(2) In Cor 12:13 by the baptizer used of the Spirit the creation, the body

(3) Christ is baptizer (Matt 3:11) in the sense, the Accounting gift

what is the difference - "baptized", "filled"?

1. There is no command, ever, for anyone to be baptized with the Spirit.
There is distinct instruction for every believer to be filled with the Spirit.
Eph. 5:18 imperative, present tense, continuous, repeated action.

2. The baptizing work of the H.S. a one-for-all operation.
at once, confirmation. Never baptized again.
Apostle twice I Cor 12:13.

The filling is the H.S. agent and again.
Present tense, Eph 5:18. And so Acts 2:4 etc.
Once baptism, many fillings.

The once-for-all baptism places man in the body of Christ,
of course & repeated, would mean a person would be
removed from that Body, this is stated by a second
baptism. A foreign idea from the 3 writers. As with the
land, first, replacing.

Eph. 4:5 Our God ... fill .. baptism.

4. The baptism places us in position to receive power
but it does not in itself guarantee that power.
