

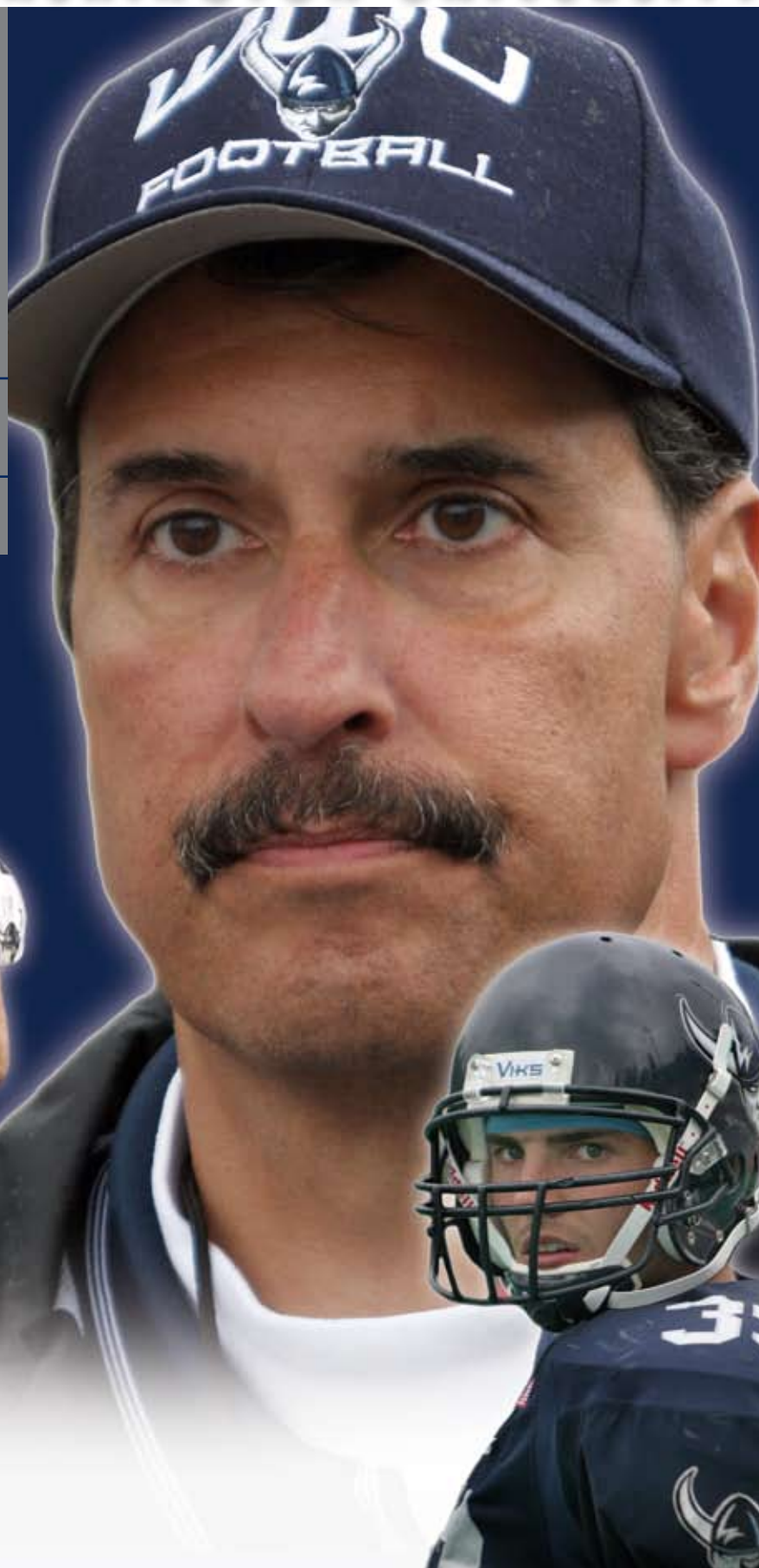

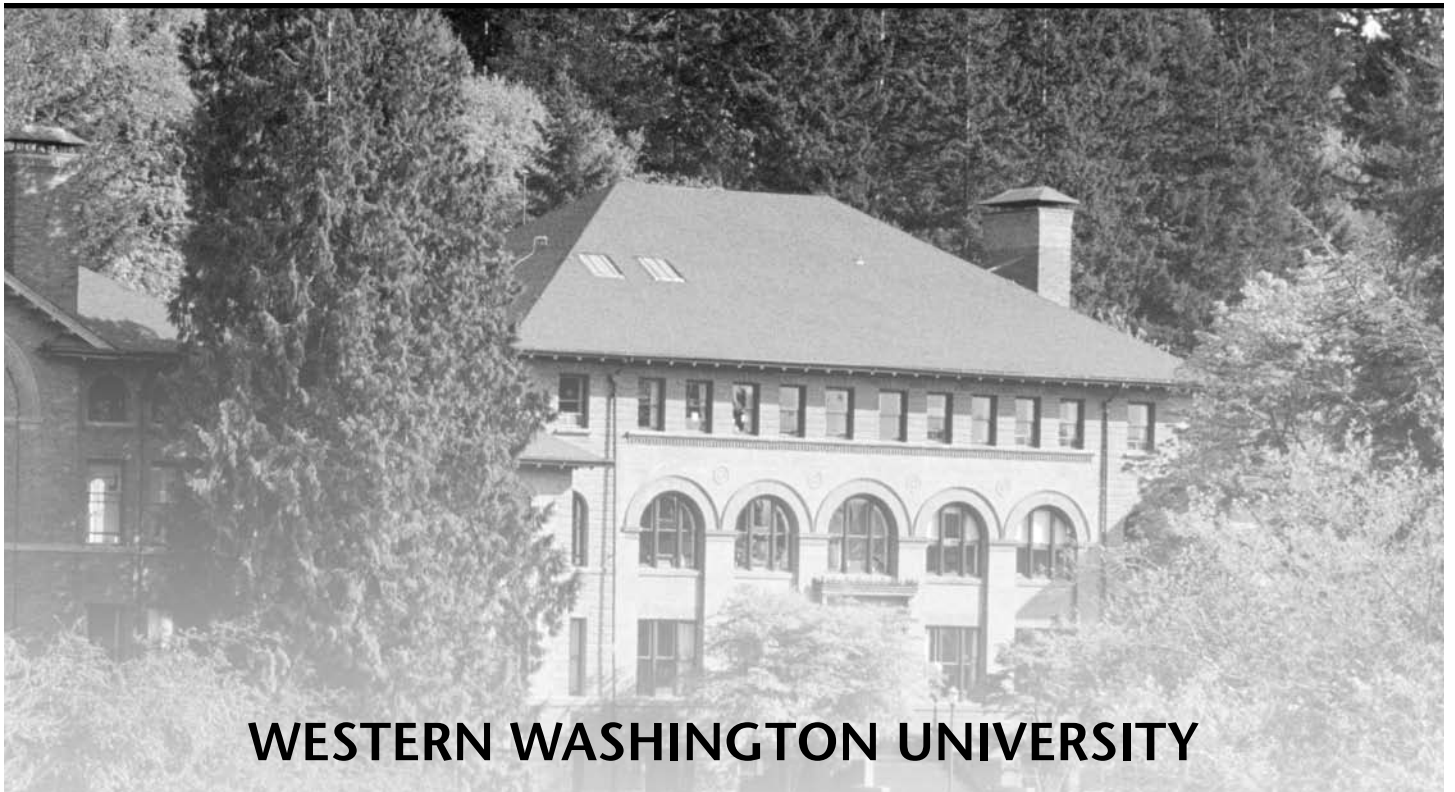

The University

Western Washington University is a public, comprehensive university with a national reputation for academic excellence, dedicated to providing the highest quality undergraduate education in the Pacific Northwest. A Western education offers students the opportunity to develop active learning skills to last a lifetime and serves them well in today's pluralistic, changing and highly technical world.

While large enough to offer students a range of top quality programs, Western remains small enough to focus its resources on the needs of individual students as they build career skills on the sound foundation of the arts, humanities, sciences and professional studies.

The campus

Western's main campus on the western slope of Sehome Hill has been called a "jewel of a university." It offers a magic blend of art and nature with views of Bellingham Bay and the San Juan Islands to the west and a panoramic vista of the city of Bellingham. Some campus locations also offer scenic views of Mount Baker and Washington's Cascade Range to the east and the Canadian Cascades to the north. The campus is just minutes by bus from downtown Bellingham as well as the city's historic Fairhaven district, and its proximity to both locations also puts it within easy walking distance. Western's main campus and the adjacent Sehome Hill Nature Reserve encompass 216 acres near the heart of Bellingham. Counting Lake-wood Recreation Center and Boathouse, the Shannon Point Marine Center in Anacortes, and the Viqueen Lodge, Western properties occupy 300 acres.

Students

Over 13,000 students call Western home during each academic year, starting in late September and continuing through June. A third of Western's students reside in on-campus residence halls. Western offers something for every student, with more

than 100 cultural, academic, recreational, religious, social and political clubs and organizations as well as multiple venues for the performing arts and extensive opportunities for community service.

Academic programs and degrees

Western is organized into a graduate school and seven undergraduate colleges: the College of Business and Economics, the College of Fine and Performing Arts, Fairhaven College, the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, Huxley College of the Environment, the College of Sciences and Technology, and Woodring College of Education.

GENERAL INFORMATION

WWU ATHLETICS

In its eighth year as a full member of NCAA Division II (Sept., 1998), Western Washington University already has made national appearances in men's and women's basketball, men's cross country, women's rowing, football, men's and women's golf, softball and volleyball.

The Vikings won the school's first NCAA II National Championship in women's rowing in 2005 and successfully defended that crown last spring. Western placed second nationally in women's rowing in 2002 and 2003, and reached the national semifinals in men's basketball and women's basketball in 2001 and 2000, respectively.

Western won the first four Great Northwest Athletic Conference All-Sports Championships (2001-02, 2002-03, 2003-04, 2004-05), and placed second by just three points last year.

In women's basketball, Western ranks among the top 15 in all-time victories among all four-year schools, and has made nine straight national appearances. The Vikings had the fourth-longest winning streak in NCAA II history when they won 57 consecutive league matches in volleyball from 2002-04.

During the 2005-06 academic year, Western won league titles in women's basketball and men's indoor track and field. The Vikings captured the NCAA II national title in women's rowing, and placed fifth nationally in women's golf. They also made regional appearances in men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf and women's rowing.

The Vikings' athletic history dates back over a century. Intercollegiate competition began in football and basketball in 1903. Today, nearly 500 student-athletes compete in 16 varsity sports.

The 2005 NCAA Report found that 79 percent of Western student-athletes receive their degrees in six years or fewer. That was 28 percentage points higher than the average for student-athletes in the 10-team Great Northwest Athletic Conference (51 percent), and 25 points higher than the national average for NCAA II schools (54 percent).

FACILITIES

Athletic facilities on Western's campus include Sam Carver Gymnasium, a softball field, artificial-surfaced Viking Field, a six-lane all-weather rubberized track, and four practice fields.

Carver Gym, completed in 1962, has five basketball courts, including a main gym which seats 2,534 spectators. It also has a swimming pool, handball courts, a strength and fitness center, and convertible facilities for volleyball, which includes a SportCourt.

Football and men's and women's soccer games are held at recently renovated Bellingham's Civic Stadium, as are major track meets. The stadium, built in 1961, with an addition in 1971, has covered seating for 4,400 spectators and lights for night use. A FieldTurf surface was installed in 2000. The track is an eight-lane, 400-meter oval.

Softball contests take place on campus at a facility completed in 1999. There is seating for 500.

Rowing events are held on Lake Whatcom, with the boathouse located at Lakewood. Cross country competition is conducted at Lake Padden Park. Golf matches are held at the Bellingham Golf and Country Club.

