2016 and again in 2017, the first series sweeps for either team since 1997.

On March 27, West Virginia notched a 15-3 victory at Marshall in Charleston. WVU scored in each of the first four innings, highlighted by a nine-run third, to lead 13-0 in the middle of the fourth. The offense was aided by 11 walks, including four with the bases loaded, and all but one starter had a hit and seven drove in at least one run.

Sophomore designated hitter Paul McIntosh led the team with three hits and three RBIs, with a third-inning home run. On the mound, junior left-hander Nick Snyder collected the win. In 4.0 innings, he allowed one unearned run on two hits with seven strikeouts and five walks. Snyder was followed by five relievers who combined to hold the Thundering Herd to two runs, one earned, on one hit with eight strikeouts and one walk in the final 5.0 innings.

Season Notes and Highlights

- Is the first player in WVU history to strike out 15 batters in a complete-game shutout in back-to-back weeks, and the only player in Big 12 history to achieve the feat since at least 2003
- Is the fourth player in program history with multiple 15-strikeout games in the same season, and the first since John Radosevich struck out 17 once and 16 twice in 1965
- Had a shutout streak of 34.1 innings and did not walk a batter for 28.1 consecutive innings, with both streaks starting on March 29 vs. Oklahoma and ending on April 26 at Texas
- Leads the team with six wins and nine quality starts in 11 starts this season
- Is the first pitcher in Big 12 history to be named Pitcher of the Week three consecutive weeks
- Is the 18th player in Big 12 history to be named Pitcher of the Week at least three times in a single season
- Is the first Mountaineer to collect three or more conference weekly accolades in the same season since Jackson Cramer was named Player of the Week three times in 2016
- Is the second Mountaineer in program history to be named NCBWA Pitcher of the Week twice in the same season (LHP Harrison Musgrave, twice in 2013)
- Is the first player to ever earn the Golden Spikes Award/D1Baseball.com Performance of the Week award three consecutive weeks
- His 15 strikeouts on April 12 against No. 11 Texas Tech, and again on April 20 vs. Kansas, are tied for 14th-most in WVU history and were the most by a Mountaineer since David Maust had 15 against Cleveland State on March 11, 2001
- His two complete games was the first by a WVU starter since BJ Myers went the full 9.0 on April 7, 2017, against Kansas

Alek Manoah's Game-by-Game Breakdown

at Kennesaw State - February 15 (No Decision)

On Opening Day, Manoah struck out a then-career-best 13 batters, which nearly doubled his previous career high of seven. He threw 78 pitches, 58 for strikes. Manoah struck out three batters in an inning twice and had two strikeouts in a frame three times. He also escaped a bases-loaded, no-out jam in the third inning.

at Georgia Southern - February 22 (Win)

Manoah allowed one unearned run on two hits with eight strikeouts, second-most in his career at the time and two walks in 6.1 innings. He held GSU hitless through 4.2 innings and did not allow a runner to reach second base while on the mound.

at No. 3 Oregon State - March 1 (Loss)

Manoah suffered his first loss of the season at No. 3 Oregon State. Against the defending national champions, he allowed seven runs, four earned, on four hits with three strikeouts and three walks in 2.0 innings. All seven runs and four hits came in the second inning, with one error.

Kent State - March 9 (Win)

In 7.2 innings, Manoah struck out 12 batters and allowed two runs on five hits. He struck out the side in the sixth and seventh innings and added two strikeouts in the third and fifth. From the fourth through seventh innings, Manoah struck out nine of the 10 batters he faced.

at William & Mary - March 16 (Win)

Manoah allowed one unearned run on four hits with nine strikeouts and three walks in 7.0 innings, and William & Mary's first hit did not come until the fifth inning. He struck out the side in the first inning, struck out two more in the fourth and got a key strikeout to end the fifth inning with two runners in scoring position.

at Baylor - March 22 (No Decision)

In WVU's Big 12 opener, Manoah allowed five runs on eight hits with six strikeouts and two walks in 7.1 innings pitched. He faced the minimum three batters in the third, fourth and fifth innings.

No. 19 Oklahoma - March 29 (Loss)

Manoah had another quality start but suffered his second loss of the season after he allowed two runs, both in the second inning, on three hits with three strikeouts and four walks in 7.1 innings. He escaped a jam in the fourth, after an error and a double put two on with one out.

at No. 23 Oklahoma State - April 5 (Win)

Manoah struck out 11 and did not walk a batter in 8.0 shutout innings to help the Mountaineers beat No. 23 Oklahoma State. He held the Cowboys to three hits in a then-career-long outing. Manoah retired the side in order five times and limited OSU to just three baserunners, only one of which advance to second base, in the eighth. He notched double-digit strikeouts for the third time this season.

