Tomb at Halicarnassus to Mausolus, King of Caria
by his widow, Artemisia, 363 BC.
140' high, 120' long, 100' wide. 800' of wooden panels

1. Cairn, (Carn). Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Cornwall, Brittany
Most remarkable in New Grange, Ireland. 400 paces in cir. interior with
30' high balconys.
180,000 tons of stone
Many parts of England, where stones were, made of earth. But made them
anyway. Diffs only in material.
A Highland Highlander would have said to his benefactor "I will add a
stone to your cairn."

2. Cromlech. Northern Europe. Rough stone supporting an enormous flat stone.
one well preserved in France the flat stone = 20 tons. Spherical monuments,
no archaic signs supposed. Chamber in some cases, etc.

3. Spherical Monuments.
All over the world. Europe, Asia, America. Monuments, raised up to memory of no one.

4. Obelisk. Prismatic monuments of stone, terminating with a pyramidal
top. Erected to celebrate great triumphs of monarchs. Some 105 feet.
of Cleopatra's need. N.Y.

5. Pyramid. Egypt & Old Mexico. Some said, once, they were erected for
astronomical purposes, some for resisting the encroachment of the desert, some
for granaries, reservoirs, but we discover monuments. A big built
found of the monarchs. The first and of an Egyptian monarch to pyramid it
about 500 feet high. 100,000 men for 50 years to build it. (This is Cheops)

9. Mausoleum. Tomb erected at Halicarnassus to Mausolus, King
of Caria, by his inconsolable widow, Artemisia, 353 BC.
140' high, 126' long, 100' wide. One of the 7 wonders of the world.

10. Taj Mahal, built at Agra, India, by the Mogul Emperor Shah Jahan in
memory of his favorite wife.