HEAD COACH ROBIN ROSS

He was the defensive coordinator for two of the finest teams in school history in the mid-1990s. Now, Robin Ross brings three decades of coaching experience to his new post - head football coach at Western.

Ross has spent most of that time as an assistant at the NCAA Division I-A level. He also coached in the National Football League, being the linebackers coach with Oakland for two seasons, helping the Raiders have the ninth-ranked defense in the NFL in 2000, when they were 12-4 and reached the AFC Championship Game.

This past season, Ross was linebackers coach at Oregon State University, where the Beavers led the PAC 10 in run defense, allowing 108.0 yards per game. He spent the previous four seasons as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at University of Oregon. The Ducks won the 2001 PAC 10 championship, finishing second in the ESPN Coaches Poll after defeating Colorado in the 2002 Fiesta Bowl. He was also at Oregon as an assistant during the 1997 and 1998 seasons.

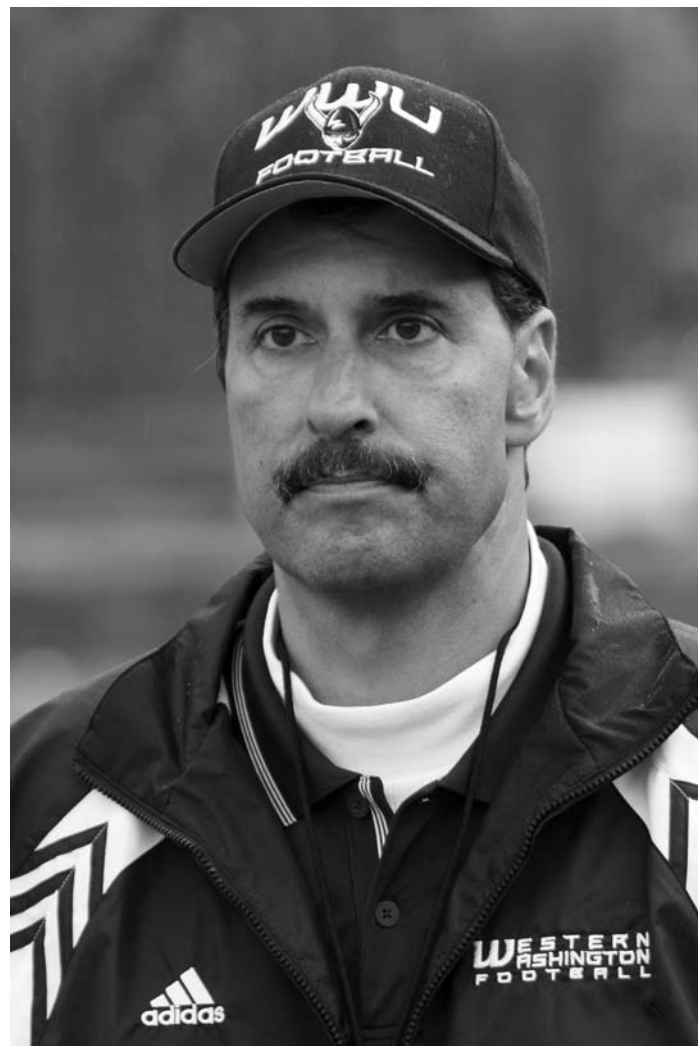
Ross came to Western in 1994 and in his first season, the Vikings led the NAIA Division II in scoring defense, allowing just 11.5 points a game and five times holding opponents without a touchdown. Western, which posted its first national playoff victory that season with a 21-2 triumph at No.1-ranked Linfield, ranked third nationally in rushing defense at 76.0 yards a contest and fifth in total defense (260.3) with 42 takeaways (26 interceptions, 16 fumble recoveries).

In 1995, Western finished 9-1, going 9-0 for the first undefeated regular-season for the school in 57 years and being ranked No.1 nationally in NAIA II for five weeks. The defense allowed 13.7 points a game, ranking seventh nationally in that category.

Immediately prior to coming to Western, Ross had been defensive coordinator at Iowa State University from 1987 to 1993. He has also been a defensive coordinator at Fresno State University (1996) and University of Cincinnati (1984 and 1985).

Ross, 52, began his coaching career at Long Beach State University in 1977. A graduate of Washington State University, where he also spent one season as a defensive line coach, Ross was a second-team all-PAC-8 pick as an offensive lineman. He was a 10th round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 1976, and spent one preseason with the Seattle Seahawks.

Ross, who becomes the 13th head coach in the 95-year history of Western football, is a graduate of El Rancho High School in Pico Rivera, Calif. He and wife Jean have been married for 25 years.

Head Coach, Defensive Coordinator

In first year as head coach at Western ... Was Vikings' defensive coordinator in 1994 and 1995, two of the best seasons in school history ... Western led NAIA Division II in scoring defense in 1994, allowing just 11.5 points a game and five times holding opponents without a touchdown ... That season, the Vikings were 8-3 and posted their first national playoff victory with a 21-2 triumph at No.1-rated Linfield, being ranked third nationally in rushing defense at 76.0 yards a contest and fifth in total defense (260.3) with 42 takeaways ... In 1995, Western finished 9-1, going 9-0 for school's first undefeated regular season in 57 years and being ranked No.1 nationally for five weeks. Defense allowed 13.7 points a game, ranking seventh nationally in that category ... Was linebackers coach at Oregon State in 2005, the Beavers leading the PAC 10 in rushing defense allowing 108.0 yards per game ... Spent previous four seasons (2001-04) as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach at Oregon ... During that tenure, the Ducks won the 2001 PAC 10 championship, finishing second in the ESPN Coaches Poll after defeating Colorado in the 2002 Fiesta Bowl ... Also was an assistant at Oregon in 1997 and 1998, coaching the defensive line and linebackers ... Coached two years in the NFL with Oakland, helping Raiders to ninth-ranked defense in the league in 2000 when they were 12-4 and reached the AFC Championship Game ... Was defensive coordinator at Iowa State from 1987 to 1993, and defensive coordinator at Fresno State in 1996 and Cincinnati in 1984 and 1985 ... Defensive line coach at Washington State in 1986 and handled same duties at Long Beach State from 1977 to 1983 ... Graduate of Washington State, earning bachelor's degree in physical education in 1977 ... Played two seasons as offensive lineman for Cougars, receiving honorable mention All-American and second-team PAC 8 Conference all-star honors in 1975 ... Began collegiate career at Rio Hondo Community College (Whittier, Calif.), playing two seasons and earning first-team All-Southern California Conference honors ... Tenth round draft pick of San Francisco 49ers in 1976 and played for Seattle Seahawks for one preseason ... Native American (Cherokee) ... 52 years old ... He and wife Jean (formerly Kwid) have been married since 1980.

Offensive Coordinator/Strength Coach/Quarterbacks

In 14th year at Western ... Offensive Coordinator and Strength Coach ... Works with quarterbacks ... Director of Parberry Strength and Fitness Center ... Has worked with wide receivers last 12 years, coaching three All-Americans, after one year with tight ends ... Assistant at Thurston High School in Springfield, Ore., for one year and head coach at Deary (Id.) High School for one season, directing Mustangs to state semifinals ... Named Whitepine League Coach of the Year ... Also assisted one year at Deary and two seasons at Ferndale High School, helping Golden Eagles to semifinals of Class AA state playoffs in 1987 ... Received bachelor's degree in education at Western in 1989 ... Did not play for Vikings because of knee injury ... Two-sport athlete at Bellevue's Newport High School ... Captain and quarterback of football team that reached first round of Class AAA state playoffs in 1983 ... Infielder/catcher on baseball team that won state title in 1982 ... 41 years old ... He and wife Erin have two daughters, Chloe 8 and Rayn 5.

GREG MALO

Recruiting Coordinator/Secondary

In first year as assistant at Western ... Recruiting coordinator and works with defensive secondary ... Spent last six years as assistant at NCAA I-A Louisiana Tech University ... Coached outside linebackers in 2005 after working with running backs the previous three seasons ... Was linebackers coach for two years as graduate assistant, the Bulldogs winning Western Athletic Conference championship and playing in Humanitarian Bowl ... Worked with three future NFL players there - running backs Joe Smith (Tampa Bay, Houston and Tennessee) and Ryan Moats (Philadelphia) and linebacker Byron Santiago (Green Bay) ... All three players were first-team WAC all-stars, with Moats being named league's Player of the Year ... Prior to tenure at Louisiana Tech, coached at College of the Sequoias (Calif.), serving as defensive backs coach and defensive coordinator in 1998 and 1999 ... Worked with first-team All-American defensive back Jacob Yavasile, who was the Central Valley Conference defensive Player of the Year ... In 1998, the Giants posted a 9-1 record, were ranked among the top 10 nationally, and won conference title before losing to San Francisco City College in Northern California Junior College championship game ... Served as defensive backs coach in 1997 at national high school powerhouse Santa Margarita in southern California where the Eagles posted a perfect 14-0 record and won the CIF Southern Section championship ... Coached All-America defensive back Jon Minardi ... Also worked with the defensive backs in 1995 at Western as graduate assistant, the Vikings posting a perfect 9-0 regular season mark and being ranked No.1 nationally before losing to eventual national champion Central Washington in the playoffs ... Lettered four years and started three at Western from 1991 to 1994, earning first-team all-Columbia Football Association honors as senior free safety ... That season, Western boasted the No.1 scoring defense in the country and lost in the national quarterfinals, finishing 8-3 ... Played with the Barcelona Dragons of NFL Europe for three years as free safety, earning NFL Europe Player of the Week honors three times and helping Dragons to 1997 World Bowl title ... Earned bachelor's degree in exercise science from Western in 1995, and master's degree in sports science from Louisiana Tech in 2001 ... He and wife Megan have two sons, Timothy 4 and Max 1 ... 33 years old.

In first year as assistant at Western ... Academic coordinator and works with linebackers ... Graduate assistant at Washington State University last year while working on master's degree in sports management ... Received bachelor's degree in agricultural business at WSU in 2004 ... Four-year letter winner as linebacker for Cougars, starting 27 games and finishing career with 137 tackles ... Helped WSU to Sun Bowl appearance in 2001, the 2003 Rose Bowl after Cougars earned share of Pac-10 title in 2002, and trip to Holiday Bowl in 2003 ... First-team Washington State Sportswriters Association, Washington Prep Report and Seattle P-I all-state selection as senior at Kamiakin High School in Kennewick ... Named Big 9 Conference Defensive Player of the Year ... Two-way all-league pick, rushing for 934 yards and being credited with 149 tackles ... Recorded school-record 16 quarterback sacks as junior ... Broke seven school records including career sack record with 32 ... ROSS ERA BEGINS AT WESTERN

It's the start of a new era for the Western Washington University football team.

The Vikings, who were 4-6 last year, enter the 2006 season with a new coach – Robin Ross – and in a new league – the North Central Conference, long considered one of the power conferences of NCAA Division II.

Neither are completely unfamiliar. Western has faced at least one NCC opponent in each of the last four seasons. And Ross, who has spent much of the last 30 years as an NCAA Division I-A assistant, most recently at Oregon State, was the Western defensive coordinator in 1994 and 1995, helping the Vikings be one of the top defensive teams in the NAIA.

There's a solid core of returnees – 13 starters are back among 36 letter winners, led on offense by senior quarterback James Monrean (Bellingham/Sehome), who ranked 28th in total offense in NCAA II at 252.7 yards a game, and on defense by junior linebacker Shane Simmons (Kent/Kentlake), who had 66 tackles, with team-highs of 8.5 for loss and five sacks, and also added four forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, and an interception.

"The first thing I told the team when I took the job was that we are going to be the best team we can be," said Ross. "We'll find out how good that is as the season goes on. We want to continue to improve as the season progresses."

Ross said there were three specific areas the Vikings need to show improvement.

