Seven-Time National Champions



35th Year of Soccer Excellence—Michael Pantalione, Yavapai's first head soccer coach, started the program in August of 1988. The initial team members arrived on campus one year later. On November 18, 1990, in just their 39th match in school history, the Roughriders captured their first of seven national championships. Hundreds of official matches later, the winning tradition, high standards and positive image on and off the field remains the program's foundation thanks to great players making great teams producing great memories.

The Coaches



MICHAEL PANTALIONE (636-63-30) was the first head coach (a term that spanned 32 seasons) and pioneer of men's soccer at Yavapai College. Hired in 1988, his tenure in Prescott, Arizona, spanned almost five decades. Under his direction, Yavapai developed the most successful Junior College soccer program in the nation, capturing 78 championships including seven national championships, 19 final four finishes, a combined 43 region and district championships along with 28 conference titles. He currently has the best winning percentage (90%) of any collegiate men's soccer coach and is the all-time leader in JUCO wins (636).

In 1995, he was selected as the recipient of the NSCAA/NISOA National Merit Honor awarded to one college coach (2-year or 4-year/men's or women's) whose reputation is recognized as praiseworthy, and reflective of the highest standards of professional and ethical behavior. In 2006, he was the first active coach elected to the NJCAA Soccer Hall of Fame. In 2012, he received the NJCAA National Service Award given to those who have made significant contributions to junior college athletics. In 2015, he was awarded the NSCAA Letter of Commendation, presented for unusual achievement that clearly exceeds performance requirements, expectations and contributions beneficial to the NSCAA and soccer in the United States. In 2016, he was the recipient of the prestigious NSCAA Bill Jeffrey Award recognizing long-term service and contribution to collegiate soccer. Also in 2016, he was the first active coach in a men's sport elected to the ACCAC Hall of Fame. Additionally, honors include seven NJCAA and five NSCAA National Coach of the Year Awards along with being named NSCAA West Region Coach of the Year 18 times.

A native of Philadelphia and a former goalkeeper, Pantalione previously coached soccer at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, University of Montana, Kenyon College in Ohio, Jesuit High School in Portland, Oregon and Archbishop Wood High School in Philadelphia.

He graduated from the University of Montana and earned his international soccer coaching license in England. Pantalione founded, developed, and directed youth soccer in Montana, including the first state program in Missoula. In addition, Pantalione has directed and coached various summer soccer camps across the nation. In 1980, he was named national soccer coach of the year by Special Olympics, Inc. of Washington, D.C. He is a 43-year member of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and served 23 years as National Chair for the NJCAA & NSCAA Soccer Rankings. In the fall of 2022, Pantalione was inducted into the Yavapai College Athletics Hall of Fame.

HUGH BELL was selected as Yavapai's first assistant soccer coach in 1992, the year the Roughriders won their second national championship. The position gained full-time status at the college in 2017. In 2008, Bell was inducted into the NJCAA Soccer Hall of Fame. He was honored with the AFLAC National Assistant Coach of the Year award in a 2003 ceremony held at the America West Arena in Phoenix and was selected as a finalist for the 2004 NSCAA National Assistant Coach of


the Year award. He became the active head coach (10-5-0) midway through the 2018 season due to a family medical leave by the long-time head coach. Bell previously coached several clubs, three different high school programs in Arizona and at Scottsdale Community College. He came from Belfast, Northern Ireland where he played on numerous clubs as an attacker. He was a graduate of Arizona State University and holds a national coaching license. In addition, he has directed and coached various summer soccer campus across the nation and is a long-time member of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

OFFICIAL VOLUNTEER COACHES include former Major League Soccer goalkeeper coach Emilio Estrada. Coach Emilio worked with the YC goalkeepers from 2011 to 2016. In addition, former Yavapai College players Marvin Cassler assisted with the 1995 squad, Kurt Funkhouser helped the following season, Ivan Dizdar trained the 2016 team and Mike Tristani worked with the keepers from 2017 through 2019. All four players played on national championship teams for Yavapai College. Cassler was a keeper on the 1990 national title team before moving on to NAIA power

Sangamon State/Illinois Springfield. Funkhouser scored the winning goal in the 1990 national championship game prior to playing at the University of New Mexico. Dizdar was back to back national champion in 2007 and 2008 before taking his keeper skills to Seattle University. Tristani played on the 1992 national title team and the 1994 national runner-up squad. See our web site (www.goroughriders.com) for the latest Roughrider soccer news.



Andre Luciano (YC's first national champion goalkeeper) took over YC soccer as the head coach with Harold Warren as his assistant coach during the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Due to the 2020 fall season being canceled, the regular season got moved to the 2021 spring. That season, Luciano and Warren helped lead the Roughriders to a region championship. Their final season as a coaching duo of the Roughriders came in the fall of 2021.



The Roughriders are now led by Head Coach Chris Houser, who entered his second season as head coach in 2023. Houser boasts an impressive soccer resume that includes a college national championship and five-year professional playing career. His former assistant coach was Ryder Vanderheyden who coached the squad in 2022. Now, YC's assistant coach is Billy Gatti who made his debut in 2023.







1989-2023 Revisited

"The First Season" (1989)

Roughriders defeated nationally-ranked St. Louis-Forest Park in school's first ever match...15-0-1 "on field" record...80 goals scored, 11 against...Yavapai College first homecoming weekend saw the Roughriders win over Arizona Western...Two NSCAA All-Americans named-Edson Rico (team high 26 goals) and Steve Macias (team high 9 assists)...Great home attendance.