No. 11 Texas Tech - April 12 (Win)

In his first career complete game, Manoah struck out a career-best 15 batters in a shutout performance against No. 11 Texas Tech. He held the Red Raiders to four hits with no walks. Manoah did not allow a baserunner until the fourth inning and allowed a runner to reach second base just once. Manoah had three strikeouts in the third and eighth innings, had two punchouts in an inning three times and retired the side in order five times.

Kansas - April 19 (Win)

Manoah became the first player in program history to strike out 15 batters in a complete game shutout in back-to-back games. It was his third consecutive scoreless outing, extending his shutout streak to 31.2 consecutive innings. Manoah gave up just three hits and again did not walk a batter. He struck out two batters in an inning four times and struck out three in the first, and had at least one strikeout in every inning. Manoah retired 12 in a row beginning in the second inning and notched four perfect 1-2-3 innings. In a 0-0 game in the ninth, he worked his way out of a jam with two on and nobody out to keep his shutout streak intact and allow WVU to walk off in the bottom half.

at Texas - April 26 (No Decision)

Manoah earned his ninth quality start in 11 starts this season. In 7.0 innings, he held Texas to one run on seven hits with eight strikeouts and two walks. With the one run allowed, Manoah's shutout streak was snapped at 34.1 consecutive innings, and he walked his first batter in 28.1 consecutive innings. His shutout streak came to an end in the third inning, as UT took a 1-0 lead. While he was not as dominant as he was in his last three shutout outings, Manoah battled on the road to escape several key jams to allow the Mountaineer offense to rally late. His first strikeout did not come until the third, and he proceeded to add eight more on the night.

Mountaineers Ranked for Third Consecutive Week

For the third consecutive week, WVU is in the national rankings and appears in all six major polls.

- The Mountaineers check in at No. 17 in this week's D1 Baseball and Baseball America top-25. WVU also moves up to No. 18 in the Perfect Game poll and No. 19 in the NCBWA rankings and is No. 20 in the Coaches Poll and No. 28 in the Collegiate Baseball rankings.
- West Virginia's No. 17 ranking is its highest since 1982, when the Mountaineers finished the 1982 season No. 16 in the final Collegiate Baseball Newspaper poll. WVU is ranked in three consecutive weeks for the first time in seventh-year coach Randy Mazey's tenure.
- The Mountaineers' appearance in this week's polls is the sixth time they have been ranked since 1982, with all six appearances, three times in 2019, twice in 2017 and once in 2018, coming under Mazey.
- WVU is one of four Big 12 Conference teams ranked in at least one national poll this week.

Mazey Climbing Up the Wins Chart

Coach Randy Mazey is in his seventh season at WVU and is 215-169.

- Mazey is the fourth-winningest coach in program history and passed Ira Errett Rodgers (204-209-4 from 1921-42, 1946) for fourth place on the all-time wins list on March 31, 2019, with a 5-1 win over No. 19 Oklahoma. Steve Harrick is third on the all-time wins list, with a 333-162-1 mark, from 1948-67.
- Mazey became the fifth coach in program history to eclipse the 200-win mark on March 16, 2019, with a 9-1 win at William & Mary.
- After leading WVU to the NCAA Tournament in 2017, Mazey was named the East Regional Coach of the Year by the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) and the Chuck Tanner College Coach of the Year Award by the Rotary Club of Pittsburgh.
- Mazey joins Ira Errett Rodgers (1921-42, 46), Steve Harrick (1948-67), Dale Ramsburgh (1968-94) and Greg Van Zant (1995-2012) with at least 100 wins at WVU. All five also have 200 wins at West Virginia.
- In his career, Mazey is 402-329-2 and earned his 400th win on April 20, 2019.

Home Sweet Home

West Virginia plays in one of the premier collegiate baseball venues in the country, Monongalia County Ballpark. With a capacity of 3,500, the ballpark opened in 2015.

- West Virginia owns a 70-39 (.642) record in the venue, which includes a 13-3 mark in 2019 and a 55-20 (.733) record since April 17, 2016.
- A school-record crowd of 3,494 saw WVU beat No. 11 Texas Tech, 5-4, on April 13, 2019. The attendance mark broke the previous record of 3,487, set 10 days earlier, on April 3, in a 5-4 win over Pitt.
- WVU has experienced record-setting attendance numbers each year, as nearly 150,000 fans have watched the Mountaineers in their new home. That includes more than 30,000 every season.
- The Mountaineers opened Monongalia County Ballpark with a 6-5, 13-inning victory against Butler on April 10, 2015.
- Just beyond the right field fence serves as the everyday home for the Mountaineers, with clubhouse amenities rivaling those in Major League Baseball. The building features a player's locker room, coaches' locker room and offices, player's lounge, team theater, indoor and outdoor batting cages, a fully-equipped athletic training room and equipment room.
- Monongalia County Ballpark was named the BaseballParks.com Ballpark of the Year for 2015. The annual award recognizes a new or remodeled stadium with the best combination of site selection, exterior appearance, architectural design and fan amenities.