"The first is that we can't turn the ball over – and we need to get more turnovers forced, too, that was a glaring weakness last year. Second, we need to make great improvements on special teams. Third, we need to improve defensively, in particular, we have to stop the run."

Those improvements will have to come while facing a tough schedule that includes four 2005 NCAA II national playoff teams in a four-game stretch of September. The positive side is three of those games are at home.

"It's one of the toughest schedules in the country, and we're doing it with a young team," Ross said. "But having six games at home will help (as well as playing host to fourth annual Battle in Seattle for the Cascade Cup). The team wore out last year from being on the road so much."

Here's a position-by-position look at the Vikings:

OFFENSE

Western ranked 36th nationally in total offense at 401.7 yards a game and 25th in passing offense at 251.7 yards a contest. Many elements of the offense will remain similar.

"We want to be multiple in personnel and formations, and we want to be balanced run and pass," Ross said. "We have to run

the ball, but we don't want to be one-dimensional, that's a lot easier to defend."

LINE: Two starters return on the offensive line, led by senior tackle Brandon Torrey (Graham/Bethel), a unanimous first-team all-Great Northwest Athletic Conference pick last season. The other returning starter is senior guard Peter Van Datta (Bremer-ton/Central Kitsap).

The only other returning letter winners on the line are sophomore tackle Dale Moore (Vancouver/Evergreen) and sophomore guard Phil Hayes (Renton/O'Dea). Moore will battle with sophomore Chris Corey (Federal Way/Decatur) for a starting tackle spot. Sophomore Dan Trask (Aberdeen) enters the fall as the starting center, and redshirt freshman Chris Miller (Everett/Mariner) has the inside track for the other guard slot.

Additional depth comes from redshirt freshman Scott Allanson (Everett/Jackson), and Shea Thorstad (Stanwood), a transfer from Adams State.

QUARTERBACK: Monrean, earned second-team all-GNAC honors last year, throwing for 2,322 yards, the sixth highest total in school history, and 19 touchdowns, while completing 195-of-317 attempts.

"James has a good feel for what we're doing," said Ross. "He knows he doesn't have to make every play, he just needs to make good decisions and put the ball where it needs to be. In the spring, he only threw one interception."

Three players are battling for the backup spot – junior A.J. Porter (SeaTac/Kennedy), sophomore Adam Perry (Longview/R.A. Long), and sophomore Tony Gardiner (Bothell). Porter, who injured his shoulder during the off season, threw for 187 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions in a backup role last season.

RUNNING BACK: None of the backs on the Western roster had a carry last season, but there is one experienced back in junior Jon Williams (Redmond), who rushed for 202 yards and two scores in 2004, including a 142-yard performance in one game.

Junior Calvin McCarty (Surrey, BC/St. Thomas More) lettered at Boise State in 2004, then rushed for 620 yards and had 500 more receiving last year for Reedley JC in California.

True freshman Craig Garner (Tacoma/Lakes) ran for 1,719 yards and 24 touchdowns as a high school senior, and is probably the fastest runner of the group. Redshirt freshman Tyler Roberts (Friday Harbor) could also see time.

Western is likely to make far greater use of a fullback this season. Redshirt freshman Matt Clark (College Station, TX/Texas A&M Consolidated), who transferred from the Air Force Academy last fall, is No.1 at that spot.

TIGHT END: Sophomore Logan Cullen (Anacortes) emerged out of spring ball as the No.1 tight end. Solid as both a blocker and

receiver, he had two catches in 2005. Junior Ben Shelton (Tacoma/Lincoln) also lettered last year.

Another former letter winner is sophomore Kevin Kamphouse (Sumas/Nooksack Valley), however, that letter came in the 2002 season, when he was a part-time starter at defensive end. A newcomer is senior Tyler Birkley (Modesto, CA/Highland KY), a transfer from UC Davis.

RECEIVER: This is perhaps the deepest position anywhere on the team, with a load of experienced players returning. Junior Brett Upchurch (Sammamish/Eastlake) led Western in receiving last season, making 45 catches for 620 yards and four touchdowns. Senior Matt Wilson (Auburn) started nine games last season, having 24 receptions for 306 yards and three scores.

Junior slot receiver Chris Robinson (Lakewood/Clover Park) was limited to four games last year because of hamstring problems, but still managed 16 receptions. He was brilliant as a freshman in 2004, making 40 grabs for 432 yards and three touchdowns and earning GNAC Offensive Freshman of the Year honors.

Junior Casey Dell (Moxee/East Valley) had 16 catches for 190 yards and three scores last season, and there's also high hopes for 6-foot-5 sophomore Travis McKee (Bothell), the leading receiver in the spring game.

DEFENSE

Western ranked 122 of 144 teams in NCAA II in total defense last year, allowing 417.1 yards a game. Ross has made stopping the run a priority.

"You make it tough for the offense to control the game when they can't run," said Ross. "If people can't run on you, you'll always have a chance to get the ball back."

Ross is also looking to get more speed on the field in his 4-3 system, so some former linebackers are now at defensive end, and former safeties have moved to outside linebacker.

LINE: Sophomore tackle Junior Aumavae (Palmer, AK) was a first-team all-GNAC pick last season. He started eight of 10 games, making 24 tackles, including two for loss. There is good depth at tackle, with senior Ryan Lucas (Vancouver, BC/North Delta), who had seven stops and made three starts, and 25-year old sophomore Joe Samuels (Palmer, AK), who saw action in seven games.

At end, junior Ryan Conwell (Kent/Kentwood) missed much of last year with injuries, but still had three tackles for loss in four games. In 2004, he had 14 stops, four of them for loss.

Senior Matt Overton (Tracy, CA), who started four of the last five games last year, and had 14 tackles, including three for loss, on the season, is the leading candidate at the other end.

A number of former linebackers could also figure at end. Junior Brandon Elliott (Auburn/Fife) has made six starts over the last two seasons and had 25 tackles in 2005; and redshirt freshmen William Jackson (Seattle/O'Dea) was the Defensive Scout Team Player of the Year.

LINEBACKER: In Simmons, the Vikings have a true impact player who ranked ninth nationally in fumbles forced. He played out-

side last year, but has been moved to middle linebacker for this season.

"He has good size, and he runs well," Ross said of Simmons. "He gives us a guy who can run sideline-to-sideline, and by playing in the middle, he can be involved in more plays."

Returning at strong-side linebacker are junior Taylor Wade (Mukilteo/Kamiak), who has worked his way up from being a walk-on to contending for a starting spot, and junior Tieba Bropleh (Bremerton), a two-year letter winner who had 26 stops in 2004.

At the other outside spot, junior James Day (Vancouver/Mountain View), who lettered at safety the last two years, and sophomore Nick Warren (Bellevue) are the leading candidates.

SECONDARY: This is one of the most experienced areas of the squad. Sophomore strong safety Steve Davis (Kennewick/Kamiakin) had a team-high 73 tackles while making nine starts as a redshirt freshman, and added an interception and a forced fumble. Back at free safety is senior Todd McClellan (Lacey/Timberline), who has started the last 19 games over two seasons, and last year had 60 tackles, including four for loss, four pass breakups, an interception and a forced fumble. They'll be pushed for time by junior Mike Schmit (Vancouver/Columbia River), redshirt freshman C.J. Green (Federal Way), who moves over from cornerback, and true freshman Allan Denton (Los Angeles, CA/Upland), who was a CIF Division II all-star.

On the corner, senior Kevin Jones (Seattle/Kentwood) started eight games last year despite playing the entire season with a broken thumb, and had a team-best seven pass breakups, plus one interception.

Sophomore Maurice Jones (Tacoma/Spanaway Lake) enters camp with the inside track on the other starting corner spot, but there's also experience in junior Ocie Moore (Seattle/Kent-Meridian) and sophomore Anthony Rosso (Walla Walla), both of whom have started in the past. Another possibility is true freshman Anthony Zackery (Spokane/Ferris), a Seattle Times White Chip pick who has run a 10.7 100 meters.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The kicking units figure to get a big boost from the addition of sophomore Robby Smith (Bellingham), who hit 17-of-22 field goals and 36-of-37 extra points, and had 85 percent of his kickoffs go for touchbacks while at Ventura JC (Calif.) last year.

Sophomore Ace Younggren (Snohomish), who connected on 1-of-4 field goals and 29-of-33 extra points last season, also returns.

At punter, junior Corbin Anderson (Veradale/University) and redshirt freshman Josh Linder (Bellevue/Sammamish) will battle for the job. Anderson averaged 34.8 yards a punt last year, putting 16 kicks inside the 20.

Overton returns as the long-snapper, and Porter is back as the placement holder. The return game could be bolstered by the influx of speed from newcomers like Garner, McCarty and freshman wide receiver Cody Oakes (Bremerton/Central Kitsap).

2005 REVIEW

VIKINGS HAVE JUST SECOND LOSING SEASON IN LAST 19 YEARS

There were some high points along the way, but overall, the 2005 season was a disappointing one for the Western Washington University football team.

The Vikings struggled to find consistency and finished 4-6 overall, just the second losing record in 19 years, and were 3-3 in the Great Northwest Athletic Conference.

“It was an extremely frustrating year,” said Western head coach Rob Smith. “We never played to the level I believe we were capable of, and it just seemed like we couldn’t catch a break. You can point to injuries and a number of other things, but the bottom line was that we didn’t get it done.”

The campaign was the final one of Smith’s 17-year tenure as head coach. He left as the winningest coach in school history in both victories and winning percentage with a 109-62-1 record.

The Western offense was solid, ranking 36th nationally with an average of 401.7 yards a game and being 25th nationally in pass offense at 251.7 yards a contest. The Vikings did that despite injuries that severely limited the playing time of the top two receivers from the previous year – senior wide receiver Andy Olson (Chehalis/W.F. West) and sophomore slotback Chris Robinson (Tacoma/Clover Park) – and the leading rusher in each of the previous three seasons – senior Duncan Sherrard (Seattle/Roosevelt).

Olson, a preseason All-American, played eight of 10 games, but was truly healthy for only about a game-and-a-half because of ailments that included a collapsed lung in preseason camp and knee and shoulder injuries during the year. Despite that, he still managed 33 receptions for 510 yards and four touchdowns, often drew double-teams and extra attention from opposing defenses, and was a first-team all-GNAC pick for the third consecutive year.

“It was just one thing after another for Andy, which is such a shame,” Smith said. “He was the heart and soul of the football team, and a player who has meant so much to the program.”

Olson ended his four-year career as the school leader in touchdown grabs with 31 and receptions with 183, and finished second in yards receiving with 2,990.

Sophomore wide receiver Brett Upchurch (Sammamish/Eastlake) was Western’s leading receiver, with 45 receptions for 630 yards and four touchdowns.

Sophomore wide receiver Matt Wilson (Auburn) had 24 receptions for 306 yards and three touchdowns. Senior tight end Nick Yoney (Arlington), a second-team all-league pick, had 25 catches for 306 yards and three scores.

Junior quarterback James Monrean (Bellingham/Sehome) was the trigger of the offense, passing for 2,322 yards, the sixth highest total in school history, and 19 touchdowns, completing 195-of-317 attempts. He was a second-team all-GNAC selection.

Senior Jake Carlyle (Olympia/Capital), a first-team all-league pick, rushed for 657 yards and six touchdowns on 145 carries. He added 238 yards on 25 receptions, and was selected by the team as the Offensive Player of the Year. Sherrard, who missed three games with a knee injury but still earned second-team all-GNAC honors, ran for 503 yards and three scores on 95 attempts. Sherrard finished fourth in school history in career rushing with 2,761 yards.

The offensive line was solid, with the same group of starters together for nine of the 10 games. The leader was senior center Loren Winter (Bothell/Juanita), who started every game for the third consecutive season and played in the Cactus Bowl, the NCAA II Senior All-Star Game. Winter was a second-team Daktronics all-Northwest Region pick, and a unanimous all-GNAC selection.