"The Championship Season" (1990)

Roughriders captured post-season playoff wins over Glendale-AZ (6-0), Hesston-KS (3-1), defending champion St. Louis-Flo Valley (1-0), Ulster-NY (2-1), Herkimer-NY (4-0), Passaic-NJ (2-1)...Kurt Funkhouser scored title-winner with 7:37 remaining in the second sudden death overtime period in West Windsor, New Jersey on Nov. 18...Three NSCAA All-Americans named: Edson Rico (team high 22 goals); Rocco DeNardis (team high +58); and Steve Macias...National Tournament award winners include Jose Corona (nation's top defender), Andre Luciano (nation's top goalkeeper), Kobah Washington (tournament's leading scorer)...Bobby Bell recorded team high 13 assists...Michael Pantalone named NSCAA & NJCAA National Coach-of-the-Year...Outstanding home attendance.

"The Record-Breaking Season" (1991)

Roughriders broke a 22-year old National Junior College record with 40 consecutive victories (no ties) before losing to host Mercer County in the national championship game 1-0 before 4,251 paid fans in New Jersey...Yavapai defeated playoff opponents Glendale (4-1), St. Louis-Flo Valley (3-2), Johnson County-Kansas (1-0), Tyler, Texas (6-0), Ulster-New York (2-1)...Two NSCAA All-Americans named: Jose Corona (YC all-time leader in games started) and Kobah Washington (team high 22 goals, 10 assists in '91)...Chris Sagar selected top keeper in national tourney...Roughriders won national sportsmanship award while averaging less than 1 card/match...YC defeated St. Louis-Forest Park 6-0 in AZ Classic title game...Michael Pantalone became all-time JUCO coaching leader with .966 winning percentage...unbelievable home attendance.

"The Award Winning Season" (1992)

For the second time in three years Yavapai captured the NJCAA title with a 3-0 win over Andrew-Georgia...other playoff victories included: Phoenix (2-0), Glendale (4-2), Richland-Texas (3-0), St. Louis-Forest Park (1-0), Alleghany-PA (5-0), Massasoit, Mass. (2-0)...Roughriders marched away with all 7 honors (first time in NJCAA history): national championship, national sportsmanship (averaging less than 1 card/match), tourney MVP & top defender (Darren Clare), top goalkeeper (Chris Sagar), top attacker (Spencer Rush), and national coach of the year (Michael Pantalone)...Two NSCAA All-Americans named (Darren Clare & Jason Collins)...YC defeated Monroe-NY and Spokane-WA in AZ Classic...Team records included most goals (95), most shutouts (17), least goals per game (0.54), most wins (24)...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The Goal Scoring Season" (1993)

The Roughriders lost their only match of the season in a sudden death penalty kick shootout to Massasoit at the national tourney in New Jersey...YC capture their fifth consecutive conference title while finishing fourth at nationals with the same 24-1-0 record as the '92 championship team...The Roughriders set an all-time JUCO single-season scoring record with 134 goals...No less than 15 all-time school records were broke including: most conference goals (78), most playoff goals (38), least goals allowed (9), least conference goals allowed (3), most shutouts (19), most goals per game (5.30), least goals per game (0.35)...two more national records were established: most consecutive shutout (15), best goal differential (+125)...YC averaged less than 1 card/match...Two NSCAA All-Americans (Darren Clare & Pat Smith)...Michael Pantalone notched his 100th career win with Yavapai in just 105 games with the school in a 10-0 win over Pima on Oct. 23rd...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The Sizzlin' Shootout Season" (1994)

In the longest JUCO soccer match played, Yavapai defeated Mercer County (NJ) 0-0 (6-5 after 11 rounds of penalty kicks) at the national semifinals in New

Jersey...Goalkeeper Kevin Zimmermann made six saves and scored himself on the 11th kick of the shootout...The Roughriders lost to Spartanburg (SC) in the title game 3-2...Yavapai became the only JUCO team to advance to the national tournament every year this decade...Three NSCAA All-Americans (Kevin Zimmermann, Ross Hoaglund, John Hunter)...National Coach-of-the-Year finalist Michael Pantalone recorded his fifth consecutive 20-win season...The Roughriders defeated Scottsdale (2-0), Phoenix (4-0), Richland, Texas (3-1), Ulster, New York (2-1) in other playoff matches...Yavapai now stands 29-3 in post-season competition...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The Texas Two-Step Season" (1995)

In two dramatic finishes, Yavapai defeated Tyler-Texas and Richland-Texas in playoff action...With 1 minute left in the fourth overtime Richard Elliot scored the game-winner against Tyler 3-2 after trailing 2-0 late in the second half of the national semifinals...Playing with ten men in the last 70 minutes, YC's John Hunter scored with 3 minutes remaining for a 3-2 win in Dallas against Richland for their sixth consecutive district title...YC made their fifth trip to the national championship game before losing to Mercer-New Jersey on their home field...YC defeated California champion Rancho Santiago 1-0 on the road...Yavapai's 58 game home undefeated streak ended Sept. 16 but started another run currently at 9...Two NSCAA All-Americans (Steve Ybarra, Avery John)...YC's sixth straight 20-win season...Other playoff victories included Scottsdale (4-0), Mesa (3-0), Essex-Maryland (5-0)...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The Flashback Season" (1996)