Hill Named Senior CLASS Candidate

Senior right fielder Darius Hill has been named a candidate for the 2019 Senior CLASS Award, which recognizes student-athletes who have notable achievements in four areas of excellence: community, classroom, character and competition.

- A Dallas native, Hill is one of 30 baseball players recognized and one of three from the Big 12 Conference, the most of any conference.
- Hill was named to the ABCA East All-Region First Team, the All-Big 12 Second Team and the Big 12 All-Tournament Team as a junior in 2018. In 2017, he collected All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades and Big 12 All-Tournament Team honors. As a freshman in 2016, Hill was named to five freshman All-America teams, the ABCA East All-Region Second Team, the All-Big 12 Second Team and the Big 12 All-Freshman Team.
- Majoring in management, Hill was named to the Academic All-Big 12 First Team in 2018 and the Academic All-Big 12 Second Team in 2017. He has been recognized on the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll and the Garrett Ford Academic Honor Roll throughout his career. Hill was named to the WVU President's List in the fall of 2018 after he earned a 4.0 GPA.
- The 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and the Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced during the 2019 College World Series in June.

Three Consecutive Top-25 Series Wins

WVU won three consecutive Big 12 series against top-25 opponents, vs. No. 19 Oklahoma from March 29-31, at No. 23 Oklahoma State from April 5-7 and against No. 11 Texas Tech from April 12-14.

- West Virginia lost the opener to the Sooners, 2-1 on March 29, as both teams had five hits. OU scored two in the second and WVU one in the sixth. Junior right-hander Alek Manoah allowed two runs on three hits in 7.1 innings.
- WVU evened the series the next day with a 12-4 win, as the Mountaineers scored the go-ahead run in the seventh and added an eight-run eighth. West Virginia took a 1-0 lead in the first inning, and led 3-0 after four, but OU rallied to tie the game in the sixth.
- WVU jumped out to an early lead and never trailed for the second consecutive day to win the series, 5-1 on March 31. Junior right-handed starter Kade Strowd earned the win and allowed a run on three hits in 5.0 innings, while junior first baseman Marques Inman hit a two-run home run.
- West Virginia opened the series at No. 23 OSU with an 11-1 win on April 5, as Manoah struck out 11 with no walks and three hits allowed in 8.0 shutout innings. WVU scored at least one run in each of the first five innings and totaled 17 hits, led by Inman's four hits and four RBIs.
- OSU evened the series on April 6 with a 9-5 win. WVU led 5-0 after four innings, but OSU rallied with one in the fifth, three in the sixth and five in the eighth. Sophomore lefty Jackson Wolf allowed four runs, one earned, in 7.0 innings.
- West Virginia won the series with a 4-2, comeback win on April 7. WVU erased an early 2-1 deficit with two runs in the eighth inning and added an insurance run in the ninth. Strowd earned the win and had a season-high 10 strikeouts in a career-best 7.1 innings. He held OSU to two runs on four hits.
- Manoah tossed a four-hit, complete-game shutout with a career-high 15 strikeouts and no walks to lead WVU to a series-opening, 2-0 victory on April 12 against No. 11 TTU. Both runs came with two outs, on RBI singles by Inman in the first inning and sophomore designated hitter Paul McIntosh in the third.
- A walk-off walk lifted West Virginia to the series win the next day, with a 4-3 victory in front of 3,494 fans, the largest home crowd in program history. Inman drew a four-pitch walk in the bottom of the ninth inning to bring in the winning run. WVU took a 2-0 lead in the first, but TTU rallied to take a 3-2 lead in the fifth before West Virginia answered in the bottom of the fifth to tie it at 3-3. Inman and senior third baseman Ivan Gonzalez each had two hits and two RBIs in the win, while four pitchers held Tech to three runs on nine hits.
- West Virginia was shut out in the series, finale on April 14, 3-0. WVU was held to two hits as the Red Raiders scored two in the fifth and one in the eighth.

Record Crowd Sees Backyard Brawl Win

A then-WVU-record 3,487 fans watched West Virginia score the go-ahead run in the eighth inning to beat Pitt, 5-4, in the Backyard Brawl on April 3, at Monongalia County Ballpark.