Junior guard Brandon Torrey (Graham/Bethel) was also a unanimous first-team all-league pick. Completing the offensive line were senior tackle Will Freitag (Maple Valley/Eastside Catholic), junior guard Peter Van Datta (Bremerton/Central Kitsap) and senior tackle Tyler Sleeman (Black Diamond/Tahoma).

The defense struggled early in the season, but found better form after switching to a 3-4 look midway through the year. That system featured some excellent play at linebacker.

Leading that group was sophomore Shane Simmons (Kent/Kentlake), who made an immediate impact after transferring from Idaho. Simmons was second on the team with 66 tackles (41 solo) and made five quarterback sacks for minus-41 yards, earning first-team all-GNAC honors. He also tied a school season record with four forced fumbles and had three fumble recoveries, two pass breakups and one pass interception.

“Shane Simmons is an outstanding football player,” said Smith. “He’s the kind of player you can build a defense around.”

At the other outside linebacker spot, another transfer, senior Ekene Agwuenu (Chino Hills, CA/Ayala) had 36 stops, including three for loss.

In the middle, senior Craig Keenan (Salem, MA/Hamilton-Wentworth) was a second-team all-GNAC selection, making 51 tackles with three pass breakups and an interception. Senior Adam Klingenberg (Walla Walla) completed the starting corps and had 36 stops.

On the defensive line, redshirt freshman Junior Aumavae (Palmer, AK) earned first-team all-league honors, making 24 stops, including two for loss. Senior defensive end Chase Schmitz (Bellingham/Meridian) had 33 tackles, with 7.5 for loss, including four sacks.

In the secondary, redshirt freshman Steve Davis (Kennewick/Kamiakin) made an immediate impact at strong safety, leading Western in tackles with 73. Junior free safety Todd McClellan (Lacey/Timberline) had 60 stops. On the corners, senior Brett Hall (Kennewick/Kamiakin) led Western in interceptions with two, and junior Kevin Jones (Seattle/Kentwood) had a team-high seven pass breakups.

“The change to a 3-4 sparked us and gave us the ability to get the right players on the field,” Smith said. “But to have to change defenses in midseason isn’t something you want to do.”

Sophomore Corbin Anderson (Veradale/University) averaged 34.8 yards a punt, putting 16 kicks inside the 20. Freshman placekicker Ace Younggren (Snohomish) converted 29-of-33 extra points, and was 1-of-4 on field goals.

“It’s hard to go out on this type of year,” Smith said. “We’ve taken great pride in what we’ve accomplished, but over the last four years, we’re .500. That’s unacceptable to me. The goals for the program need to be set higher. We did get a lot of young talent on the field this year, and there are some good pieces for the future.”

Late first-half touchdowns propel Vikings to opening-game victory

Western scored a pair of touchdowns in the final half-minute of the first half to take the lead for good and defeated Mesa State, 49-20, in a non-conference contest at Stocker Stadium.

It was the season opener for both schools, and marks the first time since 1998 that the Vikings have won consecutive season openers.

Western quarterback James Monrean completed 20 of 30 passes for 266 yards and four touchdowns, and was intercepted once.

The Vikings won despite a massive night by Mesa State wide receiver Drew Bohannon. Bohannon, a sophomore transfer from Scottsdale JC playing his first game for the Mavericks, had seven receptions for 212 yards and three touchdowns.

With the score tied, 7-7, late in the first half, the Vikings put together a seven-play, 60-yard drive, capped by a 17-yard pass from Monrean to slotback Brett Upchurch with 28.3 seconds left in the second quarter.

Mesa State moved downfield in the dying seconds of the half, getting in range for a 36-yard attempt by Tyler Johnson. The kick missed, but a roughing the kicker penalty gave Johnson another shot from 24 yards. That attempt was blocked by Geoff Hise, and Sly Whitfield, Jr. caught the ball on a bounce and returned it 76 yards for a touchdown on the final play of the half, giving Western a 21-7 lead.

The Mavericks twice pulled to within eight points in the third quarter on touchdown receptions of 80 and 32 yards by Bohannon, and trailed just 28-20 entering the fourth quarter, but the Vikings put the game away in the first five minutes of the final period.

Monrean hit slotback Chris Robinson for a 3-yards score on the opening play of the fourth quarter, and on Western's following possession, running back Duncan Sherrard slipped out of a tackle and ran 61 yards for a score, the longest run from scrimmage for Western since 1999, giving the Vikings a 42-20 lead with 12:07 to go.

Western running back Jordyn Jackson capped the scoring with five minutes left, having a run of 20 yards that set up a 3-yard scoring rush.

Mesa State took an early lead, driving 74 yards in 10 plays on the opening series and scoring on a 35-yard pass to Bohannon from quarterback Sean McGraw, who completed 13-of-26 passes for 228 yards with three touchdowns and one interception.

The Vikings evened the score early in the second quarter on a 13-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Matt Wilson.

The Vikings had a 492-313 edge in total offense, rushing for 218 yards. Sherrard had 10 carries for 94 yards and Jake Carlyle added 63 yards on 14 carries.

Western wide receiver Andy Olson, a preseason All-America pick in three publications, had eight receptions for 121 yards, including a 24-yard touchdown catch in the third quarter that extended his string of games with a touchdown reception to 10. He had a school-record 15 scoring catches last year.

Safety Steve Davis had eight tackles for the Vikings in his first collegiate game. Two transfer newcomers – linebacker Shane Simmons and cornerback Ekene Agwuenu – had a fumble recovery and an interception, respectively.

It was the 13th consecutive loss for Mesa State, a streak that began in the 2003 NCAA Division II playoffs.

Washburn 31, Western 21

Vikings can't overcome big deficit, suffer first loss of season

Washburn took the lead midway through a wild first half, then held off Western in a scoreless second half and claimed a 31-21 victory in a non-conference contest at Yager Stadium.

The Vikings fell to 1-1 on the season with the loss despite rolling up 403 yards of total offense.

The Ichabods, ranked No.25 nationally in this week's D2football.com NCAA Division II Poll, improved to 2-0 behind a rushing attack that had 226 yards on 42 attempts.

The game was played in 90-degree heat and 50-percent humidity.

Western's Andy Olson extended his school and Great Northwest Athletic Conference record streak of games with a touchdown reception to 11. He opened the scoring with an 8-yard touchdown rush on a reverse on Western's first possession. The play was set up through a 58-yard scramble by quarterback James Monrean that put the ball on the Washburn 12.

But the Ichabods took control of the game by scoring 31 points in a 14-minute span. Connor Sabel started the charge with a 41-yard field goal, then Washburn got two touchdowns just 15 seconds apart late in the first quarter. Ra'Shawn Mosley scored on a 4-yard run, then on the first play after the kickoff, Fletcher Terrell intercepted Monrean and returned the pick 23 yards for another score, giving the Ichabods a 17-7 lead.

Washburn backup quarterback Brandon Walker continued the onslaught with a 78-yard touchdown run early in the second quarter, then running back Trent Hearn completed it with a 19-yard touchdown rush to make the score 31-7 with 6:17 left in the first half.

The Vikings responded with a pair of touchdowns late in the half. Monrean hit Olson deep in the end zone for a 35-yard score, then with 11 seconds left in the half, Monrean and fourth-string running back Darrius Tuggle combined for a touchdown on a 28-yard screen pass, narrowing the gap to 31-21.

Monrean completed 22-of-39 passes for 266 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. Olson had six receptions for 105 yards and a score. The touchdown reception was the 29th of his career, just one short of the school record.

After the two teams combined for 52 points in the opening half, neither seriously threatened to score after halftime. Western had the ball in Washburn territory on four drives, but never got past the Ichabod 16, and had two of those drives end because of fumbles.

The Ichabods played much of the game without senior wide receiver Sam Sissom, Washburn's career touchdown reception leader with 36. Sissom left after being injured on a punt return in the second quarter and didn't return, but Mike Odupitan filled the spot with six catches for 119 yards and also added 64 yards on three kickoff returns.

Washburn quarterback Jordan Brill completed 11-of-18 passes for 199 yards, but Western sacked him six times. Hearn led rushing attack for the Ichabods with 94 yards on 16 carries.

Vikings suffer second straight setback

Running back Matt Birkel rushed for 204 yards and a touchdown on 31 carries and quarterback Daniel Kaczor threw three touchdown passes and ran for a score as nationally ranked St. Cloud State defeated Western, 38-20, in a non-conference game at Civic Stadium.

Western fell to 1-2 with its second consecutive loss to a nationally ranked opponent.

St. Cloud State, ranked No.15 in the American Football Coaches Association/NCAA Division II Top 25, improved to 3-0, and has outscored its opponents 126-27.

Kaczor, who completed 15-of-21 passes for 209 yards, had all of his scoring passes in the second half, connecting on a 65-yard score with Ed DeShazer on SCSU's opening possession of the third quarter, and a pair of 10-yard passes to Ryan Koch.

Western did not score until the third quarter, when quarterback James Monrean found tight end Nick Yoney in the end zone on a 27-yard pass that capped an eight-play, 84-yard drive. Monrean, who completed 26-of-41 passes for 329 yards with two touchdowns and one interception, also threw a 12-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Casey Dell with 10 seconds left in the game.

Running back Jake Carlyle added the other Viking touchdown on a 9-yard run midway through the fourth period. St. Cloud State had a 474-374 edge in total offense, holding Western to just 45 yards rushing on 29 attempts and sacking Monrean a school-record nine times, with tackle Jordan Kroll having two of the sacks.

In three career games against Western, Birkel, a 5-foot-9, 230-pound senior, has rushed for 605 yards and five touchdowns. It was his 21st career 100-yard rushing game and his sixth career 200-yard contest.

St. Cloud State needed just 74 seconds to reach the scoreboard. Tate Wheeler returned the opening kickoff 69 yards to the Western 25, and three plays later, Birkel ran into the end zone from five yards out. The Huskies extended the lead to 10-0 on their next possession, going 80 yards in 14 plays to set up a 32-yard field goal by Shawn Braunagel with 4:48 left in the first quarter.

St. Cloud State held a 17-0 lead at halftime, as Kaczor scored on a 1-yard sneak with 5:47 left in the first half. The Huskies had a 211-109 edge in total offense in the first half, and Western did not get the ball inside the St. Cloud State 40 until the final 90 seconds of the second quarter, shortly after an interception by Viking strong safety Steve Davis.

Western wide receiver Andy Olson injured his left knee with 5:07 left in first half. He did not return, ending his school and Great Northwest Athletic Conference record streak of 11 consecutive games with a touchdown reception.

Vikings suffer third consecutive loss to nationally ranked foe

Western suffered its third straight loss, falling to nationally ranked North Dakota, 47-7, in a non-conference game before a crowd of 10,681 in the 40th annual Potato Bowl game at the Alerus Center.

It was the third consecutive loss, all against nationally ranked teams, for Western. The defeat also was the most lopsided for the Vikings since a 49-0 setback to Pacific Lutheran in 1986.

North Dakota, ranked No.4 in the American Football Coaches Association/NCAA Division II Top 25, improved to 4-0. Quarterback Chris Belmore completed 12-of-15 passes for 175 yards and four touchdowns, two each to Weston Dressler and Dan Grossman, while playing just a little more than a half.

The Fighting Sioux had a 514-208 edge in total offense and did not have a turnover, while Western had four turnovers.

North Dakota was forced to punt on its opening series, then scored on its next five possessions, reaching the scoreboard just over nine minutes into the first quarter on a 52-yard field goal by Jeff Glas. The Fighting Sioux extended the lead to 10-0 in the final minute of the first quarter when Belmore hit Dressler on a curl route, and Dressler sprinted up the middle of the field for a 55-yard touchdown.

