"Are they not all ministering spirits, sent forth to minister for them who shall be heirs of salvation?"-Heb. 1:14.

"The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear him and delivereth them."-Psalm 34:7.

"For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. They shall bear thee up in their hands, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone."—Psalm 91:11, 12. "The beggar died, and was carried by the angels into Abraham's

bosom."-Luke 16:22.

The Bible is so full of angels that it is remarkable how little Christian people know about them. There is a perversity, a carnality, a spiritual blindness, a tendency to unbelief in the human race that makes it hard to teach about invisible, miraculous things.

It is hard for human beings to believe in salvation by grace instead of works. People do not like to believe in the supernatural: they prefer the natural. Men prefer time to eternity, prefer the seen to the unseen. Men prefer to be rational and believe only what they see and understand instead of being obedient, believing what God has said!

Most men never saw an angel and therefore do not believe in angels. On the same ground, Nicodemus did not believe in the mi-raculous new birth. On that basis the fool has said in his heart, "There is no God."

Who Saw Angels?

Angels appeared to Abraham. To Lot and the men of Sodom.

To Jacob three times.

To Balaam.

To all the children of Israel. To Gideon.

To the mother and father of Samson, and many others in the Old Testament.

Then in the New Testament:

The Angel Gabriel appeared to Zacharias announcing the birth of John the Baptist and striking Zacharias dumb for his unbelief (Luke 1:11-20).

The Angel Gabriel appeared to

Mary announcing the conception, birth, Saviourhood and reign of Christ (Luke 1:26-38).

An angel appeared to Joseph (Matt. 1:20, 21).

The angel of the Lord appeared to the shepherds to announce that Jesus was born in Bethlehem, and then "there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:8-14).

After the temptation of Jesus, "behold, angels came and ministered unto him" (Matthew 4:11).

Again when Christ was sorrowful unto death in the Garden of Gethsemane "there appeared an angel unto him from heaven, strengthening him" (Luke 22:43).

At the resurrection of Christ, an angel rolled back the stone from the tomb, and the soldiers became as dead men (Matt. 28:

Two angels announced the resurrection to the women (Matt. 28: 5-7; Mark 16:5-7; Luke 24:4-7; John 20:11-13).

At the ascension of Christ, two angels announced the second coming (Acts 1:11).

Angels appeared to Peter and John, released them from prison and comforted them and sent them back to preach (Acts 5:19, 20). An angel in answer to the people's prayers released Peter from prison (Acts 12:7-10).

The angel of the Lord instructed Philip the evangelist (Acts 8:26).

An angel appeared to Cornelius in answer to his prayers and gave instructions for him to send for Peter and hear words whereby he should be saved (Acts 10:1-6).

An angel spoke to King Herod

and killed him for his sinful pride.

An angel appeared to Paul at night in the storm on board the ship and comforted him (Acts 27:

It is as clear as clear can be that Bible Christians, particularly those in the New Testament, had many dealings with heavenly angels.

Who Are Angels?

Angels are real heavenly beings. Hebrews 1:14 says,

"Are they not all ministering spirits, sent forth to minister for them who shall be heirs of salva-tion."

We are not to suppose that saved people when they go to Heaven become angels. Angels are not redeemed by the blood of Christ and even now we are only a little lower than the angels (Heb. 2:6, 7). We are imperfect SONS. The angels are perfect SERV-ANTS. Eventually, saved people will judge angels (I Cor. 6:3). The angels are marvelously beautiful

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