- In front of the largest crowd to ever watch a WVU home game at the time, the Mountaineers regained a 5-4 lead in the eighth inning on a sacrifice fly by junior first baseman Kevin Brophy after the Panthers tied the game with a three-run sixth inning. WVU scored four runs in the bottom of the second inning to take a 4-1 lead, which included a two-run home run by Brophy.
- In the oldest and most-played rivalry in program history, West Virginia has won five in a row against Pitt and 10 of the last 13 meetings. With the win, WVU increased its lead in the all-time series to 107-88.

WVU Upsets No. 3 Oregon State

West Virginia traveled to No. 3 Oregon State, the defending NCAA champions, from March 1-3, and won the finale on March 3, 2-0.

- The 2-0 upset win is tied for the highest-ranked win in program history. The Mountaineers also beat No. 3 TCU twice at home on April 14-16, 2017.
- West Virginia faced the defending national champions for the second time in program history and is 3-2 all-time against teams the year after they won the NCAA title. In 2017, WVU went 2-0 at Coastal Carolina, the reigning champions.
- A strong start by right-hander Kade Strowd and a pair of second-inning home runs by first baseman Kevin Brophy and left fielder Paul McIntosh fueled WVU in the win. Strowd took a no hitter into the seventh inning and held Oregon State to one hit with five strikeouts. In 6.1 innings, he struck out five with nine walks, but five double plays, including four inning-enders, helped him shut out OSU. Strowd earned the win and righty Sam Kessler collected the save with 2.0 shutout innings.
- West Virginia opened the series with a 9-2 loss on March 1, and the Beavers won Saturday's contest, 4-2.

Strowd Earns Big 12 Honor after Upset

Junior right-hander Kade Strowd was named the Big 12 Pitcher of the Week on March 4 after he took a no hitter into the seventh inning at No. 3 Oregon State on March 3 to lead West Virginia to a 2-0 upset victory over the defending national champions.

- The accolade is the first Big 12 weekly honor of Strowd's career and the first for the Mountaineers this season. He is the first WVU pitcher to be named Big 12 Pitcher of the Week since 2017.
- In 6.1 shutout innings in Corvallis, Oregon, Strowd allowed just one hit, which led off the seventh inning, with five strikeouts. He walked nine, but WVU turned five double plays, four of them inning-enders. Strowd held third-ranked Oregon State to a .067 batting average, second-lowest among all Big 12 pitchers on the week.
- Strowd's 6.0 no-hit innings comes a week after he took a no hitter into the fifth on Feb. Feb. 23, at Georgia Southern.
- The Fort Worth, Texas, native is 1-1 on the season and boasts a 1.56 ERA with three earned runs allowed on eight hits in three starts. In 17.1 innings pitched, he has 14 strikeouts with 10 walks.
- Sunday's performance helped the Mountaineers hand the Beavers their first loss of the season. The win over third-ranked OSU is tied for WVU's highest-ranked win in program history.

Manoah Shines on Opening Day

Junior right-hander Alek Manoah has had an impressive first two starts to the 2019 season. On Opening Day at Kennesaw State on Feb. 15, he struck out a career-best 13 batters and allowed one unearned run on five hits with no walks in 6.0 innings. The next week, he took a no-hitter into the fifth inning in a 5-1 win at Georgia Southern on Feb. 22.

- Manoah's 13-strikeout performance nearly doubled his previous career high of seven. He threw 79 pitches, 58 for strikes, and struck out three batters in an inning twice and had two strikeouts in a frame three times.
- The 13 strikeouts were the most by a Mountaineer since the 2016 season, when Michael Grove had 13 strikeouts twice and Chad Donato had 13 once.
- The 13 strikeouts were the most by a Big 12 pitcher on opening weekend, and Manoah was recognized on Collegiate Baseball's National Players of the Week.
- The next week, Manoah took a no hitter into the fifth inning and did not allow a runner to reach second base when he was on the mound. He struck out eight and allowed one unearned run on two hits with two walks in 6.1 innings to earn the win.

Highest-Ranked Recruiting Class in 2019

This year's freshman class comes to Morgantown as the highest-ranked recruiting class in program history.

- The signing class is ranked No. 26 in the nation by Perfect Game, the best in WVU history and the first in the top 30.
- This year's class eclipses the 2016 class, ranked No. 41 on signing day in 2015.
- The class features Ryan Bergert, Drew Britt, Alec Burns, Austin Davis, Phillip Dull, Brock Helverson, Madison Jeffrey, Gabe Kurtzhals, Jeremy Lapp-Barger, Beau Lowery, Paul McIntosh, Zach Ottinger, Daniel Ouderkirck, JJ Sousa and Tevin Tucker.
- McIntosh comes to West Virginia from Motlow State CC, and he was drafted by the Los Angeles Angels in the 34th round of the 2018 MLB Draft.
- Additionally, WVU's 2019 signing class is ranked No. 38 by Perfect Game, the second-best in WVU history and the second ever to be ranked inside the top 40.