North Dakota then added to the lead with three scores in the second quarter, as Grossman caught a 5-yard touchdown pass from Belmore to cap an eight-play, 53-yard drive; Glas connected on a 48-yard field goal that bounced in off the crossbar; and Dressler scored on a 3-yard pass from Belmore in the final minute of the half, giving the Fighting Sioux a 27-0 lead at halftime.

In the opening half, North Dakota had a 266-98 edge, and the Vikings did not have a play from scrimmage longer than 12 yards.

Western's defense held on the opening possession of the second half, and a short punt gave the Vikings the ball in North Dakota territory, but Western quarterback James Monrean was intercepted on the next play by Digger Anderson, and one play after that, the Fighting Sioux put the game completely out of reach as Belmore hit Grossman on a post pattern for a 57-yard touchdown.

The Fighting Sioux extended the margin to 41-0 on a 2-yard run by Chris Beatty, who rushed for 121 yards on 19 carries, before Western scored midway through the third quarter. Running back Jake Carlyle scored on 1-yard run on fourth down, a play set up by a 51-yard pass from Monrean to slotback Brett Upchurch.

Glas then completed the scoring with a 26-yard field goal late in the third quarter and a 29-yard three-pointer in the fourth period.

The Vikings were without preseason All-America wide receiver

Andy Olson and running back Duncan Sherrard, Western's leading rusher each of the last three seasons, because of injuries.

The three-game losing streak is just one short of the worst Viking skid of the Smith era, which began in 1989. The Vikings lost four in a row in 1990, and lost the first three games of the 2003 season after dropping the final game in 2002.

Vikings rack up 501 yards in total offense in winning GNAC opener

Running back Jake Carlyle rushed for a career-high 175 yards on 31 carries and quarterback James Monrean threw for three touchdowns as Western snapped a three-game losing streak, defeating Humboldt State, 21-16, on Saturday in the Great Northwest Athletic Conference opener for both schools at Civic Stadium.

The Vikings rolled up a 501-251 edge in total offense in improving to 2-3. Humboldt State fell to 3-2 with its second straight loss.

Western led the final 55 minutes, but Humboldt State pulled to within 21-16 with just over seven minutes to play, as Joey Stein blocked a punt which was recovered by Joevany Cueva in the end zone for a touchdown.

But the Vikings then put together a long drive that ran out the last 7:06 of the game, going 50 yards in 12 plays to get inside the Lumberjack 10 before Monrean took a knee on the final play of the game.

Western had over 200 yards both on the ground and in the air, having a season-high 223 yards rushing on 45 attempts, which enabled it to have a 37:17-22:43 edge in time of possession. Monrean completed 21-of-32 passes for 278 yards with three touchdowns and an interception, going 13-of-20 for 208 yards and a score in the second half.

The Vikings scored on the opening possession of the game, going 80 yards in 11 plays. Slotback Chris Robinson, returning to action after missing the last two games with a hamstring injury, capped the drive with a 20-yard touchdown reception from Monrean.

Humboldt State tied the game early in the second quarter, as a 1-yard run by running back Daniel Nembhard capped a 10-play, 56-yard drive.

Western took a 14-7 halftime lead as Monrean connected with wide receiver Casey Dell for a 25-yard score with 1:59 left in the half. Humboldt State appeared to tie the game on a 94-yard kick-off return by Kyle Killingsworth, but the play was called back because of a holding penalty.

The Lumberjacks pulled to within four, 14-10, on a 43-yard field goal by Ben Peterson three minutes into the third quarter. Later in the period, Humboldt State reached the Western 18 after converting a fourth-and-six, but quarterback Blake Moorman's pass on the next play was tipped at the goal line by cornerback Kevin Jones and intercepted by Brett Hall.

The Vikings then moved 80 yards in 10 plays, capped on the first play of the fourth quarter as Monrean threw a dart down the middle that found slotback Brett Upchurch for a 45-yard touchdown that gave Western a 21-10 lead.

Moorman completed 18-of-30 passes for 213 yards, but the Lumberjacks rushed for just 38 yards on 23 attempts.

Carlyle was named GNAC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance.

Vikings rack up 501 yards in total offense in winning GNAC opener

Central Washington scored four first-half touchdowns, all after Western fumbles, and went on to claim a 37-17 Great Northwest Athletic Conference victory before a crowd of 11,312 in the 3rd annual Battle in Seattle at Qwest Field.

Quarterback Mike Reilly completed 22-of-34 passes for 247 yards with three touchdowns and an interception for the Wildcats, who improved to 4-2 and lead the GNAC at 2-0.

Quarterback James Monrean completed 30-of-42 for a season-high 354 yards and a touchdown for the Vikings, but was intercepted three times. Western committed seven total turnovers, fumbling six times and losing four of them.

The 20-point margin is the most lopsided in the series since a 36-14 Western victory in 2001, and the widest for Central since a 34-14 triumph in 1987.

The Vikings held an early 7-0 lead and had a chance to regain the lead midway through the second period. Trailing, 14-10, midway through the second quarter, Western drove within inches of the Central goal line. But a bad snap was recovered by Wildcat linebacker Chris Burch, and Central marched 99 yards in 11 plays, capped by a 5-yard touchdown pass from Reilly to tight end Kevin Schmidt.

Western fumbled again on the following series, and the Wildcats moved 36 yards in four plays, with Will Bennett rushing in from 22 yards with 59 seconds left in the second period. The extra point failed, giving Central a 27-10 halftime lead.

The Wildcats then extended their lead to 34-10 in the third quarter. Following an interception by free safety J.R. Jamerson, one of two for him in the game, Central moved 93 yards in 11 plays, capped by an eight-yard pass from Reilly to wide receiver Brandon Robertson.

The two teams combined for 942 yards of offense, with Western holding a 475-467 edge in yardage, but Central had a 34:06-25:54 advantage in time of possession.

Western opened the scoring 10 minutes into the first quarter. After a missed 46-yard field goal by Central's Coby Sadler, the Vikings took over at their own 29 and scored in just three plays – a 13-yard pass from Monrean to Andy Olson, a 46-yard run up the right sideline by running back Jake Carlyle, and a 12-yard scoring toss from Monrean to tight end Nick Yoney.

Central responded with two touchdowns created by special-teams fumbles. First, a Sadler punt hit a Western blocker on the heel at the 10-yard line, and Chris James recovered in the end zone for a Wildcat touchdown. On the following series, Western punter Corbin Anderson bobbled the ball and was forced to fall on it, giving Central possession on downs at the Viking 34. Reilly then hit wide receiver Nate Brookreson for 30 yards, and connected with

wide receiver Brian Potucek in the right corner of the end zone for a 4-yard touchdown, giving the Wildcats a 14-7 lead with 1:16 left in the first quarter.

Olson, who had missed the last two games with a knee injury, had seven receptions for 116 yards, including a 5-yard touchdown pass from Monrean with 1:21 to play. The touchdown catch was the 30th of his career, tying the school record held by Chris Nicholl and Greg Dykstra. He also moved into second in school history in career receptions (174), and had the 14th 100-yard receiving game of his career.

Potucek, already Central's all-time career leader in receptions and receiving yards, had six receptions for 87 yards and a touchdown and became the Wildcats' career leader in all-purpose yards with 4,465.

Central now holds a 2-1 lead in the Battle in Seattle. Western claimed a 28-21 victory last year after the Wildcats won the inaugural game, 29-20, in 2003. The two teams meet again in Bellingham on Oct. 29.

Vikings get always-tough triumph in Monmouth

Running back Duncan Sherrard rushed for 158 yards on 25 carries and wide receiver Matt Wilson caught a pair of first-quarter touchdown passes as Western defeated Western Oregon, 38-16, in a Great Northwest Athletic Conference game at McArthur Field.

The Vikings improved to 3-4 overall and 2-1 in the GNAC with the triumph, just their second in the last five meetings at Monmouth.

Western Oregon fell to 2-5 and 0-3 in conference play despite the efforts of the GNAC's leading rusher, Eliot Vinzant, who had his fourth consecutive 100-yard rushing game with 144 yards on 21 carries, including a 43-yard touchdown run late in the first quarter.

Western jumped to a 12-0 lead on its first two possessions. The Vikings took the opening kickoff and went 75 yards in six plays, capped by a 19-yard pass from quarterback James Monrean to Wilson on a fourth-and-six play.

The following series, the Vikings went 99 yards in five plays, starting with a 39-yard pass to Andy Olson, and capped by Wilson, who had two touchdowns in his entire career before Saturday, getting a key block from Brandon Torrey and going 45 yards for a score on a screen pass one play after the drive had been kept alive by a Western Oregon personal foul.

After Vinzant's touchdown run, Western scored again, with Jake Carlyle scoring from a yard out on a fourth-and-goal play. The Vikings, who missed extra points on their first two touchdowns, went for two, but Monrean's pass was intercepted by Jamil Wynn, who took it 100 yards for a defensive 2-point conversion, making the score 18-9. It was the first defensive two-pointer allowed by the Vikings since Portland State scored one in the 2000 season opener.

The Vikings put the game away with a pair of third-quarter touchdowns. Carlyle scored on a 3-yard run, then wide receiver Casey Dell reached the end zone on a 15-yard pass from Monrean.

Monrean completed 17-of-27 passes for 271 yards and four touchdowns, passing for more than 250 yards for the sixth time in seven games as Western, which did not commit a turnover for the first time since the opening game of the 2003 season, had a 467-405 edge in total offense.

Western Oregon scored midway through the fourth quarter, as backup quarterback Ryan Thorson threw a 16-yard touchdown pass to tight end Kevin Boss, capping an 11-play, 92-yard drive; but Western scored the final points of the game, Monrean connecting with tight end Nick Yoney for a 14-yard score with just 1:25 to play.

Sherrard, who has led the Vikings in rushing each of the last three years but had not seen extensive action since suffering a knee injury in the opening week of this season, ran for 101 yards on 15 carries in the first half alone, helping Western have a 287-156 edge in total offense at halftime.

Linebacker Brandon Elliott, who came in for injured Adam Klingenberg, had a team-high 11 tackles for the Vikings, including one of the team's three quarterback sacks.

For these performances, Sherrard and Elliott were named GNAC Offensive and Defensive Player of the Week, respectively.

Vikings overcome 14-point halftime deficit, get first back-to-back wins

Running back Duncan Sherrard scored on a 2-yard run with 8:47 left in the game as Western rallied from a 14-point halftime deficit and defeated Humboldt State, 28-24, in a Great Northwest Athletic Conference game at Lumberjack Field.

The Vikings, who rushed for 308 yards, the most since 1999, posted back-to-back victories for the first time this season.

Humboldt State fell to 4-4 overall and 1-3 in conference play with its third consecutive loss. Quarterback Blake Moorman passed for 321 yards and a pair of second-quarter touchdowns for the Lumberjacks.

Humboldt State entered the fourth quarter with a 24-21 lead, and had a fourth-and-two play from the Western seven with just over 14 minutes left. But a pass off a fake field goal went incomplete, and Western marched 98 yards in 13 plays, 10 of them runs. Sherrard, who had 148 yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries in the game, carried nine times on the drive, converting a fourth-and-one from the Lumberjack four, then scoring on a 2-yard run two plays later.

Humboldt State reached the Western eight on the following series before being stopped on fourth-and-eight, and crossed midfield twice in the last five minutes, but had each series ended on interceptions, the final one by Western safety Todd McClellan with just three seconds left.

The 308 yards on 52 carries were the most rushing yards for the Vikings since they had 323 yards in Oct. 23, 1999, also at Humboldt State. Running back Jake Carlyle had 79 yards and a touchdown on 12 attempts; and quarterback James Monrean added 72 on nine carries.

The Vikings scored on their first possession of the game, taking the ball near midfield after a Humboldt State fumble and moving 49 yards in eight plays, capped by a 1-yard run by Carlyle.