For the sixth time this decade, Yavapai advanced all the way to the national championship game at New Jersey...On their home field, Mercer County (NJ) defeated Yavapai 1-0 in the finals...In other playoff matches the Roughriders defeated Pima (3-0), Phoenix (3-0), Tyler-Texas (2-1), and DuPage-Illinois (2-0)...YC defeated California champion Rancho Santiago 1-0 in Nevada...YC also had three double digit victories over Central-Kansas, Orange Coast-Calif., and South Mountain...For trivia stake, YC played their first-ever game on a Tuesday, winning at San Diego Mesa 3-0...Two NSCAA All-Americans (Cesar Delgado, Steve Ybarra)...For the first time YC had five players on the first-team All-Conference and All-Region Teams (Ybarra, Delgado, Alex Zametkin, Ty Engram, Richard Elliot)...YC's seventh straight 20-win season...nation's best JUCO home attendance...win season...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The Unbeaten Season" (1997)

Yavapai finished a year long quest and returned to the national championship game to beat Mercer County, New Jersey 3-0 on Mercer's home turf...The Roughriders shutout all playoff opponents while winning their third national championship in the '90s...The 1997 squad was the first Roughrider team to capture the national title with an unbeaten record (23-0-1)...In playoff matches Yavapai defeated Pima, Phoenix, State Fair (MO), Mt. Ida (MA), and Mercer (NJ) by a composite score of 12-0...YC also won the Big Four Tournament defeating St. Louis-Forest Park and Spokane (WA)...Kevin Jeffery scored the most goals in one season by a YC player with 31...Jeffery and Travis Sterling broke the school record with 15 assists each...Two NSCAA All-Americans (Jeffery and Matt Kirkpatrick)...YC's eighth straight 20-win season...Pantalone named NJCAA and NSCAA National Coach of the Year...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The 10th Anniversary Season" (1998)

Yavapai's winning tradition continues, recording their 10th consecutive title to go along with the 9th consecutive 20-win season (23-2-0) and 9th straight national tournament appearance (3rd place finish)...In playoff matches Yavapai defeated Pima 2-1, Glendale 3-0, DuPage (IL) 2-0, Springfield 1-0...After a four overtime 0-0 tie, the Roughriders lost to State Fair (MO) in a shootout. State Fair later forfeited the match due to ineligible players...YC won two out-of-state tournaments (Kansas & Mississippi) defeating Kansas City (KS), Johnson County (KS), Meridian (MS), and DeKalb (GA) by a composite score of 16-2...Two NSCAA All-Americans (Ty Hibbert & Kelvin Jack) and two NJCAA All-Americans (Travis Sterling & Kelvin Jack)...Hibbert posted team high 22 goals for the

season including a game tying goal with 28 seconds left & the overtime winner during a regional playoff match...Sterling tied all-time assists record with 23...Jack leaves program with school record 31 shutouts...JUCO's best home attendance.

"The Hall of Fame Season" (1999)

Yavapai won the first ever JUCO Hall of Fame Tournament in Oneonta, New York defeating Herkimer (NY) 4-0 and Monroe (NY) 6-1...Along with the tournament trophy, the Roughriders walked away with the team sportsmanship award, top individual attacker (Marcus Weekes) and top individual defender (Craig Trout) awards...YC captured 11th consecutive conference title...After defeating Glendale 4-1 in playoff action, YC lost in sudden death overtime to Pima 2-1 for the regional title...Yavapai finished the season 18-3-1 and was named team of the decade with the most wins in the country (218), outdistancing DuPage, Ill. (195)...most national tournament appearances (9, tied with DuPage), most national title game appearances (7; Mercer County, NJ with 4)...and national championships (3 tied with Mercer)...once again, nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"The Overtime Season" (2000)

In two dramatic JUCO matches that were decided in overtime, Yavapai (winners of 22 matches) lost to the two teams that eventually would meet in the national finals...On their home field during the regular season Meridian, Miss. won 3-2 while Bryant & Stratton won at the national tournament 4-3...Yavapai captured their 12th consecutive conference title quite convincingly, scoring a regular season league record 85 goals to the opponents 8...Playoff wins for the Roughriders were against Phoenix (4-0), Mesa (5-0), Georgia Perimeter (1-0), and Essex, New Jersey (3-1)...David Rawlings (22 goals, 15 assists) was named ACCAC Player of the Year and NJCAA & NSCAA First Team All-American...Damien Franklin scored the most goals as a freshman with 27...Sergio Iniguez had school record 17 assists...10th national tournament appearance & 10th 20-plus win season since 1990...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"Road Warriors" (2001)

Playing their best soccer on the road, Yavapai tied a school record with 24 wins (the only school in the country to win 20 games)...YC won both matches on a east coast trip and a key conference encounter in Tucson (Columbus Day Massacre) against Pima 5-0...Roughriders outscored their opponents 115-15, enroute to their 13th consecutive conference title...Playoff wins over Paradise Valley (1-0), Pima (2-1 in overtime), Schoolcraft, Mich. (8-0, most goals in national tourney winner's bracket) and DuPage (1-0 in overtime)...Playing in their 8th national championship game, YC lost to Bryant & Stratton, NY 3-2 in Texas...Alan Gordon & Gary Williamson each scored 29 goals...Goalkeeper Joseph Alessi had team record 83 saves...Gordon had 4 goals in a game twice and two overtime game-winning goals...Alessi & Gordon were first team NSCAA All-Americans, the only school to have two first-team All-Americans...nation's best JUCO home attendance.