WVU Fifth in Big 12 Preseason Poll

West Virginia was voted to finish sixth in the 2019 Big 12 preseason coaches' poll.

- WVU is one of two teams to make three consecutive Big 12 Championship semifinal appearances.
- The Mountaineers have finished in the top four in the final Big 12 standings in three of their first six seasons in the league.
- Despite its early success since joining the conference, West Virginia has never been voted better than fifth in the preseason poll.

Record-Setting Draft Success

West Virginia has experienced unprecedented success in the Major League Baseball Draft in Randy Mazey's tenure. WVU has had 20 draft picks in Mazey's six seasons, the most in a six-year stretch in team history.

- At least two West Virginia players have been drafted in each of Mazey's six seasons.
- In the 2018 draft, Michael Grove was selected in the second round by the Los Angeles Dodgers, Kyle Gray was drafted in the 14th round by the New York Yankees, junior Jimmy Galusky was picked in the 20th round by the Chicago White Sox and senior BJ Myers was selected by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 35th round.
- Grove became the fourth Mountaineer ever picked in the top two rounds, and 11th in the top 10. He is WVU's highest draft pick since 2010.
- WVU's four draft picks in 2018 are tied for third-most in a single draft in team history.
- There have been 90 Mountaineer draft picks since the first draft was held in 1965.



Season Preview

Seventh-year coach Randy Mazey has a veteran-laden team with plenty of experience alongside a freshman class that is the highest-ranked recruiting class in program history.

The Mountaineers return 13 of 17 position players from last year's team and seven of nine starters. On the mound, 10 of 17 pitchers are back in 2019. In total, 20 of 30 lettermen return.

"There's no substitute for experience," Mazey said. "I think the guys like (seniors) Darius Hill Ivan Gonzalez, (redshirt junior) Marques Inman, (sophomore) Tyler Doanes and (junior) Brandon White have played a lot in their careers. If you're going to have a good team, you have to look for experience and leadership, and we have it in some areas."

Hill, Gonzalez and White have started more than 100 games in their careers. Hill in right field, Gonzalez at catcher and White in center field, while Inman has 84 career starts, including 51 last year, primarily at first base. Doanes played in 43 games with 29 starts as a freshman and was a consistent presence at third base in the second half of the season.

"Experience is the best teacher; most of the guys in the lineup have been playing since their freshman year, so they've played in every Big 12 stadium," Mazey added. "They're not going to see anything that they haven't seen before. That has a calming effect on the rest of the crowd, when those guys don't get too out of control with their emotions. I'm hoping the experience of this team really helps us."

With plenty of returning star power, the Mountaineers have several players who have been recognized with regional or national preseason accolades. Junior right-hander Alek Manoah was named to the Golden Spikes Award Watch List and the Baseball America Preseason All-America Second Team, while Hill was named to the Preseason All-Big 12 Team. Junior righty Sam Kessler was recognized on the preseason watch list for the Stopper of the Year Award.

Despite those preseason honors and returning experience, not to mention three consecutive Big 12 Championship semifinal appearances, the Mountaineers were picked to finish sixth in the 2019 Big 12 Conference Preseason Coaches' Poll.

The low ranking is just fine with Mazey though.

"That's not very good for everybody else; I think that's really good for us," Mazey said. "I think our guys know we're better than that, and that's going to enable them to play with a chip on their shoulder, something to prove. Any time you get a group of kids with something to prove and they're willing to do it, that can be dangerous for the other team."

That mentality has helped West Virginia in its first six seasons in the Big 12. WVU has finished in the top four in the final Big 12 standings in three of its first six seasons in the league and, despite its early success since joining the conference, has never been voted better than fifth in the preseason poll.

"Just do what we do," Mazey said of his team's success since joining one of the toughest conferences in the country. "We've had a history here of really playing better in the Big 12 than we have in (non-conference games). I'm not worried about our kids as far as that goes, with the experience of this team and the fact that we're not going to get in awe of anybody at this point. We know that we can beat anybody we play on our schedule. We've had a lot of success in the Big 12, and I don't see why this year will be any different."

The Mountaineers' challenging 53-game schedule features 22 home games and 30 road contests, including the Backyard Brawl against Pitt at PNC Park in Pittsburgh, and a matchup with Marshall at Appalachian Power Park in Charleston.

Additionally, nearly half of the schedule, 23 games, is against teams that made the 2018 NCAA Tournament. That includes nine games against teams that advanced to the 2018 College World Series, with a three-game series at Oregon State, the 2018 national champions, along with a home series against Texas Tech and a road set at Texas. NCAA Tournament teams also include Oklahoma and Kent State at home and Baylor, Oklahoma State and Morehead State on the road.