But the Lumberjacks tied the score on an 11-yard run by Daniel Nembhard late in the first quarter, then took a 21-7 halftime lead with a pair of scores in the last 4:39 of the second period, as Moorman, who was 27-of-45, threw touchdown passes of 17 yards to Milton White and three yards to Tre Messersmith.

Western narrowed the gap to 21-14 when Sherrard scored on a 4-yard run on the opening series of the second half. Humboldt State responded with a 15-play drive that led to Gian Martinelli's 32-yard field goal, pushing the Lumberjack lead to 24-14.

But the Vikings countered with another scoring drive, going 69 yards in eight plays. Monrean scored from two yards out, bobbling the snap but recovering to grab the ball at the one and plunging into the end zone, making the score 24-21 entering the fourth period.

Western wide receiver Andy Olson left the game in the third quar-

ter with an apparent re-injury of his MCL. If that is the injury, it would likely end the season for Olson, who is in a three-way tie for No.1 among Western career leaders in touchdown catches (30) and is No.2 in both receptions (178, three short of record) and receiving yards (2,927, 341 short of record).

Linebacker Brandon Elliott had an interception and a fumble recovery to pace Western's defense.

Humboldt State had a 441-429 edge in total offense.

Western strong safety Steve Davis earned GNAC Defensive Player of the Week honors as he had 10 tackles and a forced fumble.

Vikings see 21-point lead slip away in 10th annual Cascade Cup game

Quarterback Mike Reilly connected with wide receiver Nate Brookreson for an 11-yard touchdown with 3:15 to play as Central Washington rallied from a 21-point halftime deficit and defeated Western, 31-28, in the 10th annual Cascade Cup in a Great Northwest Athletic Conference game at Civic Stadium.

The Vikings had a 28-7 lead at halftime, but had no first downs in the third quarter and just one in the first 12 minutes of the fourth period.

Central improved to 7-2 overall with its fifth consecutive victory, and clinched outright its third consecutive GNAC championship with a 5-0 conference record. The Wildcats hold a 6-4 lead in the Cascade Cup.

Trailing, 28-23, the Wildcats started the game-winning drive on their own six following an interception by Brandon Kennedy, and moved 94 yards in just five plays. The key play was a 74-yard reception by wide receiver Brian Potucek, who took a short pass from Reilly, slipped two tackles and ran down the right sideline for a 76-yard gain.

Two plays after that, Reilly found Brookreson in the end zone for the go-ahead score. Reilly then hit Potucek with a two-point conversion pass for the final margin.

Reilly finished 20-of-34 for 251 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions, finding Potucek eight times for 152 yards and a score.

Western was stopped on downs its following series, but got the ball back with 1:58 to play as Central running back Landon Hall fumbled, and Viking cornerback Kevin Jones returned the ball to the Western 45. Backup quarterback A.J. Porter, in for starter James Monrean, who was injured on the previous possession, completed three passes to move to the Central 27 with 1:15 left, but was then intercepted by Josiah Wilfong, effectively ending the game.

Central had opened the scoring just 4:30 into the game, with Potucek grabbing a 21-yard touchdown pass in the right corner of the end zone on a third-and-19 play.

But Western responded with 28 consecutive points, with all four touchdowns coming directly after Wildcat turnovers. Monrean threw touchdown passes of 24 yards to Andy Olson and 18 yards to Brett Upchurch, and also ran the ball in himself from 16 yards out. Running back Jake Carlyle had the other touchdown in the charge on a 1-yard run.

Monrean was 9-of-13 in the opening half for 105 yards and two touchdowns, and finished 15-of-25 for 139 yards.

Central closed to 28-17 in the third quarter with a 16-yard run by Reilly and a 23-yard field goal by Coby Sadler, then pulled to

with five with 9:59 left on a 4-yard run by Hall, who rushed for 133 yards on 26 carries, having 103 of those yards on 19 second-half attempts.

Central had a 441-308 edge in total offense.

Olson's first quarter touchdown on a fourth-and-four play was the 31st scoring reception of his career, giving him sole possession of Western's career record. He had three receptions for 50 yards, giving him 181 catches for his career, tying the school mark held by Greg Dykstra (1999-2002).

Western linebacker Shane Simmons was credited with nine tackles, including a quarterback sack, and had a hat trick of takeaways with an interception, forced fumble and fumble recovery. He received GNAC Defensive Player of the Week honors for his performance.

Smith era ends after 17 years as Vikings fall to Wolves

The 17-year tenure of Western head coach Rob Smith ended on a down note Saturday as the Vikings fell to Western Oregon, 28-7, in a Great Northwest Athletic Conference football game Saturday at Civic Stadium.

Western finished its season 4-6 overall and 3-3 in GNAC play. It is just the third losing season during Smith's career. He finishes as the winningest coach in school history with a 109-62-1 record, with the victories being the third most all-time of any collegiate coach in the state of Washington.

Western Oregon is 4-6 overall and concludes GNAC play 2-4. Running back Eliot Vinzant paced the Wolves with 160 yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries, his sixth consecutive 100-yard game.

The Wolves took control early, scoring touchdowns on their first two possessions. After Western fumbled on the Western Oregon two on the opening series of the game, the Wolves moved 98 yards in nine plays, capped by a 10-yard pass from Mark Thorson to Tyler Knudsen. The key play in the drive was a 59-yard pass completion to Tyler Smith.

Western Oregon extended the lead to 14-0 on its next possession as Michael Ramirez scored on a 2-yard run. Another 2-yard run, this one by Vinzant midway through the second quarter, gave the Wolves a 21-0 lead at halftime. Western Oregon had a 222-70 edge in total offense in the first half, with 46 of Western's yards coming on the opening drive of the game.

Another Vinzant touchdown run from three yards, just over 10 minutes into the third period, gave Western Oregon a 28-0 lead.

The Vikings scored with 9:44 left in the game, as backup quarterback A.J. Porter threw a 39-yard touchdown pass to slotback Brett Upchurch. Porter, who saw extensive time with starter James Monrean hampered by an ankle injury, completed 9-of-16 passes for 159 yards. Upchurch had five receptions for 141 yards.

Western Oregon safety Bret Hughes had three interceptions, two of them in the end zone to kill Viking drives. He also had three interceptions in a 52-49 overtime victory over Western Washington in 2004. The Vikings committed five turnovers in the game, three of them deep in Western Oregon territory.

Western Oregon had a 443-360 advantage in total offense. It was the first time the Wolves had defeated the Vikings by more than four points since 1984.

Western Washington wide receiver Andy Olson, already the school's career touchdown reception leader with 31, took sole possession of the career reception record with 183 grabs for 2,990 yards. Olson had two catches totaling 13 yards on back-to-back plays in the second quarter, but reinjured a knee on the second grab and did not return.

Thorson completed 20-of-32 passes for 235 yards for Western Oregon, which concludes its season next week against Puget Sound.

It was the last game for 17 Western seniors, eight of whom were four-year letter winners. It was also the last game of a 20-year career for assistant coach Terry Todd.

1923 & 1924 - BACK TO BACK TRI-NORMAL TITLES

In the early years of Western football, the Vikings claimed a pair of Tri-Normal League titles.

The 1923 season was a watershed one for the then-named Bellingham State Normal School, as the school opened an on-campus facility, Waldo Field, adopted the Viking nickname and posted a 3-0-2 record for coach Sam Carver.

With interim coach Elwood Davis at the helm in 1924, Bellingham Normal went 4-2, with the only losses being to the University of Washington Frosh and Super-Varsity.

Bellingham was in the Tri-Normal Conference with the other state normal schools at Ellensburg and Cheney, the forerunners to Central Washington and Eastern Washington.

1938 - LAPPY'S BOYS GO UNDEFEATED

Western has had only one undefeated, untied football team in its history. That was in 1938, when the Vikings of coach Charles "Lappy" Lappenbusch posted a 7-0 record.

The toughest game of that season was the last, a 7-0 victory over Eastern Washington. It had been 11 years since the Vikings had beaten the Savages, but two long passes by Link Sarles got Western a second-quarter touchdown that stood up. The Vikings preserved the victory by stopping Eastern on four plays inside the two-yard line in the third quarter.

It was appropriate that the Vikings scored through the air. They threw 15 to 20 times a game in an era when most teams used the pass as only a desperation device.

Lappenbusch coached 20 years at Western, posting an 81-62-15 record. He was nationally-recognized for his Straight Line Philosophy, the centerpiece of which was, "If you don't know what you're doing, get out of the way!"

1951 - VETS LEAD VIKS TO TIE FOR CROWN

In the post-war years, Western had some powerful football teams. One of the best was the 1951 squad, which posted an 8-1 record and finished in a three-way tie for the Evergreen Conference title.

The only blemish on the Vikings' record that season was a 14-0 loss to Pacific Lutheran. Otherwise, Western was almost unstoppable. The defense had three shutouts and the offense scored over 50 points three times.

The leader of coach Charles Lappenbusch's troops was World War II veteran Norm Hash. Hash, a bruising fullback, earned honorable mention Associated Press Little All-America status. He scored 11 touchdowns, and with kicking duties added in, had 86 points.

The defensive captain was Art Larsson, a 250-pound lineman from Anacortes, another veteran. Larsson and Hash each earned honorable mention United Press International all-Coast honors, as did halfback Roy Richardson, end Pete Muir and defensive lineman Dick Pangelo.

1958 - VIKINGS OVERCOME INJURIES FOR TITLE DEADLOCK

In 1958, Western went 6-2 and tied for the Evergreen Conference title despite playing most of the season without its top player, halfback Fred Emerson.

Emerson, an honorable mention Little All-American the year before, suffered a knee injury in the second game and saw limited action the rest of the season.

He did, however, play a big role in a 19-18 victory over Central Washington, coming off the bench to key a 96-yard drive in the last four minutes for the winning touchdown.

Coach John Kulbitski's Vikings needed a win or a tie in their last game to win the conference championship outright, but lost to Puget Sound, 14-0.

Guard Ed Melbourne earned honorable mention Little All-America honors. Melbourne and halfback Dennis Sheppard were all-conference selections.

1969 - FOG AND DEFENSE A WINNING COMBO

In 1969, Western posted a 5-4 record and tied for the Evergreen Conference championship with a 4-2 mark. The Vikings did it with a stifling aggressive defense and an opportunistic offense.

In a 19-16 triumph over Eastern Washington, a thick fog that had shrouded Civic Stadium nearly the entire game lifted for Western's final drive. The Vikings scored the winning touchdown on a 13-yard pass from quarterback Glenn Hadland to split end Gary Aagaard on a fourth-and-ten situation with 1:14 left.

At Spokane against Whitworth, Western pulled out a 28-21 victory when outside linebacker Jerry Kelly intercepted a pass and returned it 54 yards for the winning touchdown with 11 seconds left. The Pirates had led 21-19 with 2:18 remaining when defensive end Mike Tasker blocked a punt, the ball bouncing through the end zone for an automatic safety to tie the game at 21-all.

Against Central Washington, the Vikings won 15-12 as linebacker Rocky Hughes picked off a pass on the Western 20 with 25 seconds

remaining. Moments before the Vikings had stopped Central on downs at their own 15.

Leading the stop squad was Little all-Northwest safety Vic Randall, who had eight of his school-record 26 pass interceptions during the campaign, and honorable mention NAIA All-America tackle Butts Giraud.

1971 - FIRST AND ONLY OUTRIGHT EVCO TITLE

Western played 37 years of football in the Evergreen Conference. During that time, the Vikings won only one outright conference championship, that coming in 1971.

The 1971 squad posted a 7-3 record and was 6-0 in the Evco. Leading the way were running back Tom Wigg and quarterback Glenn Hadland. Wigg rushed for a then-school record 1,176 yards and Hadland passed for a then-record 1,475 yards.

The defense was also tough, allowing only 12.1 points a game and recovering 27 fumbles.

Wigg was a second-team United Press International all-Coast selection, as were defensive back Kevin Halliburton and offensive lineman Jeff Michaelson.