"Two Second Halves" (2002)

Yavapai captured their 300th win and fourth national championship on the same weekend...After defeating Iowa Central 3-0 in the national semifinals for their 300th win, the Roughriders beat Mercer, NJ 2-1 in the finals...The two second halves stories are simple-YC scored 69 of their 100 goals in the second half (including two shootout victories over Pima in the regional finals and San Jacinto, TX in the national quarterfinals)...YC also won all 14 games in the second half of the season...The Roughriders won their 14th Arizona Conference title in 14 years...Jordan McKee was voted national player of the year while Stephen O'Farrell joined McKee for All-American honors...Eric Santiago was voted Team MVP...Michael Pantalone national coach of the year and featured in Sports Illustrated (Super Bowl issue)...nation's best home attendance.

"Back to Back" (2003)

So many story lines...5th national championship!...Back to Back National Championship!...First national championship decided by a penalty kick shootout...First Time in YC's 15-year history with exclusively All-American team...First national title match in 20

years where winning team did not score first...In fact, Yavapai came back from a 2-0 first half deficit to defeat Mercer County, NJ 3-2 in a penalty kick shootout to win the NJCAA National Championship...Goalkeeper Stephen O'Farrell won his third penalty kick shootout in 3 attempts during his 2-year career at Yavapai...YC defeated East Central, MO 2-1 in the national semifinals and Springfield, Ill. 2-0 in the national quarterfinals...The Roughriders won their 15th consecutive Arizona Conference title...Goalkeeper Bobby Armstrong (0.42 GAA) and Forward Maurice Hughes (29 goals) were selected to the NSCAA All-America First Team...Josh Westermann selected NSCAA All-West First Team...Hughes, Westermann, O'Farrell joins Craig Ettinger, Jason Martin and Sky Asay -Davis has the only Roughriders to win two national titles...nation's best home attendance.

"Sweet Sixteen" (2004)

For the 16th consecutive year, Yavapai captured the Arizona Conference title...YC defeated Chandler-Gilbert 4-1, scoring four first half goals, in the Regional Championship Game...On a flooded field in Tyler, Texas the Roughriders lost in the National Quarterfinals to Georgia Perimeter 3-2...Yavapai continued their streak of never losing a national consolation match defeating South Suburban, Illinois and Schoolcraft, Michigan, thus finishing in the top four in the country for the 14th time in 15 years...Yavapai completed the season with a 23-2-0 overall record...Defender Michael Randolph (21 points), Goalkeeper Robert Armstrong (second all-time in career saves with 133), and Todd Brown (team record 34 goals in a season) were named to the NSCAA All-American Team...Tyler Hasman (20 goals) joined the three All-Americans on the NSCAA All-West Team...nation's best attendance.

"Excitement, Drama & Tradition" (2005)

The fastest Yavapai team accounted for 116 goals, second all-time at Yavapai, en route to a 24 win season which ties a school record...The Roughriders clinched its 17th consecutive conference title...Yavapai won five playoff games (4-1 over Chandler-Gilbert, 3-0 against Pima, 4-1 versus North Idaho, 5-1 at Nationals against Illinois Central and a dramatic 3-2 win in the national semifinal over Louisburg, North Carolina...Yavapai played in their 11th national championship game before losing to Georgia Perimeter...For the 15th time since 1990, Yavapai won more than 20 matches in a season including posting a winning record at the national tournament with the national runners-up finish...Midfielder Obed Becerra (15g,13a) was named Region Player of the Year while Michael Pantalone was named Coach of the Year for the 11th time...Pantalone passed 30-year St. Louis Flo-Valley retired coach Pete Sorber for most wins over .500, finishing the season with 344 games over .500. Obed Becerra, Forward Tyler Hasman (21g, 13a) and defender Patrick Roy (+79) were named to the NJCAA and NSCAA All-America Teams.

"Undefeated Season with an Asterisk" (2006)

The Roughriders captured their 18th consecutive conference title along with their 16th region and 16th district championship...Yavapai tied Mercer (NJ) 1-1 and Northern Oklahoma 2-2 at the national tournament but lost on penalty kicks by identical scores of 4-3...According to the new rules, these two matches go down in the books as a tie. Shootouts are designed for tournament advancement purposes only. Somehow the Roughriders finished the season unbeaten at 22-0-3. Roger Espinoza, Tim Kelly and Chris Johnson (17 goals) were named to the NJCAA All-America Team...Espinoza and Kelly, who anchored the school's best statistical defense (0.35 goals against average) were also named to the NSCAA All-America Team...Michael Pantalone was named NSCAA West Region Coach of the Year for the 12th time and inducted into the NJCAA Soccer Hall of Fame. Yavapai posted 17 shutouts including Chandler-Gilbert 2-0, Pima 1-0 and North Idaho 2-0 in post-season play. For the 16th time since 1990, Yavapai won more than 20 matches in a season including a victory over Tyler (TX) 2-1 in the title game of the Five Star Tournament.

"A Season to Remember" (2007)

Seventeen years to the day after the Roughriders captured their first national championship, Yavapai

trailed 1-0, 3-2 (with two minutes remaining) and even in the shootout but Yavapai would not be denied, winning their sixth national title over Georgia Perimeter (4-3) after seven rounds of penalty kicks (5-4)...Yavapai defeated Paradise Valley 7-1, Pima 5-2, North Idaho 4-2, Illinois Central 1-0 and Marshalltown (IA) 3-0, completing a undefeated post-season...Yavapai won their 19th consecutive conference title and tied a school record with 24 wins in one season...Region Player of the Year Irving Garcia and Vincent Fimbres were named to the NSCAA All-America Team...Michael Pantalone became the all-time leader in NJCAA Division One victories with 417...He was also named NJCAA & NSCAA National Coach of the Year.