On Opening Day, WVU's 36-man roster will feature five seniors, 11 juniors, five sophomores and 15 freshmen. With several two-way players, four are catchers, 13 are infielders, eight are outfielders and 21 are pitchers. That includes 17 right-handers and four leftys.

"The beautiful part about this team is that I think we can win games in a variety of ways," Mazey said. "If the power doesn't show up one day, I think the speed will, and if the speed doesn't show up, the power will. We're pretty multi-dimensional as far as that goes."

Position-by-Position Breakdown

INFIELD

While there will be some turnover in the infield from last season, many of those changes are familiar faces.

Inman, who started 51 games as a redshirt sophomore in 2018, will get the start at first base, where he made 41 starts at the position last season and had an impressive year at the plate. Expected to man second base will be Doanes, who earned his way into a starting role and made 23 starts at third base as a freshman in 2018. Freshman Tevin Tucker is anticipated to be the shortstop, while there are several candidates to play third.

An All-Big 12 Honorable Mention in 2018, Inman led the team with 20 doubles and 40 RBIs, was third with a .319 batting average, 61 hits, six home runs, a .529 slugging percentage and 101 total bases. He was fourth with 20 walks, fifth with 31 runs scored and a .387 on-base percentage.

"Marques Inman has locked down the first base position," Mazey said. "He has a lot of experience there, and is a middle of the lineup hitter. Additionally, Kevin Brophy and Andrew Zitel can back him up if need be."

Doanes was on the Big 12 All-Freshman Team and collected All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades in an impressive first-year campaign. In 43 games, Doanes led the team with four triples, was second with a .407 on-base percentage and fourth with a .317 batting average and a .475 slugging percentage with 32 hits, 20 RBIs and five doubles.

"Tyler Doanes, at least for the time being, is going to move to second base, which is a position that suits him a lot better," Mazey said. "He's a great communicator, has great leadership abilities. Right up the middle we can surround those young kids with experience."

A Petersburg, Virginia, native, Tucker comes to WVU from Prince George High, where he helped his team with its first-ever state title in 2019. Tucker was a two-time first team all-conference, first team all-region, second team all-state and all-academic team honoree. He was ranked No. 7 overall and No. 2 among shortstops in Virginia by Perfect Game.

"He's a really dynamic kid, a dynamic kid who's fun to be around," Mazey said. "I just want him to have fun and play baseball. He has a lot of older guys around him at those positions that are going to help calm him down. So, just go do what you do, that's why you're here. We'll live with some mistakes, but that's how you grow, that's what he's going to do."

At third base, junior Kevin Brophy, senior Andrew Zitel and Gonzalez all have experience at the hot corner, while sophomore Tristen Hudson also could see time at third. Brophy is back after suffering a season-ending injury last season. In 18 games with 16 starts, he hit six home runs and had a .566 slugging percentage with a .226 batting average, 12 hits and 13 RBIs. Fourteen of his 16 starts came at first base, but Brophy saw time at third base as a freshman, where he appeared in 25 games and had three starts at third.

Prior to the 2018 season, Zitel played in a total of 29 career games with four starts. Last season, he played in 44 games with 28 starts and hit .235 with 27 hits, 18 runs scored, 16 RBIs, five doubles, one home run and a .304 slugging percentage.

Primarily a catcher, Gonzalez is another player who could see time at third base. He saw consistent time at the hot corner as a freshman and 20 starts at the position while serving as the backup catcher. He started another six games in 2017 and eight in 2018 at third.

Hudson played in 12 games in the field as a freshman, with six appearances as a pinch runner, four as a pinch hitter and two at second base. He hit .125 with one hit, a double, in eight at-bats with a run scored.

OUTFIELD

Much like three of the four infield positions, right and center field are set by a pair of veterans who have patrolled the outfield nearly every game of their career. Hill will once again be in right, with White in center. There are several options in left field, including redshirt junior TJ Lake and freshman Austin Davis. Senior Braden Zarbnisky, who also is a pitcher, will miss the season with an injury.

"Brandon White and Darius Hill have been experienced starters out there and really good players for us," Mazey said. "With the loss of Braden Zarbnisky in left field, that opens up a spot for somebody. TJ Lake has stepped up and played really well in left field, and I have a young kid named Austin Davis who is pretty dynamic and will probably see some time there as well."

Hill, who ranks in the top-10 in program history in five career statistical categories, is a multiple-time freshman All-American, has been named to two ABCA All-Region teams and three All-Big 12 teams in his career. Last year, he led the team with 79 hits and 20 doubles, was second with a .329 batting average, 41 hits and 115 total bases, third with 36 RBIs and two triples and fourth with a .479 slugging percentage.

