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Walls of Lions

Hence the magnificent coloured designs on the outer walls of lions (120 depictions in all), lions were thought to be the scared creatures of Ishtar, the goddess of war and love. The Ishtar Gate Adouble gate marked the end of the street, it served as fortification and also, during the New Year festivities, was used in the ritual of the procession of gods.

The inscription on the side of the gate depicts its construction under Kina Nebudnadnezzar.

Pergamum Museum

Dear Guests,
Welcome to the State Museums. Through the recorded tour guide you will acquire a better understanding of the world famous treasures of the Near Eastern Museum and the Antiquites Collection. The Processional Way, the Ishtar Gate from Babylon, the Market Gate of Miletus and of course the Altar of Pergamum are all cultural monuments which have made our collection famous throughout the world, they are admired every year by visitors from all over the alabo.

We would also like to recommend that you visit our other exhibi-tions. The State Museums house fourteen departments in six buildings.

The Altar of Pergamum

The Altar of Pergamum, building work began around 180 B. C. under King Eumenes II to thank the gods for their victory over the Galatians. Even in ancient times a famous morble building, it is an important testimony to the late Hellenistic architecture. Its friezes are particularly impressive. They depict the gods of light and darkness, sea and nature as well as a series of the Olympians in battle with the Giants. The portrayal of Zeus and Athena provides the highpoint.

Pergamum Castle Mountain

Major buildings in an Hellenistic-Roman town are depicted in the model of the **Pergamum Castle Mountain** (scale of 1:300) as is the Altar Terrace and above that the sanctuary of Athena with the famous library and the temple for the worship of the roman emperor (Traianeum).

The Market Gate of Miletus

The Market Gate of Miletus in Asia Minor, a typical work of Roman architecture ranks among the most famous monuments of classical architecture, probably built under Emperor Hadrian around 130 A. D. It is a symmetrically designed two-storeyed focade with two protruding wings and three arched doorways.

These provided the magnificent entrance to the largest market place in Miletus and together with other impressive buildings formed the architectural framework for the political centre of this ancient commercial town. The Mosaic Floor also comes from Miletus and dates from the

second half of the 2nd century A. D., it was found in the dining room of a private house, and is called the **Orpheus mosaic**.

The Baalbek Columns

The Baalbek Columns belong in the Column Room of sanctuary of Jupiter and were made from Egyptian rose granite. They are interesting technically as the shafts were made from a single block in the middle of the 2nd century A. D.

The Processional Way

The Babylonian structures in the Near Eastern Museum were built in the time of King Nebuchadnezzar II, between 604 and 562 B. C. The **Processional Way**, built as part of the fortifications of the northern entrance to Babylon, was originally 250 m long and 25 m wide and paved in a variety of colours, it was used mainly for religious purposes as a procession street (New Year festivities).