1976 - NEVER SAY DIE

Six games into the season, the 1976 Vikings could have folded the tents. With a 3-3 record, Western seemed headed for a mediocre year. Instead, comebacks were the order of the day.

The Vikings won their last three regular-season games, coming from behind to win with touchdowns in the last two minutes on all three occasions, including a 28-21 victory at Southern Oregon in the season finale. In that game, halfback Pat Locker ran for 225 yards and three touchdowns, including the game-winner from 11 yards out with 28 seconds left.

Western then faced Pacific Lutheran in the first-ever NAIA District 1 championship game and crushed the Lutes, 48-28, as quarterback Bill Mendelson passed for three touchdowns and Locker ran for 158 yards and threw a 40-yard touchdown to Jeff Potter on a halfback option play.

Mendelson, a senior, and Locker, a freshman, were the stars of a high-powered Viking offense that season. Mendelson passed for 1,773 yards and 16 touchdowns. Locker rushed for 1,340 yards, then a school record, and was named an honorable mention NAIA Division I All-American. Six players from the offense - Mendelson, Locker, center Andy Harlin, guard Scott Stokes and wide receivers Jeff Potter and Hoyt Gier - were named to the all-Evergreen Conference team.

1995 - WESTERN EARNS NO.1 RANKING

Western was undefeated in the regular season for just the second time in school history, winning the Columbia Football Association-Mount Rainier League title and being ranked No.1 nationally in NAIA Division II for the final five weeks of the poll. But the Vikings finished 9-1, falling to eventual national co-champion Central Washington, 28-21, in the opening round of the national playoffs.

Cornerback Orlando Steinauer, the lone senior starter on a defense that ranked sixth nationally against the rush (88.4) and seventh in scoring defense (13.7), was a first-team NAIA All-American and the CFA-MRL Player of the Year. Steinauer led the NAIA with a school-record 10 interceptions and ranked ninth nationally in punt returns. Placekicker Wade Gebers was also a first-team All-American and tied for the national lead in kick scoring (7.0).

The offense ranked in the top eight nationally in three categories, setting school records for scoring offense (37.0), passing yardage (277.0) and total yardage (453.9). Quarterback Jason Stiles threw for 2,297 yards and 17 touchdowns, completing a school-record 61.0 of his passes. Wide receiver Chris Nicholl had 52 receptions for 1,064 yards and 11 touchdowns, becoming the first 1,000-yard receiver in school history, and running back Jon Brunaugh rushed for 1,127 yards and 13 scores, reaching 100 yards in seven games.

Brunaugh, Nicholl, Stiles and offensive line-men Travis Cruse and Todd Walcker all were honorable mention All-Americans.

1996 - A TRIP TO THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Despite injuries that knocked nine first stringers out for three games or more, Western went 11-2 and reached a national championship game for the first time, falling to Sioux Falls SD, 47-25, in the NAIA Division II title game at Savannah, Tenn.

The Vikings won the Columbia Football Association championship, the first back-to-back league crowns in 72 years, and were ranked No.6 in the final national poll. They won three playoff games, including a 28-21 semifinal victory at Findlay OH, the No.1-ranked defending national champion.

Eight players earned NAIA All-America honors, with wide receiver Chris Nicholl and placekicker Wade Gebers being first-team picks and offensive guard Todd Walcker and linebacker Mark Spencer being second-team selections. Nicholls was the CFA Offensive Player of the Year, setting school records with 82 receptions for 1,584 yards and 12 touchdowns, and 10 100-yard receiving games. Gebers, the first Viking to be a first-team All-American twice, ranked seventh nationally in kick scoring (7.2).

Spencer led a defense that posted two shutouts for the first time in 27 years and led the CFA in every statistical category, ranking seventh nationally in rush defense (99.5). The offense ranked 10th nationally in total yardage (421.7) and sixth in passing offense (258.5). Quarterback Darren Erath ranked seventh nationally in passing (242.9) and total offense (250.3), and set five school records, throwing for 3,254 yards and 22 touchdowns. Running back Ryan Wiggins rushed for 1,361 yards and became the first Viking to have a pair of 200-yard rushing games.

1999 - WESTERN EARNS FIRST NCAA II PLAYOFF BERTH

Western reached the NCAA Division II playoffs in just its second year of NCAA competition, going 8-3 and winning the Columbia Football Association championship with a 4-0 record.

In the post-season, the Vikings lost in overtime at Northeastern State OK, 27-24. Western reached the playoffs in part because of an eight-game winning streak during the regular season that included

victories over NCAA I-AA Saint Mary's CA, 20-7 and NCAA II No.15 Chadron State, 26-14; as well as a 27-7 triumph at Central Washington the first Viking victory at Ellensburg in 27 years.

Wide receiver Ben Clampett, a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee, was a first-team all-West Region pick and was an All-American in two publications. He had 67 receptions for 1,193 yards and 12 touchdowns, ranking ninth nationally in receiving yardage (108.5). Quarterback Scott Mitchell threw for 2,386 yards with 21 touchdowns and just six interceptions, completing 60.5 percent of his passes and ranking 11th nationally in passing efficiency (150.6) as the Viking offense ranked 20th nationally in scoring (33.4) and 23rd in passing offense (256.1). Second-team all-West Region center Nick Giralmo anchored the offensive line.

On defense, no Viking earned all-region honors, but Western notched two shutouts for the third time in four years, ranking third nationally in rushing defense (79.1) and 15th in total defense (272.0). Tackle Mark Bone had 20 tackles for loss and rover Lance Gustafson had 87 tackles, with 15 for loss, along with three interceptions. Cornerback Mike Perez had five interceptions and also blocked four kicks.

The Vikings were ranked in the NCAA II national poll for the first time, being 11th in the final ranking. Western was the No.2 team in the West Region, which would have provided a home berth in the playoffs save for unplayable field conditions at Civic Stadium.

2000 - FINAL CFA CHAMPIONSHIP

In the final year of the Columbia Football Association, Western claimed its fourth league title in six years, going 7-3 overall and 3-1 in the CFA. The Vikings narrowly missed an NCAA Division II playoff berth, being ranked No.5 in the final West Region ranking.

Two of the three losses came to national powers, as Western opened the season with a 37-20 loss at Portland State, which reached the NCAA I-AA playoffs; and ended it with a 35-28 loss to UC Davis, which reached the NCAA II semifinals.

Strong safety Erik Totten earned six All-America honors, being a first-team pick as a defensive back by D2football.com and an all-purpose player by the American Football Coaches Association, and was also a Verizon Academic All-American. Totten became the first Viking player to have over 1,000 total return yards with 1,165, returning both a kickoff and punt for a touchdown. He ranked 14th nationally in punt return average (15.7) and 16th in kickoff returns (27.3). Cornerback Martez Johnson, a second-team all-West Region pick, was seventh nationally in kickoff returns (29.5). Defensive end Dan Ball was a first-team all-region pick as the defense ranked 14th nationally against the rush (94.9).

On offense, Western ranked eighth nationally in scoring offense, averaging a school-record 37.9 points a game and scoring touchdowns on 35 of 46 trips inside the 20-yard line. Quarterback Scott Mitchell, the CFA Offensive Player of the Year, threw for 1,975 yards and had 21 touchdowns and just four interceptions. He ranked eighth nationally in pass efficiency (148.5) and also ran for 260 yards, the most ever by a Western quarterback, and eight touchdowns. He worked behind an offensive line that had the same

starting five for all 10 games and was led by center Nick Giralmo, who was named a second-team All-American by D2football.com.

Coach Rob Smith became the winningest coach in Western history, claiming his 81st victory with the final triumph of the season.

2001 - VIKINGS WIN INAUGURAL GNAC CROWN

Western won a third consecutive league championship for the first time, claiming the inaugural Great Northwest Athletic Conference title as part of an 8-3 season dampened only by narrowly missing the NCAA Division II playoffs.

After a season-opening 28-24 home loss to Central Oklahoma, Western ran off eight wins in its next nine games, the lone blemish in that string a 30-0 loss at eventual NCAA Division I-AA champion Montana. Along the way, the Vikings swept through the GNAC and claimed some big non-league victories, knocking off NCAA I-AA Cal Poly, 17-9, traveling across the country to beat New Haven CT, 24-21, and toppling South Dakota State, 45-28. But a season-ending 40-32 loss at UC Davis knocked Western out of the final post-season berth from the West Region.

Western's offense ranked ranked No.18 nationally in NCAA II in total yards, averaging 424.2 a game, and No.19 in scoring offense at 35.5 points a contest. The Vikings forced more turnovers than they committed for the 10th straight season, with their plus-11 ratio (1.00 avg.) ranking 20th nationally.

Senior quarterback Scott Mitchell, the GNAC Offensive Player of the Year, an honorable mention Don Hansen's Football Gazette All-American and a finalist for the Harlon Hill Trophy awarded to the top player in NCAA Division II, directed the Viking offense to a school-record 390 points. Mitchell threw for 2,778 yards and 25 touchdowns while completing a school record 61.5 percent of his 330 attempts and throwing just five interceptions to rank ninth nationally in pass efficiency (154.2) and 12th in total offense (279.0). He also ran for 291 yards, breaking his own school quarterback rushing mark, and five touchdowns.

Mitchell was one of seven players chosen as a first-team Little All-Northwest picks. The others were senior strong safety Erik Totten, senior defensive tackle Steve Bernardy, junior defensive end Corey Gunnerson, senior center Nick Giralmo, junior wide receiver Greg Dykstra and redshirt freshman kicker Michael Koenen.

Totten led the team in tackles with 53, and also had seven passes defended and three interceptions, anchoring a defense that ranked No.21 nationally in rushing defense (109.8). He was named to four All-America teams, being a second-team Associated Press, D2football.com and Verizon Academic choice, and a third-team Football Gazette pick.

Bernardy, who also saw time at end, had 23.5 tackles, including 11.5 for loss, and recovered two fumbles. Gunnerson had 26 tackles, with a team-high 13 for loss, including seven sacks, also a team best.

Another major contributor on defense was junior cornerback Anthony Dalton, who led the team in interceptions (4) and fumbles forced (3), and was named GNAC Newcomer of the Year.

Giralmo led an experienced offensive line that also included junior tackle Joaquin Paratore-McNabb. Koenen connected on 43-of-46 extra points, tying the school record for successful conversions, and hit 13-of-30 field goals, with school records for longest field goal (54 yards against Central Oklahoma) and consecutive makes (seven). He kicked a game-winning 40-yard field goal against New Haven with two seconds left. As a punter, Koenen averaged 40.8 yards an attempt, including a school-record 67-yard boot against Montana.

Dykstra had a team-high 57 receptions for 919 yards and 10 touchdowns. He had four 100-yard receiving games, and tied a school record with 14 receptions against UC Davis. Five other players had 21 or more catches, with sophomore wide receiver Ryan Van Diest getting 31 grabs for 539 yards and five scores. Junior Devin Martin led the rushing attack with 583 yards and four touchdowns.

Western coach Rob Smith was named GNAC Coach of the Year and became the winningest coach in school history with a 48-10 victory at Fort Lewis CO in the second week of the season. In three GNAC games, the Vikings outscored their opponents 113-35.

2003 - VIKINGS CLOSE STRONG TO WIN GNAC TITLE

Recovering from a poor start, the Vikings rallied, closing the season with three consecutive victories to win the GNAC championship.

Western was 4-6 overall, its first losing season since 1990. But after a 1-6 start, the Vikings entered conference play and swept to three consecutive victories to grab their fourth league title in five years.

The Vikings, who had been off to their worst start in 18 years, began the recovery with a dramatic 17-16 Cascade Cup victory over Central Washington, as third-string quarterback James Monrean, a redshirt freshman pressed into service because of injuries, directed a game-winning drive in the final minute, helped by a phenomenal one-handed catch and run of 52 yards by sophomore wide receiver Andy Olson. Western then claimed a 34-20 triumph at Humboldt State, and closed the season with a 17-13 triumph over Western Oregon, stopping the Wolves within 10 yards of the goal line on two drives in the final five minutes.