"The Perfect Season" (2008)

The Roughriders captured their 7th National Championship, completing a perfect season, winning all 26 games...Yavapai becomes the first NJCAA team to win 26 games in one season...Dirk Petersen first half header off a free kick was the only goal scored in the national championship final against San Jacinto, Tex...Other playoff matches included wins over Chandler-Gilbert 2-0, Pima 1-0, North Idaho 6-1, Schoolcraft (MI) 3-1, Garden City (KS) 4-1...The defense, lead by the back four of Chris Hunter, Dirk Petersen, Evan McNeil and Jeff Bendawald posted 15 shutouts and allowed no more than one goal in the other 11 matches...Yavapai won their 20th consecutive conference title...For the first time Yavapai had two 30-goal scorers in the same season with First Team NJCAA & NSCAA All-America forwards Francis Khamis (YC's all-time goal scorer) and Justin Meram (YC's all-time points leader), also named JUCO National Player of the Year...Associate Coach Hugh Bell was inducted into the NJCAA Soccer Hall of Fame...Michael Pantalone was named NJCAA and NSCAA National Coach of the Year.

"Back to Jersey Season" (2009)

The Roughriders made their 19th trip to the national tournament in the past 20 years, returning to Trenton, New Jersey for the first time in 10 years...Yavapai finished fifth in the country and was awarded the National Sportsmanship Trophy...The Roughriders captured their 21st consecutive conference title and won playoff matches against Pima 2-1, Arizona Western 2-0 and Iowa Central 2-0, tied Essex County, NJ 1-1, and lost in the quarterfinals to Louisburg, NC...Gabriel Okito scored Yavapai's 2000th all-time goal versus South Mountain on Sept. 14...Okito and Gene Tibbetts were named to the NJCAA All-America Team...Tibbetts also selected to the NSCAA All-America Team...Yavapai completes the decade with 10 consecutive national tournament appearances, six national championship game appearances and four national titles...also in the past 10 years, the Roughriders lost only two home matches, both in overtime and playing down a man.

"Every 11 Seasons" (2010)

For only the second time in the past 21 years, the Roughriders failed to qualify for the National Tournament...Yavapai, winners of the past 10 region and district playoff championships, lost to Pima in a playoff match ending their season with 15 wins...In addition, the Roughriders ended a remarkable streak of capturing 21 consecutive conference titles, finishing second in the 11-team league.

"Undefeated Regular Season" (2011)

For the ninth team in team history, Yavapai had an undefeated regular season...The Roughriders scored a record 10 goals in a region playoff match before being defeated in the region championship game...Yavapai recorded 109 goals for the season en route to their 22nd conference title.

"500 & Counting" (2012)

The Roughriders won their 500th all-time match on exactly the same day (Sept. 1) that the program recorded its first-ever win back in 1989...A double overtime win over Pima lifted YC to their 23rd league title...Yavapai shutout Arizona Western for their 20th region title before losing in Wyoming in district play...The Roughriders scored 101 goals, finishing with a 21-3-0 overall record.

"Cardiac Kids" (2013)

Endless knack of magical finishes while snatching wins out of the proverbial jaws of defeat were witnessed throughout the season...11 one-goal victories, seven wins in extra time including three penalty kick shootout

victories (against Phoenix for the Region One Title; Burlington, NJ and Eastern Florida in the national tournament)...20th national tournament appearance for the Roughriders, finishing third in the country (18th all-time final four finish)...Michael Pantalone set a new national record for the most career coaching wins in NJCAA soccer history with 535 on November 9 with a 3-0 victory over Otero JC (Col.) in West District title match at Ken Lindley Field.

"Hosting Nationals" (2014)

After leading the nation in both scoring (103 goals) and goals against average (0.38) in addition to having an undefeated regular season for the 10th time in Yavapai history, the Roughriders abruptly lost a region playoff match in overtime...the defeat denied the Roughriders an opportunity to play in the NJCAA National Tournament which was hosted for the first time by Yavapai College, the City of Prescott and the Town of Prescott Valley...Yavapai captured their 24th conference title, broke numerous conference records (goals, shutouts) en route to their 20th twenty-win season and a national third place ranking in the final NJCAA and NSCAA poll.

"3 for the Road" (2015)

Yavapai captured their 25th conference title with a 2-0 victory at Phoenix College on the final day of the regular season...The Roughriders finished one of the toughest, most grueling league championship runs on the final week of play, defeating Pima CC 6-2 in addition to winning three consecutive road matches on three consecutive days...Yavapai finished fifth in the national rankings continuing a streak of weekly national poll appearances dating back to the first week of the 1990 season.

"Second Chance" (2016)

After capturing the program's 26th conference title and suffering only their 15th all-time home defeat in a region playoff match, the Roughriders closed the books on the season...a week later, Yavapai received a call from the NJCAA and was asked to represent their region in the West District Playoffs due to a bench clearing brawl eliminating other region teams...a last minute bus trip to Cheyenne, Wyoming resulted in a lost to Trinidad State and a chance for Yavapai (issued no red cards for another season) to compete in their 21st national tournament...The Roughriders will host the 2017 NJCAA National Championships.

