Some days ago, in looking through some old file folders, I came across an interesting article by Preacher Hallock. It was in the Dec. 6, 1951 bulletin of First Church, Norman. In the article he quoted from "The Studebaker Co-Operator." Here is the quote:

"The boneless tongue, so small and weak,

Can crush and kill," declared the Greek.

"The tongue destroys a greater horde,"
The Turk asserts "than does the sword."

The Persian proverb wisely saith,

"A lengthy tongue, an early death."

Or sometimes takes this form instead: "Don't let your tongue cut off your head."

"The tongue can speak a word whose speed"

Says the Chinese "outstrips the steed." While Arab sages this impart:

"The tongue's great storehouse is the heart."

From Hebrew writ the maxim sprang "Tho" feet should slip, ne'er let the tongue." The sacred writer crowns the whole: "Who keeps his tongue doth keep his soul."

Preacher Hallock then wrote a rather lengthy article on the evils of gossip. After quoting much Scripture, he wrote: "How cure this dread malady? Practice praise! Praise God! Praise others!" He closed with Psalms 141:3: "Set a watch, O Jehovah, before my mouth; Keep the door of my lips."

Come to think of it, in all the years I knew Preacher Hallock, I never heard him repeat gossip about another person. He practiced what he preached!
