What Lie Ahead for Life on Earth?

Smaller but no natural history they do not kill one another; a
big race suicide does it take us know -

The stars in the universe like globes in a
big room. Our sun one of the average stars.

If our earth collided with a star, the earth
and everything on it would be burned up. But if
so much heat produced by the smash did not
the rocks would be turned into glass. The cooled
star as about twice as hot as the inside of the
