(2) A man practicing in the medical language? Hippocrates  
of Act 28:6 Μίνητραστιδει. working here. The classical,  
medical term is Hippocrates and Galen for inflammation.

but others came and received medical treatment & departure  
handed "no"

(3) Records 6 miracles not in other gospels; all but one, healing.

f. Act 28:3 "you would have said 'Gentile'  
a Roman : : : : "provinces"  
a Greek : : : : "Greece"

He is therefore a Gentile

f. Col. 4:10-14 "of the circumcision"  
"in 7 years"

1. He is an educated, Greek scientist  
They were natural born skeptics.  
f. Paul is atheist. Stoic, Epicurean.
  2. He is a marvellously gifted writer. Artistic, versatile.  
He alone has a literary pedigree to his gospel.  
Periodic in form. Writer in grand style, structure, vocabulary.
  3. He is writing to a cultured, wealthy Romans. (Anony)  
Kpatione - Technical, descriptive terms for agriculture  
(plebeians, knights, patricians)  
- his x<sup>th</sup> name, Theophilus  
Tradition; wealthy, gov. official in Antioch. Take from  
a good slave in his home. Educated him in medicine, not  
law etc. Took over his to P.
  4. He is a contemporary  
Acts stage 63 A.D. yet after 63 wrote many books plus  
64 - beginning of Rome  
- permitting? Yes  
- naturalized? No, Paul  
67 Jewish very began; 70 destroyed.
  5. He is a true historian. investigating his sources.  
With Paul to Judea, and 3<sup>rd</sup> missing journey.  
With Paul from Judea to Rome.  
what did he do, during those more than 2 years Paul is preying?  
Zebedee 1:1 written documents  
1:2 oral testimony  
1:3 thorough investigation  
1:4 verdict: "certain"

His true, factual, intimate story: from Mary.