"Tradition Restored" (2017)

The Roughriders won conference, region and district titles, enroute to their 21st appearance in the national tournament which they hosted...Yavapai posted 23 wins, their 21st plus 20-win season...the 2017 team broke a 24-year old national scoring record with 145 goals in one season...Yavapai won 11 consecutive games in the second half of the season including six playoff matches before losing a national semifinal battle in overtime...Yavapai finish third in the country, their 19th final four finish.

"Unlike Ever Before" (2018)

Assistant Coach Hugh Bell took over early in the season when Head Coach Michael Pantalone was on family medical leave...the Roughriders defeated Mesa 5-2 in the region playoff match before losing to the eventual national champions Pima CC in Tucson 1-0...the Aztecs last defeat prior to their national title run was to Yavapai, 4-2 in Prescott.

"3000 and counting" (2019)

Yavapai scored their 3000th all-time goal in the final regular season match...Yavapai defeated ranked teams Phoenix, Pima and Otero JC at home along with Southern Nevada and Arizona Western on the road...After a 11-0 start at home in their 31st season, the Roughriders lost in overtime to Pima CC in a region playoff match.

"Conquering Adversity" (2021 Spring)

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 regular season was canceled and was instead played in the spring of 2021. The Roughriders fought through the shortened season and captured the region championship, before narrowly falling in the district title game. This was also the first season coached by Andre Luciano.

"A Quick Return to Normal" (2021)

After competing in the spring, the Roughriders had a quick turnaround after summer break for the start of the 2021 fall season. After going 8-7-1 during the regular season, the Roughriders headed to Yuma for the Region Championship match and fell 2-0.

“A New Era” (2022)

For the first time in program history, the Roughriders were not led by Coach Pantalione or a YC alumni. Under the direction of Chris Houser, the Roughriders went 9-3-1 during the regular season with a marquee win over region-foe Arizona Western. Unfortunately, YC eventually fell to AWC in the region title match to close out its season.

“A Building Block” (2023)

For the first time since the ACCAC split into NJCAA DI and DII schools, three teams competed for a spot in the region playoffs with Eastern Arizona College adding men's soccer to its athletic department. The Roughriders, however, were able to go on the road and defeat the Gila Monsters to, once more, clinch a spot in the region playoffs. For a third-straight year, however, YC was edged out by the Arizona Western College Matadors.

HISTORICAL MATCHES

Yavapai National Tournament Matches

1. Yavapai 2, Passaic, NJ 1 ('90 championship)

Kurt Funkhouser scores in the second sudden death overtime period as Yavapai, with 20 players from Arizona and 4 from Nevada, defeats heavily favored Passaic with all foreign players. (see photo page 20)

2. Yavapai 3, Mercer, NJ 0 ('97 championship)

The Roughriders finished an unbeaten season scoring two goals in the first 6 minutes to defeat the home team thus capturing their third national championship in the '90s.

3. Yavapai 1, San Jacinto, Tex. 0 ('08 championship)

Dirk Petersen's goal off a free kick early in the first half completed a perfect 26-0-0 season for the Roughriders. The 26 wins established a national record at any level.

4. Yavapai 4, Georgia Perimeter 3 ('07 championship)

Yavapai trailed 1-0, 3-2 with two minutes remaining in regulation, and even in the shootout session. But the Roughriders would not be denied winning their 6th national championship in the seventh shootout round (see page 16).

5. Yavapai 3, Mercer, NJ 2 ('03 championship)

Yavapai came back from a 2-0 first half deficit to win the only NJCAA Finals determined by a penalty kick shootout.

6. Yavapai 1, Mercer, NJ 0 ('94 semifinals)

Longest game in JUCO soccer history goes 11 shootout rounds before Kevin Zimmermann, Yavapai's goalkeeper, is inserted into the shootout by a little-known rule and scores game-winner for a 6-5 shootout victory.

7. Yavapai 3, Andrew, GA 0 ('92 championship)

In convincing fashion, Yavapai shutout all district and national playoff opponents including the Andrew game where the last 81 minutes were a mere formality.

8. Yavapai 2, Mercer, NJ 1 ('02 championship)

An early goal in each half enables Yavapai to capture its fourth national championship at Tyler, Texas. It was the first meeting between the two schools outside of New Jersey.

9. Yavapai 4, Herkimer, NY 0 ('90 semifinals)

A clinic! The game put Yavapai on the map with four-year college coaches.

10. Yavapai 2, Ulster, NY 1 ('91 semifinals)

With only 10 men and trailing 1-0 with 7 minutes to go, YC scores and four overtimes later, wins in a shootout 5-4.

11. Yavapai 3, Tyler, TX 2 ('95 semifinals)

Trailing 2-0 with 20 minutes to go, Yavapai scores two goals and another in the fourth overtime by Richard Elliot.

12. Yavapai 2, Massasoit, MA 0 ('92 semifinals)

A war! This was the national final played in the semifinal round. Yavapai showed eastern teams and fans that it could adjust and play a tough, physical game and win.

13. Yavapai 3, Mt. Ida, MA 0 ('97 semifinals)

On their way to an undefeated season, Yavapai won this heavyweight match in a driving rainstorm.

14. Yavapai 3, Louisburg, NC 2 ('05 semifinals)

In Tyler, Texas, Yavapai came from behind twice in this classic battle and qualified for their 11th national championship game appearance.

15. Yavapai 8, Schoolcraft, MI 0 ('01 quarterfinals)

Yavapai scored the most goals in a national tournament winner's bracket game.

