people were reached with **access to clean water**.

9,074,614

people have engaged with **Christian discipleship activities and tools** to support the spiritual nurture of children.

665,958

people, including 209,517 children, benefited from **health education, training, and improved healthcare**.

World Vision counts the number of people who participate in each sector program separately and combines these for total reach. Because of World Vision's holistic approach, some people will participate in more than one program during the campaign and will be counted more than once in the total.

Global Water

Karla, mother of three in Las Pilas, Honduras, used to walk 45 minutes to collect water—sometimes twice a day. “We carried the jugs on our heads or shoulders, and many times we returned with only half because it spilled along the way,” she said. The water wasn’t clean, and her young daughter, Briana (pictured), often got sick.

For years, the community searched for solutions—exploring springs, digging wells, even buying a water source they couldn’t maintain. “We looked here and there, but there aren’t any large springs around. We had to keep insisting and knock on many doors,” Karla said.

That persistence led them to World Vision. Together, Karla, her neighbors, and World Vision planned and built a gravity-fed water system. Community members contributed labor and materials. Today, clean water flows to 42 homes.

“Before, we spent a lot on diapers and wipes for our daughter because there was no water to wash,” Karla said. “Now we don’t have to—we have water every day, and that changes everything.”

Child Protection

Lucky, pictured left with her daughter, from Cox’s Bazar in Bangladesh, has fought to rebuild her life since her husband abandoned the family 11 years ago. With no income and a broken van—their only asset—she struggled to feed her four children, and pressure to marry off her daughters grew each day.

When Lucky learned about World Vision’s Big Dream to End Child Marriage program, she enrolled in the Child Safety Net project and received an interest-free loan of about \$230, on the condition she would not arrange child marriage. “It was a blessing,” she said.

Repairing the van allowed her son to earn daily income and keep his sisters in school, restoring a measure of stability the family had long prayed for. One of them, Riya (pictured right), her second daughter, shared: “Before taking the loan I could not go to school regularly ... But now I want to be a police officer.”

Global Emergency Response

Seventeen-year-old Anita* was away from home when she learned that her entire village, including her parents, had been taken hostage. She waited in fear until the news came: Everyone had been murdered. More than 100 armed groups terrorize villages in eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo—abducting families, recruiting children, and committing horrific violence with near total impunity.

Amid repeated displacement and ongoing violence, World Vision equips pastors and other faith leaders to help children heal from trauma. Pastor Mayani was one of 196 faith leaders trained, and his counseling helped Anita return to school. “I am grateful to World Vision for equipping us, as pastors, to know how to heal wounded souls, those most affected by killings and terror,” he said.

Anita said that memories of her family still pierce her heart. “I draw comfort from God,” she said, “the greatest comforter. I place my hope in Him and bless His servants who, every day, through their emotional support, help me prevent this pain from destroying me.”

Christian Discipleship

Haniel, 9 (pictured), is known as “the counselor” among his friends in Hawassa, Ethiopia. Bright and responsible, he’s the eldest of three siblings and often guides his peers at school, church, and in the village. Despite often caring for his siblings while his mother works far away, he continues to excel in school. One day, he hopes to become a mechanical engineer.

Haniel attends Sunday school at Immanuel United Church, a key partner of the Let the Children Come (LCC) project. Thanks to teachers trained and equipped by World Vision through LCC, he’s thriving in age-appropriate programs that nurture children’s understanding of God and His Word. Through LCC classes, Haniel has developed a deep love for Scripture. He memorizes long Bible passages in Amharic and English and has even led entire church services. His ministry has grown beyond his home church—he now visits other congregations to share Scripture and what God is teaching him.



These experiences have strengthened both his confidence and his faith. As Haniel put it, “The Lord is my everything—my life, shield, provider, and Father.”

Economic Empowerment

Don Antonio (pictured left) knew scarcity. For 40 years, he scraped by, growing only corn and beans and depending entirely on the rain. “Almost every year was a struggle,” he said, “but we had no other choice.” Then, THRIVE (Transforming Household Resilience in Vulnerable Environments) offered him a different path.

“World Vision trained us in Biblical Empowered Worldview, and that changed everything,” he said. “It brought us closer to God, taught us to have a clean heart, to help others, and to work together.” Through THRIVE, Don Antonio and neighboring farmers formed a producer group and diversified their crops, planting tomatoes and jalapeños.

Don Antonio’s annual income is now eight times what it was before THRIVE. He can provide for his granddaughter Genesis (pictured right), save for emergencies, and invest in his dreams. Genesis often works beside him in the fields—learning, helping, and carrying forward the hope taking root in their family. He’s traded scarcity for abundance.

Health

In northern Ethiopia, conflict and hunger upended the life of Kelem and her 2-year-old son, Alembirhan (pictured). Forced to flee their home in West Tigray, they arrived at the Seleklaka internally displaced persons camp, where Alembirhan was diagnosed with severe acute malnutrition. “He was underweight and wasn’t getting enough food,” Kelem recalled.

Thanks to help from World Vision’s mobile health and nutrition team, Kelem found strength during an uncertain time. Alembirhan received ready-to-use therapeutic food and regular checkups, while Kelem learned how to care for him and support his recovery. In a matter of weeks, she began to see changes. “With the nutrition support and counseling, my son’s physical health was restored,” she said. “He can now sit without any support, stand by himself, and has even begun to walk independently.”

Alembirhan’s recovery restored more than his health—it renewed Kelem’s confidence. Through her involvement with World Vision, she gained practical tools and a renewed sense of hope for what’s ahead. “My ultimate goal is to see him go to school,” said Kelem. “I hope one day he can become a person who will bring real change to our community.”