White earned All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades in each of his first two years as a Mountaineer. While making highlight-reel plays in center, he finished

second on the team with 22 stolen bases in 2018, which ranked No. 6 in WVU history. White was third with 33 walks, fourth with 58 hits and a .392 on-base percentage, fifth with a .289 batting average and 72 total bases and had 20 RBIs, 30 runs scored and seven doubles.

Lake played in 45 games as a redshirt freshman in 2017 and 11 of WVU's first 18 games with six starts last season, before he suffered a season-ending injury. Fifteen of his 23 career starts have come in the outfield. In 2017, Lake hit .233 with 17 hits, five RBIs and six stolen bases in eight attempts.

Davis comes to WVU from Orlando, where he was named a Rawlings-Perfect Game Honorable Mention All-American in 2016 and 2018. He is a two-time all-metro honoree and can play both the infield and outfield.

CATCHER

A freshman All-American and two time- All-Big 12 Honorable Mention honoree, Gonzalez has plenty of experience behind the plate, with 91 starts as catcher, and ranks No. 10 in WVU history with 780 career putouts.

Gonzalez has produced solid offensive numbers throughout his career. As a junior in 2018, he finished fourth on the team with 11 doubles, fifth with 51 hits, 25 RBIs and 18 walks and hit .255 with one home run, 25 runs scored and a .325 slugging percentage.

Sophomores Connor Hamilton and Paul McIntosh will be Gonzalez's backups behind the plate. Redshirt junior Chase Illig will miss the season with an injury.

Hamilton played in 24 games last year with four starts, one as catcher. He hit .132 with five hits and five RBIs. McIntosh comes to West Virginia from Motlow State CC. He hit 16 home runs with 48 RBIs, a .331 batting average, 57 hits and a .680 slugging percentage and a .510 on-base percentage. McIntosh joined the Mountaineers after he was drafted by the Los Angeles Angels in the 34th round of the 2018 MLB Draft.

"Ivan has been a mainstay behind the plate," Mazey said. "We rely heavily on him, but we can't expect him to catch all 56 games. Paul McIntosh is a very talented hitter who does a good job catching. He'll see some time behind home plate, and could also play in left field, while Connor Hamilton is another option we have."

DESIGNATED HITTER

There are several options in the designated hitter spot, and a lot of that depends on who is playing third base and left field. For Mazey, he doesn't have a set way he uses the position. Whoever can help the team score runs and win, he'll use.

"The DH spot for me is anybody who can help you score runs, however they can do it. If they're a bunter and a runner, or a hit-and-run guy that helps the offense, you can slide into that DH spot that way too."

Early candidates include Brophy, Davis Hamilton, Hudson, Lake, McIntosh and Zitel.

PITCHING

Mazey's starting rotation for the opening weekend is set, with Manoah getting the ball on Friday at Kennesaw State. Sophomore left-hander Jackson Wolf will start on Saturday at Georgia State and junior righty Kade Strowd will toe the rubber on Sunday at Georgia Tech.

Manoah's Friday start comes after a strong summer in the Cape Cod League. That followed a sophomore season in which he appeared in 23 games with eight starts. He was second on the team with 60 strikeouts and posted a 3-5 record with two saves and a 4.00 ERA.

"He's been really good so far," Mazey said. "I think he made a decision this summer that he's going to get really serious about playing this game for a living, and I think the results have shown. He's been pitching really well so far this spring. He's going to have to be a workhorse for us, go out and give us 100, 120 pitches every time out."

"He has all three pitches going on really well right now; he has command of all three pitches. The stuff is off the charts; he throws really hard, has a great changeup, great slider, but he's put it all together. And, he's cleaned up his body. That's the first thing he had to do, and he couldn't do that until he made a decision to clean up his body, like we all try to do every day, right? But, he's done that, and I think that's what's enabled him to turn the corner."

Wolf made 17 appearances with two starts as a freshman. He posted a 1-1 record with a 4.07 ERA in 24.1 innings pitched.

Strowd collected All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolades as a sophomore. He made 15 appearances with a team-best 13 starts and led the team with four wins, going 4-7, 61 strikeouts and 62.2 innings pitched. His ERA was 5.74.

Another candidate to start games is junior Nick Snyder, who made seven appearances last season and pitched 4.0 innings after coming to WVU from Mercer County CC.

"There's some experience with our starters as well," Mazey said. "Kade Strowd has started some games for us last year in Big 12 play. Jackson Wolf has made a jump; he's a big tall left-hander who has been throwing pretty well. Nick

Snyder had as good a fall for us as anybody, and he's very capable. Depth is going to be a little bit of an issue between starters and once we get to the back end of the bullpen where Sam Kessler is going to sit. We're going to need some new guys in that role to fill in some quality innings. That'll probably dictate our success, how well those new guys pitch in that role."

