Further exploration

2. How could the restoration of mobility impact someone's life? How could providing these low-cost prosthetics to India's millions with locomotor disabilities impact Indian society?
3. The typical amputee in developing countries has a very different profile than in the West. How is that demographic difference manifested in prosthetic development?



4. How might the collaboration between major research labs in Western countries and the Jaipur organization benefit people in both rich and poor countries?