16. Yavapai 2 Ulster, NY 1 ('90 quarterfinals)

Yavapai's first national playoff match in New Jersey was not easy. Trailing 1-0 at the half, YC scored two second half goals and became a hit with Jersey fans and four-year college coaches.

17. Yavapai 5, Allegheny, PA 0 ('92 quarterfinals)

Yavapai used "YMCA rules" and sub all 11 players at the 55 minute mark in this classic clinic.

18. Mercer, NJ 1, Yavapai 0 ('91 championship)

Although Yavapai lost, the game was a classic witnessed by 4,651 fans. The defeat ended Yavapai's 40-game winning streak, a NJCAA Division One national record.

19. Yavapai 7 Mercer, NJ 2 ('07 group play)

The Roughriders broke a national scoring record for goals in one season with seven of their 145 tallies against their long-time national rival.

20. Yavapai 2 Eastern Florida 1 ('13 group play)

Yavapai played three goalkeepers in winning their second consecutive shootout at the national tournament and third penalty kick win of the 2013 post-season.

Yavapai Region & District Playoff Matches

1. Yavapai 2, Pima 1 ('02 Region Final)

Erik Sterling's free kick with only 10 minutes left forced an overtime with YC winning in the sixth round of penalty kicks in the first and only shootout ever at Ken Lindley Field.

2. Yavapai 2 Phoenix 1 ('13 Region Final)

Similar storyline and result to the '02 region final. After tying the match with 10 minutes left in regulation and down throughout the shootout, Yavapai rallied to win in the sixth round of penalty kicks in their first ever region playoff match outside of Yavapai county.

3. Yavapai 1, St. Louis-Flo Valley 0 ('90 District Final)

Edson Rico scored with five minutes to go to upset the defending national champions in Missouri.

4. Yavapai 3, Otero, Col. 0 ('13 District Final)

Michael Pantalione set a new record for the most career coaching wins in NJCAA soccer history with 535. The win came in only the way he would have preferred—in a playoff game, at home at Ken Lindley field in Prescott where the program began in 1989, and resulting in their 20th trip to the national tournament.

5. Yavapai 4, Glendale 2 ('92 Region Final)

Josep Masllorens scored late in the second half to force overtime at Ken Lindley Field.

6. Yavapai 3, St. Louis-Flo Valley 2 ('91 District Semifinals)

Because of a snowstorm, the game was move to an astroturf field at the St. Louis Soccer Park where Kobah Washington and Jason Collins scored two goals in the last 15 minutes in 20 degree weather.

7. Yavapai 6, Glendale 0 ('90 Region Final)

Yavapai's first playoff game was a decisive victory in front of one of the largest crowds at home (see photo).

8. Yavapai 3, Richland, Tex. 2 ('95 District Final)

John Hunter scored the final of his three goals with 5 minutes remaining in Dallas, Texas. YC played with 10 men for 70 minutes.

9. Yavapai 2, Pima 1 ('98 Region Semifinal)

Ty Hibbert scored with only 28 seconds remaining in regulation and tallied again in the second overtime.

10. Yavapai 1, Johnson County, Kan. 0 ('91 District Final)

Jose Miranda scored in the 104th minute in Missouri. Throw-ins were taken on the top of snow banks in below freezing weather.

11. Yavapai 3, Richland, Tex. 0 ('92 District Semifinal)

A clinic in Dallas, Texas where YC took another step towards their national championship.

12. Yavapai 3, Richland, Tex. 1 ('94 District Final)

Trailing 1-0, YC substituted a defender for a third forward and Octavio Heredia scored with 50 seconds to go (in the first half). YC tallied two second half goals in a tough home win.

13. Yavapai 3, Hesston, Kan. 1 ('90 District Semifinal)

YC first playoff win on the road played at a bizarre setting in Parkville, Missouri. One example included Ed Brooks disappearing while falling downhill after saving a ball on the far touchline. He snuck 40 yards downfield, reappeared while reentering, and was wide open to the surprise of everyone. Contact alumni for other examples.

14. Yavapai 4, Glendale 1 ('91 Region Final)

All-time playoff scoring leader Kobah Washington had a hat trick against arch-rival Glendale before one of the largest crowds in Prescott.

15. Yavapai 2, Pima 1 ('01 Region Final)

YC scored in the 83rd minute to tie the match and force a sudden death overtime which lasted only a minute on Alan Gordon's game winning goal.

16. Yavapai 5, Mesa 0 ('00 Region Final)

YC's domination of regional championships continued with this rout.

17. Yavapai 3, St. Louis-Flo Valley 0 ('93 District Final)

The match marked the end of an era for one of the best junior college programs in the '70s and '80s.

18. Yavapai 4, Chandler-Gilbert 1 ('04 Region Final)

The match was over at halftime with four spectacular first half goals.

19. Yavapai 1, Pima 0 ('06 Region Final)

Chris Johnson scored the winner off a corner kick late in the second half.

20. Yavapai 1, Pima 0 ('08 Region Final)

Justin Meram scored a second half goal continuing the run to the school's 7th national championship and a perfect season.

Yavapai Regular Season Games

1. Yavapai 4, St. Louis-Forest Park 3 (1989)

Edson Rico scored 4 goals against a nationally ranked team in the Roughriders first game ever.

2. Yavapai 6, Pima 3 (1990)

The Roughriders scored five goals by Edson Rico and Roger Salazar in the last 20 minutes to come from a 2-goal deficit to win the home season opener.