Kessler once again will be WVU's closer in 2019, after he earned four wins and four saves last year. His 25 relief appearances as a sophomore tied for fourth-most in a single season in team history. He led the team with a 2.86 ERA and allowed nine earned runs on 25 hits with 32 strikeouts.

Between the starters and Kessler, Mazey notes the relief corps could include freshmen Ryan Bergert, Brock Helverson and Beau Lowery, all who have thrown the ball well in preseason practice.

"Sam Kessler has proven that he can finish games for us," Mazey said. "He has the chance to be a pretty quality closer in this league. We just need to fill the gap between what we feel like are quality starters and quality closers. And that's where the loss of Zarbrisky and some other guys are really going to open the door for some young guys to step in ... Ryan Bergert and Brock Helverson are two freshmen who pitch pretty well who should see some time, and Beau Lowery, a West Virginia kid, has really pitched well this spring as well."

A Look Back on 2018

West Virginia reached the Big 12 Championship semifinals for the third consecutive season in 2018, as the Mountaineers went 29-27 on the season. In the Big 12, the No. 2 RPI conference in the country, WVU went 9-15, and became one of two teams to reach the Big 12 semifinals three years in a row.

- The 2018 campaign included a 5-3 mark against top-25 teams, highlighted by a series win over No. 19 Texas. West Virginia also posted a 5-0 record against regional foes, highlighted by a walk-off win in 10 innings at PNC Park to improve to 2-0 at the home of the Pittsburgh Pirates.
- Numerous Mountaineers earned national postseason awards, highlighted by junior second baseman Kyle Gray, who was recognized on the ABCA All-America Third Team. That continued a stretch of four consecutive years with an All-America honor for West Virginia. Gray became the 18th All-American in program history, while the honor was the 16th total in Mazey's tenure.
- Gray was joined by fellow junior Darius Hill on the ABCA East All-Region First Team, marking the sixth consecutive year West Virginia has had a representative on the all-region list and the third year in a row it has had a member on the first team. The pair are the 50th and 51st players in program history to be named to the East All-Region First or Second Team since 1983.
- Nine players were named to an All-Big 12 Team. Gray was named to the All-Big 12 First Team, WVU's sixth first team honoree, and Hill was selected to the second team. The Mountaineers earned a total of 10 All-Big 12 accolades for the third consecutive season, and the seven honorable mention accolades are tied for the most in program history.
- Gray and Hill also added Big 12 All-Tournament Team accolades, marking the third consecutive year West Virginia has had at least two All-Tournament Team selections after it had just one prior to 2016. Additionally, five student-athletes were honored on an Academic All-Big 12 Team.
- The Mountaineers again played in front of record-breaking crowds at Monongalia County Ballpark in 2018. A total of 35,101 fans filled the stands, the third-most in program history, for an average of 1,526 per game, the second-highest in program history. The attendance totals were highlighted by two crowds that ranked in the top-10 all-time and four in the top 25.
- Statistically, the Mountaineers stole 95 bases, which led the Big 12, was No. 17 nationally and was third-most in program history. Additionally, WVU's 12 team saves and 462 strikeouts also were No. 3 in the record books. Individually, Myers set the record with 49 career starts and 305.1 innings pitched.
- West Virginia had three walk-off wins in 2018, tied for sixth-most in the country. The victories, two at Monongalia County Ballpark and one at PNC Park, came after WVU played 21 of its first 24 games, including its first 15, on the road thanks to a pair of rain-postponed games.
- A challenging 56-game schedule featured 23 games against teams that made the NCAA Tournament in 2018. Three opponents hosted regional contests, three reached the super regionals and two nationally-seeded teams hosted super regionals and advanced to the College World Series.
- Gray's 14 home runs tied for sixth-most in a single season in program history and were WVU's most since 2010. The Blanco, Texas, native added a 23-game hit streak, the longest by a Mountaineer since 2009. He led the Big 12 with a .391 batting average, was second with a .759 slugging percentage and 66 total bases, third with eight home runs and fourth with a .460 on-base percentage and 34 hits.
- Hill, from Dallas, led the team and finished second in the Big 12 with 79 hits, was third in the conference with a team-high-tying 20 doubles and was ninth in the league with 115 total bases. He was second on the team with a .329 batting average and 41 runs scored and added four home runs, 36 RBIs, a .479 slugging percentage and a .362 on-base percentage. Hill's 240 at-bats led the team and ranks No. 7 in a single season in team history. In conference action, Hill was sixth in the Big 12 with a .364 batting average and finished second with 36 hits and sixth with nine doubles.