Offensively, the Vikings had some bright moments. Western was ranked second nationally in passing offense through the first five games, and ended up 26th overall at 260.7 yards a game. But it was the running game that found its stride to provide late-season success, as the Viking averaged 179.7 yards rushing in the last three contests, compared to 123.1 for the full campaign.

Olson was the brightest light in Western's offense, establishing himself as a go-to receiver in the tradition of Chris Nicholl, Ben Clampitt and Greg Dykstra. Olson had 64 receptions for 1,063 yards and nine touchdowns, notching the third-best single-season reception mark in school history and the fifth-best yardage total, and ranking ninth nationally in NCAA II in receiving yardage (106.3 avg) and 17th in receptions (6.4).

Olson, who was a second-team Don Hansen's Football Gazette West Region all-star, first-team all-GNAC choice and D2football All-America honorable mention, had four 100-yard receiving games, and had three of the top 16 efforts in school history in consecutive

games, with the best being an 11-reception, 199-yard performance in an overtime victory over Saint Mary's.

Senior Ryan Van Diest started the first five games at wide receiver, making 16 grabs for 252 yards before suffering a season-ending knee injury and senior slotback Nate Kuhns added 26 catches for 216 yards and a touchdown. Junior tight end Rick Carte, a unanimous first-team GNAC all-star, had 17 receptions for 158 yards and five scores, and tied a school single-game record with three touchdown receptions at Humboldt State.

At quarterback, senior Josh Shimek and junior Steve Nichols shared time for the second consecutive season. Nichols made seven starts, completing 112-of-216 passes for 1,484 yards with 16 touchdowns and five interceptions. Shimek, who missed two games with a shoulder injury, completed 75-of-141 attempts for 917 yards with five touchdowns and seven interceptions.

At running back, sophomore Duncan Sherrard was a first-team all-GNAC pick as well as a CoSIDA District VIII Academic all-star, rushing for 760 yards and three touchdowns on three carries and adding 193 yards and three scores on 16 receptions. He already ranks seventh in school history in career rushing with 1,447 yards. Sophomore Jake Carlyle added 418 yards and five touchdowns on 97 attempts. They became the first duo to each have 100 yards rushing in a game for Western since 1987, as Carlyle had 143 yards and Sherrard 131 in the triumph at Humboldt State.

The improvement of the rushing game near the end of the season was a product of improved offensive line play. Senior guard Jon Pagan, who earned first-team all-GNAC honors, was the only offensive lineman to start all 10 games.

Anchoring the defense, which allowed just 16.3 points a game in the three conference victories, were two first-team all-GNAC selections - senior middle linebacker Lann Olson and junior strong safety Rob White.

Olson, Andy's older brother, was named an honorable mention All-American by Dopke.com. He had 83 tackles, including team highs of 11 for loss and four sacks. Olson led an all-senior linebacker trio that started all 10 games. Jesse Looker was third on the team in stops with 58, including 9.5 for loss, and Brett Thompson, a CoSIDA District VIII Academic all-star, had 51 and added a team-high two fumble recoveries.

White, a CoSIDA District VIII Academic all-star, was often the only returning letter winner on the field in the secondary. He led Western in tackles for the second straight year with 90, ranking 14th nationally in solo tackles (6.1), and shared the team lead in interceptions with two and passes defensed with seven.

Redshirt freshman Sly Whitfield, Jr. started five games at cornerback, making 21 tackles and having two interceptions. Cornerback Bryan Jarrett and free safety Justin Coronado became the first true freshmen to see action for Western since 2000. Jarrett made four starts, notching 30 tackles and leading the Vikings in passes broken up with seven. Coronado had 27 tackles and one interception, leading Western in tackles in two games late in the season.

Tackles Brad Mann and Nick Ball and end JeVarian Gamble, all seniors, made significant contributions along the defensive line, with Ball making 32 stops, 8.5 of them for loss, to earn second-team all-GNAC honors. Sophomore end Joey Joshua was also a second-team all-league pick, making 43 tackles, including 9.5 for loss, and batting down four passes.

Junior Michael Koenen handled all placekicking and punting duties for the third consecutive year. Koenen was fourth nationally at 43.2 yards a punt, earning second-team all-GNAC status and honorable mention All-America recognition from D2football.com. A first-team all-league placekicker, he was 26-of-28 on extra points, having a school-record streak of 44 successful conversions snapped early in the year, and 9-of-20 on field goals, a mark held down by 10 of his attempts coming from 45 yards or more. Koenen also sent 16 kickoffs for touchbacks.

Olson averaged 10.2 yards on 13 punt returns to earn second-team all-league recognition, and Carlyle and redshirt freshman Matt Wilson shared kickoff return duties. Carlyle averaged 22.5 yards on 20 returns to get first-team GNAC all-star honors, Wilson 20.8 on 19. Smith also said he was pleased with the coverage units, in particular the performance on kickoff coverage late in the season.

A major highlight of the campaign came on Oct. 4, when Western met arch-rival Central Washington in the first Battle in Seattle, which drew 16,392 at Seahawks Stadium, a record for a non-Division I football game in the state of Washington.

Rob Smith was named GNAC Coach of the Year.

NORTH CENTRAL CONFERENCE



The North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, one of the oldest and most respected alignments in NCAA Division II, was formed in 1921 when nine schools representing five Midwestern states first met. Today, two of those charter members remain in the league: North Dakota and South Dakota.

The NCC is a seven-member league entering the 2006-07 season, with schools in five different states. Charter members North Dakota State and South Dakota State left the league in the spring of 2004, but the University of Minnesota Duluth became a full-fledged member in the summer of 2004.

Western Washington and Central Washington were added in football only beginning this year.

The NCC is still regarded as a premier NCAA II league, having produced more national championship teams than any other conference. To date, NCC teams have captured 42 national titles since 1958 when South Dakota won the Division II men's basketball crown.

The league has been particularly dominant in football with 10 titles, women's basketball with nine, and wrestling with nine.

The NCC, which had maintained a constant 10-team line-up from 1981 through 2002, has undergone some significant changes in recent years. The first came in 2002 when Morningside dropped its football program and left the league. Northern Colorado, in 2003, and North Dakota State and South Dakota State, in 2004, all left to pursue NCAA I and IAA status.

The other charter members of the league in 1921 were Des Moines Municipal University, Nebraska Wesleyan University, College of St. Thomas MN and Creighton University. In 1935, when those four schools all withdrew, Omaha University joined the league. In 1936, the University of Northern Iowa became a member and in 1941 Augustana College SD joined the fold. UNO withdrew in 1942 because of World War II, and did not rejoin again until 1976.

Minnesota State, Mankato, joined first in 1968, then left the conference in 1977 when the school dropped its football program. MSU and St. Cloud State then were admitted in 1981.

Northern Iowa withdrew in 1978, then was replaced by the University of Northern Colorado.

Former North Dakota Athletic Director Roger Thomas became the league's seventh commissioner in January, 2005. Thomas replaced Mike Marcil who led the NCAA from 1997-2004. Marcil had replaced Noel Olson, the commissioner from 1984-97. Olson was preceded by Dewey Halford (1977-84); Dr. Richard Kopenhagen (1970-77) and Jack McClelland (1968-70).

HALL OF FAME

NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

Six Western coaches and athletes are members of the NAIA National Hall of Fame.

SAM CARVER

Known as the "Father of Western Athletics," Sam Carver was a standout student-athlete at the school in 1912 and 1913. Shortly after, he became coach of nearly every Western sport.

Carver coached six sports at Western, including baseball for 10 years, basketball for 19 years, football for 14 years, golf for 22 years, tennis for 18 years and track & field for 22 years. He also was director of athletics for 18 years.

The current home of Viking basketball is named for Carver, who was inducted in 1957.

HERBERT HEARSEY

Western's faculty athletic representative for 25 years, Herb Hearsey was instrumental in developing the bulk of the eligibility rules used by the NAIA.

Hearsey helped write the constitution and bylaws of the Evergreen Conference which was formed in 1948. He also was secretary of the NAIA National Eligibility Committee.

A professor of library science and associate director of Wilson Library during his 34 years at Western, Hearsey was inducted in 1975.

LYNDA GOODRICH

One of just three women's basketball coaches in the NAIA to reach 400 career victories,

Lynda Goodrich continues to leave her mark on athletics as an administrator.

A 1966 graduate of Western, Goodrich returned to the school to coach basketball in 1971. Over the next 19 seasons, she compiled a 411-125 record, guiding the Vikings to five national tournaments.

Currently Western's director of athletics, Goodrich was inducted in 1986.

CHARLES LAPPENBUSCH

The developer of the "straight-line philosophy," Charles Lappenbusch was a member of Western's physical education department for 42 years.

Lappenbusch was athletic director for 30 years and coached five sports. His most notable coaching achievements came in football, where he guided the 1938 squad to a 7-0-0 record, the only undefeated, untied season in the team's history.

Lappenbusch, who had an overall record of 81-64-17 in football, was inducted in 1961.

JO METZGER

A forward on the women's basketball team from 1977-81, Jo Metzger is the only Western athlete in the NAIA Hall of Fame, being inducted in 1992.

Metzger was one of only 30 finalists for the Wade Trophy, which goes to the nation's top female collegiate basketball player, in both 1980 and 1981. She also received first-team AIAW Division II All-America honors in 1981.

Metzger was a four-time league and region all-star. She held 15 school records at the end of her career, including the career scoring mark of 1,990 points.

Metzger is the only Western player to lead the team in scoring four times and is the only Viking ranked among the school's Top 10 career leaders in points, rebounds, assists, steals and blocked shots.

CHUCK RANDALL

As the Western men's coach for 18 seasons, Chuck Randall compiled an impressive 275-186 record.

Randall's teams had winning records in his first 11 seasons, but the best campaign was 1971-72, when the Vikings went 26-4 and reached the quarterfinals of the NAIA National Tournament. He also coached the baseball team to two national appearances.

Randall invented the first breakaway rim and founded the first basketball camp in the western United States.

Called the "Coaches' Coach" because so many of his players became coaches themselves, Randall was inducted in 1985.

MEDIA INFORMATION AND NEWS OUTLETS

PRESS BOX: The press box contains space for radio stations, scoreboard and 25-second clock operators, public address announcer and spotter, Western and opponent coaches, statisticians and print media representatives. Since the press box is a working area, please refrain from cheering.

MEDIA PASSES: Credentials are issued only to working members of the news media. Please do not request space for spouses, family members or friends. Sideline passes will be issued only to photographers.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers who work the sidelines must have a media pass. Photographers must operate three-feet behind the sideline so as not to obstruct the chain gang or game officials. NCAA regulations limit shooting to outside the team areas (between the 25-yard lines). Photographers may also work beyond the end line but not in the end zone. Any photographer who interferes with game personnel will be ejected from the field.

SCOUTS: Scouting space is provided in the top row of the south bleachers, just in front of the press box. Scouts will be provided with game programs and final statistics.

STATISTICS: Statistics will be copied and be available seven minutes into the halftime and 15 minutes after the game in the press box. Statistics will include team and individual totals, plus tackles and a play by play. An abbreviated form is used at halftime.

DRESSING ROOMS: Western dresses at Sam Carver Gymnasium on the WWU campus, and the opponent suits up at Bellingham's Civic Stadium. The Vikings are bused back to Carver Gym following the game.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS: Media who wish to interview Western coaches and players after the game should do so before they depart for campus.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Interviews can be set up by contacting the sports information office (360-650-3108).

COACH INTERVIEWS: Head coach Robin Ross is available in his office on weekday mornings for interviews. Appointments can be made by calling Ross (360-650-3211) or the sports information office (360-650-3108).