3. Yavapai 8, Mesa 3 (1990)

This wild home match featured as many red cards as Yavapai goals. When told to go into the game, Kurt Funkhouser asked what position. The coach replied left, the entire left side.

4. Yavapai 1, Rancho Santiago, Calif. 0 (1995)

Goalkeeper Cesar Delgado posted a school record 16 saves in California against their state champion.

5. Yavapai 1, Rancho Santiago, Calif. 0 (1996)

A classic collegiate soccer match played at a neutral site in Las Vegas with the only goal scored by Ty Engram.

6. Yavapai 13, Victor Valley, Calif. 0 (1989)

The Roughriders first home game ever witnessed by curious locals, a band, and yes, even cheerleaders. The next night YC scored six goals and was asked by a local supporter just learning the game, "only six goals, what happen?"

7. Yavapai 6, St. Louis-Forest Park 0 (1991)

Six different players scored in the invitational tournament final at Mesa, AZ.

8. Yavapai 3, Spokane, Wash. 0 (1993)

This was the first men's intercollegiate soccer match ever in Montana. The game was played in Missoula, where Head Coach Pantalione founded Montana youth soccer in 1977.

9. Yavapai 5, Pima 0 (2001)

Alan Gordon scores four goals in 48 minutes in the "Columbus Day Massacre" at Tucson.

10. Yavapai 1, Massasoit, Mass. 1 (1990)

The Roughriders first trip back east was a wild affair with 80 fouls called in the overtime match. The trip to the Mercer Invitational was significant because it proved that YC could play with the traditional powers from the east, Mercer-NJ & Massasoit.

11. Yavapai 3, Rockville, MD 2 (2001)

Marcus Bailey scored with two minutes left in regulation to force extra time. YC won the match held in Baltimore on a Alan Gordon goal in the second overtime.

12. Yavapai 4 San Jacinto, Tex. 3 (2000)

YC came back from three, that's right, three one-goal deficits to win the match held in Meridian, Mississippi.

13. Yavapai 3, Meridian, Miss. 0 (1998)

YC won this televised match featuring a yellow card on a YC player for delay of game after he tripped over a television cable wire while attempting to take a corner kick.

14. Yavapai 4, Herkimer, NY 0 (1999)

A one-sided Hall of Fame Tournament match played at the Hall of Fame Field in Oneonta, New York.

15. Yavapai 2, Arizona Western 1 (2006)

Trailing 1-0, Yavapai scored two goals in the final two minutes of regulation to win in Yuma.

16. Yavapai 4, Monroe, NY 0 (1992)

Season home opener played in front of one of the largest crowds assembled at Ken Lindley Field.

17. Yavapai 8, Mesa 0 (2017)

The program's 600th win was a solid road victory.

18. Yavapai 13, Scott, IA 0 (2004)

Team and individual records were established in this match played in Minnesota.

19. Yavapai 2, Phoenix 0 (2015)

With this victory, the Roughriders captured their 25th conference championship, winning three consecutive road matches on three consecutive days.

20. Yavapai 3, Phoenix 2 (2011)

The Roughriders evened the score with 3:33 left in regulation and tallied the game-winner with 1:55 remaining in the second overtime for the program's 490th win.

Most Memorable Exhibition Games

1. Yavapai 3, San Diego State 2 (Spring 1991)

Trailing 2-1 at the half in San Diego, Edson Rico and Remy Bilsback scored second half goals to defeat SDSU, a top ten NCAA Division One team at the time.

2. Yavapai 3, UNLV 2 (Fall 1993)

At Las Vegas, Herbert Richards scored the deciding goal hitting a 40-yard missile in the 90th minute.

3. Yavapai 2, Grand Canyon University 0 (Fall 1989)

Just four days after reporting to the Prescott campus, the original pioneers of the program travel down to Phoenix wearing the Yavapai uniform for the first time while totally dominating "time of possession."





Ken Lindley Field History



Ken Lindley Field—Home of the Roughriders since 1989

The first intercollegiate soccer match took place in 1989 when Yavapai defeated Victor Valley CC 13-0 on “guaranteed win night.” Winning streaks of 58, 56, and 39 matches are a part of this field’s legacy. Today the park is listed in the National Register of Historic Places with a seating capacity of 3000, featuring a 116 x75 yd., grass surface; soccer field located 5368 feet above sea level and was the site of the 2014 NJCAA Men’s Division One National Championships. Since 1908, the area of Prescott now known as Ken Lindley Field has been used as a public park and ball field. The land was deeded to the City of Prescott by Charles

T. and Ada M. Joslin in 1922. In 1931, during the Great Depression, the grandstand was constructed on the corner of Gurley & Washington Streets. The grandstand is constructed of cast concrete in a vernacular style with a slight Art Deco influence. In 1934, the area surrounding the field was defined for the construction of bleachers made of native stone as a Civil Works Administration project. City Park & Ballfield was renamed Ken Lindley Field in 1971 in memory of Prescott’s Chief of Police who died in 1971. A memorial plaque for long-time groundskeeper Dewey Nelson is positioned proudly in the southwest corner of the stadium.

Mountain Valley Park History

The Prescott Valley Amphitheater at Mountain Valley Park is Yavapai’s other home soccer field that opened in 1996 for the Roughriders and during one stretch, Yavapai was undefeated and untied on this

120 x 75 yard grass field for a 17-year period. This venue was the site of the 2014 NJCAA Men’s Division One National Championship Tournament and played host to the 2017 event as well.
